SUBJECT: Alameda County Federal Inactive Projects Update

Recommendation

This item will provide the Alameda County Technical Advisory Committee with an update on the current Caltrans Inactive Projects list (Attachment A), which identifies federal funding at risk of deobligation due to delayed invoicing, and will request that Committee members take the necessary actions to keep funding obligations active. This item is for information only.

Summary

Federal regulations require local agencies receiving federal funds to regularly invoice against each obligation and close out projects in a timely manner. Caltrans maintains a list of inactive obligations with no invoice activity for the past six months. If Caltrans does not receive an invoice during the subsequent five-month period, the project's federal funds will be at risk for deobligation unless the local agency provides proper justification. To reduce the occurrence of inactive projects, MTC requires local agencies to implement quarterly invoicing, starting with the second invoice.

ACTAC members, in coordination with Single Points of Contact, are requested to review the latest inactive projects list (Attachment A, posted on 9/9/26 and reflective of sponsor updates as of 9/17/26). Project sponsors with inactive projects are to work directly with Caltrans Local Assistance to clear the inactive invoicing status and provide periodic status updates to Alameda CTC (via email to Seon Joo Kim at sjkim@alamedactc.org) until the projects are removed from the Caltrans report.

Background

Federal and State Requirements

In response to the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA's) requirements for processing inactive obligations, Caltrans manages federal obligations, as follows:

- If Caltrans has not received an invoice for obligated funds in over six months, the project will be deemed inactive and added to the list of Federal Inactive Obligations. The list is updated regularly on the [Caltrans Inactive Projects website](#).
- If Caltrans does not receive an invoice within the following five months (or 11 months without invoicing), Caltrans will require local agencies to provide proper justification for inactivity (causes beyond the control of the agency, such as litigation, unforeseen utility relocations, or unforeseen environmental concerns) and establish a timeframe for invoicing.
- FHWA could deobligate the unexpended balances if the local agency does not provide justification or an invoice within the specified timeframe. The deobligation process is further detailed in [FHWA's Obligation Funds Management Guide](#), which states that project costs incurred after deobligation are not considered allowable costs for federal participation and are therefore ineligible for future federal reimbursement.

Regional Requirements

MTC Regional Project Delivery Policy, [Resolution 3606](#), states, “*Agencies with projects that have not been invoiced against at least once in the previous six months or have not received a reimbursement within the previous nine months have missed the invoicing/reimbursement deadlines and are subject to restrictions placed on future regional discretionary funds and the programming of additional federal funds in the federal TIP until the project receives a reimbursement.*” Additionally, MTC may delay the obligation of currently programmed regional discretionary funding to a future year, which could impact the sponsor agency’s ability to include a project in MTC’s Annual Obligation Plan. Thus, agencies with inactive projects must aim for resolving their inactive status as promptly as possible to avoid restrictions on federal funds.

MTC actively monitors inactive obligations, periodically contacts project sponsors for status updates, and requires sponsor agencies to update County Transportation Agencies (Alameda CTC for Alameda County) and MTC if they cannot award/encumber the federal funds within six months of obligation. MTC also encourages sponsors to consider including funds in the Construction Engineering phase so that eligible staff costs can be invoiced if the construction contract process gets delayed.

Fiscal Impact: There is no fiscal impact. This item is for information only.

SUBJECT: One Bay Area Grant County Program Cycles 2 and 3 Obligation Status Update

Recommendation

This item will provide the Alameda County Technical Advisory Committee with an update on the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) County Program Obligation Status Report (Attachment A). OBAG project sponsors are required to remain in compliance with OBAG program and project delivery requirements. This item is for information only.

Summary

In accordance with Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) Resolutions 4202 (for OBAG Cycle 2) and 4505 (for OBAG Cycle 3), OBAG sponsors must comply with Regional Project Delivery requirements detailed in Resolution 3606 and its supplemental Annual Obligation Plan (AOP) requirements, as well as various policy, assessment, and reporting requirements related to Complete Streets, pavement condition and needs, and housing.

As a County Transportation Agency (CTA), Alameda CTC is required by MTC to monitor the delivery of MTC discretionary funding, including OBAG, and as such provides periodic OBAG obligation status updates to ACTAC to help identify risks to timely funding delivery in order to avoid any loss of funding. ACTAC members with unobligated OBAG funds are requested to coordinate with their respective Single Point of Contacts (SPOCs) to take the actions needed to remain in compliance with MTC's requirements and email updates to Seon Joo Kim, sjkim@alamedactc.org.

Background

OBAG program requirements and compliance status for Cycle 2 and 3 are noted below:

- Housing and Community Development (HCD) Housing Element Certification (*by 12/31/24, for the current Regional Housing Needs Allocation cycle for OBAG 3 sponsors; all compliant*)

- HCD Annual Progress Report (*annually, all compliant to date*)
- Highway Performance Monitoring System traffic streets checklist (*annually, all compliant to date*)
- Housing Law Self-Certification (*by 12/31/24; all compliant*)
- Local Roadway Safety Plan* (*all Cycle 2 and 3 sponsors compliant*)
- Pavement Management Program certification (*deadline varies by sponsor; all compliant or will be pending completion of the latest Technical Assistance Program*)
- Local Streets and Roads Survey (*biennially, all compliant to date*)
- Highway Performance Monitoring System Traffic Count (*biennially, all compliant to date*)
- Complete Streets policy compliance and resolution (*all compliant*)

* For OBAG County Program Cycle 4, MTC is continuing all of the requirements with some clarifications, such as the need to update the Local Roadway Safety Plan every five years.

OBAG project delivery requirements include deadlines for Field Review, Request for Authorization (RFA), FHWA Authorization to Proceed (E-76), and Contract Advertisement and Award, as well as invoicing frequencies. After MTC's January 31 obligation deadline, sponsors can advance a project not originally included in the FY 25-26 AOP to submit their RFAs to Caltrans (subject to the remaining Obligation Authority for the region) but no later than June 17, 2026. Following the obligation, sponsors must submit the first invoice within 6 months, receive reimbursement from Caltrans within 9 months, and implement quarterly invoicing thereafter.

OBAG project delivery status, as shown in the OBAG County Program Obligation Status Report (Attachment A), indicates that five projects are proceeding to access the OBAG funds in FY 26-27 or later. FY 26-27 is the final year of OBAG 3, and any OBAG 3 funds unobligated after the regional deadline of 1/31/27 may be reprogrammed by MTC to other projects. Project sponsors are to report to Alameda CTC any actual or potential delivery issues as soon as possible in order to allow sufficient time to avoid any loss of funds. Potential solutions may include reprogramming OBAG 3 funds from projects that cannot meet MTC's obligation deadline to projects that can obligate the funds within the required timelines. Alameda CTC is also working with sponsors and MTC to explore the possibility of an extension.

Fiscal Impact: There is no fiscal impact. This is an information item only.

SUBJECT: Approve Nominations for the 2028 Comprehensive Investment Plan – One Bay Area Grant Cycle 4 County and Community Action Resource & Empowerment Programs

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Commission approve the recommended nominations for the federal One Bay Area Grant Cycle 4 (OBAG 4) County and the regional Community Action Resource & Empowerment Programs.

Summary

This item presents the first phase of the 2028 Comprehensive Investment Plan (CIP) programming process, including staff recommendations to nominate eleven (11) projects for OBAG 4 funds and one (1) project for CARE funds to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC). MTC is expected to adopt the final OBAG 4 county programs of projects in early 2027. Projects not selected for OBAG 4 or CARE funding will be considered during the second phase of the 2028 CIP programming process, with recommendations for the remaining CIP funds anticipated in May 2027.

Background

Alameda CTC programs and allocates transportation funding through its CIP, a biennial process that coordinates multiple funding sources into a single programming cycle to advance the goals of the Countywide Transportation Plan and voter-approved transportation expenditure plans.

On May 28, 2026, Alameda CTC released the 2028 CIP Call for Projects, making approximately \$200 million available from locally administered fund sources, federal OBAG 4 funds, and regional CARE funds. By the July 27, 2026 application deadline, Alameda CTC had received sixty-eight (68) applications requesting approximately \$272.9 million.

To align with the procedures and timelines of the available funding sources, the 2028 CIP programming recommendations will be developed in two phases. The first major milestone is the Commission's consideration of OBAG 4 and CARE - Community-Based Transportation Plan Project Development Technical Assistance (CARE CBTP-TA) project nominations that are required to be submitted to MTC by October 31, 2026 (the subject of this item). Following MTC's final determination of OBAG and CARE funding awards, projects that are not selected for those funds will be evaluated for other CIP funding consideration.

For the OBAG 4 program evaluation, twenty-five (25) of the sixty-eight (68) CIP applications requested OBAG 4 funding consideration. These applications were initially screened for consistency with the 2026 Countywide Transportation Plan and evaluated using the Commission-approved criteria and requirements for the 2028 CIP, OBAG 4, and CARE programs, adopted in May 2026.

Alameda CTC staff recommends nominating a program of projects for OBAG 4 funding achieving the \$77.7 million Alameda County OBAG 4 target level prescribed by MTC. This includes eleven (11) projects nominated for funding. Should additional OBAG 4 funding capacity become available, the nomination lists also includes three additional contingency projects as identified in Attachment A and B.

Additionally, the OBAG 4 nomination includes funding for countywide priorities, including \$9.2 million for the Alameda Countywide Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program and \$4.0 million for County Transportation Agency (CTA) planning and programming activities. These funds will support required countywide planning, programming, and monitoring functions.

For the CARE Program, staff recommends one (1) project for the \$3.1 million available in CARE CBTP-TA funding as identified in Attachment C.

Following submission of Alameda County's nominations, MTC will evaluate the proposed projects alongside nominations from the other Bay Area counties and is expected to adopt the final OBAG 4 county programs of projects in early 2027.

Following MTC's action, Alameda CTC will evaluate projects not selected for OBAG 4 or CARE funding, as currently shown in Attachment D, for consideration under the remaining CIP funding sources, including local funds and CARE Project-Based Initiative (PBI), with recommendations to be presented in May 2027.

Fiscal Impact
