We are pleased to present the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) of the Town of Lantana, Florida (Town) for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025. Responsibility for both the accuracy of the data and the completeness and fairness of the presentation, including all disclosures, rests with Town management. To the best of our knowledge, the enclosed data is accurate in all material respects and is reported in a manner designed to present fairly the financial position and the results of operations of the various funds. All disclosures necessary to enable the reader to gain an adequate understanding of the Town's financial activities have been included.

The organization and content of this report is based primarily on the financial reporting standards set by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and recommendations of the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA).

The Town's management is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure designed to ensure the assets of the Town are protected from loss, theft, or misuse. Furthermore, management ensures that accounting data is adequate for the preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Internal accounting controls are designed to provide reasonable assurance regarding the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition. The controls are also intended to provide assurance as to the reliability of financial statements and accountability for assets. We believe the Town's internal accounting controls adequately safeguard assets and provide reasonable assurance as to the proper recording of financial transactions.

In accordance with Section 218.32 Florida Statutes, the Town engaged the firm of Grau & Associates to perform an independent audit of the Town's accounts and records. They have issued an unmodified (clean) opinion on the Town's financial statements for the year ended September 30, 2025. The Independent Auditors' Report is included in the Financial Section of this report.

Management's discussion and analysis (MD&A) immediately follows the independent auditor's report and provides a narrative introduction, overview and analysis of the basic financial statements. The MD&A complements this letter of transmittal and should be read in conjunction with it.

PROFILE OF THE TOWN OF LANTANA

The Town is less than three (3) square miles and is located in Palm Beach County on the southeast Florida coast between West Palm Beach and Fort Lauderdale – 20 minutes south of West Palm Beach and 40 minutes north of Fort Lauderdale. The Town derived its governmental authority from a charter granted by the State of Florida Legislature in 1921. The Town developed primarily as a residential community and maintains a strong commitment to its over 12,000 residents, focusing on neighborhood programs, services, improving roadway infrastructure and redevelopment.

The Town operates under the Council-Manager form of government. The governing body of the Town is the Town Council, which formulates policies for the Town's administration. The Town Council is comprised of a mayor and four (4) councilmembers elected at-large for three-year terms. Town Council appoints the Town Manager who serves as the Town's Chief Executive Officer and is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Town and the implementation of the policies established by Town Council.

The Town provides a full range of municipal services including police, planning and zoning, parks and recreation, library, water and wastewater services, public works, marine safety, road improvements and general administrative services. Fire/Rescue services are contracted with Palm Beach County and solid waste collection is contracted with Coastal Waste & Recycling of Florida, Inc.

The Town's water and wastewater utility incorporates one (1) water treatment plant with a 3.84 million gallon per day permit. The customer base is 100% within the Town's limits servicing over 3,600 accounts. Wastewater treatment is processed by the East Central Regional Wastewater Treatment Facility through an agreement and connection with the City of Lake Worth Beach.

The Town maintains budgetary control at the department level of expenditure. As of fiscal year-end, all expenditures required the Finance Director's authorization. Purchases over \$15,000 required the Town Manager's authorization, and purchases of more than \$25,000 required competitive bid and Town Council approval. Exceptions to the bid process can occur in the following cases: sole source vendor; purchases where another governmental agency or purchasing cooperative has an established agreement with vendor; and/or declaration of an emergency by the Town Council or Manager. Budget transfers within departmental cost centers are handled administratively. The Town Council approves budget transfers between departments and budget amendments that increase or decrease total appropriations of a fund. The Town also maintains an encumbrance accounting system as one technique of accomplishing budgetary control. Encumbered amounts lapse at year-end, unless it is an ongoing project, with capital outlay appropriations added into and re-appropriated as part of the subsequent year's budget.

The Town Council adopts a formal budget for the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds (excluding the Police Forfeiture Fund), the Internal Service Fund and the Water and Sewer Fund. A statement comparing the budgeted revenue and expenditures to actual revenues and expenditures for the General Fund and the budgeted Special Revenue Funds is presented in the financial section of this report.

LOCAL ECONOMY & FINANCIAL PLANNING

The Town's economic base includes commercial ventures such as Publix, The Carlisle Palm Beach and Costco Wholesale Warehouse as well as approximately 500 smaller businesses including restaurants, retail and service and repair related businesses. These businesses are located in the general commercial corridors and in the Industrial Park properties on the north end of Town.

Over the past 10 years, the Town's population has slightly increased to over 12,000. Taxable property values have consistently increased since fiscal year 2013 and exceeded \$1 billion beginning in fiscal year 2019. However, we strive to manage Town finances using a very conservative approach. Listed below is how the current fund balance of \$27,095,492 within the General Fund is allocated.

The unassigned fund balance is equal to 84% of the adopted fiscal year 2026 General Fund budget. As a coastal community, we are prone to hurricanes and storm events which may require funds to be immediately available for recovery and mitigation purposes.

With the Town's full range of municipal services, we continue to pursue alternatives that will increase annual financial resources while developing and monitoring delivery of public services at minimal cost. The Town's goal of matching revenues to expenditures is on track for maintaining a sound financial condition through prudent administration and oversight. This is also accomplished through reviewing and updating our five-year capital plan in conjunction with revenue projections. However, no formal policy has been created for this review.

MAJOR INITIATIVES

- The Town's special events program, "Enjoy Lantana!" continued to be successful with events such as: Movies at the Park, Annual Barefoot Mailman Family Beach Day, Eggstravaganza Egg Hunt, July 4th Celebration, Haunted Nature Preserve, Veterans Day Recognition, Farm Share Event, beach cleanup, Arbor Day Planting, September 11th Ceremony and the Winterfest.
- Engaged engineering services for the renovations to lift stations 3, 4, 8, and 9.
- Worked to treat and remove invasive plants and trees from the Lantana Nature Preserve (Preserve) and to identify the different exotic plants. In addition, we replaced the Preserve's large deteriorated timber pedestrian bridge and the small bridge.

- Councilmembers and the Town Manager traveled to Tallahassee for PBC Day, to provide networking opportunities; to personally observe our Legislative process; and to meet with members of our lobbying firm, State Legislators, and their staff to gain their support to fund the Town's State Appropriation Requests.
- The Town held a Visioning Session Workshop at Finland House in preparation for the upcoming FY 2025/26 Budget.
- The Town redesigned its website to enhance community engagement, making it more user-friendly. Residents can now subscribe to receive important notices and stay informed about upcoming events.
- The Town launched the new Lantana Video Tour this year, created in collaboration with CGI Productions. This interactive video invited viewers to explore the heart of our vibrant community, showcasing our charming neighborhoods and scenic beauty, the dedication and professionalism of our public safety services, and the resources and welcoming atmosphere of the Library.
- Implemented the Neighbors Helping Neighbors program to connect residents in need with willing community volunteers, and the Homeowner Toolbox: Assistance, Grants, and Guidance Guide to connect residents with resources, programs, and support available to help maintain, improve, and care for their homes.
- We held another very successful Summer Reading Program, with over 400 people attending the kick-off block party and an additional 1k participants in the incentivized reading club and summer programs at the Library. Our Summer Reading Program saw an increase of 55% over last summer's statistics.
- We partnered with the Literacy Coalition of PBC for a pilot program to provide one-on-one tutoring sessions for struggling readers in grades 1-3. The program launched late September 2024, and continues every Thursday from 3:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. The literacy program was available throughout the summer.
- Successfully transitioned from handheld to tablets for the meter readers.
- Worked closely with Florida Power & Light Company (FPL) to repair non-functional streetlights.
- Restored the Centennial Sculpture at Bicentennial Park.
- Worked with PBC's Traffic Division and our traffic engineer to enhance Traffic Light Synchronization on Lantana Rd.
- Completed the Sea Pines Stormwater Pump Station Construction Project.
- The installation of an emergency water main connection with the City of Lake Worth Beach (LWB) through an interlocal agreement (ILA) has been completed.

AWARDS

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the Town of Lantana, Florida for its Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2024. This was the 26th consecutive year that the Town has received this prestigious award. In order to be awarded a Certificate of Achievement, a governmental unit must publish an easily readable and efficiently organized Annual Comprehensive Financial Report whose contents conform to program standards. Such reports must satisfy both generally accepted accounting principles and applicable legal requirements. A Certificate of Achievement is valid for a period of only one (1) year. We believe our current report continues to conform to Certificate of Achievement Program requirements, and we are submitting it to GFOA to determine its eligibility for another certificate.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

The preparation of this report could not have been accomplished without the dedicated service of the entire Finance Department. In addition, we would also like to express our sincere appreciation of Gary Ruebush, Assistant Finance Director who greatly assisted in the preparation of the Town's financial statements.

We especially wish to thank the Town Council for their interest and support in planning and conducting the financial operations of the Town in a responsible and progressive manner. With this support, the Town is able to achieve and maintain a high degree of fiscal health and responsibility.

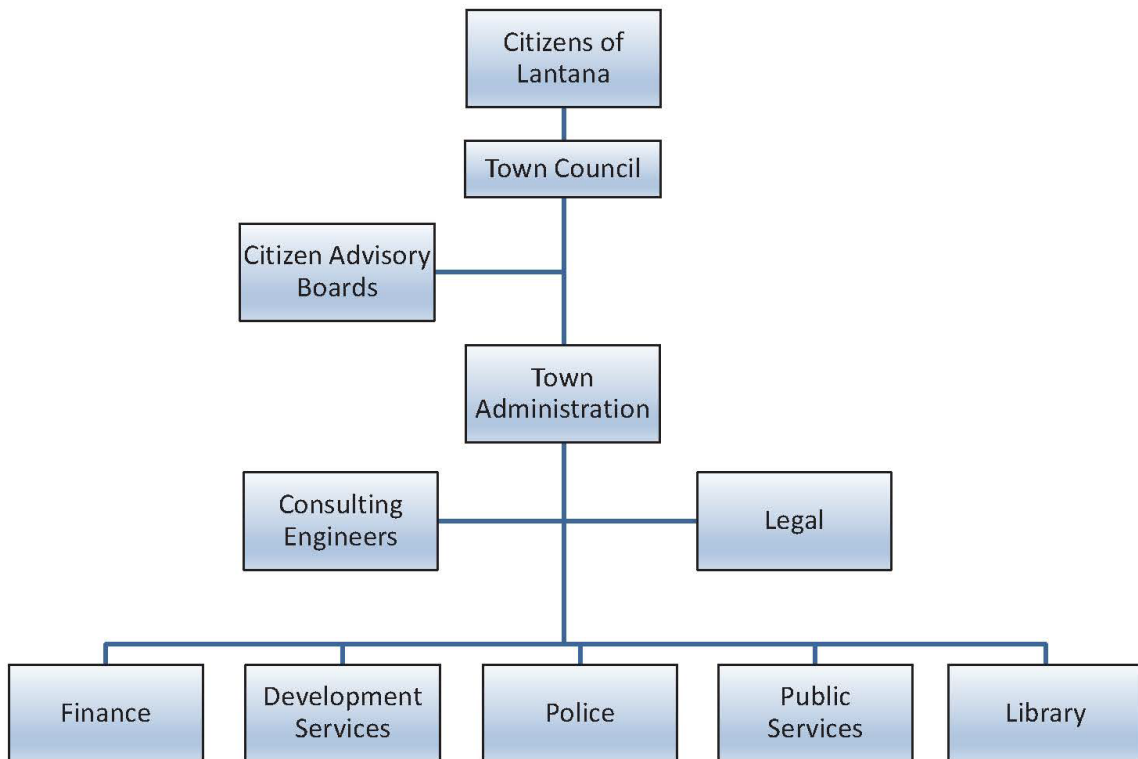

Independent Auditor's Report

To the Honorable Mayor, Members of the

Report on Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinions

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lantana, Florida, (the "Town") as of and for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, based on our audit and the report of other auditors, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town as of September 30, 2025, and the respective changes in financial position, and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the fiscal year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We did not audit the financial statements of the Town of Lantana Police Relief and Pension Fund ("Pension Fund"), which represent 99.6% and 97.1% respectively of the total assets and total additions of the aggregate remaining fund information. Those financial statements were audited by other auditors. Those financial statements were audited by other auditors whose report thereon has been furnished to us, and our opinion, insofar as it relates to the amounts included for the Pension Fund, is based solely on the report of the other auditors.

Basis for Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

The Town's management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis, budgetary comparison information, schedules of changes in net pension and OPEB liability and related ratios, and schedule of contributions be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We and other auditors have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements. The combining and individual non-major fund financial statements, non-major budgetary comparison schedules, schedule of expenditures of state financial assistance projects, as required by Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General of the State of Florida, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual non-major fund financial statements, non-major budgetary comparison schedules, and schedule of expenditures of state financial assistance projects are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual non-major fund financial statements, non-major budgetary comparison schedules, schedule of expenditures of state financial assistance projects are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Information Included in the Financial Report

Management is responsible for the other information included in the financial report. The other information comprises the introductory and statistical sections but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. Our opinions on the financial statements do not cover the other information, and we do not express an opinion or any form of assurance thereon. In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and consider whether a material inconsistency exists between the other information and the financial statements, or the other information otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work performed, we conclude that an uncorrected material misstatement of the other information exists, we are required to describe it in our report.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 25, 2026, on our consideration of the Town's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Town's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

The purpose of financial reporting, in general, is to provide the readers of the financial statements with information that will help them make decisions and draw conclusions about an entity. As management of the Town of Lantana (Town), Florida, we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with information that we have furnished in our accompanying transmittal letter beginning on Page i, and the accompanying basic financial statements.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The Town's net position at September 30, 2025 was \$73.5 million. Of this amount, \$35.9 million (unrestricted net position) may be used to meet the Town's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- Governmental activities net position was \$44.5 million, an increase of \$1,832,021.
- Business-type activities net position was \$28.9 million, an increase of \$1,277,474.
- Total revenues from all sources were \$29.5 million, a decrease of \$67,959.
- Total costs of all Town programs were \$26.5 million, an increase of \$707,710.
- Total revenues and other financing sources in the General Fund exceeded total expenditures and other financing uses by \$2,041,645.
- At the end of the current fiscal year, unassigned fund balance for the General Fund was \$15.7 million, or 94.4% of total General Fund expenditures.
- The Town's total recorded liability for the implicit rate subsidy of other postemployment benefits (OPEB) was \$671,072, a decrease of \$8,207. Governmental and business-type activities decreased \$7,793 and \$414, respectively.

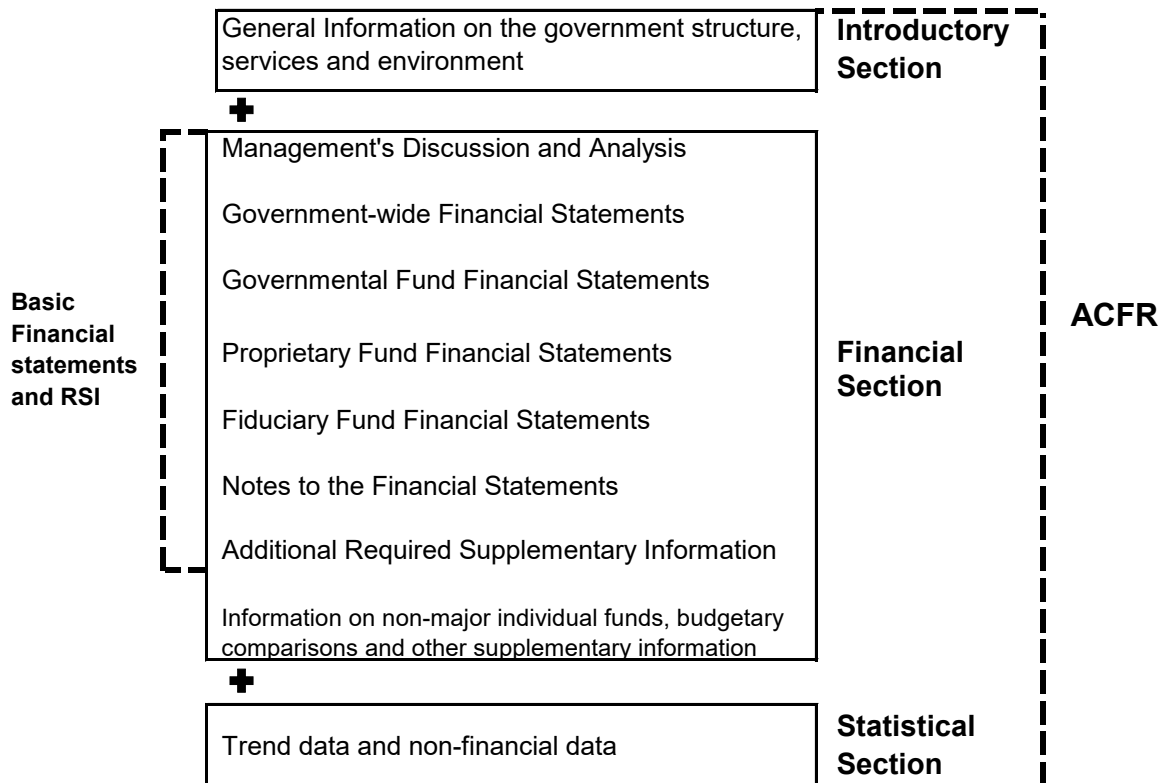
OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements. The three components of the basic financial statements are: (1) Government-wide financial statements, which include the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities. These statements provide information about the activities of the Town as a whole. (2) Fund financial statements illustrate how these services were financed in the short term, as well as what remains for future spending. Fund financial statements also report the Town's operations in more detail than the government-wide statements by providing information about the Town's most significant funds. (3) Notes to the financial statements.

Other information such as budgetary comparisons, statements and schedules of the non-major governmental funds, and the statistical section contains data such as financial trends, debt capacity, and demographic, economic and operating information to assist the reader in better understanding the operations of the Town. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements.

The financial statement focus is on both the Town as a whole (government-wide) and on the major individual funds. The following graph shows the relationship between the ACFR and the basic financial statements and Required Supplementary Information ("RSI").

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

A frequently asked question regarding the Town's financial health is whether the year's activities contributed positively to the overall financial well-being. The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities report information about the Town as a whole and about its activities in a way that helps answer this question. These statements include all assets liabilities, and deferred inflows and outflows of resources using the *accrual basis of accounting*, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account, regardless of when cash is received or paid.

These two statements report the Town's net position and changes therein. Net position, the difference between assets plus deferred outflows of resources and liabilities plus deferred inflows of resources, is one way to measure the Town's financial health, or financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position is an indicator of whether the financial health is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities present information about the following:

- Governmental activities – All of the Town's basic services are considered to be governmental activities, including general government, community development, public safety, public services, library, and recreation.
- Property taxes, sales taxes, utility taxes, and franchise fees finance most of these activities. Proprietary activities/Business-type activities – The Town charges a fee to customers to cover all or most of the cost of the services provided. The Town's Water and Sewer Utility system is reported in this category.

FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The fund financial statements provide detailed information about the most significant funds – not the Town as a whole. Some funds are required to be established by State law. However, management establishes other funds to meet legal responsibilities associated with the use of certain taxes, grants, and other monies. The Town's three kinds of funds, *governmental*, *proprietary*, and *fiduciary* use different accounting approaches as explained below:

- *Governmental funds* – Most of the Town's basic services are reported in governmental funds. Governmental funds focus on how resources flow in and out, with the balances remaining at year-end that are available for spending. These funds are reported using an accounting method called the *modified accrual* accounting method, which measures cash and all other *financial* assets that can readily be converted to cash. The governmental fund statements provide a detailed *short-term* view of the Town's general governmental operations and the basic services it provides. Governmental fund information shows whether there are more or less financial resources that can be spent in the near future to finance the Town's programs. The basic governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 17-20 of this report.
- *Proprietary funds* – These fund financial statements consist of a Statement of Net Position, Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position and Statement of Cash Flows. These statements are prepared on the accrual basis which is the accounting basis used to prepare the government-wide financial statements.

The Town uses Enterprise Funds to account for business-type activities that charge fees to customers for the use of specific goods or services. These funds are used to report the same functions presented as business-type activities in the government-wide financial statements. Internal Service Funds are used to account for services provided and billed on an internal basis. The Town uses Internal Service Funds to account for its workers compensation and general liability expenses.

The basic proprietary fund financial statements can be found on pages 21-24 of this report.

- *Fiduciary funds* – Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the government. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statement because the resources of those funds are not available to support the Town's own programs. The accounting basis used for fiduciary funds is much like that used for proprietary funds. The basic fiduciary fund financial statements can be found on pages 25 and 26 of this report.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of a government's financial position. In the case of the Town, assets plus deferred outflow of resources exceeded liabilities by \$73.5 million, which increased \$3,109,495 from the previous fiscal year.

The largest portion of the Town's net position (41.3%) reflects its net investment in capital assets (e.g., land, buildings, machinery, and equipment), used to acquire those assets that are still outstanding. The Town uses these capital assets to provide services to citizens; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the Town's net investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

The increase in the government's net position for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, was \$3,109,495 compared to an increase of \$3,885,164 for the previous fiscal year. Governmental and Business-type activities accounted for an increase of \$1,832,021 and \$1,277,474, respectively. Details of these changes are explained later in the analysis.

For both fiscal years presented, the Town was able to report positive balances in all categories of the net position for governmental and business-type activities.

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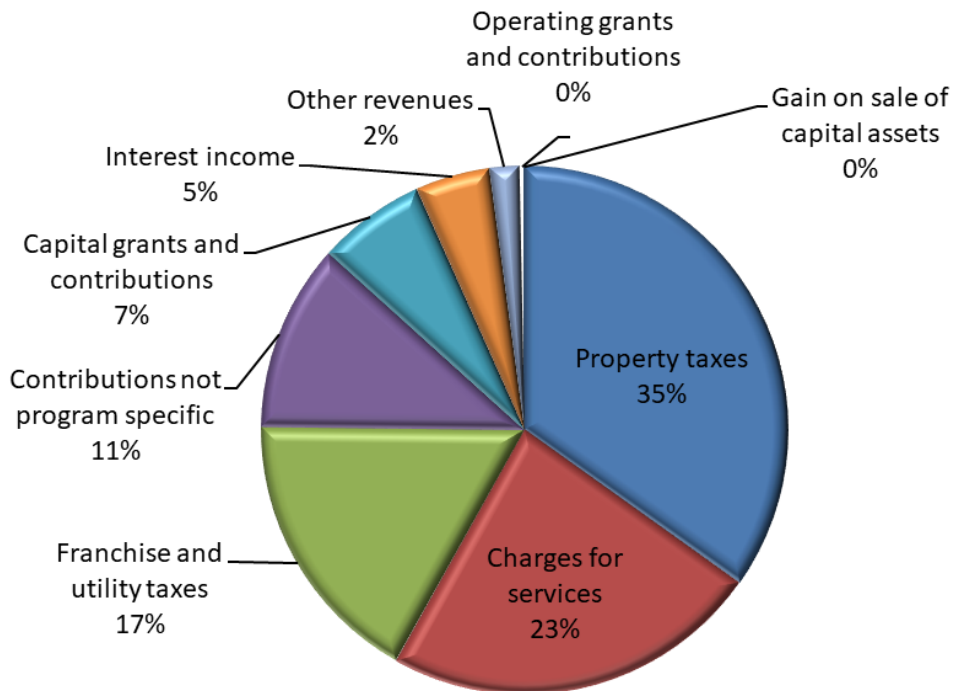

The net position for the Town's governmental activities increased \$1,832,021 compared to an increase of \$1,733,088 in the prior year. Significant variances from the prior year are as follows:

- Property taxes increased by \$549,553, or 8% which was a direct result of the total taxable value increasing while maintaining the millage rate at \$3.75 per \$1,000 of taxable value.
- Charges for Services remained relatively constant with a slight decrease of \$21,024. With such a small change, no one item was directly attributed to the change.
- Operating Grants and Contributions decreased by \$191,519 with no significant changes attributed to any one revenue source.
- Interest rates remained relatively constant at all-time highs, so while the revenue recognized was significant in the amount of \$921,774, rates are slowly coming down which resulted in a decrease of \$57,229 compared to the previous fiscal year.
- Total Cost of Services increased slightly by \$153,104, or 0.8% which is related to personnel costs increasing by a Cost of Living Adjustment to employees' salaries.

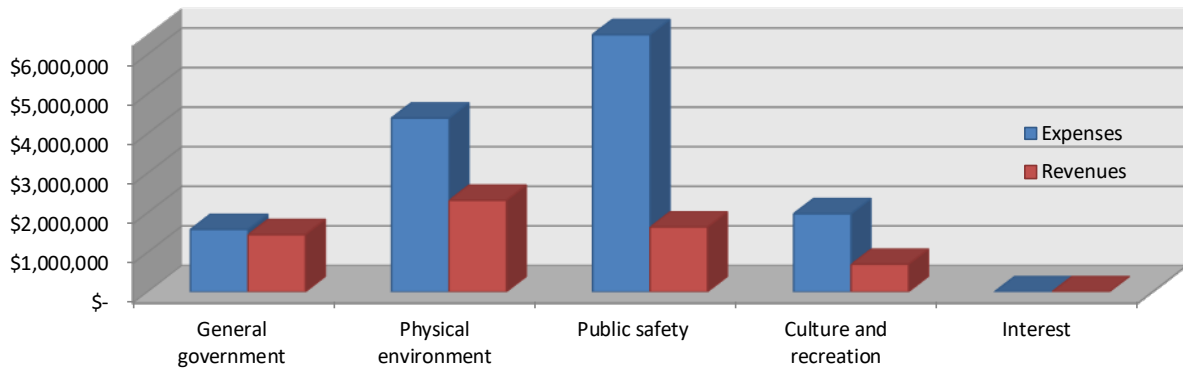
Town programs include general government, physical environment, public safety, and culture and recreational services. General government contains the following departments: legislative, executive, and finance. Physical environment contains public works, utilities, road and street maintenance. Public safety contains police and development services. Culture and recreation includes library, parks, and special events.

Each program's net cost (total cost, less revenues generated by the activities) is presented below. The net cost demonstrates the extent to which the Town's general taxes support each of the Town's programs.

The cost of all governmental activities this year was \$18.4 million. As shown in the Statement of Activities, those who directly benefited from the programs paid \$6.1 million of the cost, and \$12.3 million was financed through general revenues. Ad valorem taxes contributed 34.8% of total governmental activities revenues this fiscal year and 32.5% in the previous fiscal year. In fiscal year 2024/25, as property values increased, the Town adopted the same millage rate of \$3.75 which resulted in increased property tax revenues. Details are discussed later in the budget-to-actual analysis.

BUSINESS-TYPE ACTIVITIES

Business-type activities (Water and Sewer fund) increased the Town's net position by \$1,277,474 for fiscal year 2024/25. The net position of the proprietary fund at September 30, 2025, was \$28.9 million. The cost of providing all proprietary (business-type) activities this year increased \$554,606 compared to last year's total cost of \$7.5 million. As shown in the Statement of Activities, amounts paid through user fees were \$8,823,080 which increased \$972,634 due to a 3.3% rate increase effective the beginning of the fiscal year and increased water consumption. This also partially contributed to the increase in net position.

Expenses increased \$554,606 or 7.4%. As we continue with repairs and renovations to the water treatment plan and wastewater distribution system, costs significantly increased.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN'S FUNDS

As noted earlier, the Town uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN'S FUNDS (Continued)

Governmental Funds – The focus of the Town's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the Town's financing requirements. In particular, unassigned fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

As of the end of the current fiscal year, the Town's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$31,203,813, compared to \$28,853,906 in the prior fiscal year, an increase of \$2.3 million.

Approximately 50% or \$15,691,100 of the \$31.2 million combined ending fund balances (Governmental Funds) constitutes unassigned fund balance, which is available for spending at the government's discretion. Of the total fund balance, \$2,190 is non-spendable, \$13,340 will be used towards education and training within the Police Department, \$1,902,148 will be used towards the building permitting process, \$4,019,955 will be used for infrastructure projects, and \$120,376 for police forfeiture programs. Approximately \$5,605,704 is assigned for planned and committed projects not completed by the fiscal year end, and \$549,000 will cover the fiscal year 2025/26's budget deficit. Further, \$3.3 million is committed towards Council-directed projects.

The General Fund is the chief operating fund for the Town. As a measure of the General Fund's liquidity, it may be useful to compare both unassigned fund balance and total fund balance to the total fund expenditures. Unassigned fund balance represents 94.4% of total General Fund expenditures, while total fund balance represents 162.5% of that same amount.

The General Fund's total fund balance increased \$2,041,645 as well as the unassigned balance which increased by \$1,312,858 from \$14,423,592 to \$15,736,450. While many variables affect the increase, a significant factor were revenues exceeded initial expectations. As the economy performed better than expected, we recognized increases in property taxes, state revenue sharing and metered parking. We continued to recognize higher-than-typical interest income due to increased rates. Additionally, with the continued activity in the construction industry, we also saw building permit revenue exceed our expectations. And finally, increased electricity franchise and utility taxes were recognized likely due to increased consumption.

General Fund revenues increased \$341,622 from the previous fiscal year. Property taxes recognized an additional \$549,553 through increased property values while levying the same millage rate of \$3.75. We also recognized increased building activity through our Business Tax Receipts which exceeded expectations by \$55,500 and fines derived from Code Enforcement exceeded budget by \$140,500.

Expenditures within the General Fund increased by \$1,110,416 to \$16,676,736 which can be most attributed to increased personnel costs (salary and benefits) which increased by \$753,300 when compared to the previous fiscal year. Increases to Public Safety costs of \$584,500 make up the majority of the increase. The Department's personnel costs increased due to scheduled salary increases included in their Collective Bargaining Agreement. We also continue to invest capital projects with costs reaching almost \$900,000. Further details in a later section.

A Special Revenue Fund designated to account for funds received from the American Rescue Plan Act received its final of two tranche payments in FY 2021/22 with only interest income as a revenue source. The Town identified projects to spend down the remaining funds which we did and completed prior to the December 31, 2026 due date.

The Infrastructure Surtax fund was created as a Special Revenue Fund to account for the voter-approved "Penny Tax" earmarked for infrastructure projects. Beginning January 1, 2017, the tax continued until December 31, 2025. The projects are monitored and reported to a committee coordinated by the Palm Beach County League of Cities. This year's fund revenue included \$1,317,923 of sales tax and interest income. The Town incurred \$526,861 in project costs resulting in a fund balance after its ninth year of \$4,019,955.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE TOWN'S FUNDS (Continued)

The Police Forfeiture Fund, also known as the Law Enforcement Trust Fund, remained relatively flat with fund balance increasing \$751 to \$120,376.

GENERAL FUND BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

The General Fund budget was amended as follows: increase in revenues of \$1,803,963, increase in carryforward of \$3,800,868, increase in appropriations of \$5,546,280, and increase of transfers out \$58,551.

Variations between adopted and revised budgets include:

- Increased budget for insurance proceeds for claims submitted of \$83,199
- Donations and contributions of \$1,155
- Additional State grant funding of \$91,168
- Increased budget for legal services of \$16,000
- Carry-forward of capital outlay programs from the previous fiscal year of \$3,562,199

The most significant variances between the final budget and actual amounts were as follows:

- Actual revenues for the 2025 fiscal year were less than the budget by \$723,901. The greatest variances include the following:
 - Surplus property taxes of \$70,318
 - Surplus business tax receipts of \$55,479
 - Surplus building permits of \$117,833
 - Surplus metered parking of \$47,339
 - Surplus code fines of \$140,571
 - Surplus interest income of \$517,610
 - Deficit of \$62,504 for electric franchise fees and utility taxes
 - Deficit of \$43,069 for half-cent sales tax
 - Deficit of \$1,677,676 grants yet to be received; however, project costs were not incurred
- Expenditures were \$6,701,415 less than the final budget for the 2025 fiscal year. Most of the discrepancy, \$5,587,389 or 83%, is designated for contracts where the full cost has not been recognized and for funded projects yet to begin. Approximately \$604,000 in personnel costs were unspent due to staff vacancies.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

CAPITAL ASSETS

The capital assets of the Town are those assets that are used in the performance of Town functions. Capital assets include equipment, buildings, land, park facilities, etc. The Town previously elected to retroactively apply the capitalization requirements of GASB Statement No. 34 to major general infrastructure assets.

- The Town's net investment in capital assets for its governmental and business-type activities as of September 30, 2025, amounts to \$30.3 million.

Major capital asset events during the fiscal year included the following:

- Maddock Park portable access ramp - \$62,000
- Roofing improvements - \$171,000
- Computers and servers - \$235,000
- Vehicle & Heavy Equipment purchases - \$190,000

LONG-TERM DEBT

Currently, the Town uses debt financing on an as-needed basis. At the end of the current fiscal year, the Town's total debt was \$31,575, a decrease of \$12,878 as compared to the previous fiscal year. This is the result of payments made during the year to reduce outstanding debt while not incurring new debt.

No debt is backed by the full faith and credit of the government. Water and sewer revenues secure the bonds and notes, when applicable. During periods where leases are utilized, the corresponding equipment secures the debt.

In addition, the Town has a liability for compensated absences of \$1,461,702 and an OPEB liability of \$671,072. Additional information on the Town's debt can be found in Note 7 beginning on page 42 of this report.

NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AND ECONOMIC FACTORS

When developing next year's budget, the primary economic factor affecting the budget continued to be the uncertainty of the economy. We used a conservative approach when developing the General Fund revenue budget. Property taxes are anticipated to increase by \$421,000 as a budget-to-budget comparison. Overall, the total fund's revenue is anticipated to decrease approximately \$523,000 or 3% compared to FY 2025's actual revenues. Besides one-time revenue sources from the previous fiscal year, the other significant decreases include building permits as we see construction slowing, and anticipated reductions in code fines and interest income. Inflation, while still historically higher than normal, is expected to lessen its negative impact on the economy which will directly affect expenditures.

NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AND ECONOMIC FACTORS (Continued)

The taxable value of property is anticipated to continue increasing in the coming year. Increased taxable value can translate into additional revenue when maintaining or raising the millage rate. Property tax is the single largest revenue source within the General Fund accounting for 40% of the fund. The budget was crafted using a 7% increase in taxable property values while maintain the millage rate at \$3.75 per \$1,000 which is 6.2% above the roll-back rate of \$3.5322. This translates into almost \$350,000 of additional tax revenue to be recognized compared to the previous fiscal year.

Palm Beach County provides fire rescue services using an MSTU (municipal services taxing unit) and tax Lantana property owners \$3.4581 per \$1,000 of taxable value. This rate is deducted from the maximum allowable tax rate of 10 mills leaving 6.5419 mills available.

As the economy continues to be unpredictable, we'll continue employing a strategic plan to conservatively budget revenues and reduce expenditures wherever and whenever possible using excess reserves only when warranted and approved by our Council.

We anticipate taxable values will continue to increase above the market as the Water Tower Commons project continues and is subsequently added to the tax roll. Also, redevelopment at the site formerly known as Kmart was approved for phasing in 426 dwelling units and 21,967 square feet of commercial space which is anticipated to assist in revenue growth in upcoming years.

The Town continues to retain a healthy fund balance within the General Fund. The fiscal year 2025 unassigned fund balance is approximately \$15.7 million. When comparing this as a percentage to fiscal year 2026 budgeted expenditures, it can be used as a decent indicator of the Town's fiscal health. The unassigned balance accounts for 84% of fiscal year 2026's General Fund originally adopted operating budget (not including debt or capital); however, even when including the total adopted budget, it still accounts for 84%. A portion of the assigned fund balance (\$646,794) is earmarked for projects currently in progress but anticipated to conclude in the following year. Approximately \$4.96 million of the assigned balances will be used for projects approved, but yet to begin. Finally, approximately \$549,000 of the assigned fund balance will be used to fund the excess expenditures over revenues in fiscal year 2026.

The use of the remaining fund balance changes from year to year. In some years, large capital equipment is purchased; in other years, it's the Council's direction to refrain from its use. Finally, as we continue to grow fund balance, it will assist the funding of future years' projects.

In considering the Town's budget for fiscal year 2025/26, the Town Council and management were conservative as to the growth of revenues and expenditures.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Town of Lantana, Florida (the Town) was originally incorporated in 1921 pursuant to Chapter 8998, Laws of Florida. It was re-incorporated in 1931 by Chapter 15302, Laws of Florida. The Town operates under a Council-Manager form of government. The Town is governed by an elected Mayor and a four-member Town Council (the "Council"), which appoints a Town Manager. The Town provides the following services: public safety, recreation, sanitation, streets and roads, planning and zoning, water and sewer, and general administrative services.

The basic financial statements of the Town have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The following is a summary of the Town's more significant policies:

a. Reporting Entity

Under governmental accounting and financial reporting standards, the Town's reporting entity consists of the Town, organizations for which the Town is financially accountable and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the Town are such that exclusion would cause the Town's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. The Town is considered financially accountable if it appoints a voting majority of an organization's governing body and it is able to impose its will on that organization. The Town may also be financially accountable if an organization is fiscally dependent on the primary government regardless of the authority of the organization's governing board. Legally separate organizations outside of the primary government that meet the criteria for financial accountability are considered component units. Based upon the application of these criteria, there were no organizations that met the criteria described above.

b. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the Town. For the most part, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services or privileges provided by a given function or segment and, 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds, proprietary funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements. All remaining non-major governmental funds are aggregated and reported as non-major funds.

c. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the proprietary fund and fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the Town considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences, are recorded only when payment is due.

Property taxes, franchise fees, other taxes, permits, fees and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period, if available. Revenues for expenditure driven grants are recognized when the qualifying expenditures are incurred and resources are available. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the Town.

The Town reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund - The General Fund is the primary operating fund of the Town and is used to account for all financial resources applicable to the general operations of the Town government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Infrastructure Surtax Fund — This fund is used to account for restricted funds designated by Florida Statutes for infrastructure expenditures.

The Town reports the following major enterprise funds:

Water and Sewer Fund - The Water and Sewer Fund is used to account for the provision of water and sewer services to residents of the service area. All activities to provide such services are accounted for in this fund, including administration, generation, transmission, distribution, collection, pumping, treatment, disposal and customer service.

Stormwater and Flooding Improvement Fund— This fund is used to account for all revenues from the stormwater and flooding improvement assessments, grants and other funding sources and expenditures from which expenditures relating to the stormwater and flooding improvements shall be paid from.

Additionally, the Town reports the following fund types:

Internal Service Fund - The Internal Service Fund is used to account for insurance premiums and deductibles which are funded by other Town funds on a cost reimbursement basis.

Pension Trust Fund - The Pension Trust Fund accounts for the activities of the Police Relief and Pension Fund, which accumulates resources for pension benefit payments to qualified employees.

c. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation (Continued)

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are charges between the Town's utility functions and various other functions of the Town. Elimination of these charges would distort the direct costs and program revenues reported for the various functions concerned.

Amounts reported as program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions. Internally dedicated resources are reported as general revenues rather than as program revenues. Likewise, general revenues include all taxes.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from non-operating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the Water and Sewer Fund and the Internal Service Fund are charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses for the Water and Sewer Fund and the Internal Service Fund include the cost of sales and services, general and administrative expenses, depreciation and amortization. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as non-operating revenues and expenses.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Town's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as needed.

d. New Accounting Standards Adopted

During fiscal year 2025, the Town adopted new accounting standards as follows:

GASB 101: Compensated Absences:

This statement, issued in June 2022 and effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2023, updates the recognition and measurement guidance for compensated absences. This statement requires that liabilities for compensated absences be recognized for leave that has not been used and for leave that has been used but not yet paid in cash or settled through noncash means.

GASB 102: Certain Risk Disclosures:

This statement, issued in December 2023 and effective for fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2024, requires disclosures about certain risks that could significantly affect a governmental entity's financial position.

e. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position or Equity

1. Deposits and Investments

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, time and demand deposits. The Town maintains a cash pool that is available for use by all funds. Interest earned on pooled cash is allocated to each of the funds based on the fund's average equity balance on a monthly basis.

The State Board of Administration's ("SBA") Local Government Surplus Funds Trust Fund ("Florida PRIME") is a "2a-7 like" pool. A "2a-7 like" pool is an external investment pool that is not registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") as an investment company, but nevertheless has a policy that it will, and does, operate in a manner consistent with the SEC's Rule 2a-7 of the Investment Company Act of 1940, which comprises the rules governing money market funds. Thus, the pool operates essentially as a money market fund. The Town has reported its investment in Florida PRIME at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes.

The Town records all interest revenue related to investment activities in the respective funds. Investments are measured at amortized cost or reported at fair value as required by generally accepted accounting principles.

Cash and cash equivalents, for purposes of the statement of cash flows, includes pooled cash and investments which are defined as short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

2. Interfund Receivables and Payables

Activity between funds that is representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the fiscal year is referred to as either due to/from other funds. Any residual balances outstanding between the governmental activities and business-type activities are reported in the government-wide financial statements as internal balances.

3. Receivables

Receivables include amounts due from other governments and others for services provided by the Town and for assessments related to the gas line project. Receivables are recorded and revenues are recognized as earned or as specific program expenditures/expenses are incurred. Allowances for uncollectible receivables are based upon historical trends and the periodic aging of receivables.

4. Inventories and Prepaid Costs

Inventories consist principally of materials and supplies held for consumption and are recorded at cost using the first-in first-out method. In the governmental funds, the cost of inventories are recorded as expenditures at the time of purchase, while in the proprietary funds, the cost of inventories are recorded as expenses when consumed. In the governmental funds, reported inventories are offset in a non-spendable fund balance category which indicates that they do not constitute available spendable resources.

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid costs using the consumption method in both government-wide and fund financial statements.

5. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, equipment, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, bridges, sidewalks, and similar items) and intangible assets, are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. Capital assets are defined by the Town as assets with an initial individual cost of \$1,000 or more and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. For right-to-use leased assets and subscription-based information technology arrangements assets, the same estimated minimum useful life is used (in excess of one year), but only those right-to-use leased assets and subscription-based information technology arrangements assets that have an initial individual value of more than \$15,000 are reported as capital assets. Purchased or constructed assets are recorded at actual cost or estimated historical cost if actual cost is unavailable (except for intangible right-to-use leased assets, the measurement of which is discussed in Note 1.d.6 below and intangible subscription-based information technology arrangements assets which are measured in a similar manner to intangible right-to-use leased assets). Donated capital assets are recorded at acquisition value at the date of donation.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the asset's life are not capitalized. Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Tangible capital assets of the Town are depreciated using the straight-line method over the following useful lives:

Intangible capital assets consist of a right-to-use leased equipment, a right of use of the City of Lake Worth wastewater facilities, as well as computer software. These assets are being amortized using the straight-line method over the following useful lives:

6. Leases

Lessee: When the Town is a lessee for a noncancellable lease the Town recognizes lease liabilities and intangible right-to-use leased assets (lease assets) in the government-wide financial statements. The Town recognizes lease liabilities with an initial, individual value of \$15,000 or more.

At the commencement of a lease, the Town initially measures the lease liability at the present value of payments expected to be made during the lease term. Subsequently, the lease liability is reduced by the principal portion of lease payments made. The lease asset is initially measured as the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for lease payments made at or before the lease commencement date, plus certain initial direct costs. Subsequently, the lease asset is amortized on a straight-line basis over its useful life.

6. Leases (Continued)

Key estimates and judgments related to leases include how the Town determines (1) the discount rate it uses to discount the expected lease payments to present value, (2) lease term, and (3) lease payments.

- The Town uses the interest rate charged by the lessor as the discount rate. When the interest rate charged by the lessor is not provided, the Town generally uses its estimated incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for leases.
- The lease term includes the noncancellable period of the lease. Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability are composed of fixed payments and purchase option price that the Town is reasonably certain to exercise.

The Town monitors changes in circumstances that would require a remeasurement of its lease and will remeasure the lease asset and liability if certain changes occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of the lease liability.

Lease assets are reported with other capital assets and lease liabilities are reported with long term debt on the statement of net position.

Lessor: When the Town is a lessor for a noncancellable lease the Town recognizes lease receivables and deferred inflows of resources in the government-wide and governmental fund financial statements.

At the commencement of a lease, the Town initially measures the lease receivable at the present value of payments expected to be received during the lease term. Subsequently, the lease receivable is reduced by the principal portion of lease payments received. The deferred inflow of resources is initially measured as the initial amount of the lease receivable, adjusted for lease payments received at or before the lease commencement date. Subsequently, the deferred inflow of resources is recognized as revenue over the life of the lease term.

Key estimates and judgments include how the Town determines (1) the discount rate it uses to discount the expected lease receipts to present value, (2) lease term, and (3) lease receipts.

- The Town uses its estimated incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate for leases.
- The lease term includes the noncancellable period of the lease. Lease receipts included in the measurement of the lease receivable is composed of fixed payments from the lessee.

The Town monitors changes in circumstances that would require a remeasurement of its lease and will remeasure the lease receivable and deferred inflows of resources if certain changes occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of the lease receivable.

7. Unearned Revenue

Governmental funds report unearned revenue in connection with resources that have been received, but not yet earned.

8. *Deferred Outflows/Inflows of Resources*

Deferred outflows of resources represent a consumption of net assets that applies to future reporting period(s). For example, the Town would record deferred outflows of resources on the statement of net position related to debit amounts resulting from current and advance refundings resulting in the defeasance of debt (i.e., when there are differences between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount of the old debt).

Deferred inflows of resources represent an acquisition of net assets that applies to future reporting period(s). For example, when an asset is recorded in the governmental fund financial statements, but the revenue is unavailable, the Town reports a deferred inflow of resources on the balance sheet until such times as the revenue becomes available.

9. *Compensated Absences*

It is the Town's policy to permit employees to accumulate, within certain limits, earned but unused vacation time, sick leave, and compensatory time, which will be paid to employees upon separation from Town service. All vacation and sick leave pay and compensatory time is accrued when incurred in the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements. A liability for those amounts is reported in the governmental funds only if they have matured, for example, as a result of employee resignations and retirements.

10. *Long-Term Obligations*

In the government-wide financial statements long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the statement of net position. Bond premiums and discounts are deferred and amortized over the life of the Bonds. Bonds payable are reported net of applicable premiums or discounts. Bond issuance costs are expensed when incurred.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

11. *Net Position*

Net position is the difference between assets and deferred outflows of resources less liabilities and deferred inflows of resources. Net position of the government-wide and proprietary funds are categorized as net investment in capital assets, restricted or unrestricted. Net investment in capital assets, is that portion of net position that relates to the Town's capital assets reduced by accumulated depreciation and by any outstanding debt incurred to acquire, construct or improve those assets, excluding unexpended proceeds.

Restricted net position is that portion of net position that has been restricted for general use by external parties (creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments) or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Unrestricted net position consists of all net position that does not meet the definition of either of the other two components.

12. Fund Equity

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report non-spendable and restricted fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Assignments of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change.

The Town's accounting and finance policies are used to interpret the nature and/or requirements of the funds and their corresponding assignment of restricted, committed, assigned or unassigned. The Town has established a policy for its use of unassigned fund balance amounts.

The Town can establish limitations on the use of fund balance as follows:

Committed fund balance. These amounts can only be used for the specific purposes determined by a formal action (Ordinance) of the Town Council, the Town's highest level of decision making authority. Commitments may be changed or lifted only by the Town Council taking the same formal action (Ordinance) that imposed the constraint originally. Resources accumulated pursuant to stabilization arrangements sometimes are reported in this category.

Assigned fund balance. Includes spendable fund balance amounts that are constrained by the Town's intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Town Council has by resolution authorized the Town Manager to assign fund balance. This balance includes (a) all remaining amounts that are reported in governmental funds (other than the General Fund) that are not classified as nonspendable, restricted, or committed, and (b) amounts in the General Fund that are intended to be used for a specific purpose. Specific amounts that are not restricted or committed in a special revenue fund are assigned for the purposes in accordance with the nature of their fund type.

Assignment within the General Fund conveys that the intended use of those amounts is for a specific purpose that is narrower than the general purposes of the Town itself.

Additionally, the Town would first use committed fund balance, followed by assigned fund balance and then unassigned fund balance when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of the unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

13. Minimum Level of Unassigned Policy

Unassigned fund balance is the residual classification for the general fund and represents fund balance that has not been restricted, committed or assigned to specific purposes within the General Fund. If, after the annual audit, prior committed or assigned fund balance causes the unassigned fund balance to fall below 25% of general fund operating expenditures, the Town Manager will so advise Town Council in order for the necessary action to be taken to restore the unassigned fund balance to 25% of general fund operating expenditures. The Town shall take action necessary to restore the unassigned fund balance to acceptable levels within two years.

14. Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 2 – DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

DEPOSITS

All of the Town's deposits are held in qualified public depositories pursuant to State of Florida Statutes, Chapter 280, *Florida Security for Public Deposits Act*. Under the Act, every qualified public depository shall deposit with the Treasurer eligible collateral of the depository to be held subject to his or her order. The Treasurer, by rule, shall establish minimum required collateral pledging levels. The pledging level may range from 25% to 125% of the average monthly balance of public deposits depending upon the depository's financial condition and establishment period. All collateral must be deposited with an approved financial institution. Any potential losses to public depositors are covered by applicable deposit insurance, sale of securities pledged as collateral and, if necessary, assessments against other qualified public depositories of the same type as the depository in default.

INVESTMENTS - TOWN

The Town has adopted an investment policy in accordance with Florida Statutes to establish guidelines for the efficient management of its cash reserves. The Town is authorized to invest in obligations of the U.S. Treasury, its agencies and instrumentalities, certificates of deposit, the State Board of Administration investment pool, any intergovernmental investment pools authorized pursuant to Chapter 163 of the Florida Statutes, SEC registered money market funds with the highest credit quality rating from a nationally recognized rating agency, and securities of any interest in any open-end or closed-end management type investment company or investment trust registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, provided that the portfolio is limited to obligations of the U.S. government, its agencies and instrumentalities and to repurchase agreements fully collateralized by such U.S. government obligations and provided that such investment company or investment trust takes delivery of such collateral either directly or through an authorized custodian.

Fair Value Measurement – When applicable, the Town measures and records its investments using fair value measurement guidelines established in accordance with GASB Statements. The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques.

These guidelines recognize a three-tiered fair value hierarchy, in order of highest priority, as follows:

- **Level 1:** Investments whose values are based on unadjusted quoted prices for identical investments in active markets that the Town has the ability to access;
- **Level 2:** Investments whose inputs - other than quoted market prices - are observable either directly or indirectly; and,
- **Level 3:** Investments whose inputs are unobservable.

The fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the entire fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used should maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

For external investment pools that qualify to be measured at amortized cost, the pool's participants should also measure their investments in that external investment pool at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes. Accordingly, the Town's investments have been reported at amortized cost above.

External Investment Pool – With regard to redemption gates, Chapter 218.409(8)(a), Florida Statutes, states that “The principal, and any part thereof, of each account constituting the trust fund is subject to payment at any time from the moneys in the trust fund. However, the Executive Director may, in good faith, on the occurrence of an event that has a material impact on liquidity or operations of the trust fund, for 48 hours limit contributions to or withdrawals from the trust fund to ensure that the Board can invest moneys entrusted to it in exercising its fiduciary responsibility. Such action must be immediately disclosed to all participants, the Trustees, the Joint Legislative Auditing Committee, the Investment Advisory Council, and the Participant Local Government Advisory Council. The Trustees shall convene an emergency meeting as soon as practicable from the time the Executive Director has instituted such measures and review the necessity of those measures. If the Trustees are unable to convene an emergency meeting before the expiration of the 48-hour moratorium on contributions and withdrawals, the moratorium may be extended by the Executive Director until the Trustees are able to meet to review the necessity for the moratorium. If the Trustees agree with such measures, the Trustees shall vote to continue the measures for up to an additional 15 days. The Trustees must convene and vote to continue any such measures before the expiration of the time limit set, but in no case may the time limit set by the Trustees exceed 15 days.”

With regard to liquidity fees, Florida Statute 218.409(4) provides authority for the SBA to impose penalties for early withdrawal, subject to disclosure in the enrollment materials of the amount and purpose of such fees. At present, no such disclosure has been made.

As of September 30, 2025, there were no redemption fees or maximum transaction amounts, or any other requirements that serve to limit a participant's daily access to 100% of their account value.

Interest Rate Risk

The Town has an investment policy of structuring the investment portfolio so that the securities mature to meet cash requirements for ongoing operations, thereby avoiding the need to sell securities on the open market prior to maturity and investing operating funds primarily in short-term securities, money market mutual funds, or similar investment pools unless it is anticipated that long-term securities can be held to maturity without jeopardizing the liquidity requirements. The Town's investment policy limits the maturities on individual investments to no more than five years.

Credit Risk

The Town's investment policy limits investments to the highest ratings issued by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization (NRSRO). The Florida PRIME is rated AAAM by Standard and Poor's.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Town's investment policy states that assets shall be diversified to control the risk of loss resulting from concentration of assets to a specific maturity, instrument, issue, dealer, or bank through which these securities are bought and sold. As of September 30, 2025, the Town did not invest in securities.

INVESTMENTS - LANTANA POLICE RELIEF AND PENSION FUND (LPRPF)

The Plan's Board of Trustees recognizes that the obligations of the Plan are long-term and that its investment policy should be made with a view toward performance and return over a number of years. The general investment objective is to obtain a reasonable total rate of return defined as interest and dividend income plus realized and unrealized capital gains or losses that commensurate with the prudent investor rule and Chapter 185 of the Florida Statutes. Permissible investments include obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agencies, high capitalization common or preferred stocks, pooled equity funds, high quality bonds or notes and fixed income funds.

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment in debt securities. Generally, the longer the time to maturity, the greater the exposure to interest rate risks. Through its investment policies, the Plan manages its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates. The Plan limits the effective duration of its investment portfolio through the adoption of the Barclays Capital Intermediate Aggregate Bond Index benchmark.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that a debt issuer will not fulfill its obligations. The Plan's investment policy addresses credit risk by limiting investments in bonds and preferred stocks to securities rated investment grade or above by a Nationally Recognized Statistical Rating Organization, unless specifically approved by the Board of Trustees. Securities which are unrated may be purchased, if in the judgment of the investment manager, they would carry an investment grade rating. Consistent with State law, the Plan's investment guidelines limit its fixed income investments to a quality rating of "A" or equivalent as rated by Moody's or by Standard & Poor's bond rating services at the time of purchase. Fixed income investments which are downgraded below the minimum rating must be liquidated at the earliest beneficial opportunity. The Plan's investments were in compliance with the above at September 30, 2025.

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk is defined as the risk that the Plan may not recover cash and investments held by another party in the event of a financial failure. The Plan requires all securities to be held by a third party custodian in the name of the Plan. Securities transactions between the broker-dealer and the custodian involving the purchase or sale of securities must be made on a "delivery vs. payment" basis to ensure that the custodian will have the security or money, as appropriate, in hand at the conclusion of the transaction.

Investment in Foreign Markets

Investing in foreign markets may involve special risks and considerations not typically associated with investing in companies in the United States of America. These risks include revaluation of currencies, high rates of inflation, repatriation restrictions on income and capital, and future adverse political, social, and economic developments. Moreover, securities of foreign governments may be less liquid, subject to delayed settlements, taxation on realized or unrealized gains, and their prices are more volatile than those of comparable securities in U.S. companies.

Foreign Tax Withholdings and Reclaims

Withholding taxes on dividends from foreign securities are provided for based on rates established via treaty between the United States of America and the applicable foreign jurisdiction, or where no treaty exists at the prevailing rate established by the foreign country. Foreign tax withholdings are reflected as a reduction of dividend income in the statement of operations. Where treaties allow for a reclaim of taxes, the Plan will make a formal application for refund. Such reclaims are included as an addition to dividend income.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Plan's investment policy establishes limitations on portfolio composition by investment type and by issuer to limit its exposure to concentration of credit risk. The Board requires that Plan assets be invested with no more than 60% in stocks and convertible securities measured at cost or 70% of the Plan assets at market (fair) value. In addition, the Plan limits investment in common stock (equity investments) as follows:

- No more than five percent of the Plan's assets may be invested in the common or capital stock of any single corporation.
- The Plan's investment in the common stock of any single corporation shall not exceed three percent of such corporation's outstanding common or capital stock.

No individual investment represents a concentration of 5% or more of total investments.

Risks and Uncertainties

The Plan invests in a variety of investment funds. Investments in general are exposed to various risks, such as interest rate, credit, and overall volatility risk. Due to the level of risk associated with certain investments, it is reasonably possible that changes in the values of investments will occur in the near term and that such changes could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of fiduciary net position available for benefits.

Investment Measurement at Fair Value

The Plan categorizes its fair value measurement within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The Plan has the following total recurring fair value measurements as of September 30, 2025:

- Mutual funds - The rationale for inclusion in Level 1 or Level 2 points to the unobservable inputs involved in mutual fund pricing. Mutual funds do not trade using bid and ask, as with ETF's or common stock. Instead, the prices are determined by the net asset value of the underlying investments at the close of business for the next day's open. The underlying assets themselves may include a variety of Level 1 and Level 2 securities and some may be valued using matrix pricing which interpolates the price of a security based on the price of similar securities.
- Fixed income funds - Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable input for similar securities. This includes basing value on yield currently available on comparable securities of issues with similar credit ratings.
- Debt securities - Debt securities classified in Level 1 of the fair value hierarchy are valued using prices quoted in active markets for those securities. Debt securities classified in Level 2 of the fair value hierarchy are valued using a matrix pricing technique. Matrix pricing is used by International Data Corporation and Bloomberg, L.P. to value securities based on the securities' relationship to benchmark quoted prices.

The real estate investment funds are open end, commingled private real estate portfolios. These REIT-based funds are structured as Limited partnerships. Their primary focus is to invest in well-based income producing properties within major U.S. markets. The fair values of the investments in these funds have been determined using the NAV per unit of the Trust's ownership interest in partners' capital. The investments of the fund are valued quarterly. Withdrawal requests must be made 60 days in advance and may be paid in one or more installments.

NOTE 3 – PROPERTY TAXES

Ad valorem taxes on property values are assessed as of January 1st and are levied the following October. Taxes are payable on November 1st, with discounts allowed of 1% to 4% if paid prior to March 1st of the following calendar year. All unpaid taxes on real and personal property become delinquent and subject to lien on April 1st. Real and personal property taxes are collected by Palm Beach County and remitted to the Town. State law permits Florida cities to levy a maximum of \$10 per \$1,000 (10 mills) of assessed taxable value for general government services. The Town levied taxes at a rate of 3.7500 mills, combined with Palm Beach County's Fire/Rescue rate for the Municipal Service Taxing Unit (MSTU) of 3.4581, leaving a margin of 2.7912 mills under the maximum possible assessment of 10 mills.

NOTE 6 – LEASES

Lease receivables

On May 1, 1997 the Town began leasing a restaurant it owns to a third party. The lease has been amended several times. On February 14, 2011, October 31, 2017 and on June 13, 2022 the lease was amended and set to expire on December 31, 2025, with an automatic two (2) year extension of the lease term unless the Town revokes said option. On May 17, 2011 the Town entered into an agreement to lease a portion of an approximately 8,250 square foot building it owns to the Palm Beach County Fire Department for the operation of Fire Station 37. The lease was amended effective on October 1, 2020 for five (5) years, with one (1) automatic renewal for an additional five (5) year term, unless either party provides one (1) year advance notice of non-renewal. The Town also has three leases of land it owns for communication towers. Two of the leases have terms including option periods set to expire on January 26, 2042. The remaining communication tower lease has a term including option periods set to expire on August 25, 2054. The Town recognized \$258,188 in lease revenue and \$54,475 in interest revenue during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025 related to these leases. As of September 30, 2025, the Town's receivable related to these leases was \$3,226,122. Also, the Town has a deferred inflow of resources associated with these leases that will be recognized as revenue over the lease term. As of September 30, 2025, the balance of the deferred inflow of resources was \$3,000,127.

Lease payables

The Town has entered into lease agreement as lessee for the right to use of leased equipment. As of September 30, 2025, the value of the lease liability was \$31,575. The Town is required to make principal and interest payments on the leases. At September 30, 2025, principal and interest payments due on the various leases were as follows:

NOTE 8 – EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

LANTANA POLICE RELIEF AND PENSION FUND (LPRPF)

The Town sponsors the LPRPF, a single employer defined benefit plan. The Plan is governed by a five member Board of Trustees. The Plan is reported as a pension trust fund and is included as part of the Town's reporting entity.

PLAN DESCRIPTION

The Plan was established by Ordinance enacted by the Town Council to provide for the creation and operation of the LPRPF. All full time certified police department employees are covered under this plan. The LPRPF issues separate audited financial statements which can be obtained by contacting the Town's Finance Department.

The Plan provides retirement, death and disability benefits for its participants. A participant may retire with normal benefits after reaching age 50 and accumulating 10 or more years of credited service. Normal retirement benefits are based on 3% of the participant's final average salary multiplied by the number of credited service years rendered. The final average salary for purposes of calculating benefits is the participant's average salary during the highest 5 years of a participant's last 10 years of employment. Salary does not include lump sum payments for accumulated leave. Any retiree or beneficiary who begins receiving pension benefits after October 2000 is entitled to a monthly supplemental pension benefit equal to \$35 per year of service.

Effective January 8, 2001, a deferred retirement option plan (DROP) was adopted. Eligible participants may elect to participate in the DROP while continuing their active employment with the Town. Upon election, the participant becomes a retiree for all Plan purposes so that further benefits cease to accrue. Benefit payments that would have been payable to the participant as a result of retirement are accumulated and invested in individual participant accounts and are payable to the participants at the termination of employment.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The Plan's financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. Contributions from the Plan's members are recognized as revenue in the period in which the contributions are due. Contributions from the Town, as calculated by the Plan's actuary, are recognized as revenue when due and when the Town has made a formal commitment to provide the contributions. Expenses are recognized in the accounting period incurred, if measurable. Benefits and refunds are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the terms of the Plan.

METHOD USED TO VALUE INVESTMENTS

Investments in common stock and bonds traded on a national securities exchange are valued at the last reported sales price on the last business day of the year; securities traded in the over-the-counter market and listed securities for which no sale was reported on that date are valued at the mean between the past reported bid and asked prices; investments in securities not having an established market value are valued at fair value as determined by the Board of Trustees. The fair value of an investment is the amount that the Plan could reasonably expect to receive for it in a current sale between a willing buyer and a willing seller, other than in a forced or liquidation sale. Purchases and sales of investments are recorded on a trade date basis.

Investment income is recognized on the accrual basis as earned. Unrealized appreciation in fair value of investments includes the difference between cost and fair value of investments held. The net realized and unrealized investment appreciation or depreciation for the year is reflected in the Statement of Changes in Fiduciary Net Position.

FUNDING POLICY

Contribution requirements are established and may be amended by the Town Council. The contribution requirements are determined on the benefit structure established by the Town. For the year ended September 30, 2025 the required member contributions were 8% of their annual covered earnings. Pursuant to Chapter 185 of the Florida Statutes, a premium tax on certain casualty insurance contracts written on Lantana properties is collected by the State and is remitted to the Plan. This amount totaled \$226,596 for the year ended September 30, 2025 and is included in the general fund as a revenue and expenditure. The Town is required to contribute the remaining amounts necessary to finance the benefits through periodic contributions of actuarially determined amounts. For the year ended September 30, 2025, the Town's contribution was \$1,054,308. Administrative costs are financed through investment earnings.

PENSION LIABILITIES AND PENSION EXPENSE, DEFERRED OUTFLOWS OF RESOURCES AND DEFERRED INFLOWS OF RESOURCES

The Town's net pension liability for the LPRPF is measured as the total pension liability less the pension plans' fiduciary net position. At September 30, 2025, the Town reported a net pension liability of \$278,218 related to the LPRPF. The net pension liability was measured as of September 30, 2025, using an annual actuarial valuation as of October 1, 2024 rolled forward to September 30, 2025 using standard update procedures. For the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, the Town recognized pension expense of \$588,817.

A single discount rate of 6.75% was used to measure the total pension liability. This single discount rate was based on the expected rate of return on pension plan investments of 6.75%. The projection of cash flows used to determine this single discount rate assumed that plan member contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that employer contributions will be made at rates equal to the difference between the total actuarially determined contribution rates and the member rate. Based on these assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. DEFINED CONTRIBUTION PLAN

The Town of Lantana General Employees' Defined Contribution Plan (401a Plan) was established by the Town and is administered by Florida Municipal Pension Trust Fund ("FMPTF") to provide benefits at retirement for all of its full-time employees except police officers. Contributions equal 7% of each general employee's salary and 15% for the Town Manager's salary and up to a 2% match of any employee's contribution. The Plan permits participant nondeductible voluntary contributions in the amount of 1% to 10% of the participant's salary. Participants are fully vested after five years of service. Plan revisions and contribution requirements are established and may be amended by the Town Council. The covered payroll for the plan was \$4,997,055. The Town's total payroll for the same period was \$9,565,862. Town contributions for the year ended September 30, 2025, were \$454,973. The contributions included forfeited amounts of \$35,304. The amount of employee contributions made for the year ended September 30, 2025 were \$0.

The Town of Lantana General Employees' Deferred Compensation Plan (457 Plan) was established by the Town and is administered by FMPTF to provide benefits at retirement for all of its full-time personnel. Director level employees may receive a 4% Town contribution, as the Town budget allows. The Town Manager position will receive Town contributions equal to the maximum annual amounts permitted by the IRS. Employee contributions are voluntary. The Town contributions for the year ended September 30, 2025, were \$30,865. Participants are fully vested immediately. Plan revisions and contribution requirements are established and may be amended by the Town Council. The amounts of employee contributions for the year ended September 30, 2025 were \$421,261.

NOTE 9 – OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (“OPEB”)

PLAN DESCRIPTION

The Town provides an optional single employer defined benefit post-employment healthcare plan to eligible individuals. The plan allows its employees and their beneficiaries, at their own cost, to continue to obtain health, dental and other insurance benefits upon retirement. The benefits of the plan conform to Florida Statutes, which are the legal authority for the plan. The plan has no assets and does not issue a separate financial report. There are no minimum required employer contributions.

FUNDING POLICY

The Town does not directly make a contribution to the plan on behalf of retirees. Retirees and their beneficiaries pay the same group rates as are charged to the Town for active employees by its healthcare provider. However, the Town's actuaries, in their actuarial valuation, calculate an offset to the cost of these benefits as an Employer Contribution, based upon an implicit rate subsidy. This offset equals the total age-adjusted costs paid by the Town or its active employees for coverage of the retirees and their dependents for the year net of the retiree's own payments for the year.

WASTEWATER SERVICE AND FACILITIES COST SHARING

On May 13, 2024, the Town renewed an ILA for Wastewater Service and Wastewater Facilities Cost Sharing Agreement with the City of Lake Worth Beach (LWB) for sewage disposal services along with other participating municipalities and entities (i.e., Atlantis, Lake Clarke Shores, Manalapan, Palm Beach, Palm Springs, South Palm Beach and Palm Beach State College). The ILA specifies each party's financial responsibilities related to LWB's wastewater collection system. The costs are allocated based on each entity's proportionate flow (volume of wastewater discharged into their system) and includes LWB's Subregional System's Operating and Maintenance charges. The Town's expenditures related to this agreement for the year ended September 30, 2025, were \$1,670,930.

NOTE 13 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

GRANTS

Grant monies received and disbursed by the Town are for specific purposes and may be subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Such audits may result in requests for reimbursements due to disallowed expenditures or other actions by grantor agencies. The Town does not believe that such disallowances or other actions taken by the grantor agencies, if any, would have a material effect on the financial position of the Town.

NOTE 14 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the Town carries commercial insurance. The Town is also covered by Florida Statutes under the Doctrine of Sovereign Immunity which effectively limits the amount of liability of municipalities to individual claims of \$200,000/\$300,000 for all claims relating to the same accident. There were no changes in insurance coverage from the prior year and there were no settlements that exceeded insurance coverage in the last three years.

NOTE 1 – BUDGETS AND BUDGETARY ACCOUNTING

State of Florida Statutes requires that all municipal governments establish budgetary systems and approve balanced annual operating budgets. The Town Council annually adopts an operating budget and appropriates funds for the General Fund and Special Revenue Funds, except for the Police Forfeiture Fund.

The procedures for establishing budgetary data are as follows:

By July 1st of each year, the Property Appraiser certifies the tax roll for the Town. The tax roll is used in formulating the proposed millage rate for the coming year. Thereafter, the following time table must be adhered to:

- Within 45 days the Town Manager must submit a proposed operating budget to the Council. The proposed budget includes expenditures and the means of financing them.
- Between 65-80 days from the date of certification (September 3rd — September 18th), the Town must hold a tentative budget and millage hearing. This hearing cannot be held sooner than ten days following the mailing of notices by the Property Appraiser (August 24th).
- Within 15 days of the tentative budget and millage hearing (September 18th — September 30th), the Town must advertise a final hearing on the budget.
- Not less than two or more than five days after the advertisement (September 20th — October 8th), a final hearing adopting the budget and millage is held.
- Within three days after the receipt of final value, the Finance Director completes form DR-422 and returns it to the Property Appraiser.
- Within 30 days of final millage and budget adoption, the Town must certify compliance with Section 200.065 and 200.068, Florida Statutes, to the Department of Revenue.

Budgets are adopted on the modified accrual basis of accounting, consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States. All appropriations lapse at fiscal year end unless encumbered or specifically designated to be carried forward to the subsequent year. Changes or amendments to the total budgeted expenditures, except as noted above for encumbrances and carry forwards, of the Town must be approved by the Council. The legal level of control is at the departmental level. The General Fund budget was amended as follows: increase in revenues of \$1,803,963, increase in carryforward of \$3,800,868, increase in appropriations of \$5,546,280, and increase of transfers out \$58,551.

MISCELLANEOUS STATISTICS

Historical Sketch: The Town of Lantana is a coastal community in Palm Beach County, which still retains the charm of its origins as an old Florida fishing village. Although it is one of the smaller communities of Palm Beach County, it is noted as one of the oldest. The first settlers came after Congress passed the Armed Occupation Act in 1842 at the end of the Seminole Wars. One of the pioneer settlers, The Lyman family, is distinguished as the founders of the town. M. B. Lyman brought his family to Lantana in 1888 and started several enterprises. He established a store, Indian Trading Post and post office in 1889. As postmaster, Mr. Lyman named the post office Lantana Point for the wild Lantana plant, which grew in abundance in the area. The “Point” was later dropped. One of the Lyman businesses was the Lantana Fish Company. One hundred thousand-pound catches of fish were made. In the early 1900’s the gathering and marketing of oysters became the leading industry. The Town of Lantana was incorporated in 1921, with 22 residents voting in the first election. At the time of incorporation, the area of Lantana was one square mile, with a population of 100 residents. Today the year-round population is 12,226 with a seasonal population of approximately 13,000.

Form of Government: Town Council – Manager with a Mayor and four Councilmembers elected for three year overlapping terms. The Town Manager is appointed by the Town Council.

Location and Area: The Town of Lantana encompasses an area of 2.79 square miles and is located about five miles south of the City of West Palm Beach. The Town’s corporate limits extend just west of I-95 and eastward to the Atlantic Ocean. Four other municipalities and one unincorporated area of Palm Beach County border the Town. Palm Beach County is located on the southeast coast of Florida and extends westward to Lake Okeechobee with a total 2,230 square miles, including 46 miles of frontage on the Atlantic Ocean and about 25 miles of frontage on Lake Okeechobee.

Police Protection: The Department consists of thirty-three sworn officers and nine civilian full-time employees.

Fire Protection: Fire/rescue services are provided to the residents of the Town of Lantana by Palm Beach County through a 10-year interlocal agreement that expires on December 31, 2027.

Recreation Facilities: The Town of Lantana’s recreational facilities include an eight-acre municipal beach with 750 feet of ocean frontage, open picnic areas, an open-air restaurant, showers, restrooms, lifeguard station and a playground area. The Town has three passive parks and one preserve, which encompass approximately six acres. Some provide shaded picnic areas, playground equipment and/or restrooms. One of the parks also has a basketball court and skate area. The Lyman Kayak Park has a kayak launch and observation dock. The Town has a Recreation Center with four tennis courts (two lighted) and all are painted with pickleball lines, a picnic area with four picnic benches, and a playground area. Maddock Park is a dog park and has dog water fountains and waste stations, and size appropriate dog obstacle course/exercise equipment. The Town has a two-acre boat launching facility on the intracoastal capable of a four-boat capacity with a parking area. The Town maintains an 11-acre sports park consisting of three baseball fields, two soccer fields, two basketball courts, restrooms, a concession stand, and a playground.

Marine Safety: Members of the marine safety team responded to over 151 ocean assists in the year where over 186,500 people visited Lantana beach. Marine Safety assisted with 13 major medical emergencies and treated 175 minor first aid actions to visitors.

Building Activity: The Town of Lantana is approximately 99% developed. During fiscal year 2025, the Building Department issued 765 permits for a total construction amount of \$26.89 million. In addition, the Department issued 82 new business tax receipts and 1,193 business tax receipt renewals for total revenue of \$320,973.

Water and Wastewater System: As of September 30, 2025, the Town provided water service to over 3,350 customers. For the 2025 fiscal year, the number of gallons of finished water that passed through the master meter was 771.0 million.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lantana, Florida ("Town") as of and for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 25, 2026. Our report includes a reference to other auditors who audited the financial statements of the Town of Lantana Police Relief and Pension Fund ("Pension Fund") as described in our report on the Town's financial statements. This report does not include the results of the other auditors' testing of internal control over financial reporting or compliance and other matters that are reported on separately by those auditors.

Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Town's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Town's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

Report on Compliance for Each Major State Project

Opinion on Compliance for Each Major State Project

We have audited the Town of Lantana, Florida's (the "Town") compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the Chapter 10.550 of the Rules of the Auditor General that could have a direct and material effect on the Town's major state project for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025. The Town's major state project is identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

In our opinion, the Town complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on its major state project for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2025.

Basis for Opinion on Each Major State Project

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS); the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States (Government Auditing Standards); and the audit requirements of Chapter 10.550 Rules of the Auditor General. Our responsibilities under those standards and Chapter 10.550 Rules of the Auditor General are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance section of our report.

We are required to be independent of the Town and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion on compliance for the major state project. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of the Town's compliance with the compliance requirements referred to above.

Responsibilities of Management for Compliance

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements referred to above and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of effective internal control over compliance with the requirements of laws, statutes, regulations, rules and provisions of contracts or grant agreements applicable to the Town's major state projects.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of Compliance

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether material noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above occurred, whether due to fraud or error, and express an opinion on the Town's compliance based on our audit. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS, Government Auditing Standards and Chapter 10.550 Rules of the Auditor General will always detect material noncompliance when it exists. The risk of not detecting material noncompliance resulting from fraud is higher than for that resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above is considered material, if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, it would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user of the report on compliance about the Town's compliance with the requirements of each of its major state projects.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, *Government Auditing Standards*, and Chapter 10.550 Rules of the Auditor General, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material noncompliance, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the Town's compliance with the compliance requirements referred to above and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.
- Obtain an understanding of the Town's internal control over compliance relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with Chapter 10.550 Rules of the Auditor General, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance may exist that were not identified.

Our audit was not designed for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of Chapter 10.550 Rules of the Auditor General. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Lantana, Florida ("Town") for the year ended September 30, 2025. We did not audit the financial statements of the Town of Lantana Police Relief and Pension Fund, which financial statements represent 99.6% and 97.1% respectively of the total assets and total additions of the aggregate remaining fund information. Those financial statements were audited by other auditors. Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards and, Government Auditing Standards, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. 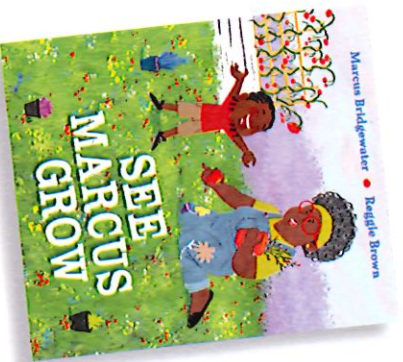

Town Council Meeting Minutes
March 23, 2026**

1. ROLL CALL, MOMENT OF SILENT PRAYER, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

Mayor Lythgoe called the regular Town Council meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers. Town Clerk Kathleen Dominguez called the roll and confirmed a quorum with all elected officials present.

Clerk's Note: Councilmember Chris Castle attended the meeting by phone.

Mayor Lythgoe led a silent prayer that was followed by the pledge of allegiance, led by Councilmember Zeitler.

2. OATHS OF OFFICE AND INSTALLATIONS:

a. Group 3: Mark Zeitler, Office of Councilmember

Town Clerk Dominguez announced the re-election certification process for the 2026 election cycle.

Town Attorney Lohman then swore in Councilmember Mark Zeitler.

b. Group 4: Christopher Castle, Office of Councilmember

Mayor Lythgoe officially recognized Councilmember Castle and informed the Councilmembers that his swearing-in took place on March 20, 2026, by the Town Attorney in advance of tonight's meeting to accommodate Mr. Castle's conference schedule.

Councilmember Castle expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to serve and shared his commitment to the continued service of the Town's residents.

3. COUNCIL REORGANIZATION:

a. Appointment of Vice Mayor and Vice Mayor Pro Tem.

Mayor Lythgoe reviewed the list of current and past Vice Mayors and Vice Mayor Pro Tems. She then opened the floor for nominations for the 2026 Vice Mayor and Vice Mayor Pro Tem positions.

Motion: Vice Mayor Mason made a motion to nominate Chris Castle as the Vice Mayor. Councilmember Zeitler seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

Motion: Councilmember Zeitler made a motion to nominate Jesse Rivero as the Vice Mayor Pro Tem. Councilmember Mason seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

b. Palm Beach County League of Cities voting delegate and alternates.

Mayor Lythgoe introduced the above agenda item and asked for nominations for the voting delegates and alternates for the Palm Beach County League of Cities. She went over past practices and said that she wishes to continue as the voting delegate for the Town.

Motion: Councilmember Mason made a motion to nominate Mayor Karen Lythgoe as the Voting Delegate and the Town Council and Town Manager as the alternates for the Palm Beach County League of Cities. Vice Mayor Pro Tem Rivero seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

c. Other Councilmember assignments.

Mayor Lythgoe and the Councilmembers reviewed and discussed the following representative assignments:

- **Councilmember Mason** expressed a continued interest in serving as the primary voting member for both Lantana Elementary and Lantana Middle Schools.
- **Vice Mayor Pro Tem Rivero** was appointed to continue serving as the representative for the Friends of the Library.
- **Mayor Lythgoe** agreed to continue serving as the representative for the Library Foundation, noting this was a specific request for her continued involvement from Mr. Bob Barfknecht.
- **Mayor Lythgoe** will continue serving on the Issues Forum, with Vice Mayor Castle volunteering himself as the secondary alternate.

By consensus, the Town Council agreed that all remaining 2025 Councilmember assignments and appointments not specifically addressed above would remain unchanged for the current year.

Motion: Councilmember Mason made a motion to approve the slate as described above. Vice Mayor Castle seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

4. AGENDA APPROVAL:

- a.** Additions, substitutions, deletions.
- b.** Agenda Approval.

Motion: Councilmember Mason made a motion to approve the agenda, as submitted. Councilmember Zeitler seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

5. STAFF AND COMMITTEE REPORTS:

a. Town Council

Vice Mayor Pro Tem Rivero commented on the commencement of the median project on S Dixie Highway, noting that the traffic impact has been less significant than anticipated. He also expressed satisfaction with the progress of the Ocean Ave Median Project.

Vice Mayor Castle noted reports of record sargassum levels and commented on the timely nature of the Town's current sargassum cleanup initiative.

Mayor Lythgoe reported on her "Coffee with the Mayor" event held Saturday, March 21, 2026, at Le Dor Café. She noted there were 14 residents in attendance, including several first-time participants. During the event, the Mayor addressed and clarified various misconceptions originating from social media and encouraged residents to communicate directly with the Town Council. Additionally, she highlighted the floral arrangement program held at the Library, describing it as a successful and peaceful event, and encouraged the public to attend future Library programming.

b. Town Manager

Town Manager Raducci provided the following updates:

- **3rd Street Parking Lot:** Announced the completion of the wall replacement project ahead of schedule and within budget. He noted that a "Call to Artists" will soon be issued for a mural or installation as part of the Art in Public Places program, following the 2025 workshop series.
- **Lantana Beach Master Plan:** Reported on the successful community workshop held on March 14, 2026, which saw approximately 70 attendees and productive dialogue. He expressed appreciation to the Town staff and the Police Chief for their coordination efforts. Mr. Raducci noted that over 150 residents have already participated in the Master Plan survey and encouraged others to complete it, which is available on the Town's website and via QR Codes on the flyers in English, Creole, and Spanish.
- **Greater Lantana Chamber of Commerce Leadership Program:** Announced the upcoming graduation for the Lantana Chamber's Leadership program, noting that several Town staff members who participated in the program will be among the graduates.
- **Touch-a-Truck Event:** Highlighted the upcoming "Touch-a-Truck" event on April 11, 2026, featuring various vendors and equipment. He noted that a "quiet hour" will be observed during the first hour, followed by full operations from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., and expressed hope for a strong community turnout.

Mayor Lythgoe issued a final reminder to the public regarding the Special General Election for State Representative District 87, taking place tomorrow, March 24, 2026, and encouraged all eligible residents to vote.

6. SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS:

- a.** Proclamation Recognizing April 12 - 18, 2026, as National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week.

Mayor Lythgoe presented the National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week proclamation. Assistant Chief Thomas Mitchell accepted the proclamation. Following the reading, Assistant Chief Mitchell thanked attendees and discussed the responsibilities of a Police Dispatcher.

- b. Proclamation Recognizing April 19 - 25, 2026, as National Library Week.

Mayor Lythgoe presented the National Library Week proclamation to Library Director Kristine Kreidler. Ms. Kreidler accepted the proclamation and highlighted the recent surge in adult programming at the Library. She expressed her gratitude to Library supporters and patrons and invited the community to participate in its programs. Ms. Kreidler also introduced and thanked Library staff members Midji and Caleb for their contributions and attendance.

Mayor Lythgoe emphasized the connection between municipal services and public funding, noting that the diverse programming offered at the Library is made possible through the Town's property tax revenue.

7. APPROVAL OF THE CONSENT AGENDA:

- a. Approval of the March 9, 2026, Regular Town Council Meeting Minutes.
- b. Consideration of a request from the First Baptist Church of Lantana to open the Lantana Municipal Beach parking lot at 5:00 a.m. and to waive parking fees from 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. for an Easter Sunrise Service at the Dune Deck Café and Lantana Beach on April 5, 2026.

Motion: Councilmember Mason made a motion to approve the consent agenda, as submitted. Councilmember Zeitler seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

8. ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS:

- a. None.

9. QUASI-JUDICIAL HEARINGS:

- a. None.

10. MISCELLANEOUS:

- a. Consideration of the purchase and implementation of an access control system for the Greynolds Circle buildings, in an amount not to exceed \$31,305.06, by Integrated Fire and Security Solutions.

Mayor Lythgoe introduced the agenda item.

Finance Director Stephen Kaplan and IT Manager William Parker presented the request and addressed inquiries from Councilmembers.

There were no public comments.

There was no discussion among the Councilmembers.

Mayor Lythgoe requested an administrative review of the electronic door locking system for the Administration Building, noting that the current autolock timeframe should be adjusted for improved operational efficiency and security.

Motion: Vice Mayor Pro Tem Rivero made a motion to approve the purchase of hardware and installation services from Integrated Fire and Security Solutions in an amount not to exceed \$31,305.06 and authorize

the Town Manager to execute said agreement and any amendments thereto. Councilmember Mason seconded the motion. Motion passed 5-0.

11. PUBLIC COMMENTS:

There were no public comments.

12. FUTURE EVENTS/IMPORTANT DATES (subject to change):

Mayor Lythgoe read the future events and important dates, highlighting the Visioning Session on April 10, 2026, and the inaugural Touch-a-Truck event.

13. COUNCIL COMMENTS:

Vice Mayor Pro Tem Rivero brought up the conversations he's had with residents about the Beach parking management, highlighting the need for increased enforcement and additional capacity for patrons. Specifically, he suggested:

- Evaluating the current parking time limits for Dune Deck Café staff to prioritize patron access.
- The potential hiring of a parking lot attendant authorized to issue citations.

Mayor Lythgoe acknowledged the concerns and recommended that Vice Mayor Pro Tem Rivero present these specific proposals during the upcoming Visioning Session for further strategic evaluation.

A brief discussion ensued among the Councilmembers regarding current parking trends and enforcement challenges at the Beach.

14. ADJOURNMENT.

The motion was made and carried unanimously. There being no further discussion, the meeting adjourned at 6:35 p.m.

Remarks: First Reading

ISSUE/BACKGROUND:

This ordinance addresses the Town's need for a codified process to manage special events impacting public safety and services. It incorporates the Town Council's feedback from the **November 21, 2025**, and **January 30, 2026**, workshop series meetings.

PROVISIONS:

- **Two-Tiered Approval System:** Establishes administrative approval (Tier 1) for events with fewer than 60 attendees and requires Town Council approval (Tier 2) for events with 60 or more attendees.
- **Regulatory Standards:** Formalizes requirements for site plans, traffic management, and a mandatory \$1,000,000 liability insurance policy naming the Town as an additional insured.
- **Residential Block Parties:** Codifies a framework for neighborhood street closures, including a 75% resident consent threshold.
- **Oversight and Due Process:** Authorizes the Town Manager to revoke permits for safety concerns and establishes a formal appeals process before the Town Council.

Staff recommends the adoption of Ordinance O-05-2026 to provide a transparent, efficient, and standardized permitting process while safeguarding the Town's resources and the public welfare. This ordinance was reviewed and approved as to form and legal sufficiency by the Town Attorney.

Proposed ordinance's title:

ORDINANCE NO. O-05-2026: AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LANTANA, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 17 STREETS, SIDEWALKS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES AT ARTICLE VI. TOWN PARKS, BY ADOPTING NEW SECTIONS 17-80 TO 17-85 TO DEFINE AND SET REGULATIONS FOR SPECIAL EVENTS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY.

1. Summary of the proposed ordinance (must include a statement of the public purpose, such as serving the public health, safety, morals, and welfare):

Summary: This ordinance establishes a formal, two-tiered permitting system for meetings, activities, parades, block parties, or gatherings on Town-owned property or private property that significantly impacts public rights-of-way or Town services. It defines two levels of approval: Tier 1 for events with fewer than 60 people (Staff approval) and Tier 2 for events with 60 or more people (Council approval). The ordinance also sets specific requirements for applications, insurance, and residential block parties.

Public Purpose: To provide a coordinated process for managing events that may affect Town services, traffic flow, or public safety, thereby ensuring the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the Town of Lantana.

2. An estimate of the direct economic impact of the proposed ordinance on private, for-profit businesses in the [City/Town/Village], if any: (a) An estimate of direct compliance costs that businesses may reasonably incur; (b) Any new charge or fee imposed by the proposed ordinance or for which businesses will be financially responsible; and

(c) An estimate of the [City's/Town's/Village's] regulatory costs, including estimated revenues from any new charges or fees to cover such costs.

Direct Compliance Costs: Businesses organizing events on public property (such as fitness classes, markets, or promotional gatherings) will be required to submit formal applications 30 to 90 days in advance. They must also provide proof of liability insurance with a minimum of \$1,000,000, naming the Town as an "Additional Insured."

New Charges or Fees: Applicants are responsible for the payment of all applicable permit fees. Additionally, if the Chief of Police determines police presence is necessary for traffic or safety, the business/organizer must cover those expenses.

Town Regulatory Costs: The Town will incur administrative costs related to the processing and review of permit applications by the Town Manager and Town Council. These costs are expected to be offset by the revenue generated from permit fees.

3. Good faith estimate of the number of businesses likely to be impacted by the proposed ordinance:

Estimate: Low to Moderate. The ordinance primarily impacts professional event planners, commercial entities seeking to use Town parks or streets for promotion, and businesses whose large-scale private events overflow into public rights-of-way.

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Lantana has determined that a need exists to amend Chapter 17 – Streets, Sidewalks and Other Public Places. of the Town’s Code of Ordinances to establish a coordinated process for managing special events on public property that may affect town services, traffic, or public safety; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council has determined this revision to be in the best interests of the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of the Town of Lantana.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LANTANA, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1: Chapter 17 – Streets, Sidewalks and Other Public Places. of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Lantana is hereby amended at Article VI. – Town Parks, by adopting new Sections 17-79 to 17-84, which shall hereafter read as set forth in Exhibit “A.”

SECTION 2: Each and every other Section and Subsection of Chapter 17 – Streets, Sidewalks and Other Public Places. shall remain in full force and effect as previously enacted.

SECTION 3: All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4: Should any section or provision of this Ordinance or any portion thereof, any paragraph, sentence, or word be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5: Specific authority is hereby granted to codify this Ordinance.

SECTION 6: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

Sec. 17-79. – Special Events - Purpose and Intent.

The purpose and intent of sections 17-81 through 17-85 is to provide a coordinated process for regulating special events on public property when such events may impact town services, traffic flow, and/or public safety, while ensuring the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the Town of Lantana.

Sec. 17-80. – Definitions.

Special Event shall mean any meeting, activity, parade, event, or gathering of persons that:

- (a) Is held on Town-owned property (e.g., parks, streets, or facilities); or
- (b) Is held on private property but due to the scope, magnitude, and/or planned duration it is likely to impact the health, safety, and/or welfare of the public at-large, and/or is likely to significantly impact traffic on public rights-of-way and/or police or fire services.

Block Party shall mean a neighborhood event organized by a group of residents for the purpose of social interaction, involving the temporary closure of a single residential street (or portion thereof) or a cul-de-sac.

Sec. 17-81. – Two-Tiered Permit Approval System.

All special events require a permit from the Town. The approval process is based on the following criteria:

- (a) **Tier 1 (Staff Level Approval):** Events with an anticipated attendance of **fewer than 60 people.**
 - 1. *Approval authority:* Requires Town Manager, or designee, approval.
 - 2. *Timeline:* Applications must be submitted at least thirty (30) days prior to the event.
- (b) **Tier 2 (Council Level Approval):** Events with an anticipated attendance of **60 or more people.**
 - 1. *Authority:* Requires Town Council approval.
 - 2. *Timeline:* Applications must be submitted at least ninety (90) days before the event to allow for staff review and placement on a Council agenda.

Sec. 17-82. – Application Requirements.

Applications shall be submitted on forms provided by the Town and shall include:

- (a) A site plan and description of activities
- (b) Location, duration (not to exceed 7 business days), and schedule (start and end times, and set-up and break-down times)

- (c) Traffic and parking management plans: Use of police officers for public safety during the event or an acceptable alternative to direct and control traffic may be required by the Chief of Police or designee at the expense of the applicant/organizer.
- (d) Proof of Liability Insurance (minimum \$1,000,000) naming the Town of Lantana as an "Additional Insured."
- (e) Payment of all applicable fees.

Sec. 17-83. – Residential Block Parties.

1. **Approval Tier:** Block parties with fewer than 60 attendees shall be processed as **Tier 1 permits.**
2. **Neighbor Consent Requirement:** Applications for block parties must include a signature petition demonstrating that **at least 75% of the households** on the affected block or street segment consent to the street closure.
3. **Street Closure Requirements:**
 - (a) Access for emergency vehicles must be maintained at all times.
 - (b) Only Town-approved barricades or cones may be used (the Town may provide these for a refundable deposit).
 - (c) No permanent structures may be placed in the right-of-way. Any item(s) placed in the right-of-way must be temporary in nature and easily removed or relocated immediately upon direction by any Town personnel.
4. **Limitations:** Block parties are restricted to daylight hours and must comply with the Town's noise ordinance.

Section 17-84. – Revocation and Appeals.

- (a) Revocation: The Town Manager may revoke or deny any permit at any time if the event poses a threat to public health, safety, or welfare or if the applicant fails to comply with the conditions of the permit or Town ordinances.
- (b) Appeals: Any applicant denied a Tier 1 permit, or aggrieved by a condition of the approval, may appeal the decision to the Town Council within 10 days of rendition of the decision. There will be no appeal of a Tier 2 permit.

ISSUE/BACKGROUND:

Staff recently inspected and gathered input from various sources to identify Town-owned sidewalks that needed repair. As a result of the inspection, and in order to maximize efficiency, the locations highlighted on the attachment were vetted and determined to be those in most need of immediate repair. The repairs will include, but are not limited to, trip hazard elimination, aesthetic improvement, removal of the old concrete, base compaction, root and other upheaval corrections, and the replacement of concrete on original grades.

Staff is recommending the Town enter into an agreement with M&M Asphalt Maintenance Inc., d/b/a All County Paving Inc. in the amount of \$73,981.28, to make said repairs, through a piggyback contract with the City of West Palm Beach ITB 23-24-104DL. Funding for the repairs will be provided from the FY 2025/26 Public Services Operating Budget.

Any alteration or deviation from proposal specifications involving extra costs, will be executed only upon written orders, and will become an extra charge over and above the contract.

3. 90% of contract amount and change orders must be paid prior to completing punch list items and/or any changes for additional work required by cities or municipalities.
4. For projects requiring city or county permits, All County Paving will coordinate the process and charge Procurement Fees \$795.00 per application, plus cost of permit(s). Any additional work required by the permit(s) will be a change order to the contract. If the Owner / Authorized Agent/ Customer directs this work to be completed without required permitting, all costs including, but not limited to, fees, expediting and fines are the responsibility of the Owner / Authorized Agent/ Customer.

9. All County Paving cannot guarantee sealcoat longevity where there is standing water. Cracks in pavement will still be noticeable after sealcoating. Tire turning marks will be visible at first but will disappear over time.
10. If there are existing car stops on the property, the new line striping of the parking stalls will not be installed beyond the car stop(s) unless they are removed. The striping machine cannot fit between the car stops. If you would like the existing car stops removed during the striping phase, there will be additional costs associated with this scope of work. 29. Due to the fluctuations in the petroleum markets, All County Paving will impose a fuel surcharge
30. All accounts past due will incur a finance charge of 1.5% per month.

SEALCOATING | CUSTOMER INSTRUCTIONS AND INFORMATION

1. Barricaded Parking Lot: It is vital that all vehicles are removed from our area of work no later than 7:15 am, unless otherwise agreed. Our project costs are based on the property having all cars, people and objects off the area of work. Tow Trucks need to be arranged 5 days prior to the start of any work and must be on call to remove cars from the scheduled work zone. If any cars are left in the area of work, we cannot be held responsible for any damage to the vehicles. There will be additional costs if we are unable to access the work area billed at a minimum of \$2,000.00.
2. Cleaning: Customer is responsible for any "heavy cleaning"; otherwise, All County Paving will bill for this additional cleaning.
3. Cracking: cracks in pavement will still be noticeable after Sealcoating
4. Lawn Fertilization: should not be installed seven days before or after service.
5. Rain: If it's raining the day of scheduled service, assume we aren't coming, and we will contact you to reschedule as soon as possible. If it rains after our installation, please contact your representative. We monitor the weather closely and can generally predict this very well. If an unexpected storm happens, we will touch up any areas where sealer has not bonded.
6. The sprinkler system should be off 24 hours prior to the commencement of your project and stay off 48 hours after completion of project. The surface must be dry for our arrival as areas where the newly sealed pavement is wet may wear prematurely.
7. Newly sealcoated areas will be barricaded for 24-48 hours after each project phase completion. It is the responsibility of the customer to keep the area clear to allow proper curing of the material. Failure to do so will void any warranty.
8. Sealer: will take a minimum of 30 days to fully cure and is sensitive to animal droppings, tree droppings; water stains from irrigation systems, ponding water & tire markings during this time. This is normal, it will fade over time. Areas of shade will take longer to dry and cure than areas in the direct sunlight.

7. The cost of and obtaining of all permits, bonds, stakeouts, cut sheets, engineering and testing are excluded.
8. In the event of undesirable sub-base or base course conditions, if the customer or authorized agent insists on the installation of any part of the pavement without authorizing corrective action, All County Paving will not be responsible for any subsequent pavement failures and will be paid as stated in the contract. All County Paving shall not be liable for any failure to undertake or complete the work for causes beyond our control.

This Agreement is hereby entered into this 13th day of April, 2026, the effective date, by and between M & M Asphalt Maintenance, Inc., a Florida corporation, d/b/a All County Paving (“Contractor”) and the Town of Lantana, Florida, a municipal corporation (“Town”).

WITNESSETH:

Town and Contractor, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, hereby agree as follows:

1. Town and Contractor hereby enter into this Agreement for the Townwide repair of sidewalks pursuant to the **Scope of Work (taken together “Town of Lantana Sidewalk Repairs 2026 REV1” and “Phase II Repair Site List”)** attached hereto, at the piggy-backed unit rates and service pricing rates set forth in City of West Palm Beach ITB No. 23.24.104 DL, the Contractor’s response to same and the contract between the City of West Palm Beach, Florida, and the Contractor (the “Piggy-back Agreement”). This Agreement will commence on the date first written above and shall continue in full force and effect for a period of one (1) year.
2. All terms of the Agreement are as specifically set forth herein and the Piggy-back Agreement, including all documentation required thereunder as Exhibit “A” and the Scope of Work, as Exhibit “B”, which is the Contractors price schedule for the work contemplated by this Agreement, both exhibits are hereby incorporated herein and made a part hereof. Contractor shall not commence any work pursuant to this Agreement until the Town properly issues Notices to Proceed (“NTP”) for each project set forth in Exhibit “B”, which shall be incorporated herein and made part hereof as Exhibit “C” (“C1”, “C2”, “C3”, etc...). The parties hereby agree and acknowledge that this two (2) page Agreement, together with Exhibits A, B, and C; including all bonds or insurance documents referencing the “Town of Lantana” pursuant to the Piggy-back Agreement’s requirements, shall constitute the entire Agreement.
3. Notice as required in the Agreement documents shall be sufficient when sent by certified mail, return receipt requested or hand delivered to the parties at the following address:

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4. The parties hereby recognize and acknowledge that time is of the essence for the completion of the work described in this Agreement. The parties further agree that all work described herein will be

completed within the time specified in the NTP for each project and that any delay in the completion of the work described herein shall constitute a material breach of this contract. The parties further recognize that the Town will suffer damage and/or financial loss if the work is not timely completed in accordance with the construction schedules set forth in the Notices to Proceed. The parties also recognize the time, expense and difficulties involved in proving in a legal proceeding, the actual losses or damages suffered by the Town if the work is not completed on time. Accordingly, instead of requiring any such proof, the parties agree that Contractor shall pay liquidated damages for delay, but not as a penalty, in the amount of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each calendar day that expires, beginning with the day following the project's completion date as set forth in the Notice to Proceed for each project described within the Scope of Work, notwithstanding any proper extension of time granted by the Town.

5. This Agreement may be terminated for cause by action of the Town or by Contractor if the party in breach has not corrected the breach within thirty (30) days after written notice from the aggrieved party identifying the breach. The Town shall not be obligated or liable for any future payments due or for any damages as a result of termination hereunder.

6. The Town may terminate performance of work under this contract in whole or, from time to time, in part, with or without cause, if the Town determines that a termination is in the Town's interest. The Town shall terminate by delivering to the Contractor a Notice of Termination specifying the extent of termination and the effective date.

7. After receipt of a Notice of Termination, and except as directed by the Town, the Contractor shall immediately proceed with the following obligations, regardless of any delay in determining or adjusting any amounts due under this clause:

- a. Stop work as specified in the notice.
- b. Place no further subcontracts or orders (referred to as subcontracts in this clause) for materials, services, or facilities, except as necessary to complete the continued portion of the contract.
- c. Terminate all subcontracts to the extent they relate to the work terminated.
- d. Complete performance of the work not terminated.
- e. For contract work performed before the effective date of termination, the Town will pay for the cost of this work.

8. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) of the compensation to be paid by Town, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged by Contractor, is given as special consideration to Contractor for Town's right to terminate this Agreement for convenience.

9. The Town's obligations under this Agreement are specifically conditioned upon the availability of lawful appropriations by the Town Council. Notwithstanding any contrary provision of this Agreement, each payment obligation of the Town created by this Agreement is conditioned upon the availability of funds that are lawfully appropriated by the Town Council for this Contract. If such funds are not appropriated (a "Non-appropriation Event"), this Agreement shall automatically terminate on September

30th of the last year for which funds were appropriated. No penalty shall accrue to the Town should a Non-appropriation Event occur and such occurrence shall not constitute a breach or default by the Town.

10. Notwithstanding anything contained herein, as provided under Section 119.0701, *Fla. Stat.*, if the Contractor: (i) provides a service; and (ii) acts on behalf of the Town as provided under Section 119.011(2) *Fla. Stat.*, the Contractor shall comply with the requirements of Section 119.0701, *Fla. Stat.*, as it may be amended from time to time. The Contractor is specifically required to:

11. Keep and maintain public records required by the Town to perform services as provided under this Contract.

12. Upon request from the Town's Custodian of Public Records, provide the Town with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119 or as otherwise provided by law. The Contractor further agrees that all fees, charges, and expenses shall be determined in accordance with Palm Beach County PPM CW-F-002, Fees Associated with Public Records Requests, as it may be amended or replaced from time to time.

13. Ensure that public records that are exempt, or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the Contract if the Contractor does not transfer the records to the public agency.

14. Upon completion of the Contract the Contractor shall transfer, at no cost to the Town, all public records in possession of the Contractor unless notified by Town's representative/liaison, on behalf of the Town's Custodian of Public Records, to keep and maintain public records required by the Town to perform the service. If the Contractor transfers all public records to the Town upon completion of the Contract, the Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt, or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. If the Contractor keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the Contract, the Contractor shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically by the Contractor must be provided to Town, upon request of the Town's Custodian of Public Records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of Town, at no cost to Town.

15. Failure of the Contractor to comply with the requirements of this article shall be a material breach of this Contract. Town shall have the right to exercise any and all remedies available to it, including but not limited to, the right to terminate for cause. Contractor acknowledges that it has familiarized itself with the requirements of Chapter 119, *Fla. Stat.*, and other requirements of state law applicable to public records not specifically set forth herein.

16. IF THE CONTRACTOR HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO THE CONTRACTOR'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS CONTRACT, PLEASE CONTACT THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT TOWN CLERK, TOWN HALL, 500 GREYNOLDS CIRCLE, LANTANA, FL 33462, BY E-MAIL AT KDOMINGUEZ@LANTANA.ORG OR BY TELEPHONE AT 561-540-5016.

17. This Agreement and all services contemplated by this Agreement shall be governed by, and construed and enforced in accordance with, the laws of the State of Florida. Venue for all proceedings in connection herewith shall be exclusively in Palm Beach County, Florida.

18. This Agreement shall supersede and take precedence over any Exhibit attached hereto and/or incorporated herein.

19. In the event of any litigation, or any other proceeding, is commenced or arises out of this Agreement, each party shall bear its own attorney's fees and costs, including fees and costs on appeal.

20. This two (2) page Agreement, along with other documents referenced in paragraph 2 above, constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties; no modification shall be made to this Agreement unless such modification is in writing, agreed to by both parties and attached hereto as an addendum to this Agreement.
