Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 9:00 am by Mayor Meehan

Present were: Mayor Rick Meehan, City Manager Terry McGean, Public Works Director Hal Adkins, Council Secretary Tony DeLuca, Council Member Will Savage, Council Member Carol Proctor, Transit Manager Rob Shearman, Operations Manager George Peake, Deputy Director of Public Works Scott Wagner, Parking Manager Jon Anthony, and Bethany Hooper, OCToday Dispatch.

A. Approval of August 12, 2025 Transportation Committee Meeting minutes

Motion made by Council Secretary DeLuca to approve the minutes; seconded by Council Member Savage, vote was unanimous

- B. Special Event Update
 - 1. Past
 - a. Rock and Ride

Park N Ride had 2,096 riders from Wednesday to Sunday during Rock and Ride.

Staff recommends not having a dedicated Park N Ride Service for the Rock and Ride event in the future. People are using the Park N Ride lot to park their trailers but are riding their motorcycles into Town.

In lieu of a dedicated Park N Ride Service for this event; staff would recommend that we have our buses meet the Shore Transit buses to bring riders into Town; approximately 7 trips per day

b. Oceans Calling

Ridership for Oceans Calling on the Coastal Highway Beach Bus was 76,524 and an additional 14,112 riders from Park N Ride Shuttle. In the Coastal Highway Beach Bus figures of 76,524 is also included the riders from the Concert on the C3 provided buses

Felt the Transportation for the concerts went well

We had adequate staffing to put out needed deployments

C3 also provided 20 school buses to help with the moving of people from Downtown to the north once the Concerts let out each night

c. Country Calling

Ridership for Country Calling on the Coastal Highway Beach Bus was 66,693 and from the Park N Ride shuttle was 7,700

- 2. Future
 - a. Sunfest

Staff will be providing Park N Ride shuttle service for Sunfest

- C. Requested Discussions (from September 15th Mayor and Council Meeting)
 - 1. Proposal to allow golf carts to operate on MD-528 Bicycle and Bus Lanes

At the September 15th Council Meeting there was discussion about allowing Golf Carts to utilize the bus lane. Town has been exploring options to reduce traffic in the bus lane. Transportation Staff would encourage the Town to find an alternative solution to allowing utilization of the bus lane due to safety concerns for the buses

2. Proposal for non-senior Bus Passes

Also brought up during public discussion at the Council Meeting was a Non-Senior Bus Pass. Staff would not recommend any additional criteria for discounted fares; if we allow it for one group, we will have multiple other groups requesting the same.

Rob Shearman stated that since his employment with the Town of Ocean City (approximately 3 years); he has had requested from various groups for discounted fares; such as:

 - a. Ridership and Deployments

There was a spike in deployments due to music festivals

Ridership is 2.2% above 2024 figures

b. Expenses

Part time salaries are tracking slightly ahead for both year over year and over projected FY026 figures; however, we have had a savings in premium overtime this year due to having adequate staffing

Fuel and maintenance expenses are tracking on budget to date

c. Revenue – Farebox

Bus revenue down approximately 1% from projected bus revenue for FY2026

Bus revenue down approximately 4% from FY2025

d. Revenue – Advertising

Advertising revenue is still tracking ahead of last year

e. Fleet

Currently have 11 articulating buses in the fleet; two of them are the older buses from MTA; we are trying to keep them running for another year

Working with MTA to order 4 additional articulating buses two with FY2025 grant funds and 2 with FY2026 grant funds. Hope to begin taking delivery of them by the end of 2026 or beginning of 2027

Will need to start requesting replacements for the 40foot fleet; buses are reaching useful life

2. Parking Division a. Revenue

Parking revenue is up 17% over last year; revenue for fines has also increased

Mayor Meehan stated that there were not as many complaints regarding changes to paying for parking as staff had anticipated

ISSUE(S):

Amanda Cropper, representing OC4WD, LLC, requests Council approve Ocean City Jeep Week, tentatively scheduled to take place Thursday through Sunday, May 28-31, 2026 in rows AAD in the Inlet Lot and on the beach north of the pier to Dorchester St., as well as daily parades from the Inlet to 30th Street.

SUMMARY:

Ms. Cropper requests to hold the following events:

- * Morning beach Jeep parades, Thursday through Sunday, beginning at 6:30 am from the Inlet to 30th St.
- * Vendor Village in the Inlet Lot, 12-5 pm on Thursday and 9 am-5 pm Friday and Saturday
- * Sand Course rides Thursday through Saturday; 9-11 am, 12-2 pm and 3-5 pm
- * Jeep Show and Shine on the beach, Saturday, 11 am-3 pm

Public Works will provide cones for event use in the northeast corner of the Inlet Lot.

Risk Management stated the minimum amount of insurance required is \$1M per occurrence/\$5M aggregate. The Mayor and City Council must be named additional insured and certificate holder.

Beach Patrol (OCBP) stated that while this event is during their season, they are not yet fully staffed, so OCBP will be severely limited in the support they can provide during the morning beach parades. Ms. Cropper must ensure participants in the parade do not throw items from their vehicles, causing spectators to run toward the parade. OCBP has scheduled pre-employment physical skills evaluations on May 30 at Dorchester St., and registration for this is on the beach directly off the Boardwalk. OCBP will be using the beach and ocean between the jetty and Talbot St. for testing. They continued, stating Ms. Cropper will need to ensure this main vehicular beach access at the Dorchester St. ramp remains open and accessible throughout the duration of their event. Also, a driving lane must be maintained with barriers and a monitor as Jeeps move between the Inlet Lot to north of the

pier. Lastly, Ms. Cropper must provide adequate safety and

security for beach patrons.

FISCAL IMPACT: Ms. Cropper shall pay the Town \$6,400 in private event fees

and \$2,880 is asset and support fees, for a total of 9,280.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve the event as presented.

SUBJECT: OCEAN CITY JEEP WEEK 2026

Having appeared before Council, receiving approval, and paying all fees, this permit defines the terms by which this event shall occur.

PURPOSE: Jeep festival with daily parades, a vendor village, and a sand course

PLACE, DATE, TIME:

<u>Beach Parade:</u> Thursday through Sunday, May 28-31, beginning at 6:30 am on the beach from the Inlet to 30th St., with staging in the Inlet Lot. No more than 250 jeeps per day.

<u>Vendor Village:</u> In rows AA-D in the Inlet Lot, Thursday, May 28 from 12-5 pm, Friday and Saturday, May 29-30 from 9 am-5 pm.

<u>Beach Course:</u> On the beach north of the Pier, between Wicomico and Dorchester Streets. No more than 250 Jeeps per session.

o Thursday through Saturday, May 28-30: (1) 9-11 am, (2) 12-2 pm, (3) 3-5 pm

Show 'n' Shine: Saturday, May 30, 11 am-2 pm in the beach parking footprint. No more than 250 participating Jeeps.

SET-UP: Wednesday, May 27, beginning at 7 am.

TEARDOWN: Sunday, May 31, beginning at 12 pm. Teardown to include the reopening of the event footprint to the public by staging the cones used to create the footprint in the northeast corner of the Inlet Lot.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF EACH PARTY:

Amanda Cropper for OC4WD

- 1. Serve as the event manager.
- Coordinate the events.
- 3. Ensure clearance is high enough that all participants can traverse under the pier.
- 4. Ensure each participating Jeep has valid insurance coverage.
- 5. Ensure participants do not throw items from the vehicle during the Beach Parades.
- 6. Create, maintain and secure a Jeep beach course. The primary course design factors will be the safety of the drivers and public.
- 7. Work closely with the Town in regard to the sand course, and make any necessary safety modifications the Town deems necessary.
- 8. Keep beach access at Dorchester St. open for emergency vehicles to enter the beach and move to the water's edge easily.
- Have dedicated staff monitor the entire beach drive path and the Sand Course for the entirety of the events.
- 10. Contact the affected Beach Stand Operators twice, advising about the event: Once after the event is approved by Council and a second time one (1) week prior to the event.

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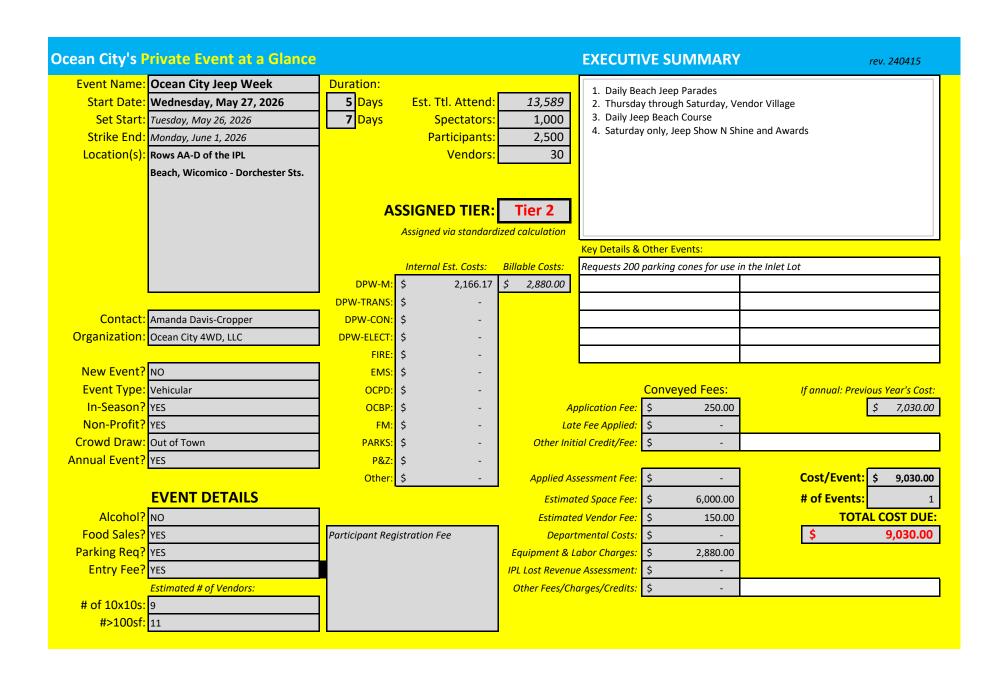
- 11. Release Jeeps in the Sand Course in groups to both enter and exit the beach. There is not to be a constant flow of vehicles on the beach.
- 12. Return the beach to the same condition it was previously, prior to the creation of the beach course, and the inflation/deflation and Jeep inspection area.
- 13. Ensure the area around "Wally Whale" is monitored and kept clear to prevent damage to the structure during staging for the sand course as well as the actual event series.
- 14. Inspect all Jeeps participating for fluid leaks, not allowing access to the beach if one is found.
- 15. Provide a hazardous spill procedure to the Town's Private Event Coordinator.
- 16. Post informational signs at each beach entrance to the parade route and beach course 24-hours in advance of the event.
- 17. If the beach is cleared, event staff, participants and spectators must leave the beach until Beach Patrol (OCBP) gives the "all clear."
- 18. Provide the Certificate of Insurance to include coverage for personal injury in the amount of \$1M per occurrence, \$5M aggregate, and name the Mayor and City Council as additional insured and certificate holder. Provided coverage shall be primary, non-contributory, and without regard to the named insured's fault or lack thereof.
- 19. Abide by all Guidelines and Obligations listed on the Private Event Application, unless otherwise noted in this permit.

The Town of Ocean City, Maryland

- 1. OCBP shall provide personnel for each parade.
- 2. Public Works (DPW) shall block off rows AA through D in the Inlet Lot for event use.
- 3. DPW shall place cones in the Northeast corner of the Inlet Lot for event use by Tuesday morning, May 26.
- 4. Special Event shall provide Inlet Lot parking codes to the Event Manager for staff and participant use.
- 5. The Private Event Coordinator, shall serve as the liaison for this event. Any questions regarding it should be directed to her. The liaison can be reached at 443-235-5275, LMitchell@oceancitymd.gov, or on the city radio system at #9010.

If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. If the applicant and franchise owner(s) are unable to reach a mutually acceptable agreement, the matter shall be submitted to the Town for mediation, and the Town will decide an impartial resolution by which both parties shall abide.



ROAD/LANE CLOSURES: A state highway permit shall be obtained for use of any state property (roads, highways, etc.) This is the responsibility of the applicant independent of the Town's private event process. Applicant shall keep the Town's Private Event Coordinator apprised of all steps and approvals related to such efforts. Non-state roads affected by the event shall be reviewed by the Town for consideration of closure or traffic modification through the private event process.

Requirements will depend on, including but not limited to, hazards and exposures associated with the specific private event.

Minimum required insurance shall be provided by companies licensed in the State of Maryland with a current AM Best, Inc. rating of a VII or better. The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials shall be named as additional insured on all insurance policies except workers' compensation and, except for automobile liability, the The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland's additional insured status shall include premises liability and products/completed operations.

Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. The applicant agrees to sell, dispense or serve only Coca-Cola beverages on Town premises for the duration of the permitted use. The applicant is expressly prohibited from using the beverages of other suppliers, said beverages to include soft drinks, juices, sport drinks, specified energy drinks and bottled waters. The permitted beverages include Coca-Cola, Diet Coke, Sprite, Pibb Xtra, Mello Yello, Fresca, Nestea, Arizona Tea, Honest Tea, Barqs Root Beer, Fanta, Minute Maid, Seagrams Ginger Ale, PowerAde, V-8 Juice, Fuze Juice, Monster, Tum E Yummies, Dasani and other products that Coca-Cola may provide in accordance with its agreement with the Town of Ocean City.

- BEACH ACCESS: Vehicle access to and from the beach must be clearly identified on your application and is not guaranteed. If approved, applicant must complete a beach driving and safety course annually provided by OCBP at the applicants expense.
- BEAUTY CONTESTS: Beauty contests are not permitted on the beach.
 - CITY SERVICES: Each applicant should plan on providing all the necessary cleanup, set-up, etc. without the assistance of City Services. If town services are requested, they must be clearly indicated within the Private Event Application for evaluation.



CONCESSIONS: No food or beverage concessions will be permitted on the beach or along the boardwalk, although such sales may be considered at other sites. Beverage sales at other sites must maintain compliance with the sponsorship restrictions noted within this application. ONLY event - related merchandise sales may be permitted on the beach upon appropriate request and approval, subject to applicable laws.



SPONSORSHIPS: All sponsors must be identified on the application.

ADVERTISING: Ocean City will not allow any type of advertising that is:

- False, misleading or deceiving statements
- Sexually explicit or obscene materials
- Tobacco or tobacco products
- Vaping or vaping products
- Tattoos
- Casino gambling including games of chance and skill
- Alcohol
- Promoting the use of marijuana
- Other potentially objectionable marketing or advertising which may be established from time to time by the Town.



DIAGRAM OF EVENT LAYOUT: A detailed diagram of the event layout/set-up and location of any and all facilities is required with your application. The application will be considered incomplete without the diagram.



INFLATABLES: Inflatable displays may be permitted, but must be pre-approved. A photograph of the intended display and the dimensions must be included before approval can be considered. FIREWORKS, TENTS, AIR SUPPORT/AIR INFLATED STRUCTURES & BONFIRES: Application to the City Fire Marshal at (410) 289-8780 is required, with appropriate approvals forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator. Failure to comply will result in revocation of all event approvals.

TOILET FACILITIES: Identification of planned "comfort" provisions must be included in the application and event diagram. The Town owns a number of established public toilet stations in the downtown area that may assist in event planning.

A copy of the raffle permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. All raffles must be drawn and announced prior to the conclusion of the event.

TRASH: Applicant is required to clean the area of trash and transport it to the appropriate receptacle. On the beach, all trash must be placed in the appropriate street-end dumpsters. Failure to practice appropriate cleanup procedures may result in the denial of future event requests and/or appropriate billings.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SERVICE: Groups are discouraged from the service of alcoholic beverages at their Ocean City event. However, those that desire such approval must state this clearly on their application. Permission to serve alcoholic beverages shall be granted exclusively by Mayor and City Council. It should be noted that without Council approval, open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property is illegal. Only Worchester County based non-profit groups may request to sell alcoholic beverages at an event, and must obtain a license from the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners. A "One Day Alcohol Permit" application with the Ocean City Mayor's signature must be submitted to the County a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the event, along with a the permit fee. Applications are usually available in the Mayor's office at City Hall. A copy of the approved permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. The original permit must be kept on site at the event and must be available to display if required.



CHANGES TO APPLICATION OR PERMIT: Event applicants desiring to make changes to their submitted application or approved private event must complete the "Request for an Addendum to a Private Event" form (available upon request), and must submit the completed form, along with the appropriate fee, to the Private Events Coordinator. However, no changes will be accepted within 30-days prior to the event.



LOCAL ORDINANCE DISCLOSURE AND COMPLIANCE: The applicant agrees to comply with the provisions of all applicable ordinances of the Town of Ocean City. Specifically all permitted uses on or within 75 feet of the Boardwalk are required to comply with the provisions of chapter 62 of the Code which expressly prohibits the public sale, rental or exchange for a donation of any goods, wares, merchandise, foodstuffs, refreshments or other commodities or services.

HOLD HARMLESS CLAUSE: Permitee (organization/ applicant) shall assume all risks incident to or in connection with the permitee activity including exposure to an infection of COVID-19 and shall be solely responsible for damage or injury, of whatever kind or nature, to person or property, directly or indirectly arising out of or in connection with the permitee activity or the conduct of Permitee's operation. Permitee hereby expressly agrees to defend and hold the Town of Ocean City, its officers, agents, employees and representatives harmless from any penalties for violation of any law, ordinance, or regulation affecting its activity and from any and all claims, suits, losses, damages, or injuries directly or indirectly arising out of or in connection with the permitee activity or conduct of its operation or resulting from the negligence or intentional acts or omissions of Permitee or its officers, agent and employees, including possible exposure to an infection from COVID-19.

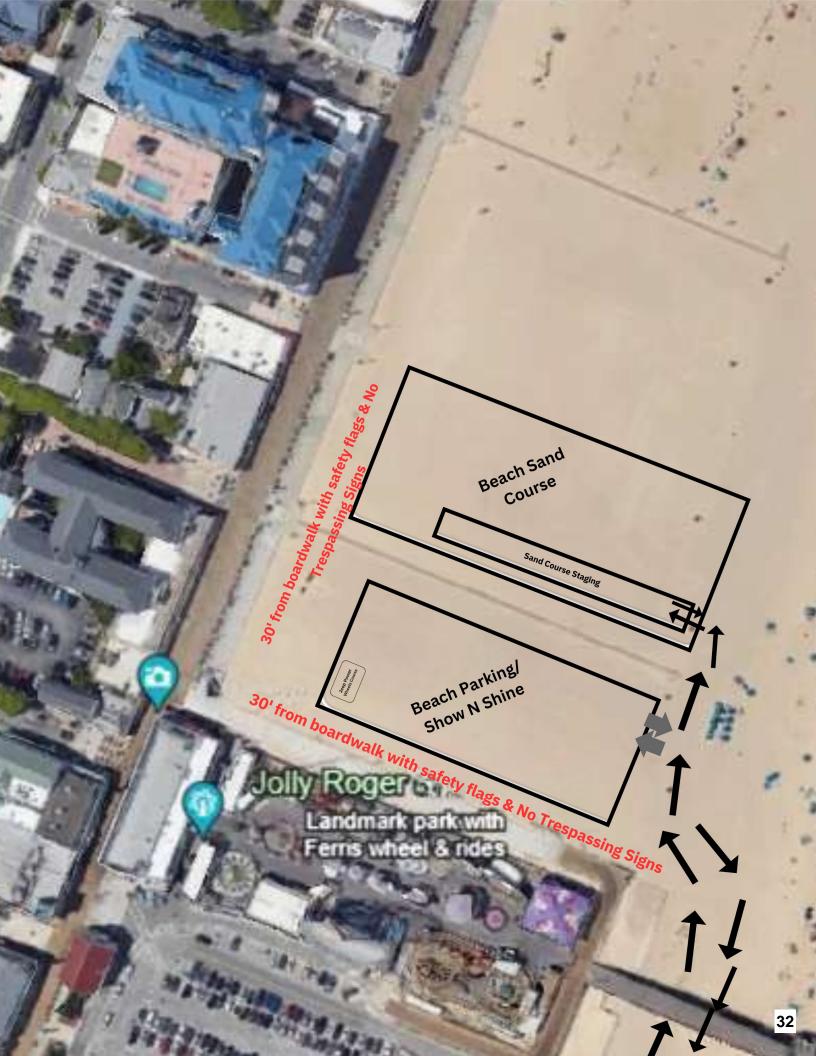

approve the Ocean City Criterium, tentatively scheduled to take place Saturday, March 28, 2026 in the West Ocean City

Park and Ride, 6 am-7 pm.

SUMMARY: A Criterium is a bicycle race consisting of several laps around a

closed circuit, the length of each lap ranging from a 1/4-mile to 6-miles. This event would showcase a 1/2-mile course that will have cyclists racing in the outer lanes of the parking lot with parking and spectators in the center. Spectators may also view the races under the covered woooden bridge. Mr. Chance will place barricades to separate the course from the spectators. While Inlet Isle Lane will remain open to vehicular traffic, the entrance at Old Bridge Road will be closed to

traffic.

Mr. Chance will provide portolets, and food and beverage sales, including alcohol. Mr. Chance will also utilize a PA System for event announcements and music. Lastly, Mr.

Chance will erect 10'x10' tents for event use.

Mr. Chance asks that the Town sweep the lot prior to the event and place signage, letting the public know the lot is closed for the event. Public Works confirmed they will do so.

Risk Management stated the minimum insurance required is \$1M/\$3M Aggregate with a Liquor Liability of \$1M/\$2M Aggregate, and the Mayor and Council listed as additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis. Also, given the nature of this event, participants must sign a Waiver of

Liability to participate.

FISCAL IMPACT: Mr. Chance shall pay the Town \$900 in private event fees.

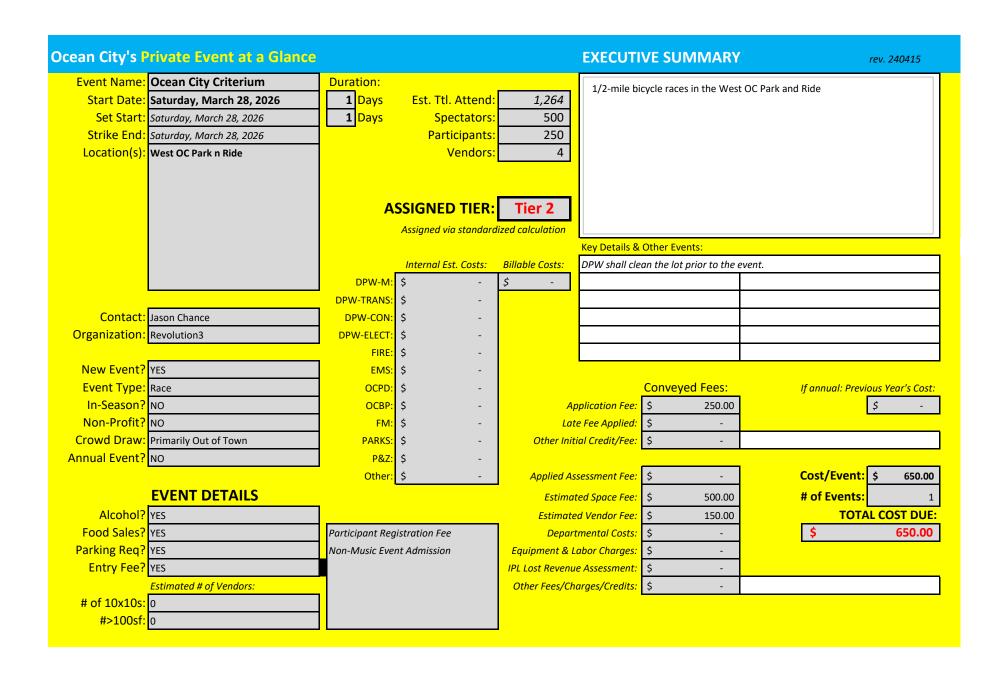

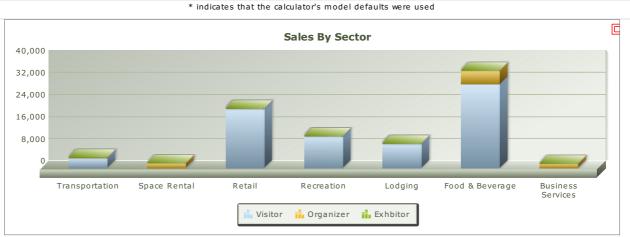

POINT OF CONTACT FOR THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY: The Town's Private Event Coordinator shall be the primary contact for all communications with the Town of Ocean City. If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. If the applicant and franchise owner(s) are unable to reach a mutually acceptable agreement, the matter shall be submitted to the Town for mediation, and the Town will decide an impartial resolution by which both parties shall abide.



ROAD/LANE CLOSURES: A state highway permit shall be obtained for use of any state property (roads, highways, etc.) This is the responsibility of the applicant independent of the Town's private event process. The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials shall be named as additional insured on all insurance policies except workers' compensation and, except for automobile liability, the The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland's additional insured status shall include premises liability and products/completed operations.

Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. The applicant agrees to sell, dispense or serve only Coca-Cola beverages on Town premises for the duration of the permitted use. The applicant is expressly prohibited from using the beverages of other suppliers, said beverages to include soft drinks, juices, sport drinks, specified energy drinks and bottled waters. - BEACH ACCESS: Vehicle access to and from the beach must be clearly identified on your application and is not guaranteed. If approved, applicant must complete a beach driving and safety course annually provided by OCBP at the applicants expense.
- BEAUTY CONTESTS: Beauty contests are not permitted on the beach.
- CITY SERVICES: Each applicant should plan on providing all the necessary cleanup, set-up, etc. without the assistance of City Services. If town services are requested, they must be clearly indicated within the Private Event Application for evaluation.



CONCESSIONS: No food or beverage concessions will be permitted on the beach or along the boardwalk, although such sales may be considered at other sites. Beverage sales at other sites must maintain compliance with the sponsorship restrictions noted within this application. ONLY event - related merchandise sales may be permitted on the beach upon appropriate request and approval, subject to applicable laws.



SPONSORSHIPS: All sponsors must be identified on the application.

ADVERTISING: Ocean City will not allow any type of advertising that is:

FIREWORKS, TENTS, AIR SUPPORT/AIR INFLATED STRUCTURES & BONFIRES: Application to the City Fire Marshal at (410) 289-8780 is required, with appropriate approvals forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator. Failure to comply will result in revocation of all event approvals.

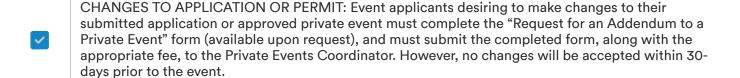

RAFFLES: Only non-profit groups may offer any form of raffle in conjunction with an event in Ocean City. These groups must apply through the Worcester County Department of Development Review and Permitting, and must submit a processing fee at the time of application. Applications are available at the Isle of Wight County Office Building on Route 90, or at the Court House in Snow Hill. A copy of the raffle permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. All raffles must be drawn and announced prior to the conclusion of the event.

TRASH: Applicant is required to clean the area of trash and transport it to the appropriate receptacle. On the beach, all trash must be placed in the appropriate street-end dumpsters. Failure to practice appropriate cleanup procedures may result in the denial of future event requests and/or appropriate billings.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SERVICE: Groups are discouraged from the service of alcoholic beverages at their Ocean City event. However, those that desire such approval must state this clearly on their application. Permission to serve alcoholic beverages shall be granted exclusively by Mayor and City Council. It should be noted that without Council approval, open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property is illegal. Only Worchester County based non-profit groups may request to sell alcoholic beverages at an event, and must obtain a license from the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners. A "One Day Alcohol Permit" application with the Ocean City Mayor's signature must be submitted to the County a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the event, along with a the permit fee. Applications are usually available in the Mayor's office at City Hall. A copy of the approved permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. The original permit must be kept on site at the event and must be available to display if required.



LOCAL ORDINANCE DISCLOSURE AND COMPLIANCE: The applicant agrees to comply with the provisions of all applicable ordinances of the Town of Ocean City. Specifically all permitted uses on or within 75 feet of the Boardwalk are required to comply with the provisions of chapter 62 of the Code which expressly prohibits the public sale, rental or exchange for a donation of any goods, wares, merchandise, foodstuffs, refreshments or other commodities or services.

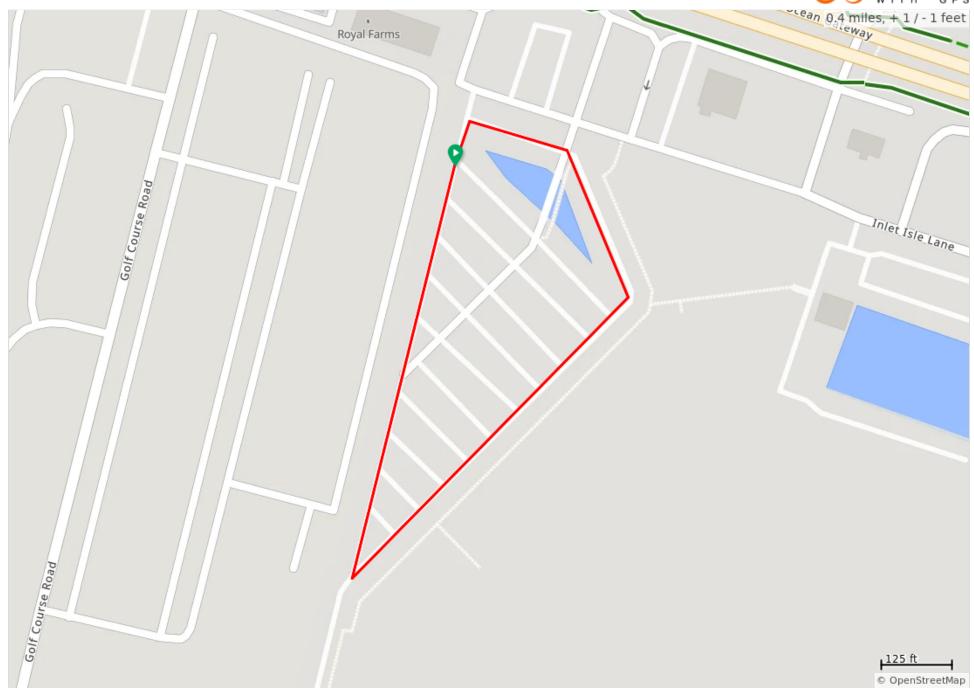

ISSUE(S):

The Recreation and Parks Department possesses two separate and/or adjacent age-appropriate playground infrastructure(s), located at Northside Park that were originally installed in approximately ~2002-2005. phases beainnina infrastructure has surpassed a two-decade original installation date and have been identified as in need of replacement. The Recreation and Parks Department made a determination in approximately ~2023 to replace the five (5) to twelve (12) year-old playground in phased developments in 2023 and 2026 to meet this replacement lifecycle. The second phase of the project construction anticipated for 2026 replacement of the five (5) to twelve (12) year-old elevated ADA-compliant ramping system, replace original playground equipment installed in ~2005, and newly install a bonded rubber surfacing system for increased safety measures.

SUMMARY:

The Recreation and Parks Department Superintendent Gary historical Collier discussed conditions, involvina establishment of established brand and/or manufacturer and Vendor of record for the region and/or geographical location for the Town of Ocean City, Maryland, as a basis for Mayor and City Council, Town of Ocean City Maryland consideration for approval of a sole source declaration. Procurement Manager Matt Perry requested Recreation and Parks Department Superintendent Gary Collier to provide documentation from the Vendor for further review to determine if a sole source procurement could be authorized. Procurement Manager Matt Perry reviewed the documentation provided and deemed a Waiver of Competition justification was supported. Due to the monetary valuation of the project exceeding \$100,000.00, Mayor and City Council approval is being sought to proceed with Awarding the Vendor for this effort and subsequently developing a Contract with the Vendor as a result.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Up to estimated valuation of \$268,000.00. Per discussion with Recreation and Parks Department Superintendent Gary Collier and Grants Manager Leah Dyson, this procurement would be eligible for a Maryland Department of Natural Resources - Community Parks and Playgrounds grant funding Award in the

amount of \$267,140.00 which has been included in the State of Maryland's Fiscal Year 2026 budget. Additionally, Gametime has Awarded the Town of Ocean City, Maryland a Community Champions grant in the amount of \$73,536.00 to reflect a discount attributed to the intended equipment purchase. The Procurement Department has also reviewed the OMNIA Partners cooperative purchasing network to verify that the Town of Ocean City, Maryland would receive best potential pricing for this effort. Consequently, the same valuation has been approved and secured for funding efforts in the Recreation and Parks Fiscal Year 2026 operating budget in the event that grant funding was not secured.

RECOMMENDATION:

Gametime is the established brand and/or manufacturer as well as the Vendor of record for the region and/or geographical location for the Town of Ocean City, Maryland. The Recreation and Parks and Procurement Department(s) formally recommends Mayor and City, Council, Town of Ocean City, Maryland Award a Sole Source Contract to Gametime with expenditure approval up to \$268,000.00.

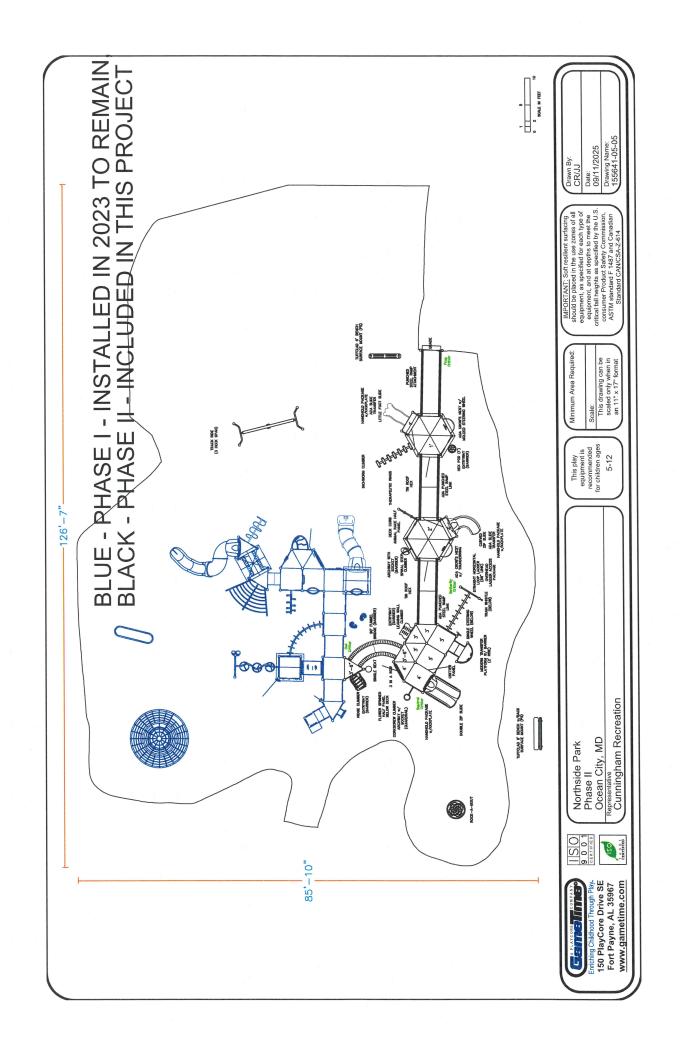

- E. The parties amended the Contract on January 1, 2019, to incorporate unit price adjustments and freight rate adjustments.
- F. The parties amended the Contract on April 1, 2019, to incorporate new products and pricing.
- G. The parties amended the Contract on January 1, 2020, to incorporate unit price adjustments and freight rate adjustments.

Attached are four documents, along with other information, related to the Northside Park 5 to 12-year-old Playground Phase II project.

- The first two attachments are quotes, reflecting the project costs broken down into two components.
 - O Quote #155641-05-05 in the amount of \$99,477.53, is for the play structure & other associated equipment.
 - Quote #155641-06-02 in the amount of \$161,192.05, is for the costs associated with the surfacing, removal & disposal of the old equipment and installation of the new equipment.
 - The total combined cost of the two quotes is \$260,669.58.
 - The quotes were intentionally presented in this format by Gametime, to reflect a grant discount which attributed to the equipment being discounted \$75,580. The majority of the discount was based upon a Gametime Community Champions grant we applied for, and were awarded, in the amount of \$73,536. This resulted in a 50% savings on the main play structure and ADA ramping system. In addition, Omina Partners cooperative purchasing network pricing was applied to the remaining equipment pieces for an additional \$2,044 saving. It is worth noting that Cunningham Recreation also applied Omnia Partners contract pricing for the surfacing, removal & disposal of the old equipment and installation of the new equipment.

 - We have been awarded a Maryland Department of Natural Resources Community Parks & Playgrounds grant in the amount of \$267,140 for this project. This is a 100% grant, with no matching funds required.
- The third attachment is the Gametime Community Champions Grant award certificate.
- The fourth attachment is a model illustrating the equipment that was installed in 2023 during phase I (in blue), and what is to be replaced as part of this phase II project, showing the connection point where the new equipment will marry to the equipment installed in 2023.
- This project is proposed to be a sole source project, utilizing a Waiver of Competition, based upon the fact that the new Gametime ADA ramping system and equipment will be attached to existing Gametime equipment installed in 2023, which effectively splits the 5 to 12-year-old playground in half. It is prudent to utilize GameTime equipment for the replacement ADA ramping system and equipment, as attaching another manufacturer's ADA ramping system and equipment to the existing equipment manufactured by GameTime would void any warranty from either playground manufacturer, and create a very grey area from a liability aspect for both the manufacturer and the Town.
 - The WOC has been submitted to you in a prior email. I used an estimated cost of \$268,000 on the Waiver of Competition, the total award from the Community Parks & Playgrounds grant was \$267,140, and the total cost of the project as it stands is \$260,670.

- These discrepancies are intentional to allow headroom for unforeseen costs and / or to add other elements such as trash cans, more benches, etc. as part of this project. We may or may not order additional amenities from Gametime, but if we do we are covered on the Waiver of Competition.
- The difference between the grant and the current project cost is \$6,470 to cover these other amenities.
 Leah We will do our best to consume as much of the grant funding as possible. Trash cans, benches and other site amenities have traditionally been allowable expenses covered by CP&P grant monies for playgrounds.
- As I mentioned in my previous email, there is some urgency to move this forward to Mayor & Council if it needs their approval, based upon a deadline for placing the order by the expiration date of October 24, 2025 noted on the Gametime grant award certificate. I am in the process of applying for an extension to the grant; however, there is not guarantee that it will be approved. It may be necessary to move this up to the regular meeting agenda on Monday, October 20, 2025 in order to meet that deadline. If the extension is granted it could go on the October 28th work session agenda. I will let you know as soon as I find out about the extension.

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- With the summer crowds at Northside Park, immediately followed by Winterfest (which runs through December 31st), the best timeframe to close the playground to perform the removal is early January through March of 2026.
- GameTime typically implements any annual price increases on January 1st each year, with a cutoff date for ordering to beat the price increase of the Friday before Thanksgiving (November 21, 2025).

- GameTime's current delivery dates are 8 weeks after the order is placed.
- The best process is to deliver new equipment direct to work site.
- Bonded rubber surfacing installation is temperature dependent upon a minimum of 40 degrees through the curing process. (Average Ocean City Hi / Low temps in February 42/31 and March 49/38)

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- install bonded rubber as soon as temps permit early March hopefully

Good morning Matt,

Per our brief telephone conversation several weeks ago, and a follow up email including you and Leah, pertaining to the replacement of playground equipment at Northside Park as a sole source (Waiver of Competition) project, here is the background / support information that I promised to send to you:

History - beginning 2002

Inside Northside Park there are two separate, but adjacent, age-appropriate playgrounds. One 2 to 5-year-old playground and one 5 to 12-year-old playground. The two playgrounds are installed in such a fashion that at first glance they may appear to be one playground. They were originally installed in two phases at a total cost of \$212,000 (the best I can tell); however, the construction was not the traditional two-phase process used when installing two separate age-appropriate playgrounds.

The first phase, installed in 2002 at a cost of \$62,000, included the replacement of previously existing, outdated 5 to 12-year-old playground equipment. The equipment was manufactured by GameTime and installed by West Recreation.

The second phase, installed in 2005, connected an elevated ramping system onto the existing 5 to 12-year-old playground to allow handicap users to fully interact with other users, added additional 5 to 12-year-old accessible equipment alongside the ramping system, and also added a new 2 to 5-year-old accessible playground. A late change order was added to include a few additional elements to both playgrounds to bring the total cost of this phase to \$160,000. The equipment was also manufactured by GameTime and was installed by West Recreation.

History - 2022 to 2023

As the equipment installed in the 2002 first phase was 20 years old, an estimate of \$496,565 was obtained in 2022 to the replace the complete 5 to 12-year-old playground, including the equipment installed in 2002 and the elevated ramping system / additional 5 to 12-year-old accessible equipment installed in 2005. This estimate did *not* include replacement of *any* the 2 to 5-year-old play equipment that was installed in 2005. Based upon the almost half a million

dollar price tag for the 5 to 12-year-old playground & elevated ramping system alone, Ocean City Recreation & Parks decided to replace the 5 to 12-year-old playground in two phases (2023 and 2026) and then replace the 2 to 5-year old playground as a stand-alone project in 2027 as opposed to the two non-traditional phases used in the original sequence of construction.

In 2023, the first phase of the two phase 5 to 12-year-old equipment replacement was completed at a cost of \$300,400, and was funded by a \$265,400 Community Parks & Playgrounds (CP&P) grant and \$35,000 from the General Fund. It is worth noting that the cost did not include removal and disposal of existing equipment, concrete footings and existing wood fiber surfacing. The Town of Ocean City Public Works Department performed these tasks as in-kind services to aid in keeping the playground replacement costs as low as possible. The value of these in-kind services was estimated to be \$27,000, which is roughly 9% of the total project cost.

The new equipment installed in 2023 was manufactured by GameTime and installed by Cunningham Recreation. A Waiver of Competition (WOC) was issued by former Procurement Manager Scott Wagner to utilize GameTime equipment for this project due to the fact that we basically split the 5 to 12-year-old playground in half, and attached new play equipment to the existing ADA ramping system manufactured by GameTime. We determined it was prudent to utilize GameTime equipment for the replacement equipment, as the replacement equipment would be connecting to the GameTime ADA ramping system, and attaching another manufacturer's equipment to the ADA ramping system manufactured by GameTime would void any warranty from either playground manufacturer, and create a very grey area from a liability aspect for both the manufacturer and the Town.

Sidebar - West Recreation, the original GameTime installer went out of business sometime around 2013 and was bought by Cunningham Recreation. Cunningham Recreation is the GameTime vendor of record for our geographical region. We have maintained a very good long-term relationship with both GameTime and Cunningham Recreation as we have multiple playgrounds in Town in which we have utilized GameTime equipment.

Present

The second phase of the 5 to 12-year-old construction, scheduled for 2026, will include replacement of the 5 to 12-year-old elevated ramping system and additional 5 to 12-year-old equipment that was originally installed in 2005, along with bonded rubber surfacing. We acquired an estimate from GameTime in the fall of 2025 for this second phase project in the amount of \$267,140. Consequently, we have received notification that Community Parks & Playgrounds grant funding in the amount of \$267,140, has been included in the State of Maryland's FY26 budget. Funding in the amount of \$267,140 has been approved in the Park FY26 operating budget in case the grant did not come through.

As previously noted, all of the play equipment installed in both phases was manufactured by GameTime. As we are going to be basically splitting the 5 to 12-year-old playground in half once again, and attaching a new ramping system / play equipment to the existing GameTime equipment installed in 2023, I feel it would be prudent to utilize GameTime equipment as the replacement equipment. Connecting another manufacturer's equipment would void any warranty from either playground manufacturer and create a very grey area from a liability aspect for both the manufacturer and the Town.

A new Waiver of Competition form will be forthcoming, however, it is worth noting that the \$267,140 estimate was obtained in 2025 so it is very possible with the market volatility that this cost will increase, therefore, I will begin working with the Cunningham representative to obtain a new quote and submit a new WOC once I have obtained that pricing.

I am hopeful that I have provided adequate information to justify a WOC for this project when the time comes. 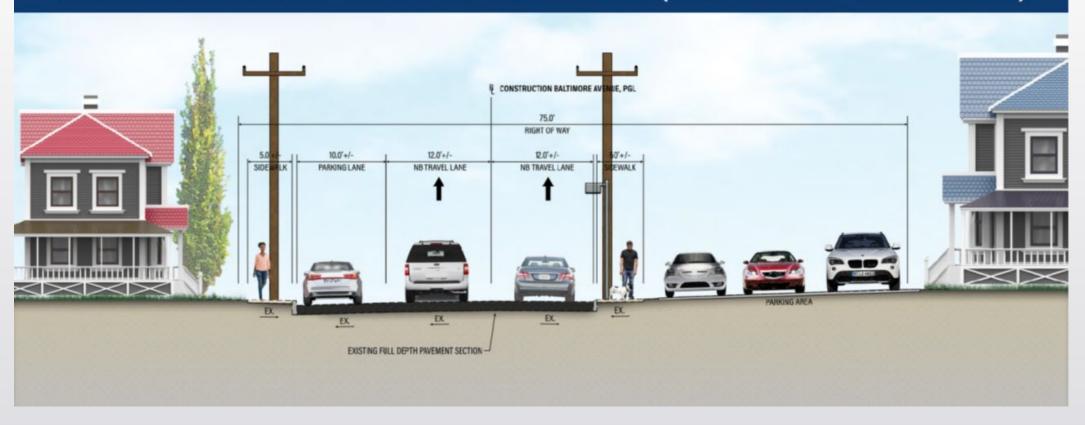

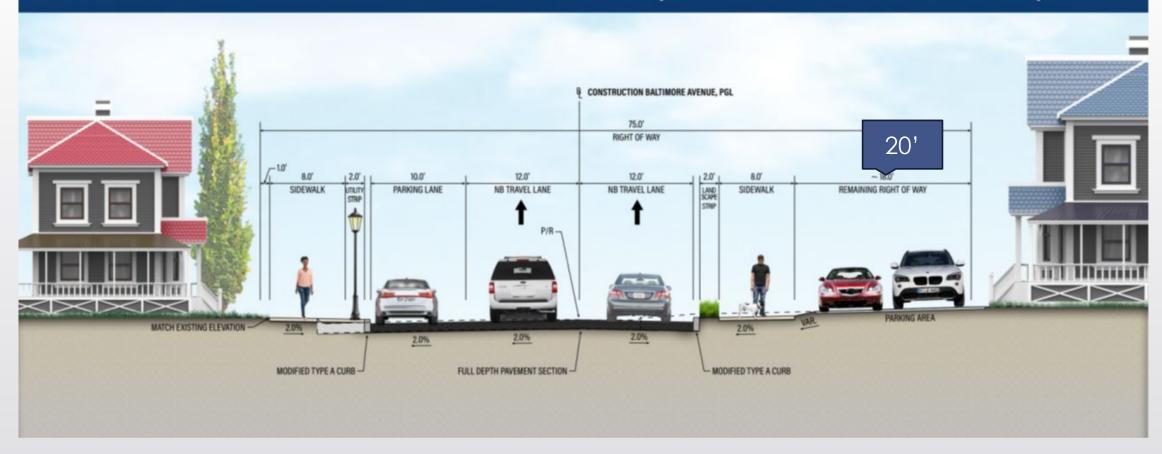

BALTIMORE AVENUE - EXISTING CONDITIONS (12TH STREET - 13TH STREET)



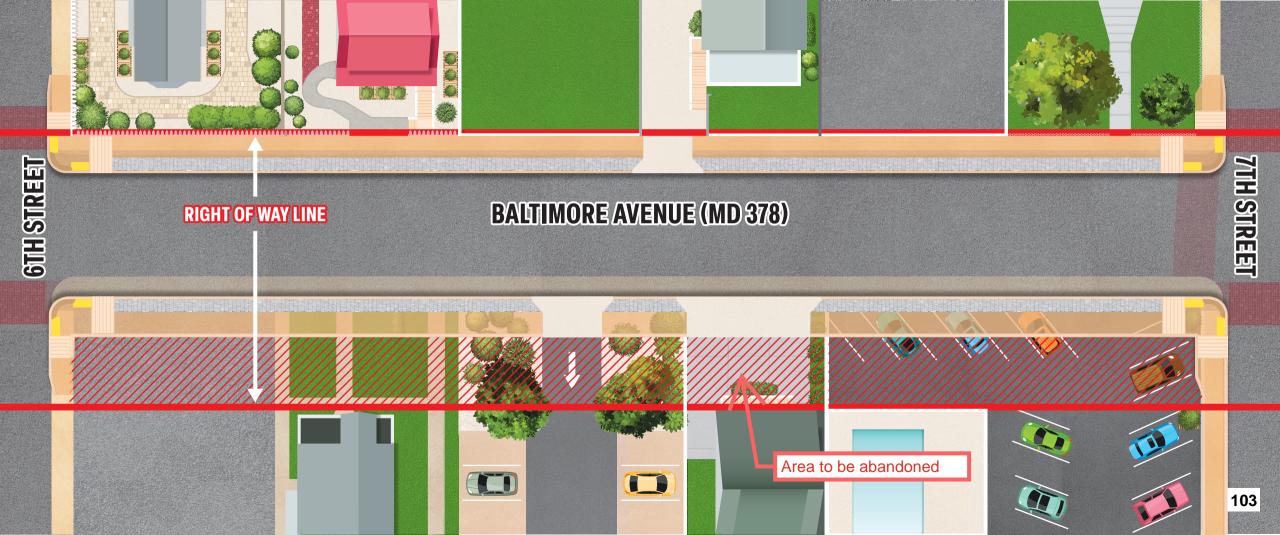

Skateboards and Similar Conveyances.

SUMMARY: Pursuant to a change in State law, effective October 1, 2025,

unless prohibited by local ordinance, a person is permitted to ride a bicycle, play vehicle, or unicycle on a sidewalk or a

sidewalk area.

At a prior Work Session, with the knowledge of the State law change, and with the recommendation of the Ocean City Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC), the Police Commission, and staff, the Mayor and City Council directed the City Solicitor to draft an ordinance to prohibit bicycles on sidewalks except for areas approved by a resolution of the

Mayor and City Council.

To appropriately execute the direction of the Mayor and City Council, Chapter 90, Article V, titled "Bicycles, Skateboards and Similar Conveyances" of the Town's Code needed to be substantially revised. Given the substantial revisions, this matter came back before the Mayor and City Council for presentation at the October 14, 2025, Work Session.

Following the presentation of the draft Ordinance, a Motion was made (and carried) to advance the draft Ordinance to

First Reading.

FISCAL IMPACT: Not Applicable

RECOMMENDATION: Pass Ordinance 2025-26 on First Reading.

ORDINANCE 2025-

ORDINANCE TO AMEND ARTICLE V, ENTITLED BICYCLES, SKATEBOARDS AND SIMILAR CONVEYANCES, OF CHAPTER 90, ENTITLED TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY THAT ARTICLE V, ENTITLED BICYCLES, SKATEBOARDS AND SIMILAR CONVEYANCES OF CHAPTER 90, ENTITLED TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND, BE AND THE SAME IS HEREBY AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

Chapter 90 – TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES

ARTICLE V. BICYCLES, SKATEBOARDS AND SIMILAR CONVEYANCES¹

Sec. 90-191. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Bicycle means a vehicle that is designed to be operated by human power, has two or three wheels, of which one is more than 14 inches in diameter, and has a wheel configuration as follows: If the bicycle has two wheels, with both wheels in tandem, or if the vehicle has three wheels, with one front wheel and with two rear wheels that are spaced equidistant from the center of the bicycle. The term "bicycle" includes surrey bikes.

Bicycle shall mean the following:

- (1) a vehicle that:
 - (i) is designed to be operated by human power;
 - (ii) has at least two or three wheels; and
 - (iii) handlebars for steering.
- (2) an electric bicycle, generally, subject to the specific definition below in this section;

- (3) a moped;
- (4) an electric low speed scooter;
- (5) a surrey bike; or
- (6) a unicycle.

Bike lane means any portion of a roadway or shoulder designated for single-directional bicycle flow.

Electric bicycle means a vehicle that is designed to be operated by human power with the assistance of an electric motor, is equipped with fully operable pedals, has two or three wheels, has a motor with a rating of 750 watts or less, and meets one of the following requirements:

- (1) Class 1 electric bicycle is equipped with a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches a speed of 20 miles per hour;
- (2) Class 2 electric bicycle is equipped with a motor that provides assistance whether or not the rider is pedaling the bicycle and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches a speed of 20 miles per hour; or
- (3) Class 3 electric bicycle is equipped with a motor that provides assistance only when the rider is pedaling and ceases to provide assistance when the bicycle reaches a speed of 28 miles per hour.

Electronic personal assistive mobility device (EPAMD) means a device that has two nontandem wheels, is self-balancing, is powered by an electronic propulsion system, has a maximum speed capability of 15 miles per hour, and is designed to transport one person. As used in this article, an EPAMD only includes those electronic propulsion devices often referred to as "Segways," but does not include those electronic propulsion devices often referred to as "hover boards."

<u>Pushcarts</u> means a wheeled cart or wagon or similar conveyance designed to be pushed on or pulled by hand and not designed or equipped for riding or propulsion by pedals or motor.

Roadway means any part of a highway, street, road, public way, avenue or alley that is improved, designed or ordinarily used for motor vehicle travel, other than the shoulder or designated bike path.

<u>Roller Skates</u> as used in this article shall include roller skates, in-line skates or rollerblades.

Sidewalk means for the purposes of this article, that part of a highway:

- (1) That is intended for use by pedestrians; and
- (2) That is between:

- (i) The lateral curb lines or, in the absence of curbs, the lateral boundary lines of a roadway; and
- (ii) The adjacent property lines.

<u>Skateboards</u> as used in this article shall include non-motorized skateboards and motorized one-wheels, hover boards, and electric skateboards.

Sec. 90-192. - <u>Roadway - Operation of bicycles, electric bicycles, skateboards, roller skates, pushcarts and EPAMDs on Roadway.</u> Use of bike lane or shoulder by persons operating bicycles, electric bicycles or EPAMDs.; riding bicycle or EPAMD on roadway.

- (a) Roadways with bike lane or shoulder paved to smooth surface. Where there is a bike lane paved to a smooth surface or a shoulder paved to a smooth surface, a person operating a bicycle or electric bicycle, roller skates or a skateboard shall use the bike lane or shoulder and may not ride on the roadway, except in the following situations:
 - (1) When overtaking and passing another bicycle, <u>electric bicycle</u>, <u>roller skates</u>, <u>skateboard</u>, pedestrian, or other vehicle within the bike lane or shoulder if the overtaking or passing cannot be done safely within the bike lane or shoulder;
 - (2) When preparing for a left turn at an intersection or onto an alley, private road, or driveway;
 - (3) When reasonably necessary to leave the bike lane or shoulder to avoid debris or other hazardous condition; or
 - (4) When reasonably necessary to leave the bike lane because the bike lane is overlaid with a right turn lane, merge lane, or other marking that breaks the continuity of the bike lane.
- (b) Leaving bike lane. A person operating a bicycle, or electric bicycle, roller skates or a skateboard may not leave a bike lane or shoulder until the movement can be made with reasonable safety and then only after giving an appropriate signal.
- (c) Riding to right side of roadway. Each person operating a bicycle, or electric bicycle, roller skates or a skateboard on a roadway shall ride as near to the right side of the roadway as practicable and safe, except when making or attempting to make a left turn, when operating on a one-way street, or when passing a stopped or slower-moving vehicle.
- (d) Unlawful riding.
 - (1) EPAMD and Pushcarts. It is unlawful for a person to ride an EPAMD or operate a pushcart on a bike lane, shoulder of road or a roadway, except to cross a roadway at an intersection

- (2) <u>Skateboards</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a skateboard on any public lots or any other public property except for:
 - (i) public skateboard facilities:
 - (ii) at public sponsored or authorized skateboard events within the corporate limits of Ocean City; or
 - (iii) as provided for in this section or section 90-193.
- (3) Roller Skates. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate roller skates on any public lots and other public property, except for:
 - (i) in public roller skate facilities;
 - (ii) at publicly sponsored or authorized roller skate events within the corporate limits of Ocean City; or
 - (iii) as provided for in this section or section 90-193.

Sec. 90-193. - <u>Boardwalk</u> - Operation of bicycles, electric bicycles, <u>skateboards</u>, <u>roller skates</u>, pushcarts and EPAMDs on boardwalk.

- (a) Operation of bBicycles, as defined in subsections (1), (5) and (6) of the Bicycle definition in this article, class 1 electric bicycles, non-motorized skateboards, roller skates, pushcarts and EPAMDs may be operated on the boardwalk is only permitted, during the periods and times established by resolution of the Mmayor and Ceity Ceouncil.
- (b) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary stated in this section, it shall be unlawful for more than six persons to ride on any bicycle or tricycle or on any self-propelled vehicle with more than two wheels or for any bicycle or tricycle or any self-propelled vehicle capable of containing more than six persons to be operated on the boardwalk at any time.
- (c) It shall be unlawful for any nongovernmental motor vehicle or motor-assisted vehicle, to be operated on the boardwalk at any time without permission of the <u>M</u>mayor and <u>Ceity Ceouncil or its designated agent.</u>
- (d) It shall be unlawful to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate a class 2 or class 3 electric bicycle, motorized skateboards, a moped, or an electric low speed scooter on the boardwalk at any time.
- (e) It shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate any electronically propelled, gas propelled, or human propelled device, for transportation use, recreational use, or any other use on the boardwalk at any time unless otherwise expressly permitted in this article, in other articles or chapters of this Code, or in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and policy of the Mmayor and Ceity Ceouncil.

- (f) It shall be unlawful for any person to operate the otherwise permitted bicycles, electric bicycles, skateboards, roller skates, pushcarts and EPAMDs in a careless or imprudent manner that endangers any property or the life or person of any individual on the boardwalk.
- (g) It shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate any conveyance defined by this article, as well as any other electronically propelled, gas propelled, or human propelled device, for transportation use, recreational use, or any other use, on the sea wall, railings or benches on or adjacent to the boardwalk at any time.
- (h) For the purposes of this section, the Boardwalk shall include Somerset Street from Baltimore Avenue east to the boardwalk, and South First Street from Baltimore Avenue east to the boardwalk are hereby designated as pedestrian ways/parks.

Sec. 90-194. Lamps and reflectors on bicycles.

- (a) If a bicycle or electric bicycle is used on a highway at any time when, due to insufficient light or unfavorable atmospheric conditions, persons and vehicles on the highway are not clearly discernible at a distance of 1,000 feet, the bicycle shall be equipped:
 - (1) On the front, with a lamp that emits a white light visible from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front; and
 - (2) On the rear, with a red reflector of a type approved by the administration and visible from all distances from 600 feet to 100 feet to the rear when directly in front of lawful upper beams of headlamps on a motor vehicle.
- (b) A bicycle, electric bicycle or bicyclist may be equipped with a lamp that emits a red light or a flashing amber light visible from a distance of 500 feet to the rear in addition to the red reflector required by subsection (a) of this section.

<u>Sec. 90-194. - Sidewalks - Operation of bicycles, electric bicycles, skateboards, roller skates, pushcarts, EPAMDs or similar devices on sidewalks.</u>

(a) Except as stated in subsection (b) and (c) of this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate any the following devices for transportation use, recreational use, or any other use on any sidewalk within the corporate limits of Ocean City at any time:

- (1) bicycles;
- (2) electric bicycles;
- (3) skateboards;
- (4) roller skates; and
- (5) an electronically propelled, or gas propelled device of any kind.
- (b) A person may operate the following devices on any sidewalk within the corporate limits of Ocean City:
 - (1) an EPAMD;
 - (2) a Pushcart;
 - (3) a device that is operating in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA); or
 - (4) a device that is permitted on sidewalks as so designated by resolution of the Mayor and City Council.
- (c) A person under the age of 16 years may operate a Bicycle as defined in subsection (1) of the bicycle definition in this article provided that said operation does not interfere with pedestrian use of the sidewalk.

Sec. 90-195. Operation of skateboards.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate a skateboard on Atlantic Avenue (the Boardwalk) except during the time periods established by resolution of the Mayor and City Council.
- (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate a skateboard on the sea wall, railings or benches on or adjacent to Atlantic Avenue (the boardwalk) at any time.
- (c) Subject to subsection (a) of this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate a skateboard on any other public street, public way, ramp, public alley, public sidewalk, public lots or any other public property (except for public skateboard facilities, and public sponsored or authorized skateboard events) within the corporate limits of Ocean City between April 1 and October 1 of each year.

Sec. 90-196. Operation of roller skates.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push, or otherwise operate roller skates on any public street, public way, public alley, public sidewalk, public boardwalk, public lots and other public property, except as follows:

(1) In public roller skate facilities and publicly sponsored or authorized roller skate events within the corporate limits of Ocean City.

- (2) In the designated bike lanes north of 17th Street.
- (3) On Atlantic Avenue (the Boardwalk) during the time periods established by resolution of the Mayor and City Council.

Sec. 90-197. Pedestrian ways/parks.

- (a) Somerset Street from Baltimore Avenue east to the boardwalk, South Division Street from Philadelphia Avenue west to the Bay and South First Street from Baltimore Avenue east to the boardwalk are hereby designated as pedestrian ways/parks.
- (b) Except as provided by subsection (c) of this section, it shall be unlawful for any person to ride, propel, push or otherwise operate a bicycle, EPAMD, pushcart, scooter, skateboard, roller skate or similar self-propelled vehicle or device on a pedestrian way/park. Carrying or walking such vehicles or devices while walking through a pedestrian way/park shall not be considered a violation hereof.
- (c) Notwithstanding subsection (b) of this section to the contrary, it shall be lawful for a person to ride or operate a bicycle or EPAMD on the Somerset Street pedestrian way/park during the same hours as permitted on Atlantic Avenue (the boardwalk).

Sec. 90-198. Operation of EPAMDs.

ISSUE(S): First Reading - Ordinance 2025-27 amends multiple sections of

> Code increasing municipal infraction misdemeanor fines and penalties and revising the Town Code

for consistency and clarity as to penalties and fines.

SUMMARY: Effective October 1, 2025, and as a result of Senate Bill 820,

§6-101 and §6-102 of the Local Government Article of the Maryland Annotated Code now allows municipalities to increase the maximum monetary penalty for civil infractions, and maximum monetary penalty for misdemeanors to \$5,000

(previously both were \$1,000).

Additionally, §6-101 of the Local Government Article of the Maryland Annotated Code was amended previously by the Legislature to allow municipalities to establish a maximum length of imprisonment for misdemeanors to 6 months.

Section 1-8 of the Town Code generally covers penalties. Additionally, there are specific sections in the Town Code which also set forth a penalty in addition to what is listed in

Section 1-8.

Specific code sections are being amended by this Ordinance to reflect increased penalties and fines. Additionally, Code sections are being added which are necessary to provide

consistency and clarity to the penalties and fines.

Section 1-8 is being revised to provide clearer guidance as to penalties for municipal infractions

misdemeanors.

WHEREAS, effective October 1, 2025, and as a result of Senate Bill 820, §6-101 and §6-102 of the Local Government Article of the Maryland Annotated Code now allows municipalities to increase the maximum monetary penalty for civil infractions and maximum monetary penalty for misdemeanors to \$5,000 (previously both were \$1,000); and

WHEREAS, §6-101 of the Local Government Article of the Maryland Annotated Code was amended previously by the Legislature to allow municipalities to establish a maximum length of imprisonment for misdemeanors of six (6) months; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Ocean City Code has the penalties for municipal infractions, fines, and misdemeanors in various sections of the Code; and

WHEREAS, stating the offense for a specific Code section is best placed in the specific Chapter for which the act appears, for consistent and clear enforcement; and

WHEREAS, Section C-416A of the Town's Charter states, "The Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may provide by ordinance for the enforcement of this Charter and of any ordinance or regulation made hereunder. The violation of this Charter or such ordinance or regulation is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor, and the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may provide for the punishment thereof by fine or imprisonment or both. It is also empowered to provide civil penalties for such violation."

WHEREAS, pursuant to the powers of the Council a set forth in Charter §C-414, and after careful consideration, the Mayor and City Council have determined that the changes to penalties and fines as set forth in the amended code sections below, are necessary for the good government of the Town; for the protection and preservation of the Town's property, rights and privileges; for the preservation of peace and good order; for securing persons and property from violence, danger or destruction; and for the protection and promotion of the health, safety, comfort, convenience, welfare and happiness of the residents of the Town and its visitors.

Sec. 1-7. - Altering or tampering with Code.

It shall be unlawful for anyone to improperly change or amend, by additions or deletions, any part or portion thereof, or to alter or tamper with such Code in any manner whatsoever, which will cause the law of Ocean City to be misrepresented thereby. Anyone violating this section shall be subject, upon conviction, to a fine of not less than \$5.00 \$250.00 nor more than \$100.00\$5,000.00, or by imprisonment for a period not to exceed 20 days 6 months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

- (a) Prohibitions.  - (2)—Any offender violating any of the provisions of any portion of the laws, ordinances, or resolutions, as same may be, from time to time, adopted, passed or amended by the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City and/or any declaration, resolutions, proclamations or orders of the Mayor pursuant to chapter 18 of this Code, declared to be a misdemeanor or any of the above enumerated laws, ordinances, resolutions or orders issued pursuant to chapter 18, or committing any of the acts therein declared to be unlawful shall, upon conviction thereof, by

a court of competent jurisdiction, be deemed guilty of an offense classified as a misdemeanor, and be punishable by a fine of not more than \$500.00 \$5,000.00 and/or be imprisoned for a term not to exceed three six months, or both, unless otherwise provided in an enumerated section of this Code.

(c) Municipal infractions.

- (1) Any person, partnership, corporation, unincorporated association, or other business entity who shall violate any of the provisions of the <u>laws</u>, <u>ordinances</u>, <u>resolutions</u>, or code provisions, as same may be, from time to time, adopted, passed or amended by the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City any of the provisions of the following laws, ordinances or resolutions or who shall fail to comply therewith, or who shall violate or fail to comply with any such order made thereunder, within the time fixed therefor, shall, for each and every such violation and/or noncompliance respectively, <u>declared to be a municipal infraction</u>, shall, upon a finding thereof, by a court of competent jurisdiction, be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction, punishable by a fine of not less than \$25.00 -1,000.00 of up to \$5,000.00 unless otherwise provided in an enumerated section of this Code. If a violation is not designated as a misdemeanor, it shall be treated as a municipal infraction.

- (2) Any person, partnership, corporation, unincorporated association, or other business entity who shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction shall be issued a citation for such violation and/or noncompliance. For the purposes of this section, the following listed officials are authorized by the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City to issue citations to violators:
 - a. Police officers.
 - b. Qualified police officers and employees authorized by the chief of police.
 - c. Animal control officers.
 - d. Fire marshal.
 - e. Fire chiefs.
 - f. Fire investigators, fire inspectors and deputy fire marshals.
 - g. Members of the beach patrol.
 - h. Building officials.
 - i. Planning and zoning administrators.
 - j. Licensing investigators and licensing inspectors.
 - k. City engineers and assistants.
 - l. Solid waste manager.
 - m. Recreation and parks personnel.
 - n. City Clerk for the purposes of Chapter 22-42.

A copy of the citation shall be retained by the issuing authority and it shall bear certification attesting to the truth of the matter therein set forth.

- (3) The citation shall further contain:
 - a. Name and address of the person, partnership, corporation, unincorporated association or other business entity charged;
 - b. The nature of the infraction:
 - c. The location and time that the infraction occurred;

- d. The amount of the infraction fine assessed;
- e. The manner, location and time in which the fine may be paid to Ocean City; and
- f. Notice of the right to elect to stand trial for the infraction; pursuant to Ann. Code of Md., art. 23A, § 3 Local Government article §6-103.
- g. Notice of the effect of failing to pay the fine or demand a trial within the required time; and
- h. The enforcement officer's certification: (i) attesting to the truth of the matter set forth in the citation; or (ii) that the citation is based on an affidavit.

A copy of the citation shall be retained by the issuing authority, and it shall bear certification attesting to the truth of the matter therein set forth.

- (4) The imposition of one municipal infraction citation for any violation and/or noncompliance shall not excuse the violation and/or noncompliance nor permit it to continue; and all such violators guilty of such violation and/or noncompliance shall be required to correct or remedy such violation and/or noncompliance within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each 24 hours that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate municipal infraction.
- (d) Other relief. It shall be unlawful for any person who is violating a municipal ordinance to fail and/or refuse to provide proper identification to the issuing authority by providing the person's name, address, and date of birth. Any person who shall fail and/or refuse to provide the person's name, address and date of birth to the issuing authority shall be charged with a violation of this section and, upon conviction thereof, by a court of competent jurisdiction, be deemed guilty of an offense classified as a misdemeanor and be punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 and/or be imprisoned for not more than 90 days 6 months, or both. In addition to any fines and penalties in subsections (b) and (c) of this section described, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may avail itself of any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of stopping continuing offenses and violation of any chapter of this Code.
- (e) Continuing offenses. Each day an offense continues is a separate offense in the absence of provisions to the contrary.
- (f) Lien on property. Any municipal infraction resulting in a judgment against the violator shall be a lien on the violator's property, and the property shall be subject to being sold at tax and lien sales.
- (g) Issuance/Reissuance of Town licenses. Any municipal infraction or misdemeanor resulting in a judgment against a defendant in favor or the Town shall prohibit the defendant from having any Town-issued license issued/reissued in the defendant's name until such time that the judgment is satisfied.

ARTICLE II. - BUILDING AND RELATED CODES²

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 10-31. - Violations and penalties.

(a) Any person or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this chapter or who shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof or who shall build or alter any building in violation hereof shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a municipal infraction. The owner of any building or premises or part thereof where anything in violation of this chapter shall be placed or shall exist and any architect,

- engineer, building contractor, agent, person or corporation employed in connection therewith and who has assisted in the commission of such violation shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a separate offense.
- (b) Any person or corporation who shall violate a provision of this <u>chapter division</u>, except in cases where a different fine is established in the Code, shall be fined not less than \$150.00 \$500.00 nor more than \$500.00 \$2,500.00 for the initial or second <u>violation</u>. The fine for a third or any subsequent violation of the same offense by the same person shall be no less than \$1,000.00. \$5,000.00
- (c) Each day that a violation continues shall be a separate offense.

ARTICLE II. - LICENSED OCCUPATIONS

...

Sec. 14-38. Suspension and revocation.

- (a) Suspension of a business license. The city manager may suspend a business license for a period of time not to exceed 30 days if the city manager determines that a licensee or an employee of a licensee has committed any one or more of the following acts:
 - (1) A licensee has breached any condition upon which their license was issued or has failed to comply with the provisions of this chapter.
 - (2) A licensee has committed an offense under a law or ordinance regulating business, a crime involving moral turpitude, or an unlawful sale of merchandise or prohibited goods.
 - (3) A licensee has engaged in an unlawful activity or nuisance related to the business.
 - (4) A license has failed to correct a building, zoning, fire or life safety violation within the timeframe directed in the notice of violation.
- (b) Revocation of a business license. The city manager may revoke a business license if the city manager determines:
 - (1) A license has been mistakenly or improperly issued, or issued contrary to law.
 - (2) A license has been obtained through fraud, misrepresentation, a false or misleading statement, evasion or suppression of a material fact in the license application.

- (3) A cause of suspension under this section occurs and the license has been previously suspended within the preceding 12 months.
- (4) There is any violation of the provisions of this chapter or any other ordinance of the town, or any statute of the state or any statute of the United States of America, other than motor vehicle violations, if the city manager determines the violation is contrary to the public health, safety and general welfare.
- (c) Hearings. Upon reasonable belief that a violation of this chapter has occurred, the city manager shall notify the licensee in writing of the alleged violation and pending penalty by hand-delivery to the licensee or an employee of suitable age and discretion, or certified mailing, and shall schedule a hearing within three business days after notice of said violation. At the hearing the licensee shall have the opportunity to be heard as to why the license should not be suspended or revoked. After the hearing thereon, if the city manager determines upon a preponderance of the evidence, that a violation has occurred, the city manager may take the appropriate action as herein set forth in subsections (a) and (b) of this section for a business license and 14-176(a) and (b) for a rental license. If the licensee fails to appear, without good cause, the city manager may consider the evidence and make a determination in the absence of the licensee. If mitigating circumstances so warrant, in lieu of a suspension, the city manager may levy a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 per violation.
- (d) Appeals. If the city manager fines, suspends or revokes a license, the city manager shall send to the licensee, by certified mail, return receipt requested, written notice of the action and the right of appeal. The licensee may appeal the decision of the city manager to the city council in accordance with the following procedures. The filing of an appeal does not stay the action of the city manager in fining, suspending or revoking a license until the city council makes a final decision.
 - (1) The aggrieved licensee may, not later than ten calendar days after receiving notice of the fine, suspension or revocation, file with the city clerk a written request for an appeals hearing before the city council.
 - (2) If a written request is filed with the city clerk within the ten-day limit, the city council shall consider the request. The city clerk shall set a date for the hearing within three business days from the date the written request is received.
 - (3) The city council shall hear and consider evidence offered by any interested person to determine whether the city manager properly fined, suspended or revoked the license in accordance with the provisions of this chapter. The formal rules of evidence do not apply. If the licensee fails to appear, without good cause, the decision of the city manager shall become final.
 - (4) The city council shall grant or deny the appeal by majority vote. Failure to reach a majority vote will result in denial of the appeal. Any dispute of fact must be decided on a basis of a preponderance of the evidence. The decision of the city council is final.
 - (5) If the city council denies the appeal of a revocation, the aggrieved licensee may not reapply until at least 12 months have elapsed since the date of the city council's action

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Sec. 14-152. - Penalties.

- (a) Any violation of the requirements of this article shall be deemed to be a municipal infraction, and the violator shall be subject to a civil fine of \$500.00 \(\)\frac{\$1,000.00}{2}\(\) per violation.
- (b) In addition to the penalty set forth in subsection (a) of this section, if the chief of police determines the violation is serious enough or continuous, the chief may direct the violations to the police commission. If, after conducting a hearing thereon, with the alleged violator being given an opportunity to be heard and to contest the charges, the police commission determines the violations have occurred and there is good cause to suspend or revoke the EPAMD rental license, the police commission may order the suspension or revocation of the license. Any licensee aggrieved by the

decision of the police commission may appeal same to the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City, by written notice of appeal filed with the municipal clerk within 30 days of the decision of the police commission. The Mayor and City Council of Ocean City shall conduct a hearing on the appeal, de novo, and may affirm, reverse or modify the findings and determination of the police commission.

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ARTICLE V. - RENTAL HOUSING

Sec. 14-175. Violation.

- (a) Generally. Any violation of this article by the property owner of the rental housing unit(s) shall be unlawful and is subject to a municipal infraction and subject to the penalties set forth in section 1-8 of this Code. Each day of violation shall be considered a separate violation. Prior to a municipal infraction being issued, the license inspector or other Ocean City employee, will provide the property owner written notice of the violation and allow the property owner ten days from the date of the letter to correct said violation.
- (b) Violation of an emergency order. A rental housing license or a business license may be revoked by the city manager if the holder of the license violates or allows an occupant of the rental housing unit to violate an emergency order issued pursuant to chapter 18. Such revocation shall be processed in accordance with section 14-174(e)(2)(d).
- (c) *Process not exclusive*. The issuance of an infraction to enforce this article does not preclude the town from pursuing any other civil remedy or enforcement action authorized by law.

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ARTICLE VI. - BODY PIERCING

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Sec. 14-205. - Violations and penalties.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this article shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$100.00 \$1,000.00 nor more than \$500.00 \$5,000.00 and/or imprisoned for up to 30 days 6 months for each offense, and, for the purposes of this article, a separate offense shall be deemed to be committed on each day during or person on which a violation occurs or continues. In addition thereto, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may seek any other lawful remedies including injunctive relief.

ARTICLE VII. - DRY NIGHTCLUBS

DIVISION 4. – VIOLATION AND PENALTIES

Sec. 14-292. - Suspension.

- (a) The city manager may suspend a dry nightclub license for a period of time not exceeding 30 days if the city manager determines that a licensee or an employee of a licensee has committed any one or more of the following acts:
 - (1) Violated any provisions of the dry nightclub regulations;
 - (2) Refused to allow an inspection of the dry nightclub premises so authorized in this article;
 - (3) Knowingly permitted an intoxicated person to remain on the premises;
 - (4) Knowingly permitted gambling by any person on the dry nightclub premises;
 - (5) Knowingly permitted the possession, consumption, or sale of an alcoholic beverage on the premises of a dry nightclub.
- (b) If mitigating circumstances so warrant, in lieu of a suspension, the city manager may issue a reprimand or levy a fine not to exceed \$500.00 \$5,000.00 per violation.

Sec. 14-295. - Penalties and remedies.

A person who operates or causes to be operated a dry nightclub without a valid license or in violation of any provision of this article shall be subject to the following penalties and/or remedies:

- (1) Violations of this article are misdemeanors, and, upon conviction thereupon, subject to a fine of not more than \$500.00 \(\)5,000.00 or imprisonment of not more than 30 days 6 months, or both.
- (2) Each day that any violation continues after receipt of a written notice of such violation shall constitute a separate violation and a separate offense for purposes of the penalties and remedies specified herein.
- (3) In addition to the penalties and remedies above, the city may institute any appropriate action or proceedings to prevent, restrain, correct or abate a violation of this article, as provided by law.

Such violations shall be a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of \$1,000.00 or 30 days' up to \$5,000.00 or 6-months imprisonment, or both. Each day a sexually oriented business so operates is a separate offense or violation.

DIVISION 2. - BURGLARY ALARMS

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Sec. 26-53. - Violations and penalties.

Any user of a burglary alarm system who uses such system without a permit or otherwise violates any provision of this division shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction and subject to a fine of \$100.00\$250.00. In addition to any fine or

penalty herein described, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may avail itself of any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of stopping continuing offenses of this division.

Sec. 26-55. - Limit on number of false alarms; fines for excessive false alarms.

- (a) If six false alarms occur within a one-calendar-year period (January 1 to December 31), then for the false alarms that occur thereafter in said calendar year the user will be assessed a fee of \$100.00 \$250.00 for each of the next two false alarms and \$200.00 \$500.00 for each additional false alarm thereafter in said calendar year.
- (b) Any person aggrieved by the assessment of such fines may appeal the same to the police commission within 15 days of the notice of assessment of such fine. The police commission shall conduct a hearing thereon, and, in the event that it determines that the false alarm was caused by storms, major electrical problems not within the control of the user or acts of God, the police commission may abrogate the fine.
- (c) In the event that any fine assessed hereunder remains unpaid for a period of 30 days, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City shall cause a lien in the amount of such unpaid fine to be filed among the property tax records, to be collected in the same manner as taxes, with interest from the date of said filing. In addition, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may institute civil suit at any time to collect any such fines. No person shall convey or otherwise transfer the ownership of any property within Ocean City unless all such fines, interest and costs are paid prior thereto.

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DIVISION 1.- GENERALLY

Sec. 30-31 – Penalties.

Any violation of this article shall be deemed to be a municipal infraction, and the violator shall be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00. Each day a violation continues is a separate offense.

ARTICLE III. STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Sec. 30-154. Penalties.

Any violation of this article shall be deemed to be a municipal infraction, and the violator shall be subject to a civil fine of up to \$5,000.00. In addition to any penalty, the Town of Ocean City may institute injunctive, mandamus or other appropriate action or proceedings of law to correct violations of this article. Any court of competent jurisdiction shall have the right to issue temporary or permanent restraining orders, injunctions or mandamus, or other appropriate forms of relief.

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 30-255. Violations, penalties and civil relief.

- (a) Violations. Any violation of a provision of divisions 1 through 7 of this Article and section 30-383 of division 8 shall be a misdemeanor subject to Section 1-8 of this Code, unless otherwise classified in Section 1-8 or this Article, and on conviction thereof, a misdemeanor an offender shall be subject to imprisonment for up to six (6) months ninety (90) days and/or a fine up to five one thousand dollars (\$5,000.00\$1,000.00), and all other sections of this article shall be a any municipal infraction and shall be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00 and each day a violation continues shall be a separate offense. the penalties set forth in Section 1-8 of this Code.
- (b) *Injunction*. In addition to the penalties herein and in Section 1-8 of this Code, if any person violates any provision of this Article, and/or commits noise pollution and/or causes or allows noise pollution to emanate from source property under his ownership or control, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City, Maryland may seek injunctive relief against such person to prohibit or prevent such violations.
- (c) Licensing restraints on business and other type property.
 - (1) The owner of any property which is the source of noise pollution resulting in the Department responding to three incidents, each of which result in the issuance of a citation and/or arrest under this Article, in one license year, shall be notified of such fact by the City Manager, at the address as shown on the tax rolls of the Town of Ocean City, and said notice shall state that the City Manager intends to have a hearing on whether or not to issue the property a rental license and/or business license for the next license year. The owner shall be notified of the hearing in said letter, by personal service or by certified mail (return receipt requested), which shall occur no earlier than fifteen (15) days after the mailing of the notification and no later than thirty (30) days after mailing such notification. At said hearing, the owner of the premises, tenants thereof, neighbors, officers of the Department, and any other members of the general public shall be given an opportunity to be heard. Formal rules of evidence do not apply.
 - (2) At the hearing, if the City Manager determines upon a preponderance of evidence, that the owner did not take serious and effective steps to control noise pollution in the license year of said citations and/or arrests and that no serious or effective steps for noise pollution control are proposed for the subsequent license year, or that said steps will not be implemented throughout said subsequent license year, the City Manager may order that no rental license and/or business license be issued for the licensed premises for the subsequent license year. In the event that the City Manager orders that no rental license and/or business license be issued for the subsequent license year, the owner shall have the right to appeal within ten (10) days of the decision, to the Mayor and City Council of Ocean

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- City. The City Manager shall send the owner written notice, by certified mail (return receipt requested), of the decision and inform the owner of the right to appeal. The filing of the appeal does not stay the decision of the City Manager.
- (3) If the owner appeals the decision of the City Manager, the owner shall be notified of a hearing to be held by the Mayor and City Council, which shall occur no earlier than fifteen (15) days after the mailing of the notification and no later than thirty (30) days after mailing such notification. Such hearing shall be advertised for at least two (2) consecutive weeks prior to said hearing in at least one (1) newspaper published in Ocean City. At such hearing, the owner of the premises, tenants thereof, neighbors, officers of the Department, and any other members of the general public shall be given an opportunity to be heard. The Mayor and City Council shall hear the testimony and evidence offered to determine, based on a preponderance of evidence, whether the City Manager properly ordered that the rental license and/or business license not be issued for the licensed premises for the subsequent license year. The formal rules of evidence do not apply. If the owner fails to appear, the decision of the City Manager shall become final. The Mayor and City Council shall affirm or overturn the City Manager's decision by a majority vote. Failure to reach a majority vote will result in the decision of the City Manager being affirmed. The decision of the Mayor and City Council is final. If the Mayor and City Council affirms the order to not issue the rental license and/or business license for the subsequent year, the owner may not apply for said rental license and/or business license until twelve (12) months have elapsed since the date of the Mayor and City Council's action.

DIVISION 8. – RESIDENCES PROVIDING SHELTER TO TRANSIENT OR TEMPORARY POPULATION

Subdivision II. -- Permit

Sec. 30-405. - Violations

- (a) It shall be a municipal infraction, in accordance with section 1-8 of this Code, for the owner of any property for which there must be a permit issued by the Town pursuant to section 30-401 of this division to fail to exercise due diligence, within the meaning of section 30-403, in controlling noise on or emanating from his property, and said infraction shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00. \$5,000.00. Each day an offense continues is a separate offense.
- (b) If the Noise Control Board determines that the owner of any such property has failed to exercise due diligence, the Noise Control Board may, in addition to any actions it may take under section 30-403, direct the police officer to issue a citation to the property owner, citing the facts supporting the Noise Control Board's conclusion. The citation shall contain the information required by section 1-8 of this Code. The

citation is payable within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of the citation. A person receiving the citation may elect to stand trial for the offense by notifying Ocean City of his intention of standing trial. The notice shall be given at least five (5) days prior to the date of payment of as set forth in the citation. Upon receipt of the notice of the intention to stand trial, Ocean City shall forward to the District Court a copy of the citation and the notice from the person who received the citation indicating his intention to stand trial. Upon receipt of the citation, the District Court shall schedule the case for trial and notify the defendant of the trial date. All fines, penalties or forfeitures collected by the District Court for violations of municipal infractions shall be remitted to the Town.

- (c) If a second or greater incident occurs where the property owner fails to exercise due diligence, within the meaning of section 30-403, in controlling noise pollution on or emanating from his property, the property owner is required to appear before the Noise Control Board. The Noise Control Board shall send notice of the hearing to the property owner at his last known address and said notice shall be by certified mail, return receipt requested, at least seven (7) days prior to the hearing. If the property owner is unable to attend the scheduled Noise Control Board meeting, the property owner must contact the Noise Control Board and reschedule. If the property owner fails to appear or reschedule, then the second or greater incident shall be cited by the Department and shall be punishable by a fine one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) not to exceed \$5,000.00, and processed in accordance with section 1-8 of this Code. The property owner shall reschedule within ten (10) days of receipt of formal notice. If the property owner does so and appears before the Noise Control Board, then this citation will be rescinded.
- (d) In addition to other remedies provided in this division, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may institute an action for injunctive relief in the Circuit Court for Worcester County against any person to whom this division applies for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this division. Any person required to obtain the aforesaid permit who does not obtain and display same shall not be entitled to obtain a rental license and/or business license under Chapter 14, Article II of this Code.

Chapter 34 – FIRE PREVENTION AND PROTECTION

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ARTICLE II.- ADMINSITRATION

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Sec. 34-27. Violations.

- (a) Any person who shall violate any violation of the provisions of this article or failure to comply therewith, or who shall violate violation or failure to comply with any such order made hereunder, or who shall failure to comply with such order as affirmed or modified by the fire prevention commission, the fire marshal or by a court of competent jurisdiction, within the time fixed therefor, shall, for each and every such violation and noncompliance, respectively, be deemed to have committed be a municipal infraction.
- (b) Any person, partnership, corporation, unincorporated association or other business entity who or which shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction shall be issued a citation for such violation and/or noncompliance. For the purposes of this article, the following listed officials are authorized by the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City to issue citations to violators:
 - (1) Members of the fire prevention commission.
 - (2) Fire marshal.
 - (3) Fire investigators and fire inspectors.
 - (4) Ocean City police officers.
 - (5) Deputy fire marshals.
- (c) A copy of the citation shall be retained by the issuing authority and shall bear certification attesting to the truth of the matter set forth. The citation shall contain:
- (1) The name and address of the person, partnership, corporation, unincorporated association or other business entity charged.
- (2) The nature of the infraction.
- (3) The location and time the infraction occurred.
- (4) The amount of the infraction fine assessed.
- (5) The manner, location and time in which the fine may be paid to Ocean City.
- (6) Notice of the right to elect to stand trial for the infraction.

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- (dc) Violations for overcrowding places of assembly shall be a municipal infraction with fines will be as follows: First offense carries a fine of \$500.00\$750.00;. The sSecond offense carries a fine of \$750.00\$2,500.00, and t Third offense \$1,000.00\$5,000.00. Violations to carry year-to-year. Each day a violation continues is a separate offense.
- (ed) The imposition of one municipal infraction citation for any violation and/or noncompliance shall not excuse the violation and/or noncompliance nor permit it to continue; and all violators guilty of such violation and/or noncompliance shall be required to correct or remedy such violation and/or noncompliance within a reasonable time; and when not otherwise specified, each 24 hours that prohibited conditions are maintained shall constitute a separate municipal infraction. The application of the above penalties shall not be held to prevent the enforced removal of

prohibited conditions through any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of stopping continued offenses of this article.

Chapter 38 - FLOODS¹

ARTICLE II. - FLOOD DAMAGE PREVENTION

DIVISION 1. – GENERALLY

Sec. 38-32. - Violations and penalties.

- (a) Compliance required.
 - (1) No building, structure or development shall hereafter be located, erected, constructed, reconstructed, improved, repaired, extended, converted, enlarged or altered without full compliance with this article and all other applicable regulations.
 - (2) Failure to obtain a permit shall be a violation of this article and shall be subject to penalties in accordance with this section.
 - (3) Permits issued on the basis of plans and applications approved by the floodplain administrator authorize only the specific activities set forth in such approved plans and applications or amendments thereto. Use, arrangement, or construction of such specific activities that are contrary to that authorization shall be deemed a violation of this article.
- (b) Notice of violation and stop work order. If the floodplain administrator determines that there has been a violation of any provision of this article, the floodplain administrator shall give notice of such violation to the owner, the owner's authorized agent, and the person responsible for such violation, and may issue a stop work order. The notice of violation or stop work order shall be in writing and shall:
 - (1) Include a list of violations, referring to the section or sections of this article that have been violated;
 - (2) Order remedial action which, if taken, will effect compliance with the provisions of this article;
 - (3) Specify a reasonable period of time to correct the violation;

(4) Advise the recipients of the right to appeal; and

- (5) Be served in person; or
- (6) Be posted in a conspicuous place in or on the property and sent by registered or certified mail to the last-known mailing address, residence, or place of business of the recipients.
- (c) Any person, partnership, joint venture, corporation or other entity violating this article shall, upon conviction thereof, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor <u>and punishable by a fine of up to \$5,000.00 or 6-months imprisonment, or both.</u> as <u>and shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$500.00</u>. Each day that this article is violated shall be deemed a separate offense.

Chapter 39 – FRANCHISES

ARTICLE IV. - CABLE TELEVISION

Sec. 39-209. - Violations and penalties.

Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this article shall be guilty of a municipal infraction and fined not less than \$5.00 \$500.00 nor more than \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00, and a separate offense shall be deemed committed on each day during or on which a violation occurs or continues.

Chapter 58 - OFFENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

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ARTICLE I. - IN GENERAL

Sec. 58-2. - Public urination and defecation prohibited.

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It shall be unlawful for any person to urinate or defecate on, from or upon any beach, public way, public street, public alley, public sidewalk, public boardwalk, public lot, public building and any other public property, except within proper facilities designated as public restrooms, within the corporate limits of Ocean City. Any person who violates this section shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction and subject to a fine up to \$5,000.00. Each day a violation continues is a separate offense.

Sec. 58-3. - Impersonation of municipal officers.

It shall be unlawful for any person to wear or display, sell or offer for sale any badge, insignia, identification card, uniform or other article of clothing which would purport to impersonate or identify that person as a police officer, fire marshal, beach patrol or any other officer or employee of Ocean City, unless said person is, in fact, a police officer, fire marshal, beach patrol or officer or employee of Ocean City. Any person who violates this section shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction and subject to a fine up to \$5,000.00. Each day a violation continues is a separate offense.

Sec. 58-4. - Use of vehicles for sleeping quarters.

It shall be unlawful for any person to sleep in or occupy as sleeping quarters any motor vehicle, or for an operator of any motor vehicle to allow any other person to sleep in or occupy as sleeping quarters said motor vehicle, while said motor vehicle is parked on any public way, alley, place, avenue, street, highway or parking lot or parked on any other public facility. Any person who violates this section shall be deemed to have committed a misdemeanor and subject to a fine up to \$5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of up to 6 months. violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to the applicable penalties.

Sec. 58-5. Dropping or throwing objects from building.

It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of Ocean City, to drop, throw, kick, push, slide or in any other manner move or eject any object or missile whatsoever from any location above ground level within or upon any building or appurtenance thereof, if said building has been certified for occupancy by Ocean City. Any person who violates this section shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction and subject to a fine up to \$5,000.00. This prohibition shall not apply to persons engaged in the building, repair or renovation of any building necessitating disposal of material, if proper safety measures have been taken meeting with the approval of the Ocean City Building Official.

It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of Ocean City, to drop, throw, kick, push, slide or in any other manner move or eject any stone, board or other object or missile upon or at any vehicle, building or other public or private property, or upon or at any person in any public or private way or place. Any person who violates this section shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction and be subject to a fine up to \$5,000.00. This prohibition shall not apply to persons engaged in athletic or recreational activities where same are not otherwise prohibited by law.

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ARTICLE II. - OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC PEACE AND ORDER DIVISION 1. - LASER POINTERS

Sec. 58-31. - Harassment by laser pointers.

(a) *Definitions*. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this subsection, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Laser pointer means a battery-powered portable handheld device that emits a narrow beam of ultraviolet, visible or infrared light due to stimulated emission.

- (b) Offenses,
 - (1) It is unlawful for any person to focus or shine a laser pointer directly or indirectly onto another person or animal in any manner.
 - (2) It is unlawful for any person to shine a laser pointer directly or indirectly onto or from a balcony, porch, patio, deek or any other structure where a person may gather or into any window or door, or into any vehicle on land, air or water, which includes, but is not limited to, cars, bicycles, scooters, buses, trams, planes, helicopters, boats, jet skis, motorcycles, Segways or wheelchairs, in any manner.
 - (3) It is unlawful for any person to shine a laser pointer onto the beach, boardwalk, public streets, sidewalks, public waters, or other public property; or from private property onto the beach, boardwalk, public streets, sidewalks, public waters, or other public property; or from public property onto private property; or from private property onto another private property.
 - (4) It is unlawful to possess a laser pointer on the beach, boardwalk, public streets, sidewalks, public waters, or other public property, except that a laser point may

be used as part of a power point presentation and/or within a meeting of any kind for educational or instructional purposes and said use shall not be a violation of this section.

- (5) It is unlawful to sell or otherwise transfer to another, a laser pointer.
- (6) It is unlawful for a minor to possess a laser pointer.
- (c) *Exceptions*. Sworn police officers, fire marshals and fire fighters in the performance of their duties.
- (d) *Violations and penalties.* Any person found guilty of a violation of this division shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine of up to \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 and/or imprisonment for up to 90 days. 6 months.

DIVISION 2. UNLAWFUL ASSEMBLY¹

Sec. 58-52. - Prohibited acts.

No person shall join together with any other person comprising an aggregate group of five or more, with the intent mutually to assist one another in the execution of a common purpose by the use of force or other unlawful means, nor shall any person attempt or threaten such use of force, but without actually putting an unlawful design into execution, upon any public street, way, avenue, alley or beach within the corporate limits of Ocean City or in any place of public worship or public resort or amusement in Ocean City. Any person found guilty of a violation of this division shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of up to 6 months.

DIVISION 3. - ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Sec. 58-71. - Public consumption generally.

It shall be unlawful for any person to consume any alcoholic beverage or beverages upon any public street, highway, avenue, alley, sidewalk, municipal parking lot, boardwalk or public beach or other public property or in vehicles upon any public street, highway, avenue, alley, municipal parking lot or other public property within the corporate limits of Ocean City. Any person found guilty of a violation of this section shall be deemed guilty

of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of up to 6 months.

Any person found guilty of a violation of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of up to 6 months.

division, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00 and/or imprisonment of up to six months.

In addition to such penalties, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City shall have the right to pursue all other legal and equitable remedies in the appropriate courts.

- (2) The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 for the second violation. The violator will be ordered that he/she has until no later than the next morning when they are open for business to relocate the merchandise and/or materials which have resulted in the violation.
- (3) Any further violations shall result in additional municipal infractions and shall result in the suspension or revocation of the applicable business license at the discretion of the City Manager and pursuant to Section 14-38 of the Code.
- (4) No business owner shall be issued/re-issued a business license if the business owner has any outstanding, unpaid, municipal infractions.

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Chapter 78 - SUBDIVISIONS¹

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ARTICLE III. - PLATS

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DIVISION 3. - FINAL PLAT

Sec. 78-121. General requirements; approval procedure.

- (a) General requirements. The final plat shall be on linen or other comparable reproducible material, shall not have a width greater than 36 inches and shall be at a scale of one inch to 50 feet or one inch to 100 feet, depending upon the nature of the subdivision or condominium project.
- (b) Review. Any person, company, partnership, corporation or any other legal entity shall, upon completion of any subdivision or condominium project, prior to recordation of any plats, submit the final, to be recorded, subdivision plats and/or condominium plats to the office of the city engineer, to the office of the zoning administrator and to the office of the building official of Ocean City. Said municipal officials shall review said plats as to their conformity with the existing municipal laws and with the building and zoning codes and as to their conformity with any agreements with or conditions of any zoning agency or of the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City.
- (c) Approval. Each of said offices upon review of said plats shall, if the same are approved, indicate on said plats such approval. Said plats shall then be presented to the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City by delivering said plats, with the aforesaid approvals affixed thereto, to the office of the Mayor of Ocean City. The Mayor and Council shall confirm that said plats contain the necessary approvals, and if said approvals are affixed and the said Mayor and City Council of Ocean City otherwise approves, said plats shall be signed as hereinafter provided.
- (d) Necessary signatures. The approval of said plats by the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City shall be indicated by the signatures on said plats of the Mayor and of the

Council president. The Mayor and Council president shall inform each other when either intends to be outside the corporate limits for more than five days. The one remaining shall, upon such notification, first notify the secretary of the Council that they will be required to approve and sign said plats in the absence of the official not present. If the secretary is not or intends not to be present within Ocean City during the official's absence, the Mayor or the president, whatever the case may be, shall designate any other councilmember to perform said approval and signing duties. If both the Mayor and president plan to be without the corporate limits for more than five days, the Mayor shall designate two councilmembers to approve and sign said plats, one of whom shall be the secretary, if the secretary plans to be present. Said other councilmembers so designated shall sign as follows: "______ Councilmember, for the President of the Council; ______ Councilmember, for the Mayor."

(e) *Violations*. Any violation of this section shall be deemed to be a municipal infraction and the violator shall be subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00.

- (a) Any person who performs towing services within the town without a license as herein specified shall be guilty of a municipal infraction and, upon conviction thereof, shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 for each and every offense.
- (b) Any person who tows a vehicle from private property in violation of division 6 of this article shall be liable for actual damages sustained by any person as a direct result of the violation and shall be liable to the vehicle owner, a secured party, an insurer or a successor in interest for triple the amount paid by the vehicle owner or the vehicle owner's agent to retake possession of the vehicle.
- (c) Any violation of section 90-276 by a person or a towing company or employee of a towing company shall, upon conviction thereof, be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to 90 days' 6 months imprisonment and/or a fine of \$1,000.00,\$5,000.00 with each violation to be considered a separate offense.
- (d) Any other violation of the requirements of this article by a person or a towing company or employee of a towing company shall be deemed a municipal infraction and the violator of such shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$1,000.00\$5,000.00. Each day a violation continues is a separate violation.

- (b) Any vehicle found to be parked in violation of this article may be towed and impounded pursuant to the provisions of this chapter.
- (c) Each day a violation occurs shall constitute an additional violation.
- (d) The Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may avail itself of any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of stopping continuing offenses and violations of this article.

ARTICLE IX. - DOCKLESS RIDE SHARE PROGRAMS

A violation of this article shall be punishable by a civil penalty of \$500.00 per occurrence, to be recovered by Ocean City in a civil action in the nature of debt, as a municipal infraction under state law, if the offender does not pay the penalty within 30 days of receiving a notice of violation. This penalty shall be in addition to any penalty imposed by any other ordinance, rule, regulation or other provision of law. Each day a violation continues is a separate offense.

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- (b) This article may be enforced by any Ocean City department or employee. The enforcing officer shall be authorized to remove any bicycle or e-scooter found to be in violation of this section from any sidewalk, square, park or other public property without prior notice.
- (c) Any bicycle or e-scooter removed from Ocean City property pursuant to subsection (b) of this section shall be returned to its owner upon Ocean City receiving adequate proof of ownership. If a bicycle or e-scooter removed from city property remains unclaimed after a period of 60 days, it will be deemed abandoned, and may be disposed of in any manner permitted by law.

Chapter 102 - VEHICLES FOR HIRE¹

ARTICLE II. - TAXICABS²

DIVISION 2. - BUSINESS LICENSE

Sec. 102-53.1 - Suspension or revocation of business license.

The police commission, after conducting a hearing thereon, may suspend or revoke a business license as follows:

- (a) Suspension of a business license. The police commission may suspend a business license for a period of time not to exceed 30 days if it determines that a licensee or an employee of a licensee has committed any one or more of the following acts:
 - (1) A licensee has breached any condition upon which their license was issued or has failed to comply with the provisions of this article or chapter 14.
 - (2) A licensee has committed an offense under a law or ordinance regulating business, a crime involving moral turpitude, or an unlawful sale of merchandise or prohibited goods.

- (3) A licensee has engaged in an unlawful activity or nuisance related to the business.
- (b) Revocation of a business license. The police commission may revoke a business license if:
 - (1) A license has been mistakenly or improperly issued or issued contrary to law.
 - (2) A licensee has obtained a license through fraud, misrepresentation, a false or misleading statement, evasion or suppression of a material fact in the license application.
 - (3) A cause of suspension under this section occurs and the license has been previously suspended within the preceding 12 months.
 - (4) Any violation occurs of the provisions of this section or any other ordinance of the town, or any statute of the state or any statute of the United States of America, if the police commission determines the violation is contrary to the public health, safety and general welfare.
- (c) Hearings. Upon reasonable belief that a violation of this section has occurred, the police commission shall notify the licensee of the alleged violation and hearing by hand-delivery to the licensee or an employee of the licensee of suitable age and discretion, or certified mailing (return receipt requested) to the licensee and shall schedule a hearing within 72 hours after notice of said violation. Formal rules of evidence do not apply. At the hearing thereon, if the police commission determines upon a preponderance of the evidence that a violation has occurred, the police commission may take the appropriate action as herein set forth in subsections (a) and (b) of this section. If the licensee fails to appear, without good cause, the police commission may consider the evidence and make a determination in the absence of the licensee. If mitigating circumstances so warrant, in lieu of a suspension, the police commission may levy a fine not to exceed \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 per violation.
- (d) Appeals. If the police commission fines, suspends or revokes a license, the police commission shall send to the licensee, by certified mail, return receipt requested, written notice of the action and the right of appeal. The licensee may appeal the decision of the police commission to the mayor and city council in accordance with the following procedures. The filing of an appeal does not stay the action of the police commission in fining, suspending or revoking a license.
 - (1) The aggrieved licensee may, not later than ten calendar days after receiving notice of the fine, suspension or revocation, file with the city clerk a written request for an appeal hearing before the mayor and city council.
 - (2) If a written request is filed with the city clerk within the ten-day limit, the mayor and city council shall consider the request. The city clerk shall set a date for the hearing within three business days from the date the written request is received.

- (3) The mayor and city council shall hear and consider evidence offered by any interested person to determine whether the police commission properly fined, suspended or revoked the license in accordance with this article. The formal rules of evidence do not apply. Any dispute of fact must be decided on a basis of a preponderance of the evidence. If the licensee fails to appear, without good cause, the decision of the police commission shall become final.
- (4) The mayor and city council shall affirm, modify, or reverse the decision of the police commission by majority vote. Failure to reach a majority vote will result in the decision of the police commission being affirmed. The decision of the mayor and city council is final.
- (5) If the mayor and city council affirms a revocation of a license, the aggrieved licensee may not reapply until at least 12 months have elapsed since the date of the mayor and city council's action.

DIVISION 4. – REGULATIONS

Sec. 102-73. - Violations.

(a) Employing or permitting a taxicab driver who does not meet the qualifications/requirements set forth in this article is a municipal infraction punishable by up to a \$500.00 \$5,000.00 fine, subject to section 1-8 of this Code. In addition to the other remedies provided by this Article, Aa violation of any other provision of this article shall be a municipal infraction, and subject to fines up to \$100.00 \$250.00 fine for the first violation, subject to 1-8 of this Code. A second violation carries a fine of \$500.00 up to \$1,000.00 for the second violation and up to a third or subsequent violation carries a fine of \$1,000.\$5,000.00 for a third or subsequent violation.

ARTICLE V. - AUTOMOBILE (ELECTRIC) SHUTTLE SERVICE

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Sec. 102-133. - Violations and penalties.

(a) Any violation of the regulations and prohibitions set forth in this article shall be considered a <u>civil municipal</u> infraction with both the driver and the automobile (electric) shuttle service business licensee culpable.

- (b) Any violator of the regulations and prohibitions set forth in this article, upon conviction thereof, shall be subjected to a municipal infraction fine of up to \$500.00 \$1,000.00, with each violation to be considered a separate offense.
- (c) Any automobile (electric) shuttle service licensee who prepays or is found guilty of three or more violations in any license year may have the business license suspended or revoked by the city manager upon due notification and the right to a hearing before the city manager.

Chapter 106 - WATERWAYS

ARTICLE II. - SHORELAND DEVELOPMENT¹

Sec. 106-32. - Violations.

- (a) Any person, partnership, corporation, unincorporated association or other business entity who shall violate any of the provisions of this article or commit any of the acts herein declared to be unlawful shall be deemed to have committed a municipal infraction <u>subject to a fine of up to \$5,000.00</u>. Each day a violation continues is a separate violation.
- (b) In addition to the fines and penalties herein described, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may avail itself of any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of stopping violations and continuing violations of this article.

DIVISION 4. - SURF FISHING AND CASTING

Sec. 106-135. - Violations and penalties. Reserved.

Any person who violates any provision of this division shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a municipal infraction and be subject to a fine of not more than \$1,000.00.

ARTICLE IV. - OCEANFRONT BUILDING LIMIT LINE

Sec. 106-251. - Violations.

- (a) Any offender violating any provision of this article, upon conviction thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punishable by a fine of up to \$5,000.00 or 6-months imprisonment, or both.
- (b) In addition to the fines and penalties herein described, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may avail itself of any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of restraining or stopping continued offenses of this article.

Chapter 110 - ZONING¹

ARTICLE V. - SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS

DIVISION 1. – GENERALLY

Sec. 110-884. - Outdoor display of merchandise standards for properties fronting on Atlantic Avenue (boardwalk).

- (a) Properties displaying merchandise outdoors fronting the boardwalk shall be subject to the following:
 - (1) An annual display permit, issued by the zoning administrator, is required for outdoor display of merchandise. It is required that the display permit application

be reviewed for recommendation by the OCDC Boardwalk Committee (BC) Review Committee. The BC review committee shall consist of five persons, recommended by the BC, to be appointed by the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City. Two committee members shall be representative of boardwalk retail merchants, with a quorum required of three members. If the BC review committee recommends against the issuance of the display permit, it shall state, in writing, to the zoning administrator, the reasons for the unfavorable recommendation. Upon review by the zoning administrator, the zoning administrator may grant or deny the display permit. Any applicant aggrieved by the decision of the zoning administrator may file an appeal to the board of zoning appeals as set forth in this chapter.

- (2) A copy of the approved plans for display of merchandise must be conspicuously displayed on the premises.
- (3) No merchandise, signs or other items shall encroach into the boardwalk right-of-way (property line) other than as allowed by other provisions of this Code.
- (4) Framed merchandise such as decals or t-shirts, is to be treated as outdoor display, not signage. The square footage of these panels is counted toward the total square footage allowed for outdoor display. The total amount of wall merchandise may not exceed 30 percent of exterior walls. The boards may not exceed ten feet in height. These display boards do not require sign permits as they are considered merchandise of outdoor display.
- (5) Display areas may be utilized for certain activities such as a caricaturist, henna tattoo artist, hair wraps and the like. Square footage of amenity displays (henna, hair wraps, etc.) is considered part of the outdoor display and counts toward the allowable display square footage. Display boards showing examples of designs are considered display of merchandise and count toward allowable square footage.
- (6) Properties fronting the boardwalk south of 3rd Street are allowed 30 percent of the total wall space or pad space in aggregate for display.
- (7) Properties fronting the boardwalk north of 3rd Street are allowed outdoor display of merchandise based on 30 percent of the pad area measured ten feet distance from the property line adjacent to the boardwalk to the face of the main building by the width of the pad in front of the main building.
- (8) Decorative and functional amenities are allowed and encouraged in the ten-foot area abutting the boardwalk to enhance the display and the boardwalk experience. These amenities may include live plantings (no plastic or silk plantings), and attractive seating such as benches and chairs for the comfort of the visitors. The amenities must be well maintained throughout the entire season.
- (9) All approved display areas shall be clearly delineated on the pad surface with some type of permanent markings that can be easily identified by enforcement personnel. The various display areas outlined above shall be arranged in such a manner to avoid clutter.

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- (10) No display may exceed five feet in height, except other items deemed appropriate by the BC such as surfboards, windsocks, kites, sunglass racks which are manufactured at six feet, and open umbrellas of six feet, eight inches clearance from grade, used to protect merchandise display from sun damage.
- (11) Items displayed shall be representations of the greater range of products within the store. Only items sold inside the store may be displayed outside.
- (12) Display stands, boxes, bins, clothes poles, racks, hermit crab cages, sunglass racks, etc., shall be of uniform size, type and materials to create an attractive and cohesive shopping district.
- (13) All merchandise displayed outside must be able to be placed inside the store during inclement weather, and the store must continue to meet life safety regulations in order to remain open, if the merchandise is displayed inside.
- (14) All display, including display racks and bins, shall be moved inside the store when the store is not open for business.
- (15) The entire display pad/floor surface shall be maintained and kept cleaned regularly.
- (16) Graffiti shall be removed from the premises in accordance with section 302-9, Defacement of property, of the 2006 International Property Maintenance Code.
- (17) All coin-operated vending machines shall be kept in compliance with section 110-335(6).
- (18) All sales registers and sales transactions shall be located and conducted within the enclosed building.
- (19) No business may create a barrier between businesses by using merchandise or signage to inhibit the flow of traffic from one business to another. There must be a 24-inch walkway between businesses.
- (20) Each store is allowed one A-frame sign for each 25 linear feet of store frontage facing the boardwalk. The A-frame signs may not exceed 17.5 square feet on each side and nothing may be attached to the A-frame that extends above, on the edges, or extends beyond the frame. The A-frame may not exceed 60 inches in height including the legs. Signs may be two sided. A-frame signs will not require a separate sign permit. They will be part of the display permit but will not be deducted from the allowed display area. A-frame signs shall be professionally constructed and lettered.
- (21) A-frame signs which are part of the display shall be removed when the business is not open for business.
- (22) All other signage shall obtain necessary sign permits.
- (23) Prohibited items: unclothed mannequins; promotion of alcohol and cannabis, illegal drugs and paraphernalia, tobacco products, firearms, knives, offensive adult materials, products containing or displaying profanity, sexually explicit messages, or obscenity, sound amplification arranged or directed towards the outdoors and/or located outdoors; and flashing lights.

- (b) Restaurants, hotels/motels and amusements shall be subject to the following outdoor display guidelines:
 - (1) Handwritten signs shall be limited to incidental signs describing or identifying menus, carry-out windows, hours of operation, entry/exit, vacancy, office, and the like;
 - (2) No hanging displays or signs shall be placed on benches, railings or fences;
 - (3) One A-frame sign, not to exceed 17.5 square feet for every 25 linear feet of boardwalk storefront frontage shall be permitted, not to exceed two A-frames per storefront;
 - (4) Wall signs not to exceed 30 percent of exterior walls are permitted;
 - (5) Enclosures must be well maintained and pad to be maintained regularly; and
 - (6) Graffiti shall be removed from the premises in accordance with section 302.9, Defacement of property, of the 2006 International Property Maintenance Code.
- (c) Outdoor displays as described in sections (a) and (b) shall be subject to the following enforcement procedures:
 - (1) The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$500.00 for the initial violation. A letter and copy of the citation will be sent to the property owner.
 - (2) The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$1,000.00 for the second violation.
 - (3) The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$1,000.00 \$5,000.00 for a third violation. The display permit and the ability to display shall be suspended for two weeks beginning the day after the third violation. A confirmation letter of the suspension and a copy of the citation will be sent to the property owner. The business owner must remove the outdoor display completely within 24 hours of receiving the suspension letter.
 - (4) Any further violations shall result in additional municipal infractions and shall result in the revocation of the outdoor display permit and revocation of the ability to display for four months. The business owner must remove the outdoor display completely within 24 hours of receiving the revocation letter. After four months, the business owner may apply for a new one-year outdoor display permit provided the business owner is in compliance with subsection (5) below.
 - (5) No business owner shall be issued/re-issued an outdoor display permit if the business owner has any outstanding, unpaid, municipal infractions.
 - (6) Failure to abide by the requirements set forth in this section may result in the suspension or revocation of the violator's business license as set forth in section 14-38.

SUMMARY: Ordinance 2025-05, passed as an emergency, established a

moratorium on the issuance of new short- term rental licenses in R-1 and MH districts to allow and did not permit any new

license to be issued, with certain limited exceptions.

Ordinance 2025-06 amended Ordinance 2025-05 to provide the ability to transfer or to allow a short-term rental license to renew or to be obtained if a property is sold and has an existing rental license and rentals on the books during the

2025 rental license period.

Ordinance 2025-05 required that the Mayor and City Council to place the subject of the moratorium on a Work Session Agenda no later than October 28, 2025. At the October 14, 2025, Work Session, the Mayor and City Council heard comments from the public and considered the impact of the Rental Ordinances passed at the end of the 2024 and the beginning of 2025. Following discussion and consideration, a motion was passed (and carried) to proceed to First Reading on extending the

existing Moratorium, until January 3, 2027.

ORDINANCE 2025-

AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF NEW SHORT-TERM RENTAL LICENSES IN THE R-1 SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL AND THE MH MOBILE HOME RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS

WHEREAS, on February 3, 2025, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City, passed Ordinance 2025-05 that established a Moratorium on the issuance of new short-term rental licenses in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts; and on March 17, 2025, the Mayor and City Council passed Ordinance 2025-06 which amended an exception to Ordinance 2025-05 (collectively "Moratorium"); and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 2025-05 required that the Mayor and City Council place the subject of the Moratorium on a Work Session agenda no later than October 28, 2025, where public comment would be taken and the Mayor and City Council could consider how best to proceed with the issuance of short-term rental licenses in the R-1 and MH districts for the 2026 rental license period and the license years that follow; and

WHEREAS, without further action by the Mayor and City Council, the Moratorium will expire on January 3, 2026; and

WHEREAS, at the October 14, 2025 Work Session, public comment was received, and the Mayor and City Council discussed how to best to proceed with the short-term rental licenses in the R-1 and MH districts; and

WHEREAS, based on the Work Session discussion, a motion was made (and carried) to proceed to First Reading with an Ordinance extending the Moratorium; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council find that good cause exists to extend the Moratorium through January 3, 2027, to allow time for further evaluation of the impacts and/or effects of ordinances passed in 2024 and 2025 aiming to address the issues surrounding short-term rentals in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts ("Rental Ordinances"); and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council further find that good cause exists to prohibit the issuance of any new supplementary short-term rental licenses in the R-1 or MH Districts while the Town continues to monitor and review the actions and impact of the Rental Ordinances.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY, AS FOLLOWS:

1. Moratorium.

- a. The Moratorium (established by Ordinance 2025-05 and amended by Ordinance 2025-06) which prohibited the issuance of any new supplementary short-term rental licenses in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts shall be extended until **January 3, 2027** (hereinafter "Extended Moratorium").
- b. During the Extended Moratorium, the issuance of any new supplementary short-term rental licenses in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts shall be prohibited and the Town shall not accept, process, or review any new application for a supplementary short-term rental license in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts.
- c. Notwithstanding subsection (b) above, property owners in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts who have a current rental license which was issued for the 2025 license year (May 1, 2025 through April 30, 2026), may apply for a rental license and the supplementary short-term rental license for the 2026 license year (May 1, 2026 through April 30, 2027), subject to all applicable Town Code sections.
- d. Under this Extended Moratorium, no supplementary short-term rental licenses in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts shall be issued based on the sale, transfer or other change in ownership of the property regardless of whether the property has a 2026 license pursuant to subsections (b) and (c) above, except as follows:
 - i. A property in the R-1 Single Family Residential or the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts that is impacted by the death of the property owner that would cause and/or create the need for a change in ownership of the property, and for which a supplementary short-term rental license was issued prior to the death and pursuant with subsections (b) and (c) above, may submit a request to the Town for consideration by the City Manager to permit any exception to this Extended Moratorium.
 - ii. Nothing contained herein should be deemed inconsistent with Town Code Section 14-174 (k).
- 2. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Extended Moratorium shall be effective as of January 2, 2026.

WHEREAS, the home occupations section of the Town's Zoning Code refers to an outdated term, specifically, "tourist home"; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council desire to update the term "tourist home" to a more appropriate term and to terms used elsewhere in the Town's Zoning Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY THAT CHAPTER 110, ENTITLED ZONING, ARTICLE I ENTITLED IN GENERAL, SECTION 110-2 ENTITLED DEFINITIONS AND ARTICLE V, ENTITLED SUPPLEMENTAL REGULATIONS, DIVISION 2, ENTITLED HEIGHT, AREA AND BULK RESTRICTIONS, SECTION 110-908, ENTITLED HOME OCCUPATIONS, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND, BE AND THEY ARE HEREBY AMENDED, AS FOLLOWS:

DIVISION 2. – HEIGHT, AREA AND BULK RESTRICTIONS

. . .

Sec. 110-908. Home occupations.

- (a) A home occupation is permitted as an accessory use within a residential dwelling, provided that:
 - (1) The occupation or activity is clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the premises for residential purposes and is carried on by a member of the family residing on the premises.
 - (2) No more than one person outside the resident family is employed on the premises.
 - (3) There is no display or storage of materials on the premises.
 - (4) There is no exterior indication of the home occupation or variation from the residential character of the building.
 - (5) There is no generation of vehicular or pedestrian traffic or parking demand greater than normal for the district in which it is located.
 - (6) There is no equipment used which creates offensive noise, vibration, smoke, dust, odor, heat, glare or which would cause interference with electrical or radio equipment.
 - (7) There is no more than one nonilluminated sign no larger than four square feet in size, per dwelling unit, and each home occupation within that dwelling unit, desiring to identify its presence, must do so on said sign.

 - (4) Teacher, with musical instruction limited to one or two pupils at a time.

The search for a new manager is ongoing, and the last candidate to receive an offer declined. Attempts to find a qualified year-round parttime candidate for the position continue to be a struggle
- The Racquet Center closed for the season on September 29, wrapping up another successful summer. The pickleball courts continue to be a driving force for participation
- Staff has been working on a grant through the National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) for more access to girls/women in sports. With the help of Grants Manager Leah Dyson, the Department is working to receive this grant so staff can focus on offering more program opportunities for girls and female coaches
- Division staff is looking forward and preparing for fall events, such as:
