Hi Michele,

This is Stew Meyers, Co-founder of Exago, an 80-person (and rapidly growing) business intelligence and analytics software company, half of which are located in the Fuller building in Midtown Kingston. I am writing to voice my support for the bond which will help pay for the work at the intersection of Pine Grove and Grand Streets, which is right up the road from us. I understand that the vote is scheduled for November 10th.

There are two major points that the work at the intersection will greatly help, both of which I think are very important:

- **Traffic Safety:** As you know, the way the intersection is currently is very confusing and a cause for many accidents. I can tell you from personal experience (since I go through there several times a day) that it's difficult to know which way someone is going when coming from the opposite direction due to the orientation of Pine Grove with Prince Streets, and really needs to be changed to make it safe.
- **Community / Green Space:** On March 6th, right before Covid hit hard, we hosted a wonderful event in our new space with many political, business, and educational leaders to discuss community and how individuals and companies like Exago can help and work within the community. Please add my comments to the public speaking segment on the agenda for this evening's council meeting. I ask that my comments become part of the proceedings as well. I have also taken the liberty of copying each of the aldermen and Council President.

**PUBLIC COMMENT FOR COMMON COUNCIL MEETING
HELD VIRTUALLY NOVEMBER 10 2020**

**Council President, Aldermen and Members of
the Press and Public**

I am compelled to voice my opposition to Resolutions No. 173, 174 and 175 pertaining to the improvements project at Broadway and Grand Streets intersections which require an additional bonding of \$425,000.

When you passed Resolutions 65, 66 and 67 of April 2, 2019 to purchase the 500 Broadway property, questions should have been asked if more spending was required for this reconfigured intersection and the former Planet Wings building. Now, the project construction and other costs exceed the NYSDOT \$750,000 funding secured by our assemblyman and the taxpayers are left to make up the difference. Now we have to bond \$425,000 for the shortfalls of this project and rob the CDBG fund for \$50,000 to cover asbestos removal. When will this end? It becomes more obvious this was not the "best solution" for reconfiguring this intersection.

I also stated at last April's council meeting that the crash numbers are fabricated to justify re-designing an unsafe and dangerous intersection.

The crash report compiled by the Ulster County Transportation Council for Building a Better Broadway Design Plan indicated this particular intersection is the lowest reported intersection for all crash types for HIGH CRASH LOCATIONS (rear end, right angle, side swipe, left turn, right turn, overtaking head-on or other), COLLISION WITH (motor vehicle, pedestrian, bicyclist, tree, fixed object or other) and CRASH SEVERITY (fatal, injury, property damage or non-reportable).

I am writing this letter to express my strong opposition to the rezoning of the Lawton Park properties in the City of Kingston.

First, as a lifelong resident and property owner of both 60 South Washington Avenue and 64 South Washington Avenue it came as a total surprise to my neighbors and I that the rezoning of the Lawton Park property had been proposed by our 5th Ward alderman Donald Tallerman. The zoning change being proposed is in direct conflict with the desires of the constituents of the 5th Ward.

My primary concern with this proposal is that it seems to bring forth far more questions than answers. How do you represent the will of your constituents when you have failed to seek their input? Why is there such a rush and lack of transparency on Mr Tallerman's part? What exactly did alderman Patrick O'Reilly mean by the term "Backdoor Zoning" in regard to this proposal? Why are we considering a zoning change to these properties prior to having a developer buying the land or is there a developer we don't know about? If there is a developer why are their interests being paid more attention to than the families of Ward 5?

In an attempt to gain clarity and understanding of the city's plan to rezone the properties I contacted Alderman Tallerman. I was curious how Alderman Tallerman could proceed with this proposal with out first speaking to the current residents of the neighboring properties. I was astonished to be told that Alderman Tallerman "doesn't have time to knock on doors" and speak to the people he has been elected to represent.

My final question to the Common Council is shouldn't all these issues been fully vetted before making it a proposal? This proposal seems in direct conflict with the City of Kingstons mission of enhancing the quality of life for present residents and leadership that reflects the needs of those who live in the 5th Ward.

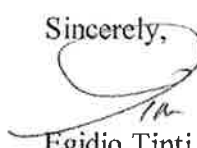

Hello Alderwoman Hirsch and Alderman Tallerman—

We are writing to second a recent comment made by our neighbors, Kate & Joe Schoonmaker, about recent traffic changes in the hamlet of Wilbur, in Kingston.

As you are probably aware, the stop sign on Wilbur Ave (heading southeast, as Wilbur Ave merges into Dunn St) was recently removed, while a stop sign on Wilbur Ave (heading northwest, towards midtown Kingston) was added. These changes, in our opinion, have had a dramatic and negative effect on traffic and pedestrian patterns on these few streets. Walking around Wilbur was already dangerous, but traffic has gotten increasingly reckless as it heads into the hamlet from midtown Kingston. Simultaneously, traffic heading in the opposite direction (towards midtown Kingston) has gotten increasingly choked up with the additional, new stop sign.

The traffic pattern at the triangle was significantly smoother, and safer, as it existed before these changes. Many people already had a tendency to ignore the stop sign heading into Wilbur, but at least the presence of that sign slowed traffic and protected pedestrians and pets in the neighborhood.

In fact, after living in Wilbur for about two years, the only traffic change we would really advise would be to add a clear "no left turn" sign on Abeel St, at the intersection of Abeel St / Dunn St. Cars heading northeast on Abeel, towards the Rondout neighborhood, frequently make illegal left turns onto Dunn St, which is one way. This largely seems to happen because there is a "213, left" sign on Abeel St as you approach Dunn St, and people do not realize that they should be taking the second left.

Other than this suggestion, again, the traffic in Wilbur was far smoother and safer before this most recent change was made. We are hoping the traffic pattern can be returned to its previous state—or at the very least, the stop sign can be re-added to its former position on Wilbur Ave, heading southeast, as you enter the hamlet.

Some parents are reluctant to allow their children to walk or bicycle to CCE due to the traffic congestion and perceived traffic danger from speeding drivers on Cedar Street during student arrival and dismissal. This often results in more parents driving their children to school which adds to the extra congestion and safety problems at CCE, creating an increasing cycle of more traffic problems and less walking.

By improving the drop-off and pick-up process, traffic conditions become safer for all, including pedestrians and bicyclists. Better organized and safer traffic conditions will ease the concerns of parents, and make them more willing to allow their children to walk or bike to our day, afternoon, evening and weekend programming.

Thank you for looking into this important issue for us and the youth of the community.

Re: Funding Recommendations for CDBG-CV

Dear President Shaut,

While this has been an incredibly difficult year, I am so proud of our community, which has continued to work together during this challenging time. Over seven months later and volunteers are still delivering food and other essential supplies to neighbors across our city. Residents and visitors are continuing to safely patronize our local businesses, and our youth service partners have rapidly developed small learning centers to support children participating in remote classes. Thanks to another round of CDBG-CV funding, we have the opportunity to support a variety of these critical initiatives. While each of the proposed projects would contribute to our community during this difficult time, as is always the case, the proposals far outpaced the resources available. During this round of CDBG-CV funding, I focused on four key priority areas - youth education, housing assistance, food access, and local business support. Below are my recommendations for this round. It should be noted that I strongly encourage all of the other applicants to consider reapplying during our regular CDBG application process, as many of the proposed projects align well with our annual and 5-year plan.

Funding Recommendations:

City of Kingston Office of Economic and Community Development - Community Development Block Grant Administration - I have allocated 10% (\$25,638) of the grant award for this expense. It should be noted that I previously recommended waiving the administrative fee during the first round of CDBG-CV funding, but the Council ultimately decided to include the administrative fee, though at a lower rate than the typical 20% fee applied during the regular CDBG process. If the Council wishes to fund additional projects and reduce or eliminate the administrative fee during this round, I would support that decision.

City of Kingston Parks and Recreation Department - technology upgrades for Community Centers. Both the Rondout Neighborhood Center and Everett Hodge Community Center are open and serving children on-site to participate in the school district's remote learning program. While the district has worked to distribute chromebooks as quickly as possible to students, some students still do not have the reliable equipment they need. Further, the pandemic has quickly shown that access to free internet, printing/scanning, and video calling equipment will be vital for both youth and adults moving forward. I am recommending \$30,000 to purchase a total of 30 computers, 4 printers and the necessary materials to support this important work.

Business Alliance of Kingston - our local businesses have been hit hard by the pandemic and are in need of assistance to stay open. While the KLDC has offered a number of zero interest loans, many applicants were still unable to access this assistance due to financial barriers. I am proposing to allocate \$30,000 to be used to assist approximately 7 businesses with grants up to \$4,000 as well as the materials, supplies and program administration. The support is targeted to assist low to moderate income business owners who may not be able to access conventional lending options.

Boys and Girls Club - the Boys and Girls Club has been a key partner in our effort to provide safe spaces for young people to go to during the summer and now during remote learning days. The large building allows the Club to provide remote learning assistance and recreation in small groups to maintain safety and provide the support children need during this difficult time. I am proposing to allocate \$15,000 to support these important efforts.

Center for Creative Education - as described above, access to safe, supervised children's programs, with an emphasis on in-person remote learning support, is a top priority of my administration during this critical time. CCE's new facility allows a large number of children to participate in small, socially-distanced groups, and includes new technology and other supports essential for learning in this new era. I am asking the Council to consider funding this program with at least \$25,000 in support, particularly since the organization was not approved for any funding during the first round of CDBG-CV.

Family of Woodstock, Inc. - in addition to managing the day to day operations of the Hodge Center's youth program and remote learning support, Family has been offering an extensive meal program, serving breakfast and lunches to youth on-site at the Hodge Center, as well as at the Rondout Neighborhood Center, Boys and Girls Club, and Center for Creative Education. The agency has been preparing meals for individuals and families in need through the Kingston Emergency Food Collaborative since its inception. I have allocated \$15,000 to support this critical meal program.

Legal Services of the Hudson Valley - while the moratorium on evictions has helped many individuals and families stay in their homes during the pandemic, we know that this halt is temporary and that it is likely that some of our residents will be facing eviction in the coming months. LSHV plays a critical role in supporting community members during the legal process, which can be overwhelming and confusing. While we do not have enough funding to support the full request, the City was able to support LSHV significantly during the first round of CDBG CV funding. I am allocating \$20,000 to continue to support this effort.

People's Place - this organization has distributed hundreds of thousands of meals throughout the pandemic and is still maintaining its holiday distribution programs, a critical resource for so many of our families in Kingston. I am recommending \$15,000 to support their request to pay for the costs of staffing needed to maintain safety protocols so they may continue to provide their essential services.

Read and Write - this organization has been a key partner with the Parks and Recreation Department at the Rondout Neighborhood Center. Under this partnership, staff from the Department and Read and Write have been working as one team in order to reopen the doors at the Rondout Center and assist youth in our downtown neighborhoods with remote learning. I am allocating \$10,000 to support their request.

Ulster County Community Action Committee - UCCAC is an anchor organization in our downtown community and has facilitated the distribution of thousands of meals to community members. In order to continue these essential services, I am recommending \$10,000 to support their food pantry program.

Ulster Immigrant Defense Network (UIDN) - this organization has been working to assist our vulnerable immigrant neighbors with essential needs such as food, diapers and personal hygiene items. I am allocating \$15,000 to support this important effort, which I believe is reaching community members who otherwise may not be able to easily access these basic necessities.

Housing Assistance - I am recommending the remainder of the funds (\$45,738) to be set aside to assist individuals and families in the coming months with housing needs. As you will recall, the Council authorized the reallocation of funding during the first round to be used for rental assistance, which I expect will be a great need in early 2021. I believe it is prudent to continue to dedicate resources to this area in preparation for the worsening housing crisis.

Virtually all of the applicants proposed worthy projects and it was incredibly difficult to make these recommendations. I thank all of the organizations for their contributions to our community and commitment to public service. If the Council has any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me. Dear Common Council members,

I am writing to you today, to advise you on an ongoing issue. In recent months my office has received many calls and complaints in reference to chickens and roosters. The complaints are on the rise, as more and more residents are acquiring chickens and roosters.

1. The complaints range from neighbors being woken up at odd hours of the morning by the sound of roosters crowing.
2. One couple has called repeatedly because of the smell from a neighbors chickens is affecting their quality of life and after living in their home for the past 15 years now have rats in there yard. This Individual's chicken coop is right up against his neighbor's property. (They state rats are attracted to chicken feces and when it rains the feces run into their yard).
3. Another resident has complained about her neighbors chickens getting loose and ruining her garden.
4. On another occasion, I responded to a complaint and upon arrival witnessed a person harvesting a chicken for self-consumption.
5. Lastly, I receive complaints of chickens and roosters strolling through the streets.

The following is how the current zoning code for the City of Kingston reads: Chapter 405-9(5)

Farms, truck gardens, greenhouses, nurseries and arboretums on lots having an area of at least five acres, including the sale on the premises of produce grown thereon, provided that:

(a)

Except as hereinafter provided, any farm building, other than dwellings and buildings accessory thereto, and the heating plant of any greenhouse shall be distant at least 75 feet from any street line or property line.

(b)

Farm buildings devoted to or intended for the housing of livestock, horses, rabbits, hares, guinea pigs, ducks, geese, live poultry or fowls of any kind shall be erected at least 200 feet from any street or property line.

No odorous fertilizer shall be stored within a distance of 75 feet of any street or property line.

The complaints coming into my office are greater by the day. I would ask the Common Council to come up with a plan to deal with this issue. At the very least:

1. Chickens should be housed in secure cages.
2. Roosters should possibly be banned.
3. Cages must be kept clean and away from neighboring properties due to odors and rodents.
4. Limit the number of chickens allowed on small city lots.
5. Possibly the registration of chicken owners.
6. Legislation on how to deal with the waste and feces which attract disease and rodents.
7. Guide lines for proper disposal of waste and proper maintenance of chicken coops and how to monitor.

In closing, my position is part time 17.5 hours per week. I deal with many complaints a day involving all sorts of zoning complaints and violations. My main priority is also working on monthly applications that come before the ZBA. This ongoing issue is taking up plenty of valuable time. I would ask for you to thoroughly discuss this ongoing issue possibly amend this code and provide guidance to me, as your Zoning Enforcement officer.

New schedule, LGS-1 Retention and Disposition Schedule for New York Local Government Records arrives August 1, 2020

Thursday, May 21, 2020

The State Archives is revising and consolidating its local government records retention and disposition schedules and issuing a single, comprehensive retention schedule for all types of local governments on August 1st, 2020. The new schedule, *Retention and Disposition Schedule for New York Local Government Records* or LGS-1, will supersede and replace:

- *CO-2 Schedule* for use by counties (2006),
- *MU-1 Schedule* for use by cities, towns, villages, and fire districts (2003),
- *MI-1 Schedule* for use by miscellaneous local governments (2006), and
- *ED-1 Schedule* for use by school districts, BOCES, County Vocational Education and Extension Boards, and Teacher Resource and Computer Training Centers (2004)

Local governments must adopt LGS-1 prior to utilizing it, even if they adopted and have been using the *CO-2*, *MU-1*, *MI-1*, or *ED-1* Schedules. Governing boards of local governments will have a five-month period – between August 1st, 2020 when LGS-1 is issued and January 1st, 2021 when the four existing schedules expire – to adopt the Schedule by resolution (a model resolution is available on the State Archives' website). Local government records may not be legally destroyed after the end of 2020 unless the LGS-1 is formally adopted. There is no need to notify the State Archives of LGS-1 adoptions, but local governments should keep a record of the date of adoption and maintain the resolution permanently.

The organization and formatting of the LGS-1 is similar to the existing four schedules. Section heading names have been retained. Because of the consolidation, the LGS-1 contains more sections. Local government can ignore those that are not applicable. As with previous schedules, items that are new or significantly revised have been indicated. Each schedule item has been assigned a new, unique number; however, the unique numbers of the four existing schedules have been provided allowing cross referencing. In addition, each schedule item contains the record series title and description, retention period, and any notes.

A copy of the LGS-1 will be available on the State Archives website on August 1st. Additional online resources will include [a list of the major revisions](#) to the Schedule and a webinar series to introduce the LGS-1. Local governments are encouraged to check the State Archives website periodically for LGS-1 news and updates.

By consolidating multiple, disparate retention schedules, the LGS-1 helps to ensure consistent retention and disposition guidance for records that are common to various local governments. It also

makes it easier to apply revisions necessitated by changes to laws, regulations or other mandates that affect retention.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") made the _____ day of _____, 2020, between the **COUNTY OF ULSTER**, a municipal corporation, having its principal place of business at 244 Fair Street, Kingston, New York 12401, hereinafter referred to as the "**County**"; and the **CITY OF KINGSTON**, a municipal corporation having its main office and principal place of business at 420 Broadway, Kingston, New York 12401, hereinafter referred to as the "**City**" (each, a "Party," and together, the "Parties").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the County of Ulster has imposed a Sales and Compensating Use Tax pursuant to the laws of the State of New York; and

WHEREAS, Articles 28 and 29 of the Tax Law of the State of New York authorize municipalities to impose certain taxes on retail sales and other similar transactions and compensating use taxes as herein specified, to be administered by the State Tax Commission, and provide certain priorities and pre-emptive rights for each of the Parties; and

WHEREAS, subdivision (c) of Section 1262 of the Tax Law of the State of New York provides that Sales and Compensating Use Taxes may be allocated to cities and the areas in the county outside the cities in such proportion as may be agreed upon by the elective governing body of a county and of each of the cities in the county, with the approval of the State Comptroller; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 1210(i)(7) and 1224(o) of article 29 of the Tax Law of the State of New York, the County receives an additional one percent (1%) on taxable sales; and

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into a sales tax agreement with an effective date of March 1, 2016, and which expires on February 28, 2021; and

WHEREAS, representatives of the Parties have entered into extensive discussions and negotiations regarding this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into this Agreement and be bound by its terms, and hereby acknowledge that sufficient consideration has been exchanged by the terms of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, by resolutions duly adopted by the governing bodies of the County and the City, the Parties have agreed upon a plan of distribution of a portion of the Sales and Compensating Use Tax imposed by the County providing a portion to the Towns of Ulster County; and

WHEREAS, for purposes of this agreement, the term "Towns" shall mean the Towns situated within the County of Ulster as a unit.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, the Parties hereto mutually covenant and agree as follows:

1. The County shall, effective March 1, 2021, continue to impose all taxes described in Articles 28 and 29 of the Tax Law of the State of New York, pursuant to Sections 1210 of said law, at a rate of 4% or any other rate(s) as may be authorized by the New York State Legislature during the term of this Agreement.
2. During the term of this Agreement, the City shall not impose any of the taxes authorized by Section 1210 of Tax Law of the State of New York as specified above in Paragraph Number 1 of this Agreement, nor shall the City exercise any "prior right" set forth in Section 1224 of the Tax Law of the State of New York.
3. The net proceeds of said taxes that the County imposes shall be allocated and disposed of as follows:

DURING THE PERIOD OF MARCH 1, 2021 THROUGH FEBRUARY 28, 2026:

- A. 85.5% of such monies shall be set aside for County purposes and shall be available for any legitimate County purpose.
 - B. 11.5% of such monies shall be paid monthly directly to the City to be used by the City for any legitimate City purpose. The County shall pay such share of the monies to the City within seven (7) work days after receiving the same from the State Tax Commission.
 - C. 3.0% of such monies shall be allocated monthly or otherwise as provided by law, to the area of the County outside of the City, to be distributed among the Towns therein, based upon full valuation.
4. For any sales tax period covered under this Agreement, should the Gross Sales Tax collected by Ulster County during a tax year exceed the high watermark of \$128,561,331 (2020 Budgeted Revenue), the County of Ulster and the City of Kingston agree to meet no later than May 1 of the following year to discuss the allocation of the amount in excess of \$128,561,331, and to consider increasing the allocation of the excess to the Towns, subject to the approval of the Ulster County Legislature and City of Kingston Common Council.
 5. This Agreement shall take effect on March 1, 2021 and continue in effect for a period of five years expiring on February 28, 2026.
 6. This Agreement is subject to the approval of the State Comptroller of the State of New York.

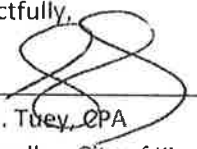

Given the importance of Broadway as a main thoroughfare, this will result in considerable inconvenience to the public and costs to the city when these failures occur.

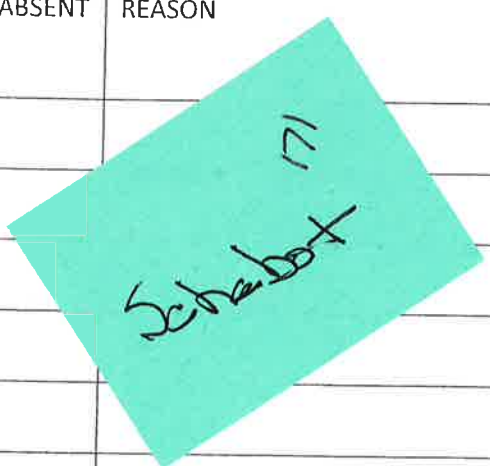

BOND ORDINANCE DATED NOVEMBER 10, 2020.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE BROADWAY SEWER PROJECT IN AND FOR THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$1,900,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,900,000 BONDS OF SAID CITY TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all members of said Council, as follows:

Section 1. The Broadway Sewer Project, including the length of roadway from approximately 726 Broadway to the Henry Street Intersection, and including costs incidental thereto, in and for the City of Kingston, Ulster County, New York, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,900,000.

Section 2. The plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$1,900,000 bonds of said City hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law; provided, however, that the amount of bonds to be issued shall be reduced to the extent of grants received therefor.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is forty years, pursuant to subdivision 4 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said City of Kingston, Ulster County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said City, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the City Comptroller, the chief fiscal officer of said City. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said City Comptroller, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters, except as provided herein relating to such bonds herein authorized including date, denominations, maturities, interest payment dates, and whether said bonds shall be repaid in accordance with a schedule providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the City Comptroller, the chief fiscal officer of such City. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the City Comptroller shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 7. This ordinance shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this ordinance, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 8. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said City is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this Bond Ordinance are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 9. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be applied to reimburse the City for expenditures made after the effective date of this ordinance for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 10. This ordinance, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in summary form in The Daily Freeman, the official newspaper of said City hereby designated for such purpose, together with a notice of the City Clerk in substantially the form set forth in paragraph a of Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Dear President Shaut,

The Office of Grants Management requests placement on the agenda of the Finance and Audit Committee on October 14, 2020 to discuss authorization of construction and a bond for the project. We anticipate advertising the project for bid in December 2020 and awarding the construction contract in January 2021 so that construction can begin in March 2021 and be completed during the 2021 construction season.

The purpose of Broadway & Grand Intersections Improvements Project is to re-align the intersection of Broadway, Grand Street, Prince Street, and Pine Grove Avenue to reduce traveler confusion, crashes, and alarming near-misses. From 2013 to 2018, there were 29 crashes at the intersection and seven of those resulted in injuries. At the beginning of the design of the Broadway Streetscape Project, the consultant engineers recommended re-aligning the intersection to improve safety. However, at that time, the property needed to re-align the intersection was not owned by the City.

As you all well know, the City acquired the Planet Wings property and has made plans to demolish the Planet Wings building utilizing its DPW forces. Meanwhile, the City secured funds from the NYSDOT Multi-Modal Program with assistance of NYS Assemblymember Kevin Cahill in the amount of \$750,000. Of those funds, \$75,000 was used for engineering services to re-design the intersection, and the remaining \$675,000 is available for construction costs.

When DPW was preparing to demolish the building it was discovered that asbestos was present in the building, which must be removed by a contractor that specializes in its removal. At the September 2020 Community Development Advisory Board meeting, the group voted to allocate \$50,000 in CDBG funds to contract for the asbestos removal.

The project construction cost is estimated to be \$1.1 million – \$980,000 for construction and \$120,000 for construction inspection. This cost includes traffic signalization equipment, estimated at \$223,000, and

pavement and concrete sidewalk ADA ramps, estimated at \$42,000, which would have been a cost in the original Broadway Streetscape Project if the intersection were not being re-designed. The construction does not include the landscaping of the public green space created by the re-alignment. It is the City's intention to conduct a more robust planning process for the public space, and with this construction phase a green lawn would be put in place. The purpose of this communication is to request bond authorization in the amount of \$425,000 to construct the intersection re-alignment project. I have included a sample resolution with this request.

While I understand that it is a difficult time to consider bonding, I urge the Council to seriously consider this request so that we are able to construct a sensible and safe end to the Broadway Streetscape Project, implement the signalization plan that will improve traffic flow for the entire corridor, and create the foundation for a meaningful public space in Midtown where the City's post office was previously located.

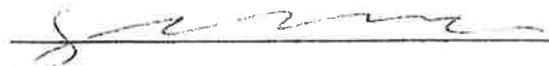

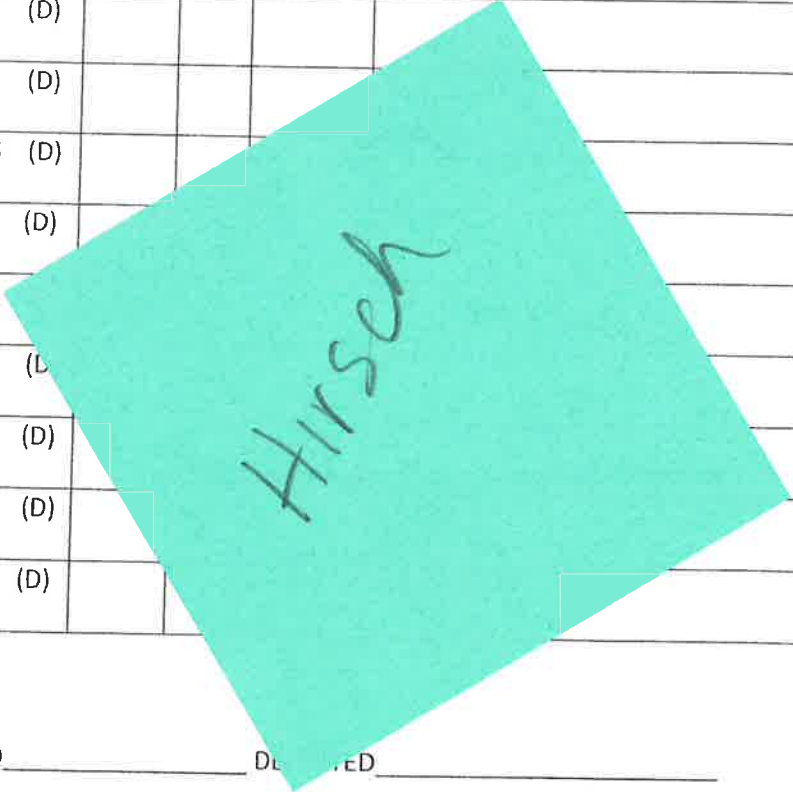

BOND ORDINANCE DATED NOVEMBER 10, 2020.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE BROADWAY AND GRAND INTERSECTION PROJECT IN AND FOR THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$1,175,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$425,000 BONDS OF SAID CITY TO PAY COSTS THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KINGSTON, ULSTER COUNTY, NEW YORK, by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all members of said Council, as follows:

Section 1. The Broadway and Grand Intersection Project, including costs incidental thereto, in and for the City of Kingston, Ulster County, New York, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$1,175,000.

Section 2. The plan for the financing thereof is (i) by the issuance of up to \$425,000 bonds of said City hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law; and (ii) by the appropriation of \$750,000 grant monies.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivision 20 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said City of Kingston, Ulster County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said City, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the City Comptroller, the chief fiscal officer of said City. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said City Comptroller, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters, except as provided herein relating to such bonds herein authorized including date, denominations, maturities, interest payment dates, and whether said bonds shall be repaid in accordance with a schedule providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same and also including the consolidation with other issues, shall be determined by the City Comptroller, the chief fiscal officer of such City. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals in addition to those required by section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the City Comptroller shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 7. This ordinance shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this ordinance, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 8. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said City is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this Bond Ordinance are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 9. The proceeds of the bonds herein authorized and any bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of said bonds may be applied to reimburse the City for expenditures made after the effective date of this ordinance for the purpose for which said bonds are authorized. The foregoing statement of intent with respect to reimbursement is made in conformity with Treasury Regulation Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Department.

Section 10. This ordinance, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in summary form in The Daily Freeman, the official newspaper of said City hereby designated for such purpose, together with a notice of the City Clerk in substantially the form set forth in paragraph a of Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

I am requesting that section 405 of the City Code be amended to require that in the C2 and C3 zones in the City of Kingston, any and all proposals for "Formula Retail stores" shall require review and approval by the Historic Landmarks Preservation Board and that any such store not be permitted absent the issuance of a certificate of appropriateness by the HLPC.

This would apply primarily to our 3 main historic corridors of Uptown, Broadway Midtown and Broadway Rondout. This would NOT apply to such stores who are already here - they would be grandfathered. This would also NOT apply to Kingston Plaza.

A "formula retail store" means a type of retail store or food sales establishment that is required to maintain a standardized ("formula") array of services and/or merchandise, trademark, logo, service, sign, décor, architecture, layout, uniform, or similar standardized feature.

It is my belief that Kingston is a city that is rich with history, diversity and beauty with a unique business community made up of mostly small business owners, something that is rare in the United States. I believe that the City of Kingston should be working to build upon our local legacy of locally owned business and that this legacy enhances the quality of life of our residents. I believe that regulating "formula stores" will help establish that Kingston is a City that is devoted to small business and that we will take proactive steps to help small business thrive in our City.

I have been in contact with Corporation Council and am working with them to draft specific language to address this issue. I expect that the proposed legislation will be available prior to the October Laws and Rules meeting. 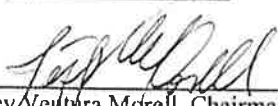

Dear President Shaut,

I am requesting that section 405 of the City Code be amended to authorize the Zoning Board of Appeals to grant temporary variances for property owners to lease properties for uses that are not currently permitted under the Zoning Code. The variances would be for a limited period of time in order to address hardships that have been specifically caused by the COVID emergency.

The applicant would be required to establish by competent documentary proof to the ZBA that he/she has made reasonable efforts to lease the space for a permitted use, that such efforts have been unsuccessful and that the reasons for the inability to lease the space is specifically related to the declared state of emergency. The ZBA would then review the proposed use and, after a public hearing, would determine if the use is appropriate. In addition, any variance could not be used as a basis to apply for or secure a more permanent variance at the conclusion of the state of emergency.

I have been in contact with Corporation Council's office and expect that I can have specific language available prior to the October Laws and Rules meeting. I would respectfully request that this communication be referred to the Laws and Rules committee for consideration at the October meeting and hopeful action by the full council in November.

Members of the Common Council:

Quarry Waters, LLC and The Scenic Hudson Land Trust, Inc., respectfully request that the City abandon its interests in the right of way known as North Street, to the extent that said right of way is located on the Property (the "ROW"). As you are aware, we are working with the City, New York State and local stakeholders to develop a park on the Property. New York State has expressed an interest in purchasing the Property and, abandonment of the City's interests in the right of way will facilitate that process and the park's development. For your reference, please see the enclosed map of North Street within the Property.

We recently granted the City a public access easement over the Property for the construction, maintenance, and use of a new segment of the Kingston Greenline (the "Trail Easement"). This trail, which will also become part of the Empire State Trail, is located partially within the City's ROW. The remainder of the trail will diverge from North Street and be closer to the shoreline, thereby providing wonderful views of, and potential access opportunities to, the Hudson River. The Trail Easement is the realization of a longstanding City goal, to expand its Greenline and increase public access to the River.

We understand that the segment of North Street located on the Property has been closed to the public for more than a decade and that the City has not maintained the road for at least that long. Additionally, the only active utility within the City's ROW is a Central Hudson gas line, pursuant to a 1949 easement (the "1949 Easement"). The gas line runs from the southern portion of the ROW, to a separate easement that travels northwest and away from North Street. Neither easement will be extinguished by abandonment of the City's ROW and Central Hudson has indicated that they do not object to the City taking such action. Central Hudson has however requested that their North Street easement rights be confirmed. We are working with them to determine the appropriate way to achieve this.

Verizon also has an easement within the City's ROW, however Verizon officials have advised us that they no longer require this easement and removed their infrastructure from the Property several years ago and, therefore do not object to abandonment of the ROW. Furthermore, Verizon holds reserved rights pursuant to an agreement with Central Hudson, which will allow them access the Property via the 1949 Easement if a future need arises. We have asked them to provide written confirmation of their consent to the ROW abandonment.

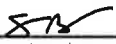
There is no water or sewer infrastructure within the ROW. We understand that the City may, in the future, wish to install such utilities. We are prepared to work cooperatively with the City to provide access for same should the need arise. New York State has given the City the same assurance, in the event they take ownership of the Property.

Within the Property, North Street runs north from the southern boundary (shared with Hutton Brickyards) up to the shared City/Town of Ulster boundary, where it intersects with John Street (also within the Property) in the Town. Earlier this year, the Town abandoned its rights in the John Street portion of the right of way.

The City's interest in providing public access through the Property has been fulfilled by the newly granted Trail Easement. We have taken appropriate steps to ensure that the City does and will have access to necessary utilities after abandonment of its ROW. We therefore respectfully request that the City of Kingston consider this application to formally abandon all interests that it currently has in the right of way and convey such interest by quitclaim deed to Quarry Waters, LLC. We further request that this application be referred to all appropriate committees and be heard at the next Common Council meeting, if possible. Formal abandonment of the road will help facilitate the development of a robust public amenity that will serve all of Kingston and the surrounding areas.

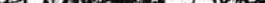
