City Council budgeted for a new municipal website in the FY26 budget. City staff met to discuss how we can better serve the community with accessibility, communication, and digital services. Through this discussion, we developed a comprehensive list of priorities to guide the redesign process.

- Improved User Experience: Residents should be able to access core services within three clicks. The new site must feature intuitive, streamlined navigation and a responsive design optimized for desktop, tablet, and mobile use.
- Future-Ready Technology: The new website should include smart tools like chatbots and contextual search to help users find information quickly and easily.
- Enhanced Design and Functionality: The new website should feature user-friendly online forms, event reservations, service requests, and personalized notifications. It must also be easy for staff to manage and update without needing developer support. The new site needs to be capable of being transferred/backed up easily from one host to another, ensuring that the city's site is not limited in mobility as it is now.

Re: City and SCDOT Road Safety Coordination Update

Mayor and Council,

Please see below for updates on our ongoing coordination with SCDOT in pursuit of improved safety on Folly. We started the most recent series of conversations in November of 2023. Since then, we have completed some of the original items and added new ones. If you have any questions or additional items, please let me know. We plan to present this as a quick overview at the next Council meeting.

What: Ongoing short and long-term coordination between SCDOT and the city to study and implement projects related to road safety issues on Folly.

Why: City requested a meeting by resolution and also through communication from SC Representative Wetmore. SCDOT assigned senior staff to meet and review DOT resources and provide guidance to city.

Completed/In Progress Items

-Radar Signs and Traffic Signal Improvements:

- The city completed phase one of the traffic signal changes to adjust timing, reorient and repair crosswalk buttons, and conduct a drone-based traffic flow study.
- Two additional radar signs were deployed on the island after the required studies were completed and sent to SCDOT.
- The Civic Club donated an additional radar trailer that is now operational.
- City made a TST application for funding of Phase 2 of traffic light improvements (new traffic signal arms paired with shoulder and parking improvements), and we recently got notice that they would not be funded. We continue to seek funding for these items.

-Adding Additional Stop Signs:

- Four-way stop installed at intersection of 2nd W and W Hudson.
- SCDOT confirmed that they have received our request for a stop sign analysis at 2nd E and E Ashley. There is no timeline available as of today. SCDOT noted the traffic

volume differential and noted the impact on a stop sign study. They are open to discussing other improvements if a stop sign is not the answer.

-Pedestrian Scramble at Center/Ashley:

• City staff met with SCDOT to review prior discussions of the pedestrian scramble at this location. SCDOT will require a traffic analysis to be conducted demonstrating the effects of a scramble on traffic volume, traffic delay, and pedestrian crossings. We are reviewing all prior work to see if we have a start on this information. If not, we will present information on cost and timing to Council.

-Data Driven Decision Making:

- Crash data and traffic volume data were used to complete a Safety Action Plan for the city. It is online here: https://cityoffollybeach.com/safetyactionplan
- City has applied for full funding to construct the improvements identified in the Artic Avenue Plan.
- The plan also identified intersection visibility as a concern. Public Safety has completed an island-wide intersection assessment, and we have submitted work tickets through the SCDOT website.

-Pedestrian Paths:

- Second Street East is complete and open to the public.
- SCDOT is managing the construction of the Indian Avenue path and anticipates a fall start date. SCDOT management was a condition of a 500 thousand dollar grant.
- Design, Engineering, and permitting are underway for West Ashley from 2nd to 3rd. There are no construction funds in the FY26 budget. Funds may be available mid-year once other capital project grant decisions have been communicated to the city.

-Intersection of Peas/Bowens/Folly Roads

- The city approved a contract in FY25 and funds for final design and permitting are included in the FY26 budget.
- No construction funds (or final cost estimate) are available at this time.

- a. City Administrator Aaron Pope mentioned that the council received a memo about a proposed paid parking signage ordinance. He clarified that this would help improve transparency in pricing and create a consistent appearance for signage. Mr. Pope stated that a draft ordinance will be presented to the council soon.
- b. Jenna Stephens, Zoning Administrator. Ms. Stephens stated that the Red Sunset Lane committee met and discussed potential solutions for the road and parking management proposal. She explained that one option would be for the owners to grant an easement to the city to allow parking enforcement and continued gravel maintenance without needing a budget amendment. Ms. Stephens stated that another idea was that the city may explore a private service to help move trash bins to the designated collection point because trash trucks have difficulty making it down the road.

 Mayor Goodwin stated that he is not in favor of the idea of the city contracting a private company to move their trash cans. He stated that there are services on the island already, if they want to reach out and partner with them that is on them to do so.
- c. Mayor Goodwin stated that there will be a Hurricane and Disaster Preparedness meeting in partnership with Charleston County Emergency Management on July 17th from 5:30-6:30 at the Community Center.
- d. Councilmember Fink gave an update on Senior Transportation. He stated that he has been working with staff and Councilmember Bizzell to address all the questions and concerns that citizens have. Councilmember Fink said that staff received a letter from BOCCOG and CARTA stating that their program is not an option for the city. He explained that they are exploring other options and solutions.

Beach Clean Up Stations

- The beach clean-up station initiative is a collaboration between Relic Sustainability and Dead Low Cafe. Relic Sustainability is a clothing company out of Easthampton, NY. They use a portion of their sales to replenish oyster beds in Long Island as well as build beach cleanup stations.
- Currently, they have over 110+ clean-up stations around the country.
- Dead Low Cafe is the only station currently in use in the Southeast. This is a great opportunity for the city of Folly Beach to be first movers in promoting tourists and locals to do their part in maintaining the health and beauty of our beaches.
- We discussed 6 initial stations located at the major beach accesses between 2E and 3W, including the pier. Each station will be located where trash receptacles are currently in place.
- The idea of the Public Works Department assisting in the installation of post hole digging was brought up during our meeting and is a great idea
- It was also noted that the parking division could potentially monitor the status of the stations (i.e. in working order) and report back to me if there is any damage or missing components.
- The signs are low maintenance and do have a graffiti-proof coating on them.
- The upfront cost of the stations will be covered by Relic Sustainability and we will
 only be responsible for shipping costs. Currently estimated at \$500. The use of city
 discretionary funds was discussed. If money is a limiting factor, Relic and Dead Low
 will provide funding because we believe so strongly in this cause.

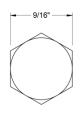

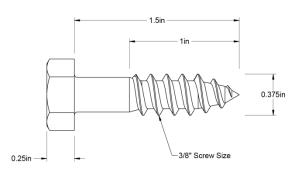

- Drill, with 1/4" or 15/64" drill bit



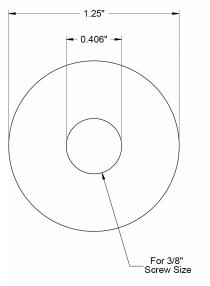

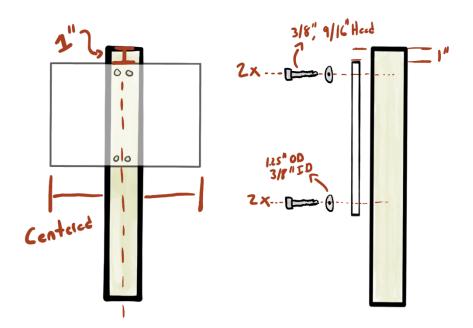

Installation and Instructions

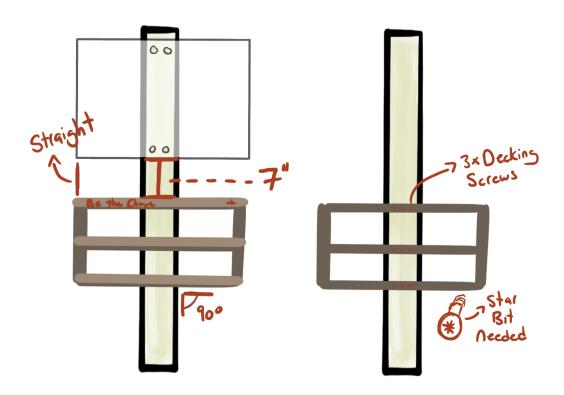
- 1. **Attaching The Sign:** The sign should be mounted with the top edge 1" from the top of the 4x4x10.
 - a. Measure and draw a line 1" down from the top of the 4x4. With the 4x4x10 laid down, place the top edge of the sign at the line. Center and mark the 4x4x10 at the drilled sign holes.
 - b. Remove the sign and using a 15/64 or $\frac{1}{4}$ inch drill bit, predrill the 4 marked holes for sign fastening bolts.
 - c. Attach the sign to the 4x4x10 using the hex-head bolts and washers provided.



2. Mounting the Docking Station:

- a. With the 4x4x10 laid down, mark a line 7" below the bottom edge of the attached sign.
- b. Lay the docking station onto the 4x4 and make sure it is level and centered. Make sure the "Be the Change" is facing outward and upright.

c. While applying pressure to the docking station, drive 3 decking screws through each of the 3 back pieces of the docking station and into the 4x4x10. Be careful to not sink these too deeply and crack the wood! Going slow is safer.



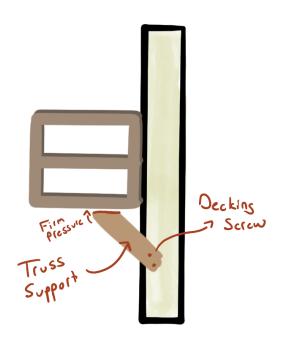

4. Putting the Station in the Ground:

- a. Confirm that the placement will not significantly obstruct view to the water line, block passageway. Make sure that the station will be close to the onsite trash can.
- b. Using a post digger or shovel, dig a hole for the 4x4 as deep as needed to make sure that the station is at the right height for people to easily grab baskets. The sign is usually chest height, with the baskets position at waste height.
- c. Burying depth can vary given the substrate and the type of install, but make sure that the station is firmly buried in the ground with significant 4x4 beneath the surface.
- d. Smooth displaced sand around the station.

5. Install the Truss Supports:

- a. With the station sunk in the ground, use 2 decking screws to fasten the truss supports to the 4x4x10. Make sure the supports are firmly pressed against one of the bottom pieces of the station (the one that the baskets sit on).
- b. Be careful to not sink the screws too deep and crack the supports.



6. Admire your work... that's it.

Mayor and Council,

The Special Events Committee met on August 4th, 2025, to review the applications for the upcoming Mermaid and Mateys, Charleston Beach Olympics 2026, and Outer Banks Filming Request. Below, please find the recommendations made by the committee:

Mermaid and Mateys- October 4th, 2025:

This event is on the City's pre-approved event list and does not require full Council review. City staff will continue working with the FAB on logistical details related to safety and festival footprint.

Outer Banks Filming- August 25th & 26th, 2025:

Narrow Isle Productions, LLC is requesting approval for a high-impact filming project located at Bowen's Island Restaurant. The producer has requested one Folly Beach Police Officer to be on site. The committee voted unanimously to forward this application to the City Council for review and recommends approval.

Charleston Beach Olympics 2026-April 25th, 2026

The Pattison's Academy is requesting exclusive use of the beach in front of the Pelican Pavilion for their Therapeutic Summer Camp. The committee raised concerns about the requested date of April 25th, 2026, citing that this is spring break and a very busy time for Folly Beach. The committee voted unanimously not to recommend approval due to safety concerns. The committee stated that they will work with the county and the applicant to find a better-suited date. The event request is now up for City Council review.

ORDINANCE 011-25

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FOLLY BEACH CODE OF ORDINANCES SECTIONS 134.50 TO 134.99 GOVERNING ABANDONED AND DERELICT VESSELS TO ADDRESS CHANGES IN STATE LAW.

The City Council of Folly Beach, South Carolina, duly assembled, hereby ordains that Folly Beach Code of Ordinance be amended as follows:

NOTE: Deleted material struck through, new material shown in red,)

§ 134.50 PURPOSE AND AUTHORITY.

- (A) *Authority*. The provisions are adopted pursuant to the police powers of municipalities generated by state legislation, including the State Home Rule Act, construed in accordance with provisions of the South Carolina State Constitution and the South Carolina Code of Laws, and pursuant to the authority conferred by S.C. Code Title 5, specifically §§ 5-7-30 and 5-7-140 thereof, and S.C. Code Title 50, specifically §§ 50-21-30(C)(1), 50-21-80, and 50-21-190(B) 5-21-200 to 5-21-270 thereof.
- (B) *Purpose*. The provisions of this subchapter are adopted for the promotion of the public health, safety, welfare, and general convenience by:
- (1) Ensuring that vessel owners are responsibly using the city's waterways without causing undue environmental harm, creating hazardous conditions, or leaving derelict and abandoned vessels in the waterways; and
- (2) Preventing environmental harm of spilled fuel, human waste, or other pollutants that can be associated with derelict or live aboard vessels not properly pumped or maintained; and
- (3) Protecting human life and navigation hazards associated with over-crowded waterways, haphazardly moored vessels, or sunken vessels, particularly near public boat landings and other crowded areas; and
 - (4) Protecting, preserve, restore, and enhance the city's natural waterways and marshes; and
- (5) Preventing damage to public bridges and boat landings, and private docks and marinas through improperly moored or listing vessels; and

(6) Preventing wasteful tax expenditures for the cost of removing sunken and abandoned vessels.

(Ord. 22-20, passed 10-13-20; Am. Ord. 005-24, passed 3-12-24)

§ 134.51 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this subchapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

ABANDON or ABANDONED. Any watercraft that has been moored, stranded, wrecked, sinking, or sunk, and has been left unattended for longer than 45 days. A watercraft is not ABANDONED if it is legally moored on private property. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(1))

ABANDONED VESSEL. A vessel that: (a) is wrecked, junked, or in a state of disrepair; (b) does not have a visible identifier; and (c) remains on the waters of the State, or on public property adjacent thereto, for at least ten consecutive days from the day an abandoned vessel notice is posted on the vessel. (S.C. Code § 50-21-210(A)(1))

BOAT. A vessel. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(2)). A vessel or watercraft of any type or size specifically designed to be self propelled, whether by engine, sail, paddle, or other means, which is used to travel from place to place by water. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(2); S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 30-1(D)(7))

CITY. The City of Folly Beach.

DEPARTMENT. The South Carolina Department of Natural Resources.

DERELICT VESSEL. A vessel that: (a) is wrecked, junked, or in a state of disrepair; (b) has a visible identifier; and (c) remains on the waters of the State, or on public property adjacent thereto, for at least twenty-one consecutive days from the day a derelict vessel notice is posted on the vessel. (S.C. Code § 50-21-210(A)(2))

FLOATING STRUCTURE. A man-made object other than a watercraft that is capable of flotation and that is not authorized by a permit issued by an agency of this state. (S.C. Code § 50-21-30(A))

JUNKED. Substantially stripped of vessel components.

LEGALLY MOORED. Any watercraft or floating structure that is not abandon or abandoned and:

- (1) Moored to a dock or marina berth with permission from the dock or berth owner;
- (2) Moored to a mooring buoy that is permitted by the Department of Health and Environmental Control-Department of Environmental Services with permission from the buoy owner;
- (3) Moored to a mooring buoy with permission from the buoy owner, provided that the buoy is in the location as it existed on public waters on June 30, 2021.

OPERATE. To navigate, steer, drive, or be in control. It also includes the manipulation of moving water skis, a moving aquaplane, a moving surfboard, or similar moving device. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(15))

OUTBOARD MOTOR. A combustion engine or electric propulsion system, which is used to propel a watercraft and which is detachable from the watercraft as a unit. No **OUTBOARD MOTOR** of less than five horsepower or its equivalent is required to be titled under this chapter. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(17))

OWNER. A person, other than a lienholder, who claims lawful possession of a vessel or outboard motor by virtue of legal title or equitable interest in it which entitled him or her to possession. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(18))

PERSON. An individual, a partnership, a firm, a corporation, an association, or other legal entity. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(19))

PUBLIC SAFETY. The Folly Beach Department of Public Safety.

REGISTERED OWNER. A person listed as the owner on a state's vessel registration records or on a United States Coast Guard certificate of documentation.

RESPONSIBLE PARTY. A person who has the rights to the possession and use of a vessel.

USE. Operate, navigate, or employ. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(26)

VESSEL. Every description of watercraft, other than a seaplane regulated by the federal government, used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on water. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(27))

VISIBLE IDENTIFIER. A visible identifier includes: (a) a hull identification number; (b) a vessel registration number of this state or another state; or (c) a vessel name and home port.

WATERS OF THE CITY. Waters within the territorial limits of the city but not on private lakes or ponds.

WATERS OF THE STATE. Waters within the territorial limits of the state but not private lakes or ponds. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(29))

WATERCRAFT. Anything used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water but does not include: a seaplane regulated by the federal government, water skis, aquaplanes, surfboards, windsurfers, tubes, rafts, and similar devices or anything that does not meet construction or operational requirements of the state or federal government for watercraft. (S.C. Code § 50-21-10(30))

WRECKED. Listing due to water intake or hull damage, or aground and cannot be extracted without mechanical assistance.

(Ord. 22-20, passed 10-13-20; Am. Ord. 005-24, passed 3-12-24)

§ 134.52 ENFORCEMENT OF STATE LAW GOVERNING ABANDONED AND DERELICT VESSELS.

- (A) Abandoned vessels, derelict vessels, and sunken vessels are public nuisances and violative of both this Code and State law, in particular South Carolina Code §§ 50-21-220 to 270. Pursuant to South Carolina Code § 50-21-230 and this Code of Ordinances, the City's Department of Public Safety is authorized to enforce South Carolina Code §§ 50-21-220 to 270 within the City's corporate limits extending outward to one mile from the high-water mark of any bordering navigable body of water, including the authority:
 - to enforce South Carolina Code § 50-21-220 in magistrate court, including seeking convictions of not more than ten thousand dollars, imprisonment for not more than sixty days, or both and further holding violator's liable for all costs arising from the removal and disposal of the vessel from the waters of the State;
 - 2) to enforce South Carolina Code §§ 50-21-240 & -250, including to locating, identifying, providing notice, and reporting vessels that are wrecked, junked, or in a state of disrepair; and

- 3) to enforce South Carolina Code § 50-21-260 & -270, including removal of abandoned and derelict vessels and commencing civil actions against a responsible party.
- (B) This provision does not limit the authority of the City's Department of Public Safety to enforce other provisions of Title 50 of the South Carolina Code of Laws on the waters of the State pursuant to South Carolina Code §§ 23-20-10, et seq., 50-21-30(B), or 50-21-80. Any such enforcement against actions or vessels located within the corporate limits set forth in South Carolina Code § 5-7-140 (one mile seaward of the high tide line of the Atlantic Ocean and the low-water mark of any other navigable body of water bordering the City) may be pursued in municipal court. All other violations on State waters beyond the corporate limits (except where specifically extended by State law) shall be pursued in the magistrate court or other appropriate state court.

§ 134.53 DERELICT OR ABANDONED VESSELS WITHIN CITY'S CORPORATE LIMITS.

In addition to State law, the following provisions of this Section apply to abandoned and derelict vessels located within the City's corporate limits as defined by South Carolina Code § 5-7-140 and may be enforced at the option of the City in the municipal court.

- (A) It is unlawful to abandon a watercraft or outboard motor on the public lands or waters within the City's corporate limits of this state or city or on private property without permission of the property owner. This section does not apply to persons who abandon a watercraft in an emergency for the safety of the persons onboard; however, after the emergency is over, the owner and operator of the abandoned watercraft shall make a bona fide attempt to recover the watercraft.
- (B) If a watercraft or floating structure is found to be in violation of § 134.54 (mooring permit required to moor or anchor within territorial limits of the city) and the permit holder or owner fails to respond within 45 10 consecutive days, this shall constitute abandonment.
- (C) A person violating the provisions of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and may be charged with a municipal ordinance violation or a violation of State law. upon conviction, must be fined not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$5,000 or imprisoned up to 30 days, or both. In addition, the City may seek removal of the vessel, costs of removal, or other remedies provided by State law. the owner must remove the abandoned watercraft within 14 days of conviction. The city municipal court is vested with jurisdiction for cases arising under this section.

 (D) An abandoned watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor may be removed at the risk and the expense of the owner and disposed of by the city. If removed by the city, all costs associated with the removal and storage of the watercraft shall become a lien against the watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor. Nothing contained in this section shall prohibit the city from exercising its rights to bring an action to recover such costs associated with the removal and storage of the watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor by the city. (S.C.

§ 134.53 DERELICT VESSELS PROHIBITED.

It shall be unlawful to anchor, moor or ground on the public land or waters of this city, as defined in S.C. Code § 5-7-140, to include waters out to one mile seaward of the high tide line on the Atlantic Ocean and waters out to the low-water mark on any navigable body of water bordering the corporate limits of the city or on private property without permission of the property owner, any derelict vessel. Indicators that a vessel is derelict include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (A) Improper, non-working, or no anchor light;
- (B) Vessel is neglected, or substantially dismantled, or improperly maintained, or is not able to be used for navigation as intended;
- -(C) Vessel does not comply with current registration requirements;
- (D) Vessel is barnacle-laden;
- (E) Vessel interior is exposed to the elements (rain, waves, and the like);
- (F) Vessel is listing;
- (G) Vessel is aground;
- -(H) Vessel is in danger of breaking or dragging its mooring;
- (I) Vessel is sinking;
- (J) Vessel is abandoned; or
- (K) Vessel fails to display a city permit as required in § 134.54.
- (Ord. 22-20, passed 10-13-20; Am. Ord. 005-24, passed 3-12-24) Penalty, see § 134.99

§ 134.54 PERMIT REQUIRED TO MOOR OR ANCHOR WITHIN TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF THE CITY.

- (A) Any watercraft or floating structure that remains moored, anchored, or otherwise located within a one-mile radius of the Folly Beach Boat Landing, 97 Center Street, Folly Beach, South Carolina on public waters the waters of the city for more than 14 consecutive days must obtain a permit from the city's Public Safety Department.
 - (B) The cost of a permit may not exceed fifteen dollars.
 - (C) The permit requirement does not apply to watercraft:
 - (1) moored to a dock or marina berth with permission from the dock or berth owner;
 - (2) moored to a mooring buoy that is permitted by the Department of Health and Environmental Control with permission from the buoy owner; and
 - (3) moored to a mooring buoy with permission from the buoy owner, provided that the buoy is in the location as it existed on public waters on June 30, 2021.
- (B) Pursuant to S.C. Code § 50-21-30(C)(2) not withstanding S.C. Code § 5-7-140(B) the city's corporate limits where bordering on the high-water mark of a navigable body of water, other than the Atlantic Ocean, are extended to the center of the channel of the navigable body of water for the sole purpose of enforcing this section.
- (D) Pursuant to S.C. Code § 50-21-30(C)(2), notwithstanding Section 5-7-140(B), the corporate limits of the City are extended to the center of the channel of any navigable body of water bordering the City for the sole purpose of enforcing this ordinance.

- (CE) (1) In order to obtain a permit, There is no cost for a permit, however the owner must present:
 - (a) Proof of ownership;
 - (b) Proof of current insurance;
 - (c) Proof of current state or Coast Guard registration;
- (d) Name, address, and phone number of a local contact who can respond and has authority to take action on a vessel within 24 hours if called by Public Safety;
 - (e) Description of mooring technique, and explanation of its adequacy for the location; and
 - (f) Attestation that the vessel is neither derelict nor abandoned.
 - (2) Permits expire unless renewed every 60 days.
 - (D) Permit regulations. Permitted watercraft and floating structures:
 - (1) May only be moored or anchored in the area provided on the permit;
- (2) May not be anchored or moored within 500 yards of a boat landing, community dock, public bridge, or marina, except for vessels with express written permission of the owner of the boat landing, community dock, or marina;
- (3) May not be moored or anchored or able to swing within 100 feet of any other legally anchored or moored watercraft or floating structures or permitted mooring, dock or marina without written permission of the owner;
- (4) Must display current state, federal, or foreign registration, and must provide a current permit, official documentation of ownership and registration if requested by Public Safety;
- (5) Must be kept free of litter, debris, barnacles, algae, and other unsightly growth. This requirement applies not only to removal of loose litter, but to materials that already are, or become, trapped or pinned against watercraft and floating structures;
- (6) Must not be unsightly, derelict, abandoned, neglected, or substantially dismantled, or improperly maintained, or be unable to be used for navigation as intended;
- (7) Must not be listing, aground, sinking, in danger of breaking its mooring or anchor, dragging its mooring or anchor, or otherwise unsuccessfully, improperly, or unsafely moored or anchored;
- (8) Must have a local contact listed on the permit able to respond to the watercraft or floating structure withing-24 hours of a Public Safety officer contact or attempt to make contact;
- (9) Must be equipped with a holding tank if slept on and must provide to Public Safety proof of regular weekly pump outs of the vessel's holding tank upon request;
- (10) Must not be subject to complaints of excessive noise, thefts, firearms violations, controlled substance violations, or other disturbances of possible danger to the environment or any person, emanating from the vessel or its crew;
 - (11) Must display proper anchor lights.
- (E) If Department of Natural Resources, Department of Health and Environmental Control Department of Environmental Services, or the Director of Public Safety determines there are safety-related or environmental reasons for denying permission during a particular period of time, or in a particular place, or in a particular manner or has been identified as an abandoned watercraft by the Department of Natural Resources, the permit will be revoked.
- (F) If a person's permit has been revoked twice, an additional permit shall not be granted for a period of one year.
- (G) Within four hours of a hurricane warning being declared, each vessel operator shall secure their vessel to prevent the vessel, and/or its parts or contents from damaging the property of others.

- (H) This section does not apply to the following watercraft or floating structures:
- (1) Moored to a dock or marina berth with permission from the dock or berth owner;
- (2) Moored to a mooring buoy that is permitted by the Department of Health and Environmental Control Department of Environmental Services with permission from the buoy owner; or
- (3) Moored to a mooring buoy with permission from the buoy owner, provided that the buoy is in the location as it existed on public waters on June 30, 2021.
- (41) A vessel seeking safe harbor from dangerous weather or in the event of mechanical failure for up to seven days; or
- (52) A vessel anchored while actively engaged in fishing or other noncommercial recreational activities.
 - (I) Permit denial or revocation.
- (1) Permits may be denied or revoked for non-compliance with the provisions of this subchapter or other federal, state, county or city laws governing or related to the watercraft or floating structure.
- (2) If a permit is denied or revoked a person may reapply for a permit once they are in compliance with the provisions of this subchapter and other federal, state, county and city laws governing or related to the watercraft or floating structure.
- (3) Permits may be denied or revoked for violations of this subchapter or other federal, state, county or city laws governing or related to the watercraft or floating structure, as well as, violations of federal state, county or city laws committed on or involving the watercraft or floating structure.
- (4) A person who is denied or revoked for two or more violations of this subchapter or other federal, state, county or city laws governing or related to the watercraft or floating structure, or violation of federal, state, county or city laws committed on or involving the watercraft or floating structure shall be ineligible to apply for a permit for a period of one year from the date of the second violation.
- (5) A person who is denied a permit or has their permit revoked may appeal the decision to the city's hearing officer by filing written notice with the Director of Public Safety within ten days of being notified of the denial or revocation.
 - (J) Renewal and changes to permit.
 - (1) Permits must be renewed every 60 days.
- (2) Permit holders must notify the Police Department within 24 hours of any changes to the information provided in the permit application.
 - (K) Illegal mooring and anchoring.
- (1) It shall be unlawful for any watercraft or floating structure to remain moored, anchored, or otherwise located on the waters of the city for more than 14 consecutive days without first obtaining a permit from the city Police Department as set forth above.
- (2) It shall be unlawful to attach a watercraft or floating structure to a mooring ball, dock, or other floating structure without the express permission of the owner.
- (3) It shall be unlawful to attach a watercraft or floating structure to a mooring ball, dock, or other floating structure marked for law enforcement purposes or other use by the city.
- (L) Enforcement. A person violating the provisions of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, may be sentenced to pay a tine not exceeding \$500 or serve a term not exceeding 30 days in jail or both. Each day a violation of this section thereof shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

- (A) Any watercraft or outboard motor, or both, held or principally used in this state must be titled by the Department. An owner of a watercraft or outboard motor titled in this state must notify the Department within 30 days if ownership is transferred to another person, entity, or transferred out of state or otherwise disposed.
- (B) Exceptions to titling.
- (1) Watercraft documented by the U.S. Coast Guard or its predecessor or successor agency and water skis, aquaplanes, surfboard, windsurfers, and similar devices, and those watercraft propelled exclusively by human power are not required to be titled.
- (C) Evidence of ownership.
- (1) A certificate of title to a watercraft or outboard motor is prima facie evidence of ownership of a watercraft or outboard motor. All watercraft and outboard motors subject to the titling requirements of this section must be titled.
- (2) No person may acquire a watercraft or outboard motor, subject to the titling requirements of this section and S.C. Code Title 50, without obtaining a certificate of title or in the case of a new watercraft or outboard motor a manufacturer's or importer's statement of origin reflecting the person acquiring the watercraft or outboard motor as the original purchaser as provided in this section and/or S.C. Code Title 50. In the case of watercraft or outboard motors from other jurisdictions that do not require titling, a bill of sale and proof of registration may be substituted for this title.
- (3) No person may dispose of a watercraft or outboard motor subject to the titling provisions of this section and S.C. Code Title 50 without transferring to the person acquiring the watercraft or outboard motor a certificate of title reflecting the transfer of the watercraft or outboard motor. In the case of new watercraft, a manufacturer's statement of origin must be delivered to the purchaser. In the case of watercraft or outboard motors from other states or foreign jurisdictions, which do not title such watercraft or out board motors, a bill of sale and proof of registration may be substituted.

§ 134.56 SEIZURE OF CERTAIN WATERCRAFT AND FLOATING STRUCTURES; NOTICE OF SEIZURE AND OF TIME FOR REMOVAL; FORFEITURE AND DISPOSAL.

- —(A) Illegally moored or anchored watercraft or floating structures, a stolen or abandoned, junked, adrift, destroyed, or salvaged watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor, a watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor for which the true owner is not determined, or a watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor on which the manufacturer's or assigned serial number has been destroyed, removed, covered, altered, or defaced may be seized.
- (B) Upon seizure of the watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor, the city shall notify a person claiming an interest in it, and the person has the right to prove his or her interest before the circuit court in the county where the property was seized. If no action is filed within 60 days of notification, the Department may retain the property for official use or transfer the property to another public entity for official use, sell the property at public auction, or, if the watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor is determined to be unsafe, destroy it. The proceeds derived from the sale must be deposited in the boating operating fund of the city for administration of the program.

- (C) When the city determines the owner of a seized watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor and related marine equipment, it shall notify the owner by certified mail of the procedure, the location, and the fact that he or she has not less than 30 days from the date of the certified letter to remove the equipment from the city's designated storage facility. If a security interest has been perfected, the city must notify the lienholder by certified mail allowing 30 days to respond. Failure to respond within 30 days or remove the watercraft, floating structure or outboard motor by the date designated forfeits the equipment to the city to be used or disposed of according to law.

§ 134.57 DUTY OF OWNERS, AND THE LIKE, TO KEEP WATERCRAFT AND FLOATING STRUCTURES CLEAN.

- (A) It shall be the duty of the owner, agent, occupant or lessee of any watercraft or floating structure to keep the watercraft or floating structure free of litter, debris, barnacles, algae and other unsightly growth, including litter or debris that becomes trapped or pinned against any part of the watercraft or floating structure.
- (B) It shall be unlawful to cause or allow any litter from a watercraft or floating structure to enter into the waters or lands of the city.
- (C) If an owner, agent, occupant or lessee of any watercraft or floating structure fails to remove litter, debris, barnacles, algae, or other unsightly growth, including litter or debris that becomes trapped or pinned against any part of the watercraft or floating structure, the Police or Livability Department shall serve written notice upon the owner, agent. occupant and/or lessee to correct the violation within five days.
- (D) A person violating the provisions of this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, may be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding \$500 or serve a term not exceeding 30 days in jail or both. Each day a violation of this section thereof shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

§ 134.585 ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT.

- (A) Administration. The administration and enforcement of the provisions of this subchapter shall be vested in the City of Folly Beach Public Safety Department. City Public Safety officers shall have the authority to board any vessel subject to the provisions of this subchapter or to any applicable rule or regulation for the purpose of inspection or determining compliance and are empowered to issue a summons for appearance in court or make arrest for violations of this subchapter or the rules and regulations prescribed thereunder.
- (B) When necessary, the Department of Public Safety may act, or may join in action with other agencies, to declare a vessel "abandoned" or "derelict," or to determine and abate any unsafe or environmentally hazardous conditions, by towing, relocating, removing any vessel, or taking any other action reasonably necessary.
- (C) Public Safety shall post conspicuous notice on any vessels that are in violation of permit conditions, or that have an expired or revoked permit. Public Safety shall then continue to monitor the violating vessel until ten days have elapsed from the date of the posting. If the

person in control of the vessel returns, or contacts Public Safety, and abates the violation within that time, no further actions, other than payment of accrued fees, need to be taken.

- (D) If the owner of any unattended vessel anchored, moored, docked, or stored in city waters fails to respond to notices or pay fines and fees as required by this section for more than ten days from the posting, the vessel may be taken into custody by the Department of Public Safety and stored in a safe place of storage.
- (E) The owner shall be responsible for the costs of towing, storage, removal, and salvage of the vessel. Any vessel towed, removed, relocated or impounded shall be subject to a lien for associated costs. The owner of the vessel may only redeem the vessel from the designated storage area upon payment of costs and fees. The city or its contractor is not liable for damages associated with towing or enforcement.
- (F) If a vessel is seized and towed, Public Safety shall report the vessel to the Department of Natural Resources for owner notification. If the vessel is deemed abandoned by the Department of Natural Resources, it shall be eligible for removal in accordance with South Carolina state law.
- (F) (G) This section does not limit any other rights granted to the city or Public Safety by federal, state or local law.

§ 134.99 PENALTY.

- (A) A person violating the provisions of this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, may be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding \$500 or serve a term not exceeding 30 days in jail or both. Each day a violation of this section thereof shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.
- (B) For each day over the 30 days that a violation of §§ 134.52 through 134.57 is not abated, there will be a \$50 per day fine. The imposition of this fine shall not be suspended. Each day of violation after the expiration of the 30-day period provided in § 134.41(B) shall constitute a separate offense for the purpose of calculating the civil penalty.
- (C) A person violating any State law provisions referenced in this Chapter and subject to fines and other punishments outlined in the State law. The magistrate court has jurisdiction over violations of State law. In addition to any other penalties allowed by federal, state or local law, a person violating the provisions of §§ 134.50 through 134.54 is guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, must be fined not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$5,000 or imprisoned up to 30 days, or both. In addition, the towner must remove the abandoned watercraft within 14 days of conviction. The city Municipal Court is vested with jurisdiction for cases arising under this section

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING FOLLY BEACH CODE OF ORDINANCES SEC. 36.16 (INFORMAL PURCHASING AND BIDDING PROCEDURES) TO ALLOW THE PROCUREMENT MANAGER TO APPROVE CERTAIN EXPENDITURES UNDER 5000 DOLLARS.

The City Council of Folly Beach, South Carolina, duly assembled, hereby ordains that Folly Beach Code of Ordinance be amended as follows:

§ 36.16 INFORMAL PURCHASING AND BIDDING PROCEDURES.

- (A) Purchase orders shall be used for all purchases more than of \$400. For all purchases under \$400, a payment voucher or request for check shall be submitted, signed by the department head with all receipts attached. For small one time purchases of less than \$400, petty cash may be used if approved by the Mayor, City Administrator, or Finance Director.
- (B) When the value of purchases for supplies, services, goods or construction does not exceed \$1,000, a limited purchase order (LPO) shall be used. The LPO shall be signed by the department head certifying that each transaction is appropriate and insuring that no abuse or unauthorized use has occurred. No other signature is required on these transactions.
- (C) When the value of purchases for supplies, services, goods or construction is estimated to be in excess of \$1,000 and less than \$5,000, and the amount for the purchase has been approved in the current fiscal year's budget, a Standard Purchase Order (SPO) shall be signed by the department head certifying that each transaction is appropriate and insuring no abuse or unauthorized use has occurred. The purchase order shall then be signed by one of the following, Mayor, City Administrator, Director of Finance, or Procurement Manager.
- (D) When the value of purchases for supplies, services, goods, or construction is estimated to be

in excess of \$5,000 and less than \$10,000, and the amount for the purchase has been approved in the current fiscal year's budget, at least two oral quotes shall be obtained by the department head. The names of the vendors and the solicited quotations shall be listed on the face of the purchase order. If the vendor selected by the department head is not the lowest cost, a statement of reason must be provided as to how the selected vendor has provided the most advantageous agreement with the city. The department head shall sign the purchase order and submit it along with all supporting documentation to one of the following for signature: Mayor, City Administrator, or Director of Finance.

ORDINANCE 013-25

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FOLLY BEACH CODE OF ORDINANCES SECTION 118.02 (COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY ON PUBLIC PROPERTY GENERALLY) TO CREATE A CONCESSIONS FRANCHISE AT 3RD STREET WEST, SECTION 118.03 (COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY ON THE PUBLIC BEACH) TO DEFINE THE LIMITS OF ALLOWABLE FRANCHISE COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY, AND SECTION 118.04 (FRANCHISE AGREEMENTS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY)

The City Council of Folly Beach, South Carolina, duly assembled, hereby ordains that the Folly Beach Code of Ordinance be amended as follows:

NOTE: Deleted material struck through, new material shown in red,

§118.02 COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY ON PUBLIC PROPERTY GENERALLY.

- (A) No commercial activity shall occur on a street, sidewalk, right-of-way, beach, or other public property or interfere with the public's use of such public property unless the business has a franchise from the city, is approved by City Council, or is being operated as part of a special event regulated by Chapter 153.
- (B) Concessions operations provided by a vendor operating under a franchise agreement with the city are allowed at Ocean Park (3rd Street West).
- (1) No products or services shall be sold or rented by concessions vendors unless expressly allowed under an approved franchise agreement.
- (2) Concessions operations may not operate beyond the hours identified in an approved franchise agreement.
- (3) Concessions operations may not operate beyond the area described in an approved franchise agreement.

§118.03 COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY ON THE PUBLIC BEACH.

- (A) There are hereby designated two sections of the public beach, Section One and Section Two. No commercial activity is permitted on in Section One or Section Two of the public beach except as expressly provided for herein.
- (1) Section One is the area between 3rd West and 3rd East. The commercial activities allowed within Section One are as follows:
 - (1) Section One is the area between 3rd West and 3rd East.
 - (2) Section Two is the balance of the public beach.
- (a)(B) Beach chair and umbrella rentals provided by vendors operating under a franchise agreement with the city are allowed in Section One and Section Two.
- (1) No more than two beach chair and umbrella rental franchises shall be allowed in each Section.
- (2) No other goods except beach chairs and umbrellas shall be delivered to or transported on the public beach.
- (3) Each vendor may transport beach chairs and umbrellas by motorized vehicles on public property in Section One and Section Two.
- a. Each vendor may only operate two motorized vehicles in either Section at the same time.
- b. From May 1 to October 31, no motorized vehicle may operate prior to the completion of turtle monitoring and the issuance of an all-clear notice from the city or its designee.
- c. In Section Two, chairs and umbrellas must be transported by accessing the public beach at the nearest drivable beach access.
- d. All drivers and supervisors employed by the vendor must complete proof of beach driving safety certification.
- e. All franchise holders operating motorized vehicles on the public beach must provide documentation of liability naming the city as an additional insured.
- (4) All beach chairs and umbrellas, except for approved wooden lounge chairs located in Section One, shall be removed from the public beach prior so sundown.
- (5) Groupings of chairs and umbrellas provided by franchise holders may not exceed a maximum of 30 feet width or depth, must be spaced at least 30 feet from other groupings of

chairs or umbrellas, and may not be located within 30 feet of the entrance to a public beach access.

- (6) Beach chair and umbrella franchise holders may not advertise on the beach except that each franchise holder may have one tent in Section One, no larger than ten feet by ten feet, that includes the provider's name, logo, and contact information. In Section Two, franchise holders may use a maximum of two unmarked tents, no larger than ten feet by ten feet, to support their operations. All tents must be removed from the public beach prior to sundown.
- (b) Personal watercraft rental vendors operating under a franchise agreement with the city. No more than one franchise shall be allowed. Personal watercraft rentals which shall meet the following standards:
- 1. The franchisee shall possess on-site proof of current registration (certificate of numbers) for each personal watercraft (PWC).
- 2. All employees shall be CPR certified, and the franchisee shall have an automated external defibrillator ("AED") on site. The vendor shall also have a safety plan in coordination with Charleston County Parks and Recreation lifeguards.
- 3. The vendor shall have one CPR certified employee with no additional responsibilities than to watch the watercraft from shore.
- 4. Watercraft shall be kept in safe working condition.
- 5. Failure to adhere to these standards will result in revocation of the franchise agreement and business license.
- (2) Section Two is the balance of the public beach. The commercial activities allowed within Section Two are as follows:
- (a) Beach chair and umbrella rentals provided by vendors operating under a franchise agreement with the city. No more than two franchises shall be allowed.
- (b) (C) Surf and paddleboard lessons and camps are allowed in Section Two.
- 1. Surf and paddleboard lessons are limited to a maximum of five students. Lessons do not require a franchise agreement but must obtain permission from City Council and a business license annually. Permission from City Council will only be considered if proof of the safety standards and certifications of division (A)(2)(b)3. is presented to Council. Lessons must occur outside of Section One and the washout (1500 block) and do not have exclusive right to any section of the beach.
- 2. Surf and paddleboard camps involving more than five students must have a franchise agreement with the city. There will be a maximum of four surf camp franchises per year on the beach and two paddleboard camp franchises, with location determined by city staff in

coordination with franchise holder. Camps must not exceed 40 students and can only operate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Camps must comply with the safety standards and certifications of division (A)(2)(b)3.

- 3. All surf and paddleboard lessons and camps must adhere to the following safety standards.
 - a. Lessons and camps must have one instructor for every five students.
- b. At least one instructor per ten students must be lifeguard, CPR, and first aid certified, with current certifications on file with the city. This certification requirement also applies to lessons, classes, and camps having less than ten students. There must be a first aid kit on site.
- c. Each provider must carry liability insurance of at least \$1,000,000 that names the City of Folly Beach as an additional insured.
- d. Lesson and camp providers may not advertise on the beach, but franchise holders approved providers may have a tent no larger than ten feet by ten feet that includes the provider's name, logo, and contact information.
- e. Failure to adhere to these standards will result in revocation of the franchise agreement and business license.
- (B) (D) Weddings and photography activities Commercial activity related to weddings and photography are is allowed in Section One and Section Two and does not require a franchise agreement or City Council approval, but does require a current business license. However, these
- (1) Wedding and photography related activities shall not interfere with the activities of approved franchisees.
- (2) Any items delivered to the public beach for a wedding or other event (such as tents pulpits, chairs, plants, arbors, or decorations must be delivered from the nearest public walkover, unless the event has permission to use a private beach access. In no case shall these items be transported on the public beach by motorized vehicles.
- (3) All items must be removed before sunset, before the tide reaches them, or no later than two hours after the conclusion of the event, whichever is sooner.
- (C) (E) City Council may approve other lessons, classes, camps, or additional commercial activities in Section One or Section Two.
- (D) (F) A business license and all franchise fees as denoted in § 118.04 shall be paid and obtained by the business license application deadline as specified in § 110.04(C) before any commercial activity is conducted on the public beach.

§ 118.04 FRANCHISE AGREEMENTS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY.

- (A) City Council is authorized to enter into franchise agreements with vendors on public property, including the public beach, pursuant to state law SC Code 5-7-30 which allows municipalities and counties to franchise public property to private concerns.
- (B) (1) The minimum bid amount shall be determined by City Council prior to publication of the request for bids. City Council may also require vendors to pay a percentage of their gross proceeds in addition to the amounts bid. The award of a franchise to a vendor shall be determined through the competitive bid process using the criteria set forth in § 36.17.
- (C) (1) (2) Each of the approved vendors shall enter into up to a five-year three year franchise agreement with the city, with City Council having the option to extend the franchise annually for up to an additional five two years with an extension fee and/or re-negotiated franchise fee as set by Council if the extension is in the best interest of the city.
- (2) (3) Franchise agreements are contracts between the city and vendors. Once the terms and conditions have been negotiated, the agreements shall be placed on the City Council agenda for approval. Upon approval, the Mayor or Mayor's designee shall execute the agreements on behalf of the city.
- (D) (4) All vendors shall be restricted to staying within the areas of operation designated in the operational allowances specified in the franchise agreements including but not limited to products and services offered, location, operating hours, and limits on the number of participants.; except the personal watercraft vendors who shall be allowed to leave its designated location to launch personal watercraft in its assigned lane. In no other circumstances shall any vendor be mobile or allowed to operate outside his or her designated area. Vendors shall also be limited to the type of business set forth in the awarded bid. Vendors shall not vary or expand the services or products offered without re-negotiating the contract and without permission from City Council.
- (5) Business types may not be combined for the bidding process. A vendor, however, may bid on two of the same types of franchise in the same area of public property.
- —(F) (6) Vendors shall be responsible for clearing trash, debris, and any equipment from assigned areas as more fully set forth in the franchise agreement daily. Storage of equipment is permitted in unobtrusive containers approved by the Code Enforcement Officer as to location and appearance, or as negotiated in the franchise agreement. In the event of a tropical storm or hurricane, all storage boxes, equipment, or any other items used in the transaction of business must be removed 24 hours prior to forecasted landfall within 100 miles of Folly Beach. The Code Enforcement Officer has the power to require removal in his or her discretion based on other adverse weather conditions or tidal events. No storage of any item is allowed on the public beach or other public property absent an agreement approved by City Council.

- (G) (7) Franchise agreements shall not be sold or assigned to another vendor.
- (6) All vendors awarded a franchise agreement shall be subject to an audit in the final business license year of the awarded term.
- —(H) (B) Any violation of the above or violation of terms and conditions of the franchise agreement shall may result in the revocation of the franchise agreement. and vendor's business license. To initiate revocation, Tthe City License Official shall send a written notice of the revocation to the vendor by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested and delivery restricted to the addressee and by email to the address registered with the city. The vendor shall have ten business days from the receipt of said notice to submit a written Notice of Appeal to the Municipal Clerk of Council.
- —(I) (C) Upon timely receipt of a notice of appeal of a revocation of a franchise agreement and business license, a hearing shall be held by the Council or its designee within 30 days after receipt of a request for appeal following the procedures of Section 110.16 (C). the Municipal Clerk of Council shall notify the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, and the item shall be placed on the agenda of the next regular City Council meeting whose agenda has not already closed. The Municipal Clerk of Council shall notify the applicant of the date and time of the hearing. A special meeting of City Council may be called in order to address the hearing of the appeal.
- (J) On the date of the hearing, the City Council shall hear the appeal and shall determine whether a cause for revocation of the franchise agreement and business license exists. The Council may deny the appeal if it finds that cause for revocation exists.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FOLLY BEACH CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 72 (PARKING REGULATIONS) TO ALLOW FOR AN ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW AND DETERMINATION OF ERROR PRIOR TO THE SCHEDULING OF A COURT DATE FOR PARKING CITATIONS.

The City Council of Folly Beach, South Carolina, duly assembled, hereby ordains that Folly Beach Code of Ordinance be amended as follows:

72.16 PARKING CITATIONS.

- (A) Pursuant to S.C. Code 1976, § 56-7-80(G), a notice of violation in the form of a parking citation, may be issued in lieu of immediately issuing a summons to its owner or driver by a police officer or other person appointed as a code enforcement officer for any for any vehicle parked, standing, or stopped in violation of a city ordinance or state law. A copy of the parking citation shall be issued by placing it on the windshield of the illegally parked vehicle in a prominent place thereon. No parking citations shall be issued for violations of S.C. Code § 16-11-760, which requires the issuance of a uniform traffic ticket.
- (B) Parking citations must cite only one violation and contain, at a minimum, the following information:
 - (1) The state, license plate number, and make of the vehicle in violation of this section;
 - (2) The name and title of the person issuing the citation;
 - (3) The date and time when the citation was issued;
 - (4) The nature and description of the parking violation observed;
- (5) The date, time and location of the hearing manner by which an administrative review of the citation by the parking contractor to determine an error of issuance may be requested; and
- (6) Information advising the owner/ operator of the vehicle that they must may admit the violation and pay the penalty listed on the citation or must, within thirty (30) days from the date of the citation, deny the violation and request to appear at the a hearing in Municipal Court on the date and time provided on the citation and advising that failure to do so may result in impoundment or immobilization of the vehicle.
- (C) Parking citations for which no error of issuance has been found by administrative review must be filed with the Municipal Court and may be disposed of only by official action of the Court or by payment of the fine. It shall be unlawful for any person to alter or destroy any

parking citation issued under this section except in a manner consistent with this section and state law. Employees of parking contractors who issue parking citations shall attend Municipal Court and testify when citations they issued are being contested, if requested to do so by a Municipal Court Judge or the Director of Public Safety.

- (D) No person shall solicit the cancellation of any parking citation.
- (E) A person who issues a parking citation shall be authorized to cancel the citation within 24 hours of issuing the citation, but the reason for the cancellation must be shown on the citation.
- (F) No parking citation shall be dismissed absent a determination that no violation occurred. Late payment penalties may be reduced or removed if mitigating circumstances exist. Whenever a citation is dismissed, the reason for doing so must be recorded and retained.

Re: Sole Source Kimley-Horn

Mayor and Council,

Staff seeks approval for the sole-source procurement of professional engineering services from Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc., for the Folly Road intersection improvements project.

Project Background: Through the RFQ process, Kimley-Horn was selected to develop this initial project concept and provided the concept plan in October of 2024. Their research and knowledge of the project's specifics makes them uniquely qualified to proceed with the next phase.

Justification for Sole Source: The selection of Kimley-Horn is based on the following justifications:

- Prior Knowledge: Kimley-Horn's in-house development of the project's design concept gives them an intimate understanding of the site and its constraints that is unavailable from other firms.
- Continuity and Efficiency: An outside firm would require a costly and time-consuming ramp-up period, causing unnecessary additional costs and delays
- Specialized Expertise: Kimley-Horn has had preliminary meetings with SCDOT about this concept and a clear plan for obtaining the required encroachment permit.

Scope of Work: Based on the November 18, 2024, proposal, Kimley-Horn will provide:

- Task 1 Roadway Design Plans: Development of preliminary and final roadway engineering permit plans, including coordination with a survey subconsultant (Atlas Surveying), the City, and SCDOT.
- Task 2 Bid Phase Services: Preparation of a bid package, attendance at a pre-bid meeting, and answering bidder questions.
- Task 3 Limited Construction Phase Services: Provision of services during the construction phase on an hourly basis, including a pre-construction conference, responding to RFIs, site visits to observe progress, and closeout inspections.

Project Cost: The lump-sum cost for Tasks 1 and 2 is \$52,000. Task 3 is hourly, up to a maximum of \$10,000, for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$62,000. The City budgeted \$65,000 in FY26 budget for Kimley-Horn in Public Works contracts which will cover this expense.

Recommendation: Based on Kimley-Horn's unique qualifications, prior project knowledge, and the need for continuity and efficiency, I recommend a sole-source award for the professional services outlined in their proposal.

Dear Mr. Lutz,

Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. ("Kimley-Horn" or "Consultant") is pleased to submit this letter agreement ("the Agreement") to the City of Folly Beach ("Client" or "City") for providing roadway engineering services related to the Folly Road at Bowens Island Road/Peas Island Road intersection improvements.

PROJECT UNDERSTANDING

It is our understanding that the City requests roadway design, SCDOT permitting, bid assistance, and construction administration services for the Folly Road at Bowens Island Road/Peas Island Road intersection improvements concept dated October 12, 2024 by Kimley-Horn. An SCDOT encroachment permit will be needed to perform the work.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

The Consultant will provide the services specifically set forth below.

Task 1 – Roadway Design Plans

Kimley-Horn will contract with Atlas Surveying to provide survey. Kimley-Horn will coordinate and manage the effort of the survey subconsultant. Kimley-Horn will coordinate the subconsultant's scope of work, schedules, and provide a cursory review of their deliverables on behalf of the Client.

Kimley-Horn will develop preliminary roadway engineering permit plans for the proposed Folly Road improvements. Preliminary roadway permit plans will consist of a cover sheet, general notes, typical sections, plan and profile sheets, signing and pavement marking plans, and traffic control plans. This task will include project management efforts and coordination and correspondence with the City and SCDOT.

It is assumed that no utility coordination will be needed for the project.

After an internal review of the preliminary plans, Kimley-Horn will submit an electronic PDF of the preliminary roadway permit plans to the Client for review and approval. Based on the comments received on the preliminary permit plans, Kimley-Horn will develop final roadway design plans. Final



plans will consist of all the elements included in the permit plans with Client revisions incorporated. Kimley-Horn will prepare reproducible final plans in general accordance with SCDOT general procedures and policies relating to local roadway design.

Permitting

Kimley-Horn will submit one electronic copy of the permit plans to SCDOT for review as a part of an encroachment permit application. Kimley-Horn will attend one meeting with SCDOT to review the permit plans if needed. It is assumed that all SCDOT permit plan review for the project will be performed by SCDOT District staff, and it is assumed that the permit plans will not be sent to SCDOT Headquarters for review.

Kimley-Horn will revise the permit plans in accordance with SCDOT review comments. It is assumed that there will be two rounds of SCDOT comments. Kimley-Horn will submit an electronic copy of the approved sealed plans to the Client for construction.

Special Provisions and Engineer's Opinion of Probable Construction Cost

Based upon the final plans, quantity computations will be performed by Kimley-Horn for each item of work designated as unit price pay items. Computations will be tabulated for inclusion in the Bid Document.

Where possible, the "Standard Specifications for Highway Construction and Standard Special Provisions," issued by the SCDOT, will apply for materials and construction of all work. However, when no applicable specification exists, Kimley-Horn will prepare Special Provisions for those items of work not covered in the Standard Specifications or existing Standard Special Provisions.

Utilizing recent bid data from similar projects in the area, Kimley-Horn will prepare an Opinion of Probable Construction Cost (OPCC) for this project. The OPCC will be based on the final summary of quantities and will be utilized in the final bid analysis and award, as well as the Client's acquisition of Performance Bonds for the construction of the project.

Task 2 - Bid Phase Services

Kimley-Horn will prepare the bid package to be in general concurrence with previous bid packages prepared by the Client. Kimley-Horn will provide the bid package to the Client for contractors to acquire the bid package from. The Client will be responsible for advertising the project for construction.

Kimley-Horn will attend up to one (1) Pre-Bid Meeting with the Client. The Client is to provide the location for the Pre-Bid Meeting. Kimley-Horn will prepare meeting notes from the Pre-Bid Meeting.

Kimley-Horn will answer Client questions about the bid documents as needed during the bid process.



Task 3 - Limited Construction Phase Services

- Make visits as directed by Client in order to observe the progress of the work. Such
 observations will not be exhaustive or extend to every aspect of Contractor's work.
 Observations will to be limited to spot checking, selective measurement, and similar methods
 of general observation. Based on information obtained during site visits, Consultant will
 evaluate whether Contractor's work is generally proceeding in accordance with the Contract
 Documents, and Kimley-Horn will keep Client informed of the general progress of the work.

Kimley-Horn will not supervise, direct, or have control over Contractor's work, nor shall Kimley-Horn have authority to stop the Work or have responsibility for the means, methods, techniques, equipment choice and usage, schedules, or procedures of construction selected by Contractor, for safety programs incident to Contractor's work, or for any failure of Contractor to comply with any laws. Kimley-Horn does not guarantee the performance of any Contractor and has no responsibility for Contractor's failure to perform its work in accordance with the Contract Documents. - Kimley-Horn's Scope of Services and Additional Services. Kimley-Horn will perform only the services specifically described in this Agreement ("Services"). RESOLUTION 28-25

A RESOLUTION BY THE FOLLY BEACH CITY COUNCIL ALLOWING STAFF TO REQUEST \$72,267.99 FROM THE CITY OF FOLLY BEACH STORMWATER FUND HELD AT CHARLESTON COUNTY TO PAY FOR ADDITIONAL STORMWATER DRAINAGE CONSTRUCTION AT 4TH STREET EAST BETWEEN EAST COOPER AND EAST ASHLEY AVENUES.

- **WHEREAS,** The City has approximately \$500,000.00 in the stormwater funds collected and held by Charleston County on the City's behalf; and
- **WHEREAS,** The County has previously awarded a contract to Gulfstream Construction for the drainage improvements along 4th Street East; and
- **WHEREAS,** The County could only fund 90% of the construction as designed, stopping at the mid-block of 4th East between Cooper and Ashley Avenues; and
- WHEREAS, The City wishes to fund a change order for the additional scope, which is already part of the approved design, to complete full construction from the mid-block of East Cooper to East Ashley Avenues. This will incorporate the full design as drawn by ICE Engineering in the Phase II portion of the East Ashley drainage improvements within CTC bid number 6048-25C.

Mayor and Council,

Staff is seeking approval from City Council to authorize the use of county-held stormwater funds for the completion of drainage improvements on 4th Street East, currently under construction now.

Background:

- The City of Folly Beach has approximately \$500,000 in its stormwater fund balance, which is held by Charleston County.
- Charleston County previously awarded a contract to Gulfstream Construction for drainage improvements on 4th Street East.
- The County was only able to fund 90% of the construction as it was designed, which will result in the project stopping at the middle of the block on 4th East, between Cooper and Ashley Ave.

Resolution 28-25 seeks to use \$72,267.99 from the City's stormwater fund balance to complete the full construction from the mid-block on East Cooper to East Ashley Avenue. This funding will cover a change order for the additional scope, which is already part of the approved design. The change order will be approved by Charleston County and paid to Gulfstream Construction out of the City's stormwater fund balance.

Executive Summary Marshfront Management Plan 2025

Folly Beach is a unique ecological area encompassing approximately 8,600 acres of saltwater marsh, tidal creeks, and marsh islands. These habitats play a critical role in floodwater absorption, pollutant filtration, and supporting diverse recreational and commercial activities.

The Marshfront Management Plan (MMP) aims to provide strategic recommendations for protecting, restoring, and managing Folly Beach's marshfront areas. This update to the original 2019 MMP reflects the need for ongoing research and adaptation in marsh management, having drawn upon lessons learned from similar initiatives across South Carolina's coastal towns.

Key components of the updated MMP include an emphasis on collaboration among stakeholders, clearly defined responsibilities, refined regulatory frameworks, and robust educational initiatives. The management plan acknowledges the dynamic nature of the marshfront and the importance of maintaining its ecological integrity, particularly in the face of challenges such as sea-level rise and erosion.

Specific recommendations of note include changes to allowable uses within 15-ft marshfront setback and to septic regulations and planning.

- Monitor: Identify and prioritize sewer transition zones for the medium-term.
- Protect:
 - Update septic regulations on rental applications/properties and refine requirements of septic inspection program.
 - Modify allowable uses within the 15-ft setback:
 - Allow nature-based erosion control to provide marshfront owners with property protection options, and
 - Prohibit new construction of sidewalks and bulkheads.

This MMP is designed to be flexible, with annual reviews and updates every five years to ensure the management strategies remain relevant and effective. By thoughtfully balancing ecological preservation with economic needs, this plan seeks to secure the long-term health and stability of Folly Beach's marshfront ecosystem for future generations.

Staff is seeking Council approval as part of the application for a 2025 MASC Impact Grant in the Big Ideas category. Big Ideas are described by MASC as "bold, creative and forward-thinking ideas. Projects might include technology-driven service improvements, innovative uses of public space, community-wide initiatives or any other big idea that results in long-term impact. Grant judging criteria is heavily weighted toward creativity, community impact and project readiness. "

The proposed project is a mapping portal which will use data on septic tank locations, tidal and stormwater flooding, predicted ground water changes, distance to a water body, and other factors to create an online risk map for the city, residents, and property owners. The city will be able to use this information for long term planning while individual users will be able to quickly visualize the current risk to their systems. The portal will also include education about best practices and possible risk mitigation applicable at the parcel scale. In the future, the city can build on this information to offer assistance to the most vulnerable areas. Staff believes that the proposal will score well based on the stated criteria.

RESOLUTION 34-25 A RESOLUTION BY THE FOLLY BEACH CITY COUNCIL SETTING NEW RATES FOR THE CITY'S PAID PARKING LOTS.

WHEREAS, The city has designated certain off-street parking areas in the city as paid parking areas; and

WHEREAS, These parking areas are not within the right-of-way maintained by the state;

WHEREAS, Section 72.19 of the City of Folly Beach Code of Ordinances states that the city shall set the fees for parking in these areas; and

WHEREAS, The rates for parking in these areas have not been adjusted in several years while neighboring communities have adjusted rates for paid parking areas within their jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, The city's goals of dispersing traffic and congestion and increasing turnover in paid parking lots closest to the commercial districts of the island are better served by a rate structure establishing separate rates for these areas; and

WHEREAS, staff propose a paid parking rate as follows:

5th Street East to 5th Street West

March-September:

Monday through Friday: Flat fee of \$15

Saturday, Sunday and Holidays: Flat Fee of \$25

October-February:

Monday through Friday: Flat fee of \$10

Saturday, Sunday and Holidays: Flat Fee of \$15

6th Street East to Summer Place/6th Street West to 9th Street West

March-September:

\$3 per hour or \$12 per day

October-February:

\$2.50 per hour or \$10 per day

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of Folly Beach, South Carolina, that the paid parking rates as set forth herein shall be adopted and made effective within ninety 90 days of the date of ratification of this Resolution.
