# NEW GRANT AWARD TO HELP LOCAL MANUFACTURERS AND DEFENSE CONTRACTORS

October 25, 2022

The Quad Cities Chamber is one of four Illinois Defense Manufacturing Consortium (ILDMC) community members that will share a \$5 million grant to help local manufacturing companies and defense contractors grow through operational excellence, innovative technology and workforce.

The five-year grant was awarded by the U.S. Department of Defense's (DOD) Defense Manufacturing Community Support Program. In addition to the Quad Cities Chamber, ILDMC partners include the Cook County Bureau of Economic Development represented by Chicago Metro Metals Consortium, Rockford Area Economic Development Council, Greater Peoria Economic Development Council and Illinois Manufacturing Excellence Center.

Each partner will receive \$675,000 in funding. The federal grant is supplemented by \$1.6 million in non-federal funds to support the project.

"A resilient supply chain requires modern manufacturing that involves use of advanced technology, and advanced manufacturing requires a modern workforce," said Julie Forsythe, the Chamber's Senior Vice President of Business & Economic Growth. "ILDMC will implement comprehensive workforce strategies focused on untapped and underrepresented populations to build a diverse manufacturing workforce in collaboration with stakeholders."

A Resolution declaring a 2005 John Deere Motor Grader, serial # DW672DX596790, a City-owned asset, as surplus property and authorizing the Fleet and Facilities Manager to dispose of said vehicle through the legal disposal process that is most advantageous to the City, whether sealed bid, auction, negotiations, or otherwise.

**Explanation:** City staff is seeking authorization to declare unit #627, a 2005 John Deere Motor Grader, as surplus. The motor grader is currently scheduled for replacement in 2033; however, it is extremely underutilized, as it has not had any hours placed on the meter since April of 2021 and the fuel is now needing to be removed. This unit has been used primarily in the past to remove ice in snow emergencies, which is not what it was designed to do and damaged several driveways, manhole covers, and seal coat roads during its last use.

City staff feels that a better use of funds would be to declare this unit as surplus and use the revenue from its sale toward the purchase of a mid-sized tractor loader that has box blade on the back to be used for grading streets, alleys and ditches. The bucket on the front would make it versatile as it can load salt, move dirt, load cold mix, and assist with storm debris clean up.

Currently, City staff is using a farm tractor that is in Parks Maintenance division for grading; however, this is undersized and ill equipped for the street and alley grading it is doing. As City staff continues to transition the operation to include more paving to be done in-house, the need for proper dedicated equipment in the Streets Maintenance division will be vital as the use of the Parks Maintenance tractor will be limited during prime mowing season as it is used mainly used to mow right-of-ways.

Staff requests approval to declare this equipment as surplus and to authorize disposal of the equipment through the legal disposal process that is most advantageous to the City, whether sealed bid, auction, negotiation or otherwise.

A Resolution authorizing the Mayor and City Clerk to execute and attest to the Seventh Amendment to the Site License Agreement with New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC related to AT&T cellular equipment at the 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue elevated water tank.

**Explanation:** AT&T has a license agreement with the City to maintain cellular equipment at the water tank located at 1531 17<sup>th</sup> Avenue. This agreement has been in place since 2003. Since that time, six previous amendments have been executed, resulting in annual water fund revenue slightly more than \$20,000. This amendment allows for the installation of a back-up generator to be used by AT&T in the event of an extended power outage. In exchange, the water fund will receive an additional \$200 per month.

In addition, the amendment stipulates that AT&T must reimburse the City for costs associated with future cellular equipment improvement project plan review and inspection. Utilities staff and Corporation Counsel negotiated these new terms with AT&T and recommends approval.

**Staff Recommendation:** Approval

THIS SEVENTH AMENDMENT TO SITE LEASE AGREEMENT ("Seventh **Amendment**"), dated as of the latter of the signature dates below, is by and between City of Moline, an Illinois (Home Rule) municipal corporation, ("**Licensor**") and New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, having a mailing address of 1025 Lenox Park Blvd NE, 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor, Atlanta, GA 30319 ("**Licensee**").

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee (or its predecessor-in-interest) entered into a certain Site License Agreement dated March 20, 2001 as amended by that certain First Amendment to Site License Agreement dated May 16, 2003, as amended by that certain Second Amendment to Site License Agreement dated August 13,2013, as amended by that certain Third Amendment to Site License Agreement dated May 24, 2016, as amended by that certain Fourth Amendment to Site License Agreement dated November 7,2017, as amended by that certain Fifth Amendment dated June 24, 2019, as amended by that certain Sixth Amendment to Site License Agreement dated May 28, 2020 (collectively referred to herein as "Agreement") whereby Licensor licenses to Licensee certain premises ("Premises"), therein described, that are a portion of the Property located at 1531 17th Avenue, Moline, IL 61265.

WHEREAS, effective December 31, 2006, TeleCorp Realty, LLC merged into TeleCorp Communications, LLC; and

WHEREAS, effective December 31, 2011 TeleCorp Communications, LLC merged with and into New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC; and

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee desire to amend the Agreement to provide additional renewal terms of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee desire to amend the Agreement to allow for the installation of a Diesel Generator within the Leased Premises; and

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee desire to adjust the License Fees in conjunction with the modifications to the Agreement contained herein; and

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee, in their mutual interest, wish to amend the Agreement as set forth below accordingly.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Licensor and Licensee agree as follows:

1. **Term.** The term of the Agreement shall be amended to provide that the current term, which commenced on March 30, 2021, shall expire on March 29, 2026 ("Current Term"), and commencing on March 30, 2026, will be automatically renewed, upon the same terms and conditions of the Agreement, for four (4) additional five (5) year terms (each a "Renewal Term"). Hereafter, "Term" shall include the Current Term and any applicable Renewal Term. The Terms will automatically renew without further action by Licensee unless Licensee notifies Licensor in writing of Licensee's intention not to renew the Agreement at lease sixty (60) days prior to the expiration of the Current Term or any Renewal Term. Licensor agrees and acknowledges that, except as such permitted use or other rights may be amended herein, Licensee may continue to use and exercise its rights under the Agreement as permitted prior to the first Renewal Term.

2. **Generator.** Licensee shall have the right to install, repair, maintain, modify, replace, remove, utilize, and operate a new generator, including back-up power supply (all collectively, the "New Equipment") within Licensee's additional licensed premises, as more specifically depicted on Exhibit 1. The description for the Premises, as modified by the additional licensed premises will be attached to this Agreement as Exhibit 1. The New Equipment shall remain the property of Licensee, and Licensee shall have the right to remove or modify it at any time.

3. License Fees. Commencing the first day of the month following commencement of installation of the New Equipment ("Increase Commencement Date"), the License Fees shall be increased by \$200 per month, subject to further adjustments, if any, as provided in the Agreement; provided that the first such increased payment shall not be due until thirty (30) days after the Increase Commencement Date and provided further that, any partial month occurring after the Increase Commencement Date, the increased License Fee amount shall be pro-rated. For clarification, the additional \$200 will be capitalized as part of the regular License Fee and be subject to all adjustments to License Fees otherwise provided in the Agreement, as amended.

<u>Fee Guarantee</u>. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Agreement, as amended, in the event the Agreement terminates prior to ten (10) years after the Effective Date hereof (the "Fee Guarantee Date"), Licensee shall pay to Licensor in one lump-sum the total remaining License Fee payments that would have otherwise been due to the Licensor through the Fee Guarantee Date (the "Fee Guarantee Amount") within thirty (30) days after termination of the Agreement, provided however, the Fee Guarantee Amount shall not be paid to Owner in the event that: (i) the Agreement is terminated by Licensee due to an uncured breach of the Agreement by Licensor; or (ii) the Agreement is terminated by either party or any applicable third party having a legal or statutory right to terminate the Agreement due to a condemnation or taking of the Premises by the applicable local, state or federal jurisdiction or agency.

- 4. Licensee's Use of the Premises.
  - A. Any equipment no longer being used by Licensee shall be removed from the Premises.
  - B. Licensee, its personnel, invitees, contractors, agents, sublicensees, or its authorized sublessees, or assigns may use the Premises, at no additional cost or expense, for the transmission and reception of any and all communications signals and, to modify, supplement, replace, upgrade, expand, including the number and type(s) of antennas, or refurbish the equipment and/or improvements thereon (collectively, "Communications Facility"), so long as these changes do not exceed the structural capacity of the tower/structure at this height. Before Licensee commences any modification(s) which increase the structural load on the tower/structure, Licensee shall reimburse Licensor up to \$3,500.00 for the cost of engaging a structural engineer to (i) analyze the ability of the tower/structure to safely accommodate the Licensee's proposed modifications to the Communications Facility, and (ii) monitor and inspect Licensee's work on the tower/structure and the Licensor's Property (hereafter, "Engineering Review"). The Licensee's obligation to reimburse Licensor shall apply to each request for modification. Following Licensee's request for modification, Licensee shall deposit \$3,500.00 into a

> mutually agreeable joint order escrow account held by a mutually agreeable escrow officer. All costs of the escrow account shall be borne by the Licensee. After both part (i) and (ii) of the Engineering Review are completed, Licensor shall provide Licensee with a copy of the engineer's invoices describing the expenses actually incurred in connection with the Engineering Review. Licensor and Licensee shall issue a joint order to the escrow officer to release from the escrow account an amount equal to the expenses actually incurred by Licensor in connection with the Engineering Review within fifteen (15) days after receipt of documentation of said expenses. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Engineering Review expenses exceed \$3,500.00, Licensor shall be liable for such excess amount. Each Engineering Review shall not exceed twenty (20) days, which time period shall apply separately to part (i) and (ii) of Engineering Review. If the structural engineer opines that the proposed modification cannot be safely attached to the tower/structure, Licensor may deny Licensee's request for the modification. If the structural engineer opines that Licensee's work is not performed consistently with Licensee's plans or in a manner which interferes with Licensor's primary use of Licensor's Property, Licensee shall correct its work within twenty (20) days after receipt of written notice. Section B of Exhibit D to the Site License Agreement is hereby deleted and superseded by this section.

- 5. **Memorandum of Lease.** Either party will, at any time upon fifteen (15) days prior written notice from the other, execute, acknowledge, and deliver to the other a recordable Memorandum of Agreement. Either party may record this memorandum at any time, in its absolute discretion.
- 6. Other Terms and Conditions Remain. In the event of any inconsistencies between the Original Lease Agreement, any existing Amendments to the Agreement, and this Amendment, the terms of this Amendment shall control. Except as expressly set forth in this Amendment, the Agreement otherwise is unmodified and remains in full force and effect. Each reference in the Agreement to itself shall be deemed also to refer to this Amendment.
- 7. Capitalized Terms. All capitalized terms used but not defined herein shall have the same meanings as defined in the Agreement.

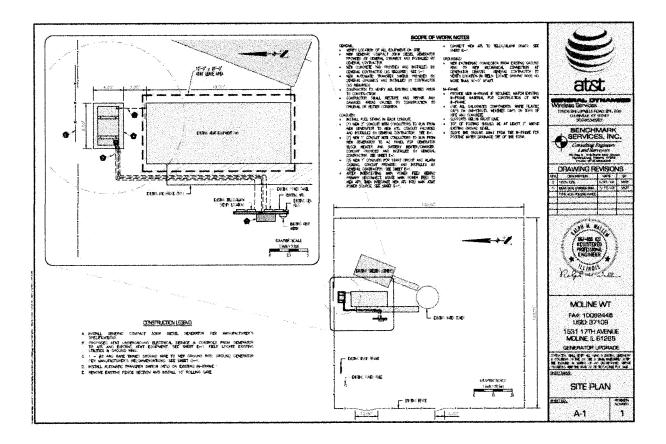

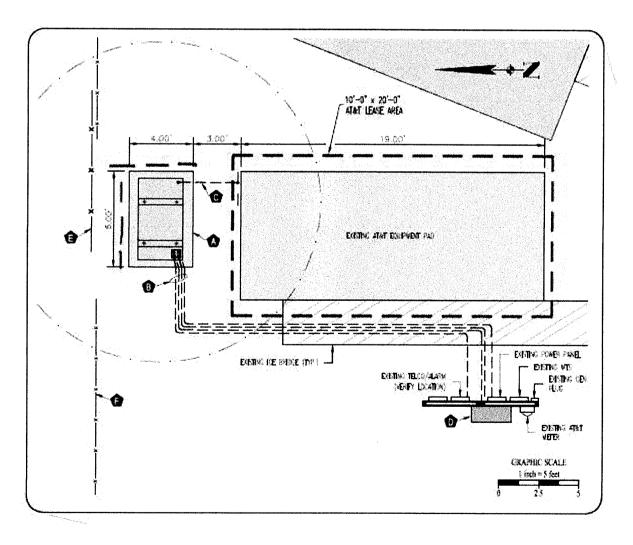

An Ordinance dissolving the special tax allocation fund and terminating the designation of the SouthPark Mall Redevelopment Project Area (TIF No. 8) within the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois. (Chris Mathias, Community and Economic Development Director)

Explanation: TIF #8 (SouthPark Mall) was established in 2013. The TIF was created to allow for a redevelopment of the mall and to bring in new tenants to increase the tax base. Under this plan, the mall owners were able to tear down a sizeable portion of the mall which allowed them to improve their vacancy numbers. The former food court, former Sears department store and mall connections in between were demolished shortly after the creation of TIF #8. A Dick's Sporting Goods was also built which has been a successful tenant at the mall. However, over many years, the mall owners have been disputing their property value and have been applying to lower their equalized assessed valuation (EAV). The decrease in their property values has lowered the EAV below the original TIF base EAV, meaning the property owners receive no benefits from this TIF. Staff have tried to get the mall owners to come to the City with a redevelopment project and, with no plan in sight, have decided to close the TIF. Moving forward, the City will notify affected taxing districts of the pending termination of the TIF district by November 1, 2023, as required under state law. Except for transfers to an escrow account created for transitional costs, all redevelopment project costs and obligations relating to the TIF will be paid and retired prior to December 31, 2023. This ordinance would dissolve the special tax allocation fund relating to the TIF district and would terminate the TIF district.

**Staff Recommendation:** Approval

**Fiscal Impact:** TIF No. 8 will be closed and money returned to the taxing bodies.

### AN ORDINANCE

DISSOLVING

The special tax allocation fund and terminating the designation of the SouthPark Mall Redevelopment Project Area (TIF No. 8) within the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois.

WHEREAS, in accordance with and pursuant to the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act (65 ILCS 5/11-74.4-1 et seq.), as supplemented and amended (the "TIF Act"), including by the power and authority of the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois (the "City"), the City Council of the City (the "Corporate Authorities") adopted a series of ordinances (Ordinance Nos. 3034-2012, 3035-2012 and 3036-2012 on September 17, 2013); and

WHEREAS, under and pursuant to the TIF Act and the TIF Ordinances, the City designated the South Park Mall Redevelopment Project Area (the "Redevelopment Project Area"), approved the related redevelopment plan, as amended (the "Redevelopment Plan"), including the redevelopment projects described in the Redevelopment Plan (collectively, the "Redevelopment Projects") and established a special tax allocation fund (the "Fund") in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, on October 25, 2023, the City will notify affected taxing districts of the pending termination of the Redevelopment Project Area, as a redevelopment project area, in accordance with the provisions of Section 11-74.4-8 of the TIF Act; and

WHEREAS, except for such transfers to the Escrow Account as described herein, all redevelopment project costs have been or will be paid, all obligations relating thereto have been or will be paid and retired prior to December 31, 2023; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of Section 11-74.4-8 of the Act, the City desires to dissolve the special tax allocation fund relating to the Redevelopment Project Area and to terminate the designation of the Redevelopment Project Area as a redevelopment project area.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOLINE, ILLINOIS, as follows:

<u>Section 1. Incorporation of Recitals.</u> The foregoing recitals are incorporated into this Ordinance as the findings of the Corporate Authorities.

<u>Section 2. Escrow Account.</u> With respect to the Redevelopment Project Area, provisions have been made or will be made prior to December 7, 2023, to create an escrow account (the "Escrow Account") and to transfer certain amounts from the Fund to the Escrow Account for the sole purposes of:

- (i) paying amounts remaining to be paid in connection with certain payment obligations under existing Redevelopment Agreements, whereby projects were substantially underway but not expected to be complete by December 31, 2023;
- (ii) paying final amounts on public works projects initiated by the City not later than October 1, 2023, but not expected to be complete by December 31, 2023; and
- (iii) paying any administrative costs incurred by the City for staff, professional and legal services related to the administration of this Ordinance, the Redevelopment Plan, the Redevelopment Project Area, the Fund, and the Escrow Account.

<u>Section 3.</u> <u>Dissolution of Fund</u>. The City Treasurer shall perform the final closing of the books and records of the Fund for the Redevelopment Project Area no later than December 31, 2023, and thereupon said Redevelopment Project Area is dissolved.

<u>Section 4</u>. <u>Termination of Redevelopment Project Area</u>. The designation of the Redevelopment Project Area as a redevelopment project area is hereby terminated as of December 31, 2023.

Section 5. Closing of Escrow Account. As soon as practical after satisfying the purposes of the Escrow Account, as stated in Section 2 of this Ordinance, any amounts remaining in the Escrow Account, if any, shall be declared surplus and distributed back to the affected taxing districts pursuant to Section 11-74.4-8 of the TIF Act and such Escrow Account closed.

<u>Section 6</u>. <u>Additional Real Estate Tax Increment</u>. In the event that additional incremental real estate taxes attributable to the Redevelopment Project Area shall be received by the City from the late payment of real estate taxes or for any other reason, after the dissolution of the Fund, such monies shall be declared as surplus funds and sent back to the Rock Island County Treasurer for distribution back to the affected taxing bodies as prescribed in Section 11-74.4-8 of the TIF Act.

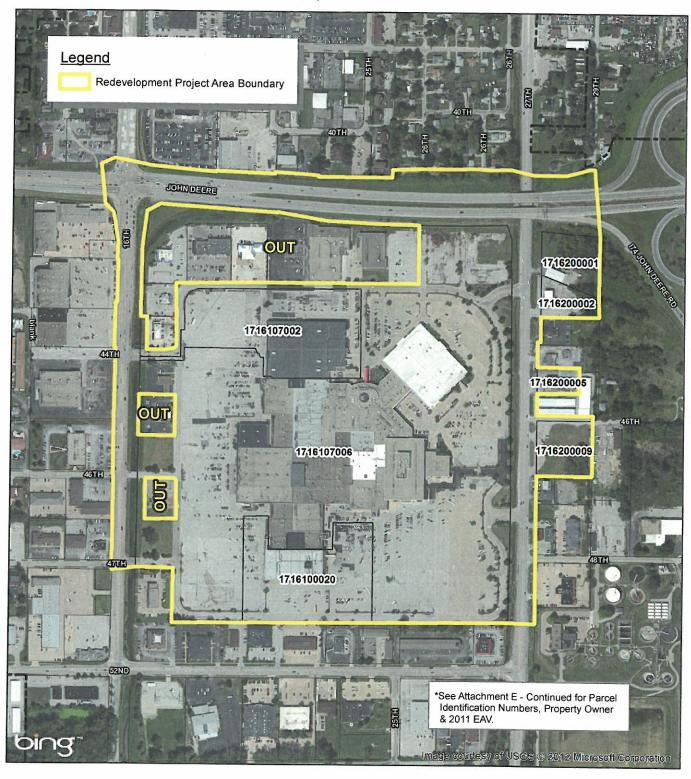

An Ordinance dissolving the special tax allocation fund and terminating the designation of the Route 6/150 Redevelopment Project Area (TIF No. 9) within the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois. (Chris Mathias, Community and Economic Development Director)

**Explanation:** TIF #9 (Route 6/150) was established in 2012. At the time, it was thought that the former Horace Mann elementary school and properties to the southeast would be developed, and the TIF district was created to help incentivize that. However, the school district ended up finding a school user to lease the former elementary school. Also, the property owner at the southeast corner of the intersection has had difficulty in obtaining floodway development permits from the State of Illinois. The City would like to close the under-utilized TIF district. Moving forward, the City will notify affected taxing districts of the pending termination of the TIF district by November 1, 2023, as required under state law. Except for transfers to an escrow account created for transitional costs, all redevelopment project costs and obligations relating to the TIF will be paid and retired prior to December 31, 2023. This ordinance would dissolve the special tax allocation fund relating to the TIF district and would terminate the TIF district.

### **AN ORDINANCE**

DISSOLVING

The special tax allocation fund and terminating the designation of the Route 6/150 Redevelopment Project Area (TIF No. 9) within the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois.

WHEREAS, in accordance with and pursuant to the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act (65 ILCS 5/11-74.4-1 et seq.), as supplemented and amended (the "TIF Act"), including by the power and authority of the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois (the "City"), the City Council of the City (the "Corporate Authorities") adopted a series of ordinances (Ordinance Nos. 3037-2012, 3038-2012 and 3039-2012 on December 4, 2012); and

WHEREAS, under and pursuant to the TIF Act and the TIF Ordinances, the City designated the Route 6/150 Redevelopment Project Area (the "Redevelopment Project Area"), approved the related redevelopment plan, as amended (the "Redevelopment Plan"), including the redevelopment projects described in the Redevelopment Plan (collectively, the "Redevelopment Projects") and established a special tax allocation fund (the "Fund") in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, on October 25, 2023, the City will notify affected taxing districts of the pending termination of the Redevelopment Project Area, as a redevelopment project area, in accordance with the provisions of Section 11-74.4-8 of the TIF Act; and

WHEREAS, except for such transfers to the Escrow Account as described herein, all redevelopment project costs have been or will be paid, all obligations relating thereto have been or will be paid and retired prior to December 31, 2023; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of Section 11-74.4-8 of the Act, the City desires to dissolve the special tax allocation fund relating to the Redevelopment Project Area and to terminate the designation of the Redevelopment Project Area as a redevelopment project area.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOLINE, ILLINOIS, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> <u>Incorporation of Recitals.</u> The foregoing recitals are incorporated into this Ordinance as the findings of the Corporate Authorities.

<u>Section 2.</u> <u>Escrow Account.</u> With respect to the Redevelopment Project Area, provisions have been made or will be made prior to December 7, 2023, to create an escrow account (the "Escrow Account") and to transfer certain amounts from the Fund to the Escrow Account for the sole purposes of:

- (i) paying amounts remaining to be paid in connection with certain payment obligations under existing Redevelopment Agreements, whereby projects were substantially underway but not expected to be complete by December 31, 2023;
- (ii) paying final amounts on public works projects initiated by the City not later than October 1, 2023, but not expected to be complete by December 31, 2023; and
- (iii) paying any administrative costs incurred by the City for staff, professional and legal services related to the administration of this Ordinance, the Redevelopment Plan, the Redevelopment Project Area, the Fund, and the Escrow Account.

<u>Section 3.</u> <u>Dissolution of Fund</u>. The City Treasurer shall perform the final closing of the books and records of the Fund for the Redevelopment Project Area no later than December 31, 2023, and thereupon said Redevelopment Project Area is dissolved.

<u>Section 4</u>. <u>Termination of Redevelopment Project Area</u>. The designation of the Redevelopment Project Area as a redevelopment project area is hereby terminated as of December 31, 2023.

Section 5. Closing of Escrow Account. As soon as practical after satisfying the purposes of the Escrow Account, as stated in Section 2 of this Ordinance, any amounts remaining in the Escrow Account, if any, shall be declared surplus and distributed back to the affected taxing districts pursuant to Section 11-74.4-8 of the TIF Act and such Escrow Account closed.

<u>Section 6</u>. <u>Additional Real Estate Tax Increment</u>. In the event that additional incremental real estate taxes attributable to the Redevelopment Project Area shall be received by the City from the late payment of real estate taxes or for any other reason, after the dissolution of the Fund, such monies shall be declared as surplus funds and sent back to the Rock Island County Treasurer for distribution back to the affected taxing bodies as prescribed in Section 11-74.4-8 of the TIF Act.

<u>Section 7.</u> <u>Effective Date of Ordinance</u>. That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage, approval, and if required by law, publication in the manner provided for by law.

<u>Section 8. Invalidity</u>. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

<u>Section 9. Conflicts</u>. All ordinances, resolutions or orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

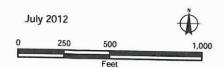

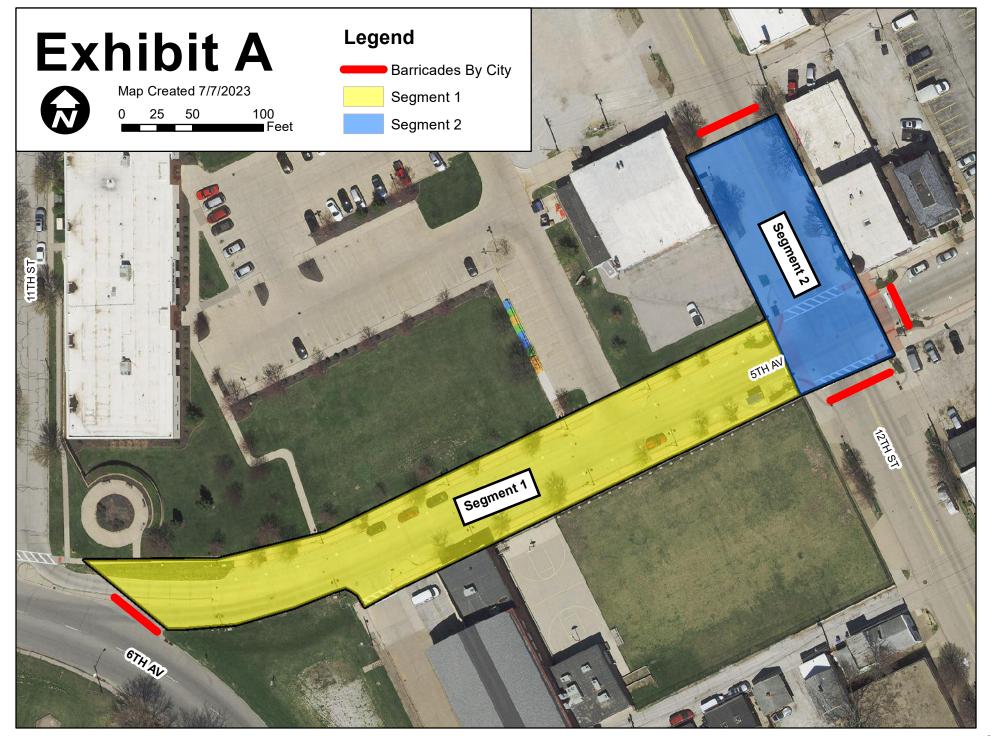

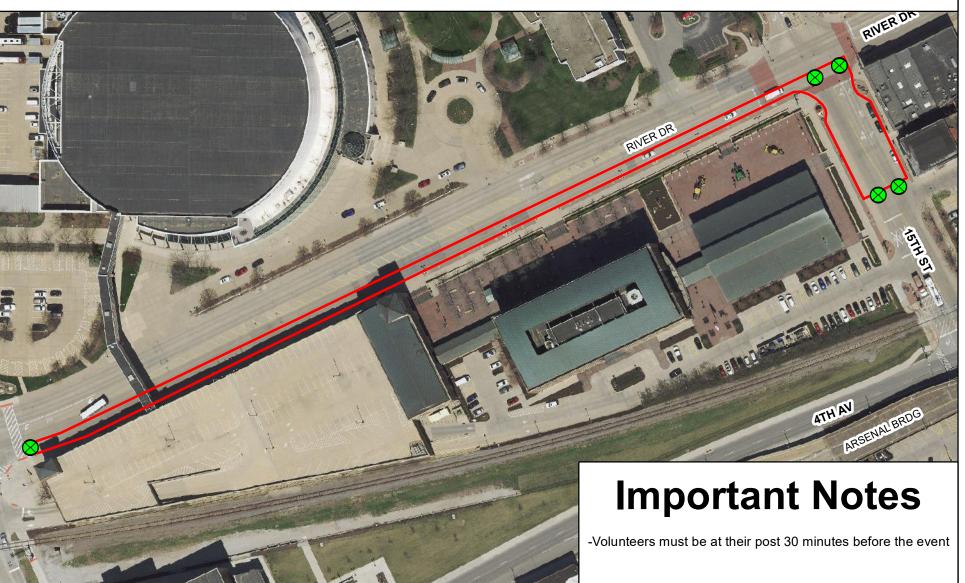

Mayor Rayapati called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in the Committee-of-the-Whole Conference Room.

#### **Council Call to Order**

#### Pledge of Allegiance

#### **Invocation**

Alderperson O'Brien gave an Invocation.

#### Roll Call

Roll call was taken with Mayor Rayapati, Alderpersons Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, O'Brien, Castro and Schmidt present. Absent: Razzaque.

#### **Public Comment**

None.

### Roundtable Discussion – 2024-2026 Budget

8.1 Enterprise Fund Finances Discussion. Mayor Rayapati offered opening remarks, reminding City Council that although they may have varying ideas, everyone is coming at this work from a helpful place. Mayor Rayapati then turned the discussion to Carol Barnes, Director of Finance. Barnes shared there were four large open items Finance would like direction on prior to finalizing the budget in October. Barnes requested input and priorities from Council. The four main open items are as follows: 1) A complete review of all fees in the four enterprise funds: Barnes noted that as those fees are reviewed, there is a fee schedule that would be used throughout the evening as a reference. 2) Unfunded projects: Barnes shared that over the last three to four years, there have been discussions of projects, and collectively, the City has been seeking revenue sources. Barnes stated that viable revenue streams, which Finance would like the City Council to consider, would be reviewed. 3) A brief review of the ARPA allocation: Barnes stated that Quarter Three will be submitted at the end of October, 2023. 4) Review of payments to agencies that are completed annually: Barnes declared this as an official budget work session. If City Council gives direction to staff, those items will be added to the agenda appropriately. Tony Loete, Director of Utilities, requested a consensus from the City Council for items recommended by the Utilities Department. Loete then reviewed the challenges presented, which included, but were not limited to, large scale improvement needed at the water waste treatment plant and the aging equipment, challenges at South Slope, and challenges in the River Drive Interceptor Improvements. Alderperson Timion asked Loete about principle being forgiven and what the conditions are for that. Loete noted the State has a scoring system based, in part, on the median household income. Mayor Rayapati asked for more information on how the census tracts work. Loete will follow-up on this.

Bob Vitas, City Administrator, noted for future reference that City Council ultimately approved the Lakeshore Recycling System (LRS) project in terms of meeting criteria, which is yet to be determined by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA). This project will create a sizeable revenue stream. Those funds should go towards repayment of the debt in TIF 7. Vitas stated that is the top priority to get TIF 7 off the General Fund obligation. Once that debt is retired, Vitas suggested that revenue be dedicated back to the sanitation fund, and used for capital equipment as well, to reduce the user rates to citizens in Moline.

**8.2** Competing Budget Pressures. Carol Barnes, Director of Finance, stated that back in June of 2023, Bob Vitas, City Administrator, shared the City had a lot of competing budget pressures. Over the past few months, four of those budget pressures have been addressed. Nine issues were set to be addressed at the September 19, 2023 meeting and two issues were set to be deferred. Barnes shared the 10-year plan for funding all projects discussed on page one of the *Competing Budget Pressures* presentation document.

Barnes noted Finance is looking for City Council to prioritize those funds. David Dryer, Director of Engineering, reviewed the CIP 2024-2026+ handout. Mayor Rayapati stated that in the past, a common question has been whether or not the Engineering Department was going to get to all the projects. Mayor Rayapati stated it sounds like Engineering has taken the time, cost, etc. to engineer and arrange a schedule so these items can be accomplished. Dryer replied stating there are three engineers in design and the department is going to do everything they can to get the projects checked off and complete. Dryer stated that if necessary, the department will seek assistance from outside design consultants. Dryer noted that delays in projects are more often due to State and Federal requirements rather than things that within the City's control. Barnes continued reviewing the updated project list and reviewed potential new revenues. Alderperson Timion asked if the City has reevaluated the price of renovating the Central Fire Station versus new construction. Vitas stated administration could try to complete a cost estimate, but noted that costs are higher than when the firehouse was first discussed in early 2022. Jason Estes, Project Manager for FMG Architects, approached the podium and shared that when FMG Architects was brought on to the project, they did look at a full facility location. Estes stated that the firehouse is not currently in the correct location. In terms of the existing facility, the infrastructure is aged, there are a lot of issues pertaining to clearance, access, and the area is short of about 12,000 square feet for an ideal programmatic space. Estes noted that the cost to build new would be around \$8,000,000 to \$9,000,000 and there would be additional costs as well. The cost does not include gaining any additional square footage. Discussion was held. Alderperson Castro inquired about bonds the City needs to pay off. Barnes stated there are several, and most are retiring in about eight years. Discussion was held regarding which projects should take priority. Vitas suggested approving funding sources and then deciding which projects to move forward with.

Alderperson Timion made a motion to remove the Green Valley Turf Project. Seconded by Alderperson Castro. Discussion held. Motion failed on roll call with the following vote: Ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Timion, and Finch. Nays: Alderpersons O'Brien, Schmidt, Murphy, and Macias.

City Council took a five minute recess at 8:40 p.m.

City Council reconvened at 8:46 p.m.

Alderperson Timion made a motion to set the franchise fees for 2024 and 2025 to 1.5%, with the fee being 3% in 2026. Seconded by Alderperson Murphy. Further discussion was held. The motion passed unanimously.

Alderperson Timion made a motion to set the amusement tax to 5%. Seconded by Alderperson Castro. The motion passed unanimously.

Carol Barnes, Finance Director, asked if the City Council would like the Finance Department to prepare a resolution for the franchise fee and an ordinance for the amusement tax fee, as soon as the September 26, 2023 City Council meeting, to have it effective January 1, 2024. Mayor Rayapati mentioned that this should not be rushed, noting that there is a place for caution and the City Council should use the weeks available to discuss the budget before making final votes. The consensus was reached to hold off on approving a resolution and ordinance.

**8.3 Outside Agencies Budget Requests 2024.** Bob Vitas, City Administrator, stated that the City has historically provided funding to various outside organizations. Vitas reviewed those organizations and the amount of money budgeted for each. Partners include Renew Moline, Moline Community Development

Corporation (MCDC), Quad Cities Chamber of Commerce, and Visit Quad Cities. Visit Quad Cities is requesting a greater rate of funding at 25% of the hotel motel tax collected, as compared to their previous funding of around 18%. Vitas stated that Dave Herrell, President and CEO of Visit Quad Cities, would be invited to the September 26, 2023 City Council meeting to provide an update. Renew Moline has made a request and they are looking for an increase in their sustaining support by an extra \$25,000. Discussion held. Alexandra Elias, President and CEO of Renew Moline, thanked Council for their confidence in the Renew Moline team. City Council reached consensus to remain open to the idea of supporting the outside agencies, but more information from the agencies was requested. Alderperson Schmidt made a motion to move \$185,000 from the 2024 Child Care Program into the Redevelopment Opportunities category to address flooding near Parr Instrument Company. Seconded by Alderperson O'Brien. The motion passed unanimously. These items are listed on Page 49 of the *Competing Budget Pressures* report.

Alderperson Timion made a motion to move \$50,000 from the Bike Lanes Project in 2024 and allocate those funds to the Center for Youth and Family Solutions adult program. Seconded Alderperson O'Brien. The motion passed unanimously.

Mayor Rayapati requested information regarding the funds for purchasing the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) parcels. Mayor Rayapati asked if the cost is still unknown and whether or not it is not in the budget. Vitas stated that he has not heard any updates from the State of Illinois. Mayor Rayapati asked that administration bring an update back to City Council regarding the aforementioned item.

#### **Miscellaneous Business**

Mayor Rayapati shared she had a great time attending an event for Junior Achievement of the Heartland (JA). Mayor Rayapati also noted Junior Achievement is building an Inspiration Center in Moline.

#### **Adjournment of City Council**

Upon motion of Alderperson Schmidt, seconded by Alderperson Castro, the Council meeting adjourned at 9:42 p.m. Motion passed unanimously.

# Funding for South Slope – SRF Requirements

User Charge System: Where a user charge system is the dedicated source of revenue, it must:

- Be enacted and enforceable before the first loan disbursement.
- Generate sufficient revenue to offset the cost of operations, maintenance, and replacement fo the facilities covered by the loan.
- Be incorporated in one or more municipal legislative enactments or other appropriate authorization. If the project is for a regional treatment works accepting wastewater from treatment works owned by others, then the subscribers receiving wastewater treatment services from the loan recipient must have adopted user charge systems.
- The user charge systems must be incorporated in the appropriate municipal legislative enactments, intergovernmental or service agreements or other appropriate authorizations.
- Ensure that the dedicated source of revenue is adequate to make loan repayments for the entire term of the loan.

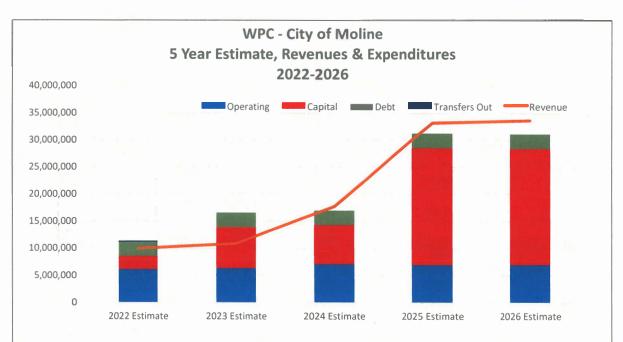

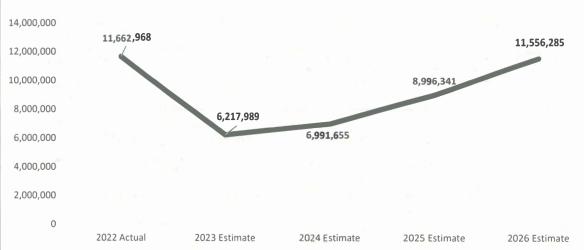

Revenue is projected to remain relatively constant through 2023 and then increase annually with the fee structure adopted by Council. Staff recommends a 9% increase in user fees, effective each year on 1/1/24 and 1/1/25 with future increases annually. These increases fund the construction of the South Slope improvements, debt service and general operations at all facilities.





Cash balances are projected to decrease through 2023 for capital purchases and design of South Slope improvements. Staff recommends a 9% increase in user fees each of the next two years on 1/1/24 and 1/1/25 with future increases annually as recommended by the rate study provided to City Council.

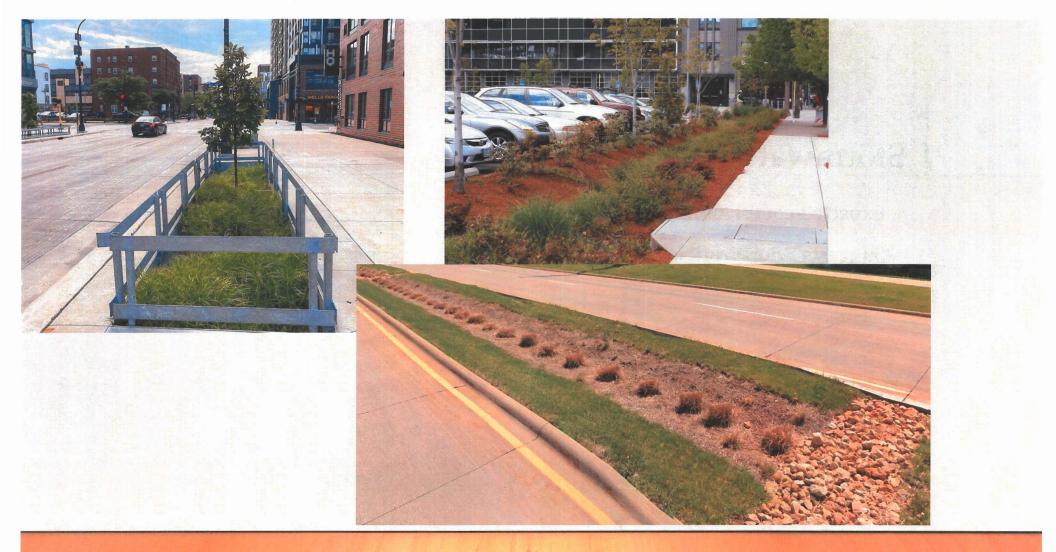

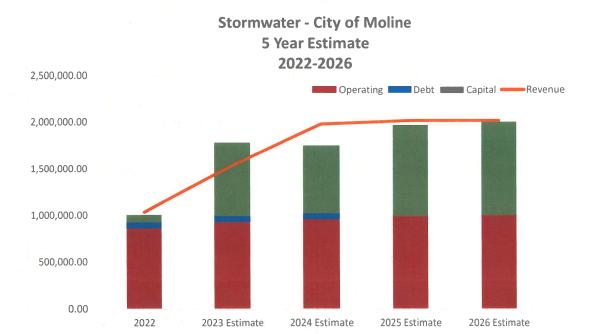

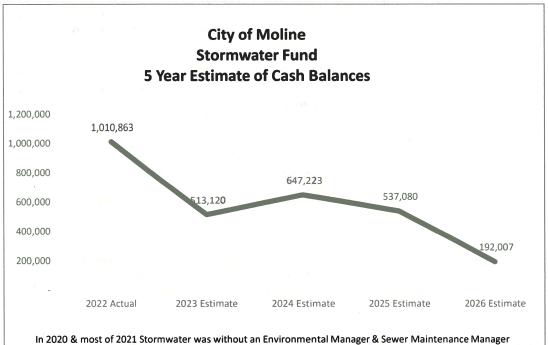

Due to staffing vacancies and Covid19, 2021 & 2022 Stormwater projects were deferred to 2023 and beyond. With user fees increasing in 2023 and debt service payments dropping off in 2024, revenue available for Capital Projects begins to increase. As shown on the above chart in green, additional money available for projectes increases annually up to \$1 million in 2026.



In 2020 & most of 2021 Stormwater was without an Environmental Manager & Sewer Maintenance Manager which temporarily increased cash reserves in 2022 shown above. In addition, fewer capital projects were completed in 2022 due to COVID -19. With debt dropping off in 2024 cash reserves begin to increase but do not allow for the same level of capital spending as in previous years. As recommended by the rate study, effective 1/1/23 Council adopted raising fees to fund an increase in annual projects going forward.

## Water System

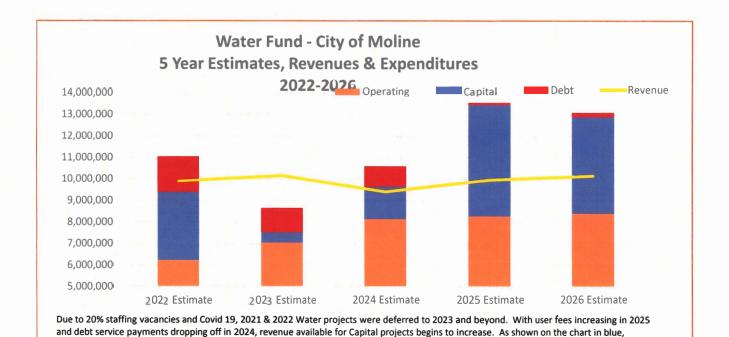

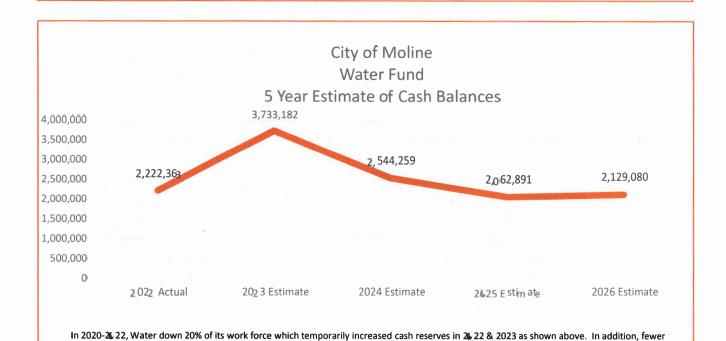

This fund collects fees for the following services:

- Residential Refuse Collection
- Residential Recycling Collection
- Brush Collection
- Lawn Yard Waste Bag Collection
- Lawn Yard Waste Cart Collection
- Bulky Solid Waste Collection

### Sanitation Fund

Due to cash flow shortfalls, the General Fund loaned \$500,000 to the Sanitation Fund, \$250,000 in 2021 & \$250,000 in 2022.

Cash flow analysis indicates a 7% increase in overall revenue required for both the 2024 & FY 2025 Budgets, and 2% in 2026.

Council authorized a 7% increase to the solid waste/recycling fee for 2023.

### City of Moline CIP 2024-2026+ City Engineering September 19, 2023

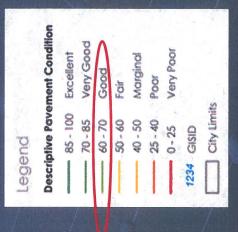

Mayor Rayapati called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. in Council Chambers.

#### **Board Appointments**

Mayor's reappointment of Andrew Sivertsen to the Moline Centre Main Street Commission for a full 3-year term expiring September 30, 2026.

Mayor's reappointment of Jeff Dismer to the Public Art Commission for a full 2-year term expiring September 30, 2025.

Mayor's reappointment of Amanda Augsburger to the Public Art Commission for a full 2-year term expiring September 30, 2025.

Mayor's reappointment of Lucie VanHecke to the Public Art Commission for a full 2-year term expiring September 30, 2025.

#### **Presentation**

Visit Quad Cities Annual Report. Dave Herrell, Visit Quad Cities President & CEO, publicly recognized Mayor Rayapati for her service on the Visit Quad Cities Board of Directors. Herrell expressed his gratefulness for Mayor Rayapati's leadership. On behalf of the Board of Directors, Herrell thanked the City for their investment in Visit Quad Cities. Herrell shared the mission, vision, and brand promise of Visit Quad Cities with those present by means of a slide presentation. Herrell stated it is important to note that Visit Quad Cities is an accredited organization. There are three entities housed within Visit Quad Cities. Those are: Quad Cities Convention & Visitors Bureau (dba Visit Quad Cities), Quad Cities Sports Commission (dba Sports QC), and friends of the Quad Cities (dba Quad Cities Destination, Inc.). Visit Quad Cities is holding its annual event on Saturday, October 26, 2023 from 3:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. at the Quad-Cities Water Front Convention Center. Attendees are invited to join Visit Quad Cities to learn about the positive impact of tourism on the communities' economic position and vitality.

#### **Public Comment**

Sam Moyer, Moline Resident, spoke in favor of Item 16.3, which is an ordinance amending the Chapter 8 "Buildings and Other Construction and Building Services". Moyer supports the idea and asked City Council to do the same.

#### Questions on the Agenda

Mayor Rayapati stated Item 7.2, a resolution approving the special event application for the Tabernacle Baptist Church Fall Harvest Celebration scheduled for Saturday, October 21, 2023, was pulled from the agenda and will be moved to the October 10, 2023 meeting. A few details need to be worked out regarding traffic concerns between the Moline Police Department and the Tabernacle Baptist Church.

#### **Agenda Items**

7.1 A Resolution approving a new special event application for Mercado on Fifth's Día de los Muertos Parade After-Party event scheduled for Saturday, October 28, 2023, and closing certain streets more particularly described herein to vehicular traffic. Bob Vitas, City Administrator, stated Mercado is having its second annual Día de los Muertos Parade. The after party is the reason for this item as this goes one day beyond the original license agreement they have with the City. Vitas noted that staff is recommending approval. A motion was made by Alderperson Schmidt to approve. Seconded by Alderperson Macias. Motion passed unanimously.

7.3 An Ordinance amending Chapter 34, "WATER and SEWERS," Section 34-4203, "DETENTION SYSTEM CRITERIA," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, by enacting one new subsection (c)(3). Tony Loete, Director of Utilities, noted this item is an addition to Chapter 34 in the stormwater code that gives staff another tool to assist developers. The proposed amendment adds language to Section 34-4203(c). A motion was made by Alderperson Schmidt to approve. Seconded by Alderperson Finch. Motion passed unanimously.

7.4 A Resolution granting a variance to Chapter 28, "STREETS AND SIDEWALKS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 28-3200(a) and Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 35-4218, to permanently waive the construction of sidewalk along 39th Street for the subject property located at 3715 39th Street, Moline, and accept payment in lieu of construction for the amount of \$4,180 to be deposited into the sidewalk improvement fund. A motion was made by Alderperson O'Brien to approve. Seconded by Alderperson Schmidt. David Dryer, Director of Engineering, stated there is a residential site on 39<sup>th</sup> Street that is on a very steep location in a self-contained neighborhood that has no sidewalks to date. The City calculated the typical cost to build sidewalk at \$11 per square foot. Brent Mosley, the property owner, is building a single-family residence and is requesting a permanent waiver and payment in lieu of constructing a sidewalk. The Engineering Department does not believe a sidewalk is feasible at this location and is not opposed to a waiver. The issue is that there a cost associated with it. Mosley can have a sidewalk installed more cheaply than what the City would be able to. The Engineering Department has calculated a cost of \$4,180 to install a sidewalk of approximately 96 feet in length along 39th Street for the property located at 3715 39th Street. The question was proposed to City Council on how to handle the discrepancy of the City cost versus Mosley's cost for installation of said sidewalk. Dryer reiterated it is a location that is very steep and noted a sidewalk would be problematic. Chris Mathias, Director of Community and Economic Development, stated there are two options listed. Staff believes Option 1 is the best option at this time. Option 1 would delay the installation of a sidewalk until sidewalks are installed on either side. This is a temporary delay. The delay would occur until sidewalks are installed on either side of 39th Street. David Silverman, Corporation Counsel, shared that his concern is that this would be a temporary waive suspension of requirement to install a sidewalk in a subdivision that has no sidewalks. Silverman inquired as to whether or not there is a thought that a sidewalk would ever be built in the subdivision since the suspension is stated as temporary. Mathias replied stating the roads would be rebuilt and at that time, sidewalks would be installed.

An amended motion was made by Alderperson Timion to approve Option 1, to allow a temporary modification to delay the construction of sidewalk along 39th Street for the subject property located at 3715 39th Street, Moline. Seconded by Alderperson Castro. The motion to amend passed unanimously. The motion as amended passed unanimously.

7.5 A Resolution granting a variance to Chapter 28, "STREETS AND SIDEWALKS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 28-3200(a) and Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 35-4218 to permanently waive the construction of sidewalk along the subject property located at 2500 53rd Street, Moline, and accept payment in lieu of construction of sidewalk for the amount \$14,700.00. A motion was made by Alderperson Timion to approve. Seconded by Alderperson Finch. Chris Mathias, Director of Community and Economic Development, stated this item is another situation where you have a small business owner who has purchased a lot but there are no sidewalks to connect to. This is another ordinance where the language will need to be changed. Staff recommendation is to pursue Option 1 which would allow the small business owner to start her to start her business at 2500 53rd Street. When development happens on

either side, a sidewalk should be installed. Timion stated this is another unique property. Adjacent properties will likely not be redeveloped for a substantial amount of time. Mathias noted it could end up being fairly long term. An amended motion was made by Alderperson Timion to approve Option 1, to allow a temporary modification to delay the construction of sidewalk along the subject property located at 2500 53rd Street, Moline. Seconded by Alderperson Schmidt. The motion to amend passed unanimously. The motion as amended passed unanimously. Schmidt shared that he wants to confirm the application had Option 2 selected. Applicant was present and stated yes, Option 2 was selected but she is in agreement with the motion as amended.

#### **Informational**

- **8.1** SSA #5 and SSA #6 Property Tax Levy for 2024. David Silverman, Corporation Counsel, stated there is a memo in the Council packet regarding the resolution of Rock Island County TIF and SSA tax extensions. The information shares a high overview of the latest information on SSAs 5 and 6. There are hearings scheduled with the SSA 5 board at 3:00 p.m. on October 16, 2023 and SSA 6 board at 3:00 p.m. on October 18, 2023, to explain the change and prepare the boards for a higher SSA tax extension on the property tax bills. The options are to stay with the current budget, increase the budgets, decrease the budgets, or begin the process to close out the SSAs. Once decisions have been made, this will return to City Council for approval. Discussion was held.
- **8.2 Enhanced Asphalt Repair Service.** Rodd Schick, Municipal Services General Manager, stated the City is looking to enhance maintenance services. The equipment requested for approval is a small asphalt paver that will typically do 3-4 feet in width. The cost is \$190,000. The item is available on a Sourcewell contract. There are also American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds designated to this item. Schick shared photos of sections of street throughout the City which were recently repaired via patch work. The purchase of the asphalt paver would allow the City to saw cut out three feet and run a continuous ribbon with the traffic flow. This will have a 10-15 year patching life. Discussion was held.
- 8.3 Annual Outside City Limits Utility Customers List. Tony Loete, Director of Utilities, stated Chapter 34 of the Code of Ordinances requires staff to report to City Council an annual list of utility customers who are outside city limits. The purpose for this is to hold the customers accountable. Loete shared a slideshow with the list of names. Loete noted the names highlighted in yellow are those who are ineligible for annex. There are names highlighted in red that are contiguous to the City of Moline borders and they are eligible to annex. There is one solitary address highlighted in white which has a preannexation agreement. Loete stated there are names at the bottom of the list of those who are ineligible because they are covered by an Investment Grade Audit (IGA) or otherwise related to the Quad Cities International Airport. Loete noted that in the coming weeks, there will be change in code coming forward. The current water code language does not mirror sewer code language. The change will allow those two sections to mirror one another. Also, in regards to the customers highlighted in red, the City will need to find a way to incentivize those customers to voluntarily annex. Loete requested a discussion on alternatives. One code suggests disconnecting customers but the City is not in favor of that option. The other option would be to force them to annex through a court proceeding. A third option would be to influence them to annex by adjusting the rate they pay. Loete requested some direction from City Council. Discussion was held.
- **8.4** Green Moline Special Event Checklist. Tony Loete, Director of Utilities, shared that the Green Moline initiative is from Mayor Rayapati's environmental working group. The Green Moline special event checklist was created to incentivize businesses to become more environmentally friendly when

hosting events. Andy Parer, Environmental Manager, is a member of the environmental working group that has been working with the City's Special Events Committee to incentive businesses to take part in the initiative. The special event checklist would be initiated and policed by the City's code enforcement department and Alexandra Jones, Environmental Health Specialist. There would be three levels of incentives. Loete reviewed those incentives. The idea is for the initiative to prompt event organizers to think about sustainability, it informs attendees that it is a sustainable event, and it advances the City Council's goal of pursuit of environmental best practices. Discussion was held.

**Adopted.** Alderperson Finch, seconded by Alderperson Macias, moved to adopt Council Bill 3036-2023. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

16.2 <u>3037-2023</u> A Zoning Text Amendment Ordinance amending Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, regarding Minimum Off-Street Parking and Traffic Circulation Standards for In-Vehicle Sales and Service Uses.

**Adopted.** Alderperson Timion, seconded by Alderperson Murphy, moved to adopt Council Bill 3037-2023. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

16.3 3038-2023 An Ordinance amending Chapter 8, "BUILDINGS AND OTHER CONSTRUCTION AND BUILDING SERVICES," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, by repealing ARTICLE VII, "MISCELLANEOUS," DIVISION 2, "RENTAL HOUSING INSPECTION PROGRAM," in its entirety and enacting in lieu thereof one new ARTICLE VII, "MISCELLANEOUS," DIVISION 2, "RENTAL HOUSING INSPECTION PROGRAM," dealing with the same subject matter.

Adopted. Alderperson O'Brien, seconded by Alderperson Timion, moved to adopt Council Bill 3038-2023. Alderperson Schmidt asked Drake Daley, Building Official, how the City of Moline's rates compare to neighboring cities as well as the cost of the program in its entirety. Daley replied stating that for the 2023 budget, Davenport has \$952,409 coming from its general fund to support their rental program. They also have trust fund where they are getting \$285,000. They are only bringing in \$345,000. Discussion had. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; pays: none.

#### Non-Consent Agenda

#### Resolutions

17.1 1180-2023 A Resolution declaring the property at 1316 26th Street and 1330 26th Street, Moline, as surplus; and authorizing the Mayor and City Clerk to execute and attest to an Agreement for Sale of Real Estate and do all things necessary to convey the City-owned property at 1316 26th Street and 1330 26th Street, Moline, to Landeros & Sons Construction, Inc.

**Approved.** A motion was made by Alderperson Timion, seconded by Alderperson Finch, to approve Council Bill 1180-2023. Mayor Rayapati shared that she had requested this item be moved from Consent

to Non-Consent because she wanted to inform City Council she had received an email from Jinnel Choiniere with Moline Community Development Corporation (MCDC) who wanted the City to be aware that in her experience with Landeros & Sons Construction, Inc., there have been significant delays on a house they are doing work on for MCDC. Mayor Rayapati shared that she spoke with Brad Hauman, Neighborhood Improvement Officer, and Amy Saunders, Legal Services Specialist, for clarification. After further discussion with MCDC, Mayor Rayapati stated that everyone is working well together and everything is fine. Alderperson Timion began a discussion regarding options for the church building if it is not a single family residence. Mayor Rayapati stated that the motion on the floor needs to be addressed, which is Phase One. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

17.2 1181-2023 A Resolution granting a variance to Chapter 28, "STREETS AND SIDEWALKS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 28-3200(a) and Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 35-4218, to permanently waive the construction of sidewalk along 39th Street for the subject property located at 3715 39th Street, Moline, and accept payment in lieu of construction for the amount of \$4,180 to be deposited into the sidewalk improvement fund.

Approved. Mayor Rayapati requested confirmation that this item was also listed on the Committee-ofthe-Whole agenda of September 26, 2023. David Silverman, Corporation Counsel, confirmed that it was on the Committee-of-the-Whole agenda. Mayor Rayapati then asked if it needs to be amended or if the City Clerk needs to re-read the motion as amended. Silverman stated it does not need to be re-read as amended. Silverman confirmed it will need to be amended based on Item 7.4 on the Committee-of-the-Whole agenda. Alderperson Schmidt made a motion to suspend the rules to have a discussion on Item 17.2. Seconded by Alderperson Finch. Motion passed unanimously. Alderperson Schmidt questioned if there is a timing concern that brings this forward from the Committee of the Whole agenda because he would prefer to table the item and have it come back to City Council written with the amendment. Bob Vitas, City Administrator, stated that in fairness to property owner, City Council needs to know that the property owner has waited for months on end to get a response from the City. In fairness to his construction timeline, Vitas thinks City Council should seek approval this evening. Otherwise, the property owner is going to be delayed even further. Alderperson Schmidt made a motion to approve Council Bill 1181-2023 consistent with the amended version of Item 7.4 on the Committee-of-the-Whole agenda, seconded by Alderperson Timion. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

18.2 <u>3040-2023</u> An Ordinance amending Chapter 15, "GARBAGE AND TRASH," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 15-2200, "FEE FOR RESIDENTIAL REFUSE COLLECTION," by repealing said section in its entirety and enacting in lieu thereof one new Section 15-2200, dealing with the same subject matter.

**Advanced.** A motion was made by Alderperson Timion, seconded by Alderperson Finch, to advance Council Bill 3040-2023 to second reading. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

18.3 <u>3041-2023</u> An Ordinance amending Chapter 34, "WATER AND SEWERS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 34-4400, "IN GENERAL" by repealing said sections in their entirety and enacting in lieu thereof one new Section 34-4400, dealing with the same subject matter.

Advanced. A motion was made by Alderperson Schmidt, seconded by Alderperson Finch, to advance Council Bill 3041-2023 to second reading. Alderperson Schmidt commented that as City Council moves forward on fee increases, he is glad that City Council is making the moves necessary to keep the enterprise funds functional. This will set the City on a path of stability to ensure it does not face crumbling infrastructure in the future. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

18.4 <u>3042-2023</u> An Ordinance amending Chapter 34, "WATER AND SEWERS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 34-3200, "SEWERAGE RATE SYSTEM," by repealing said section in its entirety and enacting in lieu thereof one new Section 34-3200, dealing with the same subject matter.

**Advanced.** A motion was made by Alderperson Timion, seconded by Alderperson Finch, to advance Council Bill 3042-2023 to second reading. Motion passed on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

#### **Miscellaneous Business**

Mayor Rayapati shared that on Thursday, September 21, 2023, she had the opportunity to speak directly with MKSK consultants regarding the Riverfront. Alderpersons Timion and Macias are on the task force. They will meet in October along with other people invested in Riverfront development in the community. Mayor Rayapati also shared that she had an opportunity, alongside Chris Mathias, Director of Community and Economic Development, and Alexandra Elias, CEO/President, Renew Moline, to attend an event for the Mayors' Institute on City Design (MICD). Professionals from the University of South Florida at Tampa completed a site visit and they spent the better part of two hours sharing three ideas for places for redevelopment. The three projects discussed were the mall area, the Eastgate TIF, and the Riverfront. The people at the MICD will pick one of the three projects and give City Council ideas for redevelopment. There will be more information coming back to City Council in November. Mayor Rayapati will then present on whichever project they choose and area experts will weigh in on the project. Mayor Rayapati also shared that she was able to meet with representatives from the Farm Bureau. Mayor Rayapati gathered ideas with Alex Elias, President and CEO of Renew Moline, professionals from both the Rock Island

County Farm Bureau, and the economic development person with the Illinois Farm Bureau. Mayor Rayapati noted that any ideas around urban farming can come with inherent risk. Elias will talk to City Council on what was learned from the different farm bureaus. The Farm Bureau is looking to move beyond the traditional rural farming focus they have had historically, and look to see what can be done in urban spaces. Last, Mayor Rayapati shared that on Wednesday, September 27, there will be a group of city administrators, mayors, and elected officials meeting to discuss the development environment in Illinois.

Alderperson Murphy noted the MICD event was very interesting. Some of the ideas that came forth can be used in Moline. Murphy shared that the most interesting thing was the disparity in the cost of how much rent is that is unsubsidized and how unaffordable it really is.

Alderperson Macias shared that last year he presented information regarding a community ID program alongside Quad Cities Interfaith. One of the recommendations of previous council members was to talk to Rock Island County and the other counties because the idea was QC Interfaith would work with Scott County, Iowa, to get it up and running. Macias stated since November of 2022, he has been in contact with both counties and has had meetings with representatives of both counties. They have talked to their people and there was a meeting for an update in early September 2023. Both counties had their reasons why they did not want to move forward with the Community ID program. Since then, Macias stated he has also talked to a city architect in Chicago. As a City, we can be a lot more nimble when implementing such a project. The next step is to bring it back to City Council so we can move forward with this project.

Alderperson Timion indicated he appreciated the time this morning at the MICD event. Timion noted he was glad the two houses that burnt down on 13<sup>th</sup> Street were vacant so no one was harmed and he was also saddened. Twenty-four hours before the houses burnt down, the City had two houses that could be occupied by two families, but 24 hours after the fires, the City had two houses at the present time that are uninhabitable, and, due to the zoning code, the City has two pieces of land on which no new homes can be built in the future. Timion shared that the City Council has the ability to fix that. The City has 35-40 lots where houses once stood but new houses cannot be built again. Timion noted that, with work, the City Council has the privilege of being part of that solution.

Bob Vitas, City Administrator, reported he lives next door to the two houses which burnt to the ground. Both stood vacant; one for over seven years. One was owned by a property management company and the other house will likely need to be condemned. The chimney on that property collapsed on the neighboring property so it is highly unlikely it is salvageable. Vitas stated staff will be reaching out to all City Council members to set up meetings with himself and Carol Barnes, Finance Director, to discuss major unfunded and partially funded capital projects. Staff does need to prioritize those projects and review those items. Vitas noted that staff can present recommendations to City Council, but it will ultimately be the choice of the City Council. Vitas shared that Mayor Rayapati received a congratulatory letter dated September 21, 2023 from Representative Gregg Johnson, Representative with the Illinois General Assembly, issuing a \$450,000 grant to City of Moline for a solar project. It was included in the new State budget at end of the spring 2023 session. The funds are earmarked and now staff waits to see that it gets approved through bonds.

Mayor Rayapati noted that in the 2022 budget, then Representative Mike Halpin, Illinois General Assembly, received money for a higher education study. She has received the initial outreach from the company doing the research and she will be responding to a survey. Last, Mayor Rayapati stated she attended a wonderful dinner Monday, September 25, at the Axis Hotel put together for people from community, the Chamber, John Deere, etc., and the chancellors and head of the University of Illinois System.

#### **Public Comment**

There was no additional public comment.

#### **Executive Session:**

Alderperson Murphy, seconded by Alderperson Timion, moved for Executive Session, for the purpose of discussion of Collective Negotiating Matters-5 ILCS 120/2(C)(2), and Pending, Probable or Imminent Litigation-5 ILCS 120/2(C)(11). Motion carried on roll call with the following vote: ayes: Alderpersons Castro, Schmidt, Murphy, Macias, Timion, Finch, and O'Brien; nays: none.

City Council convened in Executive Session at 7:53 p.m.

City Council reconvened in open session at 8:17 p.m.

#### **Adjournment of City Council**

Upon motion of Alderperson Schmidt, seconded by Alderperson Finch, the City Council meeting adjourned at 8:18 p.m.

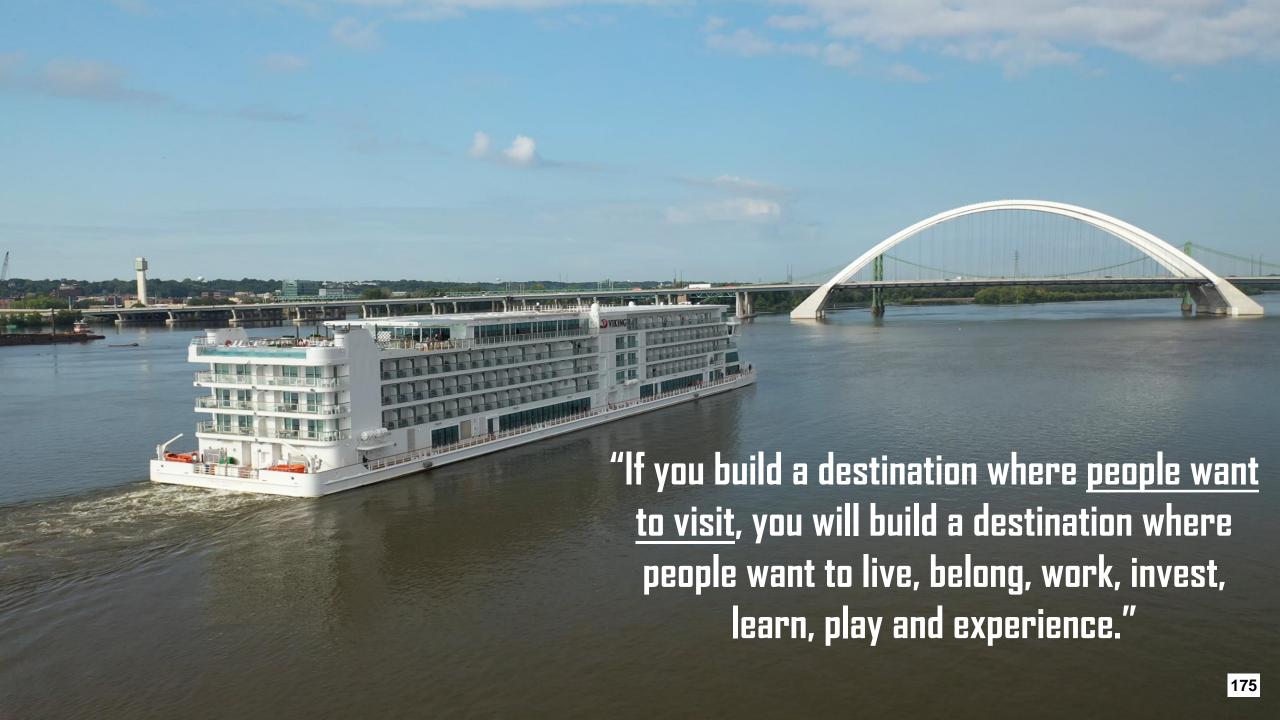

A Resolution granting a variance to Chapter 28, "STREETS AND SIDEWALKS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 28-3200(a) and Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 35-4218 to allow a temporary modification to delay the construction of sidewalk along the subject property located at 2500 53<sup>rd</sup> Street, Moline.

**Explanation:** The City of Moline ("City") is a home rule municipal corporation organized and operating in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois. Pursuant to its home rule power, the City may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs. City standards require sidewalk installation along all streets at the time a lot is developed, pursuant to the City's Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy adopted by Resolution № 1147-2016. The policy is attached to this agenda item for reference. In sum, the policy requires either 1) a temporary delay installing the sidewalk adjacent to the development site; or 2) a permanent waiver and payment in-lieu of constructing sidewalk may be paid into a fund for construction of sidewalk at a more favorable location.

Jasmine Lee of Keddie Properties, LLC filed an application to request a permanent waiver and payment in-lieu of constructing sidewalk, approximately 248.9 feet in length along the subject property located at 2500 53rd Street, Moline, which is the site where a new commercial parking lot is currently under staff review, and is also the proposed site for a food truck park. Ms. Lee contends, among other factors (paraphrasing), that surrounding properties are developed and no sidewalks are present along this [east] side of 53<sup>rd</sup> Street; that no sidewalk was installed by the previous property owner; and that slope, water, and ice may create unsafe conditions for pedestrians.

The Engineering Department has calculated a cost of \$14,700.00 to install a sidewalk of equivalent length and area. By selecting "Option 2" of the Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy, this amount would be deposited into a sidewalk fund in-lieu of construction adjacent to 2500 53<sup>rd</sup> Street in favor of a location where such a sidewalk installation would fulfill a need.

Planning staff, however, does not support granting "Option 2" since this would be in contravention of the purposes and intent of the City's Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy. The Policy was enacted to incentivize and promote a connected pedestrian sidewalk network, by creating "essential linkages between neighborhoods, allow for the safe movement of the pedestrian public, and contribute to the community's health, safety, and welfare by enhancing those areas of the public realm," particularly where provision of the same has been neglected or is lacking. 53rd Street is functionally classified as a Minor Arterial thoroughfare, having significant levels of motor vehicle traffic. The presence of sidewalks on both sides of such thoroughfares is essential. The Policy specifically requires installation of sidewalks when a lot is developed, which is the case here. The Policy does was not intended to perpetuate past development deficiencies in a particular area, but rather is geared toward the correction of such deficiencies. The Policy Option 2 necessitates that installation of sidewalk(s) is not feasible or serves no practical function. No convincing evidence has been presented to such effect here.

Therefore, staff would only support granting Option 1, being a temporary delay of installation of a sidewalk along 53<sup>rd</sup> Street adjacent to the subject property. The applicant has proposed a food

truck park on the subject property — a more intense use — which will require further review and approval by City staff, Plan Commission, and City Council. Planning staff holds that these circumstances would justify the granting of Option 1 of the City's Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy to delay the installation of the sidewalk. Option 2 is not warranted by the facts.

**Staff Recommendation:** Denial of "Option 2" of the Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy,

whereby a permanent waiver of sidewalk installation be granted commensurate with full development of the subject property and a fee in-lieu of construction be paid into the City's sidewalk

improvement fund.

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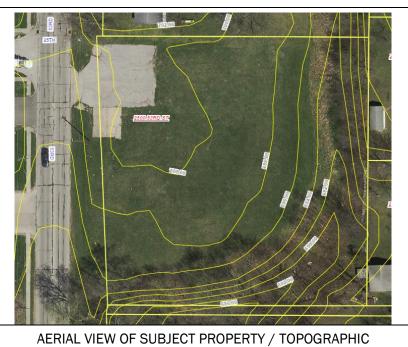

# CITY OF MOLINE SIDEWALK WAIVER OR MODIFICATION POLICY

Sidewalks are a fundamental component of good land development. Sidewalks provide essential linkages between neighborhoods, allow for the safe movement of the pedestrian public, and contribute to the community's health, safety, and welfare by enhancing those areas of the public realm. Sec. 35-4200, "PURPOSE AND INTENT," of the Moline Zoning and Land Development Code ("Code") states the following as specific objectives:

- · To promote the orderly growth and development of the City; and
- To ensure the timely and coordinated provision of required transportation improvements, utilities and other public facilities and services to new subdivisions and developments.

# Public Improvement Standards and Waiver/Modification Review Criteria

To meet the above objectives, the Code explicitly states: "Sidewalks must be installed on both sides of all public and private streets, except in cases where sidewalks are not allowed by IDOT. The sidewalk requirements are triggered as set forth in Sec. 35-4201 of the Code and other provisions, as applicable. Decision-making bodies are authorized to require the installation of sidewalks in other locations, such as at the end of permanent dead-end streets through private property when they determine that such sidewalks will create a logical and well connected pedestrian circulation system." (Sec. 35-4218) Should an owner/developer not wish to install sidewalks when required, the owner/developer must apply for a waiver or modification. The approval criteria at Sec. 35-2211(d), states that "In order to be approved, the applicant must demonstrate that the requested waiver or modification:

- Will not be detrimental to the public safety, health or welfare, or injurious to other property or improvements in the neighborhood in which the subject property is located;
- Is the result of conditions that are unique to the subject property, and that these conditions are not self-created, and that the applicant had no knowledge of the impact of the regulations on the development of the property at the time of the property's purchase.

A request for a waiver or modification to the sidewalk standards at Sec. 35-4218 shall be submitted in writing to the Department of Planning & Development. In addition to the conditions unique to the site, staff may consider the following to evaluate sidewalk waiver or modification requests:

- Topographic limitations
- Insufficient right-of-way

- Pedestrian safety
- The proximity of connection to the existing sidewalk network
- Planned future development or redevelopment of surrounding properties
- The classification and condition of the street and its construction (e.g. arterial with or without curb and gutter)
- Planned future street improvements

## Approval Procedure and Options

The request for waiver or modification may take one of two forms to be considered by the City. Upon completion of review by staff, the request shall be forwarded to the City Council which shall decide whether the waiver or modification should or should not be granted as stated in Sec. 35-2211(c) of the Code.

- Temporary modification to delay installation of sidewalk. An approved
  modification allows the applicant and his/her successors to delay installation
  of a sidewalk or sidewalk component. The City Council reserves the right to
  require installation in accordance with current sidewalk standards at such time
  that it determines the unique conditions or circumstances which justified the
  temporary waiver or modification no longer exists.
- 2. Permanent waiver and payment in-lieu of constructing sidewalk. In certain situations where it may never be practical or desirable to require installation of a sidewalk, the owner/developer may apply for a permanent waiver or modification. Under this scenario, the owner/developer must pay an amount equal to the actual estimated total cost of installing the sidewalk for which the waiver or modification has been sought from the City. This payment in-lieu of construction would be deposited into the City's sidewalk improvement fund to be utilized to meet sidewalk priorities elsewhere in the City. The City Engineer shall determine an appropriate cost for the sidewalk in question for the purpose of the owner/developer making payment to said sidewalk fund. Such cost as determined by the City Engineer shall include material, labor, and other relevant, normal, and customary costs for an average sidewalk of similar length to that sidewalk that would have been required otherwise to be constructed elsewhere in the City. This permanent waiver or modification would be recorded against the property and would run with the land. The City Council reserves the right to install sidewalk at no expense to the owner/developer in the future at any location where a permanent waiver was granted.

# Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy Citations of the Moline Code of Ordinances

The Sidewalk Variance Policy refers to certain sections of Chapters 28 and 35, some of which used to be in the Subdivision Code.

The Policy refers to the general intent, i.e.:

#### SEC. 35-4200. PURPOSE AND INTENT.

The infrastructure and public improvement standards of this division establish requirements for designing and installing infrastructure and improvements in all developments. These standards are intended to:

- (1) Protect the public health, safety and welfare;
- (2) Promote the orderly growth and development of the City; and
- (3) Ensure the timely and coordinated provision of required transportation improvements, utilities and other public facilities and services to new subdivisions and developments.

The following cited section indicates what the triggers are, i.e.:

## SEC. 35-4201. APPLICABILITY.

The infrastructure and public improvement standards of this division apply to any activity that requires one or more of the following permits or approvals:

- (1) Minor Subdivision (see Sec. 35-2108);
- (2) Major Subdivision (see Sec. 35-2209);
- (3) Site Plan Review (see Sec. 35-2105);
- (4) Planned Unit Development (see Sec. 35-2205);
- (5) Special Use Permit (see Sec. 35-2206); or
- (6) Building Permit (see Sec. 35-2103) for a principal structure or principal use.

The Policy refers to the Land Development section on sidewalk improvements, i.e.:

#### SEC. 35-4218. SIDEWALKS.

- (a) NEW DEVELOPMENT.
- (1) Sidewalks shall be installed on both sides of all public and private streets, except in cases where sidewalks are not allowed by IDOT. Decision-making bodies are authorized to require the installation of sidewalks in other locations, such as at the end of permanent dead-end streets through private property when they determine that such sidewalks will create a logical and well connected pedestrian circulation system.
- (2) Sidewalks shall have a minimum width of five (5) feet or minimum width required by the Illinois Accessibility Code, whichever is greater.
- (3) For property being subdivided, sidewalks must be installed before approval of the final subdivision plat, the cost of installation must be included in the performance guarantee approved in accordance with Sec. 35-4209. For all other development, sidewalks must be installed prior to issuance of the occupancy permit.
- (4) Sidewalks shall be located one (1) foot inside the right-of-way line whenever practicable or in an alternative location approved by the City engineer.
- (5) All sidewalks shall be constructed in accordance with the City of Moline Supplemental Specifications.
- (6) All sidewalks and ramps at intersections shall comply with the Illinois Accessibility Code.

## (b) INFILL LOCATIONS.

# Sidewalk Waiver/Modification Policy Citations of the Moline Code of Ordinances

- (1) Sidewalks shall be installed on both sides of all public and private streets, except in cases where sidewalks are not allowed by IDOT. In cases where right-of-way limits do not provide sufficient space for sidewalks, where existing topography makes the installation impracticable, or where the installation cost exceeds the anticipated public benefit, the City Council may direct that sidewalks be installed on only one (1) side of the street or not installed at all and shall state the reasons for the Council's decision by resolution.
- (2) Sidewalks shall have a minimum width of four (4) feet or the width of the sidewalk to which they will connect, whichever is greater, but not greater than five (5) feet. Where sidewalks are less than five (5) feet in width, an American's with Disabilities Act compliant passing area shall be installed at the required intervals.
- (3) Sidewalks shall be located one (1) foot inside the right-of-way line whenever practicable or in an alternative location approved by the City engineer.
- (4) All sidewalks shall be constructed in accordance with the City of Moline Supplemental Specifications.
- (Ord. No. 3025-2018; Sec. 35-4218, "SIDEWALKS," repealed in its entirety; new Sec. 35-4218, "SIDEWALKS," enacted; 07/20/18)

The Policy refers to Land Development Non-Administrative Review Sections 35-2211(c) and (d), i.e.:

SEC. 35-2211. WAIVERS AND MODIFICATIONS.

- (c) PROCESS. Preliminary subdivision plats that include requests for waivers or modifications must be processed in accordance with Sec. 35-2210(e), including review and recommendation by zoning administrator, city engineer and Plan Commission and final decision by the City Council. If preliminary subdivision plat approval is not required for the proposed infrastructure or public improvement, the waiver or modification request shall be decided by the City Council after application and review and recommendation by zoning administrator and/or city engineer, as determined by adopted policy or procedures in place.
- (d) APPROVAL CRITERIA. In order to be approved, the applicant must demonstrate that the requested waiver or modification:
- (1) Will not be detrimental to the public safety, health or welfare, or injurious to other property or improvements in the neighborhood in which the subject property is located;
- (2) Is the result of conditions that are unique to the subject property, and that these conditions are not self-created, and that the applicant had no knowledge of the impact of the regulations on the development of the property at the time of the property's purchase.
- (Ord. No. 3009-2015; Article II repealed in its entirety; new Article II enacted; 03/24/15) (Ord. No. 3036-2016; Sec. 35-2211(c) repealed; new Sec. 35-2211(c) enacted; 12/20/16)

The Special Ordinances used to approve the sidewalk variances/sidewalk waivers or modifications — each also cites this section:

SEC. 28-3200. WHEN REQUIRED; ENGINEER'S GENERAL RESPONSIBILITY; TEMPORARY CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY; VARIANCES.

(a) Concrete sidewalks, consistent with Section 35-4218, shall be constructed along any public street right-of-way line which is also a boundary of any lot upon which any principal building or principal use is established after the effective date of the ordinance from which this section is derived. Such sidewalks shall be constructed and located under the direction of, and the installation

approved by, the public works department prior to occupancy or use of the principal building or principal use. If a use is completed at a time of year when sidewalk construction is not prudent, a temporary certificate of occupancy may be issued, provided that a cashier's or certified check made payable to the City for the amount of the cost of the sidewalk construction, as estimated by the city engineer, is deposited with the accounts and finance officer. Such check will be cashed and the money deposited in the appropriate City account. The money will be returned if the sidewalk is properly constructed within one (1) year. If not, the money will be used to construct a sidewalk by the City of Moline.

- (b) When the owner of the property affected by this section can show that, if strictly adhered to, this section would cause undue hardship because of topographical or other conditions peculiar to the site, a variance can be requested. The owner shall apply in writing for such variance.
- (c) When a sidewalk variance is granted by the City Council, an agreement shall be entered into between the City and the landowner. This variance agreement shall be a covenant which shall run with the land whereby the City may require the installation of the sidewalk at that location at some future date. This agreement shall be filed with the Rock Island County Recorder of Deeds and the landowner shall bear such costs and shall serve only as notification and not affect merchantability of title. A copy of this agreement shall be retained in the office of the city clerk.

WHEREAS, Moline's TASA application will be for the remaining 80 percent of the total project costs (\$757,285.46) and Bi-State has \$1,091,082 available for the Illinois Quad Cities; and

WHEREAS, if successful, construction of Phase II of this path is expected in FY2025 or 2026, dependent on IDOT's program; and

WHEREAS, City staff recommends the use of Motor Fuel Tax Funds to be used for said local match requirements; and

WHEREAS, City staff will facilitate the submittal of said grant application; and

WHEREAS, this City Council hereby affirms their support of the herein referenced grant application and this trail project.

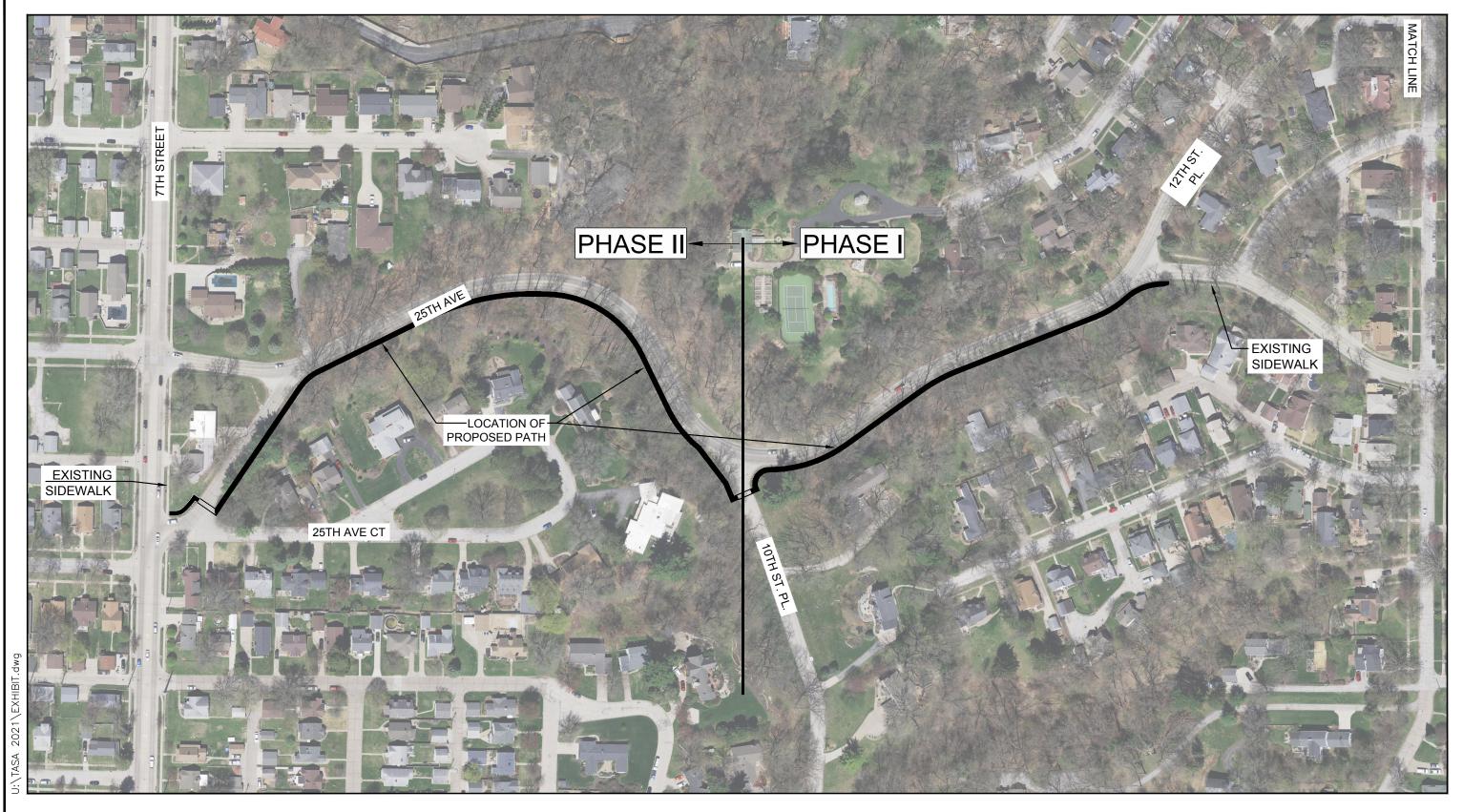

A Resolution authorizing the Director of Engineering to submit an application for funding to the Bi-State Regional Commission for Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TASA) Program Grant funds for the amount of \$757,285.46 to be administered through the Illinois Department of Transportation District 2 Office for Phase II of the Morgan Park Multi-Use Path project.

**Explanation**: Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TASA) funds are released through our Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), Bi-State Regional Commission, biennially in odd numbered years. Eligible projects include trail facilities; safety features and infrastructure for bicyclists and pedestrians; turnouts, overlooks, and scenic viewing areas; historic transportation facility preservation; and certain archeological and stormwater management tied to highway construction. Maintenance of existing facilities is not allowed with these funds.

In 2020, the Complete Streets Committee identified the need for pedestrian facilities through the Morgan Park area, specifically for children attending Hamilton School. Several route options were discussed, and the group decided the most attractive route was 25<sup>th</sup> Avenue, from 7<sup>th</sup> Street to 12<sup>th</sup> Street Place.

In 2021, City staff acquired TASA funds for a portion of this path, from 10<sup>th</sup> Street Place to 12<sup>th</sup> Street Place (Phase I). In 2022, City staff contracted with Veenstra & Kimm Inc. for engineering services for the entire path, knowing that City staff is actively seeking construction funding for Phase II of this path.

Engineering is on-going at this time with the Illinois Department of Transportation. Construction of Phase I is expected in 2024. If successful with this current grant application, construction of Phase II would be expected in 2025/26, pending IDOT's schedule.

**Staff Recommendation**: Approval

**Fiscal Impact**: 20 percent local match is required. This is estimated at \$189,321.36 of Motor Fuel

Tax (MFT) funds.

For the agreement with the Iowa Department of Transportation, Moline's contribution is for its portion of the construction costs incurred for the multi-use trail, aesthetic treatments for railings, identity elements, signing, aesthetic lighting, and lighting supplies for the I-74 bridge construction.

For agreement JN-2-17-018 with the Illinois Department of Transportation, Moline's contribution is for its portion of the construction costs incurred from the Mississippi River to 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue. These items include the multi-use path (Ben Butterworth Parkway), street lighting, traffic signals, identity elements, and other locally owned items.

For agreement JN-2-17-041 with the Illinois Department of Transportation, Moline's contribution is for its portion of the construction costs incurred from 7<sup>th</sup> Avenue to Avenue of the Cities. These items include new storm sewers, identity elements, and traffic signals.

The Departments of Transportation contracts are still pending final approval on their end. We will not receive final invoices until that time. However, this MFT resolution is necessary at this time to prepare for the upcoming final invoices.

**Explanation:** The City of Moline ("City") is a home rule municipal corporation organized and operating in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois. Pursuant to its home rule power, the City may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs. The City continuously analyzes its Zoning and Land Development Code ("Zoning Code") in order to ensure that it is responsive to contemporaneous development trends and affords clarity to existing and prospective property owners and occupants as well as its staff tasked with administering and enforcing its provisions. Amendments to the text of the Zoning Code are adopted by the City Council periodically to ensure that the zoning regulations are up-to-date and adequately responsive to community needs, land use trends, and growth patterns within the City.

City staff and Plan Commission have determined that this proposed amendment to the Zoning Code is necessary and desirable because the nationally growing uses of "Food Truck," "Food Truck Park," and "Mobile Food Services" are lacking specific zoning performance standards in terms of allowable principal uses of commercial properties. Owing to the City's experience and a review of zoning regulations, the code requirement that a parking area for food trucks must be a paved surface has been added at the public hearing before Plan Commission. The Commission voted to add the proposed uses and related regulations for these uses to the Zoning Code by a vote of 8 aye, 0 nay, and 3 absent.

Notice of a public hearing on the City's petition for text amendments to the City of Moline Zoning and Land Development Code, as amended, was published in The Dispatch/Rock Island Argus on July 23, 2023. A public hearing was convened by the Plan Commission on August 9, 2023, on which date the Plan Commission closed the public hearing and, pursuant to the findings of fact attached as Exhibit A and, by this reference, made a part of this Ordinance, recommended approval of the proposed text amendment.

WHEREAS, the City of Moline ("City") is a home rule municipal corporation organized and operating in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the City continuously analyzes its Zoning and Land Development Code ("Zoning Code") in order to ensure that it is responsive to contemporaneous development trends and affords clarity to existing and prospective property owners and occupants as well as its staff tasked with administering and enforcing its provisions; and

- b) allowing mobile food establishments supporting food trucks with a special use permit as a principal use in the City's office and business districts; and
- c) allowing mobile food establishments with a special use permit as an accessory use to restaurants in the City's ORT and business districts.

WHEREAS, amendments to the text of the Zoning Code are adopted by the City Council periodically to ensure that the zoning regulations are up-to-date and adequately responsive to community needs, land use trends, and growth patterns within the City; and

WHEREAS, notice of a public hearing on the City's petition for text amendments to the Zoning Code, as amended, was published in the Dispatch/Rock Island Argus on July 23, 2023; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was convened by the Plan Commission on August 9, 2023, on which date the Plan Commission closed the public hearing and, pursuant to the findings of fact

The following words, terms and phrases, wherever they occur in this Code, shall have the meanings ascribed to them by this section. Definitions shown in italics are unique to this Code are not included in the Unified Code. Definitions provided by this section include:

Food Truck. A self-contained motorized vehicle used for mobile food services.

Food Truck Park. An outdoor lot with the capacity for two or more food truck vendors to congregate to offer food or beverages for sale to the public for immediate consumption.

Mobile Food Establishment. Establishments primarily engaged in mobile food services using food trucks. The establishment is the central location from which the food truck route is serviced, not each food truck.

Mobile Food Services. Preparing and serving meals and snacks for immediate consumption from motorized vehicles, such as food trucks, mobile food carts, mobile food concession stands, mobile refreshment stands, mobile snack stands, and motorized food vendors. Mobile food services do not include ice cream trucks; hot dog carts; charitable organizations distributing food to those in need; and persons engaged in the door-to-door delivery of previously prepared food or beverages to customers who have placed an order for such items.

"SEC. 35-3408. PRINCIPAL COMMERCIAL LAND USES.

(a) FOOD TRUCK PARK. Description: Food truck park land uses include outdoor, public spaces where the primary function is mobile food services from two or more food trucks. Such land uses do not include mobile food establishments, campgrounds, or the storage or display of inoperative food trucks or equipment, or other materials typically associated with a junkyard or salvage yard.

#### (1) Regulations:

- a. The area of the food truck park must be clearly defined and separated from the patron parking area through the installation of a fence or other enclosure which maintains an open appearance and is a maximum of five feet in height.
- b. The parking area for the food trucks must be a paved surface.
- c. Food truck parks may have a pavilion or other permanent structure in order to provide shelter for patrons and operators, provided said structure meets the minimum setback requirements for the zoning district where the food truck park is located.
- d. Food truck parks and food trucks on the property must comply with, all applicable laws, including "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors," Res. No. 1157-2017, as may be amended from time to time.
- (b) MOBILE FOOD ESTABLISHMENT. Description: Mobile food establishment land uses include all principal land uses involving the overnight parking, vehicle storage, equipment storage, food preparation, and other services associated with food trucks that do not include the food truck actively

servicing its route or selling food to customers. Mobile food establishment land uses shall be separate and distinct from food truck park land uses.

#### (1) Regulations:

- 1. All parking areas shall be paved per the requirements of Article V.
- 2. <u>Inoperative vehicles or equipment shall not be stored with food trucks.</u>
- 3. Parking and storage areas shall provide a Type C bufferyard along all borders of the parking or storage area abutting residentially zoned property.

(a)(c) OFFICE. Description: [...]"

<u>Section 5</u> – Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," ARTICLE III, ZONING, DIVISION 4, "LAND USE REGULATIONS," Section 35-3414, "ACCESSORY COMMERCIAL LAND USES," is hereby amended as follows (additions in <u>bold and underlined</u> and deletions in <u>bold and strikethrough</u>) with the following subsections to be renumbered consecutively:

#### "SEC. 35-3414. ACCESSORY COMMERCIAL LAND USES.

Commercial accessory land uses are those which are incidental and subordinate to, and serving the principal commercial use. The following provide standards for permitted commercial accessory uses. Accessory uses not specifically listed herein, but similar to those permitted by right, may be permitted upon site plan review and approval by the zoning administrator or at the time of principal use approval by the decision making body. Accessory use not listed herein, but similar to those permitted as a special use, may be permitted with a special use permit.

(7) MOBILE FOOD ESTABLISHMENTS. Accessory mobile food establishment land uses include all land uses accessory to a principal restaurant involving the overnight parking, vehicle storage, equipment storage, food preparation, and other services associated with food trucks that do not include the food truck actively servicing its route or selling food to customers. Mobile food establishment land uses shall be separate and distinct from food truck park land uses.

#### a. **Regulations:**

- 1. Accessory mobile food establishments must comply with the applicable requirements for principal mobile food establishments.

#### EXHIBIT A — FINDINGS OF FACT

The Plan Commission, in determining whether the proposed amendment shall be recommended for approval, makes the following findings of fact, in accordance with Section 35-2203 of the Moline Code of Ordinances:

(1) Whether the existing text was in error at the time of adoption.

The current text of the Zoning and Land Development Code does not provide for food truck parks or mobile food establishments, except on a temporary basis of up to twelve days per calendar year. Outdoor Dining is currently permitted as only an accessory use. And the City's "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors" policy is devoid of any reference to zoning. Food truck parks or mobile food establishments were simply not addressed at the adoption of the Zoning Code in 2006.

(2) Whether there has been a change of character in the area or throughout the city due to installation of public facilities, other zone changes, new growth trends, deterioration, development transitions, etc.

Food truck operations and businesses a part of a growth trend nationally, including recently in the Quad Cities. The proposed text amendment will acknowledge and meet with this trend.

(3) Whether the proposed rezoning is compatible with the surrounding area and defining characteristics of the proposed zoning district or whether there may be adverse impacts on the capacity or safety of the portion of street network influenced by the rezoning, parking problems, or environmental impacts that the new zone may generate such as excessive storm water runoff, water, air or noise pollution, excessive nighttime lighting, or other nuisances.

The text amendment is not a rezoning, but rather a change in the permissible uses allowed within certain commercial zoning districts. Zoning regulations should guide the development of such venues in Moline, and special permit review is the recommended tool to deal with particular development proposals at particular locations within the City.

(4) Whether the proposal is in conformance with and in furtherance of the implementation of the goals and policies of the Comprehensive Plan, other adopted plans, and the policies, intents and requirements of the Zoning Code, and other City regulations and guidelines.

The proposed text amendment is consistent with the following Goals as indicated in Chapter 7 of the Comprehensive Plan: Goal #3: Business Development and Retention as well as Goal #8: Economic Development. The Comprehensive Plan (2001) does not contain design details or standards related to food truck parks or mobile food establishments. Later Comprehensive Plan amendments contain general directions to promote innovation in commercial areas. Moline adopted the "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors" policy in 2017, reflecting a need to regulate mobile food vending. The proposed text amendment is generally consistent with all these policies.

(5) Whether adequate public facilities and services are available or will be made available concurrent with the projected impacts of development in the proposed zone.

Public facilities and services are generally available in the affected commercial areas of the city. Special permit review is the recommended tool to assess particular development proposals at particular locations. Furthermore, the City is required to conduct assessments of such proposed developments in review of site development and building permits. These reviews will ensure that such developments will not have adverse impacts on adequate public facilities and services.

(6) Whether there is an adequate supply of land available in the subject area and the surrounding community to accommodate the zoning and community needs.

The prior review and approval under the special use permit process, coupled with site development and building permit reviews will ensure that the supply of land, accommodation of zoning and community needs are considered.

(7) Whether there is a need in the community for the proposal and whether there will be benefits derived by the community or area by the proposed text amendment.

With reference to a request by a local business person for such a text amendment and with reference to criterion (1) above, there is evidence of a need to provide for food trucks and mobile food establishments in the community. In like manner, and with prior review and approval under the special use permit process, the community stands to gain benefits.

"SEC. 35-3401. REGULATION OF ALLOWED USES.

- (3) LAND USES PERMITTED AS A SPECIAL USE. Land uses listed as permitted as a special use are indicated with an "S" on Table 35-3401.1.
- a. Special uses are permitted subject to all the requirements applicable to uses permitted by right as listed in subsection (a), above, provided the use meets the conditions for a special use listed in Sec. 35-2206, including any additional requirements imposed as part of the special use process. Each application for, and instance of, a special use shall be considered a unique situation and shall not be construed as precedent for similar requests.

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### Scope of the Current Regulations Pertinent to this Text Amendment

The current text of the Zoning and Land Development Code, effective since April of 2006, does not provide for "food truck parks" or "mobile food establishments." Under Section 35-3418(h) "Outdoor Sales, General" is permitted as a temporary use for up to twelve days per calendar year only. Under Section 35-3414(g) or (7), "Outdoor Dining" is permitted as an accessory use, including patios, decks, lawns, sidewalks and similar outdoor areas for dining that are accessory to a principal restaurant use. The area of outdoor dining shall not exceed 15% of the total indoor dining area..." Outdoor dining is not found in the Code as a principal use. In 2017 the City adopted a stand-alone "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors" policy (Ordinance № 1157-2017, passed 10 October 2017), which would indicate that a desire for this type of use existed in 2017 and regulations had been sought to deal with such uses. The adopted policy regulations center mainly on health concerns and factors. The policy is devoid of zoning considerations.

Sidewalk cafés have been the subject of various City ordinances and resolutions over the years. Most recently the revised "City of Moline Sidewalk Café Guidelines" policy was adopted in March of 2016. This policy addresses the utilization of public property, or, when on private property, relates to outdoor dining as an accessory use as described above under outdoor dining.

#### <u>Trends in Food Truck Operations and Businesses</u>

According to data reported from the U.S. Census Bureau, the number of food trucks operating in the U.S. nearly doubled from 2013 to 2018. And according to zippia.com, a career research and advising firm, the food truck industry has an average annualized business growth rate of 9.9% from 2018 to 2023. Some of the food truck parks established in other parts of the country provide entertainment, such as music performances, and some venues allow alcoholic beverage sales.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, food truck parks were springing up in dozens of cities across the U.S. Local media reported the opening of a food truck park on 44th Street between 5th and 4th Avenues in Rock Island in the spring of 2022. Therefore, a growing trend toward food truck parks has materialized.

#### <u>Impetus for this Text Amendment in 2023</u>

In March of 2023, a business proposal was brought to Department of Community and Economic Development staff for a food truck park. Specifically, the business proposal stated:

"I am considering purchasing 2500 53rd Street in Moline. It is an empty lot that has been on the market for over 5 years. It has been listed as zoned B-3.

What I would like to do with the property in the beginning is make it a food truck park. I would like to have a place where several food trucks could be throughout the week and provide a park like environment for people to sit, eat, and relax.

My intent is to make the layout as such that I could come back at a later time and put in a building towards the back of the property."

The Department Director at that time explained that the Zoning and Land Development Code did not permit such a use, except on a temporary basis for up to twelve days per year. Or one food truck could be parked for short periods on the property in accordance with the Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors policy. The Director stated that such a use, regulations, and related standards would need to be established with a code amendment and most likely should take the form of the special use permit process. The Director opined that a public hearing on the item could be scheduled in 45-60 days. The item was turned over to Corporation Council for further research. The current text amendment proposal is the result of the cooperation among the City Staff and Attorneys and the business proprietor.

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#### ANALYSIS AND REVIEW CRITERIA (see Sec. 35-2203 and Approval Criteria)

In determining whether the proposed amendment shall be approved, the following factors shall be considered and findings of fact shall be made by the Plan Commission:

(1) Whether the existing text or zoning designation was in error at the time of adoption.

As stated in the background information section of this report, the current text of the Zoning and Land Development Code does not provide for food truck parks or mobile food establishments, except on a temporary basis of up to twelve days per calendar year. Outdoor Dining is currently permitted as only an accessory use. And the City's "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors" policy is devoid of any reference to zoning. Food truck parks or mobile food establishments were simply not addressed at the adoption of the Code in 2006.

(2) Whether there has been a change of character in the area or throughout the city due to installation of public facilities, other zone changes, new growth trends, deterioration, development transitions, etc.

The proposed text amendment is consistent with the following Goals as indicated in Chapter 7 of the Comprehensive Plan: Goal #3: Business Development and Retention as well as Goal #8: Economic Development. The Comprehensive Plan (2001) does not contain design details or standards related to food truck parks or mobile food

establishments. Later Comprehensive Plan amendments contain general directions to promote innovation in commercial areas. Again, Moline adopted the "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors" policy in 2017, which indicated a need to regulate mobile food vending. The proposed text amendment is generally consistent with these policies.

(5) Whether adequate public facilities and services are available or will be made available concurrent with the projected impacts of development in the proposed zone.

Public facilities and services are generally available in the affected commercial areas of the city. Special permit review is the recommended tool to assess particular development proposals at particular locations. Furthermore, City staff would conduct assessments of such proposed developments in review of site development and building permits. These reviews will ensure that such developments will not have adverse impacts on adequate public facilities and services.

(6) Whether there is an adequate supply of land available in the subject area and the surrounding community to accommodate the zoning and community needs.

The prior review and approval under the special use permit process, coupled with site development and building permit reviews will ensure that the supply of land, accommodation of zoning and community needs are considered.

(7) Whether there is a need in the community for the proposal and whether there will be benefits derived by the community or area by the proposed text amendment.

With reference to the origin of the proposed text amendment and with factor (1) above, there is evidence of a need to provide for food trucks and mobile food establishments in the community. In like manner, and with prior review and approval under the special use permit process, the community stands to gain benefits.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Based on the above seven factors being met in staff's opinion, it is recommended that Plan Commission recommend approval to the City Council of the zoning text amendment as described in the requested action at the head of this report.

In reviewing details of the proposed code amendment ordinance, planning staff recommends removing the provision that would allow use of a gravel surface in paragraph 35-3408(a)(1)b. "The parking area for the food trucks must either be a paved or gravel surface."

It may be beneficial to note in the definition that "food truck park" does not include "entertainment, outdoor" [as under Section 35-3408(j)] and whether or not alcoholic beverage

service would be allowable. Another issue is whether sales outside of food trucks at booths or tables would be allowable, such as is customary at farmer's markets.

It is recommended the Plan Commission provide findings-of-fact as suggested above; or to add, remove, or modify such proposed findings accordingly.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

The City Council will review the Plan Commission's recommendation, if approved, at the Committee of the Whole meeting on August 15<sup>th</sup>. Thereafter a first reading and second reading of the ordinance by the City Council would normally require two additional meetings for adoption in September.

#### I. Introduction

In 2017, the City adopted rules and regulations concerning the operation of individual food trucks in the City. See Moline, Ill. Res. No. 1157-2017. Recently, City staff received an informal proposal for operation of a "food truck park" where multiple food trucks could locate to serve customers. While the City's temporary use regulations might allow this activity on a limited basis, the City's current land use regulations would not accommodate a more permanent food truck park use.

Based on our research, we drafted proposed text amendments to accommodate the proposed food truck park and mobile food establishments supporting such uses that we have encountered in other communities.

#### II. **Background**

#### A. Food Truck Policy

The City's "Food Truck Policy" defines a "motorized food vendor" as a person in the business of selling food or non-alcoholic beverages from a self-contained motorized vehicle with valid driver's license and vehicle registration. Moline, Ill. Res. No. 1157-2017. The motorized food vendor regulations or "food truck policy" does not apply to a non-motorized food cart, hot dog stand, or an ice cream truck operator.

The food truck policy regulates vehicle requirements; proximity and location; operations in public parks; noise and behavior; food inspections and licensing; sanitation and disposal; service limits and hours of operation; special events; indemnity and insurance; and compliance with laws.

The proximity and location restrictions provide that no food truck may operate in a location that is within one block face of an existing stationary restaurant during their posted hours of operation, unless the restaurant grants permission. Tables, tents, and chairs designated for customer dining

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are permitted on private property with permission of the property owner. Signs and aesthetics promoting the food truck must be attached to the vehicle.

#### **B.** Temporary Use Regulations

The zoning ordinance currently allows food trucks as a type of temporary use. Moline, Ill. Code Sec. 35-3418(h).

- "(h) OUTDOOR SALES, GENERAL. Description: Includes the display of any items outside the confines of a building which is not otherwise permitted as a permitted or special use, or a special event otherwise regulated by the City of Moline Code of Ordinances. Examples of this land use include but are not limited to: seasonal garden shops, tent sales, parking lot sales, food stands, and vendors.
  - (1) Temporary Use Regulations:
    - a. Display shall be limited to a maximum of 12 days in any calendar year.
    - b. Display shall not obstruct pedestrian or vehicular circulation, including vehicular sight distances.
    - c. Signage shall comply with the requirements for temporary signs in the sign code.
    - d. Adequate parking shall be provided.
    - e. If subject property is located adjacent to a residential area, sales and display activities shall be limited to daylight hours.

[...]"

However, these temporary use regulations would not practically support a more permanent food truck park use.

#### **III.** Proposed Amendments

#### A. Food Truck Parks – Principal Commercial Use, Special Use

Food truck parks are a relatively novel land use in Illinois, but can be found in some communities across the country, including Washington, D.C., Portland, Oregon, and Austin, Texas. Many of the regulations surrounding food truck parks are food safety measures for individual food trucks offering food or snacks to consumers. However, some communities have adopted land use regulations to accommodate the congregation of food trucks in a food truck park. Alton, Ill. Code Sec. 4-23-7; West Hartford, Conn. Code Sec. 177-37.4.

The proposed amendments define a food truck park as an outdoor lot with the capacity for two or more food truck vendors to congregate to offer food or beverages for sale to the public for immediate consumption. The proposed use would be allowed as a principal use in the City's office

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and business districts. As a novel use, food truck parks are proposed as a special use that may be subject to conditions. However, some general regulations are included in the proposed amendments, including:

- a. The food truck park must be clearly separated from any parking areas available to patrons on the lot.
- b. The surface on which food trucks are parked must be a paved or gravel surface.
- c. A pavilion or other permanent structure may be erected in conformance with the setback requirements of the zoning district.
- d. All food trucks must comply with the rules and regulations for operation approved by the City in Resolution 1157-2017.

#### B. Mobile Food Establishments – Principal Commercial Use, Special Use

The proposed amendments acknowledge that there the land uses associated with food trucks extend beyond their service of food to customers by allowing mobile food establishments as a principal use and special use in the City's office and business districts. A mobile food establishment is a complementary principal use to support food trucks, allowing overnight parking, equipment storage, and food preparation. Mobile food establishments are included in the U.S. Census Bureau's North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) and include the "central location from which the . . . route is serviced, not each vehicle or cart."

The proposed amendments apply some of the general regulations associated with Fleet Vehicle Storage for mobile food establishments. Moline, Ill. Code Sec. 35-3414(5). These regulations require that designated parking areas for food trucks be paved; that no inoperative vehicles or equipment be stored alongside the parked food truck(s); and that there be a reasonable buffer along the parking area where it abuts residential property.

#### C. Mobile Food Establishments – Accessory Commercial Use, Special Use

In addition to the above-referenced principal uses, the proposed amendments incorporate mobile food establishments as an accessory use to a principal restaurant use. While some food trucks are independent, many are often affiliated with brick-and-mortar restaurants that provide food products and furnish supplies to the food truck to be used on its service route. Permitting the overnight parking of a food truck as an accessory use to a restaurant will make it easier for these hybrid businesses to operate in the City. As a novel use, the proposed amendments require a special use permit for mobile food establishments in the City's ORT and business districts, the districts where restaurants are a special or permitted principal land use. The regulations also require that that the food truck parking not inhibit the required parking for the principal restaurant use.

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#### IV. Conclusion

The proposed amendments will be considered at a public hearing on August 9, 2023. We are available to discuss the proposed amendments at your convenience.

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#### A ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT ORDINANCE

#### **AMENDING**

Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," of the Moline Code of Ordinances regarding food trucks or motorized food vendors, including amendments to ARTICLE 1, DIVISION 2, Section 35-1203, "DEFINITIONS;" ARTICLE 3, DIVISION 4, Section 35-3401, "REGULATION OF ALLOWED USES;" Table 35-3401.1, "Permitted Land Uses;" Section 35-3408, "PRINCIPAL COMMERCIAL LAND USES;" Section 35-3414, "ACCESSORY COMMERCIAL USES."

WHEREAS, the City of Moline ("City") is a home rule municipal corporation organized and operating in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to its home rule power, the City may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, the City continuously analyzes its Zoning and Land Development Code ("Zoning Code") in order to ensure that it is responsive to contemporaneous development trends and affords clarity to existing and prospective property owners and occupants as well as its staff tasked with administering and enforcing its provisions; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that amendments to the Zoning Code are necessary and desirable to accommodate the proliferation of motorized food vendors commonly known as "food trucks," by:

- a) allowing food truck parks with a special use permit as a principal use in the City's office and business districts;
- b) allowing mobile food establishments supporting food trucks with a special use permit as a principal use in the City's office and business districts; and
- allowing mobile food establishments with a special use permit as an accessory use to restaurants in the City's ORT and business districts.

WHEREAS, amendments to the text of the Zoning Code are adopted by the City Council periodically to ensure that the zoning regulations are up-to-date and adequately responsive to community needs, land use trends, and growth patterns within the City; and

WHEREAS, notice of a public hearing on the City's petition for text amendments to the Zoning Code, as amended, was published in the Dispatch/Rock Island Argus on \_\_\_\_; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was convened by the Plan Commission on August 9, 2023, on which date the Plan Commission closed the public hearing and, pursuant to the findings of fact attached as *Exhibit A* and, by this reference, made a part of this Ordinance, recommended approval of the proposed text amendment.

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**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Moline, Rock Island County, Illinois, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u> – The foregoing recitals are hereby incorporated into this Ordinance as though fully set forth in this Section 1.

Section 2 - Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," ARTICLE 1, DIVISION 2, Section 35-1203, "DEFINITIONS" of the Moline Code of Ordinances, is hereby amended pursuant to Section 35-2203 of the Moline Code of Ordinances to add the following definitions in the proper alphabetical order and the following subsections renumbered chronologically as follows (additions in **bold and underlined** and deletions in **bold and** strikethrough):

"SEC. 35-1203. DEFINITIONS.

The following words, terms and phrases, wherever they occur in this Code, shall have the meanings ascribed to them by this section. Definitions shown in italics are unique to this Code are not included in the Unified Code. Definitions provided by this section include:

Food Truck. A self-contained motorized vehicle used for mobile food services.

Food Truck Park. An outdoor lot with the capacity for two or more food truck vendors to congregate to offer food or beverages for sale to the public for immediate consumption.

Mobile Food Establishment. Establishments primarily engaged in mobile food services using food trucks. The establishment is the central location from which the food truck route is serviced, not each food truck.

Mobile Food Services. Preparing and serving meals and snacks for immediate consumption from motorized vehicles, such as food trucks, mobile food carts, mobile food concession stands, mobile refreshment stands, mobile snack stands, and motorized food vendors. Mobile food services do not include ice cream trucks; hot dog carts; charitable organizations distributing food to those in need; and persons engaged in the door-to-door delivery of previously prepared food or beverages to customers who have placed an order for such items.

Section 3 - Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," ARTICLE III, DIVISION 4, Section 3401, "REGULATION OF ALLOWED USES," and Table 35-3401.1 are hereby amended pursuant to Section 35-2203 of the Moline Code of Ordinances as set forth in Exhibit B (additions in **bold and underlined** and deletions in **bold and strikethrough**) with the following subsections to be renumbered consecutively.

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<u>Section 4</u> – Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," ARTICLE III, DIVISION 4, Section 35-3408, "PRINCIPAL COMMERCIAL LAND USES" of the Moline Code of Ordinances, is hereby amended pursuant to Section 35-2203 of the Moline Code of Ordinances, as follows (additions in <u>bold and underlined</u> and deletions in <u>bold and strikethrough</u>) with the following subsections to be renumbered consecutively:

"SEC. 35-3408. PRINCIPAL COMMERCIAL LAND USES.

(a) FOOD TRUCK PARK. Description: Food truck park land uses include outdoor, public spaces where the primary function is mobile food services from two or more food trucks. Such land uses do not include mobile food establishments, campgrounds, or the storage or display of inoperative food trucks or equipment, or other materials typically associated with a junkyard or salvage yard.

#### (1) Regulations:

- a. The area of the food truck park must be clearly defined and separated from the patron parking area through the installation of a fence or other enclosure which maintains an open appearance and is a maximum of five feet in height.
- b. The parking area for the food trucks must either be a paved or gravel surface.
- c. Food truck parks may have a pavilion or other permanent structure in order to provide shelter for patrons and operators, provided said structure meets the minimum setback requirements for the zoning district where the food truck park is located.
- d. Food truck parks and food trucks on the property must comply with, all applicable laws, including "Rules and Regulations for Motorized Food Vendors," Res. No. 1157-2017, as may be amended from time to time.
- (b) MOBILE FOOD ESTABLISHMENT. Description: Mobile food establishment land uses include all principal land uses involving the overnight parking, vehicle storage, equipment storage, food preparation, and other services associated with food trucks that do not include the food truck actively servicing its route or selling food to customers. Mobile food establishment land uses shall be separate and distinct from food truck park land uses.

#### (1) Regulations:

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- 1. All parking areas shall be paved per the requirements of Article V.
- 2. Inoperative vehicles or equipment shall not be stored with food trucks.
- Parking and storage areas shall provide a Type C bufferyard **3.** along all borders of the parking or storage area abutting residentially zoned property.

(a)(c) OFFICE. Description: [...]"

Section 5 - Chapter 35, "ZONING AND LAND DEVELOPMENT," ARTICLE III, DIVISION 4, Section 35-3414, "ACCESSORY COMMERCIAL LAND USES" of the Moline Code of Ordinances is hereby amended as follows (additions in **bold and underlined** and deletions in **bold and strikethrough**) with the following subsections to be renumbered consecutively:

#### "ACCESSORY COMMERCIAL LAND USES.

Commercial accessory land uses are those which are incidental and subordinate to, and serving the principal commercial use. The following provide standards for permitted commercial accessory uses. Accessory uses not specifically listed herein, but similar to those permitted by right, may be permitted upon site plan review and approval by the zoning administrator or at the time of principal use approval by the decision making body. Accessory use not listed herein, but similar to those permitted as a special use, may be permitted with a special use permit.

MOBILE FOOD ESTABLISHMENTS. Accessory mobile food establishment land uses include all land uses accessory to a principal restaurant involving the overnight parking, vehicle storage, equipment storage, food preparation, and other services associated with food trucks that do not include the food truck actively servicing its route or selling food to customers. Mobile food establishment land uses shall be separate and distinct from food truck park land uses.

#### **Regulations:** a.

- Accessory mobile food establishments must comply with the applicable requirements for principal mobile food establishments.
- In no event shall the parking/storage of food trucks reduce or 2. inhibit the use or number of parking spaces provided on the

<u>Section 6</u> – That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or oprtion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

<u>Section 7</u> – That all prior ordinances and resolutions in conflict or inconsistent herewith are hereby expressly repealed only to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency.

<u>Section 8</u> – That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage, approval, and if required by law, publication in the manner provided for by law.

**Explanation:** The Finance and Public Works Departments propose changes to Chapter 15 of the Moline Code of Ordinances related to residential solid waste collection and disposal. Enterprise Fund finances were reviewed during the roundtable discussion on September 19, 2023. Adjustments are necessary to allow the Fund to operate as an enterprise, while minimizing the subsidy provided by the General Fund. The roundtable review included information related to operating, maintenance and capital planning for the Sanitation Fund. Results of the Enterprise Fund's financial model developed in 2022 were also reviewed. This review confirmed the need to increase the residential sanitation rate by 7 percent beginning in 2024.

Staff recommends implementing the adjusted residential rate to begin with the first bills issued after January 1, 2024. The new rate for residential refuse collection is proposed to be \$10.79/month with no change to the monthly recycling rate of \$3.69. The total monthly rate for solid waste and recycling is proposed to be \$14.48.

The fee for residential refuse collection shall be ten and 08/100 dollars (\$10.08) ten and 79/100 dollars (\$10.79) per single-family residence per month. Residential buildings of five (5) dwelling units or less shall be charged ten and 08/100 dollars (\$10.08) ten and 79/100 dollars (\$10.79) per unit per month. Said fee will be added to the property's quarterly City utility bill and will be combined with the recycling fee for curbside recyclable materials of three and 69/100 dollars (\$3.69). Said combined fee will be known as "solid waste collection and recycling fee" of thirteen and 77/100 dollars (\$13.77) fourteen and 48/100 (\$14.48) per month, and its payment shall be applied immediately after stormwater fees and prior to water or sewer charges."

An Ordinance amending Chapter 34, "WATER AND SEWERS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 34-4400, "IN GENERAL," by repealing said sections in their entirety and enacting in lieu thereof one new Section 34-4400, dealing with the same subject matter.

**Explanation:** Enterprise Fund finances were reviewed during the roundtable discussion on September 19, 2023. The review included information related to operating, maintenance and capital planning for the Stormwater Utility. Results of the Utility's financial model developed in 2022 were also reviewed. This review confirmed the need to adjust stormwater rates for 2024.

Adjustments are necessary to keep pace with the City's aggressive street improvement program. In addition, funds are being dedicated to equipment for utility staff to perform tangible improvements to the collection system. The Stormwater Utility is responsible for maintenance of the drainage system within the City as well as compliance with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency's Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) NPDES Permit. The Utility is exclusively funded by charges to Moline property owners related to the size and character of their property. Funds are used for O&M of the conveyance system as well as flood mitigation.

Residential parcels (up to four dwelling units) are charged a flat rate based on acreage. Small parcels are those less than ¼ acre. Medium parcels are those between ¼ and ½ acre. Large parcels are those between ½ acre and 2 acres. Commercial/Industrial, and residential parcels larger than 2 acres, or 4 dwelling units, are charged based on a measurement of impervious acreage. Average impervious surface from these parcels is 0.75 acres. Proposed monthly adjustments for each customer class is as follows:

WHEREAS, residential parcels (up to four dwelling units) are charged a flat rate based on acreage. Small parcels are those less than ½ acre. Medium parcels are those between ½ and ½ acre. Large parcels are those between ½ acre and 2 acres. Commercial/Industrial, and residential parcels larger than 2 acres, or 4 dwelling units, are charged based on a measurement of equalized hydrologic acreage (\$87.83/EHA); and

WHEREAS, a review of the Utility's financial model, developed in 2022, as well as information related to operating, maintenance and capital planning for the Stormwater Utility, indicate that adjustments to stormwater rates are necessary to keep pace with the City's aggressive street improvement program as costs related to construction and repair have continued to increase; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends amendments to Chapter 34 of the Moline Code of Ordinances to adjust stormwater rates for fiscal year 2024 as approved by Council during the Enterprise Fund roundtable discussion on September 19, 2023.

An Ordinance amending Chapter 34, "WATER AND SEWERS," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, Section 34-3200, "SEWERAGE RATE SYSTEM," by repealing said section in its entirety and enacting in lieu thereof one new Section 34-3200, dealing with the same subject matter.

**Explanation:** The Utilities and Finance Departments propose amendments to Chapter 34 of the Moline Code of Ordinances pursuant to recommendations related to sewer rates provided to City Council during the Enterprise Fund roundtable discussion on September 19, 2023.

As a result of regulatory requirements included in the National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit for Moline's South Slope Wastewater Treatment Plant, a thorough cost of service analysis of the WPC fund was performed in 2022. The analysis revealed that a series of rate adjustments are necessary to fund treatment plant improvements estimated at \$68,000,000. It will be Staff's recommendation to pursue an ILEPA State revolving loan for these improvements, which will require the City to demonstrate its capacity to repay such a debt. Staff has reviewed the 2022 recommendations, updated the financial records and studied the expected WPC enterprise fund cash flows for years 2024-2029. This analysis confirms the recommendation made in 2022.

The recommended rate increase to be implemented in January of 2024 for wholesale customers (East Moline and Coal Valley) to the Rock River Valley Regional Sewer System (RRVRSS) is 25 percent. The recently amended RRVRSS Intergovernmental Agreement requires Moline to provide a 90-day notification to the regional customers of such rate changes.

Rate increases were also recommended for 2024 for Moline customers. A 9 percent rate increase is recommended to be applied beginning in 2024 across the six customer classes, uniformly.

WHEREAS, the analysis revealed that a series of rate adjustments are necessary to fund treatment plant improvements estimated at \$68,000,000; and

WHEREAS, staff's analysis of the 2022 recommendations, including updating the financial records and studying the expected WPC enterprise fund cash flows for years 2024-2029, confirms the recommendation made in 2022; and

WHEREAS, at a roundtable meeting on September 19, 2023, Council approved staff's recommendation for rate increases, effective upon the first billing after January 1, 2024, for Moline and wholesale customers; and

WHEREAS, the rate increase for Moline customers is 9 percent, and the rate increase for wholesale customers (East Moline and Coal Valley) to the Rock River Valley Regional Sewer System (RRVRSS) is 25 percent, with a 90-day notification to be provided to regional customers as required by the RRVRSS Intergovernmental Agreement.

(a) Definitions. As used in this section, the following words and terms shall be defined as follows:

- (1) **Local capital financing charge**: A charge levied on users of a treatment works for the local capital financing costs of such works in proportion to total treatment works loading.
- (2) **Local capital financing costs**: Expenditures for debt service and reserve funds on long-term financing of major capital improvements plus normal capital requirements for minor extensions, but not replacement, to the treatment works which are financed from current revenues.
- (3) **Operation and maintenance costs**: Those costs associated with the annual needs of operating and maintaining the treatment works and includes such costs as supervision, operation and maintenance labor, supplies, utilities, chemicals, billing and accounting, administrative and general expenses, and replacement, as defined hereafter.
- (4) **Replacement**: Expenditures for obtaining and installing equipment, accessories or appurtenances which are necessary during the service life of the treatment works to maintain the capacity and performance for which such works were designed and constructed.
- (5) **Treatment works**: The water pollution control system of the City of Moline consisting of interceptor and trunk sewers, pumping stations, pressure pipe transmission mains, and wastewater treatment facilities.
- (6) **User charge**: A charge levied on users of a treatment works for the operation and maintenance costs of such works in proportion to total treatment works loading.
- (7) **Use class**: A group, or category, of users having similar flows and wastewater content characteristics, such as similar levels of BOD and suspended solids.
- (b) Quarterly unit rates for service will be assessed to the City of East Moline, Village of Coal Valley for waste water discharged to the Rock River Valley Regional Sewerage System on the following basis:
  - (1) Reserved.
- (2) User charges: (treatment plant and transportation sewers operation, maintenance and depreciation).
  - a. The unit rate shall remain as follows, until modified by Council:
- 1. For discharges measured through December 31, 20222023, the unit rate shall be \$2.02\$2.53 per 1,000 gallons.
- 2. For discharges measured after January 1, 20232024, the unit rate shall be \$2.53\\$3.16 per 1,000 gallons.
  - b. The fixed charge per quarterly bill shall be charged the following:
    - 1. Fixed charges accrued through December 31, 20222023: \$31.23\$39.04.
    - 2. Fixed charges accrued after January 1, 20232024: \$39.04\$48.80.
  - (c) Sewerage rates. The quarterly sewerage rates for Moline contributors shall be as follows:

- (1) The schedule of charges for all bills shall be a fixed quarterly bill charge of \$31.2334.04 per connection with a unit rate of \$6.42\$7.00 per 1,000 gallons.
- (d) Wastewater Strength Surcharges. Moline contributors that contribute wastewater that exceeds the strength of domestic water, in terms of total suspended solids (TSS) and biological oxygen demand (BOD), shall pay surcharges in accordance with the following schedule, in addition to the established fixed and volume charges:

- (2) In the event that a contributor does not agree with the strength class classification, the contributor may request that a point specific sampling program be conducted at their expense. The ongoing sampling program shall be conducted by the department of utilities, water pollution control division, and all aspects of the sampling program must be approved by the director. The laboratory methods used in analyzing samples of said wastewaters shall be in accordance with federal law, regulations, or guidelines, if any; otherwise, by generally accepted scientific procedures. If sampling results are still not agreeable or the sites are not satisfactory to the director for reasons not limited to but including non-representative sampling points located at the contributing site in question, the two (2) parties shall agree on a qualified third party arbitrator to conduct an independent analysis and to be bound by the results obtained thereby. Cost of arbitration shall be borne by the contributor. Such arbitrator shall be qualified in laboratory analysis. The location and design of sampling sites must be approved by the director. Samples shall be collected in such a manner as to be satisfactory to the director. The laboratory methods used in analyzing samples of said wastewaters shall be in accordance with federal law, regulations, or guideline, if any; otherwise, by generally accepted scientific procedures.
- (3) Other Moline contributors, which are not identified in the strength class contributor classification system, shall be subject to the wastewater strength surcharges should laboratory analysis reveal that the contributors' wastewater strength exceed the strength of domestic wastewater.
- (e) Quarterly unit rates for service will be assessed for wastewater discharged to the sewerage system from the Moline Water Treatment Plant on the following basis:

(1) The schedule of charges for all bills issued shall be:

Fixed charge per quarterly bill: \$31.23\$34.04 per connection

Volume charge: \$1.01 per 1,000 gallons

TSS rate: \$0.10 per lb

(f) In General.

- (1) The monthly sewerage charges specified in paragraphs (c) and (d), but not (b), hereof shall be increased by one hundred percent (100%) for all contributors to the treatment works who are located outside of the corporate limits of the City and who have been granted permission by the City to connect to the treatment works.
- (2) Where, in the opinion of the City Council a contributor assumes a substantial portion of the treatment works capacity, a contract may be required between the City and the major user. Such a contract will be governed entirely by the provisions of this section which are applicable, establish a maximum contribution for each waste characteristic (i.e., volume, BOD, suspended solids, etc.), provide for penalties when the maximum is exceeded, and indicate the means of measuring and sampling the wastewater.
- (3) The director shall make periodic determination of the concentration of wastes as may be deemed necessary by the director. The location and design of sampling sites must be approved by the director. Samples shall be collected in such a manner as to be satisfactory to the director. In the event that results of analysis of samples by the director do not substantially agree with the analysis performed by the City of East Moline or the Village of Coal Valley, the two (2) parties shall agree on a qualified third party expert to conduct an independent analysis and to be bound by the results obtained thereby. Costs of the independent analysis shall be borne by the party in error to the greatest degree as determined by the third party expert. The laboratory methods used in analyzing samples of said wastewaters shall be in accordance with federal law, regulations, or guideline, if any; otherwise, by generally accepted scientific procedures.
- (4) The City will maintain such records as are necessary to permit an annual review of the adequacy of the user charges to properly reflect the actual operation, maintenance, replacement, depreciation, administrative, and legal costs of the treatment plants and collection system.
- <u>Section 3.</u> All ordinances, resolutions, and parts thereof in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent necessary to give effect to the provisions of this Ordinance.
- <u>Section 4.</u> This Ordinance and every provision thereof shall be considered severable. If any word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph, provision, section, or part of this Ordinance is found to be void, unconstitutional, or otherwise unenforceable, all remaining portions of this Ordinance not so declared void, unconstitutional, or unenforceable shall remain in full force and effect.
- <u>Section 5.</u> That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage, approval, and if required by law, publication in the manner provided for by law.

# Tentative Agreement between the City of Moline and AFSCME, Local 1132

The following are proposals for changes to the collective bargaining agreement which have been tentatively agreed to by the City of Moline and AFSCME, Local 1132 subject to ratification by the Union and approval by the City Council.

3:015 The City shall provide on the tenth (10th) day of each month to the Union Treasurer of Local 1132, <u>AFSCME Council 31</u>, and the AFSCME Council 31 Staff Representative in a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet or other editable digital file, the amount withheld by the City under 3:01-3:016 in the previous month along with the names of employees, employee number and/or the last four (4) digits of the employee's Social Security Number (SSN), local union number, address, phone, personal email address, work email address, position/classification, work phone, work location, date of birth, dues amount paid, PEOPLE contribution amount, employee status, and date of hire and contact information for whom there still is on file a valid dues authorization card, and the names of bargaining unit employees for whom there is no authorization card on file.

Within ten (10) calendar days after hire or transfer into the bargaining unit, the City will provide the name, job title and contact information on file of the new or newly assigned employee to the Union Treasurer of Local 1132 and the AFSCME Council 31 Staff Representative.

\* \* \*

8:153 A "seasonal employee" is excluded from the unit and refers to those whose regular assignment is expected to encompass less than one thousand (1,000) hours in a calendar year.

Seasonal employee shall not be hired to cause a lay off or reduction of the unit or department below the certified number of 125-135 employees unless mutually agreed upon and only perform seasonal work. For the year 2021, the minimum staffing requirement for hiring seasonal employees due to the unprecedented events in the community. The certified number of employees is subject to change contingent upon labor contract negotiations, position certifications, position decertifications, or through attrition, provided that the certified number will not go below 125-135 employees due to attrition; provided, however, that should the number of employees drop below 125-135 because of retirement, resignation, discharge, termination, or any other reason other than layoff and provided that the City exercises good faith efforts to recruit and fill open positions, then any restriction otherwise imposed by this section shall not limit the City's rights concerning seasonal employees. Seasonal employees may be hired by the city from April March 15 1- and shall be allowed to work through October 31 of the calendar year of hire, except that seasonal employees may work through December 15 for leaf collection. No additional seasonal personnel will be hired by the city until April 1 March 15 of the following year, except maintenance and concessions seasonal personnel at Green Valley, leaf collection seasonal personnel, clerical helper I at recreational office and janitor helpers at Coolidge school (1) and garden center (1).

\* \* \* \*

9:122 When work is scheduled as to an employee's off-duty days, such work shall be divided as equally as possible over a contract year (January 1 to December 31) among those employees in the classification in the division within the department as shown in overtime records. The

City will endeavor to notify the employees as soon as possible and will give notice of the work time in turn to those having had the least amount of overtime. An employee who is offered such work, by reason of division, but refuses shall be considered to have worked overtime for the purpose of division. The City shall have offered an employee said overtime when the supervisor or designated representative calls the employee at the telephone number listed in the employment records of the City. An employee with no telephone forgoes their right to be offered overtime unless the offer could have been made while the employee was on duty. An employee offered overtime shall not be considered to have refused overtime unless the employee is actually contacted. Qualified employees on the top of the overtime list shall not be skipped. If the Employer skips an employee on the overtime list, the employee shall be paid one hour of straight time for every hour of work missed.

\* \* \* \*

Full-time employees may elect to take compensatory time rather than overtime pay with 9:14 written authorization of the Department Director. Employees desiring to take compensatory time must request such time no later than the first Wednesday of the pay period in which compensatory time is to be earned and said election shall remain in effect until revoked. Compensatory time shall be accumulated at the rate of one and one-half (1-1/2) hours for each hour worked in excess of eight (8) hours per workday and in excess of forty (40) hours per workweek and credited at the end of each payroll. Compensatory time shall not be accumulated beyond eighty (80) hours in any quarter and, if any employee has accumulated eighty (80) hours of compensatory time in any quarter, the employee shall not accumulate any more compensatory time until the accumulation is reduced below eighty (80) hours and shall be paid time and one-half (1-1/2) for hours that would qualify for compensatory time accumulation but for this limitation. Compensatory time may be used, upon request, as approved and scheduled by the supervisor in full hour increments for normal workdays; however, such request may not be approved for employees operating the Water Treatment Plant or Waste Water Treatment Plants if the vacancy will result in overtime.

\* \* \* \*

10:015 <u>Maximum Accrual</u>. For employees hired on or after January 1, 2021, the maximum sick leave accrual shall be one thousand (1,000) hours at any given time; and any sick leave accrual above said maximum shall be forfeited until such accrual is reduced below said maximum by usage.

\* \* \* \*

10:073 <u>Minimum Usage</u>. Such use of sick leave as personal leave shall be in <u>four (4)one (1)</u> or more hour increments. The use of sick leave as personal leave may be permitted in increments less than four (4) hours at the discretion of the supervisor. The use of sick leave in less than four (4) hour increments <u>must</u>shall occur in conjunction with the beginning or end of the employee's shift.

\* \* \* \*

10:083 Employees who exhaust their sick leave accrual balance may use other available paid leave to prevent unpaid time off. Such uses shall not limit the City's ability to enforce abuse of

\* \* \* \*

Claims for sick leave under 11:04 are subject to the same limitations as imposed by Article X. In addition to said limitations, the Department Director shall have the right to require an employee who has informed said Department Director of employee's non-work related sickness or disability and who continues to work to obtain a doctor's certificate that the employee is capable of performing the task required of the employee without danger to the employee's health (or, in the case of a pregnant femaleemployee, without danger to the employee's health and the fetus's health) when the Department Director has reason to believe that the employee's performance is being adversely affected by the employee's condition. When an employee submits a release to return to work from their health care provider, the City shall make a good faith effort to schedule any required appointments with the City's occupational health provider(s) in a timely manner. If the employee cannot provide said certificate within a reasonable time, the Department Director can require the employee to take the accrued rights provided in 11:03 to 11:06 and upon the employee's refusal to do so may dismiss the employee.

\* \* \* \* \*

#### (PAID PARENTAL LEAVE)

12:09 Paid Parental Leave. All regular employees covered by this agreement shall have the following paid parental leave for the birth of a child of the employee or the placement of a child for adoption or foster care with the employee. Such paid parental leave, like other leave benefits, will run concurrently with FMLA.

- Paid Parental Leave Accrual. Said employees shall be entitled to accrue one hundred twenty (120) hours of paid parental leave, accrued on the basis of 4.62 hours per payroll period through the first year of employment. The maximum balance for paid parental leave is one hundred twenty (120) hours.
- 12:092 After the first year of employment, the full one hundred twenty (120) hours of paid parental leave will be available for use for each birth or placement.

12:093 Use of Paid Parental Leave. The following rules apply to the use of paid parental leave:

- 12:0931 Use. Paid parental leave may be taken intermittently within the first year after birth or placement in full week increments.
  - 12:0932 Rate of Pay. Paid parental leave, when used, shall be paid at the rate of pay assigned to an employee's regular assignment on the day of use.
  - 12:0933 Limitations. Paid parental leave may not be used during an employee's probationary period and may only be used as to normal workdays.

Notification for Paid Parental Leave Use. In order to use paid parental leave, the employee shall notify their department of said use no later than 30 days prior to the commencement of the leave. If an employee is unable to provide 30-days' notice due to unforeseen circumstances, then employee shall notify their department as soon as practicable.

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12:095 Accumulated Paid Parental Leave as Termination Benefits. Unused paid parental leave is not subject to payout upon separation of employment.

#### (USE OF LEAVE)

12:0912:10 The intended purpose of each leave has been specified in this Article and Articles X, XI, XIII and XIV; and no employee who is authorized to be on one of the leaves specified herein shall use said leave for other than its intended purpose, except as stated in 10:083. If an employee uses the leave for other than its intended purpose, discipline shall be imposed. Approval for gainful employment during said leave shall be obtained as provided in Sections 24-2107 and 2-3113(f) of the Moline Code of Ordinances.

\* \* \* \*

#### (OVERTIME PAY FOR HOLIDAY WORK)

Should an employee, other than Sanitation Division employees, Water Plant Operators, and any other employees in classifications that are regularly scheduled to work fifteen (15) or more shifts per week, be required to work on one of the dates specified in 13:01 Column B above, the employee shall be paid one and one-half (1-1/2) times the employee's regular rate of pay for all time worked, except that an employee who works on Thanksgiving Day, Day before Christmas, or Christmas Day, Last Day of the Year or New Year's Day shall be paid two (2) times the employee's regular rate of pay for all time worked.

Water Plant Operators shall be paid one and one-half (1-1/2) times their regular rate of pay for all time worked on one of the dates specified in 13:01 Column A above.

13:042 Sanitation Division employees shall be paid two and one-half (2-1/2) times their regular rate of pay for eight (8) hours if their route is completed. Hours of work beyond eight (8) hours will be paid at one and one-half (1-1/2) times the employees' hourly rate.

13:043 Employees in the Water Pollution Control Division of the Public Utilities Department that work on one of the dates specified in 13:01 Column B above shall be paid one and one-half (1-1/2) times their regular rate of pay for all time worked plus their holiday pay.

13:044 Employees temporarily assigned to a position set forth in 13:041, 13:042 or 13:043 shall not receive double compensation under this Article because of said temporary assignment and the rate of pay received shall be as governed by 8:20.

All employees, other than Sanitation Section employees, Water Plant Operators, and other employees in classifications that are regularly scheduled to work fifteen (15) or more shifts per week, who perform holiday work of at least eight (8) hours in duration or whose regular day off coincides with an observed holiday as specified by 13:02, shall be entitled to schedule another day off in lieu of holiday leave with the scheduling approval of the Department Director. However, if the Department Director fails to approve a request to use a bonus day within sixty (60) days from the end of the payroll period in which the holiday worked falls, said employee shall be paid for an additional day. Water Plant Operators shall receive eleven (11) bonus days in accordance with past practice effective April, 1999, and twelve (12) bonus days in accordance with past practice effective April, 2000. Employees performing holiday work of less than eight (8) hours in duration shall receive holiday pay

and one and one half (1-1/2) times their regular rate of payovertime pay as specified by 13:04 for hours actually worked. Employees under 13:042 shall not be entitled to any additional time off for working as provided in said subparagraph. Such use of bonus leave shall be in one (1) or more hour increments. The use of bonus leave in less than four (4) hour increments must shall occur in conjunction with the beginning or end of the employee's shift.

\* \* \* \*

14:08 For employees hired prior to January 1, 2021, vacation Vacation leave shall not be cumulative and an employee shall not be allowed to accrue vacation leave for a period greater than a two (2) year accrual.

For employees hired on or after January 1, 2021, vacation leave shall not be cumulative and an employee shall not be allowed to accrue vacation leave for a period greater than a one and one-half (1.5) year accrual.

#### (VACATION SCHEDULING)

14:09 The following rules apply to vacation scheduling:

14:091 The maximum consecutive use of vacation leave shall be eighty (80) hours unless the Department Director determines that work and staffing needs will permit additional usage. The minimum usage shall be two (2)one (1) hours and usage shall be in increments of two (2) one (1) hours. The use of vacation leave in less than two (2) hour increments must shall occur in conjunction with the beginning or end of the employee's shift.

\* \* \* \*

#### **ARTICLE XV. WAGES**

In lieu of a general wage increase for the calendar year 2020, employees shall receive a one-time cash lump sum bonus of one thousand one hundred dollars (\$1,100), less mandatory and voluntary withholdings, to be paid no later than thirty (30) days after both parties execute the labor agreement.

Effective the first full payroll period beginning on or after 10/1/2023, with placement on the Evergreen pay plan, employees shall receive an increase of 5.00% or an increase to the classification minimum of the Evergreen pay plan, whichever is greater. For employees who reach the maximum of their grade under the Evergreen pay plan which results in an increase of less than 5%, the employee will receive the percentage difference as a lump sum payment.

All current employees at the time of execution of the labor agreement shall receive a one-time cash lump sum bonus of six hundred fifty dollars (\$650), less mandatory and voluntary withholdings, to be paid no later than thirty (30) days after both parties execute the labor agreement.

Effective the first full payroll period beginning on or after January 1, 20212024, employees shall receive a 2.50% across the board general wage increase applied to their then current

rate as shown on Exhibit J, except employees whose wage rates are in excess of the top of their pay range.

Effective the first full payroll period beginning on or after January 1, 20222025, employees shall receive a 2.002.75% across the board general wage increase applied to their then current rate as shown on Exhibit J, except employees whose wage rates are in excess of the top of their pay range.

Each employee shall be assigned to a pay range having a minimum and maximum rate as shown on attached Exhibit J. Employees below the maximum of their pay rate shall be eligible on their classification anniversary date, in accordance with past practice, to receive an annual amount equal to a 2.25% wage increase but not to exceed the maximum of the pay range. Employees whose wage rates are at or exceed the top of their pay range shall be eligible on their anniversary date, in accordance with past practice, to receive a cash lump sum equal to 1.50% of the top rate of their pay range. An employee's wage increase or cash lump sum will be processed through payroll no later than two weeks so long as the employee has submitted their self-evaluation and is otherwise eligible for the increase or lump sum.

\* \* \* \* \*

#### (SHIFT DIFFERENTIAL)

Upon execution of the labor agreement, any employee assigned to work a second or third shift as defined in this Agreement shall receive compensation at a rate of <u>40-60</u> cents per hour (\$0.4060) for second shift and <u>45-85</u> cents per hour (\$0.4585) for third shift. Employees assigned as Water Plant Operators assigned to work a second or third shift as defined in this Agreement shall receive compensation at a rate of one dollar per hour (\$1.00) in addition. Said compensation shall be entitled "shift differential premium" and shall be in addition to an employee's regular rate of pay.

\* \* \* \*

#### (HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM)

A health insurance, prescription drug, dental benefit and vision benefit program as described in the City of Moline Benefit Plan booklet (hereinafter referred to as "health insurance program"), shall be offered to all regular employees. The actual plan documents shall be the basis of any final interpretation for eligibility and benefits. Employees shall pay 20% of the total monthly premium, which shall increase as follows:

#### Choice Plus Plan

Effective 1/1/2023: Increase the total premium by 3.00%.

Effective 1/1/2024: Increase the total premium by 3.00%.

Effective 1/1/2025: At no time will the employees' share of the total premium be higher than any other union within the City. The increase to the total premium is capped at 7% over the prior year. At no time will the total health insurance premiums be higher than any other union.

#### High Deductible Health Plan

Effective 1/1/2023: Increase the total premium by 3.00%.

Effective 1/1/2024: Increase the total premium by 3.00%.

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Effective 1/1/2025: At no time will the employees' share of the total premium be higher than any other union within the City. The increase to the total premium is capped at 7%

over the prior year. At no time will the total health insurance premiums be higher than any other union.

Refer to Exhibit N for premium and benefit changes and for premium increases effective on January 1, 20202023, January 1, 20212024, and January 1, 20222025.

\* \* \* \*

The City currently has on file in the Human Resources Office a classification system for employees covered by this Agreement referred to as the GovHR USAEvergreen Classification and Compensation Study (the GovHR Evergreen pay plan); and all bargaining unit employees are assigned a position within said classification system and a pay grade therefore and each position has a job description. The Union agrees that, as of the date of execution hereof, each position, classification, job description and pay grade in the GovHR Evergreen pay plan are properly allocated therein. Employees hired prior to January 1, 2020 shall remain on the classification system and pay plan in place prior to the adoption of the GovHR pay plan so long as they remain bargaining unit members, except as modified below. The GovHR Evergreen pay plan is attached as Exhibit T.

Current employees hired prior to January 1, 2020 whose rate of pay is below the GovHR pay plan minimum for their job classification will be placed in the GovHR pay plan pay ranges (minimums and maximums) effective upon execution of the labor agreement.

#### **ARTICLE XXVII. TERMEVALUATIONS**

27:01 Employees shall be evaluated annually based on their anniversary date. Employees shall receive a copy of their evaluation. An employee who disagrees with their evaluation may object in writing and may include supporting documentation. The written objection and supporting documentation shall be attached to the employee's evaluation and placed in the employee's personnel file.

Evaluations more than four (4) years old may not be used in determining if an employee is qualified for a transfer.

#### ARTICLE XXVIII. TERM

27:0128:01 The term of this Agreement shall begin on January 1, 20202023, and shall remain in full force and effect until December 31, 20222025, but no provision shall be retroactive prior to the execution date unless otherwise specified. It shall be automatically renewed from year to year thereafter, unless terminated or modified as hereinafter provided. Should either party desire to modify or terminate this Agreement, said party must notify the other party in writing on or before September 30, 20222025, and may present its initial demands in writing at said time.

An Ordinance amending Chapter 34, "WATER AND SEWERS," Section 34-4203, "DETENTION SYSTEM CRITERIA," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, by enacting one new subsection (c)(3).

**Explanation:** The stormwater code requires installation of stormwater detention facilities in certain circumstances. The purpose of the requirement is to protect downstream properties from flooding caused by increased instantaneous discharge as new developments or re-developments add new impervious surface. In certain circumstances, the size of the development property prevents installation of the necessary detention. In those cases, Section 34-4203(c) allows the developer to pay the city a fee in lieu of installing the required detention facilities.

The code is silent with regard to cases where a developer cannot install the necessary facilities at the development site, but can install it within the watershed on another property. The proposed language allows a waiver for the development property, in favor of an installation elsewhere within the watershed and of the magnitude required of the development as approved by the Utilities Department.

The proposed change adds language to Section 34-4203(c) including off-site installation as a third criteria for a waiver of the requirement for on-site detention within a proposed development.

Staff is proposing this language as a means to make meeting the detention requirements more efficient. This change reduces staff time seeking alternate locations and arranging installation of said facilities and, instead, in certain circumstances, allows the developer to manage that process, subject to approval and inspection by the City.

#### AN ORDINANCE

**AMENDING** 

Chapter 34, "WATER and SEWERS," Section 34-4203, "DETENTION SYSTEM CRITERIA," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, by enacting one new subsection (c)(3).

WHEREAS, the Stormwater Code requires installation of stormwater detention facilities in certain circumstances; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the requirement is to protect downstream properties from flooding caused by increased instantaneous discharge as new developments or re-developments add new impervious surface; and

WHEREAS, in certain circumstances, the size of the development property prevents installation of the necessary detention. In those cases, Section 34-4203(c) allows the developer to pay the city a fee in lieu of installing the required detention facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Code is silent with regard to cases where a developer cannot install the necessary facilities at the development site, but can install it within the watershed on another property; and

WHEREAS, the proposed language allows a waiver for the development property, in favor of an installation elsewhere within the watershed and of the magnitude required of the development as approved by the Utilities Department; and

WHEREAS, the proposed ordinance amendment adds language to Section 34-4203(c) including off-site installation as a third criteria for a waiver of the requirement for on-site detention within a proposed development; and

WHEREAS, Staff recommends this language change as a means to make meeting the detention requirements more efficient, and the change reduces staff time seeking alternate locations and arranging installation of said facilities and, instead, in certain circumstances, allows the developer to manage that process, subject to approval and inspection by the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOLINE, ILLINOIS, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u> – The foregoing recitals are hereby incorporated into this Ordinance as though fully set forth in this Section 1.

<u>Section 2</u> - Chapter 34, "WATER AND SEWERS," Section 34-4203, "DETENTION SYSTEM CRITERIA," of the Moline Code of Ordinances, is hereby amended by enacting one new subsection (c)(3), as follows (additions in <u>bold and underlined</u> and deletions in <u>bold and strikethrough</u>):

"SEC. 34-4203. DETENTION SYSTEM CRITERIA.

[...]

(c) Waiver of Requirements.

[...]

3. The requirement for stormwater detention and release rates for a proposed development may be waived by the utilities director when such detention or compensatory storage is installed by the developer in accordance with the provisions of this article at another location within the watershed, approved by the utilities director.

[...]"

<u>Section 3</u> – That if any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

<u>Section 4</u> – That all prior ordinances and resolutions in conflict or inconsistent herewith are hereby expressly repealed only to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency.

<u>Section 5</u> – That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage, approval, and if required by law, publication in the manner provided for by law.
