# Keep technology strong in our schools

Technology levy renewal Vote November 7, 2023

# What is a technology levy?

A technology levy, also known as a capital projects levy, is a locally-approved source of funding. These funds must be dedicated for technology-related needs, including:

- Student iPads and staff computers
- Educational software and interactive classroom equipment
- District communication tools and security systems
- Essential technology training and support for students and staff

The State of Minnesota does not dedicate funds for technology in our schools. Districts must rely on voter-approved levies. Thanks to strong community support, Wayzata Public Schools currently has two technology levies in place.

#### Why do we have to renew one of the levies now?

We have two tech levies in place. One expires with taxes payable in 2025 and one expires with taxes payable in 2029. School districts can put a levy request on the ballot up to five years before it goes into effect.

We want to ensure that we are able to maintain our current level of funding, so we are asking voters to renew the tech levy that expires after taxes payable in 2025 now.

# What is the ballot request?

The request is for a 10-year technology levy of \$5.7 million per year. Approval of the levy will allow the district to:

- Replace aging classroom technology equipment and student and staff devices
- Maintain school safety and security systems
- Maintain essential technology support for students and staff

## What is the tax impact?

• There is **no tax increase** if voters approve the levy because it is a renewal of an existing locally-approved levy.

# What if the request is not approved by voters?

We will not be able to:

- Replace aging classroom technology equipment and student devices.
- Maintain the technology support that staff and students rely on every day in our schools.

# How is technology used in our schools?

Technology is essential to each and every student. It allows students to learn at their own pace and enables teachers to personalize learning for students.

- Up-to-date technology devices for all students and staff
- Instructional software and online resources
- Interactive classroom equipment
- Tools for communicating with students and families

# Proposed Minutes Special Council Meeting September 12, 2023

Mayor Wosje called a Special Meeting of the Plymouth City Council to order at 5:01 p.m. at Plymouth City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Boulevard, on September 12, 2023.

PLYMOUTH COUNCIL PRESENT: Mayor Wosje, Councilmembers Davis (at 5:05), Willis, Gregor, Pointner, McGregor, and Peterson.

PLYMOUTH COUNCIL ABSENT: None.

PLYMOUTH STAFF PRESENT: City Manager Callister, Public Safety Director Fadden, Fire Chief Coppa, Director of Public Works Thompson, Deputy Public Works Director/City Engineer LaBounty, Community and Economic Development Director Fernelius, Park and Recreation Director Tomlinson, Human Resources Director Timpone, Finance Director Rich, Assistant Finance Director Larson, Planning and Development Manager McGuire, Recreation Manager Hemp, Organizational Development and Equity Partner Johnson, Police Administrative Manager Anderson, Fleet and Facilities Manager Hanson, Management Intern Nwachi, and Office Support Lead/Deputy City Clerk Gottschalk.

#### 2024/2025 Biennial Budget

Finance Director Rich discussed the 2024/2025 biennial budget goals, process and background, fund balance policy, preliminary tax levies, tax impacts, new position requests, and next steps.

Council members asked questions and provided feedback for the next budget meeting.

Park and Recreation Director Tomlinson discussed lawful gambling and community organization funding history. Council discussed the lawful gambling amount and if the amount can be used for other community concerts and special events. Council provided direction on the policy to update the language that Plymouth Civic League for Music in Plymouth will get 40% of the funds with a cap at \$50,000 per year and authorize additional funds to be used for community arts programs.

Council directed staff to update the Charitable Gambling Funds Usage Policy and bring back to a regular meeting for approval.

#### Future study sessions

Council requested to add penalty grid for license violations discussion on date to be determined.

# Proposed Minutes Regular City Council Meeting September 12, 2023

Mayor Wosje called a Regular Meeting of the Plymouth City Council to order at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Boulevard, on September 12, 2023.

COUNCIL PRESENT: Mayor Wosje, Councilmembers Willis, McGregor, Davis, Peterson, Pointner and Gregor.

COUNCIL ABSENT: None.

STAFF PRESENT: City Manager Callister, Public Safety Director Fadden, Fire Chief Coppa, Director of Public Works Thompson, Deputy Public Works Director/City Engineer LaBounty, Community and Economic Development Director Fernelius, Park and Recreation Director Tomlinson, Human Resources Director Timpone, Finance Director Rich, Planning and Development Manager McGuire, Senior Planner Sommers, Facilities Manager Hanson, Organizational Development and Equity Partner Johnson, Management Intern Nwachi, City Attorney Mattick, and Office Support Lead/Deputy City Clerk Gottschalk.

#### Plymouth Forum

Donglin Liang, 5112 Merrimac Lane N., discussed the loss of the school resource officer.

Audrey Britton, 12500 53rd Avenue N., expressed her concern on the school resource officer walkout and encouraged transparency within the police department on these types of issues.

Tara Miller-Hochhalter, 5320 Ranchview Lane N., discussed her disappointment, frustration, and concern regarding the lack of communication on the restriping of Vicksburg Lane.

Sara Hlusak, 15435 59th Avenue N., expressed her concern for safety along Vicksburg Lane.

Mike Deselich, 15490 59th Avenue N., thanked Councilmembers Peterson and Gregor for their prompt email responses and encouraged the City Council to lower the speed and address safety concerns.

Tom Cleland, 10840 Rockford Road, #214, recommended hand counting election ballots instead of using an electronic machine.

Heather Rivera, 18200 31st Avenue N., expressed her disappointment with how the school resource officer situation was handled.

Paul Hintermeyer, 3035 Rosewood Lane, expressed his concern regarding the trustworthiness of the electronic ballot counting machine and recommended a plan for 2024.

Mayor Wosje noted staff will be available in the hall to discuss the concerns regarding Vicksburg Lane.

Public Safety Director Fadden stated the school resource officers were assigned to patrol, are stopping at the school periodically, completing walk throughs, and remaining visible. He continues to work with state legislators to come up with a better solution.

Mayor Wosje noted City Clerk/Administrative Coordinator Gallup will follow up with concerns and questions regarding electronic ballot counting.

#### <u>Presentations and Public Information Announcements</u>

(4.1) Swearing in of career and pt/oc firefighters Alec Waidlich, Deniss Pulemjotov, Joel Friese, Ryan Williams, Amber Hawks, Kent Anglin, Jennifer Murphy, and Derek Day

Fire Chief Coppa provided a brief bio on each of the fire fighters. Deputy City Clerk Gottschalk presented the oath of office to the career, part-time and on-call firefighters.

#### Approval of Agenda

Motion was made by Councilmember Pointner, and seconded by Councilmember Peterson, to approve the agenda. With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

#### Public Hearings

There were no public hearings scheduled.

#### General Business

(8.1) Approve comprehensive plan text amendments, rezoning, and zoning text amendment for City Center (City of Plymouth - 2023045)

Senior Planner Sommers presented this item and noted staff are looking to approve the comprehensive plan text amendment regarding density and design standards and update the zoning code amendment. The Planning Commission recommended the changes to the comprehensive plan text amendment.

The City Council discussed the topics of setbacks, types of entertainment center that include a small bowling alley, fireworks removal, and centering around a family atmosphere.

In response to questions from the City Council, Senior Planner Sommers provided the following information:

 An added 5-foot buffer could push the setback farther to allow for a balanced entryway between the setback and the design standards

- Sidewalks would be allowed up to the building
- Discussed language regarding bowling as a part of the entertainment center
- If code was changed, firework sales would only be allowed inside a business and would require a permit to sell them on the exterior.

George Stoller, 15145 38th Avenue N., expressed his concern about increased population and subsequent resident safety and encouraged City Council to keep a watchful eye on the developers.

Mandy Rhead, 14915 32nd Avenue N., expressed her concern regarding density height, parking spaces, transportation, lack of mass transit, and possible higher crime with increased student population.

Mayor Wosje noted this has been an on-going process and the City Council will continue to seek feedback from residents.

In response to additional questions from the City Council, Senior Planner Sommers provided the following information:

- Parking requirements for businesses will revert to original requirements
- Plymouth's parking standards are derived from the ITE parking standards and the National Parking Association
- Plan will continue to be monitored and changes can be made along the way
- Language in the code regarding non-conforming businesses will be allowed to stay and will have a one-time permit to either expand or modify existing structures

Motion was made by Councilmember Pointner, and seconded by Councilmember Willis, to adopt Resolution approving a comprehensive plan text amendment to CC guiding for City Center (2023045) (Res2023-234), Resolution approving findings of fact for a zoning ordinance text amendment to sections 21475 of the zoning ordinance (2023045) (Res2023-235), Ordinance amending Chapter 21 zoning ordinance of the city code to classify certain land located in City Center (2023045) (Ord2023-10), Ordinance amending chapter 21 of the Plymouth city code, entitled the Plymouth zoning ordinance (2023045) (Ord2023-11). With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

Motion was made by Councilmember Willis, and seconded by Councilmember Peterson, to adopt Resolution approving summary publication of Ordinance No. 2023-10 and Ordinance No. 2023-11 (Res2023-236). With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

#### (8.2) Approve purchase of fire engine

Facilities Manager Hanson presented this item. Staff researched this item and provided a work history of the fire engine. She also noted response calls are trending higher and have doubled since last year, explaining the need for a new truck.

The council discussed funding and noted this purchase is not included in the current budget.

In response to funding discussion from the City Council, Facilities Manager Hanson provided the following information:

- The truck was originally assigned for replacement in 2030
- Moved up the replacement date to 2022 due to updated staffing model

Funding will come from the central equipment reserve and, if needed, public safety

Motion was made by Councilmember Willis, and seconded by Councilmember Peterson, to adopt Resolution approving purchase of fire engine to support fire services (Res2023-237). With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

(8.3) Adopt ordinance amending chapter XXI of the city code, regarding accessory dwelling units, resolution approving findings of fact for said ordinance, and resolution approving summary publication

Planning and Development Manager McGuire presented this item. She stated she met with City Attorney Mattick and discussed the comments made by City Council at their last meeting and how to best implement them. She reviewed the rules and regulations for attached and detached accessory dwelling units.

The City Council and Planning and Development Manager McGuire discussed the short-term rental ordinance as it related to accessory dwelling units.

Motion was made by Councilmember Gregor, and seconded by Councilmember Willis, to adopt Resolution approving findings of fact for a zoning ordinance text amendment to sections 21005 and 21190 of the zoning ordinance to amend accessory dwelling unit regulations (2023030) (Res2023-238), Ordinance amending chapter XXI of the Plymouth City Code, entitled the Plymouth zoning ordinance (2023030) (Ord2023-12), and Resolution approving summary publication of Ordinance No. 2023-12 (Res2023-239). With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

(8.4) Approve application for Standalone Noise Barrier and cost sharing with MnDOT (Previously item No. 6.11)

Councilmember Davis pulled this item to receive clarification on location of the wall. Public Works Director Thompson stated the wall will be offset between the frontage road and the highway.

Motion was made by Councilmember Davis, and seconded by Councilmember Gregor, to adopt Resolution approving application for standalone noise barrier program and cost sharing with the Minnesota Department of Transportation (Res2023-240). With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

(8.5) Approve contract with Flock Group Inc. for automatic license plate reader technology (Previously item No. 6.14)

Councilmember Davis requested clarification on the use of this technology. Public Safety Director Fadden explained it was approved at the October 25, 2023 City Council meeting but the company had difficulty producing the new model. The city received a full refund and now plans to purchase a new one through another company, Flock Group, Inc. He stated the readers would be permanently placed in high traffic areas and the license reader data can be saved for approximately 30-60 days. Public Safety Director Fadden also noted the police department has produced a draft policy that will be reviewed by City Attorney Mattick's office.

Motion was made by Councilmember Davis, and seconded by Councilmember Peterson, to adopt Resolution approving contract with Flock Group, Inc. for automatic license plate reader technology (Res2023-241). With all members voting in favor, the motion carried.

# 1. Action Requested:

Adopt attached resolution approving cooperative agreement with Hennepin County for the 2023 Gleason Lake Drive Improvements Project (ST239001).

#### 2. Background:

On April 11, 2023, council awarded the contract for the 2023 Gleason Lake Drive Improvements Project. The project includes complete reconstruction of Gleason Lake Drive and Niagara Lane to current city standards as well as improvements to the utility infrastructure including replacement of water main and installation of storm sewer. Also included was the reconfiguration of the Gleason Lake Drive and Vicksburg Lane intersection to a mini roundabout. A section of the improvements at the Gleason Lake Drive and Vicksburg Lane intersection is within the jurisdiction of Hennepin County and the City of Minnetonka. The attached cooperative agreement with Hennepin County details the ownership, maintenance, and cost responsibilities for the improvements in their jurisdiction. The City of Plymouth previously entered into a joint powers agreement with the City of Minnetonka for the improvements.

# 3. Budget Impact:


Council previously approved this project with a budget of \$6,753,300.09. The estimated portion funded by Hennepin County with this cooperative agreement is \$268,270.29.

### CONSTRUCTION COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is made between the **County of Hennepin**, a body politic and corporate under the laws of the State of Minnesota, hereinafter referred to as the "County", and the **City of Plymouth**, a Minnesota home-rule charter city under the laws of the State of Minnesota, hereinafter referred to as the "City" or "Plymouth". The County and the City collectively are referred to as the "Parties".

#### Recitals

The following Recitals are incorporated into this Agreement.

- 1. The City, in partnership with the County, desires to construct a roundabout at the intersection of County State Aid Highway (CSAH) 15 (Gleason Lake Road), Vicksburg Lane, and Gleason Lake Drive (the "Roundabout"), multi-use trails and pedestrian crossing improvements within the corporate limits of the City, as shown in the plans for City Project No. ST239001, under County Project (CP) No. 2183549 as further illustrated in Exhibit D (Project Plan Title Sheet), and which shall hereinafter be referred to as the "Project".
- 2. The Parties have agreed to enter into this Agreement to memorialize the partnership and to outline each party's ownership and financial responsibilities, maintenance responsibilities, and associated costs for the Project.
- 3. Plymouth shall be the lead agency in Project design, engineering, and construction administration, and shall be responsible for acquiring all governmental agency-required permits needed for the Project.
- 4. The Plymouth City Engineer has prepared an Engineer's Estimate of quantities and unit prices for the above described Project, and a copy of the Engineer's Estimate and an estimated Division of Cost Summary, marked Exhibit A, is attached hereto.
- 5. The County has indicated its willingness to cost participate in the Project as detailed herein.
- 6. Plymouth and the city of Minnetonka ("Minnetonka") previously entered into a Joint Powers Agreement for cost participation and maintenance responsibilities for assets locating within the boundaries of each city (the "Joint Powers Agreement") and Minnetonka will participate in the Project construction costs via the Joint Powers Agreement.
- 7. The Project will be carried out by the Parties under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes,

#### Agreement

**NOW, THEREFORE,** the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. Term of Agreement, Survival of Terms, and Exhibits.
  - 1.1. **Effective Date.** This Agreement is effective as of the date of the final signature.
  - 1.2. **Expiration Date.** This Agreement will expire after the date in which all obligations have been satisfactorily fulfilled.
  - 1.3. **Survival of Terms.** Provisions that by their nature are intended to survive the term, cancellation or termination of this Agreement do survive such term, cancellation or termination. Such provisions include but are not limited to: Maintenance Responsibilities, Records/Audits, Indemnification, Insurance, Worker Compensation Claims, Cancellation, Termination, and Minnesota Laws Govern.
  - 1.4. **Exhibits**. All exhibits are attached and incorporated into this Agreement.
    - **1.4.1.** Exhibit A (Division of Cost Summary)
    - 1.4.2. Exhibit B (MnDOT ADA Compliance Checklist (Curb Ramp) and **Accessibility Pedestrian Signal (APS) forms)**
    - 1.4.3. Exhibit C (Drainage Ownership and Maintenance Responsibilities)
    - **1.4.4.** Exhibit D (Project Plan Title Sheet)
    - **1.4.5.** Exhibit E (Surface Maintenance Responsibilities)
- 2. Project Construction.
  - Contract Award and Administration. Plymouth or its agents shall prepare the 2.1. necessary Project plans, specifications, and proposal; obtain approval of the plans and specifications from the County; advertise for bids for the work and construction; receive and open bids pursuant to the advertisement; enter into a contract with the successful bidder at the unit prices specified in the bid of such bidder; administer the contract; and perform the required engineering and inspection; all in accordance with the plans and specifications set forth below.
  - 2.2. Plans and Specifications.
    - **2.2.1. Design Work.** All design work performed by Plymouth or its agents for the Project shall be prepared and certified by a Professional Engineer licensed in the State

of Minnesota. All designs which affect County facilities shall conform to the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) Design Standards applicable to County State Aid Highways and to the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards, and be approved by the County Engineer prior to construction. Attached as Exhibit B is a copy of the MnDOT ADA Compliance Checklist (Curb Ramp) and APS forms. Plymouth or its agents shall complete the forms for each curb ramp constructed and APS installed as part of the Project and submit the forms by using the County's "Asset Management" site, which requires registration to access. Plymouth understands and agrees that the payment as stated in Subsection 4.5 will be withheld until all required ADA curb ramp and APS certification forms have been received and verified by the County. Directions for obtaining access to the Asset Management site can be found at the following link, under the "ADA checklists for construction within county right-of-way" bar:

- **2.2.2.** Plan Numbers (S.A.P#/ S.P.#). Not applicable to the Project.
- **2.2.3. Request for Copies of Plans.** At the request of the County, Plymouth or its agents shall furnish the County with any working copies of any plans, designs or reports at any time during the Project design process. Upon completion of the Project, Plymouth or its agents shall furnish the County with a complete set of as-built plans certified as to their accuracy by the Plymouth's City Engineer and shall be submitted to Public Works Transportation Project Delivery Design and Operations Asset Management Divisions.
- **2.2.4. Plan Review and Approval.** Plymouth or its agents shall furnish the County Public Works Transportation Project Delivery Design Division with Project plans and specifications for review and approval as follows: electronic submittals at 60%, 90%, and 100%; comment response letter with 90% and 100% package; electronic copy of plans at 100% for County permit approval.
- **2.3. Construction Supervision and Inspection.** Plymouth or its agents will administer the construction contract, perform all necessary engineering, inspection, and testing of all the Project work. All work for the Project shall be completed in compliance with the County approved plans and specifications. The County Engineer or a designated representative shall have the right, as the work progresses, to enter upon the job site to make any inspections deemed necessary and shall cooperate with Plymouth Engineer and staff at their request to the extent necessary, but will have no responsibility for the supervision of the work.
- 2.4. Plan Changes and Additional Construction.
  - **2.4.1. Plan Changes**. The County agrees that Plymouth or its agents may make changes in the plans or in the character of the Project construction that are reasonably necessary to cause the construction to be in all things performed and completed in a satisfactory manner, subject to the County's rights under Subsection 2.4.2 and the limitations and restrictions on County cost participation provided in Section 3.
  - **2.4.2. Review Proposed Changes.** The County shall have the right to review any

proposed changes to the plans and specifications as they relate to the County's cost participation prior to the work being performed, except in emergencies, and in those instances where the proposed changes necessitate a re-engineering of the design and/or specifications, Plymouth shall submit the re-engineered design and/or specifications to the County. The County Engineer or designated representative shall respond to Plymouth's request for approval to authorize the issuance of any negotiated change orders or supplemental agreements prepared by Plymouth that affect the County's share of the construction cost within a reasonable time frame, subject to the limitations and restrictions on County cost participation provided in Section 3.

#### 2.5. Right of Way/Permit

- **2.5.1. Right of Way Acquisition.** Plymouth or its agents shall acquire all additional right of way, permits and/or easements required for the construction of the Project. Additionally, upon completion of the Project, Plymouth agrees to convey to the County all permanent right of way and easement acquired for the County highway included in this Project, at no cost to the County.
- **2.5.2.** Access Rights and Permits. The County shall cooperate with the conveyance of any reasonable access rights over the County right of way that may be required by Plymouth for the Project. The Parties understand that any such access rights must be necessary for completion of the Project and shall be subject to applicable County Board or County staff approval requirements; these access rights will be granted at no cost to Plymouth. Any and all County permits required for the Project shall be granted by the County at no cost or expense to Plymouth or its contractors. Plymouth shall also obtain, and comply with, any and all permits and approvals required from other governmental or regulatory agencies to accomplish the Project.
- **2.5.3. Right of Way Costs.** The Parties each understand and agree that there is no participation from the County in right of way costs required for the Project.
- **2.6.** Traffic Signal. Not applicable to the Project.
- **2.7. Rectangular Rapid-Flashing Beacon (RRFB).** Plymouth or its contractor will install two RRFB systems and associated components at the intersection as described in the construction plans.
  - **2.7.1. Power.** Plymouth, shall: (1) install, cause the installation of 120/240 volt, single phase, alternating current electrical power connection to the RRFBs constructed as part of the Project, and the cost for said work will be split among the Parties as part of the overall Project construction cost; and (2) shall provide the electrical energy for the operation of the RRFBs installed as a part of the Project. The on-going electrical energy cost for the operation of the RRFBs shall be paid entirely by Minnetonka per the Memorandum of Understanding executed between Plymouth and Minnetonka dated August 15, 2023.
- **2.8. Street Lighting.** Plymouth, at no cost to the County, shall provide the electrical energy for the operation of all streetlights installed as part of the Project.

- **2.9. Asbestos.** The Project may include the removal of asbestos containing electrical conduit. Only firms licensed to conduct asbestos abatement shall be used for the safe removal of asbestos containing electrical conduit with proper shipping manifest prepared and submitted to appropriate agency. The lead agency in the Project construction shall be responsible for the oversight of the removal of asbestos containing electrical conduit and compliance with the abovementioned specifications.
- **2.10. Detours.** The Project may require limited detouring of traffic onto the City's streets. The Parties agree that there will be no compensation to the City for detours onto its streets required to construct the Project.
- **3. Cost Participation.** The County will participate in the construction costs for the Project as provided herein.
  - **3.1. County's Total Cost Participation.** The County's cost participation in the Project shall be a total Not to Exceed (NTE) amount of \$410,000 and shall be calculated based on only those portions of the Project construction cost identified in Exhibit A as the County's shares ("County Cost Participation").

#### 4. Payment.

- **4.1. County Invoice.** The County, subject to the provisions stipulated in this Agreement, agrees to pay the County Cost Participation as described herein.
- **4.2. When to Invoice**. Upon completion of the Project, Plymouth shall notify the County and submit an invoice for one hundred percent (100%) of the County Cost Participation for the Project under this Agreement.
- **4.3. What to Include in the Invoice.** The invoice shall include: date of invoice, invoice number, name of the County construction project manager (Mr. Jay Hill, P.E.), project name, county project number (CP 2183549), contract number, and purchase order number. For the final invoice, the City shall provide the County with the Final Distribution of Costs document, and provide the County with complete as built plans, prior to requesting payment.
- **4.4. Where to Send Invoice.** Invoices and supporting documentation should be sent by email to <a href="mailto:obf.internet@hennepin.us">obf.internet@hennepin.us</a> or by mail to: Hennepin County Accounts Payable, P.O. Box 1388, Minneapolis, MN 55440-1388. An electronic copy of all invoices and project documentation should also be submitted to <a href="mailto:transp.invoices@hennepin.us">transp.invoices@hennepin.us</a>
- **4.5. Approval and Payment.** Upon approval and acceptance of the completed Project as well as all MnDOT ADA Compliance Checklist forms by the County Engineer or designated representative, and within forty-five (45) days of receipt of the invoice, the County shall reimburse Plymouth for its share of the costs for the Project under this Agreement.

- **5.** County Supplied Equipment. Not applicable to the Project.
- **6. Plymouth's Maintenance Responsibilities.** Upon completion of the Project, Plymouth shall provide the following year-round maintenance services illustrated in Exhibits C and E as Plymouth's responsibilities at no cost to the County.
  - **6.1.** Roadways and Roundabout. Maintenance of Vicksburg Lane, Gleason Lake Drive, and the Roundabout including their curbs and gutters and pavements constructed/reconstructed under the Project. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to sweeping, debris removal, resurfacing and seal coating, and any other maintenance activities according to accepted Plymouth maintenance practices.
  - **6.2. Rectangular Rapid-Flashing Beacon (RRFB).** Maintenance of the RRFBs belongs to Minnetonka as further provided in Section 7 below.
  - **6.3. Street Lighting.** Xcel Energy shall own and maintain the streetlights installed as part of the Project according to its practices at no cost to the County.
  - **6.4. Sidewalks, Pedestrian Refuges, and Pedestrian Ramps.** Plymouth shall own and maintain sidewalks, pedestrian refuges, splitter islands, and pedestrian ramps constructed as part of the Project as illustrated in Exhibit E. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to, winter maintenance, debris removal, patching, crack repair, and any other maintenance activities as per accepted Plymouth maintenance practices.
  - **6.5. Multi-use Trail/Bicycle Facility.** Plymouth shall own and maintain the multi-use trail/bicycle facilities reconstructed as part of the Project as illustrated in Exhibit E. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to, trail surfacing, sweeping, winter maintenance, and any other maintenance activities according to Plymouth maintenance practices.
  - **6.6. City Road Pavement Striping and Crosswalk Markings.** Plymouth shall own and maintain all pavement striping and crosswalk markings for roadway users installed as a part of the Project on Vicksburg Lane and Gleason Lake Drive and within the Roundabout.
  - **6.7. City Road Storm Sewers.** Plymouth shall own and maintain all storm sewer drainage systems such as all trunk lines, grit chambers, ponds, storm water treatment and drainage structures, constructed or reconstructed under the Project, as illustrated in the attached Exhibit C.
  - **6.8. Landscaping.** Plymouth shall own and maintain landscaping/streetscape installed as a part of the Project, as illustrated in the attached Exhibit E.
- **7. Minnetonka's Maintenance Responsibilities.** Upon completion of the Project, Minnetonka will maintain the improvements per the Memorandum of Understanding executed between Plymouth and Minnetonka dated August 15, 2023 at no cost to the County.

- **8.** The County's Maintenance Responsibilities. Upon completion of the Project, the County shall provide year-round maintenance at its sole cost as outlined below.
  - **8.1. Roadways.** Maintenance of the segment of CSAH 15 reconstructed under the Project. Maintenance includes, but is not limited to, sweeping, debris removal, resurfacing and seal coating, and any other maintenance activities according to accepted County maintenance practices.
  - **8.2. Roundabout.** The Parties understand and agree that the County shall have no maintenance responsibilities for any portion of the Roundabout including but not limited to pavement, curb and gutter, center island, truck aprons and splitter islands.
  - **8.3.** Rectangular Rapid-Flashing Beacon (RRFB). Maintenance of the RRFBs belongs to Minnetonka as provided in Section 7 above.
  - **8.4.** County Road Pavement Striping. The County shall thereafter maintain and repair all pavement striping for CSAH 15 installed as a part of the Project at the expense of the County.
  - **8.5. Storm Sewers.** The Parties understand and agree that the County shall have no maintenance responsibilities for any storm sewer components constructed as part of the Project, as further illustrated in the attached Exhibit C.
- **9. Authorized Representatives.** In order to coordinate the services of the County with the activities of the City and vice versa so as to accomplish the purposes of this Agreement, the Hennepin County and the City Engineers or their designated representatives shall manage this Agreement on behalf of the County and the City.

- 10. Assignment, Amendments, Default, Waiver, Agreement Complete, Cancellation or Termination.
  - **10.1. Assignment.** The City shall not assign, subcontract, transfer or pledge this Agreement

- and/or the services to be performed hereunder, whether in whole or in part, without the prior written consent of the County.
- **10.2. Amendments.** Any alterations, variations, modifications or waivers of provisions of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing as an amendment to this Agreement and signed by the Parties hereto.
- **10.3. Default.** If the City fails to perform any of the provisions of this Agreement or so fails to administer the work as to endanger the performance of the Agreement, this shall constitute a default. Unless the City's default is excused by the County, the County may upon written notice immediately cancel this Agreement in its entirety.
- **10.4.** Waiver. The County's failure to insist upon strict performance of any provision or to exercise any right under this Agreement shall not be deemed a relinquishment or waiver of the same, unless consented to in writing. Such consent shall not constitute a general waiver or relinquishment throughout the entire term of the Agreement.
- **10.5. Agreement Complete.** The entire Agreement between the Parties is contained herein and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and negotiations between the Parties relating to the subject matter hereof. All items referred to in this Agreement are incorporated or attached and are deemed to be part of this Agreement.
- **10.6.** Cancellation or Termination. This Agreement may be terminated or cancelled by either party with or without cause upon thirty (30) day written notice. This Agreement shall be terminated or cancelled by either party upon a material breach by the other party. In the event of a termination or cancellation, the Parties will remain responsible for cost participation as provided in this Agreement for obligations incurred up through the effective date of the termination or cancellation, subject to any equitable adjustment that may be required to account for the effects of a breach.

#### 11. Indemnification.

- 11.1. Plymouth Indemnifies the County. Plymouth agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the County, its officials, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees from any liability, claims, causes of action, judgments, damages, losses, costs or expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, resulting directly or indirectly from any act or omission of Plymouth or Plymouth's consultant or sub consultant, anyone directly or indirectly employed by them, and/or anyone for whose acts and/or omissions they may be liable in the performance of the services required by this Agreement, and against all loss by reason of the failure of Plymouth to perform fully, in any respect, all obligations under this Agreement. Plymouth's liability shall be governed by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 466 or other applicable law.
- 11.2. The County Indemnifies the City. The County agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City, its officials, officers, agents, volunteers, and employees from any liability, claims, causes of action, judgments, damages, losses, costs or expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, resulting directly or indirectly from any act or omission of the County or the County's consultant or sub consultant, anyone directly or

indirectly employed by them, and/or anyone for whose acts and/or omissions they may be liable in the performance of the services required by this Agreement, and against all loss by reason of the failure of the County to perform fully, in any respect, all obligations under this Agreement. The County's liability shall be governed by the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 466 or other applicable law.

12. Insurance. The City agrees that any future contract let by the City for the performance of any of the work included hereunder shall include clauses that will: 1) Require the contractor to indemnify and hold the County, its commissioners, officers, agents and employees harmless from any liability, claim, demand, judgments, expenses, action or cause of action of any kind or character arising out of any act or omission of the contractor, its officers, employees, agents or subcontractors; 2) Require the contractor to be an independent contractor for the purposes of completing the work provided for in this Agreement; and 3) Require the contractor to provide and maintain the following insurance so as to assure the performance of its indemnification and hold harmless obligation.

The above listed Professional Liability insurance will not be required in any construction contract let by the City if the City's contractors are not required to perform design engineering as part of the construction contract.

An umbrella or excess policy over primary liability coverages is an acceptable method to provide the required insurance limits.

The above subparagraphs establish minimum insurance requirements. It is the sole responsibility of the City's contractors to determine the need for and to procure additional insurance which may be needed in connection with the Project.

All insurance policies shall be open to inspection by the County and copies of policies shall be submitted to the County upon written request.

#### 13. Worker Compensation Claims.

- 13.1. Plymouth's Employees. Any and all employees of Plymouth and all other persons engaged by Plymouth in the performance of any work or services required or provided for herein to be performed by Plymouth shall not be considered employees of the County, and any and all claims that may or might arise under the Workers' Compensation Act or the Unemployment Compensation Act of the State of Minnesota on behalf of the employees while so engaged and any and all claims made by any third parties as a consequence of any act or omission on the part of the employees while so engaged on any of the work or services provided to be rendered herein shall in no way be the obligation or responsibility of the County.
- 13.2. County's Employees. Any and all employees of the County and all other persons engaged by the County in the performance of any work or services required or provided for herein to be performed by the County shall not be considered employees of the City, and any and all claims that may or might arise under the Workers' Compensation Act or the Unemployment Compensation Act of the State of Minnesota on behalf of the employees while so engaged and any and all claims made by any third parties as a consequence of any act or omission on the part of the employees while so engaged on any of the work or services provided to be rendered herein shall in no way be the obligation or responsibility of the City.
- **14. Records/Audits.** The City agrees that the County, the State Auditor, or any of their duly authorized representatives at any time during normal business hours, and as often as they may reasonably deem necessary, shall have access to and the right to examine, audit, excerpt and transcribe any books, documents, papers, records, etc., which are pertinent to the Project and the accounting practices and procedures of the City which involve transactions relating to this Agreement.
- **15. Nondiscrimination.** The provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Minnesota Statute Section 181.59, and any other applicable local ordinance relating to civil rights and discrimination and the Affirmative Action Policy statement of Hennepin County shall be considered a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein.

- **16. Counterparts/Electronic Signatures**. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which will be deemed to be an original copy of this Agreement and all of which, when taken together, will be deemed to constitute one and the same agreement. The facsimile, email or other electronically delivered signatures of the Parties shall be deemed to constitute original signatures, and facsimile or electronic copies hereof shall be deemed to constitute duplicate originals.
- 17. Minnesota Laws Govern. The laws of the State of Minnesota shall govern all questions and interpretations concerning the validity and construction of this Agreement and the legal relations between the Parties and their performance. The appropriate venue and jurisdiction for any litigation will be those courts located within the County of Hennepin, State of Minnesota. Litigation, however, in the federal courts involving the Parties will be in the appropriate federal court within the State of Minnesota.




**EXHIBIT C**Drainage Ownership and Maintenance Responsibilities





# **DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST:**

The applicant is requesting approval of a conditional use permit amendment to allow for the parking of more than ten U-Haul trucks on site. Resolution 2013-106 was approved by the City Council on April 9, 2013 and this resolution limited the parking of trucks on this site to ten. At this time the applicant is proposing to reconfigure the parking lot to provide more truck/trailer parking in the east parking lot and to provide shunting lanes in the east and west parking lots. Based on aerial imagery, it appears as though this is how the site is being used today.

Notice of the public hearing was published in the City's official newspaper and mailed to all property owners within 500 feet of the site. A copy of the notification area map is attached.

#### Natural Characteristics of Site

The site is located in the Bassett Creek drainage district. The site is not located in a shoreland overlay district.

#### **Previous Actions**

In 2013, City Council approved a conditional use permit, drive aisle variance, screening variance and site plan amendment to allow a rental truck and trailer operation accessory to a self-storage facility.

#### LEVEL OF CITY DISCRETION IN DECISION-MAKING:

The City's discretion in approving or denying a conditional use permit amendment is limited to whether or not the proposal meets the standards listed in the zoning ordinance. If it meets the specified standards, the City must approve the conditional use permit. However, the level of discretion is affected by the fact that some of the standards may be open to interpretation.

# **ANALYSIS OF REQUEST:**

The applicant is requesting approval of a conditional use permit amendment to reconfigure the parking lot to provide more truck/trailer parking in the east parking lot and to provide shunting lanes in the east and west parking lots. There are no proposed site improvements associated with this application, but the applicant will be restriping the parking lots to accommodate these improvements.

#### **Conditional Use Permit Amendment**

A conditional use permit amendment is required for the additional truck/trailer parking stalls.

A conditional use permit was granted in 2013 for this use, along with a drive aisle variance, screening variance and site plan amendment to allow a rental truck and trailer operation accessory to a self-storage facility (96,000 square foot building). Resolution 2013-106 included a number of conditions for these approvals, and one specific condition limited the number of rental trucks allowed on site to ten. The resolution also approved the storage without screening per the variance request.

The applicant has indicated that the customer demand for their trucks has increased and there is a need to store more than 10 trucks on site. Furthermore, the applicant has submitted a narrative

(included in your packet) that outlines the proposed parking of vehicles and the vehicles themselves. The highlights of that narrative are as follows:

- Customers reserve vehicles in person or online, and directional signage leads them to their truck on the day of pick up.
- Trucks are rented and returned by customers on a daily basis, and shunting lanes are used to temporarily stage the trucks. Trucks are parked rear bumper to front bumper for efficiency.
- No off street parking is allowed and no semi-truck parking is allowed on site.
- U-Haul is monitored by a real time inventory control system which allows them to limit incoming vehicles as necessary. Customers are routed to a different U-Haul location if the site is full.

The applicant has provided a site plan that indicates where all parking and shunting will occur on site. The zoning ordinance provides specific parking requirements for office/retail/showroom areas, office and warehousing uses, but not for a self-storage facility. Where specific requirements are not listed, the city uses information collected from the American Planning Association and the Institute of Traffic Engineers to determine the appropriate amount of parking required.

The parking requirements established for this use in 2013 through the staff review was 65 parking spaces, and the site accommodated 65 parking stalls at that time, which included all truck and trailer parking. The revised parking plan indicates there will be 19 customer stalls located near the eastern entrance of the building after the restriping, in addition to the truck and trailer parking and shunting lanes. If the site were ever to be used for a different type of industrial business in the future, the shunting lanes could be restriped to provide additional stalls if they were necessary.

Section 21565.07 Subd. 18 of the zoning ordinance establishes truck or trailer rental operations as a conditional use permit with the following performance standards included in the ordinance:

- a) Rental vehicles and trailers shall be parked on a paved surface that conforms to Section 21135 of this Chapter. *All parking is on a paved surface*.
- b) Parking, driveway, and circulation standards and requirements shall comply with Section 21135 of this Chapter. *All parking, driveway and circulation standards and requirements are met.*
- c) There shall be no outside repair or maintenance of vehicles or trailers. *No outside repair or maintenance is planned with this amendment.*
- d) No outside storage of parts, equipment, or damaged vehicles or trailers shall be allowed. *No outside storage, other than that of trucks and trailers, is proposed.*
- e) Rental vehicles and trailers shall not be parked or stored within a required front yard area. *The front yard has been determined to be 13<sup>th</sup> Avenue North and no truck or trailer parking is proposed in this yard.*

Staff used the attached conditional use permit standards to review the request and finds it would meet all of the applicable standards. Specifically, the proposed use: 1) would be consistent with

the comprehensive plan; 2) would not endanger the public health or safety; 3) would not be injurious to other properties in the vicinity or to the City as a whole; and 4) would not impede the orderly development of surrounding properties.

#### **Findings**

The Planning Commission must review the conditional use permit amendment request for compliance with Section 21565.07 Subd. 18 and Section 21015 in the zoning ordinance.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Community and Economic Development Department staff recommends approval of the conditional use permit amendment to reconfigure the parking lot to provide more truck/trailer parking in the east parking lot and to provide shunting lanes in the east and west parking lots. The parking of trucks/trailers/equipment related to the U-Haul use is allowed on site as long as all required drive aisles are maintained and all parking is within the confines of the paved parking lot/striped areas as shown on the attached site plan. A condition of this nature has been included on the resolution of approval.

If new information is brought forward at the public hearing, staff may alter or reconsider its recommendation.

WHEREAS, Amerco Real Estate Company, on behalf of U-Haul, has requested approval of a conditional use permit, variances and site plan amendment to allow a truck and trailer rental operation accessory to a self-storage facility at 1225 State Highway 169; and

WHEREAS, the subject property is legally described as follows:

Par 1: Tract D, Registered Land Survey No. 1251, Hennepin County, Minnesota and Par 2: Tract A, Registered Land Survey No. 1254, Hennepin County, Minnesota.

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission has reviewed said request at a duly called public hearing and recommends approval.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MINNESOTA, that it should and hereby does approve the request for a conditional use permit, drive-aisle variance, screening variance and site plan amendment to allow a rental truck and trailer operation accessory to a self-storage facility at 1225 State Highway 169, subject to the following conditions and findings:

- 1. The conditional use permit to allow an accessory truck and trailer rental operation on the site is hereby approved, in accordance with the application and plans received by the city on February 5 and 11, 2013, except as may be amended by this resolution, based on the finding that all applicable conditional use permit standards have been met.
- 2. The variance requested to allow a drive-aisle to be located 19.5 feet from the north property line where the ordinance requires 25 feet is hereby approved, in accordance with the application and plans received by the city on February 5 and 11, 2013, except as may be amended by this resolution, based on the finding that all applicable variance standards have been met.
- 3. The variance requested to allow 10 rental trucks stored on the site without screening is hereby approved, in accordance with the application and plans received by the city on February 5 and 11, 2013, except as may be amended by this resolution, based on the finding that all applicable variance standards have been met. Specifically: a) the property is guided and zoned for industrial development in an industrial area; b) storing the trucks and trailers on the east side of the property is consistent with the operation and logistics of the proposed

business, and c) the applicant has no means to alter the grade difference between the existing parking lot and State Highway 169 or provide effective screening.

- 4. A site plan amendment is approved to allow the following: a) parking lot modifications on the east side of the property; b) drive-aisle installation on the north side of the building and c) overhead door installation and relocation of a pedestrian door in the southeast corner of the building; and d) alter the windows in accordance with the application and plans received by the city on February 5 and 11, 2013, except as may be amended by this resolution.
- 5. **Prior to issuance of building permits**, the following items shall be completed:
  - a. The applicant shall submit an executed site improvement performance agreement for completion of the proposed site improvements, as required by the city.
  - b. The applicant shall revise the plans to indicate the following information:
    - i. Trees and shrubs planted on the north and east sides of the property to soften the appearance of the trucks from the freeway. The plantings will include a minimum of six overstory trees (in conformance with the zoning ordinance) to replace the six trees removed plus additional plantings as needed.
    - ii. A screened parking/storage area for the rental trucks and trailers on the west side of the property and the method of screening consistent with the zoning ordinance. The storage area shall be designed to comply with the parking and circulation requirements in the zoning ordinance.
    - iii. Concrete curb stops shall be used to prevent trucks and trailers backing into the screen fence.
    - iv. All new drive-aisles and the amended parking areas on the east side of the site shall be protected by B6/12 curb and gutter.
    - v. Add parking lot islands on the east side of the northeastern driveway and the south side of the east driveway.
    - vi. The materials and colors proposed for the installation of the overhead doors in the southeast corner of the site shall be consistent with the existing building.
    - vii. Remove the abandoned tank pads on the west side of the accessory building.
    - viii. Remove the canopy structure from the plan.
- 6. No vehicle fuel sales are permitted on the property. Propane sales in containers (i.e. for barbeque grills) are permitted with approval of an administrative permit.
- 7. No vehicles or trailers may be sold from the site without further approval of a conditional use permit, subject to the conditions listed in the zoning ordinance.
- 8. No rental vehicles or trailers shall be stored on unpaved surfaces or within a required front yard.
- 9. No outside repair or maintenance of the rental trucks or trailers is allowed nor is outside storage of parts, equipment or damaged trucks or trailers allowed.

10. Except for the 10 display trucks in the numbered parking spaces, no overnight storage of rental trucks and trailers is permitted on the east side of the property.



#### **Project Narrative**

AREC (Amerco Real Estate Company), on behalf of U-Haul, is requesting an amendment to the 2013 approved conditional use permit (CUP) attached to their self-storage facility at 1225 State Highway 169; and

WHEREAS the subject property is legally described as follows:

Par 1: Tract D, Registered Land Survey No. 1251, Hennepin County, Minnesota and

Par 2: Tract A, Registered Land Survey No. 1254, Hennepin County, Minnesota.

Part of the CUP approval was a variance to allow 10 U-Haul rental trucks on site. U-Haul's customer demand for their trucks has exceeded and it appears that more than the approved 10 U-Haul trucks are required on site. AREC is making this CUP Amendment submittal, for the opportunity to receive Plymouth City's participation and counseling. The other approved conditions related to the U-Haul trucks in the approved CUP resolution, shall remain as such, while increasing the number of U-Haul trucks on site.

The following information further explains the use of U-Haul truck and trailer share as it relates to this site, focusing specifically on the parking of vehicles and the vehicles themselves.

Customers can reserve U-Haul vehicles in-person or via U-Haul's online reservation system. When customers arrive on site, they are escorted by directional signage to U-Haul's customer pick-up and drop-off area where their truck is ready for them to utilize. Truck sharing is intended to substitute for privately owned trucks thus reducing the carbon footprint in the community and encouraging a more sustainable environment. Sharing U-Haul's trucks allows individuals access to a variety of moving options, while keeping private costs down.

U-Haul truck and trailer share is a dynamic use, with trucks being rented and returned by customers on a daily basis. To accommodate the coming and going of vehicles, U-Haul uses shunting lanes to temporarily stage their vehicles that are ready to be dispatched for customer use. Shunting lanes allow U-Haul vehicles to be parked in a neat and orderly fashion, with trucks parked rear bumper to front bumper, ensuring the area is used in the most efficient way possible. Truck sharing vehicles ready for customer use shall be parked only in the designated Equipment Shunting Area for Dispatching. There will be no off-street parking allowed. There will be no semi-truck parking on site. Only U-Haul employees have access to the shunting lanes and are the only ones who will be maneuvering vehicles in and out of this area.

U-Haul is monitored by a real time inventory control system that allows them to limit incoming U-Haul vehicles as necessary. If inventory is going to create an overflow of vehicles on a specific lot, incoming customers are routed to a nearby location to avoid unsightly and unorganized overflow. This will help to control not only the inventory at this location but also to aid with any nearby U-Haul dealers.

U-Haul looks forward to working with the City of Plymouth, MN, as you consider this CUP Amendment submittal. The proposed location of the additional U-Haul trucks and trailers is provided on the aerial, attached on the following page.

# 1. Action Requested:

Adopt attached resolution approving certification of delinquent utility accounts, false alarms, tree removal, weed eradication charges, and establish the interest rate.

# 2. Background:

Each year, the council conducts a public hearing to review delinquent utility accounts, false alarm fees, diseased tree removal, weed eradication, and other miscellaneous charges. After the hearing, council is authorized to certify the delinquent charges of the benefiting property to the county for collection with property taxes.

Letters are mailed to the individual property owners in advance of the public hearing date advising each property owner of the proposed assessment and their right to be heard before the council. This year, staff mailed 1,346 letters to accounts that were considered past due which approximates last year's mailing of 1,377 letters.

Property owners have until October 31 to pay the outstanding balance to avoid the proposed assessment. Many residents pay the delinquent amount before the certification deadline to avoid interest and penalties. Each year, approximately half of the accounts are paid in full reducing the final amount actually certified to the county. To date, 833 delinquent accounts remain with a total dollar amount outstanding of \$411,431 compared to 761 delinquent accounts and \$330,253 outstanding in 2022.

The property owners identified as delinquent were provided a city service and were billed through the regular invoice process. Staff recommends collecting the past due balances by certifying the amount to the owner's property taxes payable in 2024, which would include an administrative penalty fee of \$27.50 and interest at a rate of 3.68% if not paid by the October 31 deadline.

The deadline to submit a request for public hearing appearance was September 15. Staff did not receive any such requests.





# INTERIM ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE OPERATION OF CANNABIS BUSINESSES

### THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

### SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.

- A. By enacting 2023 Session Laws Chapter 63, the Minnesota Legislature enacted Minn. Stat. ch. 342, legalizing adult-use cannabis and permitting the operation of cannabis businesses and the sale of cannabis flower and cannabis products for human consumption. This law creates a new agency, the Office of Cannabis Management, to regulate the sales of cannabis products.
- B. The new law does enact some requirements for production, labeling, and testing, and sale of cannabis products at the state government level. However, the new law creates uncertainty that will need to be resolved by the passage of further regulations by the Office of Cannabis Management.
- C. The new law establishes that cannabis businesses are subject to a new local registration system and must comply with local zoning code. The new law provides no guidance on how cities are to zone the new businesses, leaving it to local control.
- D. Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 342.13, the city is authorized to adopt an interim ordinance prohibiting the operation of a cannabis business in order to protect the planning process and the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens. Under Minn. Stat. § 342.13, such ordinance may remain in effect until January 1, 2025.
- E. Pursuant to its general police powers, including but not limited to, Minn. Stat. § 412.221, subd. 32, the city may enact regulations regarding to promote the health, safety, order, convenience, and the general welfare of the city. This power permits the city to implement a moratorium to study the selling, testing, manufacturing, and distributing of cannabis products to determine if regulations are necessary for the sake of good order of the city.
- F. The City Council finds that it is necessary to study the application of 2023 Session Laws Chapter 63, and the products, uses, and businesses related thereto, in order to assess the necessity for and efficacy of regulations and restrictions relating to the selling, testing, manufacturing, and distributing of cannabis flower and cannabis products including through zoning ordinances, in order to protect the public health, safety, and welfare of its residents.

SECTION 2. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>. The following terms when used in this ordinance shall mean:

Official controls. "Official controls" or "controls" means ordinances and regulations which control the physical development of the city or any part thereof or any detail thereof and implement the general objectives of the comprehensive plan. Official controls include ordinances establishing zoning, subdivision controls, site plan regulations, sanitary codes, building codes, and official maps.

Cannabis Business. "Cannabis Business" has the meaning given in Minn. Stat. § 342.01, subd. 14, as amended.

Cannabis Flower. "Cannabis Flower" has the meaning given in Minn. Stat. § 342.01, subd. 16, as amended.

Cannabis Product. has the meaning given in Minn. Stat. § 342.01, subd. 20, as amended.

### SECTION 3. INTENT AND AUTHORIZATION:

- A. It is the intent of this ordinance to allow the City of Plymouth time to complete a study concerning adoption of revisions of the city's official controls for the manufacturing, testing, distributing, and selling of Cannabis Flower and Cannabis Products, and the operation of Cannabis Businesses.
- B. City staff is directed and authorized to conduct a study of the city's official controls that may need to be adopted or amended to protect the public health, safety, and welfare as they relate to the manufacturing, testing, distributing, and selling of Cannabis Flower and Cannabis Products, and the operation of Cannabis Businesses.

### SECTION 4. MORATORIUM.

A. Pending the completion of the above referenced study and the adoption of appropriate official controls, the following is prohibited within the city:

The manufacturing, distributing, and selling of Cannabis Flower and Cannabis Products, and the operation of any Cannabis Business.

- B. The city shall not issue any license, permission, or permit related to the manufacture, distribution, and sale of Cannabis Flower, Cannabis Product, or the Operation of any Cannabis Business.
- C. This moratorium does not apply to the selling, testing, manufacturing, or distributing of Cannabis Products or Cannabis Flower or the operation of Cannabis Businesses related to the Medical Cannabis Program as administered by the Minnesota Department of Health, provided that such activity is done in accordance with the regulations and laws of Minnesota regarding Medical Cannabis.
- SECTION 5. <u>ENFORCEMENT.</u> The city may enforce this Ordinance by mandamus, injunctive relief, or other appropriate civil remedy in any court of competent jurisdiction. The City Council hereby authorizes the City Manager, in consultation with the City Attorney, to initiate any legal action deemed necessary

to secure compliance with this Ordinance. A violation of this Ordinance is also subject to the city's general penalty in City Code § 2000.01.

SECTION 6. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE AND TERM.</u> This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and shall remain in effect until January 1, 2025, or until the adoption of the official controls being studied, whichever occurs first.

- Ordinance concerning smoking in city parks currently smoking tobacco in the parks is prohibited through a council policy, which provides no enforceable penalties for violations. This ordinance provides consistency in the enforcement of prohibiting smoking tobacco, cannabis, and hemp in city parks.

# ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER IX OF THE PLYMOUTH CITY CODE CONCERNING THE PUBLIC USE OF CANNABIS AND HEMP

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MINNESOTA, ORDAINS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Chapter IX of the Plymouth City Code is amended to add a new Section 970 "Public Use of Cannabis and Hemp" to read as follows:

SECTION 970: PUBLIC USE OF CANNABIS PRODUCTS

970.01. – Definitions.

For purposes of this Section, the terms defined herein have the meanings given them.

CANNABIS: Any product containing the harvested flower, bud, leaves, or stems of a plant of the genus Cannabis that has a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis. Cannabis includes adult-use cannabis flower, medical cannabis flower, and any derivative, concentrate, extract, resin, or other product made from a cannabis plant.

HEMP: Any product containing the harvested flower, bud, leaves, or stems of a plant of the genus Cannabis that has a delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of no more than 0.3 percent on a dry weight basis. Hemp includes any derivative, concentrate, extract, resin, or other product made from a hemp plant.

ELECTRONIC DELIVERY DEVICE: Any product containing or delivering a substance intended for human consumption through the inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device includes, but is not limited to, devices manufactured, marketed or sold as e-cigarettes, e-cigars, e-pipes, vape pens, mods, tank systems, or under any other product name or descriptor.

SMOKING: Inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted or heated product that is intended for inhalation. Smoking included using an electronic delivery device.

PUBLIC PLACE: Property owned, leased, or controlled by a governmental unit. Public Place does not include the following:

- (1) a private residence including the person's curtilage or yard; or
- private property not generally accessible by the public, unless the person is explicitly prohibited from consuming cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower-potency hemp

edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products on the property by the owner of the property; or

the premises of an establishment or event licensed to permit on-site consumption.

970.02. - Prohibited Activity.

No person shall smoke cannabis or hemp in a public place.

970.03. - Penalty.

Violation of this section shall be a petty misdemeanor.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its passage.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MINNESOTA, ORDAINS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Chapter VIII, Section 805.01 of the Plymouth City Code is with the following original text, <u>new text</u>, and <del>deleted text</del>:

805.01. - Park Regulations.

- Subd. 1. Application. This Section applies to public parks described as park land, lake, stream, pond, trail, nature area, open space or recreation center and amenities within. It should also mean any other property owned, leased, used or controlled, wholly or partly by the City for parks and recreation use.
- <u>Subd. 2. Definitions. The following words, terms and phrases, as used herein, shall have the following meanings:</u>

ELECTRONIC DELIVERY DEVICE: Any product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia or any other substance, whether natural or synthetic, intended for human consumption through the inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device includes, but is not limited to, devices manufactured, marketed or sold as e-cigarettes, e-cigars, e-pipes, vape pens, mods, tank systems, or under any other product name or descriptor.

SMOKING: Inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe or any other lighted or heated product containing, made or derived from nicotine, cannabis, hemp, or other plant or substance, whether natural or synthetic, that is intended for inhalation. Smoking will also include using an electronic delivery device.

<u>SECTION</u> 2. Section 805.09 of the Plymouth City Code is hereby amended with the following original text, <u>new text</u>, and <del>deleted text</del>::

805.09. - Prohibited Acts; Regulations.

Subd. 17.	Smoking. Smoking is prohibited in all City Parks, in all public parking lots that are
	adjacent to City Parks, and inside all motor vehicles located in any City Park or adjacent

In order to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to preserve the property of the City, the Director of Parks and Recreation or his/hertheir designee is authorized and directed to establish additional written regulation which shall define, in precise detail the procedures to be followed in the use of the parks.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its passage.

### 1. Action Requested:

Authorize city staff to negotiate a three-year extension to the current Republic Services recycling contract, and include a four-year term for city-organized curbside collection of source-separated organic materials.

### 2. Background:

At the July 25 Special Council Meeting, staff received direction from council to begin preliminary discussions with Republic Services to extend municipal recycling services for calendar years 2025-2027 for traditional single sort curbside recycling collection. In addition, staff was asked to explore the possibility of contracting city-led organized curbside collection of source-separated organic materials with Republic Services.

The current Municipal Recycling Services Agreement with Republic Services, effective January 1, 2019, is set to expire December 31, 2024 for traditional single sort curbside recycling. To maintain continuation of recycling services, staff began working with Republic Services to understand 2025-2027 pricing as the contract allows for a three-year extension. Neighboring cities recently bid municipal recycling services on the open market, with results that have not been favorable in terms of pricing. If final negotiations are not successful, enough time remains to bid municipal recycling services without interruption to curbside service.

In addition to curbside recycling collection, the city is exploring city-led organized curbside collection of source-separated organic materials with Republic Services, supplementing the negotiations of the current Municipal Recycling Services Agreement. This option would function similarly to the current curbside recycling program, where the city establishes a contract, and everyone pays the same fee. Benefits to residents may include increased efficiency, less truck traffic in neighborhoods and a cost-savings, rather than requiring all licensed haulers to offer curbside collection of source-separated organic materials to their customers and set their own fee for the service.

When licensed garbage haulers were required by Hennepin County (Ordinance 13) to begin offering curbside organics recycling collection to residents in 2022, haulers independently determined collection services and pricing structure. However, the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency recently provided clarification to the county regarding state law, which requires garbage haulers to charge all residential customers the same fee for curbside organics recycling collection – regardless of

whether they utilize the service or not. The law, Minnesota Statute 115A.93, is aimed at prohibiting solid waste collectors from imposing a greater charge on residents who recycle than those who do not, which includes source-separated organic materials.

Before bringing a recommendation to council, staff wanted to ensure a robust public outreach. Residents were invited to participate in a citywide survey regarding curbside organics collection, supplemented by a FlashVote survey, to provide opportunities for feedback. Information about the survey was included in a city newsletter article regarding organics. In both survey results, a majority of residents believe the city should lead single-hauler organized curbside collection of organics. Less than one-third of respondents were opposed to a city-led program. The survey results are attached.

Upon authorization by council to proceed with final contract negotiations of a three-year extension (2025-2027) of single sort recycling and a four-year term (2024-2027) for organized organics with Republic Services, staff will also finalize ancillary services within the contract, such as the centralized organics drop off site, servicing garbage and recycling to all municipal facilities, and participation in the annual spring Drop Off Day event.

Upon final contract negotiations and revisions, the contract with Republic Services will be brought to council likely in October for approval.

### 3. Budget Impact:

Republic Services has offered the city pricing for single sort recycling collection starting at \$4.75 monthly in 2025, with a 4.5% annual increase through 2027. Organics curbside collection is based on participation percentage, ranging from 2024 pricing of \$3.00 per month for up to 10% participation, to \$6.00 per month for up to 50% participation. Organics curbside collection will have a 4% annual increase through 2027.

For comparison, St Louis Park has a low bid for 2025 single sort recycling pricing of \$5.60 per month, increasing 4.5% per year, and 2024 organics pricing ranging from \$5.00 to \$6.00 per month, increasing 4.5% per year.

## **AGREEMENT**

## **General Conditions and Terms**

This Agreement is made on the 24<sup>th</sup> day of April, 2018 between the City of Plymouth [hereinafter "City"] and Allied Waste Services of North America, LLC. a Delaware limited liability company, d/b/a Republic Services of the Twin Cities- Blaine [hereinafter "Contractor"].

## **Preliminary Statement**

The purpose of this Agreement is to set forth terms and conditions for the provision of MUNICIPAL RECYCLING SERVICES by the Contractor for the City. The City and Contractor agree as follows:

#### 1 Contract Documents

The following documents shall be referred to as the "Contract Documents", all of which shall be taken together as a whole as the contract between the parties as if they were set verbatim and in full herein:

- A. This Agreement
- B. Specifications, Exhibit "A"
- C. Compensation, Exhibit "B"
- D. Trash Collection, Exhibit "C"
- E. Special Collection/Drop Off Day, Exhibit "D"

In the event of conflict among the provisions of the Contract Documents, the order in which they are listed above shall control in resolving any such conflicts, with Contract Document "A" having the first priority, and Contract Document "D" having the last priority. Residential collection shall occur on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, except for changes due to holidays, weather events, and other unscheduled interruptions. Collection will begin Thursday, January 3, 2019.

## 2 Compensation for Services

Compensation for Services: The City agrees to pay the Contractor for services as described in Exhibit B, attached and made a part of this Agreement.

## 3 Method of Payment

The Contractor shall submit itemized invoices for services provided to the City on a monthly basis. The Contractor shall provide documentation and reports as required by the City in Exhibit A. Invoices must include a copy of the corresponding month's Recycling Materials Revenue Report. Approved invoices will be paid based on the City's normal reimbursement schedule. The City processes all approved invoices within 30 days of receipt. The City will not approve penalty payments for past due dates. The City may withhold payment including, but not limited to, defective service or work, failure to meet obligations as proposed or contracted, or resulting contract and damages, or for not submitting reports. The City bills residents directly for recycling services. The Contractor may invoice residents directly only if the resident is a customer and has requested extra collection, regular trash service, a special collection, or a special

service. The Contractor may not invoice residents directly for regular collection of curbside recycling services.

#### 4 Revenue Sharing

The City shall receive a credit based on the Net Proceeds of the sale of recyclable materials collected the previous month in the City, if there are positive net proceeds from the sale. The Net Proceeds shall be applied to all recyclable materials collected from all program elements (i.e. curbside and drop-off). The per ton processing fee and formula for sharing Net Proceeds as described in Exhibit B, attached and made a part of this Agreement.

## 5 Withholding of Payment

If the Contractor does not comply with Collection Requirements as outlined in Exhibit A, City will withhold payment and no late fee will be assessed by the Contractor.

## 6 Materials Disposition

Contractor shall assure that all recyclables collected in the City are not landfilled or incinerated, and are distributed to appropriate markets for recycling. No recyclables will be landfilled or incinerated by the Contractor without written authorization from the City and the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency. If the Contractor determines that there is no market for a particular recyclable or that the market has become economically unfeasible, the Contractor shall promptly give written notice to the City. Said notice shall include information demonstrating the effort the Contractor has made to find market alternatives, and the financial information justifying the conclusion that the market is economically unfeasible. Upon receipt of said notice, the Contractor and the City shall have 60 days to attempt to find a feasible market. During this period the Contractor shall continue to pick up the particular recyclable. If the Contractor or the City is not able to find a market within 60 days or develop a market plan, the City has the option to either:

- (A) Require the Contractor to continue to collect the particular recyclable. In such case, the City would pay the Contractor, as additional compensation, the tipping fee, and any other fees or other costs charged to Contractor, at the Hennepin Energy Recovery Center [HERC] or a mutually agreeable alternative site. The Contractor is required to keep accurate records of said fees and costs and provide the City receipts of payment;
- (B) Notify the Contractor to cease collection of the particular recyclable until a feasible market is located, either by the Contractor or by the City. The Contractor and City would then be jointly responsible for the cost of printing and distributing educational materials explaining the market situation to residents. If the City notifies the Contractor to cease collection of a particular recyclable, the parties shall immediately meet to renegotiate the collection price for service.

#### 7 Audit Disclosure

The Contractor shall allow the City or its duly authorized agents reasonable access to such of the Contractor's books and records as are pertinent to all services provided under this Agreement. All finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, drawings, maps (including all route maps created by the Contractor), models, photographs, and reports prepared by the Contractor for the City shall become the property of the City upon termination of this Agreement.

## 8 Term of This Agreement

The term of this Agreement shall be from January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2024, the date of signature by the parties notwithstanding. This Agreement may be extended upon the written mutual consent of the parties for additional three-year periods as they deem appropriate, and upon the terms and conditions as herein stated.

#### 9 Termination

Except as provided below, this Agreement may be terminated by either party upon written notice to the other party outlining that party's failure to timely perform its responsibilities under the Agreement and giving said party ninety (90) days to cure said default. The City may terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice to the Contractor if the Contractor fails to substantially perform the services specified in Exhibit A on at least four (4) scheduled collection days.

#### 10 Subcontractor

The Contractor shall not enter into subcontracts for any of the services provided for in this Agreement without the express written consent of the City. Pursuant to Minnesota Statute 471.25, Subdivision 4a, the Contractor must pay any subcontractor within ten (10) days of the Contractor's receipt of payment from the City for undisputed services provided by the subcontractor. The Contractor must pay interest of one and one-half percent ( $1\frac{1}{2}$ %) per month or any part of a month to subcontractor on any undisputed amount not paid on time to the subcontractor. The minimum monthly interest penalty payment for an unpaid balance of \$100.00 or more is \$10.00. For an unpaid balance of less than \$100.00, the Contractor shall pay the actual penalty due to the subcontractor. A subcontractor who prevails in a civil action to collect interest penalties from the Contractor shall be awarded its costs and disbursements, including attorney's fees, incurred in bringing the action.

## 11 Independent Contractor

At all times and for all purposes hereunder, the Contractor is an independent contractor and not an employee of the City. No statement herein shall be construed so as to find the Contractor an employee of the City.

## 12 Assignment

Neither party shall assign this Agreement, nor any interest arising herein, without the prior written consent of the other party.

## 13 Services Not Specified

No claim for services furnished by the Contractor not specifically provided for herein, including all Exhibits to this Agreement, shall be honored by the City.

## 14 Market Indices to calculate Revenue Sharing

The Market Indices for selected materials are used to establish the revenue sharing for selected materials. The reported sale price may be more than the indices. The required monthly report will list for each material collected: the required market indices, the processing fee for each material, the tons of material collected, the finished commodity value, the net amount per ton, the total dollar amount of revenue, and these amounts for the previous month.

## 15 Entire Agreement

The entire Agreement of the parties is contained herein. This Agreement supersedes all oral Agreements and negotiations between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof as well as any previous Agreements presently in effect between the parties relating to the subject matter hereof. Any alterations, amendments, deletions, or waivers of the provisions of this Agreement shall be valid only when expressed in writing and duly signed by the parties, unless otherwise provided herein.

## 16 Compliance with Laws and Regulations

In providing services hereunder, the Contractor shall abide by all statutes, ordinances, rules, and regulations pertaining to the provision of services to be provided hereunder. Any violation shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

## 17 Equal Opportunity

During the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor, in compliance with Executive Order 11246, as amended by Executive Order 11375 and Department of Labor regulations 41 CFR Part 60, shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The Contractor shall take affirmative action to insure that applicants for employment are qualified, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

#### 18 Waiver

Any waiver by either party of a breach of any provisions of the executed Agreement shall not affect, in any respect, the validity of the remainder of the executed Agreement.

#### 19 Indemnification

The Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the City, its employees and agents, for all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees, which they may suffer or for which they may be held liable, to the extent of the fault of the negligence of the Contractor, its employees, or subcontractors in the performance of this Agreement. The Contractor shall also pay any expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred by the City in enforcing this indemnification requirement.

#### 20 Insurance

Within fourteen (14) days of the date of this Agreement, the Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance as proof of liability coverage for bodily injury or death in the amount of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for any one person, and in the sum of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for two or more persons for the same occurrence, and for damages to property in the sum of two million dollars (\$2,000,000). The certificate of insurance shall name the City as an additional insured and state that the Contractor's coverage shall be the primary coverage in the event of a loss. Further, the certificate shall provide for thirty (30) days written notice to the City before cancellation of coverage.

#### 21 Automobile Insurance

The Contractor shall provide a certificate of insurance as proof of liability coverage for a single limit or combined limit or excess umbrella automobile liability insurance policy covering agency owned, non-

owned, and hired vehicles used regularly in the provision of services under this Agreement in an amount of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per accident for property damage; not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for death or bodily injury, and/or damage to any one person; and not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for total bodily injuries and/or damages arising from any one accident.

## 22 Performance and Payment Bonds

The Contractor shall execute and deliver to the City performance and payment bonds with a corporate surety in the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000). This Agreement shall not become effective until such a bond in a form acceptable to the City, has been delivered to the City and approved by the City Attorney. This Agreement shall be subject to termination by the City at any time if said bond shall be canceled or the surety thereon relieved from liability for any reason. Upon renewal or extension of this Agreement, Contractor will execute and deliver to the City an acceptable performance bond, approved by the City Attorney and complying with the requirements above to cover the entire period of renewal or extension.

## 23 Timely Communications of Problems

The Contractor and the City shall make every reasonable effort to use timely and direct communications (e.g. phone, e-mail and/or in-person meetings) to address operational problems and service issues to prevent occurrences resulting in liquidated damages.

## 24 Liquidated Damages

The City shall notify the Contractor by means of formal written (including electronic writing) notice of each act or omission by Contractor in breach of Contractor's obligations under this Agreement that are discovered by the City. The formal notice will outline the issue and the violation. After notice has been provided by the City, the Contractor shall be liable for liquidated damages, at the following rates, if performance has not occurred consistent with the provisions of this Agreement. The City may invoice the Contractor for the full amount of any damages. The remedy available to the City under this paragraph shall be in addition to all other remedies that the City may have under law or at equity.

#### 24.1 Exceptions:

For the purposes of this Agreement, the Contractor shall not be deemed to be liable for damages where its inability to perform recycling collection service is the result of conditions beyond the control of the Contractor, including but not limited to, civil disorder, acts of God, or severe weather, changes in applicable statutes, regulations, and ordinances, labor disputes, and significant road construction; provided, however, that the Contractor shall use commercially best efforts to obtain approval for the delay from the designated City staff person prior to 4:00 p.m. of the scheduled collection day. When the City and the Contractor have upon mutual agreement determined that the Contractor may safely resume collection service, the Contractor shall have five (5) days (excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays) to provide such service. In the event of a continuing failure beyond said period, the Contractor shall not be entitled to payment for any residential dwelling unit not serviced. In the event that the City has approved a delay beyond the five (5) days the Contractor will not be assessed penalties as specified above.

#### 24.2 Non-compliant, missed pick-up

A non-compliant missed pickup is defined as recycling service not provided to a CDU (as defined in Exhibit B) or a City designated recycling (Exhibit B, Section 1.4) or trash stop (Exhibit C) during

collection hours on the scheduled day or alternate day of collection, and the address did not appear on the driver's records as an unacceptable set-out, nor as a not-out. Contractor may be assessed liquidated damages of one hundred dollars (\$100) per instance of a non-compliant missed pickup. No notice from a resident, customer or the City is necessary to trigger the start of the liquidated damages. The Contractor may return the same day, or before 12:00 p.m. the next business day without the assessment of liquidated damages to collect the material. Liquidated damages do not apply to carts that are reported as partially emptied.

#### 24.3 Missed Collection, Drop-off Center

Contractor may be assessed liquidated damages of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) per daily occurrence for failure to collect, empty, and return all containers for the drop-off center, failure to clean up excess material, and/or failure to report issues.

#### 24.4 Administrative Non-Compliance

Whenever the Contractor performs services in a manner that is non-compliant with this Agreement, Contractor may be assessed liquidated damages of two thousand dollar (\$2,000) per occurrence. The Contractor shall pay the City separately from the monthly invoice and not deduct such payment from monthly billing. Examples include but may not be limited to: failure to comply with customer service requirements; failure to provide monthly and annual reports in a timely manner; failure to document, report, and clean hydraulic spills or material spills in a timely manner; failure to report operational changes of disposal sites, material processing, formula changes, end markets; failure to conduct and report actual monthly participation and set-out studies; failure to conduct and report annual composition analysis or agreed upon alternative; failure to maintain vehicles in proper working order; failure to deliver, exchange or remove a cart at the correct address in a timely manner; failure to pick up and report litter issues caused by collection; and failure to correct chronic issues.

## 25 Workers' Compensation Insurance

The Contractor shall provide workers' compensation insurance covering all employees of the Contractor engaged in the performance of the Agreement, in accordance with the Minnesota Workers' Compensation Law.

#### 26 Conflict of Interest

The Contractor agrees that no elected official, officer, employee or other representative of the City shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof. Violation of this provision shall cause this Agreement to be null and void and Contractor will forfeit any payments to be made under this Agreement.

## 27 Data Practices/Records

All data created, collected, received, maintained or disseminated for any purpose in the course of this Agreement is governed by the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minn. Stat. Ch. 13, any other applicable state statute, or any state rules adopted to implement the act, as well as federal regulations on data privacy. All books, records, documents and accounting procedures and practices of the Contractor and its subcontractors, if any, relative to this Agreement are subject to examination by the City.

## 28 Governing Law

This Agreement shall be controlled by the laws of the State of Minnesota.

## 29 Severability

If any provision, term, or condition of this Agreement is found to be or become unenforceable or invalid, it shall not affect the remaining provisions, terms and conditions of this Agreement, unless such invalid or unenforceable provision, term or condition renders this Agreement impossible to perform. Such remaining terms and conditions of the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect and shall continue to operate as the parties' entire contract.

#### 30 Amendments

The provisions of this Agreement shall remain in force and effect without change. Amendments may be mutually negotiated by both parties but shall not go into effect until reduced to writing and executed by the authorized representatives of the City and the Contractor. If the City's residential curbside recycling program is substantially changed or altered due to Hennepin County Resolution No. 11-0306R2, revisions to Hennepin County Ordinance 13, if the County significantly alters their Residential Recycling Funding Policy, or if the City endeavors to explore organics, multi-family and/or commercial institutional programing, the City and the Contractor shall re-negotiate in good faith the affected provisions of this Agreement.

# EXHIBIT A: RECYCLING COLLECTION, PROCESSING AND MARKETING SPECIFICATIONS

#### 1. Introduction

These specifications define the requirements of the RECYCLING COLLECTION PROGRAM for the City of Plymouth.

#### 2. Definitions

**Cart:** A container in three to four sizes (20-plus gallons to 90-plus gallons) with hinged lid and wheels, used for collection of solid waste, including recyclable material and organics.

**Certified Dwelling Unit (CDU):** Means a single family home and each residential unit in a building up to an eight-plex, or townhouse complex. Residential units in structures (other than townhouses) containing more than eight dwelling units may be designated as CDU's upon mutual agreement by the City and the Contractor.

**Collection Route:** Means a contiguous geographic area that Contractor determines will be serviced by one collection vehicle and which may be used to measure collection progress. These routes and changes to the routes must be approved by the City.

**Collection Vehicle:** Any vehicle licensed and inspected by the City, the County, the Minnesota Department of Transportation, and/or the U.S. Department of Transportation for collection of solid waste or recyclables.

**Contractor:** Person or persons authorized by the City to perform recycling collection services on prescribed routes within Collection Districts in the City.

**Composition:** Composition of recyclable materials are an estimated percentage based on the results of the Recycling Composition Analysis as required in this Agreement.

**Education Tag:** Means an information tag notifying residents about issues regarding their cart or recyclable materials. The tag contains information regarding preparation requirements. The driver leaves the tag at the residence on the cart.

**Household:** Means a single-family household or a multi-family building unit that is eligible for City recycling collection services.

Market Indicies for Purposes of Revenue Sharing: The published index price is specified in the RFP for purposes of calculating revenue sharing. The published index price shall serve as the basis from which the processing fee is deducted for calculating the Contractor's amount of net revenue sharing for each commodity.

Material Recovery Facility (MRF): The facility (or series of facilities) used for the receiving, sorting, processing, storing and other steps to prepare recyclable commodities for marketing and ultimately to be recycled. The facility conforms to all applicable rules, regulations and laws of

state, local or other jurisdictions. A MRF does not include the end market facilities (e.g., mills) that manufacture new products from the recyclable commodities.

**Net Proceeds:** The revenue received from the sale of all recyclable materials minus the agreed upon processing fees which are labor and equipment charges made by the Contractor handling the processing for sale of recyclables as set forth in Exhibit B.

**Not-out:** A driver record that a cart was not at the curb at an address on the scheduled collection day by 7:00 a.m.

Participation Rate or Set-Out Rate: The number of specific CDU's on a recycling route which set out recyclable material in carts at some point during a defined period of time (industry standard is one month) as a percentage of the overall number of eligible CDU's during that same defined period of time.

**Private roads:** Private roads are surfaces for which the ownership and maintenance are the responsibility of individuals or entities which are not the City nor other government entities.

**Process Residuals:** The material from the MRF that cannot be recycled, recovered, reused and must be disposed. Process residuals may include prohibited materials not acceptable in the City's curbside program and process loss derived from residual materials no longer marketable.

**Processing:** The sorting, volume reduction, baling, containment or other preparation of recyclable materials delivered to the MRF for subsequent re-manufacturing or reuse.

**Processing Fee:** The agreed upon unit fee allocated toward the Contractor's cost of processing the many types of recyclables.

**Program Element:** There are two program elements within the City's comprehensive recycling system: (1) curbside, (2) drop-off.

**Recyclable Materials or Recyclables:** all items that would otherwise be disposed of as solid waste that are designated by the City, the County, or the State of Minnesota to be part of an authorized recycling program, which shall be either separated at the source by the generator, or by the collector or processor, for the purpose of recycling or remanufacturing, or for reuse. The recyclable materials or recyclables shall include the materials listed below and any other materials mutually agreed upon by the Contractor and the City in the future.

- Aseptic cartons, Gable top cartons: Cartons used to package milk, juice, broth, soup and other liquids, and dry products.
- Boxboard packaging: used for food, storage in refrigerator, and dry goods, except boxes designed for frozen storage.
- Corrugated cardboard: unless contaminated with food, or coated with wax or plastic.
- Glass containers: all glass food and beverage containers.

- **Metal containers:** aluminum, steel, bimetal food and beverage containers, and foil and foil trays not contaminated with food.
- Mixed paper: direct mail, envelopes, school and office paper, receipts and bills, hard and soft-covered books, paper bags, notebooks, magazines, catalogs and phone books, and shredded paper.
- Newspaper: including all paper inserts.
- Other Recyclable Materials may also include other materials as mutually agreed upon by the City and Contractor. Recyclable materials also includes any and all solid waste items designated by the Hennepin County Environmental Services Department to be part of an authorized recycling program, and which are intended for processing and re-manufacturing, or reuse.
- Plastic: plastic containers and lids up to nine inches in diameter, except those containers that held hazardous waste. Plastic containers includes these types of plastic: polyethylene terephthalate (PETE, number 1), high density polyethylene (HDPE, number 2), polyvinyl chloride (PVC, number 3), low-density polyethylene (LDPE, number 4), polypropylene (PP, number 5), polystyrene (PS, number 6), and all Other (number 7), unless recycling of a plastic is not required under the laws of the state and local governments, then the plastic may be excluded from the program if mutually agreed upon by the City and the Contractor.

**Recycling Materials Revenue Report:** A monthly report supplied by Contractor with the monthly invoice for recycling services which outlines the revenue or credit to the City for sale of recyclables in a formula and format agreed upon by Contractor and City.

**Revenue Share:** The revenue shared between the Contractor and the City from the sale of recyclable material collected in curbside residential carts and at the drop-off center after the cost of processing the various types of material is subtracted from the revenue.

**Single Sort Recycling:** The system by which the generator places all recyclable materials together in one container, the materials are collected, processed at a MRF, and sorted into their individual marketable commodities.

**Unacceptable Recyclable Materials:** Materials which are prohibited from recycling or organics recycling streams as defined by State of Minnesota statutes and/or Hennepin County policies, or are not accepted by the Contractor, including hazardous waste.

**Walk-up Service:** Door-to-curb collection of recyclables at designated CDU's upon request from the City for residents who request the service from the City and are approved by City staff to receive the service. The resident or customer stores the cart(s) near the house or garage. The Contractor "walks up" to collect the cart, brings it to the truck to empty the cart, and returns the cart to its original location.

## 3. Recyclable Material Preparation

Contractor shall collect CDU recyclables that have been prepared by the residents as directed by the City. Sorting and preparation standards for materials will be "single sort" during the life of the Agreement.

#### 3.1 Manner of Collection

The collection and transportation of recyclables by Contractor will, at no time, create a nuisance or become injurious to the public health of persons living either within or outside the corporate limits of the City.

## 4. Ownership of Materials

All recyclable materials shall remain the responsibility of the resident, property owner, tenant or business establishment until handled by the Contractor at which point it becomes the responsibility and ownership of the Contractor. Title to and liability for Unacceptable Recyclable Materials shall at no time pass to the Contractor and shall remain with the generator of such waste.

## 5. Revenue Sharing

The Contractor shall provide the same level of revenue sharing for the residential curbside and Drop-Off Center recycling programs. However, tonnages shall be itemized separately per program on the monthly invoices and revenue sharing shall be itemized separately on the revenue report.

## 6. Residential Curbside Recycling Program Collection Requirements

Every CDU shall receive curbside recycling collection services every other week. The City of Plymouth is divided into five collection districts with collection on three different days each week. The Contractor shall not change the collection day for any curbside stop without the prior approval of the City. The Contractor will notify the City of any proposed route changes, and provide the City with any revised route, and all the collection maps at least once annually, and more frequently upon request by the City.

#### 6.1 Carts

Contractor will provide storage containers of a size, shape and design acceptable to the City. Any containers provided by Contractor shall remain Contractor's property. Contractor shall be responsible for cleaning up any material spilled from the cart. Carts must be maintained in good working condition at all times. Replacement shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.

#### 6.2 Collection Days

Days of collection will be Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday of each week. If a holiday falls on or before a scheduled collection day in a particular week, recycling collection will be made on the day following the scheduled collection day. If the holiday falls on Friday, collection will be made on Saturday. If the holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, collection will continue as scheduled the following week.

#### 6.2.1 Holidays

The City designates six legal holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

#### 6.3 Collection Hours

Collection shall commence no earlier than 7:00 a.m., but no later than 9:00 a.m. The Contractor shall maintain sufficient equipment and personnel to assure that all collection operations are completed by 5:00 p.m. on each scheduled collection day. Residents will be requested to have recyclable materials placed at the curb before 7:00 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.

## 6.4 Non-Completion of Collection and Extension of Collection Hours

If the Contractor determines that the collection of recyclables will not be completed by 5:00 p.m. on the scheduled collection day, it shall notify the designated City staff person by 4:00 p.m. and request an extension of the collection hours. The Contractor shall inform the City of the areas not completed, the reason for non-completion, and the expected time of completion. If the designated City staff person cannot be reached, the Contractor shall follow the agreed-upon method of communication to inform the City of the delay in collection.

#### 6.5 <u>Non-Compliant Missed Collections</u>

The Contractor shall have a duty to pick up any missed collections. The Contractor agrees to pick up all missed collections on the same day the Contractor receives notice of a missed collection, provided the notice is received by the Contractor before 12:00 p.m. on a business day. With respect to all notices of a missed collection received after 12:00 p.m. on a business day, the Contractor agrees to pick up that missed collection before 12:00 p.m. on the business day immediately following the notice.

#### 6.6 <u>Severe Weather</u>

Recycling collection may be postponed due to severe weather in consultation between the Contractor and the City. Collection will be postponed to a day agreed upon by the Contractor and the City. Recycling collection may be postponed if the local temperature at 6:00 a.m. is at or below minus 20 degrees Fahrenheit.

#### 6.7 Point of Collection

All residential recycling curbside collection will occur at the curb, as defined herein with the exception of designated walk-up service stops. Recycling carts shall be placed by the residents at curbside on collection day, with the handle toward the house and the lid opening toward street. The Contractor shall collect from each participating household, all acceptable materials that have been prepared according to publicized procedures. The driver is required to return carts to the same curbside location as set by the resident, unless the resident has set the cart in the street, on a sidewalk or trail, or in the middle of the private driveway. The Contractor shall make a conscious effort to return the cart with the lid closed and in a standing position.

#### 6.7.1 <u>Carts</u>

Drivers are required to record and report to the Contractor's dispatcher, the location of any recycling container that is damaged. The Contractor shall repair or replace damaged carts within one (1) week of the report of damage.

#### 6.8 Walk-up Service

The Contractor shall provide walk-up service to City designated CDU's upon request of the City at no extra charge. The City will endeavor to ensure that the service is provided only for those residents requesting the service as determined by the City. In the event walk-up service collection

exceeds 0.5% of the total number of CDU's, City and Contractor may agree to negotiate financial compensation for the service. The City will not require the Contractor to enter a building or closed structure to service a property. If the Contractor and the customer agree that the property should be serviced by having the Contractor regularly enter a closed structure or building, the Contractor must provide the City with a copy of the walk-up service agreement signed by the customer and by the Contractor, which agreement must include a City liability waiver. Twice annually in December and in May, the Contractor shall submit a current list of addresses receiving walk-up service.

## 6.9 Compliance with Driving and Hauling Laws

Collection and transportation of all recyclable materials shall be accomplished in accordance with all existing laws and ordinances, and future amendments thereto, of the State of Minnesota and local governing bodies. The Contractor will be properly licensed and insured to operate in the City of Plymouth, Hennepin County, and the State of Minnesota, and shall comply with all statutes, regulations, and ordinances of the state and local governments in the execution of the Agreement.

## 6.10 Weighing of Loads and Reporting Requirements

The Contractor will keep accurate records consisting of an approved weight slip with the date, time, collection route, driver's name, vehicle number, tare weight, gross weight, net weight, and number of recycling stops for each loaded vehicle. The scale to be used by the Contractor will be certified and approved by the City. Copies of all weight tickets shall be included with the monthly invoice to the City. Contractor will provide the City annually with up-to-date route maps, indicating the starting collection point for each route. Contractor will inform the City of route changes at least two weeks before any changes are made and all other route activities that may affect the regular recycling collection schedule. The contractor shall use all means necessary to limit contamination to at or under 15%.

#### 6.11 Procedure for Unacceptable Materials

If the Contractor determines that materials set out are unacceptable, the driver shall use the following procedure. The driver shall leave all the unacceptable recyclable materials and leave an education tag. The tag is provided by the Contractor and approved by the City in the recycling container indicating unacceptable materials and/or the proper method of preparation. The driver shall record the address on forms provided by the Contractor. The Contractor shall report the addresses by the end of month to the City staff in an electronic format mutually agreed upon by the Contractor and City.

## 6.12 <u>Public Education and Promotion</u>

The Contractor will participate in educating City residents on recycling and will seek to promote recycling in a manner mutually agreed upon by the City and the Contractor. The Contractor shall conduct its own promotions and public education to increase participation and improve compliance with City-specified resident preparation instructions. Education efforts may include, but are not limited to, brochures, post cards, and cart hanging tags, cart information packets, signs, videos, presentations to classes and community groups, and events. The Contractor shall submit a draft of any public education literature for approval by the City, at least one (1) month prior to printing and distributing any such literature. The Contractor shall not distribute any education or promotional literature regarding the recycling program or waste reduction, without

prior approval by City staff. The City will work with the Contractor to ensure recycling educational materials conform to Hennepin County Funding Policy requirements. The Contractor shall provide the City with industry-related information, educational materials, articles, video, and other material for City staff to publish or distribute as requested by the City, as well as assist in the development of brochures, articles, and other pieces at the request of the City. The Contractor shall work with the City in developing innovative financial incentives that will help residents, multi-family owners and managers, businesses and institutions increase their recyclables and decrease their mixed solid waste. The Contractor will provide recycling instruction labels for single stream containers. This label shall include concise material sorting instructions for residents. The label shall be attached to the lid of the recycling cart, so it can be easily identified by the resident or customer and the Contractor's drivers as the container for recyclable materials collection. The Contractor shall participate in City-sponsored community events at the request of the City. Participation may include, but is not limited to, staffing an information booth, giving presentations, and displaying recycling trucks and equipment. Such participation shall be related to this Agreement, representative of the Plymouth recycling program, and not construed as an opportunity to prospect trash customers. The Contractor will provide education in alternate formats including, but not limited to electronic, online, video, in-person, events, and tours, and provide education that can be used in schools serving the Plymouth community. This education must address the State of Minnesota's solid waste management hierarchy and priorities. The education provided must be at the Contractor's cost, with no additional cost to the City or schools.

#### 6.13 Clean-up Responsibility

The Contractor shall adequately clean up any material spilled or blown during the course of collection and/or hauling operations. Any unacceptable materials left behind should be secured within resident's recycling container, if provided. Driver shall take all precautions possible to prevent littering of unacceptable recyclables, and shall be responsible for litter created by collection. All collection vehicles shall be equipped with at least one broom and one shovel for use in cleaning up material spillage. Contractor shall have no responsibility to remove or clean up any items which are not recyclable materials. All hydraulic fluid spills and leaks shall be reported by the Contractor immediately to a supervisor and, if it is a danger to public health or safety, to the City Fire Department (911). If the spill is over five gallons, the Contractor must report it to the Minnesota Duty Officer. The Contractor is responsible to clean up all spills, even if the City Fire Department is present.

#### 6.14 Customer Service and Records

All complaints made directly to Contractor shall be given prompt and courteous attention. Contractor will provide Customer Service through an established set of skills and capabilities. Customers seeking Customer Service shall have the ability to seek out information and answers to frequently asked questions 24 hours per day through web-based or smart phone based applications. When contact with the Contractor is required for Customer service, during office hours, the Contractor shall maintain sufficient call center staff to answer and handle complaints and service request from customers without delay. These call center staff shall have the ability to contact and work with members of the contractor staff serving the municipality, whether through direct, electronic, or telephonic means, to coordinate resolution of the local complaints. In the case of alleged missed scheduled collections, the Contractor shall investigate and, if such allegations are verified, shall arrange for the collection of Recyclable Materials not collected within one business day after the complaint is received.

#### 6.15 Pilot Project Test Areas

The City, upon consultation with the Contractor, may request limited scope pilot tests in both the residential and commercial/institutional sectors of the City. The amount of stops included in a test will be determined by the scope of the project and mutually agreed upon between the City and Contractor. The test area will not place any significant, undue hardship on the operations of the contractor and shall be reasonable and acceptable in size/effort. Fair compensation, if needed, will be determined during these discussions. No compensation shall be provided because of fewer materials during the test period.

#### 6.16 <u>Vehicle Licensing and Inspection Requirements</u>

All collection vehicles used in performance of the Agreement shall be duly licensed and inspected by the State of Minnesota and shall operate within the weight allowed by Minnesota statutes. Vehicles shall be used that are in proper working condition and that prevent loss in transit of liquid or solid cargo. All vehicles shall be kept clean and as free from offensive odors as possible. The Contractor shall obtain all pertinent licenses and registrations from the City, County and State and have DOT record books. The Contractor shall submit to the City annually before December, the most recent Minnesota or U.S. DOT inspection record for each licensed vehicle used within the City.

#### 6.17 <u>Collection Vehicle Equipment Requirements</u>

Each collection vehicle shall be equipped with the following:

- A two way communications device.
- A first aid kit.
- An approved 2A10BC dry chemical fire extinguisher or other approved fire extinguisher appropriate to the type of vehicle.
- Warning flashers.
- Warning alarms to indicate movement in reverse.
- Signs on the rear of the vehicle which state "This vehicle makes frequent stops" or similar language.
- A broom and a shovel for cleaning up spills and a spill kit.
- All of the required equipment and the vehicle must be in proper working order.
- All vehicles and equipment must be as clean and free from rust and odors as possible.
- Vehicles shall be sized to operate and negotiate turning movements of cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets without causing damage to public or private property or creating safety hazards.

#### 6.18 Personnel Requirements

The Contractor shall retain sufficient personnel and equipment to fulfill the requirements and specifications of this Agreement. The Contractor will provide a Route Supervisor to oversee the recycling route drivers servicing the City. The Route Supervisor will be available to address customer complaints by cell phone or voice mail at minimum eight (8) hours per day on collection days and four (4) hours per day on non-collection weekdays. The Contractor's personnel shall:

- Conduct themselves at all times in a courteous manner with the general public.
- Make a concerted effort to have at all times a presentable appearance and attitude.
- Perform their work in a neat and a quiet manner and clean up all recyclable materials spilled or blown during the course of collection and hauling operations.

- Take all precautions possible to prevent littering.
- Avoid damage to containers and other property.
- Not perform their duties or operate vehicles while consuming alcohol or illegally using controlled substances or while under the influence of alcohol and/or such substances.
- Not idle or park vehicles in one location, street, lot, or place longer than is necessary to reasonable collect material or take meal or rest breaks.
- Abide by all applicable local, state and federal laws while performing the work.
- Must understand safety responsibilities and spill procedures, including reporting all
  hydraulic fluid spills immediately to a supervisor, to the City Fire Department (911) in
  the event of danger to public health and safety, and to the Minnesota Duty Office if
  over five gallons.
- Report any suspicious activities or items to the Plymouth Police Department (911 or desk officers at 763-509-5192).

#### 6.19 Pavement Management Programs

The Contractor will be responsible for coordinating and providing service for individual CDU's or streets temporarily inaccessible during the City's annual street program. The City will provide to the Contractor weekly updates or construction progress reports upon request. This Agreement is subject to the right of the State, the County and the City to improve its roads, bridges, highways, and streets. The Contractor accepts the risk that such improvements may prevent the Contractor from occasionally traveling its usual route or routes for the purpose of collecting materials. The Contractor agrees to not make any claim for compensations against the City, the County or the State for such interference.

#### 6.20 City Service Limited to Public Roads

Services provided in this agreement shall be on or adjacent to publicly owned roads. If the Contractor provides service on a private road or property, the Contractor must establish a separate agreement with the property owner(s) regarding any change in condition to the private road due to the service, and hold harmless the City, Hennepin County, and the State of Minnesota.

## 7. Drop-Off Recycling Center

#### 7.1 Drop-Off Site Operations

The Contractor will service the recycling drop-off site operated by the City at Plymouth's Public Works Maintenance Facility, 14900 23<sup>rd</sup> Avenue North, Plymouth. This is an unattended facility open to residents and businesses. The City will give the Contractor card access to the site. The gate to the site is currently open from 5:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily.

#### 7.2 Drop-Off Center Materials

Recyclable material collected at the drop-off site shall be the same materials as collected in the curbside program element. Other materials may be designated by the City if acceptable to the Contractor.

#### 7.3 <u>Storage Containers: Capacity and Service Frequency</u>

Contractor will provide storage containers of a size, shape and design acceptable to the City (e.g., roll-off boxes, tanks, compartments and/or carts), and sufficient frequency emptying the

containers to assure that all recyclables deposited at the site can be placed within the storage containers without overflowing. Storage containers for the drop-off center shall be approved by the City before being installed by the Contractor. Contractor shall be responsible for cleaning up any and all material left at the drop-off site on collection days when a container is full. Containers must be kept clean and free from odors, free of graffiti and inaccurate signage, free of rust and leaks, and must be maintained in good condition at all times, including working covers, free of rust and leaks, and accurate, legible signs on all containers.

#### 7.4 City Approval of Container Type and Labeling

Containers must be clearly marked with labels listing and showing with graphics the recyclables allowed to be placed inside the containers. The Contractor may not label the containers until the City has approved the content and design of labels. The Contractor will replace and update the signs on the drop-off center containers as needed.

#### 7.5 Weighing of Loads and Reporting Requirements

Contractor will keep accurate records and weights of all recycling materials collected. All loads will be weighed and the information recorded on an approved weight/scale ticket along with the date, time, driver's name, vehicle number, tare, gross, and net weights, and the words "drop-off center". A copy of all weight tickets shall be kept on file by the Contractor for two (2) years and copies of all weight tickets will be attached to the monthly reports. The Contractor will submit a monthly report of the total tons collected by material, the percentage of the total that each material type represents, and the markets used for the sale of the recyclable materials. These reporting requirements are required for the City's semi-annual and annual recycling reports to Hennepin County.

#### 7.6 Management of Contamination

If contamination of drop-off center recyclables exceeds 15% of the total drop-off tonnage, both parties mutually agree to negotiate and revise the plan for operations of the drop-off center that may include new containers, new container locations, elimination of containers, better signs on the containers, signs at the site, and/or disposal charge backs.

## 8. Recyclables Composition

#### 8.1 <u>Determining Materials Composition as Collected</u>

The Contractor shall conduct at least one materials composition analysis of the City's recyclable materials each calendar year of this Agreement and during any and every extension of this Agreement to estimate the relative amount by weight of each recyclable commodity from each program element by grade or offer a suitable alternative to a composition analysis. The results of this analysis shall include: (1) percent by weight of each recyclable commodity by grade (including materials deemed unacceptable) as collected from the City program element; (2) relative change compared to the previous year's composition; and (3) a description of the methodology used to calculate the composition, including number of samples, dates weighed, and City route(s) used for sampling. The Contractor shall provide the City with a copy of each analysis. City staff will help coordinate the sampling and shall be invited by the Contractor to be present for the sorting.

#### 8.1.1 Estimating Process Residuals

The Contractor shall provide the City a written description of the means to estimate process residuals derived from the City's recyclable materials. This written description shall be reviewed and approved in writing by the City. This written description shall be updated by the Contractor immediately after any significant changes to the processing facilities used by the Contractor.

#### 8.2 End Market Certification

Upon request by the City, the Contractor shall provide written certification to the City that all recyclable commodities identified will continuously be recycled and not disposed. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide the City with adequate documentation of end markets for each recyclable commodity.

#### 8.3 Materials Processing and Marketing

#### 8.3.1 Processing Facilities Must Be Specified

It is intended that all recyclable materials collected by the Contractor will go to recycling markets to be reused or manufactured into recycled content products. Adequate recyclable material processing capacity must be provided for material collected. The Contractor specifies the location(s) of its MRF (or subcontractor's facility) where material collected from the City will be delivered and/or processed as Republic Services Minneapolis MRF. The Contractor shall provide written notice to the City at least sixty (60) days in advance of any substantial change in these or subsequent plans for receiving and processing recyclable materials collected from the City. Upon collection, the Contractor shall deliver the designated recyclable materials to a MRF, an end market for sale or reuse, or to an intermediate collection center for later delivery to a processing center or end market. Minnesota Statutes (M.S. 115A.95) prohibits the unapproved disposal of separated recyclable materials. Contractor shall assure that all recyclable materials collected in the City are not landfilled, composted or incinerated except for Process Residuals. The Contractor shall dispose of no more than seven percent (7%) of material (by weight) as Process Residuals as part of recyclable materials processing operations.

#### 8.3.2 Lack of Adequate Market Demand

In the event that the market for a particular recyclable material ceases to exist, or becomes economically depressed that it becomes economically unfeasible to continue collection, processing and marketing of that particular material, the Contractor shall give written notice to the City. The notice shall include information demonstrating the effort the Contractor has made to find market sources, and the financial information justifying the conclusion that the market is economically unfeasible. Adequate documentation shall be required before the City will consider changes to the municipal recycling program. At such conclusion, the City and the Contractor will both agree in writing that it is no longer appropriate to collect such item before collection ceases. Until such date that writing amendment is fully executed, the Contractor shall continue to collect the item and, if necessary, arrange for adequate stockpiling. Contractor shall pay the costs of all disposal of any item collected that is deemed not recyclable by Contractor and the City due to lack of adequate market demand. The City and Contractor shall specify a date in the said

written agreement to cease collection of the recyclable material in question. Contractor shall at all times be under a duty to minimize recyclable materials ending up in landfill or incineration. If such disposal becomes necessary, Contractor shall dispose of the materials at a facility specified in writing by the City or an alternative agreed upon by the City and the Contractor.

#### 8.4 <u>Performance Monitoring</u>

The City will monitor the performance of the Contractor against requirements specified within this Agreement. Substandard performance as determined by the City will constitute non-compliance. If action to correct such substandard performance is not taken by the Contractor within sixty (60) days after being notified by a City, the City may initiate the contract termination procedures.

#### 8.5 Reports and Meetings

City may withhold payment for recycling services or declare this Agreement to be breached unless and/or until Contractor supplies as required the information outlined in this section.

#### 8.5.1 Customer Service Reports

Contractor will provide the City with monthly electronic reports, in Word, Excel or Access format, on issues, complaints, including, but not limited to calls reporting missed collections and improper set-outs as stipulated within this Agreement. Detail shall include dates occurred, initiated and resolved, address, issue, resolution, and other details as available. These reports shall be due by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of each month.

#### 8.5.2 Monthly Reports

Contractor shall provide the Recycling Materials Revenue Report with each monthly invoice. The Contractor shall submit a written monthly report to accompany the monthly invoice packet. Invoices may not be processed for payment until the monthly report is complete and accepted by the City. The monthly report shall summarize tonnage by commodity and by type of collection (curbside, drop-off, and MF). The monthly report shall summarize complaints from the report as described in Section 8.5.1 and provide an explanation of any changes in procedures to address complaints. The monthly report shall describe any significant changes in end markets and alert the City in writing to any pending conditions that may affect the City's recycling programs. These reports shall be due by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of each month. Since Contractor carts for Recyclable Materials may contain electronics as a result of dumping activities, the Contractor shall properly register and report on the disposal of such items as required by the Minnesota Electronics Recycling Act (M.S. 115A.1310) with the State of Minnesota and comply with any other applicable electronic waste disposal reporting laws. The Contractor shall include a report on any E-waste disposal in its monthly report to the City.

#### 8.5.3 <u>Annual Reports</u>

The Contractor shall submit a written annual report by February first (1) of each year. The annual report shall summarize tonnage by commodity by program element for the previous calendar year. The annual report shall describe any significant changes in end markets and alert the City in writing to any pending conditions that may affect the City's recycling programs. The annual written report should include any MRF reports submitted

by Contractor to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and the MN Department of Revenue (annual SW-1AR report) for any MRFs used to process City recyclable materials. The SW-1AR are for recycling and composting facilities seeking exemption from solid waste management taxes pursuant to M.S. 297H.06. These reports must be submitted to the State annually, and shall be submitted annually as part of the annual report. The Contractor must include a request in writing if the Contractor wishes to have its annual report considered nonpublic data to the extent permitted by the public record laws of the State of Minnesota. The entire annual report cannot be marked as nonpublic data.

#### 8.5.4 Annual Meeting

Upon receipt of the Contractor's annual report, the City shall schedule an annual meeting with the Contractor. The objectives of this annual meeting will include (but not be limited to):

- Review Contractor's annual report, including trends in recovery rate and participation.
- Efforts the Contractor has made to expand recyclable markets.
- Summary of market trends in prices, technology advancements, specifications, and implications for all recycling programs covered in this Agreement.
- Review Contractor's performance based on feedback from residents and other customers to City staff.
- Review Contractor's recommendations for improvement in the City's recycling program, including enhanced public education and other opportunities for expansion.
- Review staff recommendations for improving Contractor's service.
- Discuss other opportunities for improvement with the remaining years under the current Agreement.

#### 8.5.5 Other Meetings

The City may call additional meetings as needed to coordinate planning, development and implementation of new or changing program elements. The Contractor may request meetings as needed to help provide for more expeditiously resolution of program implementation issues.

## 1. Compensation for Residential Curbside Recycling Collection Service

#### 1.1 Curbside CDU Counts

For the purpose of these specifications the City has identified 24,677 Curbside Certified Dwelling Units (CDU's) as of March, 2018.

#### 1.1.1 Annual Adjustment to CDU Count

The City will provide the Contractor the actual addresses of the CDU's to receive curbside recycling services before January 1 and July 1 of each year of the Agreement to ensure accurate service. The Contractor will adjust the July and January invoice to reflect the CDUs provided by the City.

#### 1.2 Collection Service Price

The curbside collection service price per month per CDU shall be as follows:

#### 1.3. Compensation for Drop-Off Collection Service

Two options are provided for service at the Drop Off Center. Each container shall be serviced one time per day either three days per week or seven days per week. Additional service for roll-off containers shall be at a price mutually negotiated between the City and Contractor. Additional service for other containers shall be at the request of the City and at no additional charge. The City may change the service level at the Drop-Off Center with 30-day's notice to the Contractor.

#### 1.5. Revenue Share

#### 1.5.1 Revenue Sharing Formula

The revenue sharing formula shall be:

- "Gross" material value (based on index prices below)
- Less processing fee.
- Equals net revenue
- Times the percent City share of net revenue. The revenue share shall be 80% to the City and credited monthly.

#### 1.5.2. Processing Fee

#### 1.5.3 Revenue Share Reserve

A revenue share reserve of \$35,000 shall be established from the sale of recyclable material prior to the City receiving shared revenue. Revenue owed to the City in excess of \$35,000 shall be credited to the City on a monthly basis. The revenue share reserve shall be in effect from January 1, 2019 through November 30, 2024. At the end of the contract term the City shall be credited for the net revenue of recyclables in December 2024 plus any positive balance in the revenue share reserve. A negative balance at the end of the contract term shall be the responsibility of the contractor. The City will not provide payment to the Contractor for a negative balance.

## **EXHIBIT C: TRASH COLLECTION SERVICE**

#### 1. Trash Collection Service

The Contractor will provide solid waste collection at designated City facilities at no additional cost.

#### 2. Unacceptable Waste

For purposes of this Exhibit C, solid waste does not include Unacceptable Waste, as defined below. City warrants that solid waste disposed of at the facilities identified by City pursuant to Section 1 of this Exhibit C will not contain any Unacceptable Waste. Title to, and liability for, any Unacceptable Waste will remain with the generator and shall at no time pass to Contractor. Contractor shall have the right to reject or revoke its acceptance of any solid waste at any time such solid waste is discovered to be or contain Unacceptable Waste.

#### 3. Definitions for Purposes of Exhibit C

- 3.1 Unacceptable Waste is Hazardous Waste and any radioactive, volatile, corrosive, highly flammable, explosive, biomedical, infectious, biohazardous, or toxic waste as defined by applicable law or any otherwise regulated waste.
- 3.2 Hazardous Waste includes, but is not limited to, any amount of waste listed or characterized as hazardous by the United States Environmental Protection Agency or any state agency pursuant to RCRA, and including future amendments thereto, and any other Applicable Law.

1. Plymouth Special Collection Day

The City hosts an annual Special Collection Day a.k.a Drop Off Day typically in April or May of each year. Municipal Solid Waste, Construction and Demolition Debris, Scrap Metal, and bulky items are collected at this event. The parties agree to negotiate in good faith such that Republic Services will provide to collect these items at the City's Special Collection Day event and the City shall compensate Republic Services for this collection.

Republic Services has enjoyed our partnership with the City of Plymouth and our team looks forward to extending this relationship into the future.

Our existing recycling contract will expire on December 31, 2024. We are excited to provide pricing for a three-year extension of the recycling contract starting at \$4.95 per home in 2025, with a 4.5% annual increase.

Additionally, we are excited to offer a combined recycle and organics contract, in this scenario the recycling price would start January 2025 at \$4.75 per home and organics collection would start January 2024 at \$3.00 per home. Both prices would have a 4% annual price increase.

The Organics price will increase as more residents participate in the organics collection program. This tiered pricing structure allows the city to make curbside organics collection available to residents at a very low price. As interest and participation in the program grows the price will increase to cover the additional costs. The tiered pricing structure is shown below.

The last several years have brought intense pricing pressures to the trash and recycling industry. Record inflation combined with a shortage of commercial drivers across the country have had a huge impact on our industry. While general inflation has been eight to ten percent, our industry has seen cost increases as high as forty percent. The cost of labor, fuel, equipment, tires and other materials have been increasing rapidly.



Additionally, we are seeing persistently low commodity prices for the materials collected in curbside recycling programs. This does not mean that recycling is a bad decision, it simply means that it costs more than it used to. Recycling is still the right decision to make; recycling preserves resources, reduces emissions, and supports green jobs in a circular economy, it just costs more than it used to.

We are confident that this represents the financial commitment that is necessary to continue providing a world class customer experience. This renewal would leave the city with a comprehensive recycling and organics collection program at an outstanding value.






## **Curbside Organics Collection Survey**






- (B) The FlashVote was open September 6 and 8 and received 941 responses.





1. Knowing that you will be charged for organics collection – and that participation requires an additional wheeled cart – do you expect to sign up for a curbside organics collection service in 2024?




## 2. If you're not already participating, what, if anything, prevents you from doing curbside collection of food waste and other compostable organic material now? (Choose all that apply)


# 3. Which of the following, if any, does your household currently do with food waste and other compostable organic material? (Choose all that apply)





I'm thrilled that Plymouth is considering doing a city-wide option--thank you! ALSO: I strongly urge you to consider every week recycling with trash moving to every other week. Since we have been participating in organics collection--along with recycling, of course--our trash has been dramatically reduced, but we often have an overflow of recycling. Please explain how you will handle HOAs where services are typically handled by the board, not by individuals.

needs to be viable for apartment buildings

More information is needed.

How is the city going to address HOAs who won't let people store carts outside but they don't have room for another cart in their garage?

Can't wait for this.

Will someone provide us with a smaller indoor collection receptacle to use?

This is nothing more than a transfer of wealth from poor people to rich ones. It's been proven that more wealthy people want to do this and poorer don't. This is the same process that played out in MPLS. If residents want this, make a compost site where they have to take their garbage to a city site instead of forcing the many that don't want or need this to pay for the very few that have the money to do this.

Very excited that Plymouth is taking another step towards environmental stewardship

Given there be a minimum of 3 haulers (trash, recycling, compostable), I believe it is time for the city to revisit having a single (or choice of 2) trash hauler (s) for the city, paid through utility billing. Adding in yard waste collection, my cul-de-sac already has a half dozen trucks each week for pickups. It is environmentally unsound, adds wear to city streets, adds to noise levels, and causes driving hazards.

I think it's a good idea. Better for the environment and less wasteful. I wonder about the smell in the summer. It's also hard to fit another wheeled cart in the garage.

It's a true conundrum, however, with the wear and tear on our streets, increased emissions and frankly the safety concerns (many of these heavy trucks speed down the road only to pick up ONE customer's bin!), my vote is for a single provider with negotiated lower cost for high volume/efficiency.

I'm too old to bother with all the different collections

Why haven't we been told what our cost will be? I want to know this information.

Part of the city contract should include the plan for the haulers to increase the actual recycling each year and any increase will depend on proven improvement. We know most recycling is just incinerated. Time to put the burden on the haulers.

How much will this cost and why does it require a new wheeled cart?

Regarding all curbside collection (trash, recycle, organic) the City of Plymouth should look at minimizing the number of trucks going through the city and neighborhoods and using the municipalities leverage to reduce costs. That would help the roads and environment as well as residents bank accounts. Work with all collections and reduce the number of companies to perhaps 3 total to still promote competition while better managing road traffic & pollution. Bid it out and re-bid every 3-5 years. The way it is now we have half a dozen trucks every collection day on our street and the companies raise prices at will and excessively.

I just want to emphasize that since we are collecting organics for environmental reasons/concerns, it makes absolutely no sense to then have multiple carriers that would increase traffic congestion and pollution.

As long as none of this impacts my ability to select my own garbage hauler.

It's a program that is only of interest to a handful of people but apparently being forced on everyone. Silly and unnecessary. If a person want's to do this, great! Do it yourself.

We opted-in to curbside organically pickup. Having one hauler would make it a more reliable and efficient service. And having many different trucks doing the pickup is counter to the environmental benefits of composting

How do I join this service now?

This should not be forced on residents. Only those participating should pay fees.

residents may need to be able to have bins in front of their homes, visible from the street due to lack of space to "hide" additional bins, which would require an ordinance change

All curbside should be through one hauler via City contract. The contract should ensure superior customer service with chargebacks for poor service that goes back to customers as credits. All services should be picked up weekly to avoid overflowing and infestations.

City of Plymouth should promote the benefits of separating organic waste to ensure residents are aware of the value of the program, not that it's just a silly law that's costing them more.

I would like to see options for community gardens in my neighborhood and other neighborhoods, for example using some of the green spaces where the city is cultivating "bee lawns". The community gardens could have a city-supplied compost bin for neighbors to bring food waste as an alternative to curbside collection.

I think education is key to how to best compost organic waste through a vendor. We had this option in Minneapolis and we used it for a time but it was disgusting and discontinued.

I would rather have low cost materials made available to the individual to do their own backyard composting than charge us for a service we're not going to use.

The collection of cities in the region IS, however, a set of ideal, free, market actors, because cities are smart and powerful buyers of services. This should not be compulsory for people that own their own property. Too much government interference. Recycling companies lied about the other durable goods for decades and I do not trust this effort is more than consumer revenue gouging.

I'd a support single garbage hauler IF cost and SLAs are lower/better. But I don't feel food/compostable waste is really necessary for us, and don't think it warrants yet another army of 15 trucks coming through neighborhoods weekly.

Our little dead end street simply cannot handle yet more trucks. Keeping the number down is better. As it is we have 4 or 5 trucks every trash day, some for only one can. We all wish we had city wide trash collection as well!!!!!

Why do t we just have one garbage hauler for the entire city- 5 different trucks though the streets seems crazy

The city is having to implement a stupid policy decision by the county. This really is another form of taxation and without having a say in the matter. Should I be surprised in this state? No, but the county calls it "optional" but that isn't legitimate because you cannot opt out to PAY for this. Plus, the burden of another truck racing through the neighborhoods on trash day. Idiocy.

It would be nice to combine yard waste and organics. This would reduce the number of bins needed and would promote greater buy-in from residents.

The confusion of what is composable is a major issue. The only items we do not currently compost are those with animal products, i.e. meat scraps, bacon fat, etc. The amount of food waste we would contribute is minimal. We already compost all veg/fruit scraps, coffee grounds/filters, tea bags, paper towels, etc. We produce one kitchen can bag of garbage per week for the entire household. What about a combined bin for several households or per block, similar to the garbage bins in our local parks?

Why are you doing this if it's organic? I can't even imagine that residents will generate enough waste to justify yet another layered cost to residents. Get a grip on your spending. Plus, the truck traffic from deliveries, waste, etc has become excessive in our neighborhood and is downright dangerous for kids playing.

I am not much know about those. Landlord knows.

A full size wheeled container is the biggest obstacle. We can't cut down on our recycle bin size or garbage size we would need a cart only about 18" square and it would have to be on our standard pickup day or we would forget.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING CITY STAFF TO NEGOTIATE A THREE-YEAR EXTENSION TO THE CURRENT RECYCLING CONTRACT, INCLUDING A FOUR-YEAR TERM FOR CITY-ORGANIZED CURBSIDE COLLECTION OF SOURCE-SEPARATED ORGANIC MATERIALS WITH REPUBLIC SERVICES

WHEREAS, the current Municipal Recycling Services Agreement with Republic Services, effective January 1, 2019, is set to expire December 31, 2024, for traditional single sort curbside recycling; and

WHEREAS, the contract allows for a three-year extension; and

WHEREAS, neighboring cities recently bid municipal recycling services on the open market, with results that have not been favorable in terms of pricing; and

WHEREAS, if negotiations are not successful, there remains enough time to bid municipal recycling services without interruption to curbside services; and

WHEREAS, all residential customers will be charged a fee for curbside organics recycling collection – regardless of whether or not they utilize the offered service; and

WHEREAS, the city is exploring city-led organized curbside collection of source-separated organic materials; and

WHEREAS, the city is considering supplementing negotiations of the current Municipal Recycling Services Agreement by including curbside collection of source-separated organic materials, similar to the current curbside recycling program; and

WHEREAS, a majority of residents believe the city should lead single-hauler organized collection, with less than one-third of respondents opposed to city-led organized collection.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH, MINNESOTA, that city staff is authorized to negotiate a three-year extension to the current recycling contract; including a four-year term for city organized curbside collection of source-separated organic materials with Republic Services.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Republic Services has offered the city single sort recycling collection starting at \$4.75 monthly in 2025, with a 4.5% annual increase through 2027, and organics curbside collection based on participation percentage, ranging from 2024 pricing of \$3.00 per month for up to 10% participation, to \$6.00 per month for up to 50% participation. Organics curbside collection will have a 4% annual increase through 2027.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Municipal Recycling Services Agreement for curbside services contract extension for single sort recycling plus organics collection will be brought to the City Council for approval once finalized contract language is agreed upon.

# 2. Background:

On September 6, the Planning Commission reviewed the proposal, conducted the public hearing, and subsequently voted unanimously to recommend approval. In addition to the applicant, six people spoke at the hearing. Two of the speakers also provided written correspondence (attached). Concerns raised included traffic, noise, walkability, and wages for construction workers. Regarding traffic, staff noted that the traffic study has found that the surrounding road system could accommodate the traffic generated by the development with improvements to be incorporated into the project. Regarding noise, staff notes that compliance with state and city noise standards would be required. Regarding walkability, staff said the future PUD submittal would address sidewalks, trails, crosswalk design, and traffic calming measures. Regarding wages for construction workers, that issue may be addressed in the TIF development agreement which is outside the purview of the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission report and minutes are attached.

# INTRODUCTION

The applicant is requesting approval of a comprehensive plan amendment to reguide four parcels of land comprising the former Prudential Insurance site at 13001 County Road 10. The site contains roughly 75 acres and is bounded by County Road 10 (Bass Lake Road) to the north, Interstate 494 to the west, County Road 61 (Northwest Boulevard) to the east, and Chankahda Trail (formerly known as County Road 47) to the south. Under the proposal, the land use guide plan map in the city's comprehensive plan would be amended to reguide the site from CO (commercial office) to MXD (mixed-use).

The requested reguiding is the first step in allowing the site to be redeveloped with a mixture of multi-family housing, retail/commercial uses, and a medical-technical (med-tech) business park. If the reguiding is approved, future requests would be made for rezoning, platting, and PUD (planned unit development) general plan.

Notice of the public hearing was published in the city's official newspaper. Two mailed notices were sent out to all property owners within 750 feet of the site. One notice was sent upon receipt of the application, and the other notice was sent 12 days prior to the public hearing. A copy of the Hennepin County Locate & Notify Map is attached. Development signage has also been posted on the site.

#### **Natural Characteristics**

The site lies in the Shingle Creek drainage district. The site is not located within the flood plain or shoreland overlay district. The site contains two wetlands: one in the southwest corner and one in the east portion of the site. The water body in the central portion of the site is a stormwater pond.

## **Previous Actions**

Construction of the existing 4-story, 450,000-square-foot office building and relating parking areas was completed in the northerly portion of the site in 1980. Under the plan, the existing building and parking would be removed. The southerly portion of the site presently remains undeveloped.

In 2022/2023, the applicant requested a review of sketch layouts for redevelopment of the site. Both the Planning Commission and City Council have previously reviewed the sketch layouts and provided their informal comments to the applicant.

In July 2023, the City Council adopted an Alternative Urban Areawide Review (AUAR) for the site, based on the highest amount of development the site could support. An AUAR is a scoping document that identifies potential environmental concerns and develops a mitigation plan to address any such concerns. The mitigation would be incorporated into any future redevelopment plans.

# LEVEL OF CITY DISCRETION IN DECISION-MAKING


The guiding of land is a legislative action (enactment of policy). Consequently, the city has a high level of discretion in approving or denying an application to reguide property. The land use guide plan is the city's long-range planning tool that indicates what type of development should occur on all land within the city. In other words, it is the city's plan for how it wants to direct future development and growth. The City Council may guide property as it deems necessary to protect and promote the health, safety, and general welfare of the community. Under state law, a city may not put a reguiding into effect until the Metropolitan Council has reviewed and responded to the proposed reguiding. State law also mandates that all cities in the Twin Cities metropolitan area adopt a 20-year comprehensive plan and review that plan every ten years. State law and city regulations explicitly allow amendments to the comprehensive plan outside of the required decennial comprehensive plan outside of the required decennial update. The city has approved over 30 such reguiding requests in the past 20 years.

# **ANALYSIS**

The applicant is requesting to amend the land use guide plan map of the city's comprehensive plan. Under the proposal, the site would be reguided from CO (commercial office) to MXD (mixed use). Refer to graphics on Page 3.


The site is currently guided CO (commercial office). Refer to the graphic below.

The applicant is requesting to reguide the site to MXD (mixed use). Refer to the graphic below.



Requested Guiding

Except for specialized housing such as nursing care, the current CO guiding does not allow residential uses. The proposed MXD guiding would allow the site to be redeveloped with a mixture of multi-family housing, retail/commercial uses, and a med-tech business park. The descriptions for both the CO and MXD guiding designations are attached.

The corresponding zoning district for MXD-guided areas is PUD (planned unit development). PUDs are customized zoning districts unique to each development. If the site is reguided to MXD, the applicant would request to rezone the site from B-C (business campus) to PUD. A separate public hearing process would be required for any such rezoning request.

The residential density range allowed within MXD-guided areas is 12 to 35 units per acre, based upon net acreage of the overall site. Net acreage excludes wetlands, wetland buffers, areas below the high water level of ponds, and areas to be dedicated as public park or right-of-way for arterials roadways.

Based on approximate net acreage calculations, the site should accommodate roughly 600 to 1,750 dwelling units under MXD guiding. The previous preliminary sketch layouts indicated a range of roughly 900 to 1,320 apartment-style dwelling units (in multiple buildings), which lies within the allowable density range. The applicant is partnering with Roers Companies to construct the residential component of the redevelopment project.

When reviewing a request for an amendment to the land use guide plan map, the city must analyze and consider the following:

- extent to which the location criteria of the existing and proposed guiding designations are satisfied;
- information supporting a re-examination of the current guiding;
- impact on land supply and demand;
- demonstration that the amendment has merit beyond the interests of the applicant;
- possible impacts of the amendment on other comprehensive plan elements including transportation, housing, sewers, water supply, surface water, parks, and capital improvement program; and
- fiscal impacts on the city.

<u>Location Criteria</u> – The site meets the specified location criteria for both CO and MXD guiding. Due to the size of the site, however, it is better suited for MXD guiding – allowing it to be redeveloped with a mixture of land uses. The housing component and retail/commercial/medtech components would result in a "right-sized" blend of uses and efficiencies in infrastructure, while creating synergy for the benefit of all land uses within and near the site.

<u>Re-examination of the Comprehensive Plan</u> – Since the 2040 comprehensive plan was enacted in 2019, new information has come forward. Prudential Insurance has decided to sell the site, as they no longer require the amount of office space provided within the existing building. Other office users were not interested in purchasing or maintaining the site when it went up for sale. This new information is relevant and provides the city with an opportunity to determine what the future land uses should be for the site.

<u>Land Supply and Demand</u> – The proposed reguiding would have minimal effect on land supply and demand. Under the requested reguiding, the amount of MXD-guided land in the city would increase to 110 acres (or 0.5 percent of the overall land within the city), and the amount of CO-guided land in the city would decrease to 525 acres (or 2.3 percent of the overall land within the city).

<u>Merit of the Amendment</u> – The proposed reguiding has merit beyond the interests of the applicant. The reguiding would provide for needed housing and retail/commercial/med-tech uses in this area of the city. The apartment-style housing component would assist the city in meeting its goals for providing a diverse housing supply. The proposed redevelopment would also provide for a new public park and related public trail system (not presently located on the site) to serve this area of the city. Lastly, the proposed redevelopment would increase the city's tax base and provide employment opportunities.

## Impacts on other Comprehensive Plan Elements -

- 1) Transportation: As part of the Alternative Urban Areawide Review (AUAR), a traffic study was commissioned by the city, but paid for by the applicant. The traffic study was based on 1,320 residential units and 700,000 square feet of retail/commercial/med-tech development which was the highest amount of development contemplated for the site under the AUAR (actual development numbers are projected to be lower based on the sketch layout). The traffic study concluded that, with modifications to be incorporated into the redevelopment plans, the surrounding road system could readily accommodate the anticipated traffic that would be generated by redevelopment of the site. In addition, the city would review extending Plymouth Metrolink bus service to this site upon its redevelopment.
- 2) Sewer and water: As part of the AUAR, a utility study was commissioned by the city, but paid for by the applicant. The utility study analyzed: a) the anticipated increase in sanitary sewer flows if the site is redeveloped; b) the downstream capacity of the local sanitary sewer system; and c) the capacity of the water system to accommodate anticipated volume, pressure needs, and flow demands upon site redevelopment. The applicant would need to address the issues identified in the utility study as part of any future redevelopment plans. Additionally, existing public utilities within the site would need to be relocated by the applicant to accommodate redevelopment.
- 3) Housing: The proposed reguiding and related redevelopment would add to the city's housing stock and would also include a level of affordability (yet to be determined), in support of the city's housing goals.

- 4) Surface Water Management: Any redevelopment proposal for the site would need to demonstrate compliance with all standards for rate control and water quality, as set forth by city standards and watershed requirements. Additionally, the applicant would be required to secure Minnesota Pollution Control Agency approval of a storm water pollution prevention plan. Surface water management would be reviewed in detail as part of the analysis of any future platting and PUD general plan application.
- 5) Parks: Redevelopment of the site would result in dedication of a new roughly 20-acre public park to be located around the existing pond in the central portion of the site. New public trails would also be installed to provide pedestrian and bicycle connectivity both within the site and to the broader community. The new park and trails would help to fulfill the park needs generated by the redevelopment and would serve this area of the city.
- 6) Capital Improvement Program (CIP): No impacts to the city's CIP have been identified at this time. The segment of Chankahda Trail that abuts the site is programmed to be reconstructed in 2024. The proposed reguiding would not impact that reconstruction project, however, the city and applicant would need to work together to coordinate timing of improvements.

<u>Fiscal Impacts</u> – The proposed reguiding would not have negative fiscal impacts on the city. Additional property taxes would be collected if the site is redeveloped. Taxes are based on the value of the land and buildings. Construction with a mixture of multi-family housing and retail/commercial/med-tech uses would increase the value of the site over current conditions.

# REQUIREMENTS FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

If the City Council approves the reguiding, the applicant would need to obtain the following city approvals in the future, prior to redevelopment of the site:

- Rezoning to PUD (planned unit development) public hearing required
- Preliminary plat public hearing required
- PUD general plan public hearing required
- Final platting/development contract City Council action required
- PUD final plan administrative approval required

## RECOMMENDATION

Community and Economic Development Department staff recommends approval of the request by Scannell Properties LLC to reguide the former Prudential Insurance site located at 13001 County Road 10 from CO to MXD, subject to the conditions listed in the resolution.

If new information is brought forward at the public hearing, staff may alter or reconsider its recommendation.

Chair Boo called a Meeting of the Plymouth Planning Commission to order at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers of City Hall, 3400 Plymouth Boulevard, on September 6, 2023.

COMMISSIONERS PRESENT: Chair Michael Boo, Bill Wixon, Marc Anderson, Neha Markanda, and Josh Fowler

COMMISSIONERS ABSENT: Jennifer Jerulle and Julie Olson

STAFF PRESENT: Planning and Development Manager Chloe McGuire, Senior Planner Shawn Drill, and City Council Liaison Julie Pointner

## **Public Hearings**

(5.1) Request for comprehensive plan amendment by Scannell Properties LLC to reguide roughly 75 acres to MXD (mixed use) for property located at 13001 County Road 10 (2023052).

Senior Planner Drill presented the staff report.

Commissioner Anderson referenced the statement that there would not be an impact on traffic, utilities, etc. He asked if that was determined by the Alternative Urban Areawide Review (AUAR) which was presented to and approved by the city council.

Senior Planner Drill confirmed that the AUAR was approved by the council in July and included the traffic and utility studies. He commented that typically a large-scale development such as this would include an environmental assessment worksheet, but the alternative was to complete the AUAR. He explained that the AUAR would need to be revisited and updated every five years.

Commissioner Wixon asked the number of multi-family housing units.

Senior Planner Drill replied that the applicant is still determining the number of units that they would propose but noted that could range from roughly 700 to 1,000 units or more.

Commissioner Wixon commented that the schools would be considerably impacted by that number of people and asked if that has been considered.

Senior Planner Drill replied that the school district is aware of the potential development and noted that as a part of the AUAR process the schools commented that they do not have concerns.

Commissioner Markanda asked if the primary component would be housing compared to commercial/retail.

Senior Planner Drill replied that in terms of building square footage, the apartments would be the largest, but noted that in terms of land area housing would be less than 50 percent of the total land area.

Commissioner Anderson asked if it would be possible that the applicant could come back with just one use, or whether it would be a requirement to have multiple uses.

Senior Planner Drill replied that the requested MXD guiding requires a mix of uses.

Chair Boo asked for input on whether there would be any concerns removing this land from CO (commercial office) and placing it under MXD (mixed use).

Senior Planner Drill replied that the property is currently guided for office uses. He provided details on the amount of land that would remain in the CO guiding category after this change. He stated that there would not be a negative impact in making this reguiding change.

Chair Boo invited the applicant to address the commission.

Chair Boo introduced Andy Bollig, Roers Companies, and Dan Salzer, Scannell Properties, who represent the applicants for this proposal. Mr. Bollig thanked staff for their work on this matter, noting that they have been doing a lot of work to identify tenants for the property as they have many interested parties. He commented that they are excited to bring a mix of users to the site with preservation of natural space as well.

Commissioner Anderson asked how optimistic the applicant is about being able to secure the desired tenants and buyers.

Mr. Bollig replied that they are very optimistic, recognizing that this is a long-term partnership that will not happen overnight. He stated that Roers will be doing the multi-family development and will begin to bring in requests for next year. He commented that they want to find the highest and best use for the property.

Commissioner Anderson referenced the area along I-494, noting that previous plans identified warehouse or office/warehouse. He stated that is now identified as med tech and asked if that is simply a change in terminology or whether that is a different use.

Mr. Salzer replied that a variety of users could fall under that use. He commented that it would be more of a corporate campus type user, and they are excited about the interest that has been expressed.

Chair Boo asked for details on the timeline of development.

Mr. Bollig replied that it would be completed in phases, with changes beginning on the site next year, but recognized that it would be a year-long process as the right users come forward.

Commissioner Wixon asked if the Prudential office building would be removed and whether that would be done early in the process.

Mr. Bollig confirmed both of those statements to be correct.

Commissioner Markanda commented that in a post-COVID world, many corporations have scaled back on the need for a large corporate office. She asked the mitigation plan in the case that type of clientele is not there for the med tech space.

Mr. Salzer commented that space would not necessarily be just office and would be a combination of office, lab, and R & D space. He agreed that the need for only office space has gone away.

Commissioner Fowler asked for the order of the phasing, recognizing that would be somewhat market dependent. He asked for details on the process for review by staff in terms of mixed-use development if the residential development were to come first.

Mr. Salzer stated that the next step would be preliminary plat and a zoning application which would identify certain areas for the different uses. He commented that if everything goes well, he would anticipate breaking ground on a few projects in the spring.

Senior Planner Drill noted that the PUD general plan would identify the allowed uses and if the applicant desired to change something after that point, it would require an amendment with another public hearing.

Chair Boo opened the public hearing.

Chair Boo introduced Rob Hastings, 5830 Oakview Lane N, who stated that he has recently noticed a lot more traffic because of the work being done on Bass Lake Road. He was concerned with additional traffic from this development and suggested that perhaps there could be a dead end in his neighborhood to prevent cut through traffic. He noted that perhaps there could still be a pedestrian connection through.

Chair Boo introduced Jim and Lisa Pavich, 5805 Rosewood Ln N, who had questions about the increased traffic that would result from that number of residential units. He raised concerns with health and safety as well as noise.

Chair Boo introduced Amy Marie Lemanski, 5955 Wedgewood Lane N, who stated that she is excited about this project. She commented that although a grocery store would be a lovely idea, there are already many different grocery options within a five-mile radius. She asked for details on the housing and whether it would be apartments and/or affordable.

Chair Boo introduced Elaine Anderson, 16905 49<sup>th</sup> Place N, who implored the city and planners to consider walkability and human friendliness seriously. She commented that the layout seems friendly for parking and vehicles. She commented on the lack of walkability between the movie theater and nearby restaurant and did not want to see that pattern repeated. She encouraged parking on the outside with the buildings and walkability on the inside.

Chair Boo introduced Deb Peterson, 13445 60th Place N, who expressed concern with the traffic. She noted that people often do not stop for the pedestrian crossings and requested a pedestrian stoplight which would ensure vehicles stop to allow crossing.

Chair Boo introduced Andy Snope, 200 Nathan Lane, who stated that he represents the electrical worker's union. He commented that several people are present from the construction industry. He supported the proposal and believed it to be a good use for the site with mixed use. He recognized that the final plans are not yet before the commission but believed that this would be a good use of a tired property. He noted that this would be a great place for future and current residents to live, shop, work and recreate. He noted that this development would increase the tax base while also creating jobs. He stated that the developer would also request tax dollars to help with the improvement. He commented that he believes that this would be a good use of tax dollars to create the end result. He stated that with larger projects sometimes come issues with wages and craftsmanship and therefore asked that there is assurance that workers are paid fairly for the construction portion of the project and that the craftsmanship would be at the required level as well. He asked what the PUD would be used for if this were to be rezoned mixed use.

Chair Boo closed the public hearing.

Senior Planner Drill commented that a traffic study has been completed based on this plan and the highest use of the site and it was determined that this site could accommodate the traffic with some improvements. He stated that he could provide a copy of the study to anyone that is interested. He stated that the development contract would address access routes for construction traffic. He commented that there are certain warrants for traffic lights and other traffic measures and, therefore, they would need to investigate further about the pedestrian crossing concerns raised by the resident tonight.

Chair Boo asked the applicant about thoughts on a grocery store after the comments made tonight.

Mr. Bollig replied that the likelihood of a grocer is strong as they have multiple companies interested. He noted that grocers go through an extensive market study to identify locations and there is demand for another grocer in this area. He stated that they would include affordable housing in line with the city's affordable housing policy.

Chair Boo asked how the city addresses the concern with walkability.

Senior Planner Drill commented that the thought is to create a development where people can live, work, play and shop without getting into a vehicle. He commented that there would be an extensive trail system with sidewalks along public streets and a city trail and potentially boardwalk through the central portion of the pond and patterned crosswalks. He noted that the multi-family housing would have underground parking.

Planning and Development Manager McGuire commented that when more specific site design comes forward, the commission would have the opportunity to review that and provide input. She noted that the goal is for people to park and then walk throughout the site, but recognized that people would most likely want to drive to a grocery store.

Chair Boo asked how the city would address the concerns with wages for contractors.

Senior Planner Drill stated that he would have to look into that. He noted that money would not be taken out of the city's tax coffers, but rather, any financial aid would be provided through tax increment financing (TIF). He stated that perhaps they could address the concerns in the TIF development agreement.

Mr. Bollig commented that they would be happy to update the industry numbers used in their narrative. He stated that many of the tenants would be building their own projects and they would be happy to have those conversations.

Chair Boo recognized that a PUD provides flexibility but also ensures that the city able to gain the desired amenities and type of development as well.

Commissioner Anderson recognized the concern with traffic raised tonight. He stated that Prudential existed on the site with 450,000 square feet of office space and a huge parking lot. He asked if there would be a comparison to that use versus the proposed use.

Senior Planner Drill commented that the AUAR and traffic study are posted on the city website for those interested. He confirmed that the traffic study compared the previous development to the development proposed and also looked at it from the perspective of full site development. He stated that a traffic study would be included with the PUD review. He stated that the mitigation measures identified in the AUAR have been adopted by the council and would need to be implemented in future plans submitted by the developer.

Chair Boo recognized that this is very early in the development process, noting that this change would be for reguiding the site from CO (commercial office) to MXD (mixed use).

Commissioner Anderson commented that it is refreshing to see just the comprehensive plan amendment at this time, as that breaks down the review process and allows them to focus on the individual steps as they move forward. He noted that this would also refresh the site. He agreed that changing the use of the site would make sense and mixed use would provide the city with a lot of control. He stated that a grocery use would be market dependent and if there are 1,000 housing units, that would provide demand for a grocer.

Commissioner Markanda commented that this is a great layout and change is inevitable. She requested that the developers keep safety and traffic in the forefront, as those will dictate whether the site will be successful.



# COMMERCIAL OFFICE (CO)

The commercial office (CO) guiding designation allows a variety of uses, including professional offices, administrative offices, research and laboratory facilities, wholesale showrooms, service facilities (e.g., conference centers, lodging and reception halls), residential care facilities (e.g., nursing homes and assisted living), senior citizen housing, and business uses having limited contact with the general public. Based on the specialized nature of potential residential uses, the City does not project the level of residential use on any of its CO sites.

CO sites may provide for limited retail sale of convenience-type products and services for the immediately surrounding area. Commercial uses in this classification are expected to develop with the highest standards of design and performance. Consequently, they should have a higher level of amenities such as landscaping, preservation of natural features, architectural controls, pedestrian trails and other features. Office parks and campus-style developments are encouraged in these areas. Commercial offices, residential facilities, and senior citizen housing can also serve as, and provide for, an orderly and progressive transition between higher and lower intensity land uses.

# MIXED USE (MXD)

Development within the Mixed Use (MXD) classification is expected to demonstrate a higher standard of site and building design. Evaluation of building design will be based on the building's relationship to its surroundings and the following architectural characteristics: materials; texture; colors; massing; building components and details; articulation of roof lines and exterior walls; height; and setbacks.

In meeting a higher standard of site design, mixed use developments should include such things as: well-defined pedestrian walkways; transit improvements; decorative paving materials; street furniture; public plazas; decorative pedestrian-scale lighting; the screening of parking and loading areas; and a quality landscape design that ties together all of the individual elements of the development.

To encourage pedestrian movement and reduce impervious surfaces, parking for either residential or non-residential uses should not dominate the site. Reducing the amount of surface parking should be accomplished through structured parking, shared parking or by locating a portion of the parking beneath the building.

# COMPREHENSIVE PLAN AMENDMENT PROJECT NARRATIVE FOR PROPOSED REDEVELOPMENT 13001 BASS LAKE ROAD, PLYMOUTH, MN

August 9th, 2023

• The Developer is proposing a new construction, mixed-use re-development at the ~75-acre, former Prudential Campus site that will bring needed diversification of uses within the existing Bass Lake corridor. The Developer's plans will require a Comprehensive Plan amendment to guide the property Mixed Use (MXD) and a rezoning of the property to Planned Unit Development (PUD). This project will bring new life and vitality to the currently underutilized vacant land on the property and continue to support a diversified housing stock of new residential development in the city of Plymouth.

The extent to which the location criteria of applicable existing or proposed land use guide plan classifications are satisfied.

• The subject property is currently zoned Business Campus (BC) and is guided Commercial Office (CO) in the Comprehensive Plan 2040 Land Use Map. Under the current Land Use Plan Classifications, the Commercial Office guiding designation allows for a variety of uses, including professional offices, administrative offices, research and laboratory facilities, wholesale showrooms, service facilities, residential care facilities, senior citizen housing, and business uses having limited contact with the general public. The Developer believes Commercial Office is the highest and best use for the majority of the West side of the site along I-494, which is currently considered in design plans. Along with uses that will conform to the Commercial Office guiding designation, the Developer is seeking a variety of mixed-uses including multifamily living, grocery, retail and restaurants, which requires the requested Comprehensive Plan Amendment.

Evidence submitted by the applicant demonstrating the reason(s) that the plan should be changed, including but not limited to whether new information has become available since the comprehensive plan was adopted that supports reexamination of the plan, or that existing or proposed development offer new opportunities or constraints that were not previously considered by the plan.

• To begin, it is the Developer's understanding that the City of Plymouth was not aware that the former owner and tenant of the property, Prudential Financial, had any intention of selling the building /property when the current Comprehensive Plan was adopted July 23, 2019. Because the City was not privy to the former owner's plans prior to adopting the current Comprehensive plan, it is logical that the property's Commercial Office guidance was adopted.

Since the adoption of the Comprehensive Plan, the property has been purchased by the Developer and is no longer actively being used as an office campus. The unique size and location of the property poses a significant opportunity to provide the community with solutions to its current parks & recreation, housing and commercial business needs. Plymouth, MN supports a population over 81,026 and held an apartment vacancy rate of 3.4% in quarter 4 of 2021 and a population growth rate of 14.4% in just the last nine years alone, adding 9,254 people\*. Looking forward, an April 2018 Comprehensive Rental Housing Market Study for the city of Plymouth HRA projected demand for approximately 972 general occupancy rental units





needed to meet housing demands into the future. Additionally, the Developer completed an updated market study in Q1 of 2023 that projected a need of approximately 704 units at the site specifically when contemplating other projects in the pipeline of the primary market area. Through initial site planning, the Developer believes the subject site can support approximately 1,000 units of multifamily housing, which could make a significant contribution to the City's growing need for housing. The sites rolling topography, existing trees & ponds also offer the ability to create new community parks and trials, which support the City's growth forecasts, trends, and goals. The site's unique location along I-494 and Bass Lake Road also provides a great opportunity to add a variety of commercial, retail, and business uses to support the existing and proposed residences in the area. I-494 boasts approximately 84,000 VPD and Bass Lake Road boasts over 20,400 VPD which makes it an attractive site to retail users and traditional business park users alike where companies can attract and retain talent.

Overall, the Developer believes the proposed amendment and re-development of the dated office campus supports the City's Land Use Goals and Policies (Chapter 3 - pg. 1-3 Land Use Plan) including (but not limited to):

- Establish and maintain a land use pattern that reflects the community's desire to provide for a variety of land uses, including residential neighborhoods of varying densities and housing types, retail commercial and office areas, industrial developments, civic uses and parks and open spaces.
- Pursue complementary economic growth and redevelopment opportunities that serve to further enhance the community's economic and social vitality and in turn help sustain Plymouth's high quality of life.
- Support efforts that strengthen community identity, contribute to a high quality of life and enhance Plymouth as a desirable place to live, work and play.

If the amendment affects a particular site, whether or not the change is needed to allow reasonable development of the site.

• As stated previously, the current zoning and Comprehensive Plan guidance does not allow for all of the Developer's proposed uses. An amendment to the Comprehensive Plan and rezoning of the site is necessary to maximize the site's opportunity and support the Developer's plans to incorporate a variety of high-quality mixed-uses including multifamily living, grocery, retail, restaurants and business campus.

The relationship of the proposed amendment to the supply and demand for particular land uses within the city and the immediate vicinity of the site.

• There is significant pent-up demand for housing both in the immediate vicinity of the site and the primary market area as a whole. The City's 2040 comprehensive plan calls for the creation of a variety of housing types within the City which this proposal will accomplish a multitude of. Additionally, there are known neighborhood desires including grocery, restaurant, and other service uses as demonstrated by both previous Plymouth resident surveys. Lastly, the demand for office/med-tech users is extremely high along the I-494 corridor, and the inclusion of these uses will enable the success of all other uses at the site.





## A demonstration by the applicant that the proposed amendment has merit beyond the interests of the proponent.

• Beyond the interests of the Developer, the proposed Comprehensive Plan amendment and development will provide many community enhancements. To begin, the proposed development will bring a variety housing options that will accommodate the City's growing population and increase the City's annual tax revenue. To add, the retail, restaurants, and commercial business portions of the site will not only support the proposed on-site housing and nearby residences, but it will also create a variety of jobs to help boost the City's economy and retain members of the community. The proposed development will also create a safer, more desirable community by upgrading and adding necessary public infrastructure components such as sewer & water systems, stop lights, and roads.

The possible impacts of the amendment on all specific elements of the comprehensive plan as may be applicable, including but not limited to:

- Transportation, as demonstrated by a traffic study to be conducted by the city at the expense of the applicant;
  - A Traffic Impact Analysis was completed as part of the AUAR by TC2 dated 05/17/2023 for the proposed development. The proposed redevelopment is expected to generate approximately 1,004-1,231 am peak hour trips, 1,706-1,961 pm peak hour trips, and 18,642 19,342 daily trips end.
  - Based on the detailed findings of this study, the area's transportation network is expected to support development within the AUAR study area with mitigation. The following mitigations will be evaluated in more detail with each phase of development and would be constructed when warranted by traffic increases related to phases of the development.
    - 1) Sycamore Lane at Bass Lake Road (CR 10)
      - The intersection operates at an acceptable LOS C during the peak hours, but the northbound left-turn queues extend approximately 350 feet during the p.m. peak hour and impact the Sycamore Lane/Quinwood Lane intersection
      - Mitigation: Construct a second northbound left-turn lane (to provide dual left-turn lanes) with approximately 225 feet of storage
    - 2) Sycamore Lane at Quinwood Lane (Internal Intersection)
      - The intersection operates at an unacceptable LOS E during the p.m. peak hour with stop control (i.e., either side-street stop or all-way stop control)
      - Mitigation: Construct a single lane roundabout at this intersection; a northbound right-turn bypass lane could be added to reduce northbound queuing during the p.m. peak hour
    - 3) Quinwood Lane at Bass Lake Road (CR 10)
      - There is no eastbound right-turn lane along Bass Lake Road (CR 10) at Quinwood Lane, which creates potential conflicts between right-turning and thru motorists.
      - Mitigation: Construct an eastbound right-turn lane; consider reconfiguration of the north approach from a 4-lane undivided roadway to a single northbound lane exiting the intersection and single southbound left-, thru, and right-turn lanes; a median north of the intersection may be needed to restrict access to the southern Holiday Gas Station access located approximately 100 feet north of Bass Lake Road (CR 10) to reduce potential conflicts and maintain safe operations
    - 4) Sycamore Lane/Teakwood Lane at Chankahda Trail
      - The intersection operates at an unacceptable LOS E or worse during the p.m. peak hour with stop control (i.e., either side-street stop or all-way stop control)





- Mitigation: Construct a single lane roundabout; westbound and southbound rightturn bypass lanes could be added to reduce queuing during the p.m. peak hour
- 5) Bass Lake Road (CR 10) at Northwest Boulevard (CR 61)
  - Eastbound and westbound left-turn lane queues along Bass Lake Road (CR 10) extend beyond the existing turn lane storage by approximately 50 feet.
  - Mitigation: Extend the eastbound and westbound left-turn lanes by at least 50 feet; the westbound left-turn lane along Bass Lake Road (CR 10) at Quinwood Lane could be shortened accordingly without creating an issue
- 6) Signal Infrastructure
  - The addition of more traffic within the study area, along with intersection improvements will necessitate signal infrastructure, timing, and phasing modifications.
  - Mitigation: Modify and/or optimize signal infrastructure, timing, and phasing throughout the study area relative to the identified mitigation.
- The site is served by Click and Ride on-demand transit service operated by Plymouth Metrolink, and the potential for future routes with Plymouth Metrolink will be investigated through the development phase.
- Sanitary sewer, including existing and proposed sanitary sewer flows as compared to the adopted plan;

The proposed development is expected to generate approximately 462,786 gallons per day (GPD) of wastewater. Wastewater will be conveyed by the City of Plymouth's existing sanitary sewer network that bisects the study area from west to east. This system has a main trunk line that ranges in size from 10-inch to 24-inch in diameter. This line begins northwest of the site, running southeast along Bass Lake, where it ultimately reaches the Bass Lake lift station on 54th Avenue. Based on the Sanitary Sewer Flow Monitoring Memorandum in Appendix D, some segments of the downstream gravity sewers may require upsizing once sewer flow from the development is in excess of 350 gallons per minute (GPM).

The Site is located within the Metropolitan Urban Service Area (MUSA). The property will be served by the publicly owned Metropolitan Wastewater Treatment Plant in Saint Paul. The plant currently treats approximately 160 million GPD, with a total capacity of 314 million GPD according to the Metropolitan Council Environmental Services Plant Inflow Summary Report for the period ending in June 2022. Based on the Twin Cities Metropolitan Council Sewer Availability Charge Guidelines, the estimated wastewater from the proposed development is anticipated to consist primarily of normal domestic sewage. The Metropolitan Council's Metropolitan Wastewater Treatment Plant has the capacity to treat the proposed project without pretreatment or other plant facility improvements.

• Housing, including the extent to which the proposal contributes to the city's adopted housing goals;

The development will address the city's adopted housing goals in multiple ways. First, the project will address the 2040 comprehensive plan's first goal of providing housing at a variety of income levels and specifically affordable housing. The Developer plans to pursue a 4% workforce affordable project at the site in addition to having each project within the development include some level of affordability in accordance with the city's affordable housing policy. Second, the project will fulfill the goal of having housing adjacent to other services including employment and retail services.





Specifically, the project also has the potential to fulfill the goal of being transit connected as the Developer plans to work with the city on connecting with the city managed public transport. The development will also address the city's goals of creating lifecycle housing by providing a multitude of housing types including standard market rate, 55+, and tax credit affordable housing. The incorporation of 3BR units and walkup units where possible will help target families. Lastly, the master site redevelopment including numerous projects under one development entity will enable both preservation and top-quality maintenance of the projects for the coming years. The residential projects will be managed upon completion by the developer.

 Surface water, including compliance with the city's goals for water quality as well as water quantity management;

The site generally drains from northwest to southeast with discharges to the onsite wetlands. No surface water with any type of special designation is present on the site. Two WCA-regulated wetlands exist on the eastern side of the site.

The existing Prudential Campus provides on-site stormwater management through constructed ponds and low-areas. It is assumed that these existing features do not meet current stormwater design standards. The runoff from the building and parking lot is routed to the existing pond in the center of the site. The pond has an upper and lower pool controlled by an overflow weir/bridge through the central portion. A pump system fills the upper pool with additional water from the lower pool as an amenity. An earthen berm controls the water level in the lower pool. In the event that the earthen berm overtops, the water flows to an outlet structure in the south-eastern corner of the lower pool and is routed to the existing city storm sewer. There is a smaller water quality basin in the northwestern corner of the intersection of Chankahda Trail and Northwest Blvd that was installed as part of the previous realignment of Chankahda Trail and Northwest Blvd. This smaller basin serves the existing street runoff and is routed to the same existing city storm sewer. The existing impervious area within the study area is around 19.1 acres, approximately 25% of the AUAR study area.

Bass Lake is the receiving water body for the site. Bass Lake is impaired for nutrients.

During construction, erosion and sediment control best management practices (BMPs) will be implemented to prevent impacts to aquatic ecosystems.

The proposed development within the AUAR study area will require compliance with the stormwater rules and standards of the City of Plymouth, the Shingle Creek/West Mississippi Watershed Management Commissions, and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Stormwater Permit for water quality, volume control, rate control, erosion control, and maintenance/monitoring. Treatment of 1-inch of runoff for the new impervious area since more than one acre of disturbance will occur. Additionally, the post-development discharge rates would be less than or equal to the existing runoff rates for the 2-, 10-, and 100-year, 24-hour rainfall events, as required by the Shingle Creek/West Mississippi Watershed Management Commissions. The proposed development will provide 1.1 inch of volume reduction over the proposed impervious surface coverage for the development through an infiltration BMPs. If infiltration of stormwater is not practical due to existing site conditions, filtration of stormwater will be used. The proposed development scenario will also be required to incorporate effective non-point source pollution reduction BMPs to achieve either 60% (Redevelopment) or 75% (New Development) percent total





phosphorus removals for the stormwater runoff. Treatment is currently planned to be provided through a wet pond in the central portion of the site and a filtration basin south-east of the wet pond. These BMPs are currently sized to meet and exceed the site requirements for pretreatment and filtration volumes while providing rate control and allowable freeboard to the currently proposed surrounding buildings. Additional biofiltration basins may be constructed throughout the proposed site to provide additional stormwater treatment above the required volumes. Stormwater runoff will be routed to this central water feature via underground piping and overland flow. Small biofiltration areas may be placed throughout the development to further increase the water quality and provide additional detention for rate control downstream. Areas that are not able to be routed to the central water feature will be captured and routed to smaller BMPs to the greatest extent possible. The central water feature outlets in the south-east corner of the site into the existing storm sewer. This storm sewer discharges downstream to Bass Lake.

### Water supply;

The water supply will be obtained from the City of Plymouth's water system, which is a groundwater based public water supply. Water mains to service the Site are provided within adjacent roadway right-of-way, and a preliminary review indicates that the existing infrastructure is sufficient for the anticipated development scenario. New water mains will be placed in the roads to serve the development needs, and potentially upsized based on City system modeling.

The estimated demand needed to support the new development is 163,333 gallons per day. Water appropriation for new wells or an increase in authorized volume is not anticipated for the project as the city's current system can accommodate the development. The water supply will be obtained from the groundwater wells that currently supply the City of Plymouth water system. The groundwater wells draw water from 17 municipal wells ranging from 302 to 473 feet deep that draw water from the Prairie Du Chien-Jordan, Prairie Du Chien Group and Jordan aquifers

### Parks and open space; and

O The amendment will allow for an unprecedented opportunity to accomplish the City's goal of adding parks and open space to the community. The site offers over 70 acres of open space, ponds and trees that will be easily accessible to the surrounding residences. The Developer has been consciously working close with the City of Plymouth to preserve green space, hills, trees and ponds, create open greenspace for the purpose of community activation, and design the site with as much pedestrian access and walkability as possible.

### • Capitol improvement program (CIP).

While the project does not explicitly impact specific desired projects listed in the most recent Capitol Improvement Plan (CIP, 2023-2032), the project will capitalize on the reconstruction of Chankahda Trail and will require coordination of a new intersection providing access to the site, the project will fulfill the goals set forth by the City Council including providing high quality services for existing residents, and, lastly, the project will create an additional City park which, although not called out in the CIP, is expressed as a continual goal. Additionally, offsite sewer upgrades related to the project will be addressed in a revised CIP as necessary.





Consideration of the impact of the proposed amendment upon current and future special assessments and utility area charges, future property tax assessments or other fiscal impacts upon the City of Plymouth.

The project will generate a large increase in the tax base. While the Developer will be requesting financial assistance for the public improvements, park, and infrastructure improvements, the overall tax increment generated from the project will be substantive. The potential assessed value of the fully developed project will be anywhere from \$250mm to \$400mm. Additionally, the construction of the project, assuming half of the construction cost is labor and an average construction salary of \$60k, will generate 1,500 to 2,000 construction jobs. The site will attract permanent businesses and retail that will generate additional taxable income for the city.

Hi Shawn. Thanks for taking time to talk with us after the Public hearing last night.

As mentioned, Jim and I are both excited for the tentative plans for the Prudential site and feel it can certainly provide an impressive "front door" to the city of Plymouth.

As residents located within 750 feet of the site and with Northwest Boulevard as our back yard, (5805 Rosewood Lane) our concern is for safety due to increased traffic on Northwest Blvd and for the increased decibel level that comes with the increased traffic, most affecting the quality of life for those that live in the immediate area. This is the second home I have owned that started out with a street that turned into a major throughfare as populations grew. (The other was Weaver Lake Road in Maple Grove). It absolutely affects the immediate residents both from a noise and safety level. With increased cars comes increased opportunities for traffic and accidents, and although the site can handle the traffic, the neighborhoods will suffer with quality of life due to traffic and noise.

Northwest Blvd seems to be the main thoroughfare for emergency vehicles and assorted drag racers in addition to regular commuters. The noise level can be heard from pre-dawn to dark. The enjoyment of

any type of outdoor activities in our backyard Is really difficult and not at all relaxing. Our next-door neighbors have let their backyard go to total wild overgrowth due to the noise and they sit in the front yard as the backyard noise is too loud. Living next door to this isn't actually attractive.

Our ask is that the city of Plymouth request the developers to incorporate some type of calm barrier/noise barrier for those of us whose quality of life and property values are most affected by the noise level of the increased traffic along Northwest Boulevard and Chakanda trail. There aren't that many properties right along the two roads, so hopefully the request is not that significant.

We love living in the area and are in support of this project, we just ask that our quality of life and investments not be negatively affected by the increased traffic and noise that it will bring.

What are the plans to control traffic?

Rec. at PC mtg. 9/6/23

The intersection of Yucca Lane and Chankahda Trail has become increasingly dangerous over the years due to the increased traffic.

- The only traffic controls between Northwest Boulevard and Cheshire Lane, since I moved to my current residence in 1999, has been to put in a flashing pedestrian cross walk at Dallas Lane and replace the four-way stop sign with stoplights at the intersection of Northwest Boulevard and Chankahda Trail.
- Hundreds of homes have been built west of Cheshire Lane making it a heavily traveled road. The proposed buildout of the current Prudential location will further increase traffic.
- When the bridge was replaced at 494 and Chankahda Trail, it reduced visibility at the intersection of Chankahda Trail and Yucca Lane. This is due to short distance from 494 and Yucca Lane and the bridge pillars being much wider. In the winter, it is a bit better because you can peek between the pillar and the slope of the bridge's hill. However, in the summer you are not able to do so because of the foliage and the trees planted on this slope. Because of this you cannot see westbound traffic until right before vehicles go under the bridge which is very close to the Yucca Lane intersection.
- Eastbound traffic is also a problem. The speed limit is 45 mph east of Cheshire Lane; however, many people do not adhere to the speed limit because on the west side of Cheshire Lane it is 50 mph and people do not slow down once, they are on the east side. Also, it appears people are traveling much faster than 50 mph.
- Before making a left-hand turn onto Chankahda Trail from Yucca Lane, one must determine the speed of traffic coming from the west, while trying to navigate if cars are coming from the east.
- When traveling east on Chankahda Trail and turning north onto Yucca Lane, there have been times when I have nearly been rear-ended despite using my blinker.


The pedestrian cross-walks are ineffective.

- In the past 24 years, despite there being pedestrian cross walks at the intersection of Yucca Lane and Chankahda Trail, only three people have stopped for me. There are no sidewalks on the north side of Chankahda Trail but there are sidewalks on the south side, so you are forced to cross the road if you want to use the sidewalks.
- A flashing pedestrian light has been put in place at Dallas Lane. However, I have seen many times where people have not stopped. When I am stopped at this cross walk, I am afraid of being rear-ended because of the speed and people not realizing they need to stop.

### My request

- Put in stop lights at the Yucca Lane intersection
- Replace the flashing pedestrian light at Dallas Lane with a stop light similar to the light by the Bass Lake Play Fields on Northwest Boulevard.

# 1. Action Requested:

Provide feedback on the streetscaping plan for Plymouth Boulevard.

# 2. Background:

Plymouth Boulevard (Highway 55 to Rockford Road) is scheduled to be rehabilitated in 2024. Staff has been working with a landscape architecture firm to incorporate the City Center 2.0 vision into the project. The attached schematics include streetscape and landscape concepts for the Plymouth Boulevard corridor and enhancements to the main entrance of the Hilde Performance Center, located at 35th Avenue. The concepts include the opportunity for public art, activating portions of Plymouth Boulevard during large community events, and creating a more functional entrance for ticketed events. A high-level plaza sketch near City Hall is also included in the staff report but is for longer term visioning only. If approved, the project would be constructed in 2024/2025, with landscaping and regional storm water management improvements to be bid as a separate package for 2025.


# 3. Budget Impact:

The total estimated project cost is \$12,850,000 and includes the improvements (\$8,050,000), trail upgrades and small plazas (\$1,500,000), street lighting upgrades (\$1,300,000), and landscape elements (\$2,000,000). Funding is anticipated to be from the Street Reconstruction Fund (\$4,900,000), Municipal State Aid Fund (\$2,400,000), Special Assessments (\$400,000), Water Fund (\$200,000), Sewer Fund (\$150,000), Reforestation Fund (\$50,000) and \$4,750,000 from other sources.

The additional placemaking and landscape elements will require an additional level of year-round maintenance. Those costs have already been included in the draft 2024-2025 biennial budget.

#### 1. Action Requested:

Three actions are requested:

- Adopt the 2024 proposed General Fund budget
- Adopt preliminary HRA levy and property tax levy
- Set public hearing on December 12, 2023 at 7 p.m.

#### 2. Background:

State statute requires council to annually adopt the budget and tax levy. The preliminary levy must be certified with Hennepin County by September 30. The final levy certified in December may not be increased from the preliminary levy, but council could choose to reduce it.

The proposed 2024 levy is \$50,680,345 or a 7.5% increase from 2023. The proposed levy detail is attached.

The General Fund budget of \$53,907,649 is an increase of \$3,809,686 (7.6%) from 2023. Significant changes in the General Fund are primarily related to personnel costs (including impact of compensation study), inflation, capital requests, training (including new cadet program) and legislative impacts (new election requirements).

The state legislature requires a budget public hearing, which must occur after November 24, must not begin before 6 p.m., and must be properly noticed to the public. The council may adopt the final budget on the same night as the public hearing.
