BACKGROUND & ANALYSIS

Because of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the District Board has met by Zoom teleconference, as did the City of American Canyon as allowed by Executive Order N-29-20 which technically expired on September 30, 2021. Assembly Bill 361, which was approved by the Governor on September 16, 2021, allows local agencies such as the District to continue to meet by Zoom teleconference, provided that certain conditions are met.

The effect of Executive Order N-29-20 was to suspend certain provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Open Meeting Act (Government Code Section 54950 et seq.), which only allowed remote teleconference participation by District Board Members through a posting process at that Legislative body's physical location, with agenda provisions indicating that location with a requirement that it be accessible to the public.

Enclosed is a District Board Resolution which would comply with the provisions of AB 361 to allow continued Zoom meetings of the District Board, while also permitting in-person meetings. This "hybrid" style of meeting continues to promote social distancing by allowing members of the Board and members of the public to participate in the manner in which they feel most safe, thereby promoting public participation while simultaneously protecting vulnerable members of the public,

such as those with compromised immune systems.

The ability to continue to meet by Zoom, even in conjunction with Open Meetings, can be accomplished by the District Board provided that monthly resolutions as amended are enacted with provisions referencing appropriate confirmation of declared emergencies are described.

Stated plainly, the Board will have to enact a "361 Resolution" at each meeting of the District Board to allow the Zoom teleconference procedure to continue with the scheduled in-person meetings.

Changes to the initial Agenda page of the Board will also change in May 2022 as the means for the public to participate via continued Zoom teleconference will have to be described consistent with the AB 361 procedures rather than Executive Order N-29-20. These changes indicate that, pursuant to this authority, members of the public and members of the District Board may continue to participate by Zoom video/teleconferencing, or alternatively participate in person at the designated physical meeting location.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-07

A RESOLUTION OF THE AMERICAN CANYON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY EXISTS, RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY GOVERNOR NEWSOM ON MARCH 4, 2020, AND AUTHORIZING IN-PERSON OR REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF THE AMERICAN CANYON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT FOR THE PERIOD MAY 1, 2022 THROUGH MAY 31, 2022 PURSUANT TO BROWN ACT PROVISIONS

WHEREAS, the American Canyon Fire Protection District (“District”) is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the American Canyon Fire Protection District Board of Directors (“Board”);

WHEREAS, all meetings of the District’s legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the District’s legislative bodies conduct their business;

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions;

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558;

WHEREAS, that proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the District’s boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters;

WHEREAS, that proclamation also requires that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees;

WHEREAS, emergency conditions exist in the District, specifically, a State of Emergency has been proclaimed by Governor Newsom on March 4, 2020, proclaiming a State of Emergency to exist in California as a result of the threat of COVID-19;

WHEREAS, during the COVID-19 pandemic, the District Board has conducted remote, teleconferenced meetings consistent with the Governor’s Executive Orders promoting social distancing;

WHEREAS, consistent with AB 361, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in Government Code Section 54953(e), the District Board must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the District, and the District Board has done so;

WHEREAS, due to the emergence of new variants of COVID-19, such as Delta Variant, followed by the surging of the Omicron Variant of COVID-19, not all members of the public may feel safe to participate personally at in-person meetings;

WHEREAS, the District Board has determined that conducting “hybrid” style meetings with the option for members of the public and members of the Board of Directors to attend either virtually or in person would allow participation in a manner in which individuals feel most safe, thereby promoting public participation while simultaneously promoting social distancing and protecting vulnerable members of the public, such as those with compromised immune systems;

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency, the District Board does hereby find that the legislative bodies of the District shall conduct their meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that such legislative bodies shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953; and,

WHEREAS, the District is providing teleconference access via a conference phone-line number to the meetings to ensure public access.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF AMERICAN CANYON FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

Section 2. Affirmation that Local Emergency Exists. The District Board hereby proclaims that a local emergency now exists throughout the District, and the surging Delta Variant of COVID-19 followed by the surging of the Omicron Variant of COVID-19 would present an imminent risk to meeting in person.

Section 3. Ratification of Governor’s Proclamation of a State of Emergency. The District Board hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California’s Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.

Section 4. Remote Teleconference and In-Person Meetings. The staff and legislative bodies of the District are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings by remote teleconference and in-person in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Section 5. Effective Date of Resolution. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of April 30, 2022 or such time the District Board adopts a subsequent Resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of the District may continue to teleconference without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of section 54953.

BACKGROUND & ANALYSIS

The County of Napa in response to community pressure resulting from the destructive 2017 and 2020 Fire Storms began investigating a process of developing a long term and sustainable Countywide Wildland Fire Threat Response and Fuel Reduction program. Once the Board of Supervisors realized the magnitude of the problem and scale of the need, it became apparent that current funding was insufficient to support the existing CWPP and related fire protection needs adequately.

The concept of a Countywide Sales Tax originally was proposed by the County of Napa without including the County's five Cities in their initial discussions or deliberations. It soon became apparent that the future of this sales tax initiative would be in jeopardy without the support of the Cities and their voters. The County agreed to re-configure its initial proposal and concept to include representation of the Cities (Mayor, Fire Chief, and City Manager) in any further Fire Tax discussions. A new Fire Tax Committee was formed and charged with re-configuring the proposal in an effort to better represent the interest of the Cities and the County with respect to the threat of Wildland Fire Countywide. The Committee quickly came to the table and over several weeks worked with County staff to negotiate a new and reconfigured Fire Tax Ordinance proposal for presentation to the Board of Supervisors for their consideration.

On March 9, 2022, the Napa County Board of Supervisors unanimously voted to place this sales tax on the ballot to fund wildfire prevention projects and enhanced wildland fire protection measures. The tax is designated for a 10-year period, so as to adequately provide sustained and dedicated funding to specifically address the ongoing threat of disastrous wildland fires within entirety of Napa County. The proposed fire tax is known as Measure L and will appear on the June 7, 2022 ballot.

Measure L needs two thirds of the votes to pass.

If approved the quarter-cent sales tax would generate approximately \$10 million a year Countywide beginning October 1, 2022. The money can only be spent to enhanced fire services and programs per the approved expenditure plan. Revenues will go to the County, Cities of Calistoga, St. Helena, Yountville, and Napa, in addition to the American Canyon Fire Protection District (District).

Measure L would generate a fund needed to build more fire resilient communities through fuel mitigation and enhanced fire protection programs throughout the county. Revenues may also be used to create fuel breaks, remove vegetation, educate the community about defensible space and other purposes.

Motivated by wildfires, the community organized a county/local level support from CalFire to create a Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). The CWPP was created by local Napa citizens from over 20 organizations including 15 Fire Safe Councils who are residents and landowners. From the CWPP, a five-year fuel reduction action plan was developed. The Plan is designed to evolve over time based on changing conditions and future fires.

What is Measure L

- ❑ ¼ cent sales tax, for 10 years.
- ❑ Special tax- can only be spent on enhanced wildfire programs per the approved expenditure plan.
- ❑ Revenues go to the County, Cities and ACFPD
- ❑ Oversight, auditing, transparency
- ❑ Considerable part of revenue comes from visitors (30%+/-)
- ❑ 100% of revenues stays in county

How it impacts American Canyon if Measure L passes



- ▶ Sales tax would increase from 7.75% to 8%.
- ▶ First five years, ACFPD would receive 4.72%
- ▶ By year nine ACFPD would receive 7.44%
- ▶ All Revenue will go to ACFPD to be appropriated by the annual action of the ACFPD Fire Board of Directors.

Why Measure L is needed

- Reducing wildfire risk and protecting public safety in Napa County are *critical*.
- 91% of voters polled in the Fall of 2021 agree that greater fire prevention is *important*.
- The cost for effective wildfire prevention projects exceeds the *limited available government funding*.
- We must do our part and take *responsibility for our own safety*.
- *Wildfires are becoming more frequent and extreme*
- *Measure L will bring in steady funding*; Visitors will pay their fair share of the tax.
- *Grant funding is unreliable, competitive, sporadic, and often inadequate*.
- *Local match funding* makes us more competitive for grant funding.

Catastrophe followed by a clear Action Plan



- ▶ Motivated by local wildfires, community members organized with support from CalFire to create a Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP)
- ▶ The CWPP was created by local Napa citizens from over 30 organizations including 15 Fire Safe Councils who are residents and landowners.
- ▶ From the CWPP, a 5-year fuel reduction action plan was developed.

CWPP: Fuel Reduction Projects

Why Measure L - Why Not State/Fed Grants

- Anticipated cost is to be approximately \$10 million a year for the next 10/+ years. During that time, we are likely to have more fires and even higher costs. Napa Firewise and the County are pursuing nearly \$50 million in State and Federal Grants that, if awarded will pay out over the next 5 years. Those grants require county matching, often on a 1:1 basis. Measure L Funds will be used as critical matching funds to help unlock tens of millions in grant money.
- State Funding \$138 Million it is split between many counties and is not guaranteed. If Napa was funded every year with the pro-rata share it would only be \$2.3 million for an effort that requires us to spend \$10-\$20 million annually. Measure L eliminates a dependency on uncertain funding from grants while enhancing our ability to secure grant funding.
- The measure anticipates and maximizes other funding sources. Measure L takes into consideration and supports further grant writing efforts.

Why Measure L - Environment/Health

A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF CAHILL

American Canyon Fire Protection District continues to build on its heritage of service to American Canyon. Since its establishment in 1957, the District is committed to ensuring the residents and businesses of American Canyon are afforded uninterrupted, efficient, and effective fire protection and pre-hospital emergency medical services.

The year 2021 provided numerous opportunities for our firefighters and administrative staff members to actively engage in support of the National, State, and local public health response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. We built on the community outreach we started in 2019 and 2020 and increased our ability to coordinate and support the delivery of vaccinations to our most vulnerable residents in local healthcare facilities and senior living environments. We teamed up with amazing partners, like North Bay Healthcare, the City of American Canyon, Holy Family Catholic Church, ACCERT, and Napa County Public Health to manage and offer first and second shot vaccination clinics here in American Canyon.

In April, we proudly promoted firefighters Preston Quick, Francisco Cano, and Sypridon Drossos at the

completion of their 18-month probation to the rank of Firefighter. These gentlemen are the future of our fire department. We look forward to following them through their careers here at ACFPD.

July marked another major accomplishment for the District and its employees with the promotion of Max Etchieson to the rank of Fire Captain. Fire Captains are the glue that holds our organization together. They supervise and provide leadership both in emergencies and during the majority of the time that our firefighters are on-duty training and living in the fire stations.

Speaking of fire stations, the Board of Directors of the Fire District (your City Council) took a bold step during the FY21/22 Budget preparation to hire an additional four firefighters in an effort to increase staffing in the District and guarantee that there will be a minimum of two engine companies on duty every day. This upgrade in service allows the fire department to operate more safely and efficiently from both the Donaldson Way and James Road fire stations.

This year, ACFPD firefighters and equipment were deployed to another drought-driven wild land MEGA fire, the Dixie Fire in the Plumas and Lassen National Forests. These incidents continue to overly burden federal, state, and local fire and emergency resources on an annual basis. ACFPD continues to be a supportive team member in this statewide emergency response.

August found us participating and supporting the Chamber of Commerce's inaugural event, Meet Me in the Street. We look forward to continuing to participate and be an active supporter of this excellent community activity. Our local CERT team members attended the Annual National CERT Convention this year in Springfield, Missouri. We are so fortunate to have such an active, well-trained and dedicated group of community volunteers giving back.

September gave way to our Annual 9/11 Ceremony sponsored by the Fire District. This year marked the 20th Anniversary of this sad, yet uniting event for our Country. In recognition of its significance, we reached out to local representatives of our faith-based communities. Their response was



heartwarming and indicative of the diversity and sense of community here in American Canyon. Thank you again to all who participated that day in honoring those we lost to that tragedy.

In Fall 2021, we developed a new partnership with UC Davis Medical Center for in-service medical continuing education opportunities for our firefighters and paramedics. We also welcomed our newest Chief Officer, Assistant Fire Chief Geoff Belyea. Geoff actually grew up in American Canyon before starting his 25-year long career with CAL Fire in Napa County. We are incredibly fortunate to have him on our team and look forward to all he has to offer as he helps guide our young department into the future.

Keeping in line with our theme, *A Year of Service*, we welcome our latest group of four new probationary firefighters to our Department. Firefighters Christina Breitenbueher, Brad Bermann, Davis Pratt, and Kyle Murchinson were sworn in by District Counsel William D. Ross on November 30th. These newest firefighters graduated from an intensive month-long in-house Fire Academy supervised and taught by Fire Captain Kenny Diede.

Firefighter/Paramedic Chad Pilkington and Fire Captain/Paramedic Ron Prettyman capped off this year by spending an entire day at American Canyon High School teaching every Freshman Hands-Only CPR in another example of how ACFPD embraces service to our community. Imagine the potential value of several hundred young adults trained in CPR for our community!

The District continually looks for ways to positively impact this community on a daily basis. I am very proud of the dedicated and professional staff in the department. They have a tremendous sense of responsibility and loyalty to the community we serve. This report is intended to capture some of those highlights.

FIRE DISTRICT GOVERNING AUTHORITY

The American Canyon Fire Protection District was established on January 31, 1955 by the Napa County Board of Supervisors. On November 6, 1957, the Office of the Secretary for the State of California certified the existence of the Fire District pursuant to the provision of the local Fire District Law. In 1992, the City was incorporated.

At incorporation, the American Canyon Fire Protection District was preserved as a subsidiary special district of the City with the elected City Council members serving as ex-officio Board of Directors for the District.

The implementation of policies and programs adopted by the District Board of Directors (Board) will be delegated to the Fire Chief. This delegation of this responsibility to the Fire Chief requires the Board to develop very clear, specific, and measurable expectations of this position.

BASIS OF AUTHORITY

The Board is the legislative governing body of the District. The primary functions of the Board are as follows:

- Develop, evaluate, and update District Policy
- Hire, fire, and evaluate the Fire Chief
- Oversee the District's finances
- Establish or modify ordinances, resolutions, and policies

In addition, their primary responsibilities include:


- Formulate and evaluate District Policy



FIRE OPERATIONS

OPERATIONS SUMMARY

Our District proudly provides all-risk emergency and non-emergency services to the citizens of American Canyon. As an all-risk fire department, we respond to a wide spectrum of emergencies, everything from medical aids, technical rescues, public assists, hazardous materials, house fires, commercial fires, vehicle accidents, and more. In fact, non-emergency calls for service are some of the most important calls we respond to.

Our firefighters take pride in delivering our services and helping our citizens when no one else will. Firefighters are trained to quickly diagnose a problem and provide a solution for a positive outcome.

All sworn ACFPD employees are trained to the level of Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) or as an Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic (EMT-P). They are able to provide advanced life support (ALS) to our citizens in times of need.

The ACFPD currently operates two ALS Engine Companies out of two fire stations that are strategically located within the District. Shift personnel work a schedule that consists of 48 hours on and 96 hours off. This means our staff works an average of 56 hours each work week. The Fire Chief and Assistant Fire Chief work a minimum of 40 hours each work week. They also share duties as the on-call Duty Chief on a 24-7 basis.

The District currently serves approximately 20,000 people located within an almost eight-square mile radius. This area includes the City of American Canyon as well as a portion of the unincorporated area of Southern Napa County.



HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

Our District contributes three firefighters to the Napa Interagency Hazard Team (NIHT). The Team is made up of individuals from different fire departments located in Napa County. The Team responds to significant hazardous materials incidents that occur within the County.

Team members receive well over 200 hours of initial training followed by ongoing monthly training and continuing education. The team members from American Canyon are all certified as Hazardous Materials Specialists.

URBAN SEARCH + RESCUE TEAM

Our District participates in the Napa Interagency Rescue Team (NIRT). Eight of our 20 suppression firefighters are members of the team.

The Team is trained and certified in trench rescue, confined space rescue, high and low angle rescue, and specialized rescue systems.







CALLS FOR SERVICE BY AREA











MAP OF INDUSTRIAL AREA INCIDENT RESPONSES IN 2021




2021 CALIFORNIA STATE MUTUAL AID RESPONSES




2021 VEHICLE ACCIDENT INCIDENTS




NORTHWEST NEIGHBORHOOD INCIDENT RESPONSES 2021




NORTHEAST NEIGHBORHOOD INCIDENT RESPONSES 2021





TRAINING ACADEMY

The Importance of the Fire Academy

The Fire Academy prepares probationary fire-fighters for the heavy arduous physical demand required of the job.

The training benefits all members of the District, not just probationary firefighters. It allows the on-duty crews to work with the new firefighters, which helps build confidence for both senior and probationary firefighters. It also allows senior firefighters to pass down the skills and knowledge they have learned over their careers.

The Academy prepares probationary firefighters for what they can expect when they arrive at an emergency scene once assigned to a shift.

Training is the backbone of the fire service and is ongoing during a firefighter's career. The ACFPD Academy sets the foundation and training expectations for what the Fire District expects from their firefighters.

Overview of Probation

The Fire District's Orientation Academy is designed to introduce new firefighters to the culture and operational standards of ACFPD.

The academy runs for 4 weeks. It consists of basic fire ground operations, including pulling hose, throwing ladders, obtaining water supply for initial fire attack, search and rescue, firefighter survival, live fire training, and EMS skills.

During the academy the firefighter will spend 1 night per week at an assigned station to help get them familiar with how the crews operate. The majority of the training happens when firefighters are assigned to their shifts.

Probation lasts 18 months and is broken up into 4 modules. Module 1 through 3 (Year 1) consists of firefighter II skills. Module 4 (final 6 months)



consists of Apparatus operator training. During Module 4, firefighters learn how to safely drive and operate all of the apparatus in the ACFPD fleet. This includes Type 1 engines, Type 3 engines, water tenders, and aerial apparatus.

Training Hours Completed per Firefighter

ACFPD probationary firefighters complete approximately 1,400 hours of training by the time they have successfully completed their Modules. This is in addition to company training, running emergency calls, participating in public education events, and business inspections.

This training format is unique to ACFPD. There is no down time once you are on board. You are immediately placed into service to our community.

The American Canyon Fire Explorer program is comprised of young men and women, ages 14 to 21 that not only want to learn about fire service, but also make a positive difference in the community.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 pandemic our Explorer Program was suspended for safety purposes.

We are looking forward to re-enlisting the program in the Summer of 2022.



FIRE PREVENTION

The Fire Prevention Division consists of the Fire Chief, Fire Company Inspectors, and CSG Consultants. The District entered into contract with CSG Consultants in September 2019. CSG offers experienced CSFM / ICC certified inspectors. The Fire Chief is the Fire Marshal and is responsible for code enforcement, review and engineering of fire plans, fire investigations, and fire and life safety education.
