1. Call to Order

Mayor Brad Wiersum called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

2. Pledge of Allegiance

All joined in the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. Roll Call

Council Members Patsy Foster-Bolton, Rebecca Schack, Kimberly Wilburn, Deb Calvert, Paula Ramaley, Kissy Coakley and Brad Wiersum (attending remotely, out of town) were present.

4. Approval of Agenda

Calvert moved, Wilburn seconded a motion to accept the agenda as amended with addenda for Items 11.B, 11.F and 13.C. All voted “yes.” Motion carried.

5. Approval of Minutes:

A. January 27, 2025 regular meeting minutes

Calvert moved, Coakley seconded a motion to approve the minutes. Foster-Bolton, Schack, Wilburn, Calvert, Ramaley, and Coakley voted “yes.” Wiersum “abstained”. Motion carried.

6. Special Matters:

A. Hennepin County Commissioner Heather Edelson

Hennepin County Commissioner Heather Edelson provided the city council with an update from Hennepin County. She discussed the health and human services and public safety services that were provided to the city by the county and reviewed the budget that was approved for 2025. She commented on the investments that would be made to EMS services and HCMC. She reviewed the transportation initiatives that would be pursued in the coming year and discussed the Green Line extension.

Ramaley thanked Commissioner Edelson for her presentation. She explained she would be looking at the presentation in further detail and would be following up.

Calvert explained she appreciated the fact Hennepin County would be making investments in EMS. She indicated she was excited about the Green Line extension. She commented further on the services that were being provided by His House to address homelessness.

Coakley thanked Commissioner Edelson for her presentation and for working to address mental health services for youth. She indicated she would enjoy speaking with Commissioner Edelson on this topic further.

City Manager Mike Funk thanked Commissioner Edelson for working collaboratively with the city.

Wiersum thanked Commissioner Edelson for all that she was doing on behalf of the City of Minnetonka and for working to meet the needs of those who were struggling in the community.

Wiersum recognized Minnetonka Police K9 Duke noting Duke joined the city in 2014. He thanked Duke for his 10 years of dedicated service to the community and wished him all the best in his retirement. A round of applause was offered by all in attendance.

Officer Joe Mace thanked the city council for recognizing K9 Duke and for their continued support for the K9 unit.

C. Black History Month proclamation

Wilburn read a proclamation in full for the record declaring Feb. to be Black History Month in the City of Minnetonka.

Wiersum commented on how important Black History was in truly understanding the history of the country. He urged the residents of Minnetonka to learn more about Black History.

D. Strategic Profile quarter four and end of year report

City Manager Mike Funk gave the staff report.

Wiersum thanked staff for all of their efforts on the strategic profile.

City Manager Mike Funk reported on upcoming city events and council meetings.

Calvert explained she participated in both the Minnetonka Academy and Minnetonka Police Academy. She reported her first ride along was with Officer Mace and K9 Duke.

Calvert noted she attended the last winter market at the community center. She encouraged residents to attend the winter market events next winter.

Calvert thanked Community Development Director Julie Wischnack for the presentation she gave on affordable housing at the Municipal League of Cities (MLC) legislative breakfast.

Ramaley thanked the elected officials who were in attendance at the MLC legislative breakfast.

Ramaley thanked city staff for hosting a wonderful Kids Fest event noting there were great vendors at this event.

Coakley stated she appreciated Community Development Director Julie Wischnack's presentation at the MLC breakfast. She explained she was really proud of the great work the city was doing to provide affordable housing.

Wiersum congratulated Community Development Director Julie Wischnack and her entire team for the great work they do to provide affordable housing in the community.

Wilburn moved, Foster-Bolton seconded a motion to amend the 2025 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) to include additional grant funding from the MPCA in the amount of \$438,697.00. All voted “yes.” Motion carried.

B. Intensive Comprehensive Police Officer Education and Training (ICPOET) grant agreement

E. Resolution for the Minnetonka Boulevard Trail Project

Ramaley stated requested further information from staff regarding this project. Public Works Director Will Manchester stated the city was proposing to construct an eight foot trail along the north side of Minnetonka Boulevard from Tonkawood to The Marsh. He explained approval tonight would move this project into the design phase. He reported power lines would also begin to be buried, which sometimes took up to a year to complete. He indicated this would be a 2026 project.

Ramaley moved, Calvert seconded a motion to adopt Resolution 2025-016. All voted "yes." Motion carried.

Ramaley moved, Calvert seconded a motion to amend the 2025-2029 Capital Improvements Program. All voted "yes." Motion carried.

Ramaley moved, Calvert seconded a motion to authorize the mayor and city manager to execute an agreement with Xcel Energy, subject to non-material changes as approved by the city engineer and city attorney, in the

amount of \$1,277,731.10 for the Minnetonka Boulevard Trail Project, Project No. 26305. All voted "yes." Motion carried.

A. Ordinance authorizing the sale of city-owned property at 13231 Minnetonka Drive

City Planner Susan Thomas gave the staff report.

Ramaley asked if the city would have first right of refusal on the Old Town Hall. City Attorney Corrine Heine reported the 1971 contract for deed included a provision or requirement that the building must be donated to the city and the city has six months to move the building in order to be maintained for historic purposes. She explained the ordinance approves the sale in accordance with the contract for deed. She noted the deed of conveyance will include this requirement and will be in place for 30 years under state law.

Ramaley inquired if the Old Town Hall was currently a historic property. Heine stated the Old Town Hall was on the national registry of historic places.

Foster-Bolton moved, Wilburn seconded a motion to adopt Ordinance 2025-04. All voted "yes." Motion carried.

B. Resolution approving vacation of easements at 3522 Elm Lane and an unassigned address and approval of Termination of Easements and Rights of First Refusal

City Planner Susan Thomas gave the staff report.

Wiersum opened the public hearing.

There being no further comments from the public, Wiersum closed the public hearing.

The Minnetonka Police Department applied for and was awarded a \$7,500 grant through the United States Police Canine Association (USPCA) American Kennel Club (AKC) REUNITE K9 program. This grant will assist the police department in purchasing a new police K9.

A police K9 enhances community safety by locating suspects, recovering evidence, and detecting illegal substances. Their presence deters crime, improves officer safety, and increases efficiency in high-risk situations. K9s also support community engagement through demonstrations and outreach, fostering trust between law enforcement and the public. By strengthening crime prevention, emergency response, and public safety efforts, a K9 unit plays a vital role in building a safer and healthier community.

Financial Consideration

Acquiring a new police canine is expected to exceed the grant award, with any additional costs covered by the police department's operating budget and fundraising efforts through the Minnetonka Crime Prevention Association. Once selected, the K9 and its handler will require additional training to achieve certification.

The city code contains numerous cross-references to state laws and state and federal regulations. The proposed ordinance removes cross-references that are now obsolete and updates cross-references to the current state law or regulation.

Background

The city code contains numerous cross-references to provisions in state statutes and state and federal regulations. The legal department recently reviewed all of those cross-references to ensure their accuracy. Some of the cross-referenced statutes have been repealed or renumbered. The proposed ordinance repeals obsolete provisions and updates other provisions to conform to current laws.

In addition, the ordinance repeals section 1050.005 of the Minnetonka City Code. That section incorporated 54 state statutes by reference. The legal department and police department determined that section 1050.005 is not needed. Violations of state law can be enforced independent of city ordinance, by either the county attorney or the city attorney.

The ordinance also directs the city clerk to use a consistent style for citing state and federal statutes, rules and regulations. The legal department has created a table of cross-referenced statutes, rules and

regulations, and that table will be reviewed annually to ensure ongoing accuracy of the city code.

An Ordinance making technical corrections to the city code; removing obsolete provisions; amending sections 300.33, 500.005, 500.010, 600.030, 610.020, 615.020, 615.065, 615.070, 805.040, 845.020, 845.025, 925.095, 930.005, 940.010, 1005.010, 1115.015, 1120.035 and 1305.005 of the Minnetonka City Code; repealing section 1050 of the Minnetonka City Code

The City of Minnetonka Ordains:

Section 1. The city clerk is directed to revise those sections of the Minnetonka City Code listed in Column 1 of the attached Exhibit A, by replacing the existing cross-referenced statute listed in Column 2 of the attached Exhibit A with the statute referenced in Column 3 of the attached Exhibit A.

Section 2. Section 300.33, subd. 4 of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to exceptions to the anti-blight regulations in section 300.33, is amended by repealing clause (d), as follows:

- d) ~~any activity regulated under Minn. Stat. §617.251; [repealed]~~

Section 3. Section 615.020 of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to exceptions to the sexually-oriented business regulations, is amended by repealing subdivision 4, as follows:

- 4. ~~activity regulated under Minn. Stat. § 617.251; [repealed]~~

Section 4. Section 850.040, subd. 1(a) of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to public pools, is amended to read as follows:

- a. Closure criteria per Minnesota Rules, ~~part 7417.3970~~ 4717.3970 or amendments thereto;

Section 5. Section 925.095, subd. 1(c) of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to wild animals, is amended to read as follows:

- c. reptiles that have the physical ability as an adult to cause substantial bodily ~~injury-harm~~ as defined in Minn. Stat. §609.02, subd. 7a, to humans and domestic animals, such as python snakes and crocodilians;

Section 6. Section 940.010 of the Minnetonka City code, relating to snowmobiles, is amended to read as follows:

940.010. Adoption of State Code.

The provisions of Minn. Stat. §§ 84.87, 84.871, 84.872, ~~84.873,~~ and 84.88 are adopted by reference. These sections apply to all public streets and all snowmobiles used in the city.

The stricken language is deleted; the underlined language is inserted.

Section 7. Section 1005.010, subd. 3 of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to definitions for curfew regulations, is amended to read as follows:

3. "Guardian" means an adult appointed under Minn. Stat. §~~525.6155~~ 524.5-202 or §~~525.6165~~524.5-204 who has the powers and responsibilities of a parent as defined by Minn. Stat. §~~525.619~~524.5-207.

Section 8. Section 1050 of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to state law offenses, a copy of which is attached as Exhibit B to this ordinance, is repealed in its entirety.

Section 9. Section 1115.015 of the Minnetonka City Code, relating to city street lighting, is amended to read as follows:

1115.015. Delinquent Payments for Electric Street Lighting.

Payments for the street lighting system are payable within 30 days following the receipt of a statement from the city. Delinquent and unpaid charges are a lien against the benefiting property and may be specially assessed against ~~certified to the county auditor and collected as a special assessment~~ on the property receiving the service, pursuant to Minn. Stat. §429.101.

Section 10. Section 1120.035, subd. 1(f) of the Minnetonka City Code, related to registration of public right-of-way users, is amended to read as follows:

f. if the registrant is a business entity as defined in Minn. Stat. §5.001 ~~corporation~~, a copy of a ~~the~~ certificate of good standing ~~that is required to be filed with Minn. Stat. § 300.06 as recorded and certified to issued by the Minnesota secretary of state;~~

Section 11. For consistency within the city code, the city clerk is directed to follow the Minnesota Revisor’s Manual, chapter 10 with respect to references to state and federal laws, rules or regulations and to correct such references pursuant to section 1315.025(2)(d) of the Minnetonka City Code.
