The Board of Education is requested to ratify an agreement with Sera Collection Research Services, LLC., to provide temporary supplemental healthcare professionals from July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2024.

### **Rationale:**

Supplemental healthcare professionals provide critical support to help keep our students safe. An updated approval of this service agreement allows Monrovia Unified School District to partner with Sera Collection Research Services to provide temporary supplemental health care professionals.

### **Background:**

In 2021, our Human Resources department established an agreement with Sera Collection Research Services, LLC, to provide COVID-19 vaccinations and supplemental healthcare professional services. The agreement with Sera Collections was recently moved to the Educational Services Department to provide supplemental healthcare professional services for the Students Support Services and Special Education Departments.

The costs for Sera Collections Research Services, LLC. will be paid with general funds for general education-related services. Services that are utilized under Special Education will be paid for with Special Education funds.

This Service Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into by and between Monrovia School District ("Client") and SeraCollection Research Services, LLC ("SeraCollection") on March 27, 2024 and supersedes any previous Supplemental Staffing Agreement. The Agreement has a term will need to be renewed on an annual basis.

Whereas Client desires to enter into this Agreement with SeraCollection to provide qualified Healthcare Professionals ("Staff") as needed on an ongoing temporary basis by Client.

Whereas no verbal agreement supersedes the terms of this Agreement

Therefore, the Client and SeraCollection hereby agree as follows:

- 3. Properly utilize any independent contracting personnel or subcontracted supplemental staffing agency and hold the aforementioned accountable to the same standards as SeraCollection Staff.

- 4. Provide worker's compensation, general liability insurance, unemployment insurance, as Staff are employees of SeraCollection and not to be construed as employees of the client.

- c. Client and SeraCollection agree to fully cooperate when situations arise that involve SeraCollection Staff
- d. Client acknowledges that Staff must be paid for any work at Client's facility regardless of the quality. All hours worked will be paid to Staff by SeraCollection and will be billed to client. FLSA regulations must be adhered to.

- 6. Send monthly invoices to Client for services provided. Invoices will be clear and concise and will include the Staff name, date worked, hours worked along with the hourly rates and the total. SeraCollection makes its best effort to create invoices based upon SeraCollection timesheets or a timekeeping app. Back ups of all timesheets are retained by SeraCollection and available for review upon request.
- 7. Allow client to utilize Client's own timekeeping methods to assist with early preparation of certain regulatory reporting. In no way will Client's records replace, negate or cause edit to SeraCollection's timesheets. However, should a discrepancy be suspected, SeraCollection will always use integrity when dealing with legitimate discrepant information.
- 8. Work with Client to discuss any perceived invoice errors. SeraCollection will swiftly investigate discrepancies and provide Client with an explanation if the discrepancy is verified, then the credit amount will be issued as a credit memo on the next invoice. SeraCollection will offer up to seven (7) c a l e n d a r days grace period for payment of invoices including errors that have been agreed upon.
- 9. Notify Client no later than two (2) hours prior to the beginning of a shift, if a Staff has cancelled a shift. SeraCollection will make every possible effort to replace any Staff who cancels a shift, whereas such a replacement will be qualified for the position.
- 10. Provide updated Rate Letters when bill rates or terms change by providing client with a thirty (30) days advance notice of such changes. SeraCollection performs ongoing due diligence of the healthcare staffing market rates, demands, shortages and competitors bill rates in order to remain premier and stable.
- 11. Provide updated Agreement as necessary due to changes in SeraCollection policies, procedures, terms, or changes in Federal and State regulations. Changes will be made as an addendum to this Agreement.
- 12. Immediately remove any Staff that Client deems incompetent. Upon removal, SeraCollection will use its best efforts to find a replacement for the removed Staff.
- 13. To the best of SeraCollection's ability, ensure Staff provide all services pursuant to this Agreement and ensure services are performed in compliance with all applicable Federal and State laws. Staff shall abide by prevailing professional standards governing Staff licenses and all Client policies and procedures.
- 14. Be responsible for all wages, compensation, taxes, and benefits owed to Staff.
- 15. Conduct an appropriate and effective screening of the Office of Inspector General of the Department of Health and Human Services List of Excluded Individuals, Systems for Award Management and Medi-Cal Suspended and Ineligible Provider List for each RN, LVN and CNA candidate. If SeraCollection becomes aware that any individual working at Client's facility under this agreement becomes excluded, suspended or otherwise ineligible to participate in the federal and state healthcare programs, SeraCollection will notify Client within 24 hours of receiving such notice.

### **Client Obligates To:**

- 1. Pay invoices in the following manner and according to the following terms and all other terms included in the Service Agreement and Agreed Rates.

This indemnification will survive the termination of this Agreement.

#### Modification

Any amendment or modification of this Agreement or additional obligation assumed by either Party in connection with this Agreement will only be binding if evidenced in writing signed by each Party or an authorized representative of each Party.

### **Termination**

Notwithstanding any other part of this Agreement, Agreement may be terminated at any time by either party for any reason, with or without cause, upon a thirty (30) day prior written notice. In the event of termination, this Agreement will continue to govern the parties' rights and obligations with respect to services performed prior to termination.

### Inurement

This Agreement may not be assigned by any of the parties without the written consent of other parties hereto. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the heirs, successors, administrators, and permitted assigs of the parties hereto.

### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to approve a contract renewal with Language Testing International for a one-year subscription for Assessment of Performance toward Proficiency in Language (AAPPL) for the 2024-25 school year. The subscription will provide Mandarin and Spanish language assessments for students enrolled in our dual immersion programs in grades three through eight.

### **Rationale:**

There is an interest among teachers and administrators in continuing the use of the AAPPL as a standardized language proficiency assessment for both Spanish and Mandarin dual immersion students. Use of the AAPPL this past school year has improved the quality and efficiency of student achievement data provided to teachers, students, families, and district leadership. The AAPPL has provided opportunities to make meaningful comparisons to state and national standards, has assisted in high school language course placement, and has served as a replacement for the California Spanish Assessment (CSA).

### **Background:**

The AAPPL is an assessment of standards-based language learning across the three modes of communication (interpersonal, presentational, and interpretive) as defined by the National Standards for Foreign Language Learning. It is the most widely used language assessment in the U.S. The four components of the test take approximately two hours to complete. We began using the AAPPL to assess our dual immersion students in the Spring of 2023.

## **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The AAPPL subscription cost is \$8,770.00 and will be funded from S&C accounts.

#### **Rationale:**

The previous subscription with Microsoft Enrollment for Education Solutions Agreement from Softchoice will expire on May 31, 2024. This is a one-year renewal subscription.

#### **Background:**

Monrovia Unified School District currently supports a wide variety of computer devices of varying ages and types. California Educational Technology Professionals Association (CITE) worked with Microsoft to put together the CAMSA (CITE and Microsoft Strategic Alliance) program, a strategic alliance program supported by Softchoice. This contract can serve as a master purchasing vehicle for K-12 educational institutions in the State of California. Offering significant discounts and simplifying the license purchase process, this consortium includes over 70% of California's Local Education Agencies (LEAs) who would not qualify for this pricing on their own. The Microsoft Enrollment or Education Solutions agreement is a piggyback contract with Simi Valley USD, Microsoft, and Softchoice Corporation to provide discounted pricing for Microsoft software. The agreement includes desktop management, anti-virus, server software, office software, operating system licensing, and Minecraft for students to code.

#### **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The cost of the services is determined by the count of knowledge worker staff members who use a computer as part of their job and the number of processors in our server hardware. The cost will be up to \$24,501.76. Departments, sites, and the Technology Services budget will provide funding.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to approve the 3-year renewal of Incident IQ, a specialized K-12 Helpdesk and asset management software.

#### **Rationale:**

Technology Services implemented and piloted Incident IQ during the 2023/2024 school year in an effort to improve efficiency in our department and deliver unparalleled service to our students and staff. Our schools can now utilize the software to effectively monitor and maintain the inventory of 1:1 devices checked out to students. In this one-year span, we have created reports within the system to assist our Media Center Technicians/Librarians with important tasks, such as identifying students who have multiple or no devices checked out. Incident IQ has also allowed Technology Services to monitor and maintain a high-quality level of services and response times to Helpdesk tickets.

#### **Background:**

Technology Services utilizes Incident IQ to integrate several existing systems, including Aeries, Google Workspace, and Microsoft, ensuring efficient support and maintenance of technology needs. Incident IQ helps Technology Services facilitate support requests generated by staff throughout the District. The asset management tool permits site staff to check out student and staff devices, generate reports based on device status, and monitor site tickets on a dashboard.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to renew the Clinical Practicum Agreement with California State University, Northridge, for a five-year term beginning April 18, 2024.

#### **Rationale:**

Board approval of this agreement would allow Monrovia Unified School District to participate in the clinical training of California State University, Northridge students in the field of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology.

#### **Background:**

The University operates a fully accredited program offering a Master of Science degree in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology. The graduate program's accreditation is under the standards of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and the Council on Academic Accreditation of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

#### CLINICAL PRACTICUM AGREEMENT

This Agreement is between Monrovia Unified School District ("Practicum Site") and The Trustees of the California State University on behalf of California State University, Northridge ("University"), and is effective as of April 18, 2024

- A. Clinical Site is a general acute care hospital, medical center, skilled nursing facility, private practice clinic or is an independent or unified school district.
- B. University operates a fully accredited program offering a Master of Science Degree in the field of Speech Language Pathology and a Clinical Doctorate Degree in the field of Audiology (AuD). The speech-language pathology graduate program is accredited under the standards of the Council on Academic Accreditation of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA). The audiology program has been granted "formal developing status" under the Accreditation Commission for Audiology Education (ACAE) accrediting body. CSUN is accredited by The Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).
- C. The purpose of this agreement is to provide the graduate training for the Master of Science in Communication Disorders and Sciences, the Speech Language Pathology Assistant Fieldwork Program, and/or the Clinical Doctorate degree in Audiology. The parties will both benefit by making a clinical training program ("Program") available to University students at the Clinical Site.

The parties agree as follows:

#### I. UNIVERSITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. <u>Student Application.</u> The student shall file an Application for Clinical Privileges. Pertinent information, which shall include the student's name, address, and telephone number, shall be sent to the clinical site. Clinical Site shall regard this information as confidential and shall use the information only to identify each student.
- B. <u>Schedule of Assignments</u>. University shall notify the clinical site supervisor of student assignment, including the name of the student, level of academic preparation, and length and dates of proposed clinical experience.
- C. <u>Department Faculty</u>. University shall assign members of the department's faculty or University's Clinical Director or University's Distance Learning Coordinator to provide professional mentoring and advice to the Clinical Site's Program Supervisor through the term of this agreement in order to assist in the education of the student.
- D. <u>Records</u>. University shall maintain all personnel records for its staff and all academic records for its students.

- E. <u>Student Responsibilities</u>. University shall notify students in the program that they are responsible for:
- 1) Complying with Clinical Site's clinical and administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations;
  - 2) Arranging for his/her own transportation and living arrangements;
- 3) Assuming responsibility for personal illnesses, necessary immunizations, tuberculin tests, annual health examinations and other requirements as identified by the Clinical Site;
- 4) Procuring and maintaining in force health insurance coverage throughout the term of the student's practica at the Clinical Site.
  - 5) Maintaining the confidentiality of patient information.
  - a) No student shall have access to or have the right to receive any medical record, except when necessary in the regular course of the clinical experience. The discussion, transmission, or narration in any form by students of any individually identifiable patient information, medical or otherwise, obtained in the course of the program is forbidden except as a necessary part of the practical experience.
  - b) Neither the University nor its employees or agents shall be granted access to individually identifiable information unless the patient has first given consent using a form approved by clinical site that complies with applicable state and federal law, including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act ("HIPAA") and its implementing regulations.
  - c) Clinical Site shall reasonably assist University in obtaining patient consent in appropriate circumstances. In the absence of consent, students shall use de-identified information only in any discussions about the clinical experience with University, its employees, or agents.
- 5) Complying with Clinical Site's dress code and wearing name badges identifying themselves as students.
  - 6) Insurance requirements. See Section 5, Paragraph B.
- F. Payroll Taxes and Withholdings. University shall be solely responsible for any payroll taxes, withholdings, and insurance or benefits of any kind for University's employees, if any, who provide services to the Program under this Agreement. Students are not employees or agents of the University and shall receive no compensation for their participation in the Program, from the University. For purposes of this agreement, however, students are trainees and shall be considered members of Clinical Site's "workforce" as that term is defined by the HIPAA regulations at 45 C.F.R. § 160.103.

#### II. CLINICAL SITE RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. <u>Clinical Experience</u>. Clinical Site shall accept from University the student and shall provide the student with supervised clinical experience, meeting the ASHA/ACAE requirement and any state licensure laws, as applicable.
- B. <u>Records and Evaluations</u>. Clinical Site shall maintain complete records and reports on student's performance and provide an evaluation to University on forms the University shall provide.
- C. <u>Withdrawal of Students</u>. Clinical Site may request that University withdraw from the program any student whom Clinical Site determines is not performing satisfactorily, refuses to follow Clinical Site's administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations, or violates any federal or state laws. Such requests must be in writing. Once the University receives the request in writing, the University will take appropriate steps to comply.
- D. <u>Emergency Health Care/First Aid</u>. Clinical Site shall, on any day when a student is receiving training at its facilities, provide to that student necessary emergency health care or first aid for accidents occurring in its facilities. Except as otherwise provided in this agreement, Clinical Site shall have no obligation to furnish medical or surgical care to any student.
- E. <u>Clinical Site's Confidentiality Policies</u>. As trainees, students shall be considered members of Clinical Site's "workforce," as that term is defined by the HIPAA regulations at 45 C.F.R. § 160.103, and shall be subject to Clinical Site's policies respecting confidentiality of medical information. In order to ensure that students comply with such policies, Clinical Site shall provide students with substantially the same training that it provides to its regular employees.
- F. <u>Clinical Supervisor Requirements</u>. Clinical Site shall provide the Clinical Supervisor with sufficient and specific time in the work schedule to carry out the supervision duties of the student's clinical practicum. The supervision duties fulfill the requirements of the accreditation of the graduate program so that the student will meet requirements for state license, and certification. The minimum requirements for these duties include:
  - 1) Allocation of sufficient time to directly observe a minimum of twenty five (25) percent of treatment and assessment sessions of a client or groups of clients by the student during the supervised practicum.
  - 2) Allocation of sufficient time to meet directly with the student for purposes of supervision feedback and discussion periodically during the course of supervision.
  - 3) Allocation of sufficient time for the Clinical Site Supervisor to communicate with the University's Clinical Coordinator or Clinical Course Instructor.
  - 4) Allocation of specific time in order to be present at the clinical site during the period that the student will be providing clinical services under this agreement.

#### III. AFFIRMATIVE ACTION AND NON-DISCRIMINATION

The parties agree that all students receiving clinical training pursuant to this Agreement shall be selected without discrimination on account of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, disability, marital status, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, age or veteran status.

#### IV. STATUS OF UNIVERSITY AND CLINICAL SITE

The parties expressly understand and agree that the students enrolled in the Program are in attendance for educational purposes, and such students are not considered employees of University for any purpose, including, but not limited to, compensation for services, welfare and pension benefits, or workers' compensation insurance. Students are considered members of Clinical Site's "workforce" for purposes of HIPAA compliance.

#### V. INSURANCE

- A. <u>University Insurance</u>. University shall procure and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement, at its sole cost and expense, insurance in amounts reasonably necessary to protect it against liability arising from any and all negligent acts or incidents caused by University's employees. Coverage under such professional and commercial general liability insurance shall be not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for each occurrence and four million dollars (\$4,000,000) in the aggregate. Such coverage shall be obtained from a carrier rated A or better by AM Best or a qualified program of self-insurance. The University shall maintain and provide evidence of workers' compensation and disability coverage as required by law. Insurance shall provide for not less than thirty (30) days' notice of cancellation to Clinical Site. University shall provide Clinical Site with evidence of the insurance required under this paragraph upon request of the Clinical Site. University shall promptly notify Clinical Site of any cancellation, reduction, or other material change in the amount or scope of any coverage required hereunder.
- B. <u>Student Insurance</u>. School shall require that during the term of each student's clinical rotation, each student shall be covered by comprehensive general and professional liability insurance to protect the student, Facility and University against liability arising from any and all negligent acts or incidents caused by the student. Coverage under such insurance shall be with limits not less than \$1 million each claim, \$3 million policy aggregate, on a claim made basis including three (3) years extended reporting period.
- C. <u>Clinical Site Insurance</u>. Clinical Site shall procure and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement, at its sole cost and expense, insurance in amounts that are reasonably necessary to protect it against liability arising from any and all negligent acts or incidents caused by its employees. Coverage under such professional and commercial general liability insurance shall be not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for each occurrence and four million dollars (\$4,000,000) in the aggregate. Such coverage is to be obtained from a carrier rated A or better by AM Best or a qualified program of self-insurance. Clinical Site shall also maintain and provide evidence of workers' compensation and disability coverage for its employees as Page 4 of 7

required by law. Insurance shall provide for not less than thirty (30) days' notice of cancellation to University. Clinical Site shall provide University with evidence of the insurance required under this paragraph upon request of the University. Clinical Site shall promptly notify University of any cancellation, reduction, or other material change in the amount or scope of any coverage required hereunder.

#### VI. INDEMNIFICATION.

- A. University agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless Clinical Site and its affiliates, directors, trustees, officers, agents, and employees, against all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses of whatever nature, including court costs and reasonable attorney fees, arising out of or resulting from University's sole negligence, or in proportion to the University's comparative fault.
- B. Clinical Site agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless University and its affiliates, directors, trustees, officers, agents, and employees, against all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses of whatever nature, including court costs and reasonable attorney fees, arising out of or resulting from Clinical Site's sole negligence, or in proportion to the Clinical Site's comparative fault.

#### VII. TERM AND TERMINATION

- A. <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall be effective as of the date first written above and shall remain in effect for five (5) years.
  - B. <u>Renewal</u>. This Agreement may be renewed by mutual agreement.
- C. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by the written agreement or upon 30 days' advance written notice by one party to the other, PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that in no event shall termination take effect with respect to currently enrolled students, who shall be permitted to complete their training for any cohort in which termination would otherwise occur.

#### VIII. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. Amendments. In order to ensure compliance with HIPAA, the following provisions of this Agreement shall not be subject to amendment by any means during the term of this Agreement or any extensions: Section I, Paragraph E, subdivisions 5.a), 5.b), and 5.c); Section I, Paragraph F, to the extent it provides that students are members of Practicum Site's "workforce" for purposes of HIPAA; Section II, Paragraph E; and Section IV. This Agreement may otherwise be amended at any time by mutual agreement of the parties without additional consideration, provided that before any amendment shall take effect, it shall be reduced to writing and signed by the parties.
- B. <u>Assignment</u>. Neither party shall voluntarily or by operation of law, assign or otherwise transfer this Agreement without the other party's prior written consent. Any purported assignment in violation of this paragraph shall be void.

- C. <u>Attorney's Fees.</u> In the event that any action is brought by either party to enforce or interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its costs and reasonable attorney's fees, in addition to such other relief as the court may deem appropriate.
- D. <u>Captions</u>. Captions and headings in this Agreement are solely for the convenience of the parties, are not a part of this Agreement, and shall not be used to interpret or determine the validity of this Agreement or any of its provisions.
- E. <u>Counterparts</u>. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all such counterparts together shall constitute one and the same instrument.
- F. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement is the entire agreement between the parties. No other agreements, oral or written, have been entered into with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.
- G. <u>Governing Law</u>. The validity, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- H. <u>Notices</u>. Notices required under this Agreement shall be sent to the parties by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid, at the addresses set forth below.
- I. Clinical Site is aware of and informed about the hazards currently known to be associated with the novel coronavirus referred to as "COVID-19". Clinical Site is familiar with and informed about the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) current guidelines regarding COVID-19 as well as applicable federal, state and local governmental directives regarding COVID-19. Clinical Site, to the best of its knowledge and belief, is in compliance with those current CDC guidelines and applicable governmental directives. If the current CDC guidelines or applicable government directives are modified, changed or updated, Clinical Site will take steps to comply with the modified, changed or updated guidelines or directives. If at any time Clinical Site becomes aware that it is not in compliance with CDC guidelines or an applicable governmental directive, it will notify the Communication Disorders and Sciences Program of that fact.

# 10. 23/24-3061 - RENEWAL OF STUDENT TEACHING AGREEMENTS WITH CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FRESNO

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to approve the renewal of the agreements between Monrovia Unified School District and California State University, Fresno, commencing April 18, 2024, through March 31, 2027.

#### **Rationale:**

Board approval of the Student Teaching Agreements will allow Monrovia Unified School District to participate in the training of student teachers from California State University, Fresno, and will allow placement of intern student candidates in the classroom.

#### **Background:**

Approval of these agreements will give the District the benefits of having student teachers in the classroom while assisting in the preparation of future teachers from April 18, 2024, to March 31, 2027. Internship programs allow individuals to complete their preparation coursework concurrent with their first year or two in a paid teaching position. These programs are led by colleges, universities, and school districts.

#### California State University's CalStateTEACH Program

#### Memorandum of Understanding and Agreement For the Employment of University Students Who Have an Intern Credential

This agreement is between the Monrovia Unified School District ("District") and the California State University's CalStateTEACH Program ("University"), who may be referred to collectively as the parties. This Agreement describes and confirms the expectations and responsibilities of the Parties regarding the Internship Program through which University students who hold an intern credential from the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing ("Paid Interns") will gain experience in the public school setting. This agreement does not apply to unpaid service learning placements that are part of a credentialing program.

#### RECITALS

CalStateTEACH operates a program for the education and training of candidates pursuing a California Preliminary Multiple Subject Teaching Credential with English Learner Authorization (ELA) and is accredited by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) with approval to offer intern options in these programs.

The District is authorized under Education Code 44320 et seq., to cooperate with institutions of higher education in providing training and experience to credential candidates who hold an intern credential ("Paid Intern").

One or more District employees who are credentialed, experienced faculty members at a District high school, middle school, or elementary school have agreed to be responsible for a class or classes assigned to a credential candidate, and may be referred to below as mentor teachers.

University employs one or more experienced credentialed teachers, administrators, or faculty who have agreed to provide direct classroom supervision and support to credential candidates and mentor teachers. Such individuals may be referred to below as university supervisors.

#### TERM OF THE AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall remain in effect for a term of 3 years beginning April 18, 2024 and ending March 31, 2027 unless terminated sooner. Either party may terminate this Agreement on 30 days' written notice to the other party; provided, however, that credential candidates shall be allowed to conclude any ongoing assignments. Performance under this Agreement shall be reviewed annually, and the parties may agree to annual extensions after expiration of the initial term.

CTC REQUIREMENTS FOR SUPPORT AND SUPERVISION OF INTERN TEACHERS

In 2013, the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) adopted policies that specify the number of hours of general support and supervision, as well as additional specific English learner support and supervision, which must be provided to Paid Interns. The regulations

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(California Education Code §44321; 5 Cal. Code Reg. § 80033) were approved and made part of law effective 2014.

Under the newly approved regulations, the University and District must ensure:

- A minimum of 144 hours per year (72 hours per semester) of support/mentoring and supervision must be provided to each Paid Intern including coaching, modeling, and demonstrating within the classroom, assistance with course planning and problemsolving regarding students, curriculum, and development of effective teaching methodologies.
- A minimum of two hours of support/mentoring and supervision must be provided to an intern teacher every five instructional days.
- The District must identify a mentor or other designated individual who meets the Commission's specified criteria prior to a Paid Intern assuming daily teaching responsibilities.
- An additional 45 hours per year (23 hours per semester) of support/mentoring and supervision specific to meeting the needs of English learners is required for a Paid Intern who enters the program without a valid English learner authorization listed on a previously issued Multiple Subject, Single Subject, or Education Specialist Teaching Credential or a valid English Learner Authorization or Crosscultural, Language and Academic Development (CLAD) Certificate. The additional hours of support can be provided by the credential program and/or the district employed mentor. The individual(s)providing this support must hold a valid California Teaching Credential with a valid English Learner Authorization or Crosscultural Language and Academic Development (CLAD) Certificate.

#### DISTRICT AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Prior to the Paid Intern's first day as teacher of record, provide each Paid Intern with a certified, experienced district-employed mentor/liaison who will work collaboratively with the University Supervisor to support the Paid Intern in achieving competency in the Teaching Performance Expectations. District will provide documentation of appropriate credentialing of district-employed supervisor as needed.
- 2. Identify a District-employed supervisor who serves as an evaluator for the Paid Intern.
- 3. Provide new teacher orientation, on-going support and other clinical/professional experiences for Paid Interns teaching in the District's schools under the supervision of a district-employed mentor/liaison.
- 4. Provide release time for participation in district group/regional group meetings and professional development activities including time to observe other exemplar teachers teaching in their classrooms.
- 5. District will immediately notify University if the District has knowledge of or suspects any professional or ethical violations by a Paid Intern. University will cooperate with District in any investigation concerning the reported violation.
- 6. District will instruct intern in school policies regarding child abuse reporting, sexual harassment and professional conduct.
- 7. The District is aware of and informed about the hazards currently known to be associated with the novel coronavirus referred to as "COVID-19". The District is familiar with and informed about the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) current guidelines regarding COVID-19 as well as applicable federal, state and local governmental directives CalStateTEACH MOU and Agreement to Provide University Intern Placements 08/16





regarding COVID-19. The District to the best of its knowledge and belief, is in compliance with those current CDC guidelines and applicable governmental directives. If the current CDC guidelines or applicable governmental directives are modified, changed or updated, the District will take the steps to comply with the modified, changed, or updated guidelines or directives. If at any time the District becomes aware that it is not in compliance with CDC guidelines or an applicable governmental directive, it will notify Dr. Nan Barker (Regional Director).

#### **UNIVERSITY DUTIES**

- 1. University will work collaboratively with the District's HR department, school site administration, and staff in the assignment of the intern.
- 2. University will guarantee that Paid Interns have met California Commission for Teacher Credentialing (CTC) requirements for an intern credential (Certificate of Clearance, CBEST, subject matter competence, negative tuberculosis test, U.S. Constitution) and University requirements (satisfactory completion of course work that meets the CTC preservice requirement, a copy of the district offer of employment) prior to recommending the candidate for an intern credential.
- 3. University will confer regularly with District and site administration and districtemployed mentor/liaison through meetings, telephone calls, and/or e-mail.
- 4. University will immediately notify appropriate District and site administration if University administration has knowledge of or suspects any professional or ethical violations by a Paid Intern in the school. District will cooperate with University in any investigation concerning the reported violation.
- 5. University will guarantee that the Paid Intern and university supervisors have appropriate TB and fingerprinting clearance.
- 6. University will instruct Paid Interns in state laws regarding child abuse reporting, sexual harassment and professional conduct.
- 7. University supervisors will conduct systematic and regular observations of Paid Interns' performances in the District's classrooms.
- 8. University supervisors will confer regularly with district-employed mentor/liaison and with the site administration through meetings, telephone calls, and/or e-mail.

# UNIVERSITY SUPERVISOR AND DISTRICT-EMPLOYED MENTOR/LIAISON RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Collaborate to ensure that the Paid Intern receives <u>a minimum of two hours of support/mentoring and supervision every five instructional days</u>.
- 2. Collaborate to ensure that the Paid Intern receives specific support and supervision in addressing the needs of English Language Learners.
- 3. Use the list of activities that satisfy CTC support and supervision requirements to assist the Paid Intern in identifying and participating in a broad range of experiences to support his/her growth as a teacher.
- 4. Assist the Paid Intern in creating networks with faculty, staff, and administrators who can provide additional support.

#### PAID INTERN RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Document required hours weekly using the electronic log.
- 2. Have the electronic log verified by both the University Supervisor and District-employed





mentor/liaison to ensure that he/she is receiving the required support/mentoring and supervision.

#### DISTRICT DISCRETION

It is at the sole discretion of the District to hire a University candidate for a Paid Intern position and to terminate the assignment in accordance with District policies and procedures. The District will notify the University of any Review that could result in termination. The University will notify the CTC to withdraw the intern credential of a Paid Intern who is terminated by the District

# LIABILITY INSURANCE & WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The University shall take out and maintain a "claims-made" policy of general liability and professional liability insurance (including personal injury with limits not less than \$1 million per loss and damage to property of others up to \$5,000 per incident), with extended reporting period of three (3) years, covering Student Teachers, and naming District as an additional named insured under such insurance policy or policies. Further, University agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance, with no exclusion for molestation or abuse, at a minimum of Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence and Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement.

Further, University shall provide written notice that should any of the above described policies be cancelled before the expiration thereof, notice will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions. University also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on Student Teachers, any individuals characterized as employees of University and instructors working at District pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement.

University shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this Section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis. If the coverage is on a claims-made basis, University hereby agrees that not less than thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination of University's current insurance coverage or termination of this Agreement, University shall either purchase three (3) year tail coverage per claim or provide proof of continuous coverage in the above stated amounts for all claims arising out of incidents occurring prior to termination of University's current coverage or prior to termination of this Agreement, as applicable, and provide District a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.

The University is permissibly self-insured through the State of California for automobile liability.

The District shall maintain automobile liability, general liability, workers' compensation and errors and omissions liability coverages for themselves and their respective employees. Errors or omissions liability coverage shall include coverage for negligence relating to alleged sexual misconduct and shall be on an occurrence basis. Automobile liability coverage must apply to owned, non-owned and hired automobiles. The required coverage may be provided by way of adequately documented individual or pooled self-insurance.





The District shall be named as an additional insured or covered party on the liability coverages maintained by the University, and such coverages shall be primary to any coverages maintained by the District. Limits of liability for each type of liability coverage shall be at least \$1 million per claim per occurrence/\$2 million aggregate.

District shall maintain workers' compensation coverage applicable to its employees, including Paid Interns.

#### **INDEMNIFICATION**


University shall defend, indemnify and hold District and its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement, but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of University, its officials, agents, or employees.

District shall defend, indemnify and hold University, its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damage arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of District, its officials, agents, or employees.

#### ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

- 1. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed to create a joint venture, partnership, principal-agent or employment relationship between the parties and neither party shall have the authority to bind the other party for any purpose.
- 2. This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be governed and construed by the laws of the State of California. Any lawsuit concerning or arising out of this Agreement shall be venued in the county in which the District is located.
- 3. This Agreement supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings between the parties, both oral and written, with respect to its subject matter and constitutes the complete agreement and understanding between the parties, unless modified in a writing executed by both parties.
- 4. In the event of a dispute between the parties arising from this Agreement, the parties agree to mediate the dispute before initiating litigation. The Parties agree that with regard to any dispute or claim related to this Agreement, prior to the initiation of a lawsuit or other legal action, they shall and must, in good faith, submit the claim or dispute to mediation with any mutually agreeable neutral. The costs of the neutral will be split equally between the Parties. The prevailing party shall be entitled to recovery from the losing party the prevailing party's reasonable expenses (fees and costs) incurred in the lawsuit or legal action as allowed by law.
- 5. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable, that provision shall be amended to achieve as nearly as possible the same effect as the original provision, and the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 6. No delay or failure by either party to act in the event of a breach or default hereunder shall be construed as a waiver of that or any succeeding breach or a waiver of the provision itself.





7. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original as against any party whose signature appears and all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument

# Memorandum of Understanding and Agreement to Provide Student Teacher Placements to University Students

This agreement is between the Monrovia Unified School District ("District") and the California State University's CalState TEACH Program ("University"), who may be referred to collectively as the parties. This Agreement describes and confirms the expectations and responsibilities of the Parties regarding the Student Teaching Program through which University students enrolled in a credentialing program ("Student Teachers") will gain experience in the public school setting.

# TERM OF THE AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall remain in effect for a term of 3 years beginning April 18, 2024 and ending March 31, 2027 unless terminated sooner. Either party may terminate this Agreement on 30 days' written notice to the other party; provided, however, that credential candidates shall be allowed to conclude any ongoing assignments. Performance under this Agreement shall be reviewed annually, and the parties may agree to annual extensions after expiration of the initial term.

# DISTRICT AND SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. The District will provide the Student Teachers with supervised clinical experience. The District's Designated Supervisor(s) will hold an appropriate degree, credential or license in the specified field, if any is required for that field, and at least five years' experience in that field. The Supervisor will provide the Student Teacher with at least two hours of face-to-face supervision per week for the duration of the student teacher placement. Supervision may be shared among more than one qualified District staff member.
- 2. The District will designate a member of its staff to participate with the University's designee in planning, implementing, and coordinating the Student Teaching Program.
- 3. The District will maintain complete records and reports on each Student Teacher's performance and provide an evaluation to the University on forms the University shall provide.
- 4. The District may, in its sole discretion, refuse to accept as a participant in the Student Teaching Program any University student assigned to participate, and, upon request of the District, University shall withdraw the assignment of any University student participant.
- 5. After the District accepts the assignment of a Student Teacher, the District may terminate the student teaching placement for "good cause." "Good cause" may include, but is not limited to failure to perform satisfactorily, refusal to follow District administrative policies, procedures, rules and regulations, or violation of any federal or state law. The District will immediately notify University in writing if it terminates an assignment. The District reserves the right to ban anyone from District facilities when the District finds, in its sole discretion that the presence of the person poses a threat or disrupts operations. University is responsible for informing its student participants of the provisions of this Section. District will immediately notify University, if District knows or suspects any professional or ethical or legal violations. University will cooperate with District in any

investigation concerning the reported violation.

- 6. District shall, on any day when a Student Teacher is receiving training at its facilities, arrange for the Student Teacher to receive any necessary emergency health care or first aid for accidents uuurring in its facilities. Except as provided in this paragraph, District shall have no obligation to furnish medical care, surgical care or other health care to any Student Teacher.

If at any time the District becomes aware that it is not in compliance with CDC guidelines or an applicable governmental directive, it will notify Dr. Nan Barker (Regional Director).

#### UNIVERSITY RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. University will work collaboratively with the District's HR department, school site administration, and staff in the assignment of the Student Teacher.
- 2. University will confer regularly with District and site administration and district-employed mentor/liaison through meetings, telephone calls, and/or e-mail.
- 3. University will immediately notify appropriate District and site administration if University administration has knowledge of or suspects any professional or ethical violations by a Student Teacher in the school. University and District agree they will cooperate in any investigation concerning the reported violation.
- 4. University will guarantee that Student Teachers and university supervisors have appropriate tuberculosis and fingerprinting clearance, including subsequent arrest notification service.
- 5. University will instruct Student Teachers in state laws regarding child abuse reporting, sexual harassment and professional conduct.
- 6. University supervisors will conduct systematic and regular observations of Student Teachers' performances in the District's classrooms.
- 7. University will be responsible for ensuring that Student Teachers have appropriate insurance coverage.

# STUDENT TEACHER RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Provide the District with the following documentation:
  - a. a copy of the letter from the University assigning the student to the District.
  - b. a background check fingerprint clearance report.
  - c. a negative tuberculosis test result, and
- 2. Comply with all applicable terms and provisions of this Agreement while serving as a Student Teacher.
- 3. Comply with the District's policies and procedures, and applicable state and federal laws





**Distinguished Program** 

- and regulations while serving as a Student Teacher.
- 4. Provide services to District pupils only under the direct supervision of District staff.
- 5. Maintain the confidentiality of pupil information. No Student Teacher will have access to or have the right to receive any District pupil records, except to the extent necessary in the regular course of assisting in providing services to pupils as part of the student teacher program. The discussion, transmission, or narration in any form by Student Teachers of any individually identifiable pupil information, educational, medical or otherwise, which is obtained in the course of the student teacher program is forbidden except as a necessary part of the practical student teacher experience. Otherwise, Student Teachers shall use de-identified information only (and not personally identifiable pupil information) in any discussions about the student teacher experience with University, its employees, agents or others.

#### STATUS OF DISTRICT AND UNIVERSITY STUDENTS

The parties expressly understand and agree that all University students serving as Student Teachers in District schools pursuant to this Agreement are doing so for educational purposes only, and Student Teachers are not considered employees of the District for any purpose, including, but not limited to, compensation for services, welfare and pension benefits, or workers' compensation insurance. It is the responsibility of University to provide notice to its student participants of the provisions of this Section. The provisions of this Section shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

#### LIABILITY INSURANCE & WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The University shall take out and maintain a "claims-made" policy of general liability and professional liability insurance (including personal injury with limits not less than \$1 million per loss and damage to property of others up to \$5,000 per incident), with extended reporting period of three (3) years, covering Student Teachers, and naming District as an additional named insured under such insurance policy or policies. Further, University agrees to maintain professional and comprehensive general liability insurance, with no exclusion for molestation or abuse, at a minimum of Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence and Twenty-Five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in aggregate throughout the course of this Agreement.

Further, University shall provide written notice that should any of the above described policies be cancelled before the expiration thereof, notice will be delivered in accordance with the policy provisions. University also agrees to maintain statutory Workers' Compensation coverage on Student Teachers, any individuals characterized as employees of University and instructors working at District pursuant to this Agreement at all times during the course of this Agreement.

University shall provide certificates evidencing all coverage referred to in this Section within thirty (30) days of execution of this Agreement and thereafter, on an annual basis. If the coverage is on a claims-made basis, University hereby agrees that not less than thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of termination of University's current insurance coverage or termination of this Agreement, University shall either purchase three (3) year tail coverage per claim or provide proof of continuous coverage in the above stated amounts for all claims arising out of incidents occurring prior to termination of University's current coverage or prior to termination of this Agreement, as applicable, and provide District a certificate of insurance evidencing such coverage.





The University is permissibly self-insured through the State of California for automobile liability.

The District shall be named as an additional insured or covered party on the liability coverages maintained by the University set forth above, and such coverages shall be primary to any coverages maintained by the District. Limits of liability for each type of liability coverage shall be at least \$1 million per claim per occurrence/ \$2 million aggregate.

#### NO WORKERS' COMPENSATION LIABILITY

The Parties agree that the District is not to assume, nor shall it assume by this Agreement any liability under the California Workers' Compensation Insurance and Safety Act for, by or on behalf of any Student Teacher or University employees while they are on the premises of the District or while performing any duty whatsoever under the terms of the Agreement or while going to or from any of the student teacher placement sites. University shall provide written notice to each Student Teacher regarding the lack of coverage of Workers' Compensation insurance by the District.

#### **INDEMNIFICATION**

University shall defend, indemnify and hold District and its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement, but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of University, its officials, agents, or employees.

District shall defend, indemnify and hold University, its officials, employees and agents, harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damage arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of District, its officials, agents, or employees.

#### ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

- 1. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be deemed or construed to create a joint venture, partnership, principal-agent or employment relationship between the parties and neither party shall have the authority to bind the other party for any purpose.
- 2. This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be governed and construed by the laws of the State of California. Any lawsuit concerning or arising out of this Agreement shall be venued in the county in which the District is located.
- 3. This Agreement supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings between the parties, both oral and written, with respect to its subject matter and constitutes the complete agreement and understanding between the parties, unless modified in a writing executed by both parties.
- 4. In the event of a dispute between the parties arising from this Agreement, the parties agree to mediate the dispute before initiating litigation. The Parties agree that with regard to any dispute or claim related to this Agreement, prior to the initiation of a lawsuit or other legal action, they shall and must, in good faith, submit the claim or dispute to mediation with any mutually agreeable neutral. The costs of the neutral will be split equally between the Parties. The prevailing party shall be entitled to recovery from the losing party the





- prevailing party's reasonable expenses (fees and costs) incurred in the lawsuit or legal action as allowed by law.
- 5. If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable, that provision shall be amended to achieve as nearly as possible the same effect as the original provision, and the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 6. No delay or failure by either party to act in the event of a breach or default hereunder shall be construed as a waiver of that or any succeeding breach or a waiver of the provision itself.
- 7. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original as against any party whose signature appears and all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

The Board of Education is requested to approve a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the District, the City of Monrovia, and Centre Stage Productions, for the organization and production of the upcoming 2024 Monrovia Days Parade & Festival on May 16-19, 2024.

# **Rationale:**

This year's Monrovia Days Library Park Parade & Festival will take place on May 16-19, 2024. The attached MOA between the three parties (City of Monrovia, Monrovia USD & Centre Stage) is intended to structure the collaboration that equitably divides the work necessary to produce the Monrovia Days event. The MOA details the contributions expected of each party towards the production, organization, and finances of the Monrovia Days event.

# **Background:**

The Monrovia Days Library Park Parade & Festival was created to be a celebration of the birthday of the City of Monrovia, the outstanding spirit of the the Monrovia community, the excellence of Monrovia public schools, and the importance of the Performing Arts in Monrovia.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The District's financial contribution for this MOA is \$15,000, to be paid from general funds.

#### **MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT**

BETWEEN THE CITY OF MONROVIA ("City"), THE MONROVIA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ("MUSD"), AND CENTRE STAGE INC. ("CSI"), FOR THE 2024 MONROVIA DAYS PROGRAM

This Memorandum of Agreement ("MOA") is entered into as of April 16, 2024, by and between the City of Monrovia ("City"), the Monrovia Unified School District ("District"), and Centre Stage, Inc. ("CSI"), (City, District, and CSI are referred to collectively herein as "Parties" or individually as a "Party") for the organization and production of the 2024 Monrovia Days Event.

#### **RECITALS**

Whereas, Monrovia Days is traditionally a celebration of the birthday of the City of Monrovia, the outstanding spirit of community, the excellence of Monrovia public schools ("Celebrating our Scholars and Champions"), and the importance of the Performing Arts in Monrovia; and

Whereas, all Parties agree to host an event that focuses on the local Monrovia community; and

Whereas, all Parties agree to develop an event that is low-cost and accessible for all Monrovians; and

Whereas, all Parties agree to operate openly with complete transparency; and

Whereas, in recent years, the organization and production of Monrovia Days has been a collaborative effort between the Parties; and

Whereas, in executing this MOA, the Parties intend to structure their collaboration in a way that equitably divides the work necessary to produce Monrovia Days in 2024.

#### **AGREEMENT**

#### 1. Event.

Monrovia Days 2024 shall take place May 16-19, 2024. The event shall include live entertainment, a carnival, game booths, and a parade in Old Town Monrovia, as well as other ancillary events as determined by the Steering Committee.

**2. Term.** The Term of this MOA shall be from April 16, 2024, through the date the Steering Committee completes the Final Review and Accounting specified in Section 8. At the end of a Term of the MOA, the Parties may mutually and unanimously agree to extend the Term of this MOA for an additional year.

#### 3. Structure.

The Steering Committee for Monrovia Days shall include the following:

- City of Monrovia City Council Representative
- Monrovia Unified School District Board Representative
- · City of Monrovia City Manager
- Monrovia Unified School District Superintendent
- Monrovia Unified School District Deputy Superintendent
- Monrovia Unified School District Performing Arts Director
- City of Monrovia Community Services Director
- Centre Stage Director

The Steering Committee shall provide general oversight over the event and facilitate the work of the Parties to carry out each Party's responsibilities as specified in this MOA. Steering Committee Members shall attempt to reach consensus on Steering Committee decisions, but a simple majority vote of the Committee Members shall be sufficient to - adopt Steering Committee decisions. Each Party may assign appropriate staff members to assist the Steering Committee with its work.

# 3. City's Obligations.

During the term of this MOA City shall:

- a. Plan, supervise, provide staffing for, permit, and execute Monrovia Days events that occur on City property including, without limitation, all events in Library Park and throughout Old Town. The Parties may mutually agree that a Party other than the City will take charge of individual events or tasks.
  - b. Make appropriate City property reasonably available for Monrovia Days events.
- c. Provide cash accounting and management for all cash revenues derived from Monrovia Days. City shall create a separately accounted for fund into which all Monrovia Days revenue shall be deposited. City shall maintain cash accounting records that comply with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, and shall make all such records reasonably available to the Parties upon request, and to the Members of the Steering Committee at Committee meetings.
- d. Obtain all necessary permits, licenses, health permits, and street closures necessary to stage all Monrovia Days events.
- e. Provide police and fire protection and additional event security, as deemed necessary at the sole discretion of City's Police and Fire Chiefs, respectively.
- f. Secure sponsorships from community stakeholders to offset the cost of the overall event.
- g. Maintain complete and accurate financial records of all of City's expenditures and costs (both cash and in-kind) relating to Monrovia Days, with the exception of all costs associated with the participation of City-related groups and individuals in the Monrovia Days events, which shall be borne solely by City. The expenditure records shall be made available to the other Parties upon reasonable request, and to the Members of the Steering Committee at Committee meetings.
  - h. Publicize Monrovia Days through City communications and social media.
  - i. Participate in meetings of the Steering Committee.

# 4. District's Obligations.

During the term of this MOA District shall:

- a. Organize and facilitate the participation of District-related groups and individuals, as appropriate.
  - b. Publicize Monrovia Days through District communications and social media.
  - c. Organize the participation from all MUSD Schools.

- d. Organize the participation from various MUSD Performing groups to perform on stage during the three-day festival.
- e. Contribute \$15,000 payable to the City of Monrovia for the cost of the overall event to be paid to the City by May 15, 2024.
- f. Maintain complete and accurate financial records of all of District's expenditures and costs (both cash and in-kind) relating to Monrovia Days, with the exception of all costs associated with the participation of District-related groups and individuals in the Monrovia Days Parade and other events, which shall be borne solely by District. The expenditure records shall be made available to the other Parties upon reasonable request and to the Members of the Steering Committee at Committee meetings.
  - g. Participate in meetings of the Steering Committee.

#### 5. CSI's (Centre Stage Inc.) Obligations.

During the term of this MOA, CSI shall:

- a. Organize and facilitate the production of live stage entertainment featuring a variety of individuals and groups in Library Park throughout Monrovia Days, and performances by CSI related groups.
- b. Publicize Monrovia Days through CSI communications and social media. As well as update and maintain the Monrovia Days website and Instagram.
- c. Organize and operate up to one concession stand selling various carnival-style food, including, but not limited to nachos, pretzels, churros, chips, and drinks (soda and water). All revenue may be held with CSI; however, a report on the total revenue will be included as a part of the Final Accounting.
- d. Maintain complete and accurate financial records of all of CSI's expenditures and costs (both cash and in-kind) relating to Monrovia Days students and families with the exception of all costs associated with the participation of CSI groups and individuals in the Monrovia Days events, which shall be borne solely by CSI. The expenditure records shall be made available to the other Parties upon reasonable request and to the Members of the Steering Committee at Committee meetings.
  - e. Organize and operate a beer garden selling beer for a fee where all revenue is held by CSI; however, a report on the total revenue will be included as a part of the Final Accounting.
  - f. Participate in meetings of the Steering Committee.

# 6. Mutual Obligations.

During the term of this MOA each Party shall:

- a. Be solely responsible for, indemnify, and hold every other Party harmless against any claim, damage, or liability arising from the Party's participation in this MOA and the Monrovia Days event, including, without limitation, the participation of the Party's employees and/or volunteers.
- b. Comply with all applicable laws, including, without limitation, the terms of any permit or license issued by any governmental entity for the Monrovia Days events.
- c. Maintain in full effect and at the Party's sole cost such policy or policies of insurance as the Party deems reasonably necessary to insure its activities hereunder including,

without limitation, workers' compensation insurance with policy limits at least the minimum required by applicable law.

- d. Not incur any cost or liability on behalf of another Party without that Party's advance written consent.
- e. Provide the services of such staff members as the Party deems necessary to carry out its obligations under this Agreement. The reasonable and proportional costs of each staff member shall be considered a cost or expenditure of the paying Party.

#### 7. Finances.

Each Party shall fully fund the costs of that Party's participation in the Monrovia Days activities, and the tasks assigned to that Party by the Steering Committee or pursuant to this MOA. Each Party shall maintain complete records of its expenditures and revenues pursuant to this MOA and shall, not later than June 15, 2022, provide a complete copy of its expenditure and revenue records to the Steering Committee for the preparation of a Final Review and Accounting of the event.

#### 8. Final Review and Accounting.

Within thirty (30) calendar days following the receipt of each Party's records of Monrovia Days expenditures and revenues, City's Director of Finance shall provide the Steering Committee and each Party with a Final Review and Accounting of Monrovia Days revenues and expenditures. If such Final Review and Accounting indicates that total revenues exceeded total expenditures, the Parties shall be reimbursed for their expenditures on a *pro rata* basis equivalent to the percentage of total costs and expenditures for Monrovia Days that party incurred. As an illustration, if the Parties paid 50%, 30% and 20%, respectively, of Monrovia Days costs and expenditures, each Party would receive the corresponding percentage of remaining revenue reimbursement available based on the Final Review and Accounting. If there is a surplus of revenue remaining after each Party has been reimbursed for its costs and expenditures, the Steering Committee shall meet and determine the disposition of that remaining revenue.

#### 9. Miscellaneous Provisions.

- a. This MOA represents the fully integrated and complete agreement between the Parties as to its subject. No other agreement, promise, practice or amendment to this MOA shall be valid and binding unless memorialized in writing and executed by each of the Parties.
- b. Each of the Parties hereto warrants and represents that the individual who executes this MOA on behalf of the Party is duly-authorized to do so, and that the other parties may rely on such representation.
- c. Once executed, this MOA may not be terminated by any Party hereto except in the case of a material breach by any Party which is not corrected within ten (10) business days following written notice of such breach from one Party to another.
- d. This MOA shall be interpreted according to the local laws of the State of California, as if jointly drafted by all the Parties. No ambiguity in drafting shall be applied to the detriment of any Party as the drafter.
- e. This MOA may be executed in identical counterpart copies, each of which shall be an original, but all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same agreement.

The Parties, through their respective authorized representatives, have executed this MOA as of the date set forth above.

Teachers appreciated Eureka Math² for its comprehensive scope and sequence, the variety of digital tools available, and the engaging instructional experiences for students.

# **Background:**

The textbook will be on display for public review for 35 days, April 17 through May 22, 2024, in the lobby of the Monrovia Unified School District office, 325 East Huntington Drive, Monrovia, California, 91016.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The estimated cost for the textbooks, teaching materials, and digital platform is \$464,000. This will be paid with state lottery funds allocated to the district and funds from the discretionary block grant. The cost aims to cover a three-year contract.

# **Rationale:**

The current curriculum being utilized for integrated mathematics was adopted nine (9) years ago in 2015. Although the California Common Core State Standards for Mathematics have not changed, the California Mathematics Framework has changed significantly with implications for both math curriculum and instruction. Our secondary students need a math curriculum that is aligned with the Framework and better meets the needs of our students. The Carnegie Integrated Math curriculum was pilot-tested by a group of teachers representing each school site and a range of grade levels, and each was the preferred choice based on surveys completed by mathematics teachers and students involved in the pilots. Feedback was also gathered from math department meetings at each school site. Teachers appreciate both curricula for the comprehensive scope and sequence, the variety of digital tools available, and the engaging instructional experiences for students.

# **Background:**

The textbooks will be on display for public review for 35 days, starting on April 17 through May 22, 2024, at the Monrovia Unified School District office lobby (325 East Huntington Drive, Monrovia, California 91016.)

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The estimated cost for the textbooks and teaching materials is \$512,324.26, which will be paid with state lottery funds allocated to the district as well as funds from the discretionary block grant.

# **Rationale:**

As part of MUSD's mission to increase access to higher-level courses to raise the number of students who complete high school and become both college and careerready, the listed courses are being presented for approval. Additionally, the Early College Program courses satisfy the requirements of the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum and are a requirement for the Associate Degree for Transfer in Sociology.

# **Background:**

The Early College Program course descriptions have been adopted from Citrus College's catalog course descriptions for the equivalent courses. The Early College semester-long courses will earn Monrovia Unified School District students three (3) units of transferable college credit while simultaneously earning 10 units of elective credit at Monrovia High School.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

Textbooks for the Monrovia High School Early College courses are approximately \$85 per student. The total anticipated cost for 32 students is approximately \$2,800 per course (approximately \$22,400). All textbook, curriculum, and training costs will be paid from the Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Round 7.

The purpose of this paper assignment is to focus on a particular topic of interest and expand upon it. You will take an aspect of family life in the United States that is of interest to you. This might be a problem within the structure of the family, or problems in society that in turn cause stress on the family, etc. You will submit a paper of 3-4 pages in length on a topic of your choice. This will include a review of literature in any area of research of particular interest to you. A minimum of three (3) outside sources must be reviewed (meaning 3 sources besides your textbook). Each source should be analyzed from a critical perspective paying particular attention to the author's main points.

This paper will include research findings about your topic, as well as a demonstration of your understanding of sociological concepts and theories. Incorporate what you have learned in class and from reading the text.

# **Rationale:**

As part of MUSD's mission to increase access to higher-level courses, raise the number of students who successfully complete high school, and become college—and career-ready, the listed course is being presented for approval. This Monrovia High School course provides additional elective options for students and is the capstone course for the Entrepreneurship Career Technical Education pathway.

# **Background:**

The Entrepreneurship 2 course description has been adopted from the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship's (NFTE) Entrepreneurship 2 course description. The NFTE year-long courses will earn Monrovia Unified School District students ten units of elective credit at Monrovia High School. NFTE aligns with Career Technical Education's focus, giving students the opportunity to build skills, confidence, and know-how to succeed in postsecondary education, advanced career training, or immediate entry into jobs with a meaningful career path. Young people who complete NFTE's entrepreneurship programs are more likely to engage in learning, achieve their educational and career goals, launch businesses, have increased lifetime earnings, and feel greater job satisfaction.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The total cost for teacher training for the NFTE course and course licensure for 32 students is approximately \$6,200. All textbook, curriculum, and training costs will be paid from the Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Round 7.

In NFTE's Entrepreneurship 2 course, students use their entrepreneurial skills and mindset to develop and test business concepts and design validated business model canvases. Students conduct customer interviews and work with industry mentors to iterate on their business models until they have demonstrated customer acquisition. Students learn about the relationship between education, employment, income, and net worth, and they plan for the cost of college. Students then broaden their study to include banking, spending, investing, and other money management concepts before exploring credit and debt. In the final unit of the course, students study microeconomics and entrepreneurship, with an overview of economic systems, supply and demand, consumer behavior and incentives, and profit principles. The course concludes with an in-depth case study about starting a business

# **Rationale:**

The California legislature introduced the K-12 Strong Workforce Program as an ongoing statewide funding opportunity. It is designed to support K-12 local education agencies and community colleges collaborating to create, improve, and expand career technical education courses, course sequences, programs of study, and pathways for students transitioning from secondary education and postsecondary education to living-wage employment. This grant proposal focuses on expanding our Early College program into our Career Technical Education (CTE) pathways, providing new opportunities for students to earn free college credit while improving their employable skills for their future careers. The grant will cover infrastructure and technology improvements necessary to raise our CTE instruction to the level Citrus College requires, professional development to prepare our CTE teachers and instructional materials needed for the expansion. Additionally, this grant will aim for greater opportunities for work-based learning, including increasing our capacity for CTE guest speakers, job site visits, and student internships.

# **Background:**

Charter Oak Unified School District (COUSD) has been elected to be the fiscal lead by the Foothill Consortium, a designated group of districts that includes Azusa Unified School District, Charter Oak Unified School District, Duarte Unified School District, and Monrovia Unified School District. COUSD has been assigned the sole responsibility to acquire, manage, and report all uses of Grant funds in compliance with the K-12 Strong Workforce Program Grant. All districts participating in the program have agreed to deliver to all terms and conditions set forth in this MOU so that COUSD can fully comply with all program eligibility requirements. The K-12 Strong Workforce Program Round 6 grant term began on January 1, 2024. The grant term is tied to the associated legislation and state budget term that provided the funds for the grant. This K-12 Strong Workforce Program funding round occurred during the 2023/24 fiscal year. The actual distribution of funds will occur in

approximately June 2024. Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) have until June 30, 2025, to expend all funds for this grant term.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

For the grant term ending June 30, 2026, the Foothill Consortium has been awarded \$895,992, a portion of which shall be made available to Monrovia Unified School District according to the Budget Allocation of the MOU (\$211,012).

# K12 Strong Workforce Program A Memorandum of Understanding

The following is a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Between Charter Oak Unified School District (hereinafter referred to as COUSD), and Monrovia Unified School District (hereinafter referred to as "District") concerning the award, allocation and required use of funds confirmed in the K12 Strong Workforce Program (K12 SWP6).

#### I. <u>Background</u>

The California legislature introduced the K12 Strong Workforce Program (K12 SWP) as an ongoing statewide funding opportunity. It is designed to support K-12 local education agencies (LEAs) in creating, improving, and expanding career technical education (CTE) courses, course sequences, programs of study, and pathways for students transitioning from secondary education to postsecondary education to living-wage employment.

COUSD has been elected to be the fiscal lead by the Foothill Consortium, a designated group of districts that include COUSD, Azusa, Duarte, and Monrovia Unified School Districts, and has been assigned the sole responsibility to acquire, manage and report all uses of Grant funds in compliance with the K12 SWP. All districts participating in the Program have agreed to adhere to all terms and conditions set forth in this Memorandum in order for COUSD to fully comply with all Program eligibility requirements.

#### II. <u>Duration of Memorandum of Understanding</u>

The duration of the MOU will be for the duration of the grant funding term of January 1, 2024 - June 30, 2026 for K12 SWP Round 6 (allocation of funds will begin approximately June, 2024), unless otherwise modified or terminated by either party 30 days following the effective date of such written notice.

#### III. Amount Awarded

For K12 SWP Round 6, the Foothill Consortium has been awarded \$895,992.00, a portion of which shall be made available to District (see attachment). The grant payment will be disbursed to the K12 Foothill Consortium Fiscal Lead pursuant to receipt of fully executed Memoranda of Understanding from all members of the Consortium and a signed Grant Award Notification (GAN). All funds must be expended within the dates designated and for not more than the maximum amount indicated on the GAN.

#### IV.

#### Responsibilities of the Parties

#### District:

- Identify one district office individual and one site contact from each participating school to work with COUSD staff in the implementation of career pathways at participating schools.
- Report a 2:1 match for any funding received as follows: two dollars (\$2) for every one dollar (\$1) received [EC § 88828, (c)(1)(A)(B)].
- Submit necessary documents and fiscal reporting, such as financial match report, into NOVA or designated reporting website/system.
- Provide assurance that all funds received shall be used only for the development and maintenance of CTE programs.
- Report and be prepared to show that all local educational agency (LEA) CTE expended funds under accounting goal codes 3800 (Vocational Education) or 6000 Regional Occupational Center and Programs (ROCPs).

#### COUSD:

COUSD shall assure that all districts participating under this MOU will meet all of the grant requirements as delineated in the RFA, with the primary objectives to be the following:

- Submit necessary documents and fiscal reporting, including expenditure reports and financial match reports, into NOVA or designated reporting website/system.
- To support essential collaboration across education systems between the K-12 sector and community colleges, with involvement from industry, businesses, and organizations in strengthening CTE programs and pathways aligned with regional workforce needs
- To support LEAs in developing and implementing high-quality, K-14 CTE course sequences, programs, and pathways that:

- Facilitate K-12 student exploration and selection of learning opportunities leading to career paths.
- Build foundational career path skills and knowledge essential to subsequent success in college and early career exploration.
- Enable a seamless and successful transition from secondary to postsecondary education within the same or related career paths.
- Lead to completion of industry-valued certificates, degrees, or transfers to four-year university or college.
- Prepare students upon completion of education to enter into employment in occupations for which there is documented demand and which pay a livable wage.
- Contribute toward meeting the projected need for one million completers of CTE programs aligned with the state's labor markets.

#### V. Additional Provisions

- A. The duly authorized officials of each respective party enter into this MOU.
- B. It is understood by both parties that each will fulfill its responsibility under the MOU in accordance with the provisions of law and regulations that govern their activities.
- C. Nothing in this MOU is intended to negate or otherwise render ineffective any previous agreements.
- D. This MOU may be amended by the mutual written consent of the parties.
- E. No amendment, modification or alteration in the terms of the MOU shall be binding on either party unless submitted in writing.

The following is a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) Between Charter Oak Unified School District (hereinafter referred to as COUSD), and Monrovia Unified School District (hereinafter referred to as "District") concerning the award, allocation and required use of funds confirmed in the California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant (CTEIG 9).

#### I. Background

The California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program is established as a state education, economic, and workforce development initiative with the goal of providing pupils in kindergarten through grade twelve, inclusive, with the knowledge and skills necessary to transition to employment and postsecondary education. The purpose of this program is to encourage and maintain the delivery of career technical education (CTE) programs.

Education Code (EC) sections 53070-53076.4

COUSD has been elected to be the fiscal lead by the Foothill Consortium, a designated group of districts that includes COUSD, Azusa, Duarte, and Monrovia Unified School Districts, and has been assigned the sole responsibility to acquire, manage and report all uses of Grant funds in compliance with the California Career Technical Education Incentive Grant Program. All districts participating in the Program have agreed to adhere to all terms and conditions set forth in this Memorandum in order for COUSD to fully comply with all Program eligibility requirements.

#### II. Duration of Memorandum of Understanding

The duration of the MOU will be for the duration of the CTEIG 9 grant funding term of July 1, 2024 - December 31, 2025, unless otherwise modified or terminated by either party 30 days following the effective date of such written notice.

#### III. Amount Awarded

For the Grant Term ending December 31, 2025, the Foothill Consortium has been awarded \$1,000,000, a portion of which shall be made available to District, per allocation attachment. The grant payment will be dispersed to the K12 Foothill Consortium pursuant to receipt of fully executed Memoranda of Understanding from all members of the Consortium and a signed Grant Award Notification (GAN). All funds must be expended within the dates designated and for not more than the maximum amount indicated on the GAN. Funding for subsequent Grant Term(s) will be subject to performance data and CDE review.

#### IV. Responsibilities of the Parties

#### District:

- A. Identify one district office individual and one site contact from each participating school to work with COUSD staff in the implementation of career pathways at participating schools.
- B. Report a 2:1 match for any funding received as follows: two dollars (\$2) for every one dollar (\$1) received from the 2023-2024 fiscal year [EC §53071(a)(1)(D)(ii)].
- C. Provide assurance that all funds received shall be used only for the development and maintenance of CTE programs.
- D. Report and be prepared to show that all local educational agency (LEA) CTE expended funds under accounting goal codes 3800 (Vocational Education) or 6000 Regional Occupational Center and Programs (ROCPs).

#### **COUSD:**

COUSD shall assure that all districts participating under this MOU will meet all of the grant requirements as delineated in the RFA as follows:

- A. Offer high quality curriculum and instruction aligned with California Career Technical Education Model Curriculum Standards.
- B. Offer CTE pathway(s) that provide a coherent sequence of courses, are reported in CALPADS as CTE, and enable pupils to transition to postsecondary education programs that lead to a career pathway or attain employment upon graduation from high school.
- C. Provide career exploration and guidance opportunities for all pathway learners.
- D. Provide support services for students, including counseling.
- E. Embed student leadership development into career pathway teaching and learning.
- F. Provide for system alignment, coherence, and articulation, including ongoing and structural regional or local partnership with postsecondary educational institutions.
- G. Form ongoing and meaningful industry and labor partnerships through participation on advisory committees and collaboration with business and labor organizations to provide opportunities for pupils.
- H. Provide opportunities for pupils to gain access to pre-apprenticeships, internships, industry certifications, and work-based learning opportunities for industry to provide input to the career technical education programs and curriculum.
- Provide opportunities for pupils to participate in after school, extended day, and out-ofschool internships, competitions, leadership development, career technical student organizations, and other work-based learning opportunities.
- J. Reflect regional or local labor market demands and focus on current and emerging highskill, high-wage, high-demand occupations.
- K. Provide programs that lead to an industry-recognized credential or certificate, or appropriate postsecondary training or employment.
- L. Provide skilled teachers with appropriate credentials, as well as skilled administrators and support staff members.
- M. Dedicate resources for professional development for CTE pathway teachers, including educator externships with industry.
- N. Provide opportunities for pupils who are individuals with exceptional needs to participate in all programs
- O. Report data as a program participation requirement to allow for evaluation of the program.

This round of CTEIG funding occured during the 2023-2024 fiscal year. Actual distribution of funds does not occur until approximately June 2024. LEAs have until December 31, 2025 to expend all funds for this grant term.

Based on the Budget confirmed herein, all expenditures made by District, and all participating districts, are not to exceed agreed upon budgeted amounts without prior approval of COUSD. All services rendered, materials and products acquired, and all activities falling within budgeted parameters, shall be reported to COUSD quarterly. Districts will receive 70% of their allocation once funds have been released to the fiscal lead by submitting an invoice, with the remaining balance distributed 3 months prior to closeout or once initial funds have been spent, whichever comes first.

# **Rationale:**

After the successful implementation of Verkada security cameras and vape sensors at Monrovia High School last year, the Board of Education has requested that the use of the Verkada system be expanded district-wide. The implementation of this security system is in accordance with the District's commitment to improving school security systems and student safety, as outlined in Measure MM. Site walks were conducted at all sites with the contracting vendor, NIC Partners, who was responsible for installation and setup at Monrovia High School, and a competitive proposal was created on a piggybackable California Multiple Awards Schedule (CMAS) contract.

# **Background:**

Agreement terms include a five (5) year software use license, ten (10) year separate warranty of equipment, and one (1) year installation/ craftsmanship warranty.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The cost for equipment, software license, warranty, and installation is \$872,069.91, to be paid from Measure MM funds.

# **Rationale:**

The scope of work for the designated schools encompasses the replacement of plumbing fixtures and appliances to ensure compliance with specified ENERGY STAR and water efficiency requirements outlined by the California Energy Commission (CEC.)

# **Background:**

The California Energy Commission was authorized by Assembly Bill (AB) 841 (Chapter 372, Statutes of 2020) to design, administer, and implement the California Schools Healthy Air, Plumbing, and Efficiency Program (CalSHAPE.) The California Energy Commission (CEC) has finalized its review of the CalSHAPE Plumbing Program application, culminating in the issuance of the Notice of Proposed Award (NOPA) to Monrovia Unified School District. This grant award is designated for implementation across nine sites, including Monrovia High, Mountain Park, Bradoaks Elementary Science Academy, Clifton Middle, Monroe Elementary, Santa Fe Computer Science Magnet, Wild Rose School of Creative Arts, Mayflower Elementary, Plymouth Elementary, falling under the Southern California Edison (SCE) funding category, operating under Agreement Number 23R5PA1139. The overarching goal of this grant is to bolster efforts toward fostering healthier air quality, enhancing plumbing infrastructure, and improving overall efficiency within school environments.

# **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The grant award of \$1,114,610.90 has been designated for the School Plumbing Fixture and Appliance Replacement projects within the Monrovia Unified School District. This funding will be specifically allocated to purchase and install plumbing fixtures and appliances across various designated sites as outlined in the grant's scope of work.

# **Legal References:**

California Education Code 17604 stipulates that any contract or agreement

pertaining to educational matters is not considered valid until it has been reviewed and approved by the Board of Education. This requirement ensures that all contractual arrangements entered into by educational institutions, including school districts like Monrovia Unified, undergo thorough scrutiny and oversight by the governing board to uphold transparency, accountability, and compliance with relevant regulations.

# **Additional Information:**

The timely completion and submission of the required documents are paramount to securing the reservation of grant funds and facilitating the subsequent execution of the grant agreement by the California Energy Commission (CEC.) Compliance with these procedures ensures that the grant award process progresses smoothly and that the allocated funds can be utilized effectively for their intended purposes within the Monrovia Unified School District. # CALIFORNIA SCHOOLS HEALTHY AIR, PLUMBING, AND EFFICIENCY (CALSHAPE) STANDARD GRANT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

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#### 1. Introduction

This grant agreement (Agreement) between the California Energy Commission (Energy Commission or Commission) and the Recipient is funded by the School Energy Efficiency Stimulus Program, established by Assembly Bill 841 (Ting, Chapter 372, Statutes of 2020), which in part provides grants to replace noncompliant plumbing fixtures and appliances. This grant program is referred to as the California Schools Healthy Air, Plumbing, and Efficiency (CalSHAPE) Plumbing Program.

This Agreement includes: (1) the Agreement signature page (form CEC-146); (2) the scope of work (Exhibit A); (3) the budget (Exhibit B); (4) a contacts list (Exhibit C); (5) these terms and conditions, which are standard requirements for CalSHAPE plumbing program grant awards (Exhibit D); (6) any special terms and conditions that the Energy Commission may impose to address the unique circumstances of the funded project, which take precedence in the event of a conflict with any provision of these terms and conditions (Exhibit E); (7) all attachments; and (8) all documents incorporated by reference.

All work and expenditure of Commission-reimbursed funds must occur within the Agreement term specified on the CEC-146 form.

#### 2. Documents Incorporated by Reference

The documents below are incorporated by reference into this Agreement. These terms and conditions will govern in the event of a conflict with the documents below, with the exception of the documents in subsections (f) and (g) below. Where this Agreement or California laws and regulations are silent or do not apply, the Energy Commission will use the federal cost principles and acquisition regulations listed below as guidance in determining whether reimbursement of claimed costs is allowable. - b. Energy Commission staff will periodically evaluate the project schedule for completion of Scope of Work tasks. This evaluation may include but not be limited to random checks of project progress at periodic intervals set by the Energy Commission. Recipients subject to a project check must complete a progress report using a template prepared by the Energy Commission to provide information on the project status and expected completion date.
- c. If Energy Commission staff determines that: (1) the Recipient is not diligently completing the tasks in the Scope of Work; or (2) the time remaining in this Agreement is insufficient to complete all project tasks by the Agreement end date, Energy Commission staff may recommend that this Agreement be terminated, and the Commission may terminate this Agreement without prejudice to any of its other remedies.

#### 5. Products

a. "Products" are any tangible item specified for delivery to the Energy Commission in the Scope of Work, such as reports and summaries. The Recipient will submit all products identified in the Scope of Work to Energy Commission staff, in the manner and form specified in the Scope of Work.

If Energy Commission staff determines that a product is substandard given its description and intended use as described in this Agreement, Energy Commission staff, without prejudice to any of the Commission's other remedies, may refuse to authorize payment for the product and any subsequent products that rely on or are based upon the product under this Agreement.

#### b. Failure to Submit Products

Failure to submit a product required in the Scope of Work may be considered material noncompliance with the Agreement terms. Without prejudice to any other remedies, noncompliance may result in actions such as the withholding of future payments or awards, or the suspension or termination of the Agreement.

#### c. Legal Statements on Products

All documents that result from work funded by this Agreement and are released to the public must include the following statement to ensure no Commission endorsement of documents:

#### **LEGAL NOTICE**

This document was prepared as a result of work sponsored by the California Energy Commission. It does not necessarily represent the views of the Energy Commission, its employees, or the State of California. Neither the Commission, the State of California, nor the Commission's employees, contractors, or subcontractors makes any warranty, express or implied, or assumes any legal liability for the information in this document; nor does any party represent that the use of this information will not infringe upon privately owned rights. This document has not been approved or disapproved by the Commission, nor has the Commission passed upon the accuracy of the information in this document.

#### 6. Amendments

a. Procedure for Requesting Extensions

The Recipient must submit a written request to the CalSHAPE Program for a onetime only extension to the Agreement, not to exceed six-months nor the final program reporting deadline date of June 1, 2026. The request must include:

- A brief summary of the proposed extension; and
- A brief summary of the reason(s) for the extension

### b. Approval of Changes

No amendment or variation of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by both of the parties except for the Commission's unilateral termination rights in Section 16 of these terms. No oral understanding or agreement is binding on any of the parties.

#### 7. Contracting and Procurement Procedures

This section provides general requirements for agreements entered into between the Recipient and subcontractors for the performance of this Agreement.

- a. Contractor's Obligations to Subcontractors
  - 1) The Recipient is responsible for handling all contractual and administrative issues arising out of or related to any subcontracts it enters into for the performance of this Agreement.
  - 2) Nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise creates any contractual relation between the Commission and any subcontractors, and no subcontract may relieve the Recipient of its responsibilities under this Agreement. The Recipient agrees to be as fully responsible to the Commission for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors or persons directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by the Recipient.

The Recipient's obligation to pay its subcontractors is an independent obligation from the Commission's obligation to make payments to the Recipient. As a result, the Commission has no obligation to pay or enforce the payment of any funds to any subcontractor.

- 3) The Recipient is responsible for establishing and maintaining contractual agreements with and reimbursing each subcontractor for work performed in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- Flow-Down Provisions

Subcontracts funded in whole or in part by this Agreement must include language conforming to the provisions below, unless the subcontracts are entered into by the University of California (UC) or the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) national laboratories. UC may use the terms and conditions negotiated by the Energy Commission with UC for its subcontracts. DOE national laboratories may use the terms and conditions negotiated with DOE (please contact the Commission Grants Officer for these terms).

- Standard of Performance (Section 3)
- Legal Statements on Products (included in Section 5, "Products")
- Prevailing Wage (Section 10)
- Recordkeeping, Cost Accounting, and Auditing (Section 11)
- Equipment (Section 14)
- Indemnification (Section 17)
- Intellectual Property (Section 20)
- Access to Sites and Records (included in Section 22, "General Provisions")
- Nondiscrimination (included in Section 23, "Certifications and Compliance")
- Survival of the following sections:
  - Equipment (Section 14)
  - o Recordkeeping, Cost Accounting, and Auditing (Section 11)
  - o Intellectual Property (Section 20)
  - Access to Sites and Records (included in Section 22, "General Provisions")

Subcontracts funded in whole or in part by this Agreement must also include the following:

- A clear and accurate description of the material, products, or services to be procured.
- A detailed budget and timeline.
- Provisions that allow for administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where subcontractors breach contract terms, in addition to sanctions and penalties as may be appropriate.
- Provisions for termination by the Recipient, including termination procedures and the basis for settlement.
- A statement that further assignments will not be made to any third or subsequent tier subcontractor without additional advance written consent of the Commission.

#### c. Audits

All subcontracts entered into for the performance of this Agreement are subject to examination and audit by the Energy Commission, Bureau of State Audits, or the California Public Utilities Commission for a period of three (3) years after payment of the Recipient's final invoice under this Agreement.

d. Copies of Subcontracts

The Recipient must provide a copy of its subcontracts upon request by the Energy Commission.

e. Conflicting Subcontract Terms

Prior to the execution of this Agreement, the Recipient will notify the CalSHAPE Program of any known or reasonably foreseeable conflicts between this Agreement and its agreements with any subcontractors (e.g., conflicting intellectual property or payment terms). If the Recipient discovers any such conflicts after the execution of this Agreement, it will notify the CalSHAPE Program of the conflict within fifteen (15) days of discovery. The Energy Commission may, without prejudice to its other remedies, terminate this Agreement if any conflict impairs or diminishes its value.

#### f. Penalties for Noncompliance

Without limiting the Commission's other remedies, failure to comply with the above requirements may result in the termination of this Agreement.

## 8. Payment of Funds

#### a. Timing of Payment

See Chapter 3, Section G, Timing of Payment, of the CalSHAPE Plumbing Commission Guidelines.

Final payment will only be made after the Energy Commission: (1) receives and approves the Recipient's final reporting; and (2) receives and accepts all other required documentation necessary for the Energy Commission to determine the total final amount due to the Recipient, based on actual and allowable Incurred Costs and Paid Costs under this Agreement, up to the total grant award amount.

Without limiting any other rights and remedies available to the Energy Commission, Recipient must return funds to the Energy Commission received under this Agreement if, for example, the Recipient was overpaid in the first payment, did not complete the project, or did not meet other program requirements.

#### b. Reimbursable Cost Requirements

In addition to any other requirements in this Agreement, the Energy Commission is only obligated to reimburse the Recipient for Incurred and Paid Costs that are (1) incurred during the Agreement Term; (2) invoiced within the required timeframes of this Agreement; (3) made in accordance with the Agreement's Budget; and (4) actual and allowable expenses under this Agreement.

ALL of the items in the Budget are capped amounts (i.e., maximums), and the Recipient can only bill its ACTUAL amount up to capped amounts listed in the Budget. For example, if the Budget includes an employee's hourly rate of \$50/hour but the employee is only paid \$40/hour, the Recipient can only bill for \$40/hour. Under the same example, if the employee earned \$70/hour but the Budget only lists \$50/hour, the Recipient can only bill for \$50. If the actual rates exceed the approved rates in the Budget, the difference may be charged to the agreement as a match share expenditure.

#### c. Payment Requests

Recipient agrees and acknowledges that time is of the essence in submitting the final payment request. The Commission has a limited period of time, set by law, in which it can reimburse funds under this Agreement. Without prejudice to the Commission's other rights, the Recipient risks not receiving any funds, and relieves the Commission of any duty and liability whatsoever to pay, for any payment requests received after the end of the Agreement.

#### d. Invoice Approval and Disputes:

Payment is subject to Energy Commission staff's approval. Payments will be made to the Recipient for undisputed invoices. An undisputed invoice is an invoice submitted by the Recipient for work performed, for which project expenditures and products meet all Agreement conditions, and for which additional evidence is not required to determine its validity.

The invoice will be disputed if all products due for the billing period have not been received and approved, if the invoice is inaccurate, or if it does not comply with the terms of this Agreement. If the invoice is disputed, the Recipient will be notified by the CEC.

#### e. Multiple Non-Energy Commission Funding Sources:

No payment will be made for costs identified in recipient invoices that have been or will be reimbursed by another source, including but not limited to an agreement with another government entity.

"Government Entity" means: (1) a state governmental agency; (2) a state college or university; (3) a local government entity or agency, including those created as a Joint Powers Authority; (4) an auxiliary organization of the California State University or a California community college; (5) the federal government; (6) a foundation organized to support the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges; and (7) an auxiliary organization of the Student Aid Commission established under California Education Code Section 69522.

#### f. Reduced funding:

If the Energy Commission does not receive sufficient funds under the Budget Act or from the investor-owned utility administrators of the CalSHAPE program to fully fund the work identified in Exhibit A (Scope of Work), the following will occur:

- 1) If the Energy Commission has received a reduced amount of funds for the work, it may: (1) offer an Agreement amendment to the Recipient to reflect the reduced amount; or (2) cancel this Agreement (with no liability occurring to the State).
- 2) If the Energy Commission has received no funds for the work identified in Exhibit A: (1) this Agreement will be of no force and effect; (2) the State will have no obligation to pay any funds to the Recipient; and (3) the Recipient will have no obligation to perform any work under this Agreement.

#### g. Allowability of Costs

#### 1) Allowable Costs

The costs for which the Recipient will be reimbursed under this Agreement include all costs, direct and indirect, incurred in the performance of the work identified in the Scope of Work. Costs must be incurred within the Agreement term. Factors to be considered in determining whether an individual item of cost is allowable include: (i) reasonableness of the item, including necessity of the item for the work; (ii) applicable federal cost principles or acquisition regulations incorporated by reference in Section 2 of this Agreement; and (iii) the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

- 2) Unallowable Costs
  - See Chapter 3, Section H, Ineligible Costs, of the CalSHAPE Plumbing Program Commission Guidelines.
- 3) Except as provided for in this Agreement or applicable California law or regulations, the Recipient will use the federal cost principles and/or acquisition regulations incorporated by reference in Section 2 of this Agreement when determining allowable and unallowable costs. In the event of a conflict, this Agreement takes precedence over the federal cost principles and/or acquisition regulations.

#### h. Final Invoice for Remaining Funds

See Chapter 4, Section C, Final Documentation and Invoice for Remaining Funds, of the CalSHAPE Plumbing Program Commission Guidelines. The Recipient must submit all invoices electronically by uploading them to the CalSHAPE Online System, which is found at https://calshape.energy.ca.gov/.

- i. If the Recipient has not otherwise provided to the Commission documentation showing the Recipient's payment of Incurred Costs, the Recipient shall provide such documentation as soon as possible and not later than three working days from a request from Commission personnel.
- i. Certification

The following certification will be included on each payment request form and signed by the Recipient's authorized officer:

The documents included in this request for payment are true and correct to the best of my knowledge and I have authority to submit this request. I certify that reimbursement for these costs has not and will not be received from any other sources, including but not limited to a government entity contract, subcontract, or other procurement method. For projects considered to be a public work, prevailing wages were paid to eligible workers who provided labor for the work covered by this invoice; the Recipient and all subcontractors have complied with prevailing wage laws.

#### 9. Reserved

#### 10. Prevailing Wage

a. Requirement

Projects funded by the Energy Commission often involve construction, alteration, demolition, installation, repair, or maintenance work over \$1,000. Such projects might be considered "public works" under the California Labor Code (See California Labor Code Section 1720 et seq. and Title 8 California Code of Regulations, Section 16000 et seq.). Public works projects require the payment of prevailing wages. Prevailing wage rates can be significantly higher than non-prevailing wage rates.

b. Determination of Project's Status

Only the California Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) and courts of competent jurisdiction may issue legally binding determinations that a particular project is or is not a public work. If the Recipient is unsure whether the project funded by the Agreement is a "public work" as defined in the California Labor Code, it may wish to seek a timely determination from DIR or an appropriate court. As such processes can be time consuming, it may not be possible to obtain a timely determination before the date for performance of the Agreement.

By accepting this grant, the Recipient is fully responsible for complying with all California public works requirements, including but not limited to payment of prevailing wage. As a material term of this grant, the Recipient must either:

- 1) Timely obtain a legally binding determination from DIR or a court of competent jurisdiction before work begins on the project that the proposed project is not a public work; or
- 2) Assume that the project is a public work and ensure that:
  - Prevailing wages are paid unless and until DIR or a court of competent jurisdiction determines that the project is not a public work;
  - The project budget for labor reflects these prevailing wage requirements; and
  - The project complies with all other requirements of prevailing wage law, including but not limited to keeping accurate payroll records and complying with all working hour requirements and apprenticeship obligations.

California Prevailing Wage law provides for substantial damages and financial penalties for failure to pay prevailing wages when such payment is required.

#### c. Subcontractors and Flow-down Requirements

The Recipient will ensure that its subcontractors also comply with the public works/prevailing wage requirements above. The Recipient will ensure that all agreements with its subcontractors to perform work related to this Project contain the above terms regarding payment of prevailing wages on public works projects. The Recipient is responsible for any failure of its subcontractors to comply with California prevailing wage and public works laws.

#### d. Indemnification and Breach

Any failure of the Recipient or its subcontractors to comply with the above requirements will constitute breach of this Agreement which excuses the Commission's performance of this Agreement at the Commission's option, and will be at the Recipient's sole risk. In such a case, the Commission will refuse payment to the Recipient of any amount under this award and the Commission will be released, at its option, from any further performance of this Agreement or any portion thereof. The Recipient will indemnify the Energy Commission and hold it harmless for any and all financial consequences arising out of or resulting from the failure of the Recipient and/or any of its subcontractors to pay prevailing wages or to otherwise comply with the requirements of prevailing wage law.

#### e. Budget

The Recipient's budget on public works projects must indicate which job classifications are subject to prevailing wage. For detailed information about prevailing wage and the process to determine if the proposed project is a public work, the Recipient may wish to contact DIR or a qualified labor attorney for guidance.

#### f. Covered Trades

For public works projects, the Recipient may contact DIR for a list of covered trades and the applicable prevailing wage.

#### g. Questions

If the Recipient has any questions about this contractual requirement or the wage, record keeping, apprenticeship, or other significant requirements of California prevailing wage law, the Recipient should consult DIR and/or a qualified labor attorney before entering into this Agreement.

#### h. Certification

The Recipient will certify to the Energy Commission on each payment request form either that: (a) prevailing wages were paid to eligible workers who provided labor for work covered by the payment request and the Recipient and all contractors and subcontractors otherwise complied with all California prevailing wage laws; or (b) the project is not a public work requiring the payment of prevailing wages. In the latter case, the Recipient will provide competent proof of a DIR or court determination that the project is not a public work requiring the payment of prevailing wages.

Prior to the release of any retained funds under this Agreement, the Recipient will submit to the Energy Commission the above-described certificate signed by the Recipient and all contractors and subcontractors performing public works activities on the project. Absent this certificate, the Recipient will have no right to any funds under this Agreement, and Commission will be relieved of any obligation to pay any funds.

## 11. Recordkeeping, Cost Accounting, and Auditing

#### a. Cost Accounting

The Recipient will keep separate, complete, and correct accounting of the costs involved in completing the project and any match-funded portion of the project. The Commission or its agent will have the right to examine the Recipient's books of accounts at all reasonable times, to the extent necessary to verify the accuracy of the Recipient's reports.

#### b. Accounting Procedures

The Recipient's costs will be determined on the basis of its accounting system procedures and practices employed as of the effective date of this Agreement, provided that the Recipient uses generally accepted accounting principles and cost reimbursement practices. The Recipient's cost accounting practices used in accumulating and reporting costs during the performance of this Agreement will be consistent with the practices used in estimating costs for any proposal to which this Agreement relates; provided that such practices are consistent with the other terms of this Agreement and that such costs may be accumulated and reported in greater detail during performance of this Agreement.

The Recipient's accounting system will distinguish between direct and indirect costs. All costs incurred for the same purpose, in like circumstances, are either direct costs only or indirect costs only with respect to costs incurred under this Agreement.

#### c. Inspections, Assessment, and Studies

If selected, the Recipient must cooperate with and participate in the following:

- 1) An assessment of a funded project's greenhouse gas reductions and energy savings. This may include, but is not limited to, requests from Energy Commission staff or its delegate for data, project and equipment information, and reasonable access to the project site to assist with determining greenhouse gas reductions and energy savings attributable to the funded project. Costs associated with any activities associated with such an assessment will not be funded by a CalSHAPE Program grant.
- 2) A site inspection and verification of installation and operation of new fixtures and appliances. This may include, but is not limited to, providing Energy Commission staff or its delegates reasonable access to the funded project site to inspect and verify installation and operation. Recipient understands that any such inspection and verification by Energy Commission staff or its delegates is not a safety inspection.
- 3) A measurement and evaluation study that will be used to analyze current program performance and improve future program designs. This may include but is not limited to providing Energy Commission staff or its delegates data, project and equipment information, and reasonable access to the funded project site.

#### d. Audit Rights

The Recipient will maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence, based on the procedures set forth above, sufficient to reflect properly all costs claimed to have been incurred in the performance of this Agreement. The Energy Commission, another state agency, and/or a public accounting firm designated by the Energy Commission may audit the Recipient's accounting records at all reasonable times, with prior notice by the Energy Commission.

It is the intent of the parties that the audits will ordinarily be performed not more frequently than once every twelve (12) months during the performance of the work and once at any time within three (3) years after payment by the Energy Commission of the Recipient's final invoice. However, performance of any such interim audits by the Energy Commission does not preclude further audit. The Energy Commission may audit books, records, documents, and other evidence relevant to the Recipient's royalty payment obligations (see Section 21) for a period of ten (10) years after payment of the Recipient's final invoice.

The Recipient will allow the auditor(s) to access such records during normal business hours, and will allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. The Recipient will include a similar right of the state to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to the performance of this Agreement.

#### e. Refund to the Energy Commission

If the Energy Commission determines that any invoiced and paid amounts exceed the actual allowable incurred costs, the Recipient will repay the amounts to the Energy Commission within thirty (30) days of request or as otherwise agreed by the Energy Commission and the Recipient. If the Energy Commission does not receive such repayments, it will be entitled to take any actions enforce any remedies available to it, such as withholding further payments to the Recipient and seeking repayment from the Recipient.

#### f. Audit Cost

The Recipient will bear its cost of participating in any audit (e.g., mailing or travel expenses). The Energy Commission will bear the cost of conducting the audit unless the audit reveals an error detrimental to the Energy Commission that exceeds more than ten percent (10%) or \$5,000 (whichever is greater) of the amount audited. The Recipient will pay the refund as specified in subsection (d), and will reimburse the Energy Commission for reasonable costs and expenses incurred by the Commission in conducting the audit.

#### g. Match or Cost Share

If the budget includes a match share requirement, the Recipient's commitment of resources, as described in this Agreement, is a required expenditure for receipt of Energy Commission funds. The funds will be released only if the required match percentages are expended. The Recipient must maintain accounting records detailing the expenditure of the match (actual cash and in-kind, non-cash services), and report on match share expenditures on its request for payment.

#### 12. Workers' Compensation Insurance

- a. The Recipient warrants that it carries Worker's Compensation Insurance for all of its employees who will be engaged in the performance of this Agreement, and agrees to furnish to the CalSHAPE Program satisfactory evidence of this insurance upon the CalSHAPE Program's request.
- b. If the Recipient is self-insured for worker's compensation, it warrants that the self-insurance is permissible under the laws of the State of California and agrees to furnish to the CalSHAPE Program satisfactory evidence of the insurance upon the CalSHAPE Program's request.

#### 13. Permits and Clearances

The Recipient is responsible for ensuring that all necessary permits and environmental documents are prepared and that clearances are obtained from the appropriate agencies.

#### 14. Equipment

Title to equipment acquired by the Recipient with grant funds will vest in the Recipient. The Recipient may use the equipment in the project or program for which it was acquired as long as needed, regardless of whether the project or program continues to be supported by grant funds. However, the Recipient may not sell, lease, or encumber the property (i.e., place a legal burden on the property such as a lien) during the Agreement term without Energy Commission Staff's prior written approval.

The Recipient may refer to the applicable federal regulations incorporated by reference in this Agreement for guidance regarding additional equipment requirements.

#### 15. Stop Work

Energy Commission staff may, at any time by written notice to the Recipient, require the Recipient to stop all or any part of the work tasks in this Agreement. Stop work orders may be issued for reasons such as a project exceeding budget, noncompliance with the standard of performance, out of scope work, project delays, and misrepresentations.

- a. Compliance. Upon receipt of a stop work order, the Recipient must immediately take all necessary steps to comply with the order and to stop the incurrence of costs allocable to the Energy Commission.
- b. Canceling a Stop Work Order. The Recipient may resume the work only upon receipt of written instructions from Energy Commission staff.

#### 16. Termination

#### a. Purpose

Because the Energy Commission is a state entity and provides funding on behalf of all California ratepayers, it must be able to terminate the Agreement upon the default of the Recipient and to proceed with the work required under the Agreement in any manner it deems proper. The Recipient agrees that upon any of the events triggering the termination of the Agreement by the Energy Commission, the Energy Commission has the right to terminate the Agreement, and it would constitute bad faith of the Recipient to interfere with the immediate termination of the Agreement by the Energy Commission.

#### b. With Cause

The Energy Commission may, for cause, terminate this Agreement upon giving five (5) calendar days advance written notice to the Recipient. In this event, the Recipient will use all reasonable efforts to mitigate its expenses and obligations. The Recipient will relinquish possession of equipment purchased for this Agreement with Energy Commission funds to the Commission, or the Recipient may purchase the equipment as provided by the terms of this Agreement, with approval of the Energy Commission.

The term "for cause" includes but is not limited to the following:

- Partial or complete loss of match funds;
- Reorganization to a business entity unsatisfactory to the Energy Commission;
- Retention or hiring of subcontractors, or replacement or addition of personnel, that fail to perform to the standards and requirements of this Agreement;
- The Recipient's inability to pay its debts as they become due and/or the Recipient's default of an obligation that impacts its ability to perform under this Agreement; or
- Significant change in state or Energy Commission policy such that the work or product being funded would not be supported by the Commission.

#### c. Without Cause

The Energy Commission may terminate this Agreement without cause upon giving thirty (30) days advance written notice to the Recipient. In this event, the Recipient will use all reasonable efforts to mitigate its expenses and obligations.

#### 17. Indemnification

To the extent allowed under California law, the Recipient will indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the state (including the Energy Commission) and state officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims and losses in connection with the performance of this Agreement.

- 18. Reserved
- 19. Reserved
- 20. Intellectual Property

a. The Energy Commission makes no claim to intellectual property developed under this Agreement that is not specified for delivery, except as expressly provided herein.

"Intellectual property" means: (a) inventions, technologies, designs, drawings, data, software, formulas, compositions, processes, techniques, works of authorship, trademarks, service marks, and logos that are created, conceived, discovered, made, developed, altered, or reduced to practice with Agreement or match funds during or after the Agreement term; (b) any associated proprietary rights to these items, such as patent and copyright; and (c) any upgrades or revisions to these items.

"Works of authorship" does not include written products created for Agreement reporting and management purposes, such as reports, summaries, lists, letters, agendas, schedules, and invoices.

b. The Energy Commission owns all products identified in the Scope of Work, with the exception of products that fall within the definition of "intellectual property."

"**Product**" means any tangible item specified for delivery to the Energy Commission in the Scope of Work.

c. Both the Energy Commission and the California Public Utilities Commission have a no-cost, non-exclusive, transferable, irrevocable, royalty-free, worldwide, perpetual license to use, publish, translate, modify, and reproduce intellectual property for governmental purposes, including but not limited to providing data and reports to the California Public Utilities Commission, State legislature, and Utilities and using data for the development of future programs.

#### d. Intellectual Property Indemnity

The Recipient may not, in supplying work under this Agreement, knowingly infringe or misappropriate any intellectual property right of a third party, and will take reasonable actions to avoid infringement.

To the extent allowed under California law, the Recipient will defend and indemnify the Energy Commission and the California Public Utilities Commission from and against any claim, lawsuit, or other proceeding, loss, cost, liability, or expense (including court costs and reasonable fees of attorneys and other professionals) to the extent arising out of: (i) any third party claim that a product infringes any patent, copyright, trade secret, or other intellectual property right of any third party; or (ii) any third party claim arising out of the negligent or other tortious acts or omissions by the Recipient or its employees, subcontractors, or agents in connection with or related to the products or the Recipient's performance under this Agreement.

#### 21. Reserved

#### 22. General Provisions

a. Governing Law

This Agreement is governed by the laws of the State of California as to interpretation and performance.

#### b. <u>Independent Capacity</u>

In the performance of this Agreement, the Recipient and its agents, subcontractors, and employees will act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees, or agents of the State of California.

#### c. <u>Assignment</u>

This Agreement is not assignable or transferable by the Recipient either in whole or in part without the consent of the Energy Commission in the form of an amendment.

#### d. <u>Timeliness</u>

Time is of the essence in this Agreement.

#### e. <u>Severability</u>

If any provision of this Agreement is unenforceable or held to be unenforceable, all other provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect.

#### f. Waiver

No waiver of any breach of this Agreement constitutes waiver of any other breach. All remedies in this Agreement will be taken and construed as cumulative, meaning in addition to every other remedy provided in the Agreement or by law.

#### g. <u>Assurances</u>

The Commission reserves the right to seek further written assurances from the Recipient and its team that the work under this Agreement will be performed in accordance with the terms of the Agreement.

#### h. Change in Business

- 1) The Recipient will promptly notify the Energy Commission of the occurrence of any of the following:
  - a) A change of address.
  - b) A change in business name or ownership.
  - c) The existence of any litigation or other legal proceeding affecting the project or Agreement.
  - d) The occurrence of any casualty or other loss to project personnel, equipment, or third parties.
  - e) Receipt of notice of any claim or potential claim against the Recipient for patent, copyright, trademark, service mark, and/or trade secret infringement that could affect the Energy Commission's rights.
- 2) The Recipient must provide the CalSHAPE Program with written notice of a planned change or reorganization of the type of business entity under which it does business. A change of business entity or name change requires an amendment assigning or novating the Agreement to the changed entity. If the Energy Commission does not seek to amend this Agreement or enter into a new agreement with the changed or new entity for any reason (including that the Commission is not satisfied that the new entity can perform in the same manner as the Recipient), it may terminate this Agreement as provided in the "Termination" section.

## i. <u>Access to Sites and Records</u>

Energy Commission and California Public Utilities Commission staff and representatives will have reasonable access to all project sites and to all records related to this Agreement.

#### j. <u>Prior Dealings, Custom, or Trade Usage</u>

These terms and conditions may not be modified or supplemented by prior dealings, custom, or trade usage.

#### k. Survival of Terms

Certain provisions will survive the completion or termination date of this Agreement for any reason. The provisions include but are not limited to:

- Legal Statements on Products (included in Section 5, "Products")
- Payment of Funds (Section 8)
- Recordkeeping, Cost Accounting, and Auditing (Section 11)
- Equipment (Section 14)
- Termination (Section 16)
- Indemnification (Section 17)
- Intellectual Property (Section 20)
- Change in Business (see this section)
- Access to Sites and Records (see this section)

#### 23. Certifications and Compliance

a. Federal, State, and Local Laws

The Recipient must obtain all required permits and shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, codes, rules, and regulations for all work performed under the Agreement.

#### b. Nondiscrimination Statement of Compliance

During the performance of this Agreement, the Recipient and its subcontractors will not unlawfully discriminate, harass, or allow harassment against any employee or applicant for employment because of sex, sexual orientation, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), mental disability, medical condition, age, marital status, or denial of family care leave. The Recipient and its subcontractors will ensure that the evaluation and treatment of their employees and applicants for employment are free from such discrimination and harassment.

The Recipient and its subcontractors will comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code Sections 12990 et seq.) and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder (California Code of Regulations, Title 2, Section 11000 et seq.). The applicable regulations of the Fair Employment and Housing Commission implementing Government Code Section 12990 (a-f), set forth in Chapter 5 of Division 4.1 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations, are incorporated into this Agreement by reference and made a part of it as if set forth in full. The Recipient and its subcontractors will give written notice of their obligations under this section to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other Agreement.

The Recipient will include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this section in all subcontracts to perform work under this Agreement.

c. Drug-Free Workplace Certification

By signing this Agreement, the Recipient certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that it will comply with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code Section 8350 et seq.) and will provide a drug-free workplace by taking the following actions:

- 1) Publish a statement notifying employees that unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited, and specifying actions to be taken against employees for violations as required by Government Code Section 8355(a).
- 2) Establish a Drug-Free Awareness Program as required by Government Code Section 8355(b) to inform employees about all of the following:
  - The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
  - The person's or organization's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
  - Any available counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
  - Penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations.
- 3) Provide, as required by Government Code Section 8355(c), that every employee who works on the proposed project:
  - Will receive a copy of the company's drug-free policy statement; and
  - Will agree to abide by the terms of the company's statement as a condition of employment on the project.

Failure to comply with these requirements may result in suspension of payments under the Agreement or termination of the Agreement or both, and the Recipient may be ineligible for any future state awards if the Commission determines that any of the following has occurred: (1) the Recipient has made false certification, or (2) violates the certification by failing to carry out the requirements as noted above.

d. National Labor Relations Board Certification (Not applicable to public entities)

The Recipient, by signing this Agreement, swears under penalty of perjury that no more than one final unappealable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has been issued against the Recipient within the immediately preceding two year period because of the Recipient's failure to comply with an order of a federal court that orders the Recipient to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board.

e. Child Support Compliance Act (Applicable to California Employers)

For any agreement in excess of \$100,000, the Recipient acknowledges that:

1) It recognizes the importance of child and family support obligations and will fully comply with all applicable state and federal laws relating to child and family support enforcement, including but not limited to disclosure of information and compliance with earnings assignment orders, as provided in Chapter 8 (commencing with section 5200) of Part 5 of Division 9 of the Family Code; and

2) To the best of its knowledge is fully complying with the earnings assignment orders of all employees and is providing the names of all new employees to the New Hire Registry maintained by the California Employment Development Department.

#### f. Air or Water Pollution Violation

Under state laws, the Recipient will not be:

- 1) In violation of any order or resolution not subject to review promulgated by the State Air Resources Board or an air pollution control district;
- 2) Subject to a cease and desist order not subject to review issued pursuant to Section 13301 of the Water Code for violation of waste discharge requirements or discharge prohibitions; or
- 3) Finally determined to be in violation of provisions of federal law relating to air or water pollution.

#### g. Americans With Disabilities Act

By signing this Agreement, the Recipient assures the State that it complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 (42 U.S.C. Section 12101, et seq.), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to the ADA.

#### 24. Reserved

#### 25. Commission Remedies for Recipient's Non-Compliance

Without limiting any of its other remedies, the Commission may, for Recipient's noncompliance of any Agreement requirement, withhold future payments, demand and be entitled to repayment of past reimbursements, or suspend or terminate this Agreement. The tasks in the Scope of Work are non-severable, and completion of all of them is material to this Agreement. Thus, the Commission, without limiting its other remedies, is entitled to repayment of all funds paid to Recipient if the Recipient does not timely complete all tasks in the Scope of Work.

#### 26. Definitions

- **Agreement Term** means the length of this Agreement, as specified on the Agreement signature page (form CEC-146).
- **Data** means any recorded information that relates to the project funded by the Agreement, whether created or collected before or after the Agreement's effective date.
- **Effective Date** means the date on which this Agreement is signed by the last party required to sign, provided that signature occurs after the Agreement has been approved by the Energy Commission at a business meeting or by the Executive Director or his/her designee.

- **Equipment** means products, objects, machinery, apparatus, implements, or tools that are purchased or constructed with Energy Commission funds for the project, and that have a useful life of at least one year and an acquisition unit cost of at least \$5,000. "Equipment" includes products, objects, machinery, apparatus, implements, or tools that are composed by over thirty percent (30%) of materials purchased for the project. For purposes of determining depreciated value of equipment used in the Agreement, the project will terminate at the end of the normal useful life of the equipment purchased and/or developed with Energy Commission funds. The Energy Commission may determine the normal useful life of the equipment.
- Intellectual Property means: (a) inventions, technologies, designs, drawings, data, software, formulas, compositions, processes, techniques, works of authorship, trademarks, service marks, and logos that are created, conceived, discovered, made, developed, altered, or reduced to practice with Agreement or match funds during or after the Agreement term; (b) any associated proprietary rights to these items, such as patent and copyright; and (c) any upgrades or revisions to these items.

"Works of authorship" does not include written products created for Agreement reporting and management purposes, such as reports, summaries, lists, letters, agendas, schedules, and invoices.

- Invention means intellectual property that is patentable.
- Match Funds means cash or in-kind (i.e., non-cash) contributions provided by the Recipient or a third party for a project funded by the Energy Commission. If this Agreement resulted from a solicitation, refer to the solicitation's discussion of match funding for guidelines specific to the project.
- Materials means the substances used to construct, or as part of, a finished object, commodity, device, article, or product and that does not meet the definition of Equipment.
- **Ownership** means exclusive possession of all rights to property, including the right to use and transfer property.
- Product means any tangible item specified for delivery to the Energy Commission in the Scope of Work.
- **Project** means the entire effort undertaken and planned by the Recipient and consisting of the work funded by the Energy Commission. The project may coincide with or extend beyond the Agreement term.
- **State** means the state of California and all California state agencies within it, including but not limited to commissions, boards, offices, and departments.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to approve Amendment No. 2 to the agreement with Veregy Pacific, LLC ("Veregy"), originally endorsed on October 11, 2023. This amendment pertains to services and works authorized and funded through the School Energy Efficiency Stimulus Program, known as the "CalSHAPE Program." The proposed amendment will approve Veregy's proposed Scope of Work for the CalSHAPE Upgrade and Repair (U & R) Grant implementation on behalf of the district.

## **Rationale:**

The California Legislature created the CalSHAPE Program to establish two grant programs: (i) the School Reopening Ventilation and Energy Efficiency Verification and Repair Program ("CalSHAPE Ventilation Program"), which provides funding to school districts to assess, maintain, and repair ventilation systems; and (ii) the School Noncompliant Plumbing Fixture and Appliance Program ("CalSHAPE Plumbing Program"), which provides funding to school districts to replace aging and inefficient plumbing fixtures and appliances with water-conserving plumbing fixtures and appliances. The District applied for and was awarded CalSHAPE Program grants for Phase 1 (Rounds 1 and 4), which the District intends to use to enhance the health and safety of the District's school facilities and make the District's future energy-related costs.

## **Background:**

The California Energy Commission issued guidelines for implementing the CalSHAPE Program, which requires various professional assessment, maintenance, and construction services. District staff recognized that a formal competitive bidding process would not be efficient or practical due to the need for preliminary assessments before determining the scope of work and the diverse nature of the required services. Furthermore, coordinating multiple contracts for these interconnected services would impair cost-effectiveness. Consequently, the District issued Request for Qualifications No. Q23-301 titled "CalSHAPE Program Implementation Services" ("CalSHAPE RFQ") to select a qualified firm to perform all required services and work. The evaluation criteria and committee comprised of District personnel and consultants were established to assess the responses. Two

contractors submitted responses, and after evaluation, Veregy was deemed the most suitable for the District's interests.

## **Budget Implication (\$ Amount):**

The amounts payable to Veregy will be paid using the CalSHAPE Program grants provided by the State of California.

## **Legal References:**

Public Utilities Code ("PUC") Section 1600 et seq. establishes the CalSHAPE Program, and the California Energy Commission has promulgated guidelines to implement the CalSHAPE Program.

1.1 This Amendment #2 dated April 17, 2024 (the "Effective Date") shall amend the Agreement, including all Attachments, Exhibits, and Schedules referenced herein (hereinafter the "Agreement") dated October 11, 2023 (the "Effective Date") by and between Veregy Pacific, LLC, referred to as "Veregy" with a principal place of business at 3090 Bristol Street, Suite 400, Costa Mesa, CA 92626, and Monrovia Unified School District ("CUSTOMER") with a principal place of business at 325 E Huntington Drive, Monrovia, CA 91016 (collectively the "Parties").

#### SCOPE OF WORK AND SCHEDULE

The Scope of Work is outlined in Attachment A and the schedule has been outlined in Attachment B.

#### PRICE AND PAYMENT

The price for the Work shall not exceed Six Million Dollars (\$6,000,000) in total CalSHAPE Phase II grant amount and the final service agreement amount will be the grant amount as approved in the California Energy Commission (CEC) Upgrade and Repair (U&R) Grant NOPA (Notice of proposed award).

#### SUBSEQUENT PHASES OF WORK

Additions and modifications to this Agreement may be made upon the mutual agreement of both Parties in writing. The Parties contemplate that such modifications may include but are not limited to the installation of additional improvement measures, facility improvement measures, or furnishing of additional services within the identified facilities, as well as other facilities owned and operated by the Customer.

If the Work is divided into phases or individual projects for which individual prices have been negotiated, then separate Commencement Dates shall apply to each phase or individual project. These projects, modifications, and modifications to the original scope of Work or Services may be included as addendums to the Master Agreement.

#### SCOPE OF WORK

#### Veregy shall:

- 1. Apply for the CalSHAPE U&R Grant on behalf of the district.
- 2. Complete the installation of equipment as required by the CalSHAPE U&R Grant that has been awarded to the CUSTOMER by the CEC.
- 3. VEREGY represents and warrants it has read and is familiar with the CalSHAPE Program Guidelines ("Guidelines") established by the California Energy Commission ("CEC"). VEREGY shall cooperate with and assist CUSTOMER in complying with the Guidelines, as applicable and appropriate and as more fully set forth in Attachment A. At CUSTOMER's request, VEREGY shall provide a contractor estimate as required in the Guidelines and attach the contractor estimate as part of Attachment A hereto.
- 4. VEREGY shall comply with federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and industry standards, including the most up-to-date California Energy Commission CalSHAPE Program Guidelines (Fourth Edition), as applicable.

#### Inclusions:

- A. As further detailed below, the repairs, upgrades, or replacements of systems eligible to be performed as part of a U&R Grant project shall include as detailed in the NOPA:
  - a. Correct a deficiency that is noted in an HVAC Assessment Report. If so, these deficiencies shall be recommended by a licensed professional to meet minimum ventilation and filtration rate requirements or as cost-effective energy efficiency repairs, upgrades, or replacements.
  - b. Electric Equipment. HVAC systems installed as part of a U&R Grant project must include equipment that meets one of the following, unless otherwise stated in the notice of funding availability issued by the CEC as described in Chapter 6.A. of the Guidelines:
    - i. All electric equipment.
    - ii. Electric equipment with a hybrid heating system. i) The LEA must submit a licensed professional recommendation for a hybrid heating system to justify the use of hybrid heating instead of an all-electric system.
    - iii. The manufacturer and model number of the HVAC system that will be installed as part of the project must be provided in the application to confirm that the equipment is eligible. This requirement for all electric equipment, or electric equipment with a hybrid heating system, applies to replacements only. The repairs or upgrades to existing HVAC systems may be performed on gas equipment if the gas equipment was a part of the HVAC system in place prior to the start of the project.
- B. Energy and Building Standards: All upgrade, repair, and replacement work performed as part of a U&R grant project must comply with Part 6 (commencing with Section 100.0) of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations.
  - All appliances and equipment must be installed per manufacturer's instructions and applicable code requirements. Additionally, all equipment installed in a U&R grant project must be listed in the CEC's Modernized Appliance Efficiency Database System (MAEDbS) (https://cacertappliances.energy.ca.gov/Login.aspx), which contains publicly accessible lists of appliances that have been certified by the CEC.
- C. Mechanical Acceptance Testing: All U&R Grant project work must have an acceptance test performed as required in Section 120.5 of Part 6 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations. The acceptance test must be performed by an HVAC acceptance test technician certified by an Acceptance Test Technician Certification Provider (ATTCP) to complete the forms set forth in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 10-103.2 of Part 1 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations
- D. Proper Disposal/Recycling Requirements: All HVAC system parts, units, or both replaced as part of a U&R Grant project shall be disposed of in compliance with all state and local laws, regulations, ordinances, and other requirements. All replaced HVAC system parts and units are to be removed from service as part of this program and are not to be resold or reinstalled.

All terms set forth in this Attachment A shall have the meanings and interpreted as set forth in the CEC Guidelines.

Exclusions: Scope of work outside of the U&R Grant obligations.

#### <u>U&R Grants Project Completion and Reporting:</u>

Veregy shall comply with reporting requirements outlined in California Schools Healthy Air, Plumbing and Efficiency Ventilation Program Guidelines (Fourth edition), chapter 7 on behalf of the customer and will require the District's cooperation and support.

Specifically, as outlined in Chapter 7, Veregy shall:

Provide the following to CUSTOMER upon request:

- 1. Project status.
- 2. Expected completion date.
- 3. Qualifications of the individuals selected to work on the project. This information is required to demonstrate that all work performed complies with the applicable skilled and trained workforce and other labor requirements.
- 4. Documentation, if any, prepared by a licensed professional that provides additional design, detail, or specification information to the recommendations provided with the A&M Grant final reporting on the repairs, upgrades, or replacements that were approved to be performed as part of the project.
- 5. Information on the intended use or use of the design contingency funds, including a detailed site-specific description and, if available, any estimates, quotes, contracts, or invoices that show the amount of funds the grantee intends to use or has incurred.

During the Work, VEREGY shall conduct the Work and undertake such efforts as will assist CUSTOMER in complying with the Final Reporting requirements of Chapter 7 of the program Guidelines, including the following:

- 1. The Project Completion Report as specified in Chapter 5.E. of the Program Guidelines.
- 2. Final invoice(s) and any other supporting documentation for all expended grant funds up to the original grant award amount for each site. The invoices must provide site-specific information and be itemized to show both the material and labor costs for the project work as described in the grant agreement.
- 3. Any reporting required to determine compliance with PUC Section 1618 or the California Climate Investments, as described in Section B above, to calculate or confirm energy savings or reduction in greenhouse gas emissions resulting from the project.
- 4. The LEA self-certifies:
  - a. It followed the program guidelines.
  - b. The information included in the final document package is true and correct to the best of the its knowledge.
  - c. All California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requirements are completed.
  - It has obtained any required DSA project approvals as applicable under California Code Regulations, Title 24.
  - e. It acknowledges that the expended funds may be subject to an audit, including a financial audit.
  - f. It complied with all reporting requirements.
  - g. It complied with all Assessment and Maintenance Grant terms and conditions.
  - h. It has disposed of or recycled all replaced HVAC system units and parts incompliance with its own policies or other applicable state and local requirements, including end-of-life management and recycling requirements.

- i. It complied with all skilled and trained workforce and other labor requirements.
- j. All DIR requirements for public works, including payment of prevailing wages, were followed.
- k. It commits to participate with the CEC or its delegate in the assessment of energy savings or GHG emission reductions, including providing access to project sites and project and equipment information.
- 1. It acknowledges that it may be subject to a post program site visit and measurement and evaluation study conducted by the CEC or its delegate.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE MONROVIA UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND THE CALIFORNIA SCHOOL EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION AND ITS MONROVIA CHAPTER 20 (CSEA)

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is entered into between the Monrovia Unified School District (District) and the California School Employees Association and its Monrovia Chapter 20 (CSEA) collectively "the Parties" regarding a shift of all CSEA represented members moving to a single salary schedule.

Background: This MOU is entered into by the Parties to eradicate pay differences between the two salary schedules currently in existence, and create one salary schedule for the CSEA bargaining unit moving forward.

The Parties will shift CSEA unit members that work less than twelve (12) months to the same salary schedule as unit members that work twelve (12) months effective July 1, 2024. This salary schedule reflects an ongoing compensation increase to members that work less than twelve (12) months of .54%.

Additionally, unit members that work less than twelve (12) months, currently employed at the time of this MOU's ratification will receive a one-time .54% retroactive pay at the rate of the unit members' 2022-23 base pay, if employed at any time during the 2022-23 school year. Unit members that work less than twelve (12) months and are currently employed will also receive one-time .54% retroactive pay at the rate of the unit members 2023-24 base pay. The retroactive pay for the respective years is the equivalent to one additional day of pay at the unit members rate of pay. Both one-time payments will be prorated based on the unit member's hire date and days worked in the respective year. Both one-time payments shall be made to unit members by July 30, 2024.

This MOU shall be subject to Article V: Grievance Procedure of the Parties' collective bargaining agreement (CBA). Any alleged violation of this MOU shall begin at Step I of the grievance procedure outlined in Article V: Grievance Procedure of the CBA.

This MOU is subject to approval by the Monrovia Unified School Board and CSEA Policy 610. The Parties may mutually agree to meet on or before June 30,2024 to determine if the provisions of this MOU should be revised.

#### **Rationale:**

In accordance with Elections Code section 10010, input regarding the criteria for the composition of trustee area maps should be received and considered in the event the Board approves a transition to by-trustee area elections pursuant to Education Code sections 5019 and 5020. The Board invites public testimony regarding this matter.

#### **Background:**

The CVRA is a state law that prohibits at-large voting systems that impair the ability of racial or ethnic minorities to elect the candidate of their choice. The CVRA favors district-based election systems in which candidates must reside in a trustee area, and only the voters residing in that trustee area vote for those candidates. To avoid the potential for litigation and the cost of attorney fees, the Board is considering modifying the current election system and establishing a district-based system for the 2024 election. This means that beginning in 2024, voters in those trustee areas up for election in 2024 will vote for one candidate in their trustee area, and the remaining trustees will hold an election in 2026.

#### **Rationale:**

The California Voting Rights Act of 2001 (CVRA) expands on the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, making it easier for minority groups in California to prove that their votes are being diluted in "at-large" elections. The Board of Education is aware that under state law, an at-large method of election may be deemed to impair the ability of some voters to elect candidates of their choice or to influence the outcome of elections and, therefore, may be subject to challenge under the California Voting Rights Act of 2001, California Elections Code. This resolution directs the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee to initiate the legal and regulatory process, including the retention of counsel and demographic experts, to establish trustee areas within the District, as provided in Education Code section 5019, in sufficient time for trustee areas to be established for the November, 2024 election of members of the Board, if possible; and directs the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee to immediately initiate the legal and regulatory process of changing the method of electing members of the Board, from the current at-large system whereby each member of the Board is elected by the registered voters of the entire District (Education Code section 5030(a)), to a method which provides that the Board members residing in each trustee will be elected by the registered voters of that particular trustee area (Education Code 5030(b)), in sufficient time for the new method of electing members of the Board to be in place for the November, 2024 election, if possible; and authorizes and directs the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee to initiate the legal and regulatory process to seek a waiver from the Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization, of the requirements of Education Code section 5020 and related statutes, so that action of the Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization establishing trustee election areas and adopting one of the alternative methods of electing Board members specified in Education Code section 5030 does not constitute an order of election, so that trustee area elections can commence effective with the November, 2024 elections.

#### **Background:**

The CVRA was implemented in 2002 as part of State law. Districts with at-large voting structures may violate CVRA if they have what is called racially polarizing voting, which may impede minority candidates from succeeding in elections. If there is evidence of undermining of voting rights or indications of racially polarized voting, a violation of the CVRA may be found.

("CVRA"); and

WHEREAS, the Board, based on this awareness, has had an ongoing interest in the issue, and has decided to initiate the process of establishing trustee areas and changing the method of electing members of the Board, in order to ensure compliance with the CVRA or, at minimum, avoid the potential for costly litigation under the CVRA; and

WHEREAS, transitioning to a by-trustee area election method is a time consuming and lengthy process, which requires considerable public input, and the involvement of the Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization; and

WHEREAS, the Board intends to complete the process of changing to the by-trustee area election methodology, and hold its initial by-trustee area election of Board members, commencing with the November, 2024 election.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Monrovia Unified School District hereby finds the foregoing recitals to be true and correct; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board directs the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee to initiate the legal and regulatory process, including the retention of counsel and demographic experts, to establish trustee areas within the District, as provided in Education Code section 5019, in sufficient time for trustee areas to be established for the November, 2024 election of members of the Board, if possible; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board directs the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee to immediately initiate the legal and regulatory process of changing the method of electing members of the Board, from the current at-large system whereby each member of the Board is elected by the registered voters of the entire District (Education Code section 5030(a)), to a method which provides that the Board members residing in each trustee will be elected by the registered voters of that particular trustee area (Education Code 5030(b)), in sufficient time for the new method of electing members of the Board to be in place for the November, 2024 election, if possible; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee is authorized and directed to initiate the legal and regulatory process to seek a waiver from the Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization, of the requirements of Education Code section 5020 and related statutes, so that action of the Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization establishing trustee election areas and adopting one of the alternative methods of electing Board members specified in Education Code section 5030 does not constitute an order of election, so that trustee area elections can commence effective with the November, 2024 election; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee attempt to initiate and carry out the legal and regulatory process, including required public hearings, in time for the Board to take final action on a District trustee area map, for submission to the County Committee on School District Organization; and

BE IT FURTHER AND FINALLY RESOLVED that this Resolution supersedes prior Resolutions related to establish by-district votes and that the Superintendent is authorized to do all things necessary and proper to accomplish the purposes of this Resolution.

## 1. BOARD POLICY 5145.3, NONDISCRIMINATION/HARRASSMENT, AND ITS ACCOMPANYING ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to receive for first reading Board Policy 5145.3, *Nondiscrimination/Harassment*, and its accompanying Administrative Regulation as recommended by the California School Boards Association (CSBA).

#### **Rationale:**

As part of the Board of Education's commitment to review and update all Monrovia Unified School District Board Policies and Administrative Regulations, Student Support Services has begun a review of the department's Board Policies and Administrative Regulations. The current Board Policy does not reflect any updates since 2013. In addition, Monrovia Unified does not have 5145.3 Administrative Regulations.

#### **Background:**

School districts receive regular policy updates from the California School Boards Association, which are compared to existing policies to determine the extent of modification needed. This policy contains revisions recommended by CSBA for Board Policy and Administrative Regulations 5145.3, Non-Discrimination/Harassment. This Board Policy was last updated on June 26, 2013. Administrative Regulations are not currently available, and this will, therefore, be a new Administrative Regulation.

#### NONDISCRIMINATION/HARASSMENT

The district designates the individual identified below as the employee responsible for coordinating the district's efforts to comply with applicable state and federal civil rights laws and to answer inquiries regarding the district's nondiscrimination policies. The individual shall also serve as the compliance officer specified in AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures as the responsible employee to handle complaints alleging unlawful discrimination targeting a student, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, based on the student's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental disability, medical condition, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, genetic information, or any other legally protected status or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics. The coordinator/compliance officer may be contacted at: (Education Code 234.1; 5 CCR 4621)

#### **Measures to Prevent Discrimination**

To prevent unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, and bullying, of students at district schools or in school activities and to ensure equal access of all students to the educational program, the Superintendent or designee shall implement the following measures:

- Publicize the district's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures, including the coordinator/compliance officer's contact information, to students, parents/guardians, employees, volunteers, and the general public by posting them in prominent locations and providing easy access to them through district-supported communications
- 2. Post the district's policies and procedures prohibiting discrimination, harassment, student sexual harassment, intimidation, bullying, and cyberbullying, including a section on social media bullying that includes all of the references described in Education Code 234.6 as possible forums for social media, in a prominent location on the district's web site in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students (Education Code 234.6)
- 3. Post the definition of sex discrimination and harassment as described in Education Code 230, including the rights set forth in Education Code 221.8, in a prominent location on the district's website in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students (Education Code 234.6)
- 4. Post in a prominent location on the district website in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students information regarding Title IX

prohibitions against discrimination based on a student's sex, gender, gender identity, pregnancy, and parental status, including the following: (Education Code 221.6, 221.61, 234.6)

- a. The name and contact information of the district's Title IX Coordinator, including the phone number and email address
- b. The rights of students and the public and the responsibilities of the district under Title IX, including a list of rights as specified in Education Code 221.8 and web links to information about those rights and responsibilities located on the web sites of the Office for Equal Opportunity and the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR)
- c. A description of how to file a complaint of noncompliance under Title IX, which shall include:
  - i. An explanation of the statute of limitations within which a complaint must be filed after an alleged incident of discrimination has occurred and how a complaint may be filed beyond the statute of limitations
  - ii. An explanation of how the complaint will be investigated and how the complainant may further pursue the complaint, including web links to this information on the OCR's website
  - A web link to the OCR complaints form and the contact information for the office, including the phone number and email address for the office
- d. A link to the Title IX information included on the California Department of Education's (CDE) website
- 5. Post a link to statewide CDE-compiled resources, including community-based organizations, that provide support to youth who have been subjected to school-based discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying and to their families. Such resources shall be posted in a prominent location on the district's website in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students. (Education Code 234.5, 234.6)
- Provide students with a handbook that contains age-appropriate information that clearly describes the district's nondiscrimination policy, procedures for filing a complaint, and resources available to students who feel that they have been a victim of any such behavior.
- 7. Annually notify all students and parents/guardians of the district's nondiscrimination policy, including its responsibility to provide a safe, nondiscriminatory school environment for all students. The notice shall inform students and parents/guardians that they may request to meet with the compliance officer to determine how best to accommodate or resolve concerns that may arise from the district's implementation of its nondiscrimination policies. The notice shall also inform all students and parents/guardians that, to the extent possible, the district will address any individual student's interests and concerns in private.

- 8. Ensure that students and parents/guardians, including those with limited English proficiency, are notified of how to access the relevant information provided in the district's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures, notices, and forms in a language they can understand.
  - If 15 percent or more of students enrolled in a particular district school speak a single primary language other than English, the district's policy, regulation, forms, and notices concerning nondiscrimination shall be translated into that language in accordance with Education Code 234.1 and 48985. In all other instances, the district shall ensure meaningful access to all relevant information for parents/guardians with limited English proficiency.
- 9. Provide to students, employees, volunteers, and parents/guardians age-appropriate training and/or information regarding the district's nondiscrimination policy; what constitutes prohibited discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying; how and to whom a report of an incident should be made; and how to guard against segregating or stereotyping students when providing instruction, guidance, supervision, or other services to them. Such training and information shall include details of guidelines the district may use to provide a discrimination-free environment for all district students.
- 10. At the beginning of each school year, inform school employees that any employee who witnesses any act of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, against a student is required to intervene if it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)
- 11. At the beginning of each school year, inform each principal or designee of the district's responsibility to provide appropriate assistance or resources to protect students from threatened or potentially discriminatory behavior and ensure their privacy rights.

#### **Enforcement of District Policy**

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate actions to reinforce BP 5145.3 - Nondiscrimination/Harassment. As needed, these actions may include any of the following:

- 1. Removing vulgar or offending graffiti
- 2. Providing training to students, staff, and parents/guardians about how to recognize unlawful discrimination, how to report it or file a complaint, and how to respond
- Disseminating and/or summarizing the district's policy and regulation regarding unlawful discrimination
- 4. Consistent with laws regarding the confidentiality of student and personnel records, communicating to students, parents/guardians, and the community the school's response plan to unlawful discrimination or harassment
- 5. Taking appropriate disciplinary action against students, employees, and anyone determined to have engaged in wrongdoing in violation of district policy, including any student who is found to have filed a complaint of discrimination that the student knew was not true

#### **Process for Initiating and Responding to Complaints**

Students who feel that they have been subjected to unlawful discrimination described above or in district policy are strongly encouraged to immediately contact the compliance officer, principal, or any other staff member. In addition, students who observe any such incident are strongly encouraged to report the incident to the compliance officer or principal, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Any school employee who observes an incident of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, or to whom such an incident is reported shall report the incident to the compliance officer or principal within a school day, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Any school employee who witnesses an incident of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

When a report of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or bullying, is made to or received by the principal or compliance officer, the principal or compliance officer shall notify the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures or, for complaints of sexual harassment that meet the federal Title IX definition, AR 5145.71 - Title IX Sexual Harassment Complaint Procedures. Once notified verbally or in writing, the compliance officer shall begin the investigation and shall implement immediate measures necessary to stop the discrimination and ensure that all students have access to the educational program and a safe school environment. Any interim measures adopted to address unlawful discrimination shall, to the extent possible, not disadvantage the complainant or a student who is the victim of the alleged unlawful discrimination.

Any report or complaint alleging unlawful discrimination by the principal, compliance officer, or any other person to whom a report would ordinarily be made or complaint filed shall instead be made to or filed with the Superintendent or designee, who shall determine how the complaint will be investigated.

## Issues Unique to Intersex, Nonbinary, Transgender, and Gender-Nonconforming Students

The gender identity of a student means the student's gender-related identity, appearance, or behavior as determined from the student's internal sense, whether or not that gender-related identity, appearance, or behavior is different from that traditionally associated with the student's physiology or assigned sex at birth.

Gender expression means a student's gender-related appearance and behavior, whether stereotypically associated with the student's assigned sex at birth. (Education Code 210.7)

Gender transition refers to the process in which a student changes from living and identifying as the sex assigned to the student at birth to living and identifying as the sex

that corresponds to the student's gender identity.

A *Gender-nonconforming* student is a student whose gender expression differs from stereotypical expectations.

Intersex student means a student with natural bodily variations in anatomy, hormones, chromosomes, and other traits that differ from expectations generally associated with female and male bodies.

Nonbinary student means a student whose gender identity falls outside of the traditional conception of strictly either female or male, regardless of whether or not the student identifies as transgender, was born with intersex traits, uses gender-neutral pronouns, or uses agender, genderqueer, pangender, gender nonconforming, gender variant, or such other more specific term to describe their gender.

A *Transgender student* is a student whose gender identity is different from the gender assigned at birth.

The district prohibits acts of verbal, nonverbal, or physical aggression, intimidation, or hostility that are based on sex, gender identity, or gender expression or that have the purpose or effect of producing a negative impact on the student's academic performance or of creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive educational environment, regardless of whether the acts are sexual in nature. Examples of the types of conduct which are prohibited in the district and which may constitute gender-based harassment include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Refusing to address a student by a name and the pronouns consistent with the student's gender identity
- Disciplining or disparaging a student or excluding the student from participating in activities for behavior or appearance that is consistent with the student's gender identity or that does not conform to stereotypical notions of masculinity or femininity, as applicable
- 3. Blocking a student's entry to the restroom that corresponds to the student's gender identity
- 4. Taunting a student because the student participates in an athletic activity more typically favored by a student of the other sex
- 5. Revealing a student's gender identity to individuals who do not have a legitimate need for the information without the student's consent
- 6. Using gender-specific slurs
- 7. Physically assaulting a student motivated by hostility toward the student because of the student's gender, gender identity, or gender expression

The district's uniform complaint procedures (AR 1312.3) or Title IX sexual harassment procedures (AR 5145.71), as applicable, shall be used to report and resolve complaints alleging discrimination against intersex, nonbinary, transgender, and

gender-nonconforming students.

Examples of bases for complaints include but are not limited to, the above list, as well as improper rejection by the district of a student's asserted gender identity, denial of access to facilities that correspond with a student's gender identity, improper disclosure of a student's gender identity, discriminatory enforcement of a dress code, and other instances of gender-based harassment.

To ensure that intersex, nonbinary, transgender, and gender-nonconforming students are afforded the same rights, benefits, and protections provided to all students by law and Board policy, the district shall address each situation on a case-by-case basis, in accordance with the following guidelines:

1. Right to Privacy: A student's intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconforming status is the student's private information. The district shall develop strategies to prevent unauthorized disclosure of students' private information. Such strategies may include but are not limited to collecting or maintaining information about student gender only when relevant to the educational program or activity, protecting or revealing a student's gender identity as necessary to protect the health or safety of the student, and keeping a student's unofficial record separate from the official record.

The district shall only disclose the information to others with the student's prior written consent, except when the disclosure is otherwise required by law or when the district has compelling evidence that disclosure is necessary to preserve the student's physical or mental well-being. In any case, the district shall only allow disclosure of a student's personally identifiable information to employees with a legitimate educational interest as determined by the district pursuant to 34 CFR 99.31. Any district employee to whom a student's intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconforming status is disclosed shall keep the student's information confidential. When disclosure of a student's gender identity is made to a district employee by a student, the employee shall seek the student's permission to notify the compliance officer. If the student refuses to give permission, the employee shall keep the student's information confidential unless the employee is required to disclose or report the student's information pursuant to this administrative regulation and shall inform the student that honoring the student's request may limit the district's ability to meet the student's needs related to the student's status as an intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconforming student. If the student permits the employee to notify the compliance officer, the employee shall do so within three school days.

Given the student's need for support, the compliance officer may discuss with the student any need to disclose the student's intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconformity status or gender identity or gender expression to the student's parents/guardians and/or others, including other students, teacher(s), or other adults on campus. The district shall offer support services, such as counseling, to students who wish to inform their parents/guardians of their status and desire assistance in doing so.

2. Determining a Student's Gender Identity: The compliance officer shall accept the student's assertion of gender identity and begin to treat the student consistent with

that gender identity unless district personnel present a credible and supportable basis for believing that the student's assertion is for an improper purpose.

- 3. Addressing a Student's Transition Needs: The compliance officer shall arrange a meeting with the student and, if appropriate, the student's parents/guardians to identify and develop strategies for ensuring that the student's access to educational programs and activities is maintained. The meeting shall discuss the intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconforming student's rights and how those rights may affect and be affected by the rights of other students and shall address specific subjects related to the student's access to facilities and to academic or educational support programs, services, or activities, including, but not limited to, sports and other competitive endeavors. In addition, the compliance officer shall identify specific school site employee(s) to whom the student may report any problem related to the student's status as an intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconforming individual, so that prompt action can be taken to address it. Alternatively, if appropriate and desired by the student, the school may form a support team for the student that will meet periodically to assess whether the arrangements for the student are meeting the student's educational needs and providing equal access to programs and activities, educate appropriate staff about the student's transition, and serve as a resource to the student to better protect the student from gender-based discrimination.
- 4. Accessibility to Sex-Segregated Facilities, Programs, and Activities: When the district maintains sex-segregated facilities, such as restrooms and locker rooms, or offers sex-segregated programs and activities, such as physical education classes, intermural sports, and interscholastic athletic programs, students shall be permitted to access facilities and participate in programs and activities consistent with their gender identity. To address any student's privacy concerns in using sex-segregated facilities, the district shall offer available options such as a gender-neutral or single-use restroom or changing area, a bathroom stall with a door, an area in the locker room separated by a curtain or screen, or use of the locker room before or after the other students. However, the district shall not require a student to utilize these options because the student is intersex, nonbinary, transgender, or gender-nonconforming. In addition, a student shall be permitted to participate in accordance with the student's gender identity in other circumstances where students are separated by gender, such as for class discussions, yearbook pictures, and field trips. A student's right to participate in a sex-segregated activity in accordance with the student's gender identity shall not render invalid or inapplicable any other eligibility rule established for participation in the activity.
- Student Records: Upon each student's enrollment, the district is required to maintain a mandatory permanent student record (official record) that includes the student's gender and legal name.

A student's legal name as entered on the mandatory student record required pursuant to 5 CCR 432 shall only be changed with proper documentation. A student's gender, as entered on the student's official record required pursuant to 5 CCR 432, shall only be changed with written authorization of a parent/guardian having legal custody of the student. (Education Code 49061)

However, when proper documentation or authorization, as applicable, is not

submitted with a request to change a student's legal name or gender, any change to the student's record shall be limited to the student's unofficial records, such as attendance sheets, report cards, and school identification.

- 6. Names and Pronouns: If a student so chooses, district personnel shall be required to address the student by a name and the pronoun(s) consistent with the student's gender identity, without the necessity of a court order or a change to the student's official district record. However, inadvertent slips or honest mistakes by district personnel in the use of the student's name and/or consistent pronouns will, in general, not constitute a violation of this administrative regulation or the accompanying district policy.
- 7. *Uniforms/Dress Code:* A student has the right to dress in a manner consistent with the student's gender identity, subject to any dress code adopted on a school site.

#### NONDISCRIMINATION/HARASSMENT

This policy shall apply to all acts constituting unlawful discrimination or harassment related to school activity or to school attendance occurring within a district school, to acts which occur off campus or outside of school-related or school-sponsored activities but which may have an impact or create a hostile environment at school, and to all acts of the Governing Board and the Superintendent in enacting policies and procedures that govern the district.

The Governing Board desires to provide a welcoming, safe, and supportive school environment that allows all students equal access to and opportunities in the district's academic, extracurricular, and other educational support programs, services, and activities. The Board prohibits, at any district school or school activity, unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, and bullying, targeted at ef any student by anyone, based on the student's actual or perceived race, color, ancestry, nationality, national origin, immigration status, ethnic group identification, ethnicity, age, religion, marital status, pregnancy, parental status, physical or mental attributes disability, medical condition, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, gender expression, or genetic information, or association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics.

Unlawful Prohibited discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, includes may result from physical, verbal, nonverbal, or written conduct based on any of the categories listed above. Unlawful discrimination also occurs when prohibited conduct is so severe, persistent, or pervasive that it affects a student's ability to participate in or benefit from an educational program or activity; creates an intimidating, threatening, hostile, or offensive educational environment; has the effect of substantially or unreasonably interfering with a student's academic performance; or otherwise adversely affects a student's educational opportunities.

Unlawful discrimination also includes disparate treatment of students based on one of the categories above with respect to the provision of opportunities to participate in school programs or activities or the provision or receipt of educational benefits or services.

Because unlawful discrimination may occur when disciplining students, including suspension and expulsion, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff enforce discipline rules fairly, consistently and in a non-discriminatory manner, as specified in Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5144 - Discipline, Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5144.1 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process, and Administrative Regulation 5144.2 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process (Students With Disabilities).

The Board also prohibits any form of retaliation against any individual student who reports or participates in the reporting of unlawful discrimination, files or participates in the filing of a complaint, or investigates or participates in the investigation of a complaint or report regarding an incident of alleging unlawful discrimination , harassment, intimidation, or bullying. Retaliation complaints shall be investigated and resolved in the same manner as a discrimination complaint.

The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate students' access to the educational

program by publicizing the district's nondiscrimination policy and related complaint procedures to students, parents/guardians, and employees. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall post the district's policies prohibiting discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying and other required information on the district's website in a manner that is easily accessible to parents/guardians and students, in accordance with law and the accompanying administrative regulation. (Education Code 234.1, 234.6)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide age-appropriate training and/or information to students, parents/guardians, and employees regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying, including, but not limited to, the district's nondiscrimination policy, what constitutes prohibited behavior, how to report incidents, and to whom such reports should be made on the scope and use of the policy and complaint procedures and take other measures designed to increase the school community's understanding of the requirements of law related to discrimination. The Superintendent or designee shall regularly review the implementation of the district's nondiscrimination policies and practices and, as necessary, shall take action to remove any identified barrier to student access to or participation in the district's educational program. The Superintendent or designee shall report the findings and recommendations to the Board after each review.

In providing instruction, guidance, supervision, or other services to district students, employees and volunteers shall carefully guard against segregating or stereotyping students.

The principal or designee shall develop a plan to provide students with appropriate accommodations when necessary for their protection from threatened or potentially harassing or discriminatory behavior.

Regardless of whether a complainant complies with the writing, timeline, and/or other formal filing requirements, all complaints alleging unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, shall be investigated and prompt action taken to stop the discrimination, prevent recurrence, and address any continuing effect on students.

Students who engage in unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, bullying, or retaliation, in violation of law, Board policy, or administrative regulation shall be subject to appropriate consequence or discipline, which may include up to and including counseling, suspension and/or expulsion when the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900.4. Any employee who permits or engages in prohibited discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, bullying, or retaliation, shall be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

All allegations of unlawful discrimination in district programs and activities shall be brought, investigated, and resolved in accordance with Board Policy 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

#### Record-Keeping

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of unlawful discrimination, including discriminatory harassment, intimidation, or bullying, to enable the district to monitor, address, and prevent repetitive prohibited behavior in district schools.

#### **Grievance Procedures**

The following position is designated Coordinator for Nondiscrimination to handle complaints regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and to answer inquiries regarding the district's nondiscrimination policies:

Any student who feels that he/she has been subjected to discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying should immediately contact the Coordinator, principal, or any other staff member. In addition, any student who observes any such incident should report the incident to the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

Any school employee who observes an incident of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, or to whom such an incident is reported, shall report the incident to

the Coordinator or principal, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

In addition, the employee shall immediately intervene when safe to do so.

Upon receiving a complaint of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the Coordinator shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with the district's uniform complaint procedures specified in AR 1312.2 - Uniform Complain Procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the student handbook clearly describes the district's nondiscrimination policy, procedures for filing a complaint regarding discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and the resources that are available to

students who feel that they have been the victim of any such behavior. The district's policy shall also be posted on the district web site or any other location that is easily accessible to

students.

When required pursuant to Education Code 48985, complaint forms shall be translated into

the student's primary language.

#### RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Education is requested to receive for first reading Board Policy 6146.1, High School Graduation Requirements, and its accompanying Administrative Regulation as recommended by the California School Boards Association (CSBA).

#### **Rationale:**

As part of the Board of Education's commitment to review and update all Monrovia Unified School District Board Policies and Administrative Regulations, the Educational Services Department has begun a review of the department's Board Policies and Administrative Regulations. The current Board Policy and Administrative Regulation does not reflect any update since 2008.

#### **HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

#### High School Graduation Requirements

The Governing Board desires each to prepare all Monrovia Unified School District students to obtain a high school diploma, which reflects a solid, basic core of educational experiences and prepares each student for postsecondary education and/or employment. Graduation requirements are established as a set of minimum expectations. All students are encouraged to take a course of study that exceeds these expectations and prepares students for enrollment in postsecondary education. successfully complete the high school course of study and obtain a diploma that represents their educational achievement and increases their opportunities for postsecondary education and employment.

District students shall complete graduation course requirements as specified in Education Code 51225.3. Unless exempted as provided in "Exemptions from District-Adopted Graduation Requirements," district students shall also complete other course requirements adopted by the Board. Students who are exempted from district-adopted graduation requirements shall be eligible to participate in any graduation ceremony and school activity related to graduation in which other students are eligible to participate.

#### Course Requirements: Comprehensive High School

Students shall be authorized to graduate, receive a standard diploma from Monrovia High School, and participate in the graduation ceremony ceremonies when the graduation requirements and following conditions are met:

- 1. The student has maintained a satisfactory citizenship and attendance record;
- 1.—2. The student has satisfactorily completed a curriculum, which includes not less than 220 semester credits. Students shall complete the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year unless otherwise specified:
  - a. Four courses in English (40 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
  - b. Two courses in Mathematics (20 credits; students shall complete at least one mathematics course that meets the state academic content standards for Algebra 1 or Integrated Mathematics 1. Students may complete such coursework prior to grade 9 provided that they also complete three mathematics courses, or 20 credits, in grades 9-12.) (Education Code 51224.5)

- d. Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences. (20 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- e. Three courses in social studies, world history, culture, and geography (10 credits); included United States history and geography (10 credits), a one-semester course in American government and civics (5 credits); and a one-semester course in economics (5 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- f. Two courses in visual or performing arts or a world language. For purposes of this requirement, a course in American Sign Language shall be deemed a course in world language. (20 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- g. Two courses in physical education, unless the student has been otherwise exempted pursuant to other sections of the Education Code. (20 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- h. The remaining 70 credits may come from additional academic courses or elective courses.
- 2. 3. Students must have a minimum Grade Point average of 2.0 (Calculated on the students overall-total GPA);
- 4. Students must pass the State required California High School Exit Exams; and
- 5. The provisions for instruction specified in California Administrative Code, Title 5. Section 1600, have been met.

#### Course Requirements: Alternative High Schools

Students shall be authorized to graduate, receive a standard diploma from an alternative program of the school district (Canyon Oaks High School and Mountain Park School), and participate in the graduation ceremony without regard to the length of time actually taken to complete the requirements, when the following conditions are met:

- The student has satisfactorily completed a curriculum, which includes not less than 180 semester credits for Canyon Oaks High School and 220 semester credits for Mountain Park School. Students shall complete the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year unless otherwise specified:
  - a. Four courses in English (40 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)

- b. Two courses in Mathematics (20 credits; students shall complete at least one mathematics course that meets the state academic content standards for Algebra 1 or Integrated Mathematics 1. Students may complete such coursework prior to grade 9 provided that they also complete three mathematics courses, or 20 credits, in grades 9-12.) (Education Code 51224.5)
- d. Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences. (20 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- e. Three courses in social studies, world history, culture, and geography (10 credits); included United States history and geography (10 credits), a one-semester course in American government and civics (5 credits); and a one-semester course in economics (5 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- f. Two courses in visual or performing arts or a world language. For purposes of this requirement, a course in American Sign Language shall be deemed a course in world language. (20 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- g. Two courses in physical education, unless the student has been otherwise exempted pursuant to other sections of the Education Code. (20 credits) (Education Code 51225.3)
- h. The remaining 30 credits for Canyon Oaks High School or 70 credits for Mountain Park School may come from additional academic courses or elective courses.

Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with the law.

#### **Exemptions from District-Adopted Graduation Requirements**

A foster youth, student experiencing homelessness, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, migrant student who transfers into the district or between district schools any time after completing the second year of high school, or newcomer student who is in the third or fourth year of high school shall be exempted from any graduation requirements adopted by the Board that are in addition to statewide course requirements. This exemption shall not apply if the Superintendent or designee makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to

complete the additional requirements in time to graduate by the end of the fourth year of high school.

Within 30 days of the transfer into a school by the foster youth, student experiencing homelessness, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, migrant student, or newcomer student, as applicable, the Superintendent or designee shall notify any eligible student, and others as required by law, of the availability of the exemption from local graduation requirements and whether the student qualifies for it. (Education Code 51225.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall not require or request the foster youth, student experiencing homelessness, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, migrant student, or newcomer student who is exempted from district-established graduation requirements and who completes the statewide coursework requirements before the end of the fourth year of high school, and would otherwise be entitled to remain in school, to graduate before the end of the student's fourth year of high school. (Education Code 51225.1)

If the foster youth, student experiencing homelessness, former juvenile court school student, child of a military family, migrant student, or newcomer student was not properly notified of an exemption, declined the exemption, or was not previously exempted, the student or the student's educational rights holder may request the exemption and the Superintendent or designee shall exempt the student within 30 days of the request. Any such student who at one time qualified for the exemption may request the exemption even if the student is no longer eligible. (Education Code 51225.1)

Additionally, a student with disabilities shall be eligible for an exemption from all coursework and other requirements adopted by the Board in addition to the statewide course requirements for high school graduation, if the student's individualized education program (IEP) provides for both of the following requirements: (Education Code 51225.31)

- 1. That the student is eligible to take the alternate assessment as described in Education Code 60640
- 2. That the student complete state standards aligned coursework to meet the statewide coursework specified in Education Code 51225.3

The district's responsibility to provide a free appropriate public education shall not terminate when a student with a disability who is exempted from district- adopted graduation requirements participates in graduation activities unless the IEP team, which includes the parent/guardian and student, has determined that the student has completed the high school experience. (Education Code 51225.31)

Annually, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the California Department of Education, in accordance with Education Code 51225.1, the number of students graduating from the fourth or fifth year of high school who, for the prior school year,

graduated with an exemption from district-established graduation requirements that are in addition to statewide coursework requirements.

#### **Alternative Education**

Students shall be authorized to graduate, receive a standard diploma from an alternative program of the school district (Canyon Oaks High School and Mountain Park Alternative School), and participate in graduation ceremonies without regard to the length of time actually taken to complete the requirements, when the following conditions are met:

- 1. The student has maintained a satisfactory citizenship and attendance record;
  2. The student has satisfactorily completed a curriculum, which includes not less than 220 semester credits; and
- 3. Students must pass the State required California High School Exit Exams.

#### **Certificate of High School Program Completion**

<u>A student with an Individual Education Plan (IEP)</u> who has not met the requirements for a standard diploma may be awarded a Certificate of High School Program Completion, if the student has demonstrated a satisfactory citizenship and attendance record, and if the student has met one of the following requirements:

- 1. Satisfactory completion of 220 semester units and all course work required by the course of study approved by the local governing board;
- 2. Satisfactory completion of goals and objectives and/or an alternative course of study as defined on the student's IEP; or
- 3. Satisfactory attendance in high school, participation in the instruction as prescribed on the IEP, and attainment of the objectives stated in the IEP transition plan.

Students not receiving the standard high school diploma, but earning the Certificate of High School Program Completion achievement may participate in all graduation ceremonies and activities according to the participation guidelines applied to all students.

#### **High School Exit Examination**

Each student completing grade 12 shall have successfully passed the California State High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) in language arts and mathematics as a condition of high school graduation.

Supplemental instruction will be offered to any student in grade 7-12 who does not

demonstrate "sufficient progress," as defined in Board policy, toward passing the exit exam.

Students who have not passed one or both parts of the exit exam by the end of grade 12 shall have the opportunity to receive intensive instruction and services, through an alternative program, for up to two consecutive academic years after completion of grade 12 or until they have passed both parts of the exam, whichever comes first.

In addition to intensive remedial instruction, the district will offer students who have passed all state and local graduation requirements except for passage of one or both parts of the exit exam the following options beyond their regular senior year until they pass the exam:

Enrollment in one of our alternative educational programs, such as Canyon Oaks, Mountain Park Independent Study, Adult Education completion program, and/or any additional alternative program that may be available in association with the Monrovia Unified School District.

These programs will provide intensive intervention in order to assist student to successfully pass all missing parts of the California High School Exit Exam.

The Superintendent or designee will regularly report to the Board regarding the number of students who have fulfilled all local and state graduation requirements except for the passage of the exit exam and the resources that have been offered to such students.

#### General Education Development Test

California residents who are at least 18 years old may complete a general educational development test and be awarded a California high school equivalency certificate.

#### **Retroactive Diplomas**

Any student who completed grade 12 in the 2003-04 through 2014-15 school year and met all applicable graduation requirements other than the passage of the high school exit examination shall be granted a high school diploma. (Education Code 51413)

In addition, the district may retroactively grant high school diplomas to former students who: (Education Code 48204.4, 51430, 51440)

1. Departed California against their will while in grade 12 and did not receive a diploma because the departure interrupted their education, provided that they were in good academic standing at the time of the departure

Persons may be considered to have departed California against their will if they were in custody of a government agency and were transferred to another state, were subject to a lawful order from a court or government agency that authorized their removal from California, were subject to a lawful order and were permitted to depart California before being removed from California pursuant to the lawful order, were removed or were permitted to depart voluntarily pursuant to the federal Immigration and Nationality Act, or departed due to other circumstances determined by the district that are consistent with the purposes of Education Code 48204.4.

In determining whether to award a diploma under these circumstances, the Superintendent or designee shall consider any coursework that may have been completed outside of the United States or through online or virtual courses.

2. Were The district may retroactively grant a high school diploma to a former student who was interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who is are an honorably discharged veterans of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that he/she they was were enrolled in a district school immediately preceding the internment or military service and he/she did not receive a diploma because his/her their education was interrupted due to the internment or military service in those wars. The Board may also grant a retroactive high school diploma to a former student, in accordance with Ed. Code 51440 and 51442, which relates to former students who have served as members of the Armed Forces and have received an honorable discharge.

Deceased former students who satisfy these conditions may be granted a retroactive diploma to be received by their next of kin.

- Are veterans who entered the military service of the United States while in grade 12 and who had satisfactorily completed the first half of the work required for grade 12 in a district school.
- 4. Are former members of the military, a resident of California, and received an honorable discharge, or, are current members of the military, a resident of California, and a resident of California when entering the military In determining whether to award a diploma under these circumstances, the Superintendent or designee shall evaluate classes completed in any high school, community college, or state college, grant credit toward graduation for military service and training received while in the military, and if satisfied that the person has completed the equivalent of the requirements for graduation from high school, grant the person a diploma of graduation.
- 5. Were in their senior year of high school during the 2019-2020 school year, were in good academic standing and on track to graduate at the end of the 2019-2020

school year as of March 1, 2020, and were unable to complete the statewide graduation requirements as a result of the COVID-19 crisis.

In addition, the Board may retroactively grant a diploma to a deceased former student who satisfies the above conditions. The diploma shall be received by the deceased student's next of kin [AR 6146.1(a-e-)].

#### **Challenge Regulations**

A student can earn semester periods of credit by challenge which involves scoring at the "A" level on a test covering <u>ALL</u> course competencies. The Challenge regulations are as follows:

- 1. A course to be challenged must be upward in sequence.
- 2. A challenge may apply to only one course or requirement per year.
- 3. A maximum of 20 credits is allowed in sequence courses
- 4. A challenge must be at the student's school of residence unless the course is not offered.
- 5. A student may challenge a specific course only once.
- 6. Challenge applications must be received and an exam taken prior to starting the course.
- 7. Challenges may be applied only to courses where participation or physical exercise is not essential to meeting the major course objectives.
- 8. The challenge assessment process/instrument is to be a local department's authority until a district wide challenge test is approved.
- 9. The department head's decision involving demonstration of skill is final for the advanced skill or artistic level.
- 10. Challenges apply only to approved courses within the Monrovia Unified School District.

#### Summer Graduates:

Seniors who would normally have graduated with their class, yet were unable to because they had not yet passed the CAHSEE and/or were short 5 15 or fewer credits may immediately attend adult summer school (following their senior year), satisfactorily complete the missing requirement by June 30th, and the receive their diploma from their original school site.

#### **Honorary Diplomas**

The Board may grant an honorary high school diploma to: (Education Code 51225.5)

 An international exchange student who has not completed the course of study ordinarily required for graduation and who is returning to the student's home country following the completion of one academic school year in the district;

#### 2. A student who is terminally ill.

The honorary diploma shall be clearly distinguishable from the regular diploma of graduation awarded by the district. (Education Code 51225.5)

#### HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Requirements for graduation, and specified alternative means for completing the prescribed course of study shall be made available to students, parents/guardians, and the public.

Students shall not be required to have resided within the district for any minimum length of time as a condition of high school graduation.

If a student successfully completes the district's graduation requirements while attending a juvenile court school or nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency, the district shall issue the student a diploma from the school the student last attended.

Diplomas of graduation from high school only after completing a prescribed course of study and meeting the graduation assessment requirements established by the state and District the superintendent or designation that parents and/or Guardians are properly notified of the district requirements for graduation and will establish procedures for parents and their Guardians involvement and consultation in instances where a student has not met requirements.

#### Requirements for Graduation

Students in grades 9 through 12 shall complete the following course of study in order to receive a graduation diploma. Required credits for graduation at each of the Monrovia Unified Schools are as follows:

Monrovia High School	220 credits
Canyon Oaks High School	180 credits
Mountain Park School	220 credits
Monrovia Community Adult School	150 credits

English 40 credits

World History and Culture 10 credits

United States History 10 credits

American Government 5 credits

Economics 5 credits

Mathematics 20 credits

(students shall complete at least one mathematics course that meets the state academic content standards for Algebra 1 or Integrated Mathematics 1. Students may complete such coursework prior to grade 9 provided that they also complete three mathematics courses, or 20 credits, in grades 9-12.) (Education Code 51224.5)

Science 20 credits

(must include 10 credits of life science and 10 credits of physical science)

Visual and Performing Arts / World Languages 20 credits

Electives and or additional academic credits required:

Monrovia High School 70 credits
Canyon Oaks High School 30 credits
Mountain Park School 70 credits
Monrovia Community Adult School 0 credits

Grade (A, B, C, or D) earns a student 10 credits per term unless granted otherwise by the principal, and the variations will be on file in the Office of Educational Services. All passing grades received Equal Credit in any given class.

#### <u>Alternative Program</u>

Recognizing that the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall adopt alternative means for the completion of the prescribed course of study. Students in danger of not earning the required 55 credits (including 10 credits of English) annually must participate in a supplemental or replacement instructional program.

An alternative program for completing graduation requirements provides students with options other than the traditional method of attending classes for a prescribed period of time in order to earn a predetermined number of credits. Alternative programs may include:

- 1. Challenging of classes through special examination;
- 2. Independent study;
- 3. Community Based study;

- 4. College classes;
- 5. Adult Education classes;
- 6. Continuation High School classes;
- 7. Distance Learning/Online courses;
- 8. After school/evening courses; and/or
- 9. Summer school

A proposal for an alternative course of study may be originated by students, parents/guardians, community members, or staff, and must represent an alternative approach to acquiring the same body of knowledge, skills, or understanding as a traditional required or elective course.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures to implement the provision for alternative programs.

Prior to consultation with the principal and/or counselor having occurred, students may earn additional credits above those that can be earned with a normal program of studies during each semester. Refer to BP 6146.11 for process and pre-approval forms.

#### <u>Correspondence/Distance Learning Instruction</u>

Students enrolled in the district high schools may receive instruction through distance learning courses provided by the University of California or another university or college in California accredited for teacher training under the provisions of the Education Code in subjects included within or related to the course of study of the high schools, and which for good reason cannot be taken by the student. If a student wishes to receive high school credit, they must receive prior approval from the principal and/or designee before taking a distance learning course.

Once written approval has been received, and subsequently, the correspondence course is completed, the student must submit a transcript showing successful completion of the course in order to receive credit. The course shall be one that satisfies college entrance requirements, applies toward college-level general education requirements, or is part of a vocational or career technical education course leading to a degree or certificate. The district will grant credit for correspondence instruction under the following conditions:

1. The correspondence instruction is provided by the University of California, or another accredited university or college in California, in subjects included

within or related to the student's course of study.

- 2. The student is, for good reason, unable to take the course of study offered in the school.
- 3. No more than 20 semester credits of correspondence instruction are credited to a student toward graduation.

For the purpose of determining appropriate credits, the following guidelines are provided:

- 1. 4 Unit Quarter-System College Course (UC/CSU) is equivalent to 10 semester units for high school credit.
- 2. 3 Unit Semester-System College Course (UC/CSU) is equivalent to 10 semester units for high school credit.

The expense/cost of any distance learning course will be the responsibility of the student and their parent/guardian. Refer to BP 6146.11 for process and pre-approval forms.

#### **Third Year Graduation Candidates**

Third-year students will be permitted to use no more than 10 adult school credits toward their graduation from the Comprehensive High School program.

- 1. The student will have completed 220 earned credits by the end of the first term for the senior year.
- 2. The student must declare in writing to the Monrovia High School principal or designee by January of the third year that they wish to graduate at the end of the third year.
- 3. Written permission from the parent and or Guardian must be included in the written request.
- 4. The following criteria will be used in considering candidates for early graduation:
  - Personal reasons (must be of an emergency or crucial nature) which may justify early graduation. Requests will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
  - b. The decision of the high school administration and counseling department may be appealed to the school district superintendent or the superintendent's design.

#### Mid-Year Graduation Candidates

 A student who wishes to graduate mid-year of their senior year must declare this intention to the Monrovia High School principal in writing by the end of the junior year.

- 2. Only one class in Adult School each semester of the junior or senior year may be taken.
- 3. The student will have completed 220 earned credits by the end of the first term for the senior.
- 4. The student will have successfully completed all subject area credit.
- 5. The decision of the high school administration and counseling department may be appealed to the school district Superintendent or designee.

#### **Transfer Students**

Transfer students must meet all requirements of the Monrovia Unified School District in order to receive a high school diploma from the school in which they are enrolled.
