Hello,

Yesterday I had the pleasure of joining a community meeting at the Clinton Ave Methodist Church in Kingston.

The meeting was about the recent increase in shootings in the city of Kingston, increased drug activity and the addition of an upcoming program running out of the church that will serve people trying to overcome addiction issues.

Two police officers joined the meeting to answer questions from the community about what was being done to stop the current increase of illegal activity and what the community can do to help in those efforts.

Let me say that I have lived on Clinton Ave for about eleven years now and have seen rampant drug activity that did improve after Home Land Security did a major drug bust a few years ago. Unfortunately, that good work those arrests achieved is now dwindling to increases in drug activity again.

It was enlightening and very concerning to be informed that the Kingston Police Department is now understaffed with officers at a time when the community needs a strong and reliable police force more than ever.

I am curious as to why there are not enough police officers in the city of Kingston Department and what can be done to increase their number.

With concerns about the Samadi run program for those trying to get and stay off drugs there is the issue of people hanging out around the block surrounding that area when not participating in activities.

General loitering is a breeding ground for all sorts illegal activity and mischief there by being a concern of the community.

I fear the drug dealers most likely thinking of the members of this program as potential customers attracting dealers to the area.

One of the subjects that came up was having police officers in the neighborhood on bicycles to monitor the area, interact with the community and make it uncomfortable for drug dealers to deal on the street.

I thought, what a good idea that would be great, but was also told there simply isn't enough officers to make anything like that a reality. Well how do we make that a reality?

In the past when there was trouble and I called the police the police came and did their best to take control and deal with the situation and that made me feel safer in my home.

In conclusion, I appreciate you taking the time to read my email and hopefully address some of the issues at hand.

Dear President Noble,

Beginning in 2016, tremendous improvements have been made to the former Hutton Brickyards and as you are aware, it has become a destination event space for large shows and festivals. As part of the most recent Planning Board application, submitted by the owners of the Hutton Brickyards, additional developments are being sought to improve the gate and fence area, located on North Street, within the public right of way. This has brought to light the actual legal definition of the roadway.

Our City's Corporation Counsel Office has been working to gather information about the gate and status of North Street. After extensive review, we have identified two previous executive orders, the first by Mayor Mancuso in May of 1984, and the second by Mayor White in September of 1989 that closed North Street from just past the Central Hudson Substation to the City of Kingston/Town of Ulster Border (see attached executive orders and map from 1989).

In an effort to codify these orders, I believe it is appropriate for the Common Council to pass an ordinance officially closing the designated section of North Street, with access to the closed portion of the street to be allowed on written application to my office, upon such reasonable terms and conditions, as deemed appropriate at my discretion.

This closure shall remain in effect until such time as improvements, to be determined by the Mayor and Superintendent of Public Works, are made to North Street thereby making travel on North Street safe and passable.

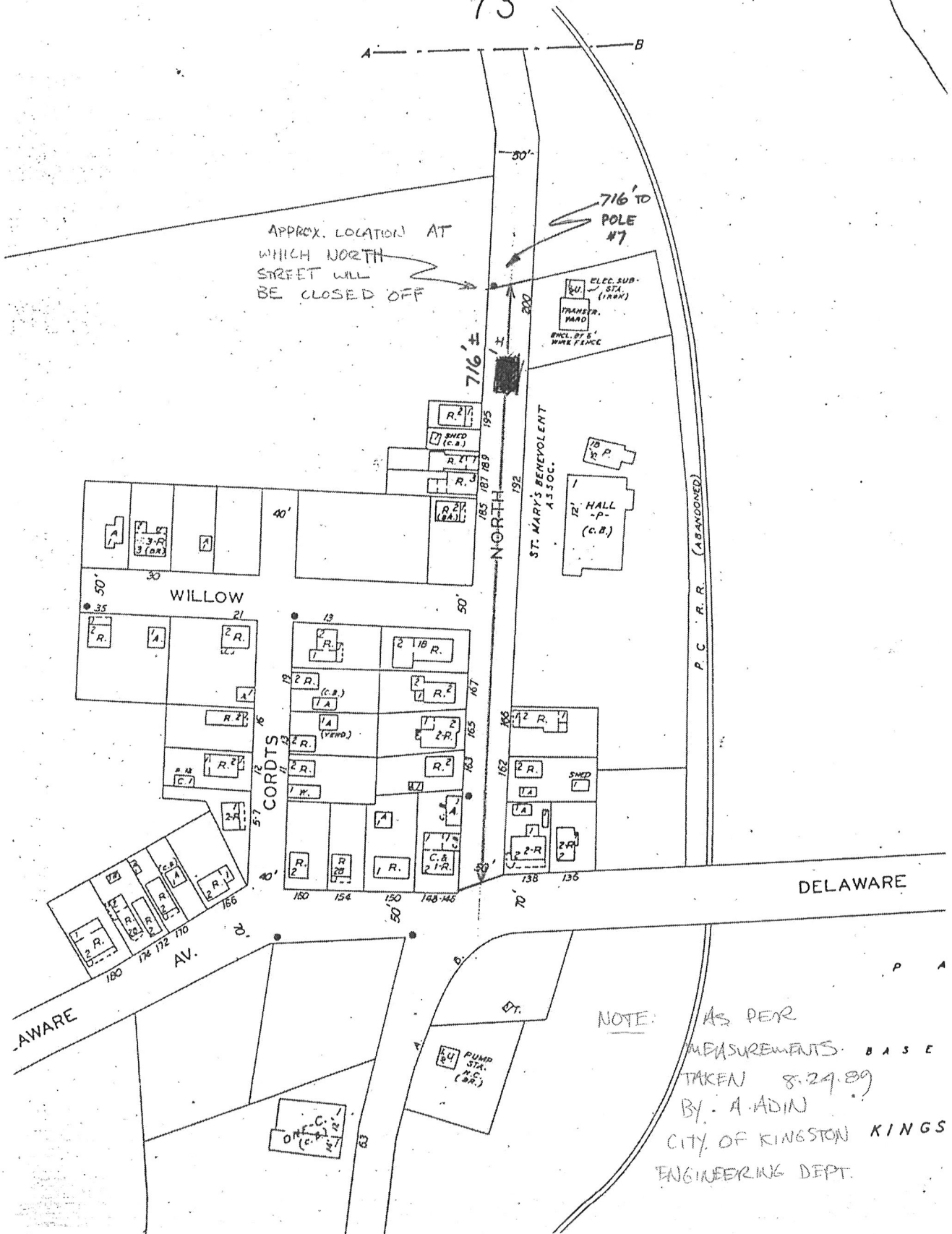

PUBLIC NOTICE

BY THE POWER VESTED IN ME BY THE CITY CHARTER, I, PETER MANCUSO, MAYOR, OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON, NEW YORK, DO HEREBY ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

As an emergency measure, to deal with the unsafe conditions that exist, on and after the 21st of May, North street will be closed to vehicular traffic from that portion of North Street beginning at a point three tenths miles north of the northerly curb of Delaware Avenue and continuing northward to the Kingston boundary line.

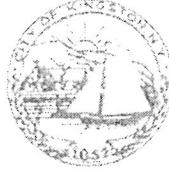
That any violation hereof shall be punishable in accordance with the provisions of the Statutes of the State of New York in such cases made and provided.

Below please see a request for reserved parking spots for the volunteers who run the Visitor's Center during the summer months. I spoke to Fran DePetrillo and she explained that the volunteers are usually elderly retired citizens who need parking spots very close to the building. Hi, Elissa.

Thank you so much for all of your assistance in the matters related to 20 Broadway.

As you know, we have been working towards gathering volunteers for the weekend shifts May 4 - October 27 for the 2019 season at the Kingston Heritage Visitors Center. We have had some

changes in our volunteer list over the last couple of years and are starting out with many new volunteers at the center. I am working on the schedule and orientation etc. and as I have been meeting with the volunteers, all have raised a very strong concern over parking.

Currently, I have a skeleton crew of volunteers that will come in Saturdays and Sundays from 11am to 2pm and a relief shift from 2pm to 5pm. One volunteer spells off another volunteer. Saturdays and Sundays downtown are already busy and there is very often not available parking in the municipal lot or out front. Most volunteers are elderly and some have handicap parking passes, however, they have discovered that those spots are often taken. In the past seasons it has been so difficult for our volunteers to park that they have returned home out of frustration or inability to physically get here which leaves the center closed. Our goal is to have more than one volunteer per shift, however, at the current time we are requesting at least two spaces either out front of 20 Broadway or the two spots closest to the yard outside of 20 Broadway in order for the volunteers to park (you have photos of those spots). A volunteer will still be parked in a spot when the relief volunteer arrives so we will need at least two spots. As I mentioned, we have had a huge challenge in getting volunteers as it is, so for them to not have parking provides a huge additional challenge.

Since the volunteers are already giving of their time, are not paid to be here, we would like to show with the City how grateful we are for their service. Thank you.

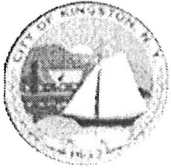

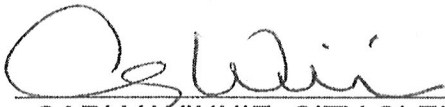

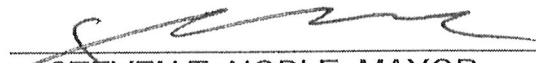
