






Average Number of Completed Contracts (6 months): 120

Average cycle time for completed projects



Background

On March 19, 2019, Jackson Health System's Nuclear Medicine Departments entered into an agreement (GPO 19-16768-JM) with Medi Physics, a subsidiary of GE Healthcare, Inc., accessing a Vizient Competitively awarded (GPO) Contract DR0011-2012, for a period of two (2) years through March 2021, in the amount of \$2,792,565.43. PHT Resolution 04/2021-014 renewed the Agreement from March 2021 through March 2022, in the amount of \$1,096,230. The Agreement covers the provision of Nuclear Pharmaceutical Products and the Ec2 Software License. In 2020 Medi Physics changed its name to RLS (USA). The company continues to manufacture and distribute diagnostic imaging agents and radio-pharmaceuticals and provides radioisotopes to the Trust's Nuclear Medicine Departments.

Through this request, the Nuclear Medicine Departments are requesting a modification of the contract to extend the current term an additional year through March 2023, during which period a new Agreement will be processed to continue these services.

The Ec2 Software Solution Application license provides the Trust with the radiopharmaceutical tracking that meets compliance with regulatory standards. The Solution includes the Patient Reporting Programs: BioRx or RMIS, BI (Business Intelligence) Reporting, and BioTrax QMS.

In providing a statement on the benefits, to the Trust, of this procurement, the Nuclear Medicine Departments have offered that the RMIS (Registry Monitoring Insurance Service – compliance monitoring management software) offers a simplified solution to the Trust's Nuclear Pharmacy needs. This software streamlines business processes and enhances customer service. BioRx/RMIS is designed to meet a range of needs while keeping up with ever-changing state and federal regulations. The BioTrax QMS combines the benefits of an electronic inventory tracking system with a batch record maintenance system, providing the Trust with a streamlined and paperless approach to managing the facilities' current Good Manufacturing Practice regulations needs. This program minimizes human error, ensures compliance, improves quality and reduces costs. The Ec2 Solution includes software support to the Trust as follows:

The Ec2 license also includes a Software Support and Updates Contract which entitles the Trust to:

- Unlimited phone and remote technical support
- Unlimited email and website submitted support tickets
- Annual software releases
- All software patches
- On-line ordering with most RadioPharmacies

* Software updates and on-line ordering are not available without a Software Support & Updates Contract.

Recommendation

The Nuclear Medicine Departments, have determined that it would be in the Trust's best interest to extend the current term and add funds to the current Trust/RLS (USA) Contract GPO 19-16768-JM for Nuclear Pharmaceutical Products and the Ec2 Software Solutions Application Support License. The amount of \$2,623,465 will continue to fund these services for the remainder of the contract term through March 2023. Pricing for this extension remains the same.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The pharmaceutical services provided under this agreement will be performed by RLS employees. The vendor does not subcontract any of its services. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. RLS is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance during the current contract year, the Nuclear Medicine Departments have reported the following:

- The average turnaround time of products and services meets the standard.
- The deliverables meet contract requirements.
- The ability to successfully respond to emergency situations is above standard.
- The responsiveness to safety issues and safety standards is above standard.

RLS USA will be monitored to ensure delivery of the following key performance indicators (KPI) that will be reported quarterly to the Nuclear Medicine Department:

- a. Delivery Schedule must be timely
- b. STAT Orders: RLS USA, Inc. must endeavor to deliver generally-available orders on STAT (urgent) or an emergency delivery basis within ninety (90) minutes of the order. Products requiring special compounding will need additional delivery time.
- c. Product Returns: Due to the nature of certain Products (short shelf life), the Trust will be allowed to return 10% of these products within the billing cycle in which vendor calculates returns.

The underlying contract was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience upon ninety (90) calendar days' notice and includes UAP and OIG fee. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as deductions on the invoices.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, RLS (USA). has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust. Background

The Trust entered into a four (4) year agreement with Quest Diagnostics Laboratories, Inc. ("Quest") on July of 2018 for the provisions of reference laboratory services under Vizient GPO Agreement No. LB0593 in the amount of \$10,202,755, PHT Resolution 07/2018-036. The amount of \$2,329,920 was subsequently added to satisfy an increase in utilization. The dollars being requested will cover cost due to an increase in utilization of these services through the end of the initial term on July 30, 2022, as well as the cost of an additional twelve-months of service, accessing the Vizient GPO Agreement, through July 30, 2023. Pricing remains the same as under the original award. Quest is the primary vendor for these services, providing esoteric and referral specialized testing that cannot be performed by the JHS Pathology Department.

Quest provides quick diagnostic turnaround times; accurate tracking and reduction of lost specimens; a comprehensive test menu selection; and, consolidation of electronic order/result interface to patient records and the laboratory information system (LIS). Quest has been able to assist Jackson Health System in its efforts to deliver consistent outcomes on these expectations, as outlined by the following:

A comprehensive test menu that includes, but is not limited, to the following selections:

- Immunology/Infectious Disease molecular testing, used for patients with autoimmune diseases, transplant patients, HIV and HCV infected patients, rheumatoid arthritis, etc.
- Neurology testing, for patients with neurologic disorders, such as epilepsy, Alzheimer's, paraneoplastic syndromes, genetic diseases, rare developmental disorders for pediatric, adult and geriatric population.
- Genetic testing, to be used on prenatal patients, pregnant patients to diagnose or rule out diseases, and for certain cancer patients to diagnose and determine best treatment options
- Toxicology, for prescription drug monitor and substance abuse issues
- IBD/IBS/Celiac disease related testing
- Prenatal Genetic testing such as NIPT, Maternal Serum testing, and Cystic Fibrosis and Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) testing. These tests are ordered on pregnant patients to screen for several chromosome abnormalities; and are used to determine risk for birth defects and facilitate disease treatment in unborn babies.
- Allergy testing, mostly ordered in patients with immunology conditions, respiratory conditions, or allergies triggered by food and/or the environment.
- Cardio metabolic and Endocrinology testing, for example thyroid related testing, for diagnosing and treating metabolic syndromes and conditions. CVD (Cardiovascular Disease Disorders), diabetes and endocrine disorders.
- Cancer and coagulation related testing.

Recommendation

All testing referral services within this contract are deemed patient chargeable. In the best interest of the Trust, the Pathology Services Departments for all four campuses recommend additional funding to the current purchase orders for Quest Diagnostics, Inc. in order to continue accessing vendor's Vizient GPO Agreement LB0593 for services through July 30, 2023.

In accordance with JHS' Contractor Due Diligence review, Quest Diagnostics Inc., has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance, the Pathology Services Department has reported the following:

- The deliverables are considered above standard.
- The ability to successfully respond to emergency situations is above standard.
- The responsiveness to safety issues and safety standards is also above standard.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The clinical laboratory testing services provided under this agreement will be performed by Quest Diagnostics employees. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. Quest Diagnostics is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

Based on the overall performance evaluation, the Pathology Services Department recommends the award of this contract to Quest Diagnostic, Inc. for clinical laboratory referral services.

The underlying contract was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience (without cause) with a ninety (90) day written notice and includes UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as a deduction on the invoices. (H. Clark/E. Borrego/B. Rodriguez).

(2063062, 2063050-LG) Jackson Health System's Information Technology Division ("IT") is requesting approval to enter into a new Agreement for a period of five years with two options to renew for one year each with Infor (US), LLC ("Infor") for the provision of Infor CloudSuite Healthcare and professional services (ongoing purchase).

Infor (US), LLC:

Background

The JHS IT Division is requesting the purchase of Infor CloudSuite Healthcare and professional implementation services. Infor CloudSuite Healthcare, also known as Infor v11, will replace JHS's current ERP System, Infor (Lawson) S3 v10.

Pursuant to RFP No. 06-5145, dated March 31, 2006, JHS uses Infor (Lawson) S3 v10 Enterprise Resource Planning ("ERP") software to run administrative operations. Infor's ERP software allows JHS to carry out essential business functions, which include, but are not limited to, payroll management, maintenance of employee records and financial records, financial reporting, procurement of goods, services, and construction, accounts payables, accounts receivables, asset inventory, asset maintenance, and asset repair requests.

Infor has converted their ERP portfolio to a cloud-based Software As A Service (SAAS) only model offering and has allocated all future research and development to this cloud-based software. As a result, Infor (Lawson) S3 v10 has become outdated and unable to support new business needs. In order to purchase the Infor CloudSuite subscription and support services, JHS will execute a master agreement with Infor, which will supersede agreement RFP No. 06-5145, dated March 31, 2006. The new agreement will be for an initial term of five years and allow for two renewal options of one year each at the Trust's sole discretion. This request is seeking funding approval for the renewal options should the Trust exercise.

JHS IT Division is also requesting the purchase of professional implementation services for Infor CloudSuite Healthcare, which will cost \$2,513,414.75.

The fees associated with the new Master Agreement are as follows:

- Professional Implementation Services: \$2,513,414.75
- Annual Subscription Fee: \$2,300,000 to be invoiced on a quarterly basis
- Total Subscription Fee: \$14,379,824 for the initial term and two options to renew (7 years total)
- Maximum Contract Value: \$16,893,239

Infor originally priced the Professional Implementation Services at \$2,807,556, and through JHS' negotiations pricing was reduced to \$2,513,414.75, providing \$294,141.25 in savings for the Professional Implementation Services. The Subscription fee for the initial subscription term was originally \$16,100,000. Infor (US) Inc. has agreed to preserve our current costs for Infor (Lawson) S3 v10 (including hosting fees) while CloudSuite Healthcare is implemented for a period of 16 months which brings the total price for the five-year subscription term (and the two one-year options to renew) to \$14,379,824. Based on a projection of the cost to maintain JHS' current ERP solution over seven years beginning on April 2022 (the effective date of the new contract), and assuming an annual fee increase of 3%, JHS will have saved approximately \$158,436.65 over the initial five-year subscription term (and the two one-year options to renew). In addition to this saving, JHS will avoid an additional expense of \$1.5M, which represents JHS' hosting fees with the vendor, Velocity, over a 16-month period. This cost avoidance has been realized, because Infor has agreed to cover the hosting for JHS at no additional cost; therefore, Velocity (present vendor for hosting) will no longer be providing these services. The amount of \$16,893,239. being requested comprises Subscription Fee of \$14,379,824 and Implementation Fees of \$2,513,415.

* Year 1 of JHS' maintenance and hosting fees were calculated by adding 5 months of fees at the rate paid during September 2021 - August 2022 and 7 months of fees at the rate due during September 2022 - August 2023 for a total of 12 months.

With this contract, the Trust has achieved a total of \$1,691,496 in subscription fee savings, which includes the cost avoidance of \$1.5M dollars JHS would have had to pay to host the existing Velocity cloud environment during the implementation period. Infor will absorb these costs.

Recommendation

JHS' IT Division has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to enter into the new Agreement with Infor for the provision of Infor CloudSuite Healthcare and professional implementation services.

In providing a statement on the benefits, to the Trust, of this procurement, the JHS IT Division has offered that, not only will JHS gain more value by implementing a platform that offers better functionality and includes more solutions (e.g. LMS, Talent Science, etc.) but JHS will also realize significant savings over the course of the subscription term. Infor's ERP system is a proven solution that is an integral part of JHS' business operations and fully integrated with various systems and interfaces. At this time, it would be too risky and costly to transition to another solution.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The proprietary software and services provided under this agreement will be performed by Infor employees. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. Infor is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

Either party may terminate the underlying agreement for convenience after the initial five-year period, should the parties enter into either option to renew available under the contract, upon 90-day prior written notice. The underlying agreement includes the OIG and UAP fees, which are provided as deductions on the invoices.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, Infor has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: 1) Contractor is a global corporation with hundreds of thousands of agreements in place and does not track litigation or disputes in the scope and manner requested and is unable to provide the detailed information requested in Form C: Contractor Due Diligence Affidavit. Additionally, contractual obligations of confidentiality owed by Infor prevent Infor from disclosing the information requested in Form C: Contractor Due Diligence Affidavit; 2) To Infor's commercially reasonable knowledge, no past or present litigation or dispute to which Contractor is a party exists that would adversely affect Infor's ability to enter into the proposed Master Agreement or to perform the services to be provided thereunder; and 3) Infor affirms that Infor is not and has not ever been debarred or received a formal notice of suspension from participating or bidding for contracts from any United States governmental entity, including Miami-Dade County.

A Bid Waiver Justification has been provided and Conflict of Interest Declarations have been signed by Michael A. Garcia, Senior Vice President and Chief Information Officer, Leticia Ruiz, Senior Director of Business Systems, Information Technology, and Rafael Yaniz, Director, Information Technology & Data Advisory Affairs, of Jackson Health System, and Antoine Chaya, Senior Vice President, Wayne Trochmann, Regional Vice President, Enterprise Clients, and Carolyn Kelly, Customer Results Executive, of Infor with no reported disclosures. **ECRI and MD Buyline are unable to provide an analysis at this time. (M. Garcia).**

4. **(BW-22-21465-SPA)** The Facilities Design and Construction Department (FDC) requests approval to enter into contract with Florida Lemark Corporation (Lemark) for the 40-Year Survey Structural Repairs needed for the Park Plaza East (Red), Park Plaza West (Green), North (Blue), and Highland Professional Building (Yellow) parking garages.

Florida Lemark Corporation:

(Cost not-to-exceed)

Background

The Trust's structural engineer of record, Douglas Wood Associates, Inc. (Douglas Wood), has completed 40-Year Surveys for the Trust's parking garages. As a result, certain structural repairs are needed in order to complete the 40-Year Survey process, specifically: shoring, scaffolding, and concrete repairs. Construction plans for Park Plaza East (Red Garage) are completed and the remaining construction plans will be completed in the coming months. The timely completion of these structural repairs is of critical importance in order to ensure the continued structural integrity of the parking garages and to avoid delay penalties that may be imposed by the county for failure to properly address the survey results timely.

The structural repairs for Park Plaza East (Red Garage) were originally procured using General Contractor Pool Contract RFP 17-14995-TC with ANF Group, Inc. (ANF). ANF advertised an open competitive Invitation to Bid for these repairs. In response, ANF received three competitive subcontractor bids as follows:

• Florida Lemark Corporation	\$2,304,611.46
• Contracting Specialists, Inc.	\$2,468,998.40
• Structural Preservation Systems	\$2,534,337.00

Florida Lemark Corporation submitted the lowest responsive and responsible subcontractor bid with detailed unit pricing for the various scope elements needed for Park Plaza East (Red Garage). These unit prices may be used to price the remaining parking garages once the construction plans are completed. Unfortunately, the Trust couldn't come to terms regarding ANF's general conditions and staffing efforts to manage the project, which would have significantly increased project costs. Contracting directly with Florida Lemark is in the best interests of the Trust.

Revised Scope

In order to reduce the coordination efforts required to manage multiple vendors working in the same space, FDC has identified the need to incorporate painting scope into the above listed 40-Year Survey work. Having Florida Lemark manage this work will be more efficient and will minimize project schedule delays. Florida Lemark has agreed to hire a certified SBE-Construction subcontractor for this added painting scope.

Funding Request

In order to fund properly the 40-Year structural repairs for the four parking garages, inclusive of the added painting scope, the funding request for each garage is estimated as follows:

• Red Garage	\$2,630,040
• Green Garage	\$2,133,700
• Yellow Garage	\$1,415,400
• Blue Garage	\$602,500
• Construction Contingency	\$218,360
Total Funding Request	\$7,000,000

Recommendation

The structural repair work to be performed is required as part of the 40-Year Survey process per Miami-Dade County Code. The timely completion of these structural repairs is of critical importance in order to ensure the continued structural integrity of the parking garages and to avoid delay penalties that may be imposed by the county for failure to properly

address the survey results timely. FDC, therefore, has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to enter into contract directly with Florida Lemark, per the terms of Contract BW-22-21465-SPA, for the not-to-exceed amount of \$7,000,000.

This Procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for SBE participation. Florida Lemark is a graduate of the SBE-Construction program and is committed to promoting the utilization of SBE vendors. Florida Lemark has agreed to utilize SBE-Construction subcontractors for the painting scope, which is estimated to be 4% of construction costs.

A Bid Waiver Justification Form for \$7,000,000, dated January 31, 2022, was approved by Richard Gamble, Director of Construction, FDC; Isa Nunez, VP, FDC; and Daniel Nino, Division CFO. Conflict of Interest forms were signed by Jordan Eljaiek, Assistant Construction Manager, FDC; Richard Gamble, Director of Construction, FDC, JHS; and Emilio Rodriguez, Executive Vice President, Florida Lemark, with no reported disclosures.

The construction contract boilerplate was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency. 100% payment and performance bonds will be required for all construction work per Florida law.

The contract can be terminated for convenience (without cause) upon thirty (30) calendar days' prior written notice and include the UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as deductions on the invoices (W. Seed).

5. (2100018-LG) Jackson Health System's Information Technology Division ("IT") is requesting approval to enter into the Managed Solution Access Agreement (the "Agreement") between the Trust, the University of Miami, and InterSystems Corporation ("InterSystems") for a period of three years with two options to renew for one year each for the provision of InterSystems' custom designed solution (new purchase).

InterSystems Corporation:

Background

The JHS IT Division is requesting the purchase of InterSystems' custom designed solution for use by the Trust and University of Miami. InterSystems' custom solution will enable the aggregation of anonymized healthcare information retrieved from Trust and the University of Miami and will make it available for research.

InterSystem's solution will manage the data in a de-identified state to allow the Trust and University of Miami users to search the database for viable cohorts to be used in research. InterSystems will provide the custom solution platform and the associated hosting to ensure a neutral platform for the data to be co-mingled from the Trust and University of Miami.

InterSystem's custom solution includes the following functionality: 1) Secure connectivity between the solution and the two customers: Trust and the University of Miami; 2) Patient matching utilizing the Solution's MPI; 3) Anonymization of data; 4) Aggregation into a unified care record; 5) Branded Clinical Viewer; and 6) Cohort identification.

InterSystems will provide the following in connection with setting up and providing access to the solution: 1) Acquisition of all hardware and software needed for the environment; 2) Installation and configuration of production and non-production areas of the environment at InterSystems' primary data center; 3) Installation and configuration of all required components, including hardware, software and network capacity, within the environment; 4) Operation of the solution; 5) Management and maintenance of all components of the environment; 6) Enhancement of the solution as agreed between the Parties and as set forth in the Agreement; and 7) Management of any incidents and remediation of any deficiencies discovered in the production area of the environment.

The Trust will pay InterSystems the fees under the Agreement. The University of Miami will pay half of the fees back to the Trust.

The fees under the Agreement are as follows:

The one-time Set Up Fee is billed in two (2) installments: 50% billed at execution of the Order within the Agreement, and the 50% balance billed at the time of the solution go-live date. Base Service Fees are billed monthly in advance of the period of service, beginning with the month when the system becomes available for set up activities.

Recommendation

JHS' IT Division has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to enter into the Agreement between the Trust, University of Miami, and InterSystems for this custom managed solution.

JHS IT Division's research into other vendors found no other solutions that offered both patient matching and a customized application to present de-identified data to users for cohort selection. The development tools and environment offered by InterSystems enables a customized solution hosted in a private cloud for a neutral solution position between the Trust and University of Miami, which could not be replicated without extensive costs for the Trust.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The proprietary software and services provided under this agreement will be performed by InterSystems employees. The vendor does not subcontract any of its services. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. InterSystems is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

Any party may terminate the underlying agreement upon 30-days prior written notice to the parties of a material breach if such breach remains uncured. The underlying agreement includes the OIG fees, which are provided as deductions on the invoices.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, InterSystems has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust based on breach of contract; (2) the company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the company has not been debarred nor has company received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

A Bid Waiver Justification has been provided and Conflict of Interest Declarations have been signed by Michael A. Garcia, Senior Vice President and Chief Information Officer, George Rosello, Director of Digital Transportation, Rafael Yaniz, Director, Information Technology & Data Advisory Affairs, of Jackson Health System, and Aaron Rothberg, Corporate Counsel of InterSystems with no reported disclosures. **ECRI and MD Buyline are unable to provide an analysis at this time. (M. Garcia).**

(2077493-CS) The Clinical Resource Management Department is requesting approval to modify the current contract with The Salvation Army, by extending the contract for six (6) months and by adding funds to contract RFP 15-13594-CS covering shelter services to the JHS homeless patient population (ongoing purchase).

Background

The resulting contract from RFP 15-13594-CS was awarded to The Salvation Army (Primary Vendor) and Camillus House (Secondary Vendor). However, Camillus House requested to be removed from the contract right after award. As a result, The Salvation Army is the only current provider for shelter beds for unfunded patients. This contract is to provide shelter services to the JHS homeless patient population and includes overnight lodging, food, clothing and social services.

The initial amount of \$1,500,000 covered the initial 3 years and was approved under CPO's delegated authority. Modification 1 changed the price structure to accommodate JHS needs as follows: 30 guaranteed per Diem Beds at \$40 per bed per day (PBPD), and overflow beds over 31 PBPD at \$45. Modification 2 exercised the first renewal option, adding \$662,400 under CPO's delegated authority. Modification 3 exercised the second renewal option and added \$438,000 under CPO's delegated authority. Modifications 4, 5 and 6 extended the contract with a total amount of \$333,250 under CPO's delegated authority. Modification 7 extended the contract for two months with no additional funding. This modification 8 is to extend the contract for six months, adding \$248,000 and requires PHT Board approval. Fees for this six-month period remain the same. A new RFP No. 22-20335-CS has been solicited for services moving forward.

Recommendation

The Clinical Resource Management Department has determined that it would be in the Trust's best interest to extend the current contract term to allow sufficient time to award the new agreement resulting from competitive RFP 22-20335-CS.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for SBE participation. A 5% SBE subcontracting goal was applicable to this solicitation. Salvation Army received zero points towards the subcontracting goal. Salvation Army is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, The Salvation Army has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance during the current year, the Clinical Resource Management Department has reported the following:

- The average turnaround time of services meets the standard.
- The competencies of contracted staff meet the standard.
- The ability to respond to emergency situations meets the standard, and
- The responsiveness to safety issues also meets the standard.

Based on the overall contract performance evaluation, the Clinical Resource Management Department recommends the approval of the requested extension and funds.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience with a thirty (30) calendar day notice and includes OIG and UAP fees. These fees are taken as a deduction on the invoice (M. Torres).

7. **(1995972,1970823-KR)** The Facilities Design and Construction Department (FDC) requests approval for Job Order Contract (JOC), Supplemental Work Order 187.01, pursuant to Contract No. 16-14204-JE/General Construction GC-01, to F.H. Paschen, S.N. Nielsen & Associates, LLC (F.H. Paschen), for the Jackson North Medical Center (JNMC) North Parking Lot project.

Background

In October 2021, Work Order 187.00 was finalized with F.H. Paschen for the JNMC North Parking Lot project in the total amount of \$920,947. During the permitting process, authorities having jurisdiction have requested changes to the drawings, which has delayed the construction start date. Additional irrigation, landscaping, and electrical scope needs to be added to the project, which increases total construction costs. These increased costs will take Work Order 187 over the \$1M threshold, requiring PHT Board approval.

Updated Project Scope

The revised project scope consists of 128 paved asphalt parking spaces with concrete curbs and an underground drainage system. The project site perimeter has concrete block walls and pilasters with two metal gates for fire truck and pedestrian access. The site has new irrigation and landscaping as well as new pole mounted parking lot lights. There is an adjacent paved cul-de-sac that is tied into an existing street, and a new paved entry drive that connects to an existing hospital parking lot, which are also part of this project scope of work.

The job order proposal will be finalized once the project manager and architect proposal review is completed. The cost identified is a construction cost estimate, deemed fair and reasonable for the anticipated level of effort and to complete the required scope of work. Assigning contractors for work orders is done on a rotational and/or equitable basis to ensure all general contractors in the JOC program receive fair work distribution.

Recommendation

The JNMC North Parking Lot is required to provide additional parking for staff. FDC, therefore, has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to authorize issuance of Work Order 187.01, pursuant to Contract 16-14204-JE/General Construction GC-01, for the not-to-exceed amount of \$779,053.

This Procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for SBE Participation. F.H. Paschen's JOC contract has a 30% SBE-Construction subcontractor participation goal.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance, Facilities, Design and Construction has reported the following:

- Schedule management meets standard
- Cost effectiveness and efficiency meets standard
- Quality is above standard
- Accountability and leadership is above standard
- Partnership is above standard

The original contract was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The contract can be terminated for convenience (without cause) upon thirty (30) calendar days' prior written notice and include the UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as deductions on the invoices (W. Seed).

8. (2079765- JM) The Miami Transplant Institute is requesting approval to exercise the second renewal option (OTR 2) of the contract BW 20-17985-JM with MedSleuth, Inc. for the continued provision of the Kidney Transplant Application Services (ongoing purchase).

Background

The Trust entered into a Bid Waiver Agreement with MedSleuth, Inc. on January 9, 2020, in the amount of \$110,250, to provide the Trust with an annual subscription to its BREEZE Transplant Application Services. First renewal option year was exercised under PHT Reso. 05/2020-024, adding \$284,500 to the contract.

Pricing has remained the same, and the new contract value of \$145,150, will include:

- \$121,550 to cover 12 months of BREEZE Transplant Application
- \$16,000 for the Matchgrid annual license fee
- \$7,000 success fee for one successful Matchgrid transplant.

The MedSleuth BREEZE® is a patient centered web-based software platform that delivers a standardized donor eligibility assessment in a timely fashion for transplant candidates. This platform streamlines the transplant process from recipient candidate evaluation through donor and recipient follow up. The BREEZE® elicits a comprehensive medical history from the transplant patients that allows for patient triage at intake, based on transplant eligibility; monitors ongoing eligibility on the national transplant wait list; and, provides patient-specific information required by healthcare providers to identify and mitigate post-transplant risk.

Vendor will continue to provide to the Trust the MedSleuth MATCHGRID™ advanced enterprise software application. This software technology will continue to allow clinicians to rapidly match living organ donors with patients who have willing, healthy, but incompatible donors, offering an alternative for a recipient to receive a living donor kidney.

In explaining the benefits, to the Trust of this procurement, the Miami Transplant Institute has offered that, the MedSleuth BREEZE® platform provides a service-oriented web-based architecture solution (cloud computing) for improving clinical workflow and deficiency as well as patient satisfaction for living kidney donor transplant patients by generating preliminary medical history reports that patients can complete online. The vendor's MATCHGRID™ uses advanced matching and optimization algorithms, that can evaluate all potential matches from 2-way all the way through 12-way combinations in minutes, saving transplant centers months of work previously required to assess a smaller number of pairs.

Recommendation

The Miami Transplant Institute has determined that it would be in the Trust's best interest to exercise this second and final renewal option to continue engaging MedSleuth, Inc. for the provision of its Kidney Transplant Application Services, during which period a new Agreement will be processed to continue these services.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance during the current contract year, Perioperative Services has reported the following:

- Average turnaround time of services is above the standard.
- The vendor's ability to successfully respond to emergencies meets the standard
- Responsiveness to safety issues and safety standards meets the standard.

In accordance with JHS' Contractor Due Diligence review, MedSleuth, Inc. has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience with a thirty (30) day written notice and includes UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as a deduction on the invoices.

The underlying Contract has been approved by Risk Management as to Insurance and Liability and by the County Attorney's Office for Legal sufficiency.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The transplant software and services provided under this agreement will be performed by MedSleuth employees. The vendor does not subcontract any of its services. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. MedSleuth is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

A Bid Waiver Justification has been provided and Conflict of Interest Declarations signed by Christin Karapelou, Associate Director of Kidney Transplant Services; and James Kalamas, CEO at MedSleuth, Inc., with no reported disclosures (**H. Clark**)

(EM 22-20744-KR) The Facilities Design and Construction (FDC) department requests ratification and approval for the emergency work to remediate water damages during active construction for the Jackson West Medical Center (JWMC) project from W.G. Yates & Sons Construction Company (Yates). The request is as follows:

Background

The first insurance claim is associated with damages occurring on January 13, 2021, due to a 4" water pipe Victaulic fitting blow out. Damage included the first and second floor areas of the hospital (OR Suite, Pharmacy area, and Main Lobby).

The second insurance claim is associated with damages occurring on February 28, 2021, due to a 1" domestic water line loss event. Damaged area included the 1st Floor Radiology holding area.

Yates was the prime contractor of record for JWMC during these events and JHS asked Yates to assist in managing the water remediation work to protect the facility that was under construction at the time. Yates hired several subcontractors under emergency declaration to mitigate the damages.

Allowable costs from these accidental loss events have been reviewed, negotiated, and recovered through the Trust's Owner Controlled Insurance Program (OCIP) administrator, Aon Property Risk Consulting.

Recommendation

The Facilities Design and Construction (FDC) department recommends ratification of the emergency award in the best interest of the Trust. Water remediation work was successfully performed, the project is fully completed, and no further engagement is anticipated.

An Emergency Procurement Determination and Approval Form for \$964,818.33, dated February 14, 2022, was approved by William Seed, SVP, FDC; Daniel Nino, Division CFO, FDC; Mark Knight, EVP, CFO; and Carlos Migoya, CEO, JHS. Conflict of Interest forms were signed by Jorge Garciga, JHS Project Manager, and Reid Warren, Assistant Project Manager, Yates, with no reported disclosures.

The original contracts were approved by Risk Management as to Insurance and Liability and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The contracts can be terminated for convenience (without cause) upon seven (7) calendar days' prior written notice and include the UAP and OIG fees. The UAP fee was negotiated as an upfront discount. The OIG fees are provided as a deduction on the invoices (W. Seed).

Track Record/Monitor

Dan Chatlos, Director, Real Estate Services, would track and monitor the lease agreement.

Background

Staff is finalizing various lease and timeshare agreements for the use of available, on-site medical office space at the new Jackson West Medical Center, including space to be occupied by the University of Miami. Approval of the attached Lease Agreement is recommended to allow the University of Miami to establish a surgical practice in Suite 2007 of the Jackson West Medical Center.

In accordance with the terms of the Lease Agreement, the Trust shall build-out the Premises in a turn-key condition as specified in the Lease Agreement prior to occupancy. 3. CHIEF PHYSICIAN EXECUTIVE AND CHIEF CLINICAL OFFICER REPORT

3.a CORONAVIUS (COVID-19) UPDATE

Peter Paige, M.D., Executive Vice President, Chief Executive Physician and Chief Clinical Officer reported statistics shows that COVID-19 continues to trend in a favorable direction. Less than one-third of patients within Jackson Health System (JHS) is COVID-19 related, and rates across Miami-Dade County dropped with reports of a favorable variance. Up to date information was shared regarding the new Omicron variant and booster dosage. JHS continues to treat COVID-19 patients at its facilities, caring for the community and ensuring that its staff is safe, informed and educated. The Committee will be informed with COVID-19 updates as new information emerges.

3.b TRANSFER CENTER UPDATE

Barbara Ortiz, MSN, RN, Director, Patient Transfer Center (PTC) shared information about the PTC and information regarding performance indicators. Highlights of activity in fiscal years 2020 and 2021 showed that case volumes was overall positive, overall increase in turnaround time which is attributed to the decision making process having to do with COVID-19 and the decision making process for patients, overall statistics for payor source, and call volume & abandonment rates improved. Other highlights included an overview of transplant, neurosurgery and cardiac surgery service specific protocols.

Mr. Migoya and members of the committee thanked Ms. Ortiz and the PTC team for all that they do to coordinate patient transfers and for the overall improvement rates in fiscal years 2020 and 2021.

4. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE ACTIVITY REPORT

With there being no issues to report, Dr. Paige recommended that the Committee accept the Credentials Committee Activity Report for the month of February 2022 as presented. The physicians' files were thoroughly reviewed by the Executive Medical Committee of the Medical Staff. Details of the report was included in the agenda.

5. JACKSON WEST MEDICAL CENTER QUALITY REPORT

Eddie Borrego, Senior Vice President and Chief Executive Officer, Jackson West Medical Center (JWMC) presented results of performance indicators beginning August 1, 2001, opening day of JWMC. From August 1, 2021 to January 22, 2022 the inpatient admissions rate has been positive, ED and surgical volumes has been successful, average length of stay ranked in the top 20% among hospitals of the same size, and rate of labor and delivery continues on a positive trend. As part of the quality report were highlights of the ED metrics throughput, which showed an overall improvement and description of the ED Metrics Performance Improvement Plan, overview of patient experience scores, ED patient experience scores, and a description of the ED experience Process Improvement Plan. The Hospital Acquired Infection Prevention Plan along with sustainable results were presented, along with details of the quality and patient safety initiatives, and list describing fiscal year 2022 strategic initiatives.

The committee thanked Mr. Borrego and the JWMC team for all their work and success since opening day at JWMC.

Jackson Health System's commitment to improving patient safety and quality of care is a crucial component of our overall mission of tending to the well-being of our community and its diverse stakeholders. Addressing these challenges requires us to not only capture the data we are required to report to institutions, such as the Joint Commission and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, but to convert that data into meaningful tools that can be used to set priorities and develop change strategies.

By focusing on industry-standard performance indicators, we can gauge our progress in improving safety measures, clinical processes of care, patient satisfaction, and employee and provider engagement. Jackson experienced sustained improvement in several critical statistical measures during 2021. Over the last five to six years, we have seen significant improvement in many areas, notably in our standardized infection ratios for central line-associated bloodstream infections (CLABSI), catheter-associated urinary tract infections (CAUTI), and Clostridium difficile (C-Diff).

The full range of data is presented below, and significant trends will be highlighted for discussion during the Public Health Trust Board of Trustees Joint Conference & Efficiencies Committee meeting.

3. PUBLIC HEALTH TRUST JACKSON HEALTH SYSTEM CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, ENDED JANUARY 31, 2022

Mark T. Knight, Executive Vice President and Chief Financial Officer presented a summary of the financial statements, ended January 31, 2022. High costs associated with staff vacancies continues to be a challenge. Due to the Omicron variant spike in late December and early January the hospital experienced a reduction in elective procedures and OR cases, which affected the bottom line. For the month the hospital showed a loss totaling approximately \$12 million, on a year-to-date basis this attribute to approximately \$17 million loss which attributes to the hospital trending slightly worse than budget for the first four months of the fiscal year. The hospital has some additional Medicaid funding that will help offset incremental costs, and preserving some of these funds for capital and facility expansion programs. For the month of January cash collections remained fairly strong, payor mix at all facilities was a little better than anticipated, continued to preserve cash, productivity is better than the prior year, and showed a slight increase in sales tax revenue. Despite the negative variance on labor and watch on net patient revenue, it is anticipated that Jackson Health System will reach a breakeven budget at the end of fiscal year 2022.

Background

On March 19, 2019, Jackson Health System's Nuclear Medicine Departments entered into an agreement (GPO 19-16768-JM) with Medi Physics, a subsidiary of GE Healthcare, Inc., accessing a Vizient Competitively awarded (GPO) Contract DR0011-2012, for a period of two (2) years through March 2021, in the amount of \$2,792,565.43. PHT Resolution 04/2021-014 renewed the Agreement from March 2021 through March 2022, in the amount of \$1,096,230. The Agreement covers the provision of Nuclear Pharmaceutical Products and the Ec2 Software License. In 2020 Medi Physics changed its name to RLS (USA). The company continues to manufacture and distribute diagnostic imaging agents and radio-pharmaceuticals and provides radioisotopes to the Trust's Nuclear Medicine Departments.

Through this request, the Nuclear Medicine Departments are requesting a modification of the contract to extend the current term an additional year through March 2023, during which period a new Agreement will be processed to continue these services.

The Ec2 Software Solution Application license provides the Trust with the radiopharmaceutical tracking that meets compliance with regulatory standards. The Solution includes the Patient Reporting Programs: BioRx or RMIS, BI (Business Intelligence) Reporting, and BioTrax QMS.

In providing a statement on the benefits, to the Trust, of this procurement, the Nuclear Medicine Departments have offered that the RMIS (Registry Monitoring Insurance Service – compliance monitoring management software) offers a simplified solution to the Trust's Nuclear Pharmacy needs. This software streamlines business processes and enhances customer service. BioRx/RMIS is designed to meet a range of needs while keeping up with ever-changing state and federal regulations. The BioTrax QMS combines the benefits of an electronic inventory tracking system with a batch record maintenance system, providing the Trust with a streamlined and paperless approach to managing the facilities' current Good Manufacturing Practice regulations needs. This program minimizes human error, ensures compliance, improves quality and reduces costs. The Ec2 Solution includes software support to the Trust as follows:

The Ec2 license also includes a Software Support and Updates Contract which entitles the Trust to:

- Unlimited phone and remote technical support
- Unlimited email and website submitted support tickets
- Annual software releases
- All software patches
- On-line ordering with most RadioPharmacies

* Software updates and on-line ordering are not available without a Software Support & Updates Contract.

Recommendation

The Nuclear Medicine Departments, have determined that it would be in the Trust's best interest to extend the current term and add funds to the current Trust/RLS (USA) Contract GPO 19-16768-JM for Nuclear Pharmaceutical Products and the Ec2 Software Solutions Application Support License. The amount of \$2,623,465 will continue to fund these services for the remainder of the contract term through March 2023. Pricing for this extension remains the same.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The pharmaceutical services provided under this agreement will be performed by RLS employees. The vendor does not subcontract any of its services. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. RLS is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance during the current contract year, the Nuclear Medicine Departments have reported the following:

- The average turnaround time of products and services meets the standard.
- The deliverables meet contract requirements.
- The ability to successfully respond to emergency situations is above standard.
- The responsiveness to safety issues and safety standards is above standard.

RLS USA will be monitored to ensure delivery of the following key performance indicators (KPI) that will be reported quarterly to the Nuclear Medicine Department:

- a. Delivery Schedule must be timely
- b. STAT Orders: RLS USA, Inc. must endeavor to deliver generally-available orders on STAT (urgent) or an emergency delivery basis within ninety (90) minutes of the order. Products requiring special compounding will need additional delivery time.
- c. Product Returns: Due to the nature of certain Products (short shelf life), the Trust will be allowed to return 10% of these products within the billing cycle in which vendor calculates returns.

The underlying contract was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience upon ninety (90) calendar days' notice and includes UAP and OIG fee. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as deductions on the invoices.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, RLS (USA). has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust. (**H. Clark**).

2. (2036098, 2079611, 2076586, 1995666, 2103047, 2103043, 2103739, 2104587-AH) The Pathology Services Departments for the Jackson Memorial, Jackson South, Jackson North, and Jackson West Medical Center campuses are requesting additional funding to complete existing term and to exercise the renewal of the contract with Quest Diagnostics for the provision of clinical reference laboratory services (ongoing purchase).

Quest Diagnostics Clinical Laboratories, Inc.:

Previously Approved Funding: \$12,532,675

(For Seventeen Months)

Total approved funding: \$18,908,405

Background

The Trust entered into a four (4) year agreement with Quest Diagnostics Laboratories, Inc. ("Quest") on July of 2018 for the provisions of reference laboratory services under Vizient GPO Agreement No. LB0593 in the amount of \$10,202,755, PHT Resolution 07/2018-036. The amount of \$2,329,920 was subsequently added to satisfy an increase in utilization. The dollars being requested will cover cost due to an increase in utilization of these services through the end of the initial term on July 30, 2022, as well as the cost of an additional twelve-months of service, accessing the Vizient GPO Agreement, through July 30, 2023. Pricing remains the same as under the original award. Quest is the primary vendor for these services, providing esoteric and referral specialized testing that cannot be performed by the JHS Pathology Department.

Quest provides quick diagnostic turnaround times; accurate tracking and reduction of lost specimens; a comprehensive test menu selection; and, consolidation of electronic order/result interface to patient records and the laboratory information system (LIS). Quest has been able to assist Jackson Health System in its efforts to deliver consistent outcomes on these expectations, as outlined by the following:

A comprehensive test menu that includes, but is not limited, to the following selections:

- Immunology/Infectious Disease molecular testing, used for patients with autoimmune diseases, transplant patients, HIV and HCV infected patients, rheumatoid arthritis, etc.
- Neurology testing, for patients with neurologic disorders, such as epilepsy, Alzheimer's, paraneoplastic syndromes, genetic diseases, rare developmental disorders for pediatric, adult and geriatric population.
- Genetic testing, to be used on prenatal patients, pregnant patients to diagnose or rule out diseases, and for certain cancer patients to diagnose and determine best treatment options
- Toxicology, for prescription drug monitor and substance abuse issues
- IBD/IBS/Celiac disease related testing
- Prenatal Genetic testing such as NIPT, Maternal Serum testing, and Cystic Fibrosis and Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA) testing. These tests are ordered on pregnant patients to screen for several chromosome abnormalities; and are used to determine risk for birth defects and facilitate disease treatment in unborn babies.
- Allergy testing, mostly ordered in patients with immunology conditions, respiratory conditions, or allergies triggered by food and/or the environment.
- Cardio metabolic and Endocrinology testing, for example thyroid related testing, for diagnosing and treating metabolic syndromes and conditions. CVD (Cardiovascular Disease Disorders), diabetes and endocrine disorders.
- Cancer and coagulation related testing.

Recommendation

All testing referral services within this contract are deemed patient chargeable. In the best interest of the Trust, the Pathology Services Departments for all four campuses recommend additional funding to the current purchase orders for Quest Diagnostics, Inc. in order to continue accessing vendor's Vizient GPO Agreement LB0593 for services through July 30, 2023.

In accordance with JHS' Contractor Due Diligence review, Quest Diagnostics Inc., has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance, the Pathology Services Department has reported the following:

- The deliverables are considered above standard.
- The ability to successfully respond to emergency situations is above standard.
- The responsiveness to safety issues and safety standards is also above standard.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The clinical laboratory testing services provided under this agreement will be performed by Quest Diagnostics employees. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. Quest Diagnostics is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

Based on the overall performance evaluation, the Pathology Services Department recommends the award of this contract to Quest Diagnostic, Inc. for clinical laboratory referral services.

The underlying contract was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience (without cause) with a ninety (90) day written notice and includes UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as a deduction on the invoices. (H. Clark/E. Borrego/B. Rodriguez).

(2063062, 2063050-LG) Jackson Health System's Information Technology Division ("IT") is requesting approval to enter into a new Agreement for a period of five years with two options to renew for one year each with Infor (US), LLC ("Infor") for the provision of Infor CloudSuite Healthcare and professional services (ongoing purchase).

Infor (US), LLC:

Background

The JHS IT Division is requesting the purchase of Infor CloudSuite Healthcare and professional implementation services. Infor CloudSuite Healthcare, also known as Infor v11, will replace JHS's current ERP System, Infor (Lawson) S3 v10.

Pursuant to RFP No. 06-5145, dated March 31, 2006, JHS uses Infor (Lawson) S3 v10 Enterprise Resource Planning ("ERP") software to run administrative operations. Infor's ERP software allows JHS to carry out essential business functions, which include, but are not limited to, payroll management, maintenance of employee records and financial records, financial reporting, procurement of goods, services, and construction, accounts payables, accounts receivables, asset inventory, asset maintenance, and asset repair requests.

Infor has converted their ERP portfolio to a cloud-based Software As A Service (SAAS) only model offering and has allocated all future research and development to this cloud-based software. As a result, Infor (Lawson) S3 v10 has become outdated and unable to support new business needs. In order to purchase the Infor CloudSuite subscription and support services, JHS will execute a master agreement with Infor, which will supersede agreement RFP No. 06-5145, dated March 31, 2006. The new agreement will be for an initial term of five years and allow for two renewal options of one year each at the Trust's sole discretion. This request is seeking funding approval for the renewal options should the Trust exercise.

JHS IT Division is also requesting the purchase of professional implementation services for Infor CloudSuite Healthcare, which will cost \$2,513,414.75.

The fees associated with the new Master Agreement are as follows:

- Professional Implementation Services: \$2,513,414.75
- Annual Subscription Fee: \$2,300,000 to be invoiced on a quarterly basis
- Total Subscription Fee: \$14,379,824 for the initial term and two options to renew (7 years total)
- Maximum Contract Value: \$16,893,239

Infor originally priced the Professional Implementation Services at \$2,807,556, and through JHS' negotiations pricing was reduced to \$2,513,414.75, providing \$294,141.25 in savings for the Professional Implementation Services. The Subscription fee for the initial subscription term was originally \$16,100,000. Infor (US) Inc. has agreed to preserve our current costs for Infor (Lawson) S3 v10 (including hosting fees) while CloudSuite Healthcare is implemented for a period of 16 months which brings the total price for the five-year subscription term (and the two one-year options to renew) to \$14,379,824. Based on a projection of the cost to maintain JHS' current ERP solution over seven years beginning on April 2022 (the effective date of the new contract), and assuming an annual fee increase of 3%, JHS will have saved approximately \$158,436.65 over the initial five-year subscription term (and the two one-year options to renew). In addition to this saving, JHS will avoid an additional expense of \$1.5M, which represents JHS' hosting fees with the vendor, Velocity, over a 16-month period. This cost avoidance has been realized, because Infor has agreed to cover the hosting for JHS at no additional cost; therefore, Velocity (present vendor for hosting) will no longer be providing these services. The amount of \$16,893,239. being requested comprises Subscription Fee of \$14,379,824 and Implementation Fees of \$2,513,415.

With this contract, the Trust has achieved a total of \$1,691,496 in subscription fee savings, which includes the cost avoidance of \$1.5M dollars JHS would have had to pay to host the existing Velocity cloud environment during the implementation period. Infor will absorb these costs.

Recommendation

JHS' IT Division has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to enter into the new Agreement with Infor for the provision of Infor CloudSuite Healthcare and professional implementation services.

In providing a statement on the benefits, to the Trust, of this procurement, the JHS IT Division has offered that, not only will JHS gain more value by implementing a platform that offers better functionality and includes more solutions (e.g. LMS, Talent Science, etc.) but JHS will also realize significant savings over the course of the subscription term. Infor's ERP system is a proven solution that is an integral part of JHS' business operations and fully integrated with various systems and interfaces. At this time, it would be too risky and costly to transition to another solution.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The proprietary software and services provided under this agreement will be performed by Infor employees. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. Infor is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

Either party may terminate the underlying agreement for convenience after the initial five-year period, should the parties enter into either option to renew available under the contract, upon 90-day prior written notice. The underlying agreement includes the OIG and UAP fees, which are provided as deductions on the invoices.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, Infor has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: 1) Contractor is a global corporation with hundreds of thousands of agreements in place and does not track litigation or disputes in the scope and manner requested and is unable to provide the detailed information requested in Form C: Contractor Due Diligence Affidavit. Additionally, contractual obligations of confidentiality owed by Infor prevent Infor from disclosing the information requested in Form C: Contractor Due Diligence Affidavit; 2) To Infor's commercially reasonable knowledge, no past or present litigation or dispute to which Contractor is a party exists that would adversely affect Infor's ability to enter into the proposed Master Agreement or to perform the services to be provided thereunder; and 3) Infor affirms that Infor is not and has not ever been debarred or received a formal notice of suspension from participating or bidding for contracts from any United States governmental entity, including Miami-Dade County.

A Bid Waiver Justification has been provided and Conflict of Interest Declarations have been signed by Michael A. Garcia, Senior Vice President and Chief Information Officer, Leticia Ruiz, Senior Director of Business Systems, Information Technology, and Rafael Yaniz, Director, Information Technology & Data Advisory Affairs, of Jackson Health System, and Antoine Chaya, Senior Vice President, Wayne Trochmann, Regional Vice President, Enterprise Clients, and Carolyn Kelly, Customer Results Executive, of Infor with no reported disclosures. **ECRI and MD Buyline are unable to provide an analysis at this time. (M. Garcia).**

4. **(BW-22-21465-SPA)** The Facilities Design and Construction Department (FDC) requests approval to enter into contract with Florida Lemark Corporation (Lemark) for the 40-Year Survey Structural Repairs needed for the Park Plaza East (Red), Park Plaza West (Green), North (Blue), and Highland Professional Building (Yellow) parking garages.

Florida Lemark Corporation:

This Request for Construction Funding: **\$7,000,000**
(Cost not-to-exceed)

Background

The Trust's structural engineer of record, Douglas Wood Associates, Inc. (Douglas Wood), has completed 40-Year Surveys for the Trust's parking garages. As a result, certain structural repairs are needed in order to complete the 40-Year Survey process, specifically: shoring, scaffolding, and concrete repairs. Construction plans for Park Plaza East (Red Garage) are completed and the remaining construction plans will be completed in the coming months. The timely completion of these structural repairs is of critical importance in order to ensure the continued structural integrity of the parking garages and to avoid delay penalties that may be imposed by the county for failure to properly address the survey results timely.

The structural repairs for Park Plaza East (Red Garage) were originally procured using General Contractor Pool Contract RFP 17-14995-TC with ANF Group, Inc. (ANF). ANF advertised an open competitive Invitation to Bid for these repairs. In response, ANF received three competitive subcontractor bids as follows:

• Florida Lemark Corporation	\$2,304,611.46
• Contracting Specialists, Inc.	\$2,468,998.40
• Structural Preservation Systems	\$2,534,337.00

Florida Lemark Corporation submitted the lowest responsive and responsible subcontractor bid with detailed unit pricing for the various scope elements needed for Park Plaza East (Red Garage). These unit prices may be used to price the remaining parking garages once the construction plans are completed. Unfortunately, the Trust couldn't come to terms regarding ANF's general conditions and staffing efforts to manage the project, which would have significantly increased project costs. Contracting directly with Florida Lemark is in the best interests of the Trust.

Revised Scope

In order to reduce the coordination efforts required to manage multiple vendors working in the same space, FDC has identified the need to incorporate painting scope into the above listed 40-Year Survey work. Having Florida Lemark manage this work will be more efficient and will minimize project schedule delays. Florida Lemark has agreed to hire a certified SBE-Construction subcontractor for this added painting scope.

Funding Request

In order to fund properly the 40-Year structural repairs for the four parking garages, inclusive of the added painting scope, the funding request for each garage is estimated as follows:

• Red Garage	\$2,630,040
• Green Garage	\$2,133,700
• Yellow Garage	\$1,415,400
• Blue Garage	\$602,500
• Construction Contingency	\$218,360
Total Funding Request	\$7,000,000

Recommendation

The structural repair work to be performed is required as part of the 40-Year Survey process per Miami-Dade County Code. The timely completion of these structural repairs is of critical importance in order to ensure the continued structural integrity of the parking garages and to avoid delay penalties that may be imposed by the county for failure to properly

address the survey results timely. FDC, therefore, has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to enter into contract directly with Florida Lemark, per the terms of Contract BW-22-21465-SPA, for the not-to-exceed amount of \$7,000,000.

This Procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for SBE participation. Florida Lemark is a graduate of the SBE-Construction program and is committed to promoting the utilization of SBE vendors. Florida Lemark has agreed to utilize SBE-Construction subcontractors for the painting scope, which is estimated to be 4% of construction costs.

A Bid Waiver Justification Form for \$7,000,000, dated January 31, 2022, was approved by Richard Gamble, Director of Construction, FDC; Isa Nunez, VP, FDC; and Daniel Nino, Division CFO. Conflict of Interest forms were signed by Jordan Eljaiek, Assistant Construction Manager, FDC; Richard Gamble, Director of Construction, FDC, JHS; and Emilio Rodriguez, Executive Vice President, Florida Lemark, with no reported disclosures.

The construction contract boilerplate was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency. 100% payment and performance bonds will be required for all construction work per Florida law.

The contract can be terminated for convenience (without cause) upon thirty (30) calendar days' prior written notice and include the UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as deductions on the invoices (W. Seed).

5. Background

The JHS IT Division is requesting the purchase of InterSystems' custom designed solution for use by the Trust and University of Miami. InterSystems' custom solution will enable the aggregation of anonymized healthcare information retrieved from Trust and the University of Miami and will make it available for research.

InterSystem's solution will manage the data in a de-identified state to allow the Trust and University of Miami users to search the database for viable cohorts to be used in research. InterSystems will provide the custom solution platform and the associated hosting to ensure a neutral platform for the data to be co-mingled from the Trust and University of Miami.

InterSystem's custom solution includes the following functionality: 1) Secure connectivity between the solution and the two customers: Trust and the University of Miami; 2) Patient matching utilizing the Solution's MPI; 3) Anonymization of data; 4) Aggregation into a unified care record; 5) Branded Clinical Viewer; and 6) Cohort identification.

InterSystems will provide the following in connection with setting up and providing access to the solution: 1) Acquisition of all hardware and software needed for the environment; 2) Installation and configuration of production and non-production areas of the environment at InterSystems' primary data center; 3) Installation and configuration of all required components, including hardware, software and network capacity, within the environment; 4) Operation of the solution; 5) Management and maintenance of all components of the environment; 6) Enhancement of the solution as agreed between the Parties and as set forth in the Agreement; and 7) Management of any incidents and remediation of any deficiencies discovered in the production area of the environment.

The Trust will pay InterSystems the fees under the Agreement. The University of Miami will pay half of the fees back to the Trust.

The fees under the Agreement are as follows:

The one-time Set Up Fee is billed in two (2) installments: 50% billed at execution of the Order within the Agreement, and the 50% balance billed at the time of the solution go-live date. Base Service Fees are billed monthly in advance of the period of service, beginning with the month when the system becomes available for set up activities.

Recommendation

JHS' IT Division has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to enter into the Agreement between the Trust, University of Miami, and InterSystems for this custom managed solution.

JHS IT Division's research into other vendors found no other solutions that offered both patient matching and a customized application to present de-identified data to users for cohort selection. The development tools and environment offered by InterSystems enables a customized solution hosted in a private cloud for a neutral solution position between the Trust and University of Miami, which could not be replicated without extensive costs for the Trust.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for potential SBE participation. The proprietary software and services provided under this agreement will be performed by InterSystems employees. The vendor does not subcontract any of its services. The opportunity to include an SBE partner is not available for this service activity. InterSystems is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

Any party may terminate the underlying agreement upon 30-days prior written notice to the parties of a material breach if such breach remains uncured. The underlying agreement includes the OIG fees, which are provided as deductions on the invoices.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, InterSystems has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust based on breach of contract; (2) the company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the company has not been debarred nor has company received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

A Bid Waiver Justification has been provided and Conflict of Interest Declarations have been signed by Michael A. Garcia, Senior Vice President and Chief Information Officer, George Rosello, Director of Digital Transportation, Rafael Yaniz, Director, Information Technology & Data Advisory Affairs, of Jackson Health System, and Aaron Rothberg, Corporate Counsel of InterSystems with no reported disclosures. **ECRI and MD Buyline are unable to provide an analysis at this time. (M. Garcia).**

Background

The resulting contract from RFP 15-13594-CS was awarded to The Salvation Army (Primary Vendor) and Camillus House (Secondary Vendor). However, Camillus House requested to be removed from the contract right after award. As a result, The Salvation Army is the only current provider for shelter beds for unfunded patients. This contract is to provide shelter services to the JHS homeless patient population and includes overnight lodging, food, clothing and social services.

The initial amount of \$1,500,000 covered the initial 3 years and was approved under CPO's delegated authority. Modification 1 changed the price structure to accommodate JHS needs as follows: 30 guaranteed per Diem Beds at \$40 per bed per day (PBPD), and overflow beds over 31 PBPD at \$45. Modification 2 exercised the first renewal option, adding \$662,400 under CPO's delegated authority. Modification 3 exercised the second renewal option and added \$438,000 under CPO's delegated authority. Modifications 4, 5 and 6 extended the contract with a total amount of \$333,250 under CPO's delegated authority. Modification 7 extended the contract for two months with no additional funding. This modification 8 is to extend the contract for six months, adding \$248,000 and requires PHT Board approval. Fees for this six-month period remain the same. A new RFP No. 22-20335-CS has been solicited for services moving forward.

Recommendation

The Clinical Resource Management Department has determined that it would be in the Trust's best interest to extend the current contract term to allow sufficient time to award the new agreement resulting from competitive RFP 22-20335-CS.

This procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for SBE participation. A 5% SBE subcontracting goal was applicable to this solicitation. Salvation Army received zero points towards the subcontracting goal. Salvation Army is aware of Jackson's SBE program and the expectation of vendor partners to advance that commitment.

In accordance with our Contractor Due Diligence review, The Salvation Army has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance during the current year, the Clinical Resource Management Department has reported the following:

- The average turnaround time of services meets the standard.
- The competencies of contracted staff meet the standard.
- The ability to respond to emergency situations meets the standard, and
- The responsiveness to safety issues also meets the standard.

Based on the overall contract performance evaluation, the Clinical Resource Management Department recommends the approval of the requested extension and funds.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience with a thirty (30) calendar day notice and includes OIG and UAP fees. These fees are taken as a deduction on the invoice (M. Torres).

Background

In October 2021, Work Order 187.00 was finalized with F.H. Paschen for the JNMC North Parking Lot project in the total amount of \$920,947. During the permitting process, authorities having jurisdiction have requested changes to the drawings, which has delayed the construction start date. Additional irrigation, landscaping, and electrical scope needs to be added to the project, which increases total construction costs. These increased costs will take Work Order 187 over the \$1M threshold, requiring PHT Board approval.

Updated Project Scope

The revised project scope consists of 128 paved asphalt parking spaces with concrete curbs and an underground drainage system. The project site perimeter has concrete block walls and pilasters with two metal gates for fire truck and pedestrian access. The site has new irrigation and landscaping as well as new pole mounted parking lot lights. There is an adjacent paved cul-de-sac that is tied into an existing street, and a new paved entry drive that connects to an existing hospital parking lot, which are also part of this project scope of work.

The job order proposal will be finalized once the project manager and architect proposal review is completed. The cost identified is a construction cost estimate, deemed fair and reasonable for the anticipated level of effort and to complete the required scope of work. Assigning contractors for work orders is done on a rotational and/or equitable basis to ensure all general contractors in the JOC program receive fair work distribution.

Recommendation

The JNMC North Parking Lot is required to provide additional parking for staff. FDC, therefore, has determined that it would be in the best interest of the Trust to authorize issuance of Work Order 187.01, pursuant to Contract 16-14204-JE/General Construction GC-01, for the not-to-exceed amount of \$779,053.

This Procurement has been thoroughly reviewed for SBE Participation. F.H. Paschen's JOC contract has a 30% SBE-Construction subcontractor participation goal.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance, Facilities, Design and Construction has reported the following:

- Schedule management meets standard
- Cost effectiveness and efficiency meets standard
- Quality is above standard
- Accountability and leadership is above standard
- Partnership is above standard

The original contract was approved by Risk Management as to indemnification and insurance and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

Background

The Trust entered into a Bid Waiver Agreement with MedSleuth, Inc. on January 9, 2020, in the amount of \$110,250, to provide the Trust with an annual subscription to its BREEZE Transplant Application Services. First renewal option year was exercised under PHT Reso. 05/2020-024, adding \$284,500 to the contract.

Pricing has remained the same, and the new contract value of \$145,150, will include:

- \$121,550 to cover 12 months of BREEZE Transplant Application
- \$16,000 for the Matchgrid annual license fee
- \$7,000 success fee for one successful Matchgrid transplant.

The MedSleuth BREEZE® is a patient centered web-based software platform that delivers a standardized donor eligibility assessment in a timely fashion for transplant candidates. This platform streamlines the transplant process from recipient candidate evaluation through donor and recipient follow up. The BREEZE® elicits a comprehensive medical history from the transplant patients that allows for patient triage at intake, based on transplant eligibility; monitors ongoing eligibility on the national transplant wait list; and, provides patient-specific information required by healthcare providers to identify and mitigate post-transplant risk.

Vendor will continue to provide to the Trust the MedSleuth MATCHGRID™ advanced enterprise software application. This software technology will continue to allow clinicians to rapidly match living organ donors with patients who have willing, healthy, but incompatible donors, offering an alternative for a recipient to receive a living donor kidney.

In explaining the benefits, to the Trust of this procurement, the Miami Transplant Institute has offered that, the MedSleuth BREEZE® platform provides a service-oriented web-based architecture solution (cloud computing) for improving clinical workflow and deficiency as well as patient satisfaction for living kidney donor transplant patients by generating preliminary medical history reports that patients can complete online. The vendor's MATCHGRID™ uses advanced matching and optimization algorithms, that can evaluate all potential matches from 2-way all the way through 12-way combinations in minutes, saving transplant centers months of work previously required to assess a smaller number of pairs.

Recommendation

The Miami Transplant Institute has determined that it would be in the Trust's best interest to exercise this second and final renewal option to continue engaging MedSleuth, Inc. for the provision of its Kidney Transplant Application Services, during which period a new Agreement will be processed to continue these services.

In providing an evaluation of the vendor's performance during the current contract year, Perioperative Services has reported the following:

- Average turnaround time of services is above the standard.
- The vendor's ability to successfully respond to emergencies meets the standard
- Responsiveness to safety issues and safety standards meets the standard.

In accordance with JHS' Contractor Due Diligence review, MedSleuth, Inc. has provided a Sworn/Notarized Statement to the Trust's Procurement Management Department that: (1) no Lawsuits have been filed against the Company within the five (5) years prior to submittal of a bid or proposal to the Trust; (2) the Company has not defaulted in the five (5) years prior to bid or proposal submittal to the Trust; and, (3) the Company has not been debarred nor has the Firm received a formal notice of non-compliance or non-performance in the five (5) years prior to proposal submittal to the Trust.

The underlying contract can be terminated for convenience with a thirty (30) day written notice and includes UAP and OIG fees. The UAP and OIG fees are provided as a deduction on the invoices.

Background

The first insurance claim is associated with damages occurring on January 13, 2021, due to a 4" water pipe Victaulic fitting blow out. Damage included the first and second floor areas of the hospital (OR Suite, Pharmacy area, and Main Lobby).

The second insurance claim is associated with damages occurring on February 28, 2021, due to a 1" domestic water line loss event. Damaged area included the 1st Floor Radiology holding area.

Yates was the prime contractor of record for JWMC during these events and JHS asked Yates to assist in managing the water remediation work to protect the facility that was under construction at the time. Yates hired several subcontractors under emergency declaration to mitigate the damages.

Allowable costs from these accidental loss events have been reviewed, negotiated, and recovered through the Trust's Owner Controlled Insurance Program (OCIP) administrator, Aon Property Risk Consulting.

Recommendation

The Facilities Design and Construction (FDC) department recommends ratification of the emergency award in the best interest of the Trust. Water remediation work was successfully performed, the project is fully completed, and no further engagement is anticipated.

An Emergency Procurement Determination and Approval Form for \$964,818.33, dated February 14, 2022, was approved by William Seed, SVP, FDC; Daniel Nino, Division CFO, FDC; Mark Knight, EVP, CFO; and Carlos Migoya, CEO, JHS. Conflict of Interest forms were signed by Jorge Garciga, JHS Project Manager, and Reid Warren, Assistant Project Manager, Yates, with no reported disclosures.

The original contracts were approved by Risk Management as to Insurance and Liability and by the County Attorney's Office for legal sufficiency.

The contracts can be terminated for convenience (without cause) upon seven (7) calendar days' prior written notice and include the UAP and OIG fees. The UAP fee was negotiated as an upfront discount. The OIG fees are provided as a deduction on the invoices (W. Seed).

Scope

The lease agreement allows the Trust use of the Premises for a one (1) year term with two (2) options to extend for period of twelve (12) months each and termination at will at any time by either party upon thirty (30) days' notice.

Fiscal Impact

The total fiscal impact during the initial term of the lease agreement is \$42,000.00 in rental payments made by the Trust to the Church. The cumulative value of rental payments, should the Trust exercise both options to extend, is \$126,000.00.

Track Record/Monitor

Dan Chatlos, Director, Real Estate Services, would track and monitor the lease agreement.

Background

On January 10, 2018, the Trust entered into a lease agreement with the Church for use of the Premises as an overflow parking area for Jackson South employees. The Trust has exhausted all of its options to extend under the existing lease and overflow parking is still required to support the operations of Jackson South.

Approval of a new lease agreement for the Premises is recommended to ensure that sufficient parking is available for employees and visitors at Jackson South until a new Trust-owned parking garage is constructed and ready for use.

Recommendation

Staff recommends that the Public Health Trust Board of Trustees authorizes the execution of a lease agreement with the University of Miami, a Florida non-profit corporation (Tenant), for the rental of approximately 2,445 square-feet located at Jackson West Medical Center, 2801 NW 79th Avenue, Suite 2007, Doral, FL (Premises) for an initial period of five (5) years (Lease Agreement).

Scope

The proposed agreement would be for an initial term of five (5) years, with one (1) option to renew for five (5) years.

Fiscal Impact

The Tenant will pay an annual base rent of \$34.00/sf/year, plus common area expenses estimated to be \$10.00/sf/year and the amortized cost of additional tenant improvements estimated to be \$28.99/sf/year (for the initial term only). The proposed rent is based on the fair market value of the Premises and is subject to annual adjustments/increases, as outlined in the Lease Agreement.

Track Record/Monitor

Dan Chatlos, Director, Real Estate Services, would track and monitor the lease agreement.

Background

Staff is finalizing various lease and timeshare agreements for the use of available, on-site medical office space at the new Jackson West Medical Center, including space to be occupied by the University of Miami. Approval of the attached Lease Agreement is recommended to allow the University of Miami to establish a surgical practice in Suite 2007 of the Jackson West Medical Center.

In accordance with the terms of the Lease Agreement, the Trust shall build-out the Premises in a turn-key condition as specified in the Lease Agreement prior to occupancy. The value of which exceeding a \$90 per square foot tenant improvement allowance shall be reimbursed to the Trust in monthly installments over the initial five-year term.

Accordingly, the Board's approval of this resolution is recommended to authorize the Chief Executive Officer or his designee to execute the Lease Agreement, take any other action required to effectuate the same, and to exercise any and all rights conferred

SUBJECT: Facility Naming Background Research: LAAIA Creative Arts Studio

Section 2-1 Rule 9.02(h) of the Code of Miami-Dade County provides that the Board of Trustees of the Public Health Trust may name or rename any interior portion of a Public Health Trust designated facility without approval by the Board of County Commissioners pursuant to the provisions of this subsection. Any Public Health Trust resolution to name or rename an interior portion of a designated facility shall only be considered by the Board of Trustees of the Public Health Trust after a public hearing and upon completion of a report by the Commission Auditor as required by subsection (f).

Section 2-1 Rule 9.02(f) of the Code requires the Office of the Commission Auditor (OCA) to conduct background research on any person, organization, place, or thing that is the subject of a naming, renaming or codesignation item or an item approving the codesignation of state or municipal roads and prepare a report detailing the findings of said research prior to the Commission meeting during which the item is scheduled to be considered.

Commission Auditor's Conclusion:

OCA completed the required background check on "LAAIA Creative Arts Studio." Since this is an organization, OCA also completed a check on the organization's leader and noted no adverse findings. OCA determined that there is no prior Board of County Commissioners (BCC) codesignation for "LAAIA Creative Arts Studio."

3. INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY UPDATE

Michael A. Garcia, Senior Vice President and Chief Information Officer, Information Technology (IT) presented a summary of work efforts that have been ongoing with a focus on the work that has been done since the beginning of the COVID-19 crisis. In the year 2012, the Information Technology team created an innovative strategy of solutions identifying where Jackson Health System (JHS) needed to be from an IT perspective, which accelerated with the arrival of COVID-19. Much of the work that has been done had to do with digital transformation. With the arrival of COVID-19 came the immediate change to the electronic medical record process; increased use of telehealth and video conferencing which created unified communications for collaborative healthcare for inpatients, outpatients, virtual meetings, and remote users to be able to work from home; enhanced the telehealth patient observer solution that is used in-house to better monitor patients remotely, leveraged current IT solutions using near real-time and real-time patient data, ability to review patient related and availability data requests, creation of visual dashboard showing JHS COVID-19 daily statistics; creation of data integration strategy; and creation of Pegasus a JHS in-house COVID machine learning environment custom tailored to JHS for hospitalized and discharged patients. As part of the ongoing efforts particularly during the COVID-19 crisis, the IT team promoted and encouraged online safety and cyber hygiene initiatives.

Mr. Richardson thanked Mr. Garcia and the IT team for their tremendous work during the COVID-19 crisis and beyond and keeping JHS safe from data breaches.
