The next meeting of the City of Auburn Planning Board will be held on Tuesday, October 6, 2020 at 6:30 p.m. and will be held at Memorial City Hall, Council Chambers, 24 South Street.

#### Ceremonial Presentations and Proclamations -

**HEREAS**, the City of Auburn, NY is committed to ensuring the safety and security of all those living in and visiting Auburn; and

WHEREAS, fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire; and

WHEREAS, home fires killed more than 2,630 people in the United States in 2017, according to the National Fire Protection Association<sup>®</sup> (NFPA<sup>®</sup>), and fire departments in the United States responded to 357,000 home fires; and

**WHEREAS**, cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the United States where fire departments responded to more than 173,200 annually between 2013 and 2017; and

WHEREAS, two of every five home fires start in the kitchen with 31% of these fires resulting from unattended cooking; and

WHEREAS, more than half of reported non-fatal home cooking fire injuries occurred when the victims tried to fight the fire themselves; and

WHEREAS, children under five face a higher risk of non-fire burns associated with cooking than being burned in a cooking fire

WHEREAS, Auburn's residents should stay in the kitchen when frying food on the stovetop, keep a three-foot kid-free zone around cooking areas and keep anything that can catch fire away from stove tops; and

WHEREAS, residents who have planned and practiced a home fire escape plan are more prepared and will therefore be more likely to survive a fire; and

WHEREAS, working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half; and

WHEREAS, Auburn's first responders are dedicated to reducing the occurrence of home fires and home fire injuries through prevention and protection education; and

WHEREAS, Auburn's residents are responsive to public education measures and are able to take personal steps to increase their safety from fire, especially in their homes; and

WHEREAS, the 2020 Fire Prevention Week theme <sup>TM</sup>, "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen!!" effectively serves to remind us to stay alert and use caution when cooking to reduce the risk of kitchen fires.

- The Civil Service Test for Firefighters is scheduled for Oct. 10. We have 223 candidates signed up for the exam.
- On Saturday Sept. 26, Civil Service administered the Police Officer exam. 125 candidates signed up, 80 sat for the exam locally, and 25 took the test at other locations.
- We urge all residents to complete their 2020 Census by October 5 the deadline has been extended. The Census can be completed electronically through the webpage 2020census.gov, or following the link on the City of Auburn webpage, or call 1-844-330-2020. Census data is used to determine eligibility and funding for a variety of community programs and projects for the next ten years, and is secure and confidential.
- The State St Bridge project is moving along and on schedule. The main structural steel beams have been set in place.
- Our most recent water samples have shown traces of microcystin in the raw water but none in the finished water.
- Demolition work related to the repair of the parking garage is scheduled to start Monday October 5. Notice has been sent through various channels and signage has been and will be in place to inform users.
- The Auburn Beautification Committee helped clean up along the River Trail last week and city crews will be tackling brush and overgrowth over the next few weeks.
- Next week DPW crews will be working at Technology Park to make way for new signage being design, manufactured and installed by Mack Studios.

# REPEALING AND REPLACING SECTIONS OF CHAPTER 265 OF THE AUBURN CITY CODE ENTITLED "TAXATION"

WHEREAS, on March 28, 1991, the Auburn City Council enacted and established Local Law No. 2-1991 as Chapter 181, entitled "Taxation," which is now known as Chapter 265 of the City Code, pursuant to New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Section 10(1); and

WHEREAS, Chapter 265, Articles II and X, of the City Code authorize the City of Auburn to provide exemptions to low income senior citizens and persons with disabilities by use of a sliding income scale; and

WHEREAS, the current Income Sliding Scale has not been updated since 2006/2007 and the City is looking to adopt a new Sliding Income Scale based on the current scale used by New York State; and

**WHEREAS**, Local Law No. 1 of 2020, attached hereto and incorporated herein, proposes to update Articles II and X of Chapter 265 of the City Code to achieve such uniformity; and

**WHEREAS**, the passage of Local Law No. 1 of 2020, is categorized as a Type II Action pursuant to the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) and New York State Code, Rules, and Regulations Sections 617.5(c)(16), and, therefore, pursuant to NYCRR Section 617.3(f) a determination under SEQRA is not required; and

**WHEREAS**, subject to City Council approval, a public hearing will be held on October 8, 2020, concerning the repealing of sections of Local Law No. 2-1991 and the enactment of Local Law No. 1 of 2020.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED** that the Auburn City Council does hereby repeal the following sections of Local Law No. 2-1991, which was originally passed as Chapter 181 of the City Code entitled "Taxation:"

- 1. Article II, Sections 265(17);
- 2. Article X Sections 265(45);

and,

**BE IT FURTHER ENACTED** that the Auburn City Council does hereby adopt Local Law No. 1 of 2020, attached and incorporated herein, which replaces the following Articles and Sections of Chapter 265 of the Auburn City Code entitled "Taxation":

- 1. Article II, Sections 265(17);
- 2. Article X Sections 265(45);

; and,

**BE IT FURTHER ENACTED** that the foregoing repeal and adoption shall take effect immediately upon the filing of a certified copy of the local law with the New York Secretary of State.

# AUTHORIZING THE SALE OF A PORTION OF REAL PROPERTY AT 1 STATE STREET

**WHEREAS**, the City of Auburn owns a vacant parcel located at 1 State Street (the "Property"), which is also known as the "Kalet's Building;" and

**WHEREAS**, the Property is situated on the west side of State Street between Genesee and Dill Streets and consists of approximately .17 acres; and

- WHEREAS, this resolution seeks approval of a proposed Purchase Offer and Sale Contract, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein, which would transfer a 15x15 ft. portion of 1 State Street to one of the adjacent property owners, Mr. James Driscoll; and
- **WHEREAS**, Mr. Driscoll owns property at 123-125 Genesee Street, which is immediately south of 1 State Street and is proposing this transfer so that he can have fire prevention access to his building, which would, in turn, enable him access to use the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> floors of the building; and
- **WHEREAS**, Mr. Driscoll has agreed as follows: (1) to use the 15x15 ft. parcel only for fire access prevention or as a small patio space; (2) to maintain and upkeep the same in perpetuity; (3) to provide all easements requested by the City for its project at 1 State Street; and (4) to pay all title and closing costs in connection with the transaction.

# FOR DESIGN SUPPORT DURING CONSTRUCTION FOR THE WHOLESALE SEWER METERING PROJECT

**WHEREAS**, December 21, 2017, the Auburn City Council approved Agreement Resolution #183 of 2017, which authorized a Municipal Cooperation Agreement (the "Agreement") with the Towns of Owasco, Fleming, Sennett, and Aurelius (The Towns); and

WHEREAS, the Agreement provides for wastewater sewer treatment and other sewer services to the Towns and, also, provides that the City and Towns agree to share the costs of meter services, including replacement and maintenance, equally; and

**WHEREAS**, on September 19, 2019, the City Council of the City of Auburn passed Financial Resolution #116 of 2019, which authorized the acceptance of funding from the Towns for the wholesale sewer meter upgrades; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Auburn hired GHD Engineering for the design phase of the Wholesale Sewer Meter Project and has received 50% reimbursement for the work completed; and

**WHEREAS**, Change Order #1 to the professional services agreement with GHD in the amount of \$67,000 is now required to provide design support services during the construction phase of the Wholesale Sewer Metering Project; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Auburn Department of Municipal Utilities recommends the City authorize Change Order #1 to GHD Engineering for design support during construction for the Project in the amount of \$67,000.

#### **Background:**

On March 28, 1991, the Auburn City Council enacted and established Local Law No. 2-1991 as Chapter 181 of the 1991 Auburn City Code entitled "Taxation," pursuant to New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Section 10(1). This is now known as Chapter 265 of the City Code, entitled "Taxation."

Within Chapter 265, Articles II and X, provide real property tax exemptions for low income senior citizens and persons with disabilities by using a sliding income scale. The sliding income scale has not been updated since 2006/2007 and the City of Auburn would now like to update this scale so that it follows the updated scale adopted by New York State. In addition, the City would like enact the option to permit seniors and persons with disabilities to subtract from their incomes all medical and prescription drug expenses that are not reimbursed or paid by insurance.

The City Comptroller and Assessor reviewed the City's current income sliding scale and now recommend that Sections of Chapter 265 of the City Code be repealed and replaced, as reflected in Local Law No. 1.

A first reading of Local Law No. 1 was proposed on September 24, 2020. A public hearing for the proposed Local Law was held on October 8, 2020.

#### **Recommendations:**

City Comptroller recommends the adoption of Local Law No. 1 of 2020 in order to repeal and replace sections of Chapter 265 of the Auburn City Code entitled "Taxation."

# REPEALING AND REPLACING SECTIONS OF CHAPTER 265 OF THE AUBURN CITY CODE ENTITLED "TAXATION"

**WHEREAS**, on March 28, 1991, the Auburn City Council enacted and established Local Law No. 2-1991 as Chapter 181, entitled "Taxation," which is now known as Chapter 265 of the City Code, pursuant to New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Section 10(1); and

**WHEREAS,** Chapter 265, Articles II and X, of the City Code authorize the City of Auburn to provide exemptions to low income senior citizens and persons with disabilities by use of a sliding income scale; and

**WHEREAS,** the current Income Sliding Scale has not been updated since 2006/2007 and the City is looking to adopt a new Sliding Income Scale based on the current scale used by New York State; and

**WHEREAS**, Local Law No. 1 of 2020, attached hereto and incorporated herein, proposes to update Articles II and X of Chapter 265 of the City Code to achieve such uniformity; and

**WHEREAS**, the passage of Local Law No. 1 of 2020, is categorized as a Type II Action pursuant to the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) and New York State Code, Rules, and Regulations Sections 617.5(c)(16), and, therefore, pursuant to NYCRR Section 617.3(f) a determination under SEQRA is not required; and

**WHEREAS,** a public hearing was held on October 8, 2020, concerning the repealing of sections of Local Law No. 2-1991 and the enactment of Local Law No. 1 of 2020.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED** that the Auburn City Council does hereby repeal the following sections of Local Law No. 2-1991, which was originally passed as Chapter 181 of the City Code entitled "Taxation:"

- 1. Article II, Sections 265(17);
- 2. Article X Sections 265(45);

**BE IT FURTHER ENACTED** that the Auburn City Council does hereby adopt Local Law No. 1 of 2020, attached and incorporated herein, which replaces the following Articles and Sections of Chapter 265 of the Auburn City Code entitled "Taxation":

- 2. Article X Sections 265(45);

- (a) The City will permit seniors to subtract from their incomes all medical and prescription drug expenses that are not reimbursed or paid by insurance.
- (2) "Income tax year" shall mean the twelve-month period for which the owner or owners filed a federal personal income tax return or, if no such return is filed, the calendar year. Where title is vested in either the husband or the wife, their combined income may not exceed such sum. Such income shall include social security and retirement benefits, interest, dividends, total gain from the sale or exchange of a capital asset which may be offset by a loss from the sale or exchange of a capital asset in the same income tax year,

net rental income, salary or earnings, and net income from self-employment but shall not include a return of capital, gifts or inheritances. In computing net rental income and net income from self-employment, no depreciation deduction shall be allowed for the exhaustion, wear and tear of real or personal property held for the production of income.

- **B.** Unless the title of the property shall have been vested in the owner or one of the owners of the property for at least 24 consecutive months prior to the date of making application for exemption; provided, however, that in the event of the death of either a husband or wife in whose name title of the property shall have been vested at the time of death and then becomes vested solely in the survivor by virtue of devise by or descent from the deceased husband or wife, the time of ownership of the property by the deceased husband or wife shall be deemed also a time of ownership by the survivor and such ownership shall be deemed continuous for the purposes of computing such period of 24 consecutive months.
  - (1) In the event of a transfer by either a husband or wife to the other spouse of all or part of the title to the property, the time of ownership of the property by the transferor spouse shall be deemed also a time of ownership by the transferee spouse and such ownership shall be deemed continuous for the purposes of computing such period of 24 consecutive months.
  - (2) Where property of the owner or owners has been acquired to replace property formerly owned by such owner or owners and taken by eminent domain or other involuntary proceeding, except a tax sale, the period of ownership of the former property shall be combined with the period of ownership of the property for which application is made for exemption and such periods of ownership shall be deemed to be consecutive for purposes of this section.
  - (3) Where a residence is sold and replaced with another within one year and both residences are within the state, the period of ownership of both properties shall be deemed consecutive for purposes of the exemption from taxation by the City of Auburn.
- C. Unless the property is used exclusively for residential purposes; provided, however, that in the event any portion of such property is not so used exclusively for residential purposes but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this article.
- **D.** Unless the real property is the legal residence of and is occupied in whole or in part by the owner or by all of the owners of the property, provided that an owner who is absent while receiving health-related care as an inpatient of a residential health care facility, as defined in § 2801 of the Public Health Law, shall be deemed to remain a legal resident and an occupant of the property while so confined, and income accruing to that person shall be income only to the extent that it exceeds the amount paid by such owner, spouse, or co-owner for care in the facility, and provided further that during such confinement such property is not occupied by other than the spouse or co-owner of such owner.

# ARTICLE X. EXEMPTIONS FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES AND LIMITED INCOMES

# §265-45 Limitations on exemption

- (a) The City will permit persons with disabilities to subtract from their incomes all medical and prescription drug expenses that are not reimbursed or paid by insurance.
- (2) "Income tax year" shall mean the twelve-month period for which the owner or owners filed a federal personal income tax return or, if no such return is filed, the calendar year. Where title is vested in either the husband or the wife, their combined income may not exceed such sum, except where the husband or wife, or ex-husband or ex-wife, is absent from the property due to divorce, legal separation or abandonment, then only the income of the spouse or ex-spouse residing on the property shall be considered and may not exceed such sum. Such income shall include social security and retirement benefits, interest, dividends, total gain from the sale or exchange of a capital asset which may be

offset by a loss from the sale or exchange of a capital asset in the same income tax year, net rental income, salary or earnings, and net income from self-employment but shall not include a return of capital, gifts, inheritances, or monies earned through employment in the federal foster grandparent program, and any such income shall be offset by all medical and prescription drug expenses actually paid which were not reimbursed or paid for by insurance. In computing net rental income and net income from self-employment, no depreciation deduction shall be allowed for the exhaustion, wear and tear of real or personal property held for the production of income.

**B.** Unless the property is used exclusively for residential purposes; provided, however, that in the event any portion of such property is not so used exclusively for residential purposes but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this section;

C. Unless the real property is the legal residence of and is occupied in whole or in part by the disabled person; except where the disabled person is absent from the residence while receiving health-related care as an inpatient of a residential health care facility, as defined in § 2801 of the Public Health Law, provided that any income accruing to that person shall be considered income for purposes of this section only to the extent that it exceeds the amount paid by such person or spouse or sibling of such person for care in the facility.

(1) I pledge to refrain from using excessive lawn fertilizers and chemicals to help preven Harmful Algal Blooms (HABs).
(2) I will only use limited phosphorus-free fertilizers (as governed by NYS law), applied properly.
(3) I will maintain my septic system.

(4) I will reduce hazardous wastes and dispose of them properly.

- (5) I will dispose of prescription drugs properly; I will not flush them.
- (6) I will maintain my vehicles, water-crafts, and other recreational vehicles to reduce fluid leaks as well as the spread of aquatic invasive species.
- (7) I will use water wisely.
- (8) I will not dispose of leaf litter or lawn clippings in waterways or ditches.
- (9) I will strive to work towards practicing recommended Best Management Practices (BMPs) for land use activities within the Owasco Lake Watershed.

#### **Background:**

On November 13, 2018, NYS Governor Andrew Cuomo announced the grand opening of the new NYS Equal Rights Heritage Center located in downtown Auburn. The 7,500 sq. ft. facility included visitation services, exhibits and a Taste NY marketplace. In addition, the new building provided office space for the Auburn Downtown BID and the Cayuga County Visitor's Bureau. Specifically, the Auburn Downtown BID has an annual agreement with the City to provide services and operation of the new NYS Equal Rights Heritage Center.

As part of the NYS FY 2018-19 budget, the City of Auburn submitted a request for working capital aid to localities in the amount of \$50,000. These working capital funds would be distributed through the NYS Empire State Development agency. The working capital funds would be used to offset first year operation and service costs associated with building operations.

On October 8, 2020, the City received the grant disbursement agreement from NYS ESD in the amount of \$50,000. The City now needs to execute the agreement and submit for reimbursement of operation costs which includes the cost of the BID annual operating agreement.

#### **Fiscal Implications:**

At this time there is no cost to the resolution as the City is only seeking funding reimbursement from NYS ESD in the amount of \$50,000 for operation costs already incurred at the new NYS Equal Rights Heritage Center. These revenue funds will be recorded to the A99.3822 Account.
