GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Guiding Principle #6 - Nurture Bainbridge Island as a sustainable community by meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

Guiding Principle #7 - Reduce greenhouse gas emissions and increase the Island's climate resilience.

Guiding Principle #8 - Support the Island's Guiding Principles and Policies through the City's organizational and operating budget decisions.

BACKGROUND: Congressman Derek Kilmer has accepted an invitation to appear before the City Council to provide an update on federal matters. One topic of discussion will be the 2021 Infrastructure legislation. This legislation has the potential of providing federal funding assistance for Bainbridge Island.

Derek Kilmer serves as the United States Representative for Washington's 6th Congressional District. He is serving his fifth term. Born and raised in Port Angeles, Congressman Kilmer is knowledgeable of the the region's economy and has focused his efforts on the region's economy and economic development.

He serves on the House Appropriations Committee, one of only four "exclusive" committees in the House. He also serves on the Interior and Environment Subcommittee, Defense Subcommittee, and Energy and Water Development Subcommittee.

Subject: Recommendations for Federal Support of Capital Projects

At the January 18, 2022 City Council Study Session, United States Representative for Washington State’s 6th District, Derek Kilmer, will address the Council regarding upcoming opportunities and strategies for seeking federal funding of City infrastructure projects. The purpose of this memo is to provide the City Council with some background information on current City projects and priorities, as well as general areas of overlap with federal infrastructure spending programs.

Planned City Project Recommendations

The City has several specific and planned capital projects in the 2021-26 Capital Improvement Plan that could be prioritized for federal investment:

Winslow Water Tank Replacement	Water	\$11.5M	Design 2022 Build 2023	Upgrades planned for climate impacts, fire and earthquake safety
Lower Lovell Sewer Beach- Main Replacement	Sewer	\$3.5M	Design 2022 Build 2024	Project will remove several thousand feet of sewer main from Eagle Harbor shoreline, provide climate resiliency
Wing Point Sewer Pump Replacement	Sewer	\$500K	Design 2022 Build 2024	Relocation from tidal flood zone required for climate resiliency
Wastewater Treatment Plant Outfall Replacement	Sewer	\$1.2M	Design 2023 Build 2025	Replacement and relocation would improve critical Puget Sound geoduck habitat
Wastewater Beneficial Re-use	Sewer	\$10-20M	Planning 2022 Design TBD	Project would re-direct and treat wastewater for re-use or groundwater re-charge
Cooper Creek Fish Passage	Storm.	\$550K	Design 2023 Build 2024	Project opens up several hundred feet of critical fish habitat
Springbrook Creek Fish Passage	Storm.	\$1.5M	Design 2022 Build TBD	Project opens up over thousand feet of critical fish habitat

Other City Priorities

In addition to the specific projects identified, the City foresees a host of other general capital and operational needs that could be prioritized for federal funding – some of which overlap with specific language in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, specifically:

- Safe Routes to School (Section 11119)
- Bicycle transportation and pedestrian walkways (Section 11133)
- Recreational trails program (Section 11134)
- Grants for charging and fueling infrastructure (Section 11401)
- Small publicly owned treatment works efficiency grant program (Section 50207)
- Operational Sustainability of Small Public Water Systems (Section 50106)
