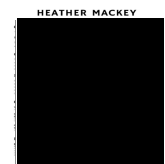

San Francisco's famous morning fog brings cool breezes to the Bay Area. Thirty miles southeast of the Golden Gate beyond Mt. Diablo towering over the east bay like Olympus is the Livermore Valley. The cooling fog rarely reaches the warm dry Valley that begins in the west at the Dublin Grade and runs east to the Altamont Summit. Approximately fifteen miles long and ten miles wide, surrounded by the Diablo Range on the north, the Altamont to the east, Mt. Mocho, Cedar Knob, and Mt. Oso to the south. The Valley, controlled by Spain, Mexico, and the United States, for seventy-five years, was used primarily as ranch land for grazing cattle before California was admitted to the United States as the thirty-first state of the Union. In the southeastern portion of the valley two Mexican Land Grants, Rancho Las Positas and Rancho del Valle de San Jose, eventually developed into the Town of Livermore.

The Ranchos' Mexico Era cattle-ranching Californio life came into sharp contrast with the expectations of American immigrants drawn to the region by the promises of riches in the Gold Rush. The Californio-American conflict illustrates the cultural tension seen in the different religions, languages, economic, political and legal systems.¹ The Mexican Rancho Land Grants, validated by the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo and the United States Constitution², created new U.S. property rights and should have been protected under United States law. However due to the influx of American

immigrants and as a proximate result of the California Gold Rush the Rancho landowners did not cement their property rights under the United States legal system before the American immigrant onslaught.

The Federal Land Commission, created to resolve Land Grant claims in light of immigrant demands for land, ruled on petitions to determine the validity and definition of Spanish and Mexican Land Grants. The Federal Land Act of 1851, sponsored by California's new senator, William Gwin, a former Mississippi Congressman, required Californio landowners claiming Mexican land grants to prove the validity of their claims under Mexican law. Petitions presented to the three-man commission in San Francisco decided the validity of the original land grant. Approved petitions received a United States land patent. Those that were declined lost their land to the Federal government making it available to U.S. citizens under the Preemption Act of 1841.³ Commission rulings, appealed to Federal Courts, averaged seventeen years to resolve⁴. The cost of the legal proceedings forced Californios to sell land to pay their legal fees and bankrupted many "regardless of the merit of their claims".⁵ "Tired of grubbing for gold, desiring to possess more nourishing soil, and feeling the weight of history on their side, they tried to adjust the land question swiftly and drastically. In fact, the Yankees' land hunger far outran the bounds of the Land Law."⁶ Senator Henry Clay, supporting the Land Law Act, stated the general American position that, while Californios deserved some consideration, "the Yankee citizens of the

West deserved more.”⁷ Senator Gwin later acknowledged that his intent was to allow Americans to “homestead” directly on the land forcing Californios to move out.⁸

The Livermore Valley Las Positas and del Valle de San Jose land grant cases, appealed by the Attorney General to the United States Supreme Court, present a microcosm of resolution of the territorial tension between Californios and Americans.

Originally described as an island on the right hand of the Indies, very close to the Terrestrial Paradise, filled with gold and riches, California, the mythological setting for the 16th century romantic prose *Las Serges de Esplandián*, gave its name to the land believed to be an island in the newly discovered Pacific Ocean.⁹ Spanish explorers came to the New World seeking gold, silver, and precious goods. Defeating the Aztecs at Tenochtitlan in 1520 the Spanish ventured north in search of additional riches. Spanish colonization of the territory was left to Catholic Missionaries supported by small military garrisons. San Diego Bay, discovered by the Spanish in 1542, was not colonized until the building of the Mission San Diego de Alcalá and el Presidio Real de San Diego in 1769. The Spanish continuing their efforts to control the territory founded el Presidio Real de San Carlos de Monterey and Mission San Carlos Borromeo de Carmelo in 1771. In 1772 Spanish military explorers led by Captain Fages and accompanied by Father Juan Crespi left Monterey heading for the entrance of San Francisco Bay to locate a suitable new mission site. Crespi’s diary describes the Fages Expedition leaving the presidio of San Carlos de Monterey on March 20, 1772 accompanied by 12 soldiers, “one muleteer and a California Indian for the pack mules”.¹⁰ They made their way north to San Francisco Bay where he noted three islands (Yerba Buena, Alcatraz, and Angel) opposite the gate. Proceeding east he noted the

large valley and two rivers running north and south (Sacramento and San Joaquin) then began the return trip to Monterey. This took them east of Mt. Diablo through the San Ramon Valley to the western end of the Livermore Valley, the first recorded European sighting of the Valley.¹¹

In 1775-1776 while American colonists met in Philadelphia to consider breaking with Great Britain Juan Bautista de Anza, by order of Viceroy Governor and Captain General of New Spain, Senor Baylio Frey Don Antonio Maria Bucareli y Ursula, led an expedition from Tubac (southern Arizona) to San Francisco to select a location for a Mission and presidio.

Leaving the “river or lake of San Francisco, to return to Sonora, 398 leagues...(they headed) south-southwest, and having traveled in this direction across a sterile plain for about a league and a half, we then began to ascend some hills belonging to the sierras which we mentioned yesterday on our right. We halted for the night on the same hills, at the first water and firewood, which we found, having traveled twelve and one-half leagues in ten hours. All the country, which we have traversed today, with the exception of that which has water, and the stretch, which we have traveled, over the last hills, is barren of any pasturage or brush or trees, and apparently continues in the same way toward the east. (Anza evidently entered the hills through Midway Valley, ascended the ridge near Patterson Pass, till he could see Livermore Valley, dropped into Livermore Valley near the Hetch Hetchy power plant east of Livermore, and ascended Brown’s Ridge to camp. Bolton, Ed.)”¹²

De Anza’s diary documents the original European venture into the Valley in 1776. De Anza traveled over thirty-six miles stopping for water and firewood. His diary demonstrates the lack of forage for their

horses, typical of the region. Over the next century the dry valley, barren of forests, and with little water, except in winter, would be ruled by three nations.

The Spanish Franciscans of Mission San Jose were the first Europeans to use the Valley providing enclosed grazing land for their cattle. The Mission Fathers drove their herds from the Mission (Fremont) through Niles Canyon along Alameda Creek to the Valley. Mexico, after gaining independence from Spain in 1821, secularized the Mission lands. Considered a major reform of the Mexican administration Mission land appropriation began in 1831.



Mission San Jose Founded 1797

The twenty-one Missions designed as the primary instrument of colonization and conversion of native Californians to Catholicism, controlled vast landholdings. The goal of teaching natives to raise and tend crops and keep livestock until they conformed to a Spanish lifestyle and religion never materialized. The policy of native conversion instead forced neophytes to live and toil as virtual slaves. Missionaries justified the treatment as necessary to convert the “*gente sin razon*, or people without reason.”¹³ Priests’ actions, torture, flogging, maiming, and imprisonment along with the introduction of European diseases decimated the native population.¹⁴ The Missions failed miserably in the effort to

convert and Hispanicize Native Californians into Mexican civil society. Natives either died, became dependent on the Mission system, or escaped east into the interior.¹⁵ Mexico intended to distribute Mission lands to Hispanicized natives however only a small portion of the Mission land devolved to Mission trained natives. Mission land, secularized, under Mexican dominion, gave rise to “a new social institution, the land grant rancho.”¹⁶



Mexico 1821-1848

Mexico made over eight hundred-land grants covering eight million acres of coastal land between San Diego and Sonoma, east into the Central Valley.¹⁷ Two of the land grants, Rancho Las Positas del Valle de San Jose and Rancho del Valle de San Jose, constitute present day Livermore. These Rancho grants, their use, and legal adjudication during the transformation of the region from Mexico to the United States, illustrate the conflict between the Mexican Rancho Era and the United States. Rancho Las Positas del Valle de San Jose, initially granted to a naturalized Mexican citizen,

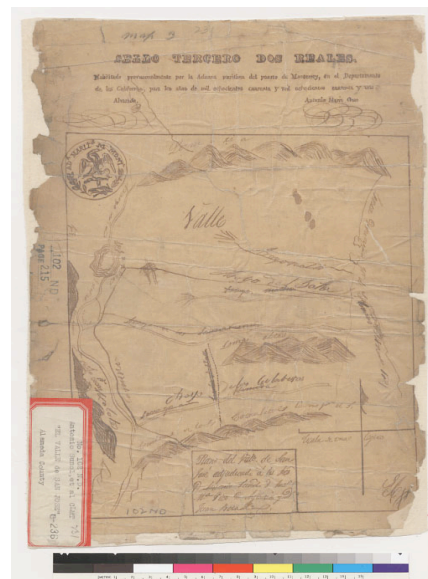

William Gulnac in 1834, was purchased and transferred to Jose Noriega and Robert Livermore in 1839. The grant, Expediente, or application and accompanying declarations from the mission priest and Alcalde, consists of two leagues, more or less, illustrated by the accompanying map or Diseño.¹⁸

Rancho Las Positas, located east of Livermore Avenue, ranges east towards The Altamont, from the base of the foothills on the north side of the valley to the sloping hills to the south and west to Pacheco's Rancho San Ramon. Rancho del Valle de San Jose, granted to the extended Bernal family, is located west and south of Rancho Las Positas. "Citizens Antonio Pico, Augustin Bernal, Juan Pablo Bernal, and Dona Dolores Bernal, wife of Don Antonio Sunol, with the knowledge of her husband", applied for the establishment of a grant "of vacant land named el Valle joining the Mission of San Jose, a map of which is herewith presented."¹⁹ Rancho del Valle de San Jose extended from the intersection of today's Highways 580 & 680 east to Livermore Ave, south to the foothills and west to Highway 680, covering over 48,000 acres.

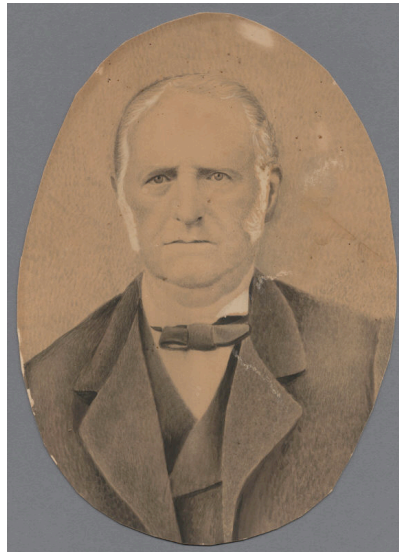

Robert Livermore, an English sailor, left his ship in Monterey in 1822, moved north to Mission San Jose working as a mason and vaquero. He worked on Rancho Los Tularcitos, today's Fremont, for Jose Higuera. Baptized at Mission Santa Clara June 20, 1823 he married Josefa Higuera Molina, Jose Higuera's daughter and widow of Jose Fuentes Molina, on May 5, 1838. He purchased cattle as early as 1831, which he maintained on a small portion of what became Jose Dolores Pacheco's Rancho Santa Rita.²⁰ William Gulnac, a New York blacksmith who immigrated to California in 1819, petitioned the Mexican government for the land grant for Las Positas in 1834 and after circulation among the authorities gained the necessary approval.²¹

Robert Livermore

In 1839 Jose Noriega and Robert Livermore, a “naturalized citizen, married with Mexican women”, presented an Expediente to the Prefects of the 1st District, Juan Alvarado and Jose Castro, for the place named Las Positas of the Valle de San Jose, having been abandoned by Guillermo Gulnac and purchased by Noriega and Livermore. They needed the property to increase their stock, which they now had in large numbers. The authorities approved the application once occupancy was verified.²²

Livermore and Noriega acquired Rancho Canada de Los Vaqueros north and adjacent to Rancho Las Positas in the Brushy Peak area from Francisco Alviso in 1844.²³ Robert and Josefa Livermore built an adobe home on Rancho Las Positas adjacent to Arroyo Las Positas. The location is just south of Highway 580 and west of North Livermore Ave.²⁴ The Livermores improved the home with a two-story wood house shipped around the horn and reassembled on the site. Livermore paid two workers, John

Strickland and John Tierney \$700 to erect the wood structure in 1851.²⁵ Livermore, his wife Josefa and her child, the eight more children she bore, and their one adopted child, lived on the original 8880 acres of Rancho Las Positas expanded with the acquisition of Rancho Canada de Los Vaqueros to double their land holdings.

Rancho del Valle de San Jose, the largest in the Valley, encompassing 48,432 acres, was home to three Bernal and Sunol families. Juan Pablo Bernal built his adobe home several miles to the southwest of Livermore's. Augustin Bernal built an adobe south and west of Juan Bernal. The Sunol adobe was located south of Augustin's home along Alameda Creek.²⁶ Soon the Bernal and Livermore families were interrelated by marriage.

Longhorn cattle roamed the countryside unimpeded by fences. "The entire economy depended on the production of cattle for the hide and tallow trade."²⁷ Ranchos raised sheep, horses, grapes for wine, vegetables; corn, rice, chili peppers, beans, grain, and fruit trees. The rancheros gathered their families and vaqueros at designated times for rodeos. They herded the cattle together and segregated the new calves. The newborn were divided by the same proportion of existing cattle, branded and released. Several steers were slaughtered, cooked over a large open fire and served with local drink to celebrate the successful rodeo.²⁸

California of the early 1830s was described in Richard Henry Dana's *Two Years Before the Mast* as destined to be "American in one way or another."²⁹ The hide and tallow trade led to increasing contact with the outside world; the French had stopped at Monterey for supplies and fresh water, British explorers had entered San Francisco Bay as did Russian Fur Company ships. But most significantly

ships from the United States entered San Francisco and Monterey Bays in increasing numbers.

Beginning with the Rocky Mountain Fur Company trappers led by legendary Jedediah Smith entered California from the east in 1827 and was soon followed by other trappers, traders, and settlers. “Smith’s arrival posed a substantive and symbolic threat not lost on Governor Echeandia.”³⁰ Within a few years others would follow overland and by sea. The maritime trade led to an “intricate four-way exchange—manufactured goods to California, sea otter pelts to China, then back to California with Chinese goods to pick up cattle hides and tallow for shipment back to Boston—linking two seas and three continents.”³¹ Maritime traders and commercial agents led by California notables John Marsh, William Hartnell, and Thomas Oliver Larkin figured prominently in the hide and tallow trade and importing manufactured goods into California. The increased trade reduced California’s isolation. In exchange for bales of hides and larders of tallow manufactured goods, furniture, clothing, and dry goods reduced the primitive nature of Mexican frontier life.³² The increased exposure whetted American expansionist interest in California.

The continental domination espoused by proponents of Manifest Destiny demanded an American West Coast presence. Texas had successfully rebelled against Mexico and Mariano Vallejo led the Californio’s consideration of American annexation. But if California could not be acquired peacefully the Americans would accomplish it by military means.³³ The United States Navy, led by Commodore Thomas ap Catesby Jones, acting under the mistaken belief that war had broken out between Mexico and the United States, landed marines at Monterey. Jones captured the town, raised the American flag, and demanded Mexico’s surrender. Learning his mistake the next day, Jones lowered his flag,

apologized and sailed away.³⁴ Although premature, Commodore Jones' actions indicated the coming events. France, Great Britain, Russia as well as the United States demonstrated their increased interest in California. President Polk, through the American Consul in Monterey, Thomas Oliver Larkin, promoted the Californios to create an independent California, either managed jointly by Californians and Americans or as an American military protectorate.³⁵ Meanwhile Senator Thomas Hart Benton pursued Manifest Destiny espousing American annexation of California in Congress.³⁶

American infiltration of Alta California increased during the 1840s. Some, largely “the representatives of the maritime interest,” adjusted to Mexican California, swore allegiance to Mexico, adopted Catholicism, married Mexican women, and qualified for land grants. While others, the pioneering interests-farmers and fur traders who came overland, led by Lansford Hastings and Benjamin Ide never “broke into society.”³⁷ Larkin came to California in 1832 as a trader without any known designs on California. By 1843, acting as American Consul, he promoted an independent California politically connected, annexed, or militarily protected by the United States. Larkin concluded that the Mexican government could not stand up to the European Nations demonstrating interest in California.³⁸ “President James K. Polk wanted California badly enough to risk war for it, but he preferred the path of least resistance: if possible, he wanted to stay on friendly terms with the Californians and buy the province in the Mexican capital, but he was prepared for a military take-over if all else failed.”³⁹ One way or another President Polk would have California.⁴⁰

United States Army Captain John Fremont, ostensibly leading a topographical mission in

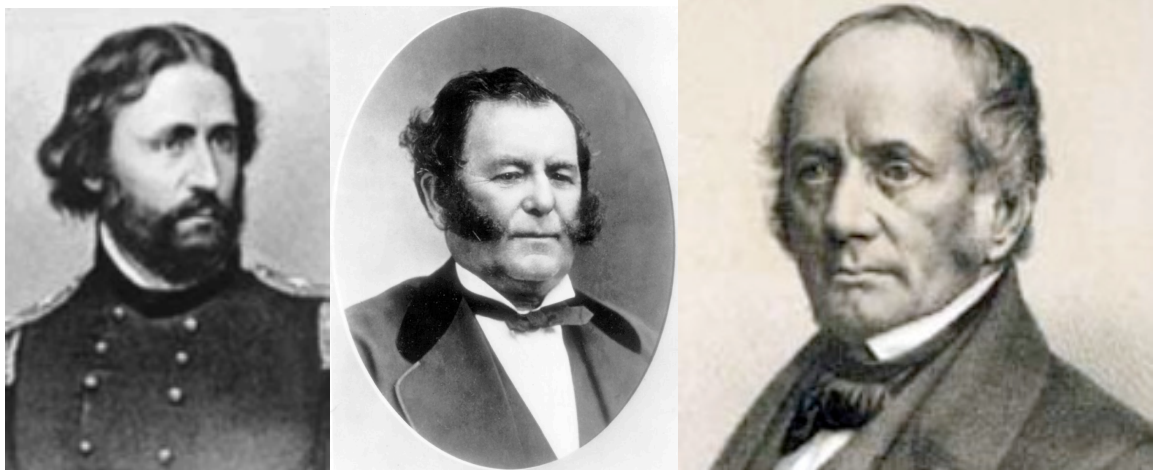

California travelled from Monterey to Oregon and returned, to the Napa Valley, in May 1846. The events of June 6, 1846 differ over whether orders were given by Fremont or not, but at dawn a party of Fremont’s American soldiers, hunters, riflemen and settlers in Sonoma entered the home of General Mariano Vallejo, arrested him and his brother, Salvador Vallejo. Intoxicated on Vallejo’s wine and brandy, the Americans declared California a Republic, “fashioned a star-and-grizzly-bear-embazoned flag” and raised it over the town square.⁴¹

The Americans took the Vallejos to Sutter’s Fort, under arrest, and imprisoned them. Sutter notes on June 16, 1846 that “Merritt & Kit Carson arrived (at Sutter’s Fort) with news of Sonoma being occupied by the Americans, and the same evening arrived as prisoners Genl. Vallejo, Lt. Col. Prudon & M. Leese (Vallejo’s son-in-law).⁴² Sutter “treated them with kindness and so good as I could.”⁴³ Capt. Fremont arrived with twenty men and had Sutter detain Jose Noriega (Robert Livermore’s partner in Rancho Las Positas) and Vicente Peralta (son of Don Luis Peralta of Rancho San Antonio-Oakland)

prisoners on June 19.⁴⁴ Held incommunicado for several months they were treated disrespectfully, referred to as "Greasers" by their captors, and lost their personal property to their jailors. Mariano Vallejo, known as a supporter of United States annexation, never forgot the injustice imposed on him. "Thus began the Bear Flag Rebellion and the Mexican War, which toppled the old regime."⁴⁵

Had his diplomatic efforts proceeded without armed interference Larkin believed California would have become part of the United States in the long run, "but of her own free will, at her own initiative and in her own good time." Richard Henry Dana agreed that California "would in one way or another have become American."⁴⁶ "From this perspective, Josiah Royce, writing in 1886, considered the forcible conquest of California as the original sin of American California history. What was taken by force, Royce argued, had been on the verge of being peacefully surrendered."⁴⁷ Larkin, supported by the American coastal trader "maritime interests", had not taken the American "pioneering interests", led by Lansing Hastings and Benjamin Ide, into his confidence. They participated in the Sonoma Bear Flag Revolt. Historians from Bancroft to De Voto conclude that the United States provoked the Californios in a cynical effort to acquire Alta California "and bungled a simple job of conquest."⁴⁸

The Californios viewed the rebels as "leperos, grimy adventurers, and "exiles from civilization. The Californians explained the rebellion as plain, unadulterated rapine...The time had come for the Yankees in California to play the Texas game".⁴⁹ But the Yankee rebels lacked serious grievances against the government. They were allowed to live untroubled by the Mexican government and by accepting citizenship and Catholicism acquire land grants. The Californios viewed the Bear Flaggers as unnecessary, brutish, drunken barbarians. Californios generally viewed the arrest and incarceration of

the Vallejos, unnecessary in light of their general support of American annexation, as deserved because they consorted with them. Bear Flaggers looted homes, stole cattle, horses, and enslaved native men and raped the women.⁵⁰

Americans who rejected Californio assimilation held a Protestant's Puritanical work ethic; objected to what they described as indolent people, allowing nature to do everything and man nothing. They held a general disapprobation towards Catholicism, belief in Manifest Destiny, and the "Anglo-Saxon" generalized fear of racial mixture."⁵¹ Highly judgmental accounts of Americans in California included traders, trappers, military officers, and Richard Henry Dana's widely read *Two Years Before the Mast*. The Californio men were regarded as highly indolent, poor fathers demanding complete familial obedience, subject to a multitude of vices, and generally poor citizens. The women, regarded as having little virtue, displayed extreme jealousy, and inflicted deadly revenge. Californians practiced absurd political activity always resulting in worsening the situation. American immigrants viewed the Mexican government as wholly inadequate in its treatment of a free press, public education, separation of the branches of government, equal protection of the law, and an independent judiciary. The Americans saw Californios as less than real men, lacking tradition, institutions, and goals.⁵²

The cultural, political, legal, social, religious differences between the Americans and Californios had just begun. Little armed conflict in the Mexican-American War occurred in California and ended at The Battle of La Mesa in May 1847. Shortly thereafter, hostilities ended entirely with the Capitulation of Cahuenga on May 13, 1847. The Mexican-American War ended with the signing of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo. Three centuries after the Spanish landed on North American soil, one century after they first settled in Alta California, and twenty-six years after Mexico declared independence

California's future was now settled. California was part of the United States.⁵³

The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo transferred California to the United States in 1848. The discovery of gold a few months later became widely published within the year, beginning the flood of immigration that brought hundreds of thousands into Alta California. John Sutter recorded the discovery in his diary: "Marshall arrived in the evening, it was raining very heavy, but he told me that he came on important business, after we was alone in a private Room he showed me the Specimens of Gold, that is he was not certain if it was Gold or not, but he thought it might be; immediately I made proof and found that it was Gold."⁵⁴ Gold, the discovery that would change California and overwhelm the Californios, including Sutter himself, sent a mystical Sirens' invitation to the world.

California, a land synonymous with gold and wealth, established that reputation with the discovery of gold at Coloma in January 1848, attracting worldwide attention. Immigrants poured into the new United States territory through the Golden Gate and across the Sierra Nevada Mountains. These newcomers came for the gold but ultimately found riches in the land. The land grant property rights, protected under the terms of the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, were incorporated into United States law and protected by the United States Constitution.⁵⁵ However the property owners had little time to adjust to American Law and perfect their interests before the Gold Rush immigration overwhelmed the region. California, initially under the military authority of the United States, did not become a state until 1850. The military governor, Colonel Richard Mason, declared the goldfields under federal jurisdiction freely open to anyone to mine after meeting claiming and filing protocols.⁵⁶ Land appeared available for the taking.

The "Golden Age" of the California Rancho Era quickly withered under the pressure of the

migration onslaught from Chile, Australia, Mexico, and fresh off their military victory in Mexico City, the United States of America. The non-Native population in 1848 estimated at less than 10,000 rapidly increased to approximately 100,000 by 1850.⁵⁷ The 1852 California state census count showed an increase to 260,949. The population grew to 379,994 by 1860, 560,246 by 1870 and 864,694 by 1880.⁵⁸ The immigrants placed a tremendous burden on land possession and ownership.

William M. Mendenhall joined a party of eleven men led by Lansford Hastings at Independence Missouri on August 17, 1845 headed for California. Crossing the Sierra Nevada Mountains as winter set in, they reached the headwaters of the Yuba River and following it downstream they reached Sutter's on Christmas Day 1845. John Sutter notes "Capt. W. L. Hastings direct from the U. States crossing the Mountains with 11 men, among them was Doctor Semple, if they had arrived one day later they would have been cut off by the immense quantity of snow."⁵⁹ Mendenhall reportedly enlisted in Fremont's California Battalion fighting throughout the Mexican-American War. His fellow Hastings' party member, Robert Semple, reportedly participated in the Bear Flag Revolt at Sonoma. The Bear Flag Rebellion included elements of Fremont's troops, American settlers, and "Delaware Indians." Fremont passed through Sutter's Fort during the Hastings' Party's stay.⁶⁰ Although Mendenhall clearly knew Semple, Hastings, and crossed paths with Fremont the United States Governmental records state his name is not found on the "rolls of California Volunteers, during the Mexican War, Treasury Department, and Commissioner of Pensions, Record and Pension Office, signed August 12 and August 9, 1897."⁶¹ Fremont employed Natives and others in the Mexican War and led the newly established California

Battalion, consisting of Fremont's army troops, mountain men, Delaware Indians, and Bear Flaggers.⁶² Fremont's Battalion allegedly marched from Monterey to Sutter's Fort during the War. The march took the Battalion through the Livermore Valley camping at Livermore's Rancho Las Positas. Mendenhall knew Hastings and Semple, both connected to the Bear Flag Revolt, and Fremont regularly called at Sutter's Fort for supplies during Mendenhall's stay there. Fremont's contingent responsible for the Bear Flag Revolt and later included in the loosely assembled California Battalion appears sufficiently vague in its make-up and there exist multiple contacts between Mendenhall and Fremont's troops to conclude that Mendenhall was likely involved.

The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo promised that the Californios "would be admitted to the enjoyment of all the rights of the United States according to the principles of the Constitution; and shall be maintained and protected in the free enjoyment of their liberty and property."⁶³ But the discovery of gold a few months after signing the treaty forced California into a "rapid, monstrous, maturity."⁶⁴ The Gold Rush brought a mass migration from all over the world, primarily the United States, with the same dreams of the Spanish explorers, gold, riches, and wealth. The land hungry Americans placed tremendous pressure on the land ownership legal system. The Americans believed they had a right to claim or "squat" on public land. However, the Mexican land grants were protected by the treaty, not public land, and not subject to preemption⁶⁵ or squatting. The United States enacted the Federal Land Commission Act of 1851 which provided that, "each and every person claiming lands in California by virtue of any right or title derived from the Spanish or Mexican government, shall present the same to

said commissioners when sitting as a board, together with such documentary evidence as the said claimant relies upon in support of said claims.”⁶⁶

The Forty-niners, dispirited by the hard work of gold mining, eyeing the land tried to “adjust the land question swiftly and drastically. In fact, the Yankees’ land hunger far outran the boundaries of the Land Law.”⁶⁷ The Americans’ position, simply stated, was that the average Rancho, which ranged from 4500 to 45,000 acres, was too large and therefore unfair. Further, the value of California land, recently obtained by the United States in war, had increased by the American demand for land. Since the Californios failed to use the land economically the new government’s position was it had little value during their tenure and they were entitled to only pre-1848 value. Americans viewed the Californios as “idly living on a revenue, wasting rich pastureland for unchecked herds. Hardy immigrants...industrious settlers” were necessary to develop the land.⁶⁸ The tension that existed between the Californios and Americans before annexation was clearly apparent after statehood. Californios obtained their land in accordance with Spanish and Mexican law, raised cattle to support their families, and served their country. The Americans viewed the Californios as indolent, claiming far too much land for any citizen and their claims to title were confusing, vague and of questionable legality. The Land Commission would adjust the claims and grants leaving the Rancheros with a more appropriate amount of land and redistribute the excess. The Rancheros would learn to cultivate the land and live the respectable and modest lives of their fellow Americans.⁶⁹

Californios did not comprehend the American concept of land ownership, based on use, and legal rights supported by solid documentary evidence. The legal process to prove their claims with evidence

mystified them. When the Californios settled the land it was plentiful and people were scarce.

Boundaries were unimportant in this vast arid wilderness where the settlers grazed cattle. Land was easy to come by for the Californios. They simply applied to the government for it based on the size of their herds and received corresponding grazing land.

Robert Livermore and Antonio Sunol followed the new American laws, filed claims to quiet title to their land grants, Rancho Las Positas and Rancho del Valle de San Jose, subjecting their property rights to Federal adjudication. The Federal Land Commissioners upheld both claims. The Attorney General on behalf of the United States appealed the ruling to Federal District Court. The Attorney General eventually appealed both cases to the United States Supreme Court. The Attorney General stipulated to discontinue the del Valle de San Jose appeal on November 12, 1859 leaving the Land Commissioners decision intact.⁷⁰ The ruling upheld division of the grant; one-half to Juan Bernal, one-quarter each to Antonio Sunol and Augustin Bernal, defining the grant as bounded on the southeast by the Corralitos, on the east by the Lomitas of the Positas, and on the northwest & north by the Arroyo Cananda de la Tasagara.

The commission upheld Livermore's claim for Las Positas, defining it as two leagues, more or less, by virtue of the grant made by Governor Juan B. Alvarado on April 10, 1839.⁷¹ The boundaries were set as the Sierra de Buenos Arroyo on the east, the border of the San Jose on the south, and the Rancho of Don Jose Dolores Pacheco on the west. The Supreme Court upheld the Commission's decision in an order signed on the "First Monday of December 1860 by Chief Justice Roger B. Taney."⁷² The land grants of Rancho del Valle de San Jose and Rancho Las Positas as defined by the Federal Land Commission and upheld by the United States Supreme Court belonged to the original grantees under the

laws of the United States and California in 1860 eight years after filing formal claims with the new government. However, ownership of the land had begun to change.

The population of California grew five-fold between 1850 and 1870 from 92,597 to 560,247. The Gold Rush brought immigrants from the east and around the world. Cities and towns grew along with the mining districts, farms, and ranches. San Francisco's population grew to 149,247, Sacramento 16,283, and Stockton to 10,066.⁷³ William Mendenhall founded the Town of Livermore in 1869 on approximately 680 acres of the Rancho del Valle de San Jose acquired in 1865. Historical references to Mendenhall, including his obituary consistently refer to his acquiring the property in 1865 but never include how he came by the land.

The Supreme Court Decision upholding the Bernal Land Grant referred the matter to the U.S. Surveyor General to determine the property lines in conformance with the Court's Decision. "The almost complete absence of professional surveyors in Spanish and Mexican California resulted in the use of vague or haphazard descriptions when conveying land. For ranchos, natural boundaries—a stream, the ocean, a sycamore tree, a road, a willow grove—were the best that could be expected. More often a rancho would be described vaguely like this: "the place known by the name of Las Salinas, with the Potrero Viejo, bounded by the Mission of San Francisco, the sea, and the lands of La Visitacion."⁷⁴ The survey set the specific boundaries of the Land Grants in the Valley in 1863. Settlement of boundaries allowed defined land transfers. Meanwhile Rancho life proceeded with cattle raising as the primary cash product. 1864 witnessed a serious drought in the Valley resulting in the decimation of much of the Bernal herds.

The Bernal family expanded from its roots on Rancho Santa Teresa in today's downtown San Jose.

Meanwhile Mendenhall married Mary Allen, who he met at Sutter's in 1845-6, at Pueblo San Jose de Guadalupe April 18, 1847. They built their home slightly southwest of the town he founded where they raised their ten children.⁷⁵ Mendenhall laid out the original town of Livermore, bounded on the north by First Street and the railroad tracks; the east by Lizzie Avenue, named for Mendenhall's daughter, and the eastern boundary of Rancho del Valle de San Jose; by Sixth Street on the south; and Q Street on the west in 1869. He donated twenty acres to the Central Pacific Railroad, which owned the right of way north of First Street, pushing its way through the Valley. The Railroad built a Station and rail yard along the tracks at L Street. The town map, filed with Alameda County on October 4th, 1869 reflected a population of seventy-five.

The Town of Livermore, however, was not incorporated by the State of California until 1876.

Mendenhall's family correspondence indicates that he acquired the Rancho del Valle de San Jose property from Thomas Hart.⁷⁶ Hart, reportedly a former employee of Robert Livermore's operated a tavern west of Livermore's home, close to or on Rancho del Valle de San Jose land. It remains unclear how and from whom Hart acquired the Rancho del Valle de San Jose property and how it was transferred to Mendenhall.

The Bernal's cattle herds suffered significant losses from the drought of 1864. Juan Pablo Bernal informally mortgaged pieces of the northeast corner of the family's Rancho for unstated goods and supplies. Augustine Bernal, Juan Pablo's brother and co-owner of the Rancho, filed suit in Alameda County Superior Court for an Accounting. Probate Referees of the Court examined the land and the claims against it resulting in the 1866 Report dividing and divesting portions of the Rancho to satisfy 64 claims. Divestments of the northeast corner of the Rancho de Valle de San Jose were made to Thomas Hart, entrepreneurs Hill & Harmon, and Bernal family members. William Mendenhall and brother Martin Mendenhall received several parcels of hundreds of acres. William Mendenhall acquired land that appears to have been divested to Thomas Hart and Hill & Harmon that he developed into the original Town of Livermore.⁷⁷ It is intriguing that the State of California did not incorporate the town for seven years after filing the town map with Alameda County. The Statute of Limitations for Adverse Possession at the time was seven years. One who occupies property of another in open, notorious, hostile, exclusive and continuous possession for seven years gains ownership.⁷⁸ In the absence of claims being filed between filing the Town map with the County in 1869 and incorporation by the State in 1876 it can safely be assumed that Mendenhall possessed unquestioned title.

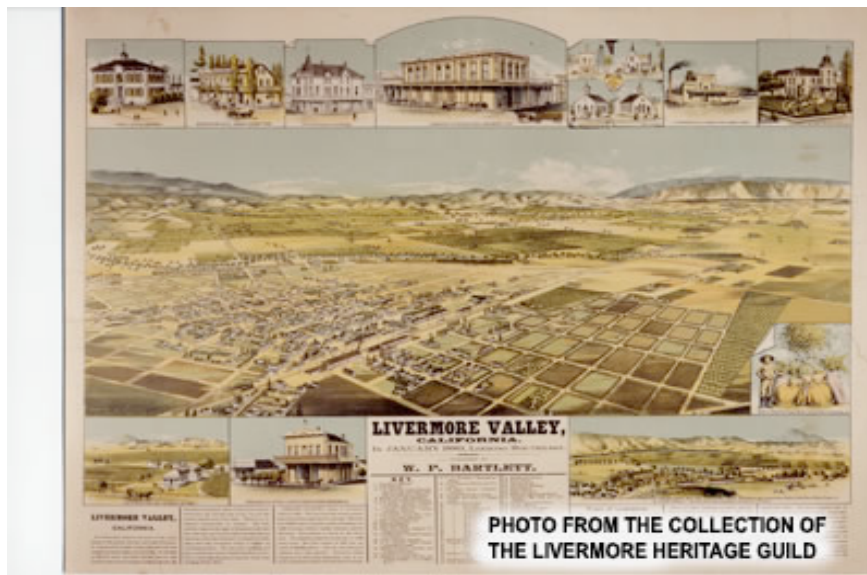
The Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo adopted and incorporated existing Spanish and Mexican land

grants into United States and California law. The land grant descriptions in the Diseño and Expedientes set forth vague and poorly defined boundaries. The size of the land grants, generally ten thousand to one hundred thousand acres, did not require greater specificity. American immigrants to California, accustomed to settling public land squatted on what appeared to be unoccupied land. A significant squatter population developed with influence on the political, legislative, and judicial history of the state.⁷⁹ Regardless how Mendenhall acquired the portion of Rancho del Valle de San Jose and the status of title when he took possession, he held it in “open, notorious, hostile, exclusive possession” for the required time to obtain legal title before incorporation by the State of California. The town of Livermore grew quickly. By 1870 it had Livermore College, a preparatory school, churches, fraternal organizations and a brewery. The town expanded east and north onto Livermore’s Rancho Las Positas land by incorporation in 1876.⁸⁰

The Californios “Golden Rancho Era” lasted from 1839 until the Mexican-American War ended in 1848. The discovery of gold at Coloma led to the overwhelming wave of American immigration with their racist, xenophobic, nativist view of Californios. The United States, determined to acquire California, instigated the War with Mexico, along the Texas border, initiated the Bear Flag Revolt at Sonoma, and failed to uphold the peace. The Treaty of Cahuenga ended the War in California. “By January, 1847, war had irrevocably separated California from Mexico and liquidated the native California government.”⁸¹ The Cahuenga Treaty preserved the Californios religious, property, social rights and culture. But the Gold Rush and ensuing onslaught of American immigrants imposed on the Californios the total, complete conquest the military sought to avoid. The land grants, valid under Mexican law and incorporated by the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo into American law in 1848, came under assault by the Forty-niners seeking to settle the land. Cultural, social, religious, and legal differences divided the conquering Americans from the Californios. The Americans never reconciled the benefits owed the Californios under the contract they entered into with the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo with their intent to dominate the land. The Californios’ property rights while guaranteed never had the opportunity to become perfected under American law before the Forty-niners immigrant land rush overwhelmed them. The Californios naïveté, in light of their defeat in 1848, led them to the brink of disaster. The hope to return to all that they considered important; religion, property, and social amenities before the War displayed the depth of their denial of American intent. Land ultimately stood at the center of the conflict. Californios believed the Treaties protected their interests while the victorious Americans viewed California as spoils of war.

The Federal Land Commission’s attempts to balance obligations the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo granted to the Californios and the land demands of the American immigrants satisfied no one.

California guaranteed full citizenship under the Constitution of 1849⁸² to all Mexican citizens who elected the United States. Although the Americans agreed to treat the Californios as equal citizens they attacked their property rights in the Land Commission and in the Courts.⁸³ Americans promised equality yet claimed Californios were culturally unsuited to American rule and that the American Protestant “work ethic” vision of the future meant progress and progress had its price.

Robert Livermore and the Bernalos prevailed in their legal battles to secure some of their land grant property rights originally granted by the Mexican Governor of Alta California. The Land Commission, Federal Courts, and Surveyor reduced the land grants for Rancho del Valle de San Jose and Rancho Las Positas in size. Validation of the claims took eight years to complete, nine years less than the statewide average. Land on both Ranchos was sold to American immigrants during the litigation. The Town of Livermore was founded on Rancho del Valle de San Jose land and grew quickly onto Rancho Las Positas land by the time of incorporation. This demonstrates a microcosm of post-Gold Rush California, chronicled in Pitt’s *The Decline of the Californios*, which illustrated similar events primarily in Southern California. It is impossible to speculate the outcome if the Californios had the opportunity to evolve into American citizens, perfect their real property rights under American law, and assimilate their culture, religion, and economy without the overwhelming pressure of Gold Rush immigration. The magnitude of American immigration, the differences in cultures, land use, and economic visions led to the only conclusion, that of American domination. The Livermore Valley witnessed remarkable transformation between de Anza’s expedition in 1776 to incorporation of the Town of Livermore in 1876; from Mission cattle grazing, to Rancho land grants, through the Mexican-American War, the Treaties of Cahuenga and Guadalupe Hidalgo, the Gold Rush, Federal Land Commission claims, Federal Court litigation, and eventual American domination.

APPENDIX

Expediente Rancho Las Positas, 1839, Bancroft Library-Spanish Original, California State Archives-English Translation:

“We Jose Noriega and Robert Livermore, residents of the jurisdiction of San Jose Guadalupe, married with Mexican women before your honor, with our respect, represent: That Don Guillermo Gulnac, having entirely abandoned the place named Las Positas of the Valle de San Jose, and we desire to invest the stock, which we now have in large numbers upon said place, which we have purchased from said Don Guillermo Gulnac, and at the same time, to improve the same as much as possible; and as Your Honor will see, that said Don Guillermo has relinquished his right to said land in our favor, and has delivered to us his title papers, which together with a map of the land, we present to Your Honor, in order that you may be pleased to issue a title of succession for the same in our favor, in order that we may legally occupy the same, and that no one may molest us therein. Wherefor, we pray Your Honor to grant our petition, in which we will receive grace and favor () what is necessary; Dispensing with the use of sealed paper, since there is none, of the corresponding seal.

San Jose de Guadalupe, March 22d, 1839 Jose Noriega Robert Livermore”

Expediente Rancho del Valle de San Jose, 1839, California State Archives-English Translation:

“We, the citizens Antonio Pico, Augustin and Juan Bernal and Dona Dolores Bernal, wife of the Spaniard Don Antonio Sunol, with the Knowledge of her husband, before your Honor, hereby desirous of forming an establishment in the country which will be useful, not only to the founders of the same, but to their descendents as well as to the whole territory, and having the means to make this establishment, we, for this purpose, ask Your Honor, to grant us the vacant lands, named “el Valle”, joining the Mission of San Jose, a map of which is herewith presented. Although at first sight, it may appear that our petition is extravagant, in view of the extent of the land we ask; but this is not so. When you take into consideration, that there are four of us, with families, and two thousand head of stock, besides these that may be brought from the Rancho Santa Teresa, for the reason that that they are there liable to considerable disease for want of sufficient room, wherefor, Since we have a considerable amount of stock, as above set forth, with which to commence said establishment, we hope Your Honor will not hesitate to grant us the said lands, protesting that we will share no labor or fatigue, however arduous it may be, in order to be able to present to the Country a work worthy of the same.

We have nothing to say in relation to our merit, since Your Honor and all the Authorities are aware of the services which we have rendered for the Common good, without ever to be excused there from, and this Concession will be a fresh stimulus to our good desires; wherefor, we pray that Your Honor may be pleased to give us title in for the lands we ask, as set forth upon the said map, with, which such restrictions, as title have up to this time been given, and under the condition, that as long as it may be necessary, the Mission San Jose shall continue to occupy the same place where it has its sheep; and under the condition of settling in said place as soon as possible two thousand head of cattle and to improve the place as much as possible by such (), as is adaptable to the territory.

Wherefor, we pray Your Honor, to be pleased to promise as we have asked, which favor we will perpetuate by our gratitude, Swearing that we do not proceed in bad faith, and to whatever is necessary.
