POLICE COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES

March 10, 2025

PRESENT: Council President Matthew James, Council Member and Police Commission Chairman Anthony DeLuca, Council Member Larry Yates, Mayor Richard Meehan, City Manager Terry McGean, Department of Emergency Management Director Joseph Theobald, Heather Stansbury, Esquire, Interim Chief Michael Colbert, Captain Shawn Jones, Captain Dennis Eade, Lieutenant Allen Hawk, Lieutenant Frank Soscia, Deputy Communications Manager Ashley Miller

- 1. The meeting was called to Order at 9:30 AM in the 3rd Floor Administrative Conference Room of the Public Safety Building.
- 2. <u>Approval of Minutes of the February 10, 2025, Police Commission Meeting</u>: Mayor Meehan made a Motion and Council Member Yates Seconded to approve the minutes of the February 10, 2025 Police Commission meeting. The vote passed 3-0 with Council President James absent.
- 3. Interim Chief Colbert's Update: Interim Chief Colbert noted that numbers across the board were generally down with a few exceptions. Assist Citizen or Motorist calls were up slighty from the previous year. Calls for Check on Welfare were up as well. Interim Chief Colbert stated that Alarm Premise calls were up a little compared to the past year. Interim Chief Colbert then noted that Domestic Assaults/Disputes were by a couple. Assaults Already Occurred were up by a greater percentage from 2 in 2024 to 5 in 2025. Custodial Arrests were at 60, which was down slightly from 2024. Interim Chief Colbert stated that DUI Arrests were up slightly. He also noted that those are officer-driven and when that numbers goes up, it reflects the officers being aggressive with DUI enforcement. Interim Chief Colbert touched on Smoking Citations, Littering Citations on the Boardwalk, and Noise Complaints, all of which were non-issues for the month of February.

The Commission expressed satisfaction with the numbers presented. Interim Chief Colbert assured the Commission that the Police Department was ready for the upcoming holiday weekend.

4. 2025 Recruiting Update: Lt. Hawk stated that in the month of February, there were 8 full-time applicants, taking the yearly total to 75 and 18 seasonal PSO applicants, taking the yearly total to 127. At the in-person testing date in February, there were 3 written test failures, 1 physical agility test failure, and no interview failures. There is an upcoming inperson testing date on March 22, 2025 in conjunction with the Town of Ocean City Job Fair and the OC Chamber of Commerce Job Fair. On March 29, 2025, there will be another in-person testing date at the Public Safety Building. As of now, there are 10 full-time applicants and 4 PSO applicants signed up for that testing date. Lt. Hawk noted that there were 24 PSOs hired as of February, however, this morning, the number went up to 30. The Commission asked how this number compared to this time last year. Lt. Hawk

stated that at this time last year, there were 16 PSAs and 12 seasonal officers hired. Interim Chief Colbert noted that one benefit this year is the Police Department has the ability to wait longer than with seasonal officers because the background process is not as extensive and the training doesn't start as early as the seasonal officer academy did.

Lt. Hawk made note that there were 2 full-time applicants who successfully completed their psychological evaluations and their final backgrounds should be finishing up in the next week or so for the upcoming July academy. Capt. Jones stated that there are an additional 10-12 full-time applicants currently at different stages of the background process. Chief Colbert stated that with those numbers, he is optimistic that the department will reach its goal of 6 total recruits for the July academy.

Interim Chief Colbert mentioned that there are some laterals currently in the process, but there are some difficulties in terms of how long some individuals have been out of law enforcement and comparative compliance for other states.

The Commission asked what the current total of officers able to work was. Capt. Jones stated he believed it was 104. It was agreed that there are 111 officers on the payroll and 7 were unavailable to work due to being in the academy, injuries, or suspensions.

Interim Chief Colbert noted that the interviews were recently held for the HR position in Training and Recruiting. Lt. Hawk added that 6 people were interviewed by a panel that included a member of the City's HR team. They narrowed down the pool to 2 applicants that are currently going through the background process.

Interim Chief Colbert stated that the 104 number is ever changing and could be different in the coming months. Capt. Jones agreed and stated it will be different due to an upcoming retirement. He also noted that the personnel who are currently injured should be back by the summer if not sooner.

The Commission asked how seasonal housing was for this coming year. Lt. Hawk answered that there are currently 2 houses in Ocean Pines that are under contract. Lt. Hawk also stated that they are planning to reach out to other real estate agencies for more options. It was then asked if the Somerset Street Substation housing would be ready for this season. Unfortunately, it will not, but will be up and running for next season.

The Commission then asked to discuss signing bonuses for Maryland lateral officers. Interim Chief Colbert noted that having a signing bonus would help get lateral applicants, but had some reservation about officers who were chasing signing bonuses. Lt. Hawk stated that if a signing bonus is offered to lateral applicants, it should be staggered over a set number of years. A motion to recommend to City Council a \$15,000 signing bonus spread out over 3 years for Maryland lateral officers was made by Mayor Meehan. This motion was seconded by Council President James. The vote was unanimous.

5. Request to Incease Taxi Rates – Century Taxi: Discussion item pulled from agenda.

6. Other Business: The Commission asked if any of the Jeeps that were decommissioned from the tram would be going to the Police Department. City Manager McGean stated that it was in the works, but hasn't been finalized yet.

Interim Chief Colbert updated the Commission on news from the Mounted Unit. One of the mounts, Moose, got sick last week with equine Covid, which further progressed to pneumonia. On recommendation from the local vet, Moose was taken to the large animal hospital in Lancaster, PA. While up there, Moose's health was still declining due to colic on top of the pneumonia. In the last 24 hours, his health started to improve and Moose was able to eat again. Interim Chief Colbert stated that if Moose's condition continues to improve, he should be able to be brought back home at some point tomorrow.

Motion made by Council President James to adjourn the meeting. Mayor Meehan seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous. The meeting was adjourned at 9:57 AM.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 9:03 am by Mayor Meehan

Present were: Mayor Rick Meehan, Public Works Director Hal Adkins, City Manager Terry McGean, Council Secretary Tony DeLuca, Transit Manager Rob Shearman, Operations Manager George Peake, Deputy Director Scott Wagner, Parking Manager Jon Anthony, Council Member Will Savage and Bethany Hooper, OC-Today Dispatch. Council Member Proctor was absent.

A. Approval of Past Meeting Minutes

- 1. February 11, 2025 Transportation Advisory Meeting Report
 - Motion was made by Council Secretary DeLuca to approve the minutes as written; seconded by Council Member Savage. Vote was unanimous with Council Member Proctor absent

B. Recruiting and Staffing Update

- 1. Year-over-year comparisons of number applied and on-staff
 - Applications are on par with the numbers from last year
 - Currently have 5 less seasonal drivers on payroll than this time last year
 - Applicants seem to be better qualified than in past
- 2. Update on recruiting activities planned and in progress
 - ➤ Did recruitment efforts with the "OC" Bus at the Mason Dixon Shopping Center in Selbyville and the Pennington Cross Shopping Center in Ocean Pines
 - Received two applications from this effort; and has at least 3 others express interest
 - Had Spanish and English marketing materials with us; and a bus driver fluent in Spanish assisting with the recruitment effort
 - ➤ Will be attending 2 job fairs on March 22nds; the Ocean City Job Fair and the Chamber of Commerce Job Fair
 - ➤ Looking into possibly taking the "OC Bus" to other locations for recruitment efforts.
 - ➤ Have not had a lot of response from the Service Organizations that we have reached out to
 - > Still working on reaching out to Fire Companies in area
 - Going to also reach out to the Ocean City Coast Guard Station

C. Bus Stop Reduction Study

- 1. Overview of bus stop locations and statistics
 - Coastal Highway Beach Bus route is a 17.9 mile circuit staring at South Division Street Transit Station and stopping at North Transit Station on 144th Street and returning to South Division.
 - Currently there are 125 different bus stop locations; this is an average of one stop every 756 feet.
- 2. Summary of data collected so far

- > Staff has identified 18 potential stops for consideration
- Not yet prepared to publicize the stop recommended for removal at this time; still need to do outreach to potentially affected property owners
- Removing these stops would be considered a "major service change" which according to MTA and FTA guidelines would require us to advertise for 30 days allowing the public the opportunity to submit written comments and/or request a public hearing
- 3. Potential timeline for further action, if desired
 - Now through March 13th contract property owners
 - ➤ March 14th through April 14th; 30 day advertising
 - > April 21st Public Hearing, if one is requested
 - April 22nd through May 16th
 - Advertise the service adjustment
 - Updates to online maps/resources/tracking services
 - Physical removal of retired bus stops
- D. General Updates and "Follow-Ups"
 - 1. Bus Division
 - a) Ridership and Deployments
 - Ridership for January and February was down 14.8% from last year
 - Bus deployments were also down for January and February from last year
 - ➤ Mayor Meehan followed up on discussions regarding Uber and Lyft from last meeting; stating that per MD Law the Town does receive revenue from rides provided by these services; 0.25 per ride.
 - Mayor Meehan requested that a year's worth of revenue numbers paid to the Town for these services be provided to Committee; include Uber and Lyft numbers in stats provided at future meetings.
 - Council Secretary DeLuca also asked about Taxi's within Town; Rob stated he would see what type of information he could find regarding taxi services in Town for next meeting.
 - b) Revenue
 - Revenue is approximately 2% below projections for year
 - Feels the revenue will rebound with the concert in May and the Air Show in June.
 - c) Expenses
 - Part time wages for FY2025 are down 6.6% from prior year
 - d) ATP application status update
 - > Finalizing grant documentation
 - Grant documents will be submitted to MTA by March 24th
 - Grant will be awarded in Fall
 - 2. Parking Division
 - a) Update on transition to meterless parking
 - Removing all single space meters from all locations; except for the Inlet Parking lot for the season
 - ➤ Worked with ParkMobile on signage; still waiting on signs to be shipped.
 - All kiosks have been removed
 - Working with Lauren and Jessica on outreach regarding change

- Mayor Meehan stated that he has spoken with Lauren about outreach to have people download the ParkMobile app prior to arriving in Ocean City; will save time and will be more efficient
- Mayor Meehan asked about the feather flags to be placed on the Kiosks at the Inlet Lot; Rob will work with Public Works Maintenance to get these installed.
- ➤ Hal brought to the Committees attention 2 properties on Talbot Street, which will lose free parking spaces, which Peter Buas is going to be authoring an email about to the Council.

E. Miscellaneous Topics

- With the pending Convention Center Construction in the future; Mayor Meehan asked about modifying bus routes to accommodate hotels and certain events; express routes
- Rob will discuss with MTA and bring summary and ideas to May Committee meeting.
- F. Adjourn (next meeting Tuesday, May 13, 2025)
 - Mayor Meehan and Council Secretary DeLuca will be out of Town for the April meeting; the next meeting will be May 13th, 2025.
 - Motion made by Council Secretary DeLuca to adjourn meeting; seconded by Council Member Savager; vote was unanimous with Council Member Proctor absent
 - ➤ Meeting adjourned at 9:41 am.

Litter Free OC:

Adopt-Your-Beach Program: Mike Brian explained they are experiencing a lot of calls for student service learning hours and the OC Surf Club has been reaching out to local schools to set up clean up events specifically for students. Tommy Vach brought newly printed coloring placemats to show the group. The placemats were completed in conjunction with the Ocean City Beach Patrol and include beach safety and education messages and photos. The mats are being marketed for sale to local.

Adopt-Your-Street Program: Sandi Smith was unable to attend today's meeting, but wanted to let everyone know that the Program has been seeing more volunteers with community service hour requirements. MCBP will not be able to attend the Spring Community Clean up, due to other commitments

Beach Heroes OC: Leslie Eisenhauer noted that there has been 35-40 volunteers at each Tuesday cleanup this winter. She also thanked Public Works for picking up the collected trash after the group cleanups each week.

Spring Community Cleanup: This will be held on April 26, from 9AM to 11 AM at 100TH Street (Worcester County Library).

Dune Grass Planting Update: Jenelle Gerthoffer noted that this event is to occur this Sunday, March 16^{TH} at 131^{ST} Street in conjunction with volunteers from the Braemar Condominium and Stephen Decatur High School. The group will be planting 3,300 square feet of clear sand areas in the secondary dune (owned by the Town), which was previously full of bamboo. After manual removal of the bamboo and root system and contact spraying over the last year, the majority of the bamboo has been removed. There is a small area where bamboo is still present, which is not being planted and the Parks Department will continue to monitor and spray.

Bucket Tree Update: Joann Landon will continue to work on this project, specifically finding groups or individuals who would like to volunteer to be responsible for each bucket tree. The bucket trees will have hooks (With latches) on them to hold buckets that can be used for an "at-your-own" pace beach cleanup.

<u>Green Team Membership</u>: The Green Team Members are those who have voting rights whenever the Committee is asked to make a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council. It has been a while since Green Team membership was updated. The group unanimously added the Beach Heroes OC, Leslie Eisenhauer, as a new Green Team Member.

City Hall Tree Maintenance: Joann Landon will reach out to Parks staff about trimming trees around City Hall and the need for removal of one diseased and dying Holly tree located along Baltimore Avenue.

Storm Drain "Art:" Jenelle Gerthoffer will reestablish communicate with Public Works on his project that was first discussed in the Fall of 2023. Specifically, the decals will say "no dumping drains to waterways" and placed adjacent to storm drain grates.

Update from Green Team Members:

- The OC Surf Club asked that we start thinking about dates for the Summer Community Clean Up event.
- Mike Brian noted that near his residence in Delaware, there have been talks regarding the location and look of the oil rigs that will be required for the offshore wind energy projects. Images showing the oil rigs being about 1 mile offshore cause the community to become more aware and resistant toward the possibilities from the wind energy project(s).
- Leslie Eisenhauer asked Town staff if we could once again place "keep our beaches clean" messages on Town sign boards.
- Mandi Wells noted that there is an OC Surfrider bingo fundraiser on April 23RD at the Sterling Tavern. She also noted that the student side of the club is creating solo beach cleanup kits that can be provided to Ocean City hotels and given to visitors who would like to do their own clean up.
- Brooke Berquist made the group aware that local students visited the Maryland General Assembly on February 4, specifically with the Maryland Bottle Bill being voted on at the end of this month.
- Debbie Dean also noted that Assateague Coastal Trust (ACT) has been busy during the legislative season. The ACT has their annual plant sale on May 3 and working with OC Go Green on a Compost Program.
- Jenelle Gerthoffer made note that the Town's annual Pollinator and Beach plant mini grant/giveaways have been posted on the Town website for Ocean City property owners to apply for.

Having received approval, and having paid all appropriate fees, this permit defines the terms by which this event shall occur.

PURPOSE: Boardwalk dog walk to raise money for the Worcester County Humane Society.

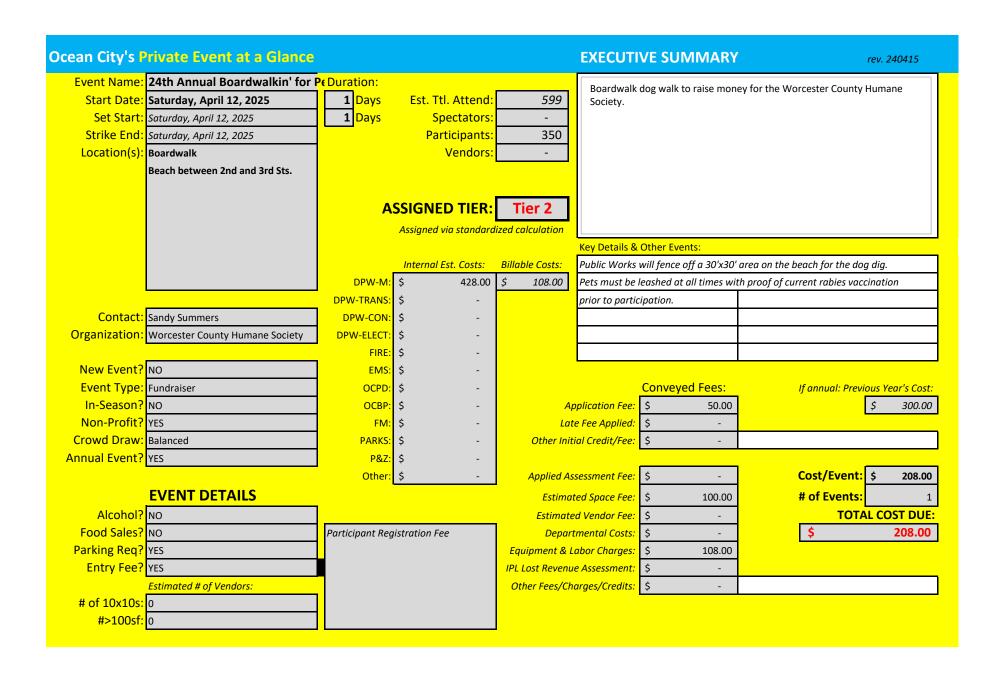

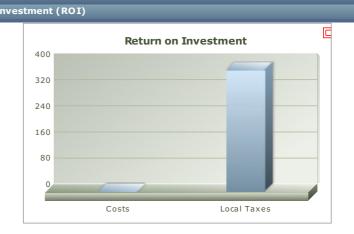

POINT OF CONTACT FOR THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY: The Town's Private Event Coordinator shall be the primary contact for all communications with the Town of Ocean City. If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. If the applicant and franchise owner(s) are unable to reach a mutually acceptable agreement, the matter shall be submitted to the Town for mediation, and the Town will decide an impartial resolution by which both parties shall abide.



ROAD/LANE CLOSURES: A state highway permit shall be obtained for use of any state property (roads, highways, etc.) This is the responsibility of the applicant independent of the Town's private event process. Applicant shall keep the Town's Private Event Coordinator apprised of all steps and approvals related to such efforts. Non-state roads affected by the event shall be reviewed by the Town for consideration of closure or traffic modification through the private event process.

Minimum required insurance shall be provided by companies licensed in the State of Maryland with a current AM Best, Inc. rating of a VII or better. The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials shall be named as additional insured on all insurance policies except workers' compensation and, except for automobile liability, the The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland's additional insured status shall include premises liability and products/completed operations.

Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. The applicant agrees to sell, dispense or serve only Coca-Cola beverages on Town premises for the duration of the permitted use. The applicant is expressly prohibited from using the beverages of other suppliers, said beverages to include soft drinks, juices, sport drinks, specified energy drinks and bottled waters. The permitted beverages include Coca-Cola, Diet Coke, Sprite, Pibb Xtra, Mello Yello, Fresca, Nestea, Arizona Tea, Honest Tea, Barqs Root Beer, Fanta, Minute Maid, Seagrams Ginger Ale, PowerAde, V-8 Juice, Fuze Juice, Monster, Tum E Yummies, Dasani and other products that Coca-Cola may provide in accordance with its agreement with the Town of Ocean City.

- BEACH ACCESS: Vehicle access to and from the beach must be clearly identified on your application and is not guaranteed. If approved, applicant must complete a beach driving and safety course annually provided by OCBP at the applicants expense.
- BEAUTY CONTESTS: Beauty contests are not permitted on the beach.
 - CITY SERVICES: Each applicant should plan on providing all the necessary cleanup, set-up, etc. without the assistance of City Services. If town services are requested, they must be clearly indicated within the Private Event Application for evaluation.



CONCESSIONS: No food or beverage concessions will be permitted on the beach or along the boardwalk, although such sales may be considered at other sites. Beverage sales at other sites must maintain compliance with the sponsorship restrictions noted within this application. ONLY event related merchandise sales may be permitted on the beach upon appropriate request and approval, subject to applicable laws.



SPONSORSHIPS: All sponsors must be identified on the application.

ADVERTISING: Ocean City will not allow any type of advertising that is:

- Violence in any form
- False, misleading or deceiving statements
- Sexually explicit or obscene materials
- Tobacco or tobacco products
- Vaping or vaping products
- Tattoos
- Casino gambling including games of chance and skill
- Alcohol
- Promoting the use of marijuana
- Other potentially objectionable marketing or advertising which may be established from time to time by the Town.



DIAGRAM OF EVENT LAYOUT: A detailed diagram of the event layout/set-up and location of any and all facilities is required with your application. The application will be considered incomplete without the diagram.



INFLATABLES: Inflatable displays may be permitted, but must be pre-approved. A photograph of the intended display and the dimensions must be included before approval can be considered. No liquor or tobacco product displays will be allowed. The Mayor and City Council reserve the right to reject any inflatable determined inappropriate.



MUSIC AND PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS: Must operate in accordance with the Ocean City Code 30-367 of 65 decibels.



DOWNTOWN EVENTS (BEACH/BOARDWALK): Events that charge participant entry fees (tournaments, festivals, etc.) and/or desire to display sponsorship banners or other promotional information, must maintain a seventy-five (75) foot buffer from the edge of the train lane to the start of the event's set up. All events must comply with the provisions of Chapter 62 of the Ocean City Code.



PARADES: An MDOT Highway Permit must be obtained at (410) 543-6715 for use of any state property, and a copy forwarded to the Town's Private Events Coordinator.



FIREWORKS, TENTS, AIR SUPPORT/AIR INFLATED STRUCTURES & BONFIRES: Application to the City Fire Marshal at (410) 289-8780 is required, with appropriate approvals forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator. Failure to comply will result in revocation of all event approvals.



TOILET FACILITIES: Identification of planned "comfort" provisions must be included in the application and event diagram. The Town owns a number of established public toilet stations in the downtown area that may assist in event planning.



PRIZE STIPULATIONS: No alcoholic beverages may be awarded as a prize on City property.



WEST OCEAN CITY PARK AND RIDE: A permit is required if a trailer or an oversized vehicle is parked over night at the West Ocean City Park and Ride. Please specify this request on your application.



SAMPLING: Sampling will be permitted on a case-by-case basis. Sizes and quantities of such must be pre-approved, as do the locations for distribution. Samples must be of a nationally recognized product available for sale at retail establishments. No prepared food samples will be permitted on the beach nor along the boardwalk. Non-alcoholic beverage samples may be permitted provided the samples are in compliance with the Town of Ocean City's exclusive beverage franchise agreement with Coca-Cola.



RAFFLES: Only non-profit groups may offer any form of raffle in conjunction with an event in Ocean City. These groups must apply through the Worcester County Department of Development Review and Permitting, and must submit a processing fee at the time of application. Applications are available at the Isle of Wight County Office Building on Route 90, or at the Court House in Snow Hill. A copy of the raffle permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. All raffles must be drawn and announced prior to the conclusion of the event.



TRASH: Applicant is required to clean the area of trash and transport it to the appropriate receptacle. On the beach, all trash must be placed in the appropriate street-end dumpsters. Failure to practice appropriate cleanup procedures may result in the denial of future event requests and/or appropriate billings.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SERVICE: Groups are discouraged from the service of alcoholic beverages at their Ocean City event. However, those that desire such approval must state this clearly on their application. Permission to serve alcoholic beverages shall be granted exclusively by Mayor and City Council. It should be noted that without Council approval, open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property is illegal. Only Worchester County based non-profit groups may request to sell alcoholic beverages at an event, and must obtain a license from the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners. A "One Day Alcohol Permit" application with the Ocean City Mayor's signature must be submitted to the County a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the event, along with a the permit fee. Applications are usually available in the Mayor's office at City Hall. A copy of the approved permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. The original permit must be kept on site at the event and must be available to display if required.

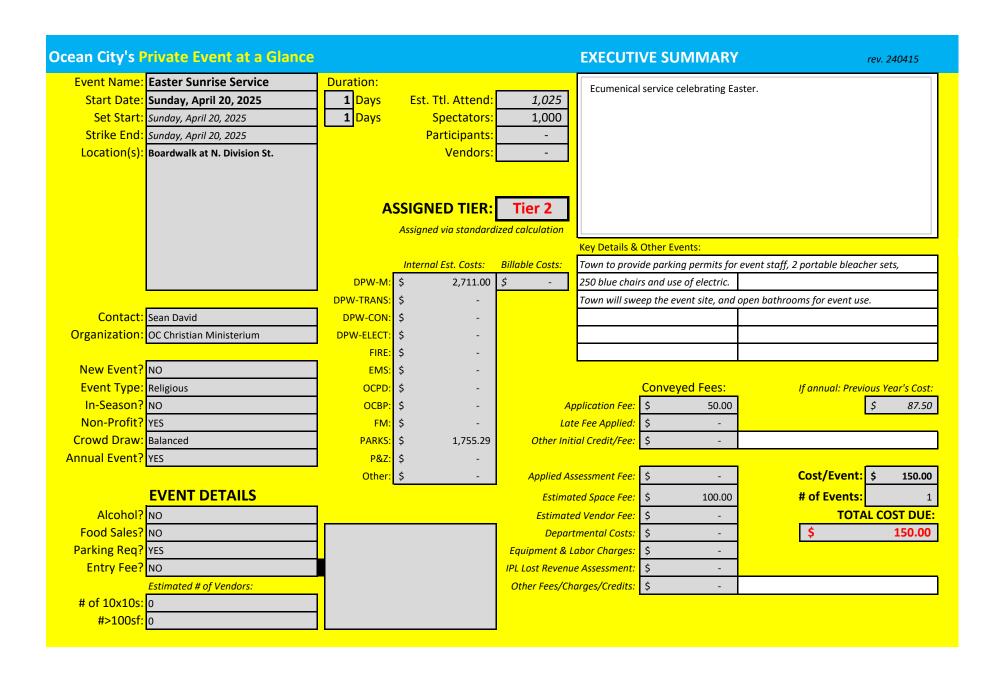

POINT OF CONTACT FOR THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY: The Town's Private Event Coordinator shall be the primary contact for all communications with the Town of Ocean City. If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. If the applicant and franchise owner(s) are unable to reach a mutually acceptable agreement, the matter shall be submitted to the Town for mediation, and the Town will decide an impartial resolution by which both parties shall abide.

Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. No liquor or tobacco product displays will be allowed. The Mayor and City Council reserve the right to reject any inflatable determined inappropriate.



MUSIC AND PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS: Must operate in accordance with the Ocean City Code 30-367 of 65 decibels.



DOWNTOWN EVENTS (BEACH/BOARDWALK): Events that charge participant entry fees (tournaments, festivals, etc.) and/or desire to display sponsorship banners or other promotional information, must maintain a seventy-five (75) foot buffer from the edge of the train lane to the start of the event's set up. All events must comply with the provisions of Chapter 62 of the Ocean City Code.

- PARADES: An MDOT Highway Permit must be obtained at (410) 543-6715 for use of any state property, and a copy forwarded to the Town's Private Events Coordinator.

FIREWORKS, TENTS, AIR SUPPORT/AIR INFLATED STRUCTURES & BONFIRES: Application to the City Fire Marshal at (410) 289-8780 is required, with appropriate approvals forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator. Failure to comply will result in revocation of all event approvals.

TOILET FACILITIES: Identification of planned "comfort" provisions must be included in the application and event diagram. The Town owns a number of established public toilet stations in the downtown area that may assist in event planning.

PRIZE STIPULATIONS: No alcoholic beverages may be awarded as a prize on City property.

WEST OCEAN CITY PARK AND RIDE: A permit is required if a trailer or an oversized vehicle is parked over night at the West Ocean City Park and Ride. Please specify this request on your application.

SAMPLING: Sampling will be permitted on a case-by-case basis. Sizes and quantities of such must be pre-approved, as do the locations for distribution. Samples must be of a nationally recognized product available for sale at retail establishments. No prepared food samples will be permitted on the beach nor along the boardwalk. Non-alcoholic beverage samples may be permitted provided the samples are in compliance with the Town of Ocean City's exclusive beverage franchise agreement with Coca-Cola.

RAFFLES: Only non-profit groups may offer any form of raffle in conjunction with an event in Ocean City. These groups must apply through the Worcester County Department of Development Review and Permitting, and must submit a processing fee at the time of application. Applications are available at the Isle of Wight County Office Building on Route 90, or at the Court House in Snow Hill. A copy of the raffle permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. All raffles must be drawn and announced prior to the conclusion of the event.

~

TRASH: Applicant is required to clean the area of trash and transport it to the appropriate receptacle. On the beach, all trash must be placed in the appropriate street-end dumpsters. Failure to practice appropriate cleanup procedures may result in the denial of future event requests and/or appropriate billings.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SERVICE: Groups are discouraged from the service of alcoholic beverages at their Ocean City event. However, those that desire such approval must state this clearly on their application. Permission to serve alcoholic beverages shall be granted exclusively by Mayor and City Council. It should be noted that without Council approval, open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property is illegal. Only Worchester County based non-profit groups may request to sell alcoholic beverages at an event, and must obtain a license from the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners. A "One Day Alcohol Permit" application with the Ocean City Mayor's signature must be submitted to the County a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the event, along with a the permit fee. Applications are usually available in the Mayor's office at City Hall. A copy of the approved permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. The original permit must be kept on site at the event and must be available to display if required.



CHANGES TO APPLICATION OR PERMIT: Event applicants desiring to make changes to their submitted application or approved private event must complete the "Request for an Addendum to a Private Event" form (available upon request), and must submit the completed form, along with the appropriate fee, to the Private Events Coordinator. However, no changes will be accepted within 30-days prior to the event.



LOCAL ORDINANCE DISCLOSURE AND COMPLIANCE: The applicant agrees to comply with the provisions of all applicable ordinances of the Town of Ocean City. Specifically all permitted uses on or within 75 feet of the Boardwalk are required to comply with the provisions of chapter 62 of the Code which expressly prohibits the public sale, rental or exchange for a donation of any goods, wares, merchandise, foodstuffs, refreshments or other commodities or services.

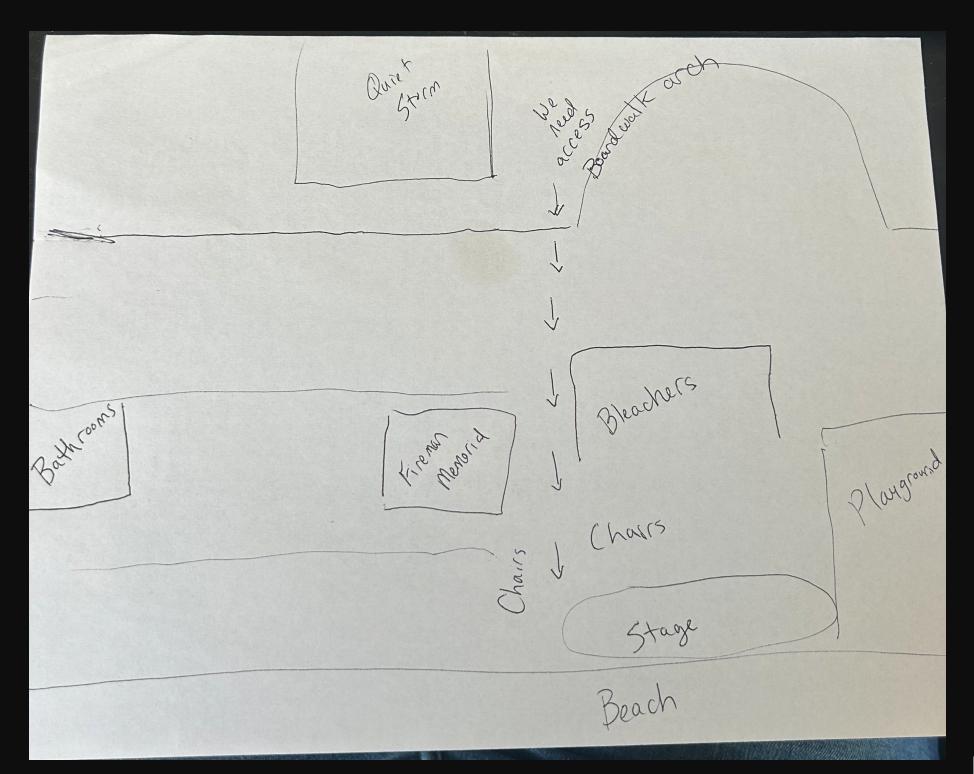

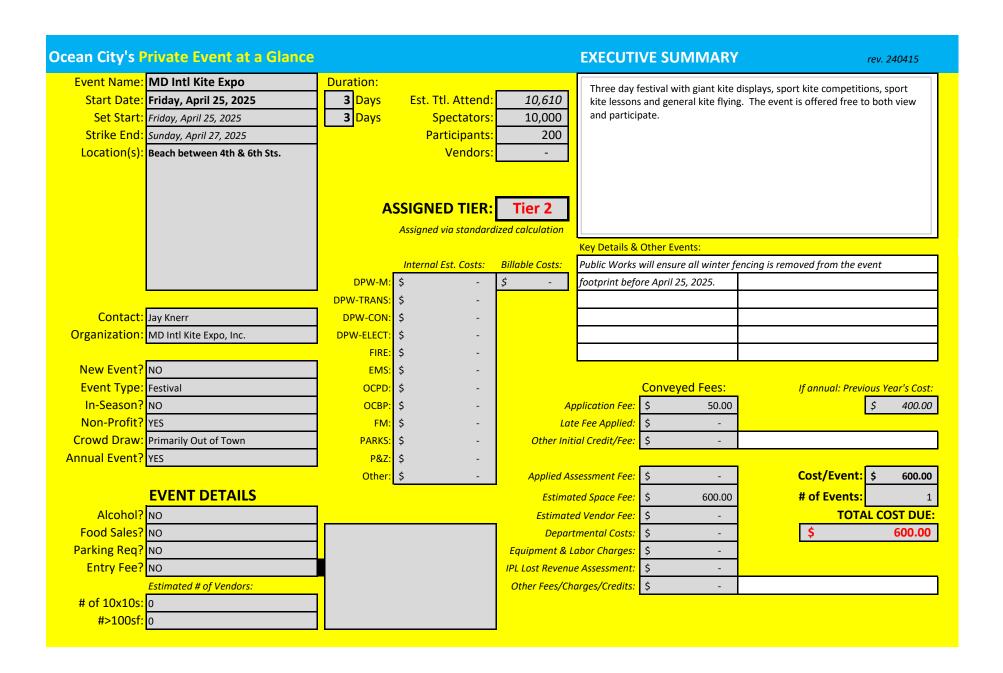

POINT OF CONTACT FOR THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY: The Town's Private Event Coordinator shall be the primary contact for all communications with the Town of Ocean City. If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. If the applicant and franchise owner(s) are unable to reach a mutually acceptable agreement, the matter shall be submitted to the Town for mediation, and the Town will decide an impartial resolution by which both parties shall abide.



ROAD/LANE CLOSURES: A state highway permit shall be obtained for use of any state property (roads, highways, etc.) This is the responsibility of the applicant independent of the Town's private event process. Applicant shall keep the Town's Private Event Coordinator apprised of all steps and approvals related to such efforts. Non-state roads affected by the event shall be reviewed by the Town for consideration of closure or traffic modification through the private event process.



USE OF MUNICIPAL PARKING LOTS: If a municipal lot is requested for use by the applicant for the event, whether for parking or placement of the event footprint, the Town reserves the right to review lost revenue and assign a cost to lot usage. This cost will be assigned during the private event approval process, discussed with the applicant and considered for approval by the Mayor and City Council as part of the private event approval.

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS: The Risk Manager for the Town of Ocean City will determine insurance requirements for all private events, following the receipt of the application. Insurance requirements apply to private event vendors, amusement ride companies and fireworks producers, their contractors and subcontractors as well as the private event owner/sponsors. Requirements will depend on, including but not limited to, hazards and exposures associated with the specific private event.

Minimum required insurance shall be provided by companies licensed in the State of Maryland with a current AM Best, Inc. rating of a VII or better. The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials shall be named as additional insured on all insurance policies except workers' compensation and, except for automobile liability, the The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland's additional insured status shall include premises liability and products/completed operations.

Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. The applicant agrees to sell, dispense or serve only Coca-Cola beverages on Town premises for the duration of the permitted use. The applicant is expressly prohibited from using the beverages of other suppliers, said beverages to include soft drinks, juices, sport drinks, specified energy drinks and bottled waters. The permitted beverages include Coca-Cola, Diet Coke, Sprite, Pibb Xtra, Mello Yello, Fresca, Nestea, Arizona Tea, Honest Tea, Barqs Root Beer, Fanta, Minute Maid, Seagrams Ginger Ale, PowerAde, V-8 Juice, Fuze Juice, Monster, Tum E Yummies, Dasani and other products that Coca-Cola may provide in accordance with its agreement with the Town of Ocean City.

- BEACH ACCESS: Vehicle access to and from the beach must be clearly identified on your application and is not guaranteed. If approved, applicant must complete a beach driving and safety course annually provided by OCBP at the applicants expense.
- BEAUTY CONTESTS: Beauty contests are not permitted on the beach.
 - CITY SERVICES: Each applicant should plan on providing all the necessary cleanup, set-up, etc. without the assistance of City Services. If town services are requested, they must be clearly indicated within the Private Event Application for evaluation.



CONCESSIONS: No food or beverage concessions will be permitted on the beach or along the boardwalk, although such sales may be considered at other sites. Beverage sales at other sites must maintain compliance with the sponsorship restrictions noted within this application. ONLY event - related merchandise sales may be permitted on the beach upon appropriate request and approval, subject to applicable laws.



SPONSORSHIPS: All sponsors must be identified on the application.

ADVERTISING: Ocean City will not allow any type of advertising that is:

- Violence in any form
- False, misleading or deceiving statements
- Sexually explicit or obscene materials
- Tobacco or tobacco products
- Vaping or vaping products
- Tattoos
- Casino gambling including games of chance and skill
- Alcohol
- Promoting the use of marijuana
- Other potentially objectionable marketing or advertising which may be established from time to time by the Town.



DIAGRAM OF EVENT LAYOUT: A detailed diagram of the event layout/set-up and location of any and all facilities is required with your application. The application will be considered incomplete without the diagram.



INFLATABLES: Inflatable displays may be permitted, but must be pre-approved. A photograph of the intended display and the dimensions must be included before approval can be considered. No liquor or tobacco product displays will be allowed. The Mayor and City Council reserve the right to reject any inflatable determined inappropriate.



MUSIC AND PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS: Must operate in accordance with the Ocean City Code 30-367 of 65 decibels.



DOWNTOWN EVENTS (BEACH/BOARDWALK): Events that charge participant entry fees (tournaments, festivals, etc.) and/or desire to display sponsorship banners or other promotional information, must maintain a seventy-five (75) foot buffer from the edge of the train lane to the start of the event's set up. All events must comply with the provisions of Chapter 62 of the Ocean City Code.



PARADES: An MDOT Highway Permit must be obtained at (410) 543-6715 for use of any state property, and a copy forwarded to the Town's Private Events Coordinator.



FIREWORKS, TENTS, AIR SUPPORT/AIR INFLATED STRUCTURES & BONFIRES: Application to the City Fire Marshal at (410) 289-8780 is required, with appropriate approvals forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator. Failure to comply will result in revocation of all event approvals.



TOILET FACILITIES: Identification of planned "comfort" provisions must be included in the application and event diagram. The Town owns a number of established public toilet stations in the downtown area that may assist in event planning.



PRIZE STIPULATIONS: No alcoholic beverages may be awarded as a prize on City property.



WEST OCEAN CITY PARK AND RIDE: A permit is required if a trailer or an oversized vehicle is parked over night at the West Ocean City Park and Ride. Please specify this request on your application.



SAMPLING: Sampling will be permitted on a case-by-case basis. Sizes and quantities of such must be pre-approved, as do the locations for distribution. Samples must be of a nationally recognized product available for sale at retail establishments. No prepared food samples will be permitted on the beach nor along the boardwalk. Non-alcoholic beverage samples may be permitted provided the samples are in compliance with the Town of Ocean City's exclusive beverage franchise agreement with Coca-Cola.



RAFFLES: Only non-profit groups may offer any form of raffle in conjunction with an event in Ocean City. These groups must apply through the Worcester County Department of Development Review and Permitting, and must submit a processing fee at the time of application. Applications are available at the Isle of Wight County Office Building on Route 90, or at the Court House in Snow Hill. A copy of the raffle permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. All raffles must be drawn and announced prior to the conclusion of the event.



TRASH: Applicant is required to clean the area of trash and transport it to the appropriate receptacle. On the beach, all trash must be placed in the appropriate street-end dumpsters. Failure to practice appropriate cleanup procedures may result in the denial of future event requests and/or appropriate billings.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SERVICE: Groups are discouraged from the service of alcoholic beverages at their Ocean City event. However, those that desire such approval must state this clearly on their application. Permission to serve alcoholic beverages shall be granted exclusively by Mayor and City Council. It should be noted that without Council approval, open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property is illegal. Only Worchester County based non-profit groups may request to sell alcoholic beverages at an event, and must obtain a license from the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners. A "One Day Alcohol Permit" application with the Ocean City Mayor's signature must be submitted to the County a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the event, along with a the permit fee. Applications are usually available in the Mayor's office at City Hall. A copy of the approved permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. The original permit must be kept on site at the event and must be available to display if required.



CHANGES TO APPLICATION OR PERMIT: Event applicants desiring to make changes to their submitted application or approved private event must complete the "Request for an Addendum to a Private Event" form (available upon request), and must submit the completed form, along with the appropriate fee, to the Private Events Coordinator. However, no changes will be accepted within 30days prior to the event.



LOCAL ORDINANCE DISCLOSURE AND COMPLIANCE: The applicant agrees to comply with the provisions of all applicable ordinances of the Town of Ocean City. Specifically all permitted uses on or within 75 feet of the Boardwalk are required to comply with the provisions of chapter 62 of the Code which expressly prohibits the public sale, rental or exchange for a donation of any goods, wares, merchandise, foodstuffs, refreshments or other commodities or services.

LEGAL DISCLOSURES

HOLD HARMLESS CLAUSE: Permitee (organization/applicant) shall assume all risks incident to or in connection with the permitee activity including exposure to an infection of COVID-19 and shall be solely responsible for damage or injury, of whatever kind or nature, to person or property, directly or indirectly arising out of or in connection with the permitee activity or the conduct of Permitee's operation. Permitee hereby expressly agrees to defend and hold the Town of Ocean City, its officers, agents, employees and representatives harmless from any penalties for violation of any law, ordinance, or regulation affecting its activity and from any and all claims, suits, losses, damages, or injuries directly or indirectly arising out of or in connection with the permitee activity or conduct of its operation or resulting from the negligence or intentional acts or omissions of Permitee or its officers, agent and employees, including possible exposure to an infection from COVID-19.



PRIVATE EVENT APPLICATION COMPLIANCE REQUIREMENT: The applicant for the private event described in this application agrees to follow guidelines provided and submit a complete application including submision of all required materials. The applicant agrees to take full responsibility for all cityowned property, whether borrowed, leased or rented, and understands that necessary replacement and/or repair fees may be assessed should such property be in an unacceptable condition. The applicant agrees to abide by all provisions of the private event permit granted by the Town and agrees to pay all fees and costs assigned to the permit. The applicant further agrees to comply with all conditions of the use permit, which may be required by the Mayor and City Council of the Town.



INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY CLAUSE: Acknowledge and agree that no Town trademarks, service marks, trade names, logos, and/or other trade indicia, copyrights and, as applicable, any patents, inventions and/or other intellectual property (Intellectual Property) owned by the Mayor and City Council of the Town of Ocean City, Maryland, will be directly or indirectly used, incorporated, published or republished, without prior written consent. Unauthorized use of the Intellectual Property will result in The Town of Ocean City authorizing immediate emergency, temporary and/or permanent injunctive relief prohibiting such unauthorized use and the Town of Ocean City, Maryland may be entitled to injunctive relief because monetary damages may not be an adequate remedy; but notwithstanding, the foregoing Town of Ocean City, Maryland may seek any other legal or equitable remedies in addition to injunctive relief. To the extent the Town of Ocean City, Maryland prevails in a suit at law or in equity for the purpose of enforcing its Intellectual Property rights, the Town of Ocean City, Maryland shall be entitled to recover its reasonable attorneys' fees plus court costs and expenses.

The applicant agrees to take full responsibility for all city-owned property, whether existing within the event footprint, add-ons thereto, borrowed, leased or rented. Applicant further agrees that they are responsible for the proper behavior of their crowd base and that damage or defacement caused to town or private property by vendors, participants, sub-contractors and/or spectators as a result of the execution of the event may be cause for action by the Town against applicant through additional repair or replacement fee assessment(s) or legal action to the extent of the law in the State of Maryland. The applicant agrees to abide by all provisions of the private event permit granted by the Town and agrees to pay all fees and costs assigned to the permit. The applicant further agrees to comply with all conditions and limitations of the Private Event Permit and additional conditions and tasks which may be required by the Mayor and City Council of the Town. This event must follow in accordance with all State of Maryland Directives and Orders regarding community, recreational, leisure, cultural and sporting gatherings and events.

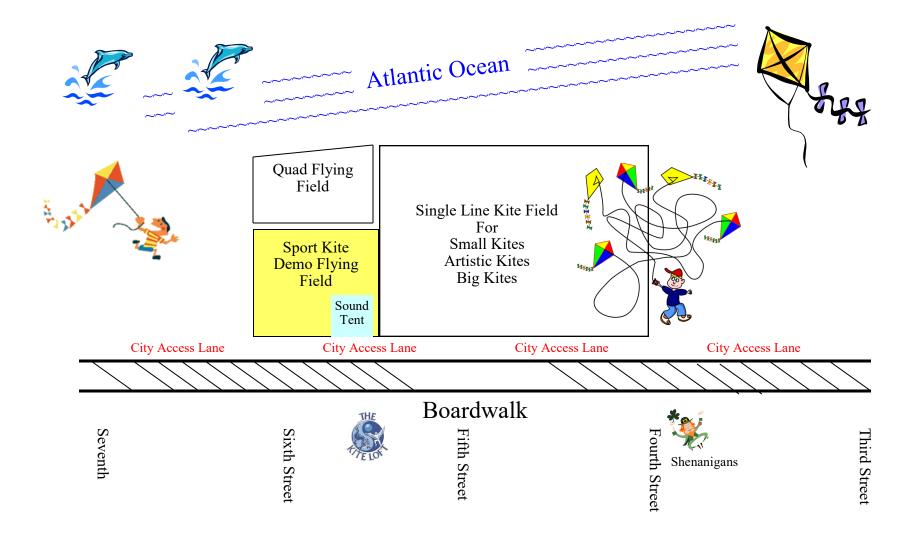

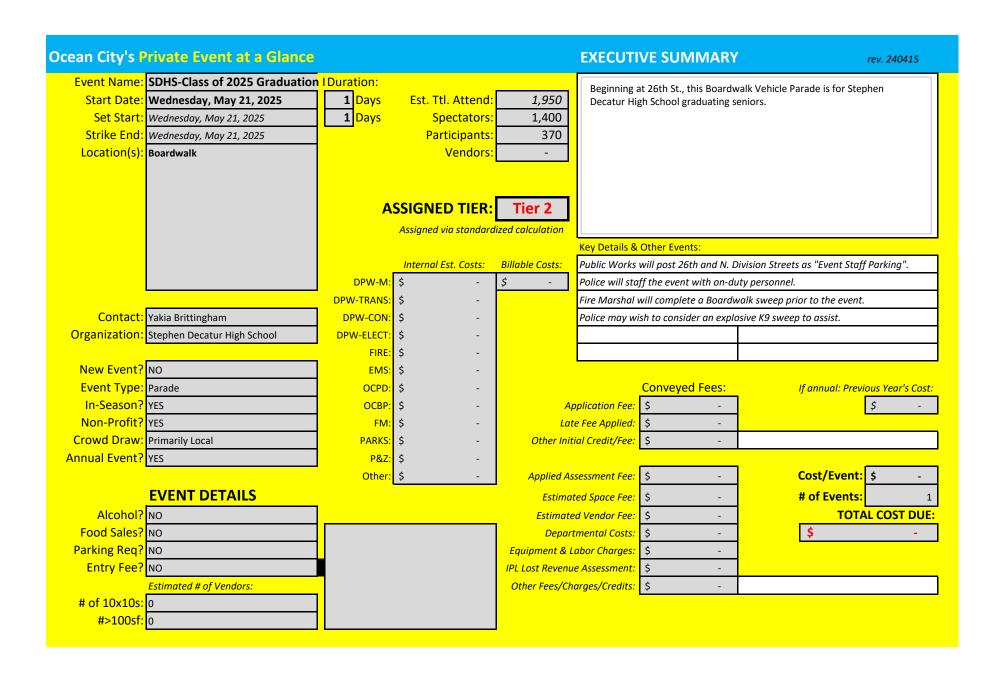

If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. The applicant agrees to sell, dispense or serve only Coca-Cola beverages on Town premises for the duration of the permitted use. Steven Grunewald, representing the Eastern Surfing Association (ESA), requests Council approve the ESA Surfing

Assoc. 2025 Series, 8 am-5 pm on the following dates:

- May 24/25 - June 7/8

June 28/29July 12/13August 9/10

- August 23/24

The location will be dependent on sandbars, weather and wave conditions, and confirmed two (2) weeks prior to the event date from the following streets:

- 13th-14th Streets

- 17th-18th Streets

- 24th-25th Streets

- 34th-35th Streets

- 36th-37th Streets

SUMMARY:

This family-friendly amateur surf competition series offers both youth and adult divisions.

Mr. Grunewald requests the following:

- Six (6) parking spaces at the east end of the event streets (three [3] on each street) for event use.
- One (1) port-o-let at the street end for ESA only.
- Vehicular access to the beach for event set-up and teardown.

Beach Patrol (OCBP) stated the beaches at the requested streets can be very crowded and often narrow. Also, these locations have caused concern from some property owners in the past. OCBP must know the chosen event location two (2) weeks prior for scheduling Surf Beach Facilitators to assist with crowd control and safety. In reviewing the Surfing Beach Schedule, there is a conflict with the June 28/29 and the July 12/13 contests in the area of 34th-37th Streets, so these events should take place elsewhere. If an event is cancelled, or if a contest ends prior to 5:30 pm, there is to be no more surfing at that location. If OCBP clears the beach, all

participants, officials and supporters of the event must leave the beach until OCBP allows the public to return.

The Town's Risk Manager requires minimum insurance of General Liability \$1M/\$3M Aggregate limit with documentation on the Certificate that "Coverage Includes Athletic Participants". All Participants must sign a waiver of liability prior to the event.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Mr. Grunewald shall pay a \$50.00 application fee and \$100.00 city space use fee per event. Mr. Grunewald shall also pay \$303.75 per event in asset and support fees.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the event series as presented.

- 10. Use a PA system.
- 11. Keep the event footprint clean and free from debris. Bag all trash and place in Town-provided receptacles.
- 12. Have one (1) 4x4 vehicle on the beach within the event footprint. Vehicular beach access is at 40th Street.
- 13. Vehicles shall not move about on the beach from 8:00 am until 7:00 pm.
- 14. Provide one (1) port-o-let at the street end of each event. It will be delivered on the Friday prior to each event and removed no later than the Monday morning after each event.
- 15. Responsible for opening the port-o-let for event use only and locking it after each event is over. It is not to be open the entire weekend to the public.
- 16. Provide cancellation notice to the Town as soon as the decision is made.
- 17. If an event is cancelled or completed earlier than scheduled, no surfing is permitted at the event J. Franklin Knight location, unless otherwise stated by OCBP.
- 18. All competitors must wear an ankle leash.
- 19. Skim boarding is not permitted.
- 20. Notify affected beach stand operators of the event within two (2) weeks of each event.
- 21. Provide the Certificate of Insurance to include coverage for personal injury in the amount of \$1M per occurrence, \$3M aggregate, and name the Mayor and City Council as additional insured and certificate holder. Provided coverage shall be primary, non-contributory and without regard to the named insured's fault or lack thereof.
- 22. Have all contestants sign a waiver of liability prior to the event.
- 23. Abide by all Guidelines and Obligations listed on the Private Event Application, unless noted in this permit.

Town of Ocean City, Maryland

- 1. Department of Public Works DPW shall post three (3) parking spaces each on the east and west ends of the event street for event use for each date in the series.
- 2. OCBP shall have personnel dedicated to this event series for crowd control and safety during their season.
- 3. If an event is cancelled in enough time for the Town to stop the scheduled delivery of assets, a refund for that particular event's asset and support fee may be provided.

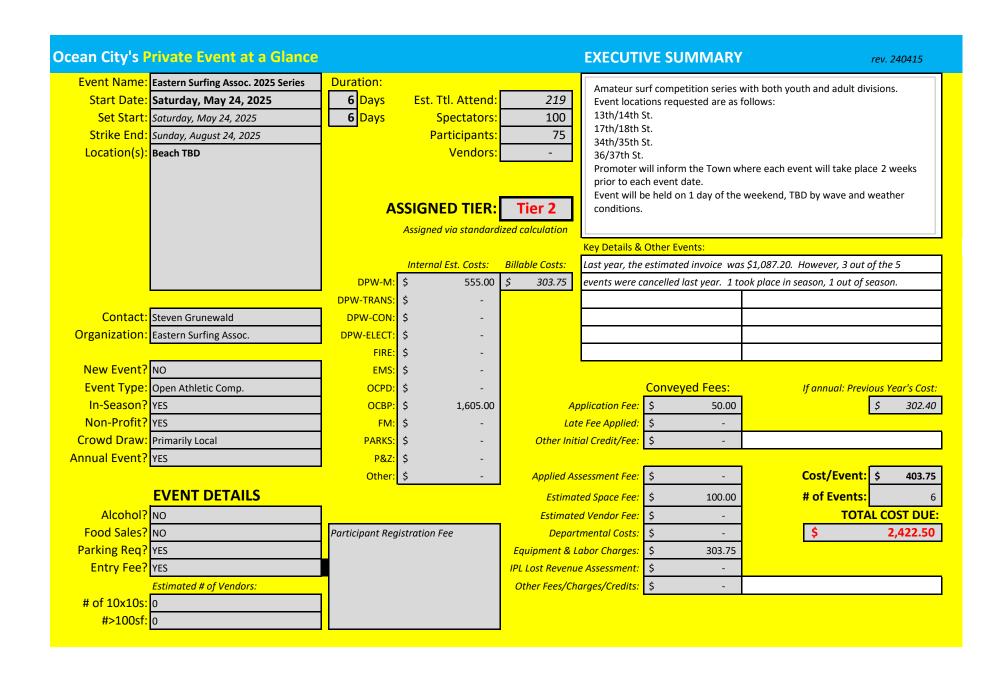

If you receive contact from another Town department or entity, it is your responsibility to make sure the Private Event Coordinator is aware of all discussions, details, modifications or approvals as a result of independent conversations. At no time shall Applicant contact other departments directly unless authorized by the Private Events Coordinator in writing.



BEACH FRANCHISE NOTIFICATION: : If your event takes place on the beach, you must notify the appropriate beach equipment rental franchise owner(s) to advise them of the event footprint. It is the applicant's responsibility to confirm, in writing, that 1) the franchise owner(s) has been notified; 2) event logistics have been coordinated; and 3) if necessary, a reasonable financial agreement has been negotiated. Written confirmation must be provided to the Town's Private Event Coordinator. If the applicant and franchise owner(s) are unable to reach a mutually acceptable agreement, the matter shall be submitted to the Town for mediation, and the Town will decide an impartial resolution by which both parties shall abide.



ROAD/LANE CLOSURES: A state highway permit shall be obtained for use of any state property (roads, highways, etc.) This is the responsibility of the applicant independent of the Town's private event process. The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials shall be named as additional insured on all insurance policies except workers' compensation and, except for automobile liability, the The Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland's additional insured status shall include premises liability and products/completed operations.

Coverage's shall be primary and non-contributory with respect to any other insurance available to the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its employees, volunteers and officials and shall include a waiver of rights of recovery or subrogation against the Mayor and City Council Town of Ocean City, Maryland, its officials, volunteers and employees without limitation for any and all claims, damages, losses, liabilities or expenses relating to, arising from, resulting from, or alleged to have arisen or resulted from, this private event.

Original copies of certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements must be received by the Town of Ocean City, Maryland's Risk Management Office at least fifteen (15) working days prior to the event.

COCA-COLA EXCLUSIVE PRODUCT AGREEMENT DISCLOSURE: The applicant must comply with all provisions of the Town's agreement with Coca-Cola Refreshments as it pertains to the distribution or sales of beverages by the applicant on Town property. The permitted beverages include Coca-Cola, Diet Coke, Sprite, Pibb Xtra, Mello Yello, Fresca, Nestea, Arizona Tea, Honest Tea, Barqs Root Beer, Fanta, Minute Maid, Seagrams Ginger Ale, PowerAde, V-8 Juice, Fuze Juice, Monster, Tum E Yummies, Dasani and other products that Coca-Cola may provide in accordance with its agreement with the Town of Ocean City.

- BEACH ACCESS: Vehicle access to and from the beach must be clearly identified on your application and is not guaranteed. If approved, applicant must complete a beach driving and safety course annually provided by OCBP at the applicants expense.
- BEAUTY CONTESTS: Beauty contests are not permitted on the beach.
 - CITY SERVICES: Each applicant should plan on providing all the necessary cleanup, set-up, etc. without the assistance of City Services. If town services are requested, they must be clearly indicated within the Private Event Application for evaluation.



CONCESSIONS: No food or beverage concessions will be permitted on the beach or along the boardwalk, although such sales may be considered at other sites. Beverage sales at other sites must maintain compliance with the sponsorship restrictions noted within this application. ONLY event related merchandise sales may be permitted on the beach upon appropriate request and approval, subject to applicable laws.



SPONSORSHIPS: All sponsors must be identified on the application.

ADVERTISING: Ocean City will not allow any type of advertising that is:

- Violence in any form
- False, misleading or deceiving statements
- Sexually explicit or obscene materials
- Tobacco or tobacco products
- Vaping or vaping products
- Tattoos
- Casino gambling including games of chance and skill
- Alcohol
- Promoting the use of marijuana
- Other potentially objectionable marketing or advertising which may be established from time to time by the Town.



DIAGRAM OF EVENT LAYOUT: A detailed diagram of the event layout/set-up and location of any and all facilities is required with your application. The application will be considered incomplete without the diagram.



INFLATABLES: Inflatable displays may be permitted, but must be pre-approved. A photograph of the intended display and the dimensions must be included before approval can be considered. No liquor or tobacco product displays will be allowed. The Mayor and City Council reserve the right to reject any inflatable determined inappropriate.



MUSIC AND PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEMS: Must operate in accordance with the Ocean City Code 30-367 of 65 decibels.



DOWNTOWN EVENTS (BEACH/BOARDWALK): Events that charge participant entry fees (tournaments, festivals, etc.) and/or desire to display sponsorship banners or other promotional information, must maintain a seventy-five (75) foot buffer from the edge of the train lane to the start of the event's set up. All events must comply with the provisions of Chapter 62 of the Ocean City Code.



PARADES: An MDOT Highway Permit must be obtained at (410) 543-6715 for use of any state property, and a copy forwarded to the Town's Private Events Coordinator.



FIREWORKS, TENTS, AIR SUPPORT/AIR INFLATED STRUCTURES & BONFIRES: Application to the City Fire Marshal at (410) 289-8780 is required, with appropriate approvals forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator. Failure to comply will result in revocation of all event approvals.



TOILET FACILITIES: Identification of planned "comfort" provisions must be included in the application and event diagram. The Town owns a number of established public toilet stations in the downtown area that may assist in event planning.



PRIZE STIPULATIONS: No alcoholic beverages may be awarded as a prize on City property.



WEST OCEAN CITY PARK AND RIDE: A permit is required if a trailer or an oversized vehicle is parked over night at the West Ocean City Park and Ride. Please specify this request on your application.



SAMPLING: Sampling will be permitted on a case-by-case basis. Sizes and quantities of such must be pre-approved, as do the locations for distribution. Samples must be of a nationally recognized product available for sale at retail establishments. No prepared food samples will be permitted on the beach nor along the boardwalk. Non-alcoholic beverage samples may be permitted provided the samples are in compliance with the Town of Ocean City's exclusive beverage franchise agreement with Coca-Cola.

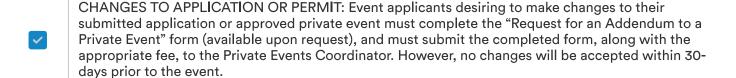


RAFFLES: Only non-profit groups may offer any form of raffle in conjunction with an event in Ocean City. These groups must apply through the Worcester County Department of Development Review and Permitting, and must submit a processing fee at the time of application. Applications are available at the Isle of Wight County Office Building on Route 90, or at the Court House in Snow Hill. A copy of the raffle permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. All raffles must be drawn and announced prior to the conclusion of the event.



TRASH: Applicant is required to clean the area of trash and transport it to the appropriate receptacle. On the beach, all trash must be placed in the appropriate street-end dumpsters. Failure to practice appropriate cleanup procedures may result in the denial of future event requests and/or appropriate billings.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SERVICE: Groups are discouraged from the service of alcoholic beverages at their Ocean City event. However, those that desire such approval must state this clearly on their application. Permission to serve alcoholic beverages shall be granted exclusively by Mayor and City Council. It should be noted that without Council approval, open containers of alcoholic beverages on public property is illegal. Only Worchester County based non-profit groups may request to sell alcoholic beverages at an event, and must obtain a license from the Worcester County Board of License Commissioners. A "One Day Alcohol Permit" application with the Ocean City Mayor's signature must be submitted to the County a minimum of fourteen (14) days prior to the event, along with a the permit fee. Applications are usually available in the Mayor's office at City Hall. A copy of the approved permit must be forwarded to the Private Events Coordinator at least seven (7) days prior to the event. The original permit must be kept on site at the event and must be available to display if required.



LOCAL ORDINANCE DISCLOSURE AND COMPLIANCE: The applicant agrees to comply with the provisions of all applicable ordinances of the Town of Ocean City. Specifically all permitted uses on or within 75 feet of the Boardwalk are required to comply with the provisions of chapter 62 of the Code which expressly prohibits the public sale, rental or exchange for a donation of any goods, wares, merchandise, foodstuffs, refreshments or other commodities or services.

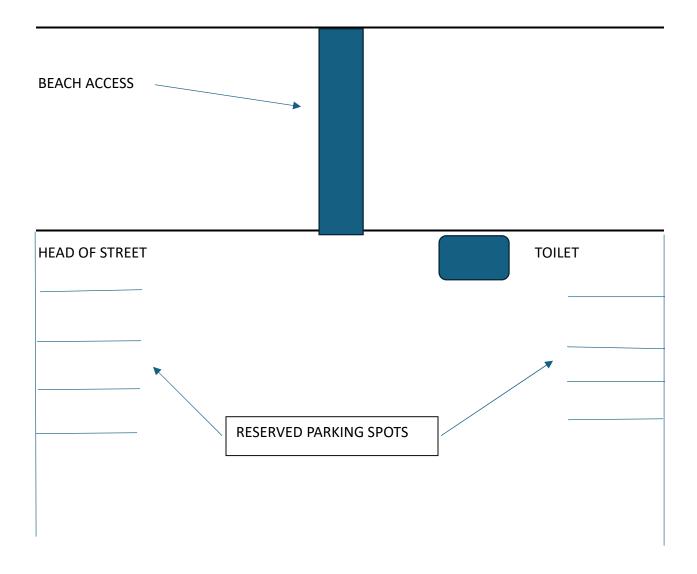

o Thursday through Saturday, May 29-31: (1) 9-11 am, (2) 12-2 pm, (3) 3-5 pm

Show 'n' Shine: Saturday, May 31, 11 am-2 pm in the beach parking footprint. No more than 250 participating Jeeps.

SET-UP: Wednesday, May 28, beginning at 7 am.

TEARDOWN: Sunday, June 1, beginning at 12 pm. Teardown to include the reopening of the event footprint to the public by staging the cones used to create the footprint in the northeast corner of the Inlet Lot.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF EACH PARTY:

Amanda Cropper for OC4WD

- 1. Serve as the event manager.
- Coordinate the events.
- 3. Ensure clearance is high enough that all participants can traverse under the pier.
- 4. Ensure each participating Jeep has valid insurance coverage.
- 5. Create, maintain and secure a Jeep beach course. The primary course design factors will be the safety of the drivers and public.
- 6. Work closely with the Town in regard to the sand course, and make any necessary safety modifications the Town deems necessary.
- 7. Have dedicated staff monitor the entire beach drive path and the Sand Course for the entirety of the events.
- 8. Contact the affected Beach Stand Operators twice, advising about the event: Once after the event is approved by Council and a second time one (1) week prior to the event.
- 9. Release Jeeps in the Sand Course in groups to both enter and exit the beach. There is not to be a constant flow of vehicles on the beach.

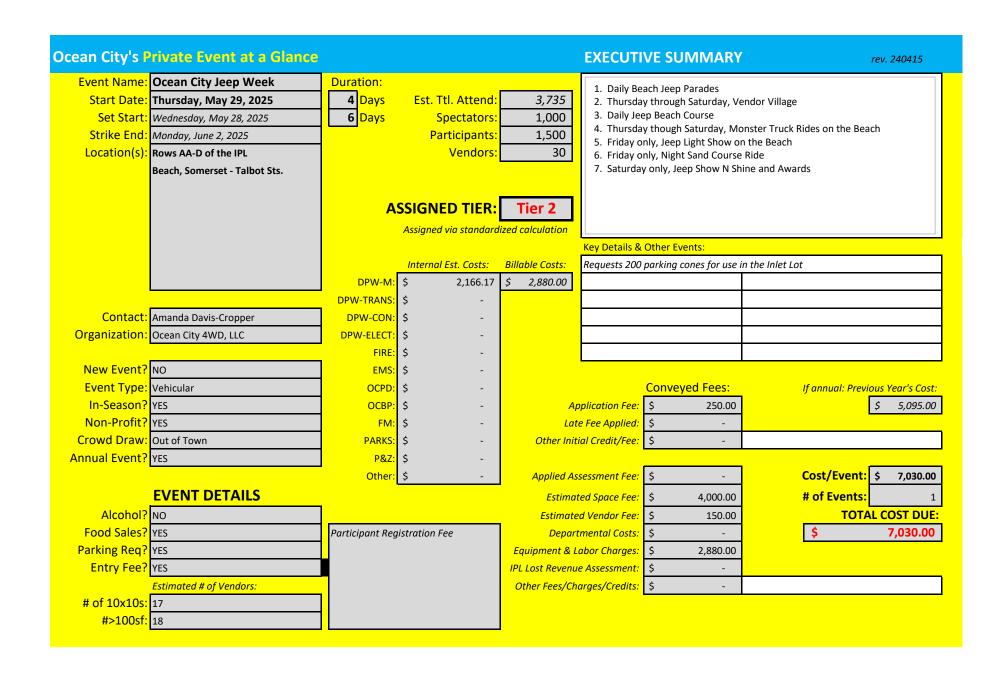
- 10. Return the beach to the same condition it was previously, prior to the creation of the beach course, and the inflation/deflation and Jeep inspection area.
- 11. Ensure the area around "Wally Whale" is monitored and kept clear to prevent damage to the structure during staging for the sand course as well as the actual event series.
- 12. Inspect all Jeeps participating for fluid leaks, not allowing access to the beach if one is found.
- 13. Provide a hazardous spill procedure to the Town's Private Event Coordinator.
- 14. Post informational signs at each beach entrance to the parade route and beach course 24-hours in advance of the event.
- 15. If the beach is cleared, event staff, participants and spectators must leave the beach until Beach Patrol (OCBP) gives the "all clear."
- 16. Provide the Certificate of Insurance to include coverage for personal injury in the amount of \$1M per occurrence, \$2M aggregate, and name the Mayor and City Council as additional insured and certificate holder. Provided coverage shall be primary, non-contributory, and without regard to the named insured's fault or lack thereof.
- 17. Abide by all Guidelines and Obligations listed on the Private Event Application, unless otherwise noted in this permit.

- 1. OCBP shall provide personnel for each parade.
- 2. Public Works (DPW) shall block off rows AA through D in the Inlet Lot for event use.

2025-05 which established a moratorium on the issuance of new short-term rental licenses in R-1 and MH districts to allow the new owner, based on a bonified purchase of the property, that has an existing rental license, the ability to apply for a rental license and the supplementary short-term rental license. If obtained, and as amended on first reading, the license is only valid for the remainder of the *calendar* year.

SUMMARY: Ordinance 2025-05, passed as an emergency, established a

Moratorium on the issuance of new short-term rental license in R-1 and MH districts. At the February 18, 2025, Regular Meeting, Council shared concerns received from rental offices regarding owners who want to sell their property that has rental reservations and rental income already on the books. Ordinance 2025-05, as written, includes that a rental license does not transfer with the property; however, a request can be submitted to the City Manager to permit any exception to the moratorium if a property is impacted by the death of the property owner that would cause and/or create the need to a change in ownership of a property with a supplementary short-term rental license issued prior to death. On February 18, the Council unanimously agreed to modify moratorium language to allow a new owner the ability to apply for a rental license if a property is sold and has an existing rental license.

At the March 3, 2025, Regular Meeting, Council unanimously agreed to modify moratorium language to replace *license year*

with calendar year in section 1(d)(ii).

A property in the R-1 Single Family Residential or in the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts that is impacted by the death of the property owner that would cause and/or create the need for a change in ownership of the property, and for which a supplementary short-term rental license was issued prior to the death and pursuant with subsections (b) and (c) above, may submit a request to the Town for consideration by the City Manager to permit any exception to this Moratorium.
 - ii. For calendar year 2025, if a property in the R-1 Single Family Residential or in the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts that has an existing rental license is sold, with settlement occurring before December 31, 2025, the buyer of said property may apply for a rental license and the supplementary short-term rental license, subject to all applicable codes, and if obtained, the license is valid for the remainder of the calendar year.
 - iii. Nothing contained herein should be deemed inconsistent with Town Code Section 14-174 (k).
- 2. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Amendment to the Moratorium shall be effective immediately upon the adoption of this Ordinance.

Notwithstanding subsection (a) above, property owners in the R-1 Single Family Residential and the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts who have a current rental license which was issued for the 2024 license year (May 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025), may apply for a rental license and the supplementary short-term rental license, for the 2025 license year (May 1, 2025 through April 30, 2026), subject to all applicable Town Code sections.
- d. Under this Moratorium, no supplementary short-term rental licenses in the R-1 Single Family Residential and in the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts shall be issued based on the sale, transfer or other change in ownership of the property regardless of whether the property has a 2025 license pursuant to subsections (b) and (c) above. However, a property in the R-1 Single Family Residential or in the MH Mobile Home Residential Districts that is impacted by the death of the property owner that would cause and/or create the need for a change in ownership of the property, and for which a supplementary short-term rental license was issued prior to the death and pursuant with subsections (b) and (c) above, may submit a request to the Town for consideration by the City Manager to permit any exception to this Moratorium.
- 2. <u>Further Consideration by the Mayor and City Council.</u> This Moratorium shall be placed on a Mayor and City Council Work Session agenda no later than October 28, 2025, where public comment will be taken at the start of the meeting to consider how best to proceed for 2026 and years that follow.
- 3. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Moratorium shall be effective immediately upon the adoption of this Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 90, ENTITLED TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND

ORDINANCE 2025 -

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY THAT CHAPTER 90, ENTITLED TRAFFIC AND VEHICLES, OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND BE, AND IT IS HEREBY, AMENDED BY AMENDING ARTICLE IV, ENTITLED PARKING, STOPPING AND STANDING, SECTION 90-136; AND ARTICLE VI, ENTITLED TOWING OF VEHICLES, SECTION 90-263, AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE IV. - PARKING, STOPPING AND STANDING

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 90-136. - Violations and penalties.

- (a) Penalties; waiver of trial.
 - (1) Any offender violating any of the provisions of this <u>Aa</u>rticle or committing any of the acts herein declared to be unlawful shall, upon conviction thereof, by a court of competent jurisdiction, be deemed guilty of an offense classified as a municipal infraction. Any person charged with the offense under this Article may request a trial by mail or in person for the parking violations, or waive the trial and prepay the fine or penalty in the amount as follows:
 - a. Violation of parking meter regulations: \$50.00.
 - b. Violation of prohibition of parking within designated areas near fire hydrants: \$100.00. This fine shall be doubled if the violation occurs during a Special Event designated by Resolution, which may be amended from time to time, or during a designated "Special Event Zone" within the Town.

- c. Violation of designated handicapped parking space: \$250.00, provided that the stated fine is posted on the handicapped sign.
 - 1. If the registered owner of a handicap placard fails to display it from their rearview mirror and subsequently receives a summons for this offense and can provide proof they were an occupant in the parked vehicle, an administrative fee of \$25.00 may be paid in lieu of the fine for the first such occurrence.
- d. Violation of parking a trailer or oversized vehicle on Baltimore Avenue at any time of the year: \$250.00.
- e. Violation of parking a trailer or oversized vehicle without a permit on any municipal parking lot, any public street or alley or any public way within the corporate limits of Ocean City from May 1 through October 31 of each year: \$250.00.
- f. Parking or causing to be parked a non-governmental or non-emergency vehicle on Somerset Street from Baltimore Avenue east to the boardwalk without a permit issued by the City Manager: \$250.00.
- g. Parking or causing to be parked a non-governmental or non-emergency vehicle on South Division Street from Philadelphia Avenue west to the bay without a permit issued by the City Manager: \$250.00.
- h. Parking or causing to be parked a non-governmental or non-emergency vehicle on South First Street between Baltimore Avenue and the boardwalk without a permit issued by the City Manager: \$250.00.
- i. Parking or causing to be parked a charter bus as defined in section 102-82 without the proper permit: \$100.00.
- j. All other violations of this article: \$50.00. This fine shall be doubled if the violation occurs during a Special Event designated by Resolution, which may be amended from time to time, or during a designated "Special Event Zone" within the Town.
- (2) Such waivers shall be done by so indicating on the summons issued to the offender and returning the same to the Ocean City Police Department paid in full, or by mailing said summons along with a money order in the amount of the prepaid fine, or by paying the outstanding fine through the City's online payment portal at least five days before the trial date noted on said summons, and in such event, the offender shall not be required to stand trial and shall be deemed to have, by such waiver and prepayment, admitted to have committed the offense charged. Summonses, in lieu of custodial apprehension, are hereby authorized.
- (b) Each 12-hour period of time from the original violation shall be a separate additional violation.
- (c) In addition to the fines hereinabove stated, any fine not paid within 30 days shall be doubled, and if not paid within 30 days of the doubling shall be subject to an additional \$20.00 administrative fee.
- (d) Scofflaw; towing of vehicles.

- (1) A scofflaw is any person offender who has received three or more unpaid tickets or unpaid tickets totaling \$100.00 \$250.00 or more, that are 14 days overdue without a request for a trial, or if a trial was requested, found guilty but the fine remains unpaid.
- (2) A scofflaw's vehicle shall be deemed a public nuisance, and the police department and or Parking Division of the Public Works Department for the Town of Ocean City are authorized to disable the vehicle with a tire locking device (boot), remove or cause to be removed said vehicle to the eity Town's impound lot and stored at the scofflaw's sole cost and expense. Vehicles with three or more unpaid parking citations or unpaid parking citations totaling \$100.00 or more that are 14 days overdue without a request for a trial, or if a trial was requested, found guilty but the fine remains unpaid may be booted after their owners receive a series of notices. If a vehicle is booted, the owner must pay the total amount due, including all fees, fines and penalties, before the boot can be removed, including a \$150.00 boot fee.
- (3) As soon as reasonably possible, within five days at best, after it impounds or boots a vehicle, the police department shall send notice, by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, to the last-known registered owner of the vehicle, a notice containing the following:
 - a. State that the vehicle has been impounded or booted;
 - b. Describe the year, make, model and vehicle identification number of the vehicle;
 - c. Give the location of the booted vehicle or facility where the vehicle is held;
 - d. Inform the owner of the owner's right to reclaim the vehicle within three weeks after the date of the notice, upon payment of all fines, penalties and towing, preservation and storage charges resulting from impounding or booting the vehicle;
 - e. State that the failure of the owner to exercise this right in the time provided is:
 - i. A waiver by the owner of all rights, title and interest in the vehicle.
 - ii. A consent to the sale of the vehicle at public auction.
- (4) The vehicle owner shall have the right to request a hearing before a tow hearing officer, if said request is made within 15 days of receipt of the aforesaid notice, to challenge whether the vehicle owner is a scofflaw; provided, however, that such a hearing is not a belated trial on the merits of the tickets themselves. The hearing before the tow hearing officer shall be held within seven days of the request.
- (e) In addition to the fines and penalties herein described the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City may avail itself of any and all civil and equitable remedies for the purpose of stopping any continuing offenses of this article.

Sec. 90-263. - Towing and impoundment authorized; collection of expenses.

The police department or Parking Division of the Public Works Department may take into custody any vehicle which is abandoned or disabled within the Ttown, parked in or obstructing a fire lane or parking or standing within 15 feet of a fire hydrant. Such vehicle shall be towed to the Ttown's impoundment lot. For this purpose, the police department and the Public Works Department may employ its own personnel or equipment or may hire persons, a towing company, equipment, and facilities for removing, preserving, and storing said vehicles. The vehicle owner of any vehicle which has been towed pursuant to this division shall reimburse the Mmayor and Ceity Ceouncil of Ocean City for all expenses incurred by it in the towing and storage of such vehicle in an amount no greater than permitted by the maximum tow charges as set forth by resolution and amended from time to time, as well as the administrative fee.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING LOCATIONS FOR PAID PARKING ON STREETS AND MUNICIPAL PARKING LOTS

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council has the authority to establish the locations for paid parking on streets and municipal lots by Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Appendix A attached hereto sets forth the current paid parking locations and shall be known as "Paid Parking Locations – Appendix A"; and

WHEREAS, there have been numerous ordinances prior to March 2025, which set forth the locations of paid parking on streets and municipal lots; and

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the Mayor and City Council that this Ordinance supersedes all prior Ordinances establishing the locations for paid parking; and

WHEREAS, if the Mayor and City Council desire to change the locations of paid parking subsequent to the passage of this Ordinance, the applicable appendix attached hereto should be modified by Ordinance.

Whenever any words and phrases are used in this chapter, the meanings respectively ascribed to them in Ann. Code of Md., Transportation article, § 21-101, shall be deemed to apply to such words and phrases used herein. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Commission means the traffic commission.

Department means the police department of Ocean City, Maryland.

Driveways means those areas of curb cuts designating such area to be the exit or entrance to a property with the size location and quality approved by the city engineer. No other area shall be considered a driveway.

Fire lane means a fire department access road, lane, or area for use by the fire department and other emergency vehicles that is marked with signs, road surface markings, curb markings, or other approved notices and located on public or private property.

<u>Paid Parking</u> means parking for which the Town requires payment and shall be read in place of the following terms: "Parking Meter", "Parking Meters", "Metered Parking", "Metered Space", or "Machine Metered Parking" as used in this Chapter.

Regulation means any regulation of traffic formally promulgated by the commission as herein specified.

Streets means any and all streets, public ways, alleys, avenues (including Atlantic Avenue), pikes, thoroughfares, highways, etc., over which Ocean City is authorized to exercise control or to share in said control.

Temporary regulation means a regulation promulgated by the commission which terminates on a date specifically written in said regulation.

Timed parking zones means zones of parking in which vehicles are only permitted to park for a specified time duration or zones of parking in which vehicles are only allowed to park during specific periods of time, or any combination of said two such limitations.

Traffic commission means the Ocean City Police Commission established pursuant to section C-413 of the Charter of the Town of Ocean City.

Trailer means a vehicle that has no motive power, is designed to carry people or property and be towed by a motor vehicle, and is constructed so that no part of its weight rests on the towing vehicle.

ISSUE(S): First Reading - Ordinance 2025-10 FY 25 Budget Amendment

#1

SUMMARY: First Reading - Ordinance 2025-10 Budget Amendment #1

reduces revenue estimates for Room Tax, Income Tax and Parking by a total of \$670,827. Prior year reserves are increased to bring forward funds for prior year purchase orders and prior year advertising funds. New grant revenue and prior year project balances have been added to the budget. Funds to purchase a replacement ambulance, cover health insurance increases and fund repairs to the Tarry Awhile have been included. Funding for the repair of the 17th street bulkhead have been transferred from Public Works operations to a capital project account. In funds other than the General Fund, revenue and expenses have been reviewed and adjusted and purchases approved by the Council have been added to the

budget.

FISCAL IMPACT: The estimated amount required from prior year reserves (fund

balance) increases from \$4,726,654 to \$6,745,099, an increase of \$2,018,445. Prior year advertising funds and prior year purchase orders account for \$2,878,846. These expenses were designated as "Assigned" in the Town's FY 24 Annual Financial report and are not part of the \$24,276,671 indicated as Unassigned Fund Balance. An additional \$3,679,592 is shown as assigned fund balance in the FY 24 annual Financial report. The FY 25 adopted budget utilized \$600,401 of those funds to cover the estimated pension increase. As the actuarial recommendation for pension funding was under the budgeted amount, these funds have been returned to fund balance for use in future years. An additional \$260,000 was added back to fund balance as an adjustment to Room Tax

revenue.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Ordinance 2025-10 on first reading.

ISSUE(S): First Reading - Ordinance 2025-11 to establish regulations for

> profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials forward-facing businesses throughout the Town including fronting on Atlantic Avenue (Boardwalk) as discussed

at the February 25, 2025, Work Session.

SUMMARY: Ordinance 2025-11 is presented based on Council's unanimous

decision to protect minors from being subjected to profane, obscene, sexually explicit or vulgar merchandise and materials as they visit the Town, including the Boardwalk. This ordinance strikes a balance which does not violate First Amendment rights while protecting the Town's most vulnerable residents and visitors. As approved at the February 25, 2025, Work Session, this ordinance: 1) makes the visual display of profane, obscene, sexually explicit or vulgar materials and merchandise prohibited unless such material and merchandise is confined to an area of the business establishment that cannot be viewed from outside the business establishment; and 2) requires a business owner who displays profane, obscene, sexually explicit or vulgar material and merchandise to display a clearly legible sign or signs as necessary to notify anyone entering an area where such materials

merchandise is displayed.

ORDINANCE 2025-

ORDINANCE TO ENACT CHAPTER 59, ENTITLED "PROFANE, OBSCENE, SEXUALLY EXPLICIT AND VULGAR MERCHANDISE AND MATERIALS" OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND

WHEREAS, the Council of Ocean City has the authority pursuant to Town Charter Section C-414 to pass ordinances as it may deem necessary for the protection and promotion of the health, safety, comfort and welfare of its residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, the Council of Ocean City additionally has the authority pursuant to Town Charter Section C-414(48) to "prohibit, suppress and punish within the Town ... all disorder, disturbances, annoyances, disorderly conduct, obscenity [and], public profanity..."; and

WHEREAS, the Town Code in its current form does not adequately protect minors from exposure to profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council and Town staff, including the Ocean City Police Department, have received complaints regarding profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials that can be easily viewed by minors without having to enter a business establishment; and

WHEREAS, is it just and proper that the Mayor and City Council enact this Ordinance, and its findings and purposes are as stated below.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY THAT CHAPTER 59, ENTITLED "PROFANE, OBSCENE, SEXUALLY EXPLICIT AND VULGAR MERCHANDISE AND MATERIALS" BE ENACTED AS PART OF THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF OCEAN CITY, MARYLAND, AS FOLLOWS:

CHAPTER 59 - PROFANE, OBSCENE, SEXUALLY EXPLICIT AND VULGAR MERCHANDISE AND MATERIALS

Sec. 59-1. Purpose and findings.

(a) *Purpose*. The purpose of this chapter is to regulate the public display of merchandise and materials which graphically depict or describe profanity, obscenity, vulgarity and/or is sexually explicit in order to promote the health, safety, morals, and general welfare of the citizens of the Town and its visitors, and to establish reasonable and uniform regulations. The provisions of this chapter have neither the purpose nor effect of imposing a restriction or a denial of access by adults to merchandise and materials protected by the First Amendment, or a denial of access by the distributors and exhibitors of profane, obscene,

This chapter does not seek to ban any business from carrying or selling obscene, profane, sexually explicit or vulgar merchandise and materials, as may otherwise be permitted by law, but instead regulates the current unrestricted public display of such merchandise and materials to protect the Town's community standards and minors.

(b) Findings. The Mayor and City Council, Town staff, and the Ocean City Police Department have been consistently contacted by concerned residents and visitors regarding the profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials that are forward-facing and/or easily viewed on the Boardwalk and at other businesses within Town. The volume of forward-facing and easily viewed profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials on display in Town businesses is not decreasing. The resident and citizen complaints that have been received most often indicate that they do not intend to return to the Town and/or the Boardwalk given the nature of the obscene, profane, sexually explicit or vulgar merchandise and materials they have viewed without ever having entered a business. The complaints further express the concern of parents/guardians who have been forced to confront and explain such merchandise and materials to their children and who have reported great offense and sensitivity to the merchandise and materials as described herein. The Mayor and City Council, individually and as representatives of the community and residents of the Town, have likewise expressed their offense, concern and objection to the merchandise and materials described herein when capable of being viewed by minors without warning.

The Mayor and City Council have reviewed emails evidencing complaints regarding the visibility of the merchandise and material described herein. The Mayor and City Council have also reviewed a representative sampling of 36 pages of merchandise and materials on display which depict obscenity, profanity, sexually explicit and vulgar content. The Mayor and City Council have listened to and reviewed a sampling of the words and phrases which appear on display, and which are on merchandise and materials that, in context, are obscene, profane, sexually explicit and/or vulgar. All of the pictures, words and phrases can easily be viewed from the displays of businesses by any passerby on the Boardwalk and other Town public ways.

Upon consideration of the evidence before it, the Mayor and City Council finds:

(1) The 38 pages of pictures and words/phrases presented to the Mayor and City Council in consideration of this ordinance are accepted, adopted and incorporated herein. The Mayor and City Council finds that such content is and/or depicts profane, obscene, sexually explicit and/or vulgar merchandise and materials as described and defined herein and is widely visible to minors passing by. The pictures and list of words/phrases which support these findings are available for inspection and copying at the Office of the Town Clerk, located at 301 N. Baltimore Avenue, Ocean City, Maryland 21842.

- (2) The "Whereas" clauses of this Ordinance are incorporated herein and made a part hereto.
- (3) Minors are confronted daily by the public display of merchandise and materials which graphically depict or describe profanity, obscenity, sexually explicit images or descriptions and/or vulgarity. Such merchandise and materials are inappropriate for viewing on storefronts and are harmful to minors.
- (4) By enacting this chapter, it is the intent of the Town to aid parents in the exercise of their primary responsibility for the health and welfare of their children and to help protect the physical and psychological well-being of minors by shielding minors from the harmful influences of exposure to such merchandise and materials in businesses which are open to the general public. Parents and guardians have a fundamental right to guide the moral and educational upbringing of their children, and the Town supports their ability to shield minors from content deemed inappropriate for their age group.
- (5) The protection of minors from exposure to profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials is a compelling government interest in promoting minors' physical, mental, and emotional well-being.
- (6) Public spaces are intended to be safe and appropriate for individuals of all ages, including children, and should not be places where minors are inadvertently exposed to materials that may be harmful to their development. The unrestricted display of profane, obscene, sexually explicit and/or vulgar merchandise and materials in public settings contributes to the desensitization of minors to inappropriate merchandise and materials and undermines societal standards of decency and public order.
- (7) Courts have recognized the government's authority to regulate the exposure of minors to harmful materials without infringing upon constitutional rights, provided that such regulations are narrowly tailored to serve a compelling governmental interest. Additionally, protecting the public sensibilities is an important governmental interest.
- (8) Regulating access to profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and materials in a public setting does not impede lawful access for adults but rather ensures that such content is accessed in private or age-appropriate settings. The regulations of such merchandise and materials in public spaces align with existing State and Federal laws prohibiting the distribution of obscene or harmful content to minors and supports community standards for public decency.
- (9) The regulations set forth herein have been carefully considered by the Mayor and City Council and seek to balance First Amendment rights,

- with the Town's interest in maintaining public decency and protecting minors from exposure to potentially harmful content.
- (10) The Town relies heavily on tourism and hosts approximately 8,000,000 visitors annually. The proliferation of profane, obscene, sexually explicit and/or vulgar merchandise and materials could negatively impact the Town's reputation, potentially discouraging family-oriented tourists and failure to impose reasonable restrictions may lead to increased public complaints, potential legal liabilities, and a deterioration of the family-friendly nature of the Town of Ocean City.

Sec. 59-2. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Child, children or minor means any person under the age of eighteen.

Merchandise or Materials means, without limitation, any banner, button, clothing (including hats), figurine, game, greeting card, magnet, photograph, postcard, novelty item, poster, souvenir, sticker, towel or similar item, whether or not the item is offered for sale.

Profane means grossly offensive language or images that lack serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value in a given context, and includes but is not limited to expletives that are likely to cause a public nuisance, disturb public order or be inappropriate for minors.

Obscene means materials which:

- (i) The average person, applying contemporary community standards, would find, taken as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest; and
- (ii) Depicts or describes, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct as specifically defined herein; and
- (iii) Taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value.
- (iv) The breastfeeding of a baby shall not be considered obscene in any circumstance.

Sexually explicit means any merchandise or materials which graphically depict or describe human or animal sexual activities or bodily organs. This shall include any depiction or description, by pictorial representation or language, of any sexual intercourse; masturbation; sadomasochistic abuse; sexual penetration with an inanimate object; sodomy; bestiality; uncovered genitals, defecation or urination; covered genitals in an obvious state of sexual stimulation or arousal; and/or the

description of excretory functions as part of, or in connection with, any sexual activity.

Vulgar means any grossly offensive language or pictorial representations of words printed on merchandise or materials that are considered a public nuisance. Vulgar language includes words or expressions that are used to denigrate and insult one's racial or ethnic background, gender or sexual orientation. Vulgar merchandise or materials can also portray sexual or excretory organs or activities in a way that is patently offensive but does not meet the definition for obscenity.

Sec. 59-3. Display of profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and material.

- (1) *Display*. It shall be unlawful for any business to display profane, obscene, sexually explicit and/or vulgar merchandise or material unless such merchandise and/or material is confined to an area of the establishment that cannot be viewed from outside the business.
- (2) Signage required. Any business who displays profane, obscene, sexually explicit and/or vulgar merchandise or material shall prominently display a clearly legible sign (or signs as necessary) to notify anyone entering an area where such merchandise and material is displayed that profane, obscene, sexually explicit and vulgar merchandise and material is displayed. Such sign(s) shall have a white background with the text in block letters no less than one inch in height which shall be black in color.
- (3) State and local law not superseded. This section shall not be deemed to supersede or conflict with Title 11 of the Criminal Law Article of the Annotated Code of Maryland or Article VIII of Chapter 14 of this Code.

Sec. 59-4. Violations.

Any person found to be in violation of a provision of this chapter shall be subject to the following:

- (a) The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$500.00 for the initial violation. The violator will be ordered that he/she has until no later than the next morning when they are open for business to relocate the merchandise and/or materials which have resulted in the violation.
- (b) The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$1,000.00 for the second violation. The violator will be ordered that he/she has until no later than the next morning when they are open for business to relocate the merchandise and/or materials which have resulted in the violation.
- (c) Any further violations shall result in additional municipal infractions and shall result in the suspension or revocation of the applicable business license at the discretion of the City Manager and pursuant to Section 14-38 of the Code.

Discussion on display of obscene, vulgar and profane material

Background

- Elected officials, Town staff and OCDC have received complaints about the obscenity, vulgarity and profanity facing Atlantic Avenue/the Boardwalk either from an outdoor display or by a display that can be viewed by the public directly inside of a store.
- Ocean City is a family friendly resort town where residents and visitors alike walk the Boardwalk throughout the year.
- Millions of visitors visit the Boardwalk each year.
- Minors are confronted by the public display and sale of merchandise which graphically depicts or describes (1) obscenities, (2) sexual activities or organs in an indecent manner, (3) profanity, and (4) vulgarity, which is harmful.
- Legal Counsel, working with Town Staff, have reviewed the Code, the law, the actual
 displays on the Boardwalk and the merchandise that can be easily viewed inside of a
 store. Pictures of examples of obscenity, sexually explicit, vulgarity and profanity that
 exists on the Boardwalk will be presented at the Work Session (but given the graphic
 nature) has not been published in the packet.
- To address these issues described herein, the framework below is being proposed to create a workable and enforceable ordinance.

Current Code and Law

- The current code and charter recognize that the Mayor and City Council can police obscenity and public profanity and prohibit from an outdoor display the promotion of alcohol and cannabis, illegal drugs and paraphernalia, tobacco products, firearms, knives, offensive adult materials, products containing or displaying profanity, sexually explicit messages, or obscenity. See Charter Section 414(48) and Code Sections 110-884(23) and 110-885(f).
- Obscenity is not protected by the First Amendment. The U.S. Supreme Court established the test that judges and juries use to determine whether matter is obscene in three major cases: *Miller v. California*, 413 U.S. 15, 24-25 (1973); *Smith v. United States*, 431 U.S. 291, 300-02, 309 (1977); and *Pope v. Illinois*, 481 U.S. 497, 500-01 (1987). The three-pronged *Miller* test is as follows:
 - Whether the average person, applying contemporary adult community standards, finds that the matter, taken as a whole, appeals to prurient interests (*i.e.*, an erotic, lascivious, abnormal, unhealthy, degrading, shameful, or morbid interest in nudity, sex, or excretion);
 - Whether the average person, applying contemporary adult community standards, finds that the matter depicts or describes sexual conduct in a patently offensive way (*i.e.*, ultimate sexual acts, normal or perverted, actual or simulated, masturbation, excretory functions, lewd exhibition of the genitals, or sadomasochistic sexual abuse); and
 - Whether a reasonable person finds that the matter, taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value.

- Any material that satisfies this three-pronged test may be found obscene.
- Profanity can be considered free speech protected by the First Amendment however, government can limit profanity in some instances.
- Vulgarity can be considered free speech protected by the First Amendment however, government can limit vulgarity in some instances.
- Mayor and City Council have the power and the duty to provide "for the preservation of peace and good order; for securing persons and property from violence, danger or destruction; and for the protection and promotion of the health, safety, comfort, convenience, welfare and happiness of the residents of the town and visitors…".
- It has been difficult and onerous on Town Staff to enforce the provisions of the current code while adhering to federal law which is often changing.
- A balance must be struck between the First Amendment and ability of a government to shield and protect minors.

Proposed definitions to include:

- 1. Obscene materials and merchandise
- 2. Vulgar materials and merchandise
- 3. Sexually oriented materials and merchandise
- 4. Profane materials and merchandise

Proposed prohibitions:

- 1. To make the open display of obscene, vulgar, sexually oriented or profane materials and merchandise prohibited unless such material and merchandise is confined to an area of the business establishment that cannot be viewed from outside the business establishment.
- 2. To require a business owner who displays obscene, vulgar, sexually oriented or profane material and merchandise to display a clearly legible sign or signs as necessary to notify anyone entering an area where such merchandise is displayed that obscene, vulgar, sexually oriented or profane merchandise is displayed.

Proposed penalties:

- 1. The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$500.00 for the initial violation.
- 2. The business owner may be issued a municipal infraction with a fine of \$1,000.00 for the second violation.
- 3. On the third violation, the City Manager shall have the ability to suspend to revoke the violator's business license as set forth in <u>section 14-38</u> (Section 14-38 would be amended to as needed).

§ C-414. - Powers of Council enumerated. (181)

The Council shall have the power to pass all such ordinances not contrary to the Constitution and laws of the State of Maryland or this Charter as it may deem necessary for the good government of the town; for the protection and preservation of the town's property, rights and privileges; for the preservation of peace and good order; for securing persons and property from violence, danger or destruction; and for the protection and promotion of the health, safety, comfort, convenience, welfare and happiness of the residents of the town and visitors thereto and sojourners therein.

The Council shall have, in addition, the power to pass ordinances not contrary to the laws and Constitution of this State, for the following specific purposes:

- (1) Advertising—To provide for advertising for the purposes of the town, for printing and publishing statements as to the business of the town.
- (2) Agreement or contracts—To enter into agreements with the United States Corps of Engineers of [or] any other governmental body or agency or any other body politic or political subdivisions for the maintenance of dune lines or any other purpose.
- (3) Aisles—To regulate and prevent the obstruction of aisles in public halls, churches and places of amusements, and to regulate the construction and operation of the doors and means of egress therefrom.
- (4) *Amusements*—To provide in the interest of the public welfare for licensing, regulating or restraining theatrical or other public amusements.
- (5) Appropriations—To appropriate municipal monies for any purpose within the powers of the Council.
- (6) Auctioneers—To regulate the sale of all kinds of property at auction within the town and to license auctioneers.
- (7) Band—To establish a municipal band, symphony orchestra or other musical organization, and to regulate by ordinance the conduct and policies thereof.
- (8) Beaches—To license, tax and regulate all activities whatsoever on, or from, the public beaches, and, at its discretion, to permit buildings of public accommodation to be erected thereon, including the right to build restrooms thereon.
- (9) *Billboards*—To license, tax and regulate, restrain or prohibit the erection or maintenance of billboards within the City, the placing of signs, bills and posters of every kind and description on any building, fence, post, billboard, pole, or other place within the town, and to phase out, within a reasonable time, nonconforming signs.
- (10) Bridges—To erect and maintain bridges.
- (11) Buildings—To make reasonable regulations in regard to buildings and signs to be erected, constructed or reconstructed in the town, and to grant building permits for the same; to formulate a building code, a plumbing code and an electrical code and to appoint a building inspector, a plumbing inspector and an electrical inspector, and to require reasonable charges for permits and inspections; to authorize and require the inspection of all buildings and structures and to authorize the condemnation thereof in whole or in part when dangerous or insecure, and to require that such buildings and structures be made safe or be taken down.
- (12) Cemeteries—To regulate or prohibit the interment of bodies within the municipality and to regulate cemeteries.
- (13) Codification—To provide for the codification of all ordinances which have been or may hereafter be passed.
- (14) *Community services*—To provide, maintain and operate community and social services for the preservation and promotion of the health, recreation, welfare and enlightenment of the inhabitants of the town.
- (15) *Cooperative activities*—To make agreements with other municipalities, counties, districts, bureaus, commissions and governmental authorities for the joint performance of or for cooperation in the performance of any governmental functions.

Curfew—To prohibit the youth of the town from being in the streets, lanes, alleys or public places at unreasonable hours of the night.

- (17) Dangerous conditions—To compel persons about to undertake dangerous improvements to execute bonds with sufficient sureties conditioned that the owner or contractor will pay all damages resulting from such work which may be sustained by any persons or property.
- (18) Departments—To create, change and abolish offices, departments or agencies, other than the offices, departments and agencies established by this Charter; to assign additional functions or duties to offices, departments or agencies established by this Charter, but not including the power to discontinue or assign to any other office, department or agency any function or duty assigned by this Charter to a particular office, department or agency.
- (19) Disorderly houses—To suppress bawdy houses, disorderly houses and houses of ill fame.
- (20) *Dogs*—To regulate the keeping of dogs in the town and to provide, wherever the county does not license or tax dogs, for the licensing and taxing of the same; to provide for the disposition of homeless dogs and dogs on which no license fee or taxes are paid.
- (21) *Elevators*—To require the inspection and licensing of elevators and to prohibit their use when unsafe or dangerous or without a license.
- (22) Explosives—To regulate or prevent the storage of gunpowder, oil or any other explosive or combustible matter; to regulate or prevent the use of firearms, fireworks, bonfires, explosives, or any other similar things which may endanger persons or property.
- (23) Filth—To compel the occupant of any premises, building or outhouse situated in the town, when the same has become filthy or unwholesome, to abate or cleanse the condition; and after reasonable notice to the owners or occupants thereof, to authorize such work to be done by the proper officers and to assess the expense thereof against such property, making it collectible by taxes or against the occupant or occupants.
- (24) Finances—To levy, assess and collect ad valorem property taxes, and general fund, real and personal property taxes and metered flow and/or front footage water and/or sewage benefit charges, or per fixture charges for water and/or sewage; to expend municipal funds for any public purpose; to have general management and control of the finances of the town.
- (25) Fire—To suppress fires and prevent the dangers thereof and to establish and maintain a fire department; to contribute funds to volunteer fire companies serving the town; to inspect buildings for the purpose of reducing fire hazards; to issue regulations concerning fire hazards, and to forbid and prohibit the use of fire-hazardous buildings and structures permanently or until the conditions of the town fire-hazard regulations are met; to install and maintain fire plugs where and as necessary, and to regulate their use; and to take all other measures necessary to control and prevent fires in the town.
- (26) *Food*—To inspect and to require the condemnation of, if unwholesome, and to regulate the sale of, any food products.
- (27) Franchises—To grant and regulate franchises to water companies, electric light companies, gas companies, telegraph and telephone companies, transit companies, taxicab companies, public or privately owned convention halls, and any others which may be deemed advantageous and beneficial to the town, subject, however, to the limitations and provisions of Ann. Code of Md., art. 23. No franchise shall be granted for a longer period than fifty (50) years.
- (28) Gambling—To restrain and prohibit gambling.
- (29) *Garbage*—To prevent the deposit of any unwholesome substance either on private or public property, and to compel its removal to designated points; to require slops, garbage, ashes and other waste or other unwholesome materials to be removed to designated points, or to require the occupants of the premises to place them conveniently for removal.

- (30) *Grants-in-aid*—To accept gifts and grants of federal or of State funds from the Federal or State governments or any agency thereof, and to expend the same for any lawful public purpose, agreeable to the conditions under which the gifts or grants were made.
- (31) *Hawkers*—To license, tax, regulate, suppress and prohibit hawkers and itinerant dealers, peddlers, pawnbrokers and all other persons selling any articles on the streets of the town, and to revoke such licenses for cause.
- (32) Health—To protect and preserve the health of the town and its inhabitants; to appoint a public health officer and to define and regulate his powers and duties; to prevent the introduction of contagious diseases into the town; to establish quarantine regulations, and to authorize the removal and confinement of persons having contagious or infectious diseases; to prevent and remove all nuisances; to inspect, regulate, and abate any buildings, structures, or places which cause or may cause unsanitary conditions or conditions detrimental to health provided, that nothing herein shall be construed to affect in any manner any of the powers and duties of the State Board of Health, the County Board of Health, or any public general or local law relating to the subject of health.
- (33) House numbers—To regulate the numbering of houses and lots and to compel owners to renumber the same or, in default thereof, to authorize and require the same to be done by the town at the owner's expense, such expense to constitute a lien upon the property collectible as tax monies.
- (34) *Jail*—To establish and regulate a station house or lock-up for temporary confinement of violators of the laws and ordinances of the town or to use the county jail for such purpose.
- (35) Licenses—Subject to any restrictions imposed by the public general laws of the State, to license and regulate all persons beginning or conducting transient or permanent business in the town or on property owned by the town for the sale of any goods, wares, merchandise or services; to license and regulate any business, occupations, trade, calling or place of amusement or business; to establish and collect fees and charges for all licenses and permits issued under the authority of this chapter, and, in the discretion of said Council, to refuse to grant any such licenses and to revoke any such licenses when granted.
- (36) *Liens*—To provide that any valid charges, taxes or assessments made against any real property within the town shall be liens upon such property, to be collected as municipal taxes are collected.
- (37) Lights—To provide for the lighting of the town.
- (38) *Livestock*—To regulate and prohibit the running at large of cattle, horses, swine, fowl, sheep, goats, dogs or other animals; to authorize the impounding, keeping, sale and redemption of such animals when found in violation of the ordinance in such cases provided.
- (39) *Markets*—To obtain by lease or rent, own, construct, purchase, operate and maintain public markets within the town.
- (40) *Minor privileges*—To regulate or prevent the use of public ways, sidewalks and public places for signs, awnings, posts, steps, railings, entrances, racks, posting handbills and advertisements, and display of goods, wares and merchandise.
- (41) *Noise*—To regulate or prohibit unreasonable ringing of bells, crying of goods or sounding of whistles and horns and noises of any sort which constitute a public nuisance or disturb the public peace.
- (42) Nuisances—To prevent or abate by appropriate ordinance all nuisances in the town which are so defined at common law, by this Charter, or by the laws of the State of Maryland, whether the same be herein specifically named or not; to regulate, to prohibit, to control the location of, or to require the removal from the town of all trading in, handling of or manufacture of any commodity which is or may become offensive, obnoxious or injurious to the public comfort or health. In this connection the town may regulate, prohibit, control the location of, or require the removal from the town of such things as stockyards, slaughterhouses, cattle or hog pens, tanneries and renderies. This listing is by way of enumeration, not limitation.

- (43) *Obstructions*—To remove all nuisances and obstructions from the streets, lanes and alleys and from any lots adjoining thereto, or any other places within the limits of the town.
- (44) *Parking facilities*—To license and regulate and to establish, obtain by purchase, by lease or by rent, own, construct, operate, and maintain parking lots and other facilities for off-street parking.
- (45) Parking meters—To install parking meters on the streets and public places of the town in such places as they shall by ordinance determine, and by ordinance to prescribe rates and provisions for the use thereof, except that the installation of parking meters on any street or road maintained by the State must first be approved by the State.
- (46) Parks and recreation—To establish and maintain public parks, gardens, playgrounds and other recreational facilities, including park structures in streets dead-ending at public parks or beaches, and programs to promote the health, welfare and enjoyment of the inhabitants of the town.
- (47) *Police force*—To establish, operate and maintain a police force. All town policemen shall, within the municipality, have the powers and authority of constables in this State.
- (48) *Police powers*—To prohibit, suppress and punish within the town all vice, gambling and games of chance, prostitution and solicitation therefor and the keeping of bawdy houses and houses of ill fame; all tramps and vagrants; all disorder, disturbances, annoyances, disorderly conduct, obscenity, public profanity and drunkenness.
- (48A) *Port Wardens*—To establish a Board of Port Wardens to regulate the dredging or maintenance and the placement, erection construction of structures or other barriers within or on the waters of the municipality, including, but not limited to, the issuing of licenses to create or build wharves or piers and the issuing of permits for dredging or maintenance, bulkheads, docks, mooring piles, floating wharves, buoys or anchors, taking into account the present and proposed uses and the effect of present and proposed uses on marine life, wildlife, conservation, water pollution, erosion, navigational hazards, the effect on other riparian property owners and the present and projected needs for any proposed commercial or industrial use. The Port Wardens shall have the power to regulate the materials and construction for the aforesaid improvements and to make certain that any improvements in the waters within the municipality do not render the navigation too close and confined and to provide for enforcement of said regulations and to provide for penalties for violation of said regulations established hereunder.
- (49) *Property*—To acquire by conveyances, purchase or gift, real or leasable property for any public purposes; to erect buildings and structures thereon for the benefit of the town and its inhabitants; and to convey any real or leasehold property when no longer needed for the public use, after having given at least twenty (20) days' public notice of the proposed conveyance; to control, protect and maintain public buildings, grounds and property of the town.
- (50) *Surf*—To regulate all activities in the surf and in the ocean, bays and other waterways within the town, including, but not necessarily limited to, swimming, surfing, boating, fishing, crabbing, clamming, etc.
- (51) Regulations—To adopt by ordinance and enforce within the corporate limits police, health, sanitary, fire, building, plumbing, electrical, traffic, speed, parking and other similar regulations not in conflict with the laws of the State of Maryland or with this Charter.
- (52) *Sidewalks*—To require sidewalks and to regulate the use of sidewalks and all structures in, under or above the same, to require the owner or occupant of the premises to keep the sidewalks in front thereof free from snow or other obstructions and to prescribe hours for cleaning sidewalks.
- (53) Streets—To regulate the use of streets, boardwalks and alleys by vehicles and to designate the kind of conveyances and vehicles which may not use designated streets, boardwalks and alleys which have been improved, together with hours for the use of such streets by certain specified types of vehicles; and to cause the streets, lanes and alleys to be sidewalked, paved, graded, repaired, repaved, regraded, drained or sewered, or to close streets, or parts of streets, lanes or alleys and to permit the construction of public structures at the point where said streets dead end at parks, at the beach or at natural bodies of water.

- (54) Sweepings—To regulate or prevent the throwing or depositing of sweepings, dust, ashes, offal, garbage, paper, handbills, dirty liquids or other unwholesome materials into any public way or onto any public or private property in the town.
- (55) *Taxicabs*—To license, tax and regulate public hackmen, taxicab men, draymen, drivers, cabmen, porters and expressmen, and all other persons pursuing like occupations.
- (56) *Vehicles*—To regulate and license wagons and other vehicles not subject to the licensing powers of the State of Maryland.
- (57) Voting machines—To purchase, lease, borrow, install and maintain voting machines for use in town elections.
- (58) *Zoning*—To exercise the powers as to planning and zoning conferred upon municipal corporations generally in Ann. Code of Md., art. 66B, subject, however, to the limitations and provisions of said article.
- (59) Saving clause—The enumeration of powers in this section is not to be construed as limiting the powers of the town to the several subjects mentioned.

Dear Mayor Meehan and Council Members,

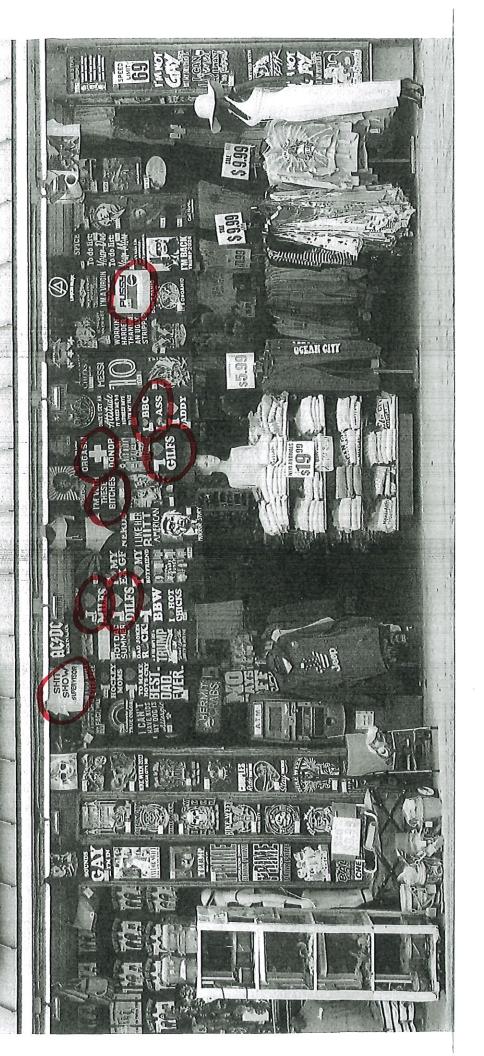

MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY ORDINANCE NO. 2025-

AN ORDINANCE to amend certain portions of Ordinance No. 2021-19 of the City,

introduced on September 7, 2021 and adopted on September 20, 2021, which authorized the issuance of the City's Municipal Purpose Bonds of 2021, by designating certain new projects as additional public projects authorized to be financed with the proceeds from the sale of such bonds;

and generally relating to said bonds.

RECITALS

On September 20, 2021, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City (the "City") adopted

Ordinance No. 2021-19 (the "Authorizing Ordinance"), authorizing the issuance and sale of its

Municipal Purpose Bonds of 2021 in an amount not to exceed \$48,945,000 (the "Bonds"), a

portion of the proceeds of which were to be used to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, certain

costs of acquisition, construction and/or improvements to the public projects described in such

Authorizing Ordinance (the "Original Projects").

Section 12 of the Authorizing Ordinance provides that, in the event that the amount of

funds allocated to a Project exceeds the amount needed for such Original Project, the excess may

be allocated to other Original Projects or may be allocated to additional public projects which are

authorized by the Mayor and City Council.

The City has determined that a portion of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds originally

designated to be used for the Baltimore Avenue Design and Implementation (one of the Original

Projects as described in the Authorizing Ordinance) will not be used in a timely manner due to

unexpected project delays and desires to redesignate a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds

originally allocated to such project to certain additional public projects that are anticipated to be

completed within this calendar year.

Additionally, the City has determined that a portion of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds originally designated to be used for the Wastewater 2nd Street Pumping Station Main Upgrades (one of the Original Projects as described in the Authorizing Ordinance) is in excess of the amount reasonably expected to be needed for such Project and desires to redesignate a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds originally allocated to such project to certain additional public projects.

The City has determined that it is in its best interests to use a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds to finance all or a portion of the costs of certain additional public projects listed on Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

The City has further determined that the projects listed on Exhibit A are eligible to be financed with the proceeds of the Bonds pursuant to the Authorizing Ordinance and have been approved as a part of the City's Capital Improvement Program and Approved Budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY, that:

Section 1: The Authorizing Ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of the Bonds is hereby supplemented for the sole purpose of designating the projects described in Section 2 below as additional public projects, the costs of which are authorized to be financed with the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds.

Section 2: The City hereby finds and determines that a portion of the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds designated to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, certain costs of acquisition, construction and/or improvements to the Original Projects exceeds the amount needed for such Original Project. The City hereby designates an amount not to exceed \$2,150,000 from the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds to be used to finance the acquisition, construction and/or improvements to the projects of the City set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part of

this Ordinance. The designation of such additional public projects authorized to be financed from the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall in no way limit the City from designated such further additional public projects as permitted by the Authorizing Ordinance and shall in no way modify, amend or rescind any other provisions of the Authorizing Ordinance.

Section 3: Pursuant to the authority of this Ordinance, all officers, employees and agents of the City may take such actions and execute and deliver such documents as are necessary or appropriate from time to time to provide for the designation of additional public projects authorized to be financed by the proceeds of the Bonds.

ADDITIONAL PUBLIC PROJECTS

Description of additional projects authorized to be financed with the proceeds of the City's Municipal Purpose Bonds of 2021:

Annual Street Paving Program

Wastewater Mains

Ordinance 2025-12

The purpose of the realignment of the 2021 bond projects ordinance is to minimize the town's arbitrage yield reduction liability for the 2021 bonds by using the remaining 2021 bond proceeds as soon as possible.

In the municipal bond context, arbitrage generally refers to the profit from borrowing funds in the tax-exempt market (through a bond issue) and investing them in the taxable market. The town is not supposed to profit from interest earned on the sale of tax exempt bonds.

If the ordinance is passed on second reading, bond proceeds originally allocated to the Fire Station 3 and Baltimore Avenue projects will be reallocated to Street Paving. This will allow us to quickly draw down the unspent bond proceeds and minimize arbitrage. A portion of the General Fund contributions originally set aside to pay for Street Paving will instead be used to pay amounts that have already been obligated (through purchase orders and retainages) to Fire Station 3 and Baltimore Avenue. We're essentially swapping revenue sources for these projects, although total FY25 revenue for Street Paving will increase by about \$800,000, which is the amount of 2021 Bond proceeds allocated to Baltimore Avenue that has not been obligated to contractors at this time

Whenever Hal and Terry determine additional funds are needed for Baltimore Avenue, those funds will be included in a future bond issue.

Bond proceeds originally allocated to the 2nd Street Pumping Station Main Upgrades project will be re-allocated to other Wastewater Mains projects, again allowing us to quickly draw down the unspent bond proceeds. Fixture charges that were set aside to pay for Wastewater Mains projects will instead be used to pay amounts that have already been obligated (through purchase orders and retainages) to 2nd Street Pumping Station Main Upgrades, if necessary. Again, we're essentially swapping revenue sources.

The 2021 bonds settled on December 2, 2021 and the bond proceeds were invested in the Maryland Local Government Investment Pool. The town has received almost \$1,900,000 in interest income on the bond proceeds which was used to pay for the projects funded by the 2021 bonds.

The interest rate the town is paying on the 2021 bonds is 1.74%. The interest rate the town earned on the 2021 bond proceeds exceeded 4% for the majority of the investment period with a significant number of months exceeding 5%. The difference in the amount of interest earned and the amount of interest paid has resulted in an arbitrage yield reduction liability for the town.

The town has contracted with Bingham Arbitrage Rebate Services to calculate the arbitrage liability on the 2021 bonds.

There is general fund contribution in the Baltimore Avenue project and the general fund contribution will be used to pay the arbitrage yield reduction liability to the Internal Revenue Service.

MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY ORDINANCE NO. 2025-

AN ORDINANCE to amend certain portions of Ordinance No. 2021-19 of the City, introduced on September 7, 2021 and adopted on September 20, 2021, which authorized the issuance of the City's Municipal Purpose Bonds of 2021, by designating certain new projects as additional public projects authorized to be financed with the proceeds from the sale of such bonds; and generally relating to said bonds.

RECITALS

On September 20, 2021, the Mayor and City Council of Ocean City (the "City") adopted Ordinance No. 2021-19 (the "Authorizing Ordinance"), authorizing the issuance and sale of its Municipal Purpose Bonds of 2021 in an amount not to exceed \$48,945,000 (the "Bonds"), a portion of the proceeds of which were to be used to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, certain costs of acquisition, construction and/or improvements to the public projects described in such Authorizing Ordinance (the "Original Projects").

Section 12 of the Authorizing Ordinance provides that, in the event that the amount of funds allocated to a Project exceeds the amount needed for such Original Project, the excess may be allocated to other Original Projects or may be allocated to additional public projects which are authorized by the Mayor and City Council.

The City has determined that a portion of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds originally designated to be used for the Baltimore Avenue Design and Implementation (one of the Original Projects as described in the Authorizing Ordinance) will not be used in a timely manner due to unexpected project delays and desires to redesignate a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds originally allocated to such project to certain additional public projects that are anticipated to be completed within this calendar year.

The Additionally, the City has determined that a portion of the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds originally designated to be used for the Baltimore Avenue Design and Implementation Wastewater 2nd Street Pumping Station Main Upgrades (one of the Original Projects as described in the Authorizing Ordinance) is in excess of the amount reasonably expected to be needed for such Original Project Project and desires to redesignate a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds originally allocated to such project to certain additional public projects.

The City has determined that it is in its best interests to use a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds to finance all or a portion of the costs of certain additional public projects listed on Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

The City has further determined that the projects listed on <u>Exhibit A</u> are eligible to be financed with the proceeds of the Bonds pursuant to the Authorizing Ordinance and have been approved as a part of the City's Capital Improvement Program and Approved Budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF OCEAN CITY, that:

Section 1: The Authorizing Ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of the Bonds is hereby supplemented for the sole purpose of designating the projects described in Section 2 below as additional public projects, the costs of which are authorized to be financed with the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds.

Section 2: The City hereby finds and determines that a portion of the proceeds from the sale of the Bonds designated to finance or refinance, in whole or in part, certain costs of acquisition, construction and/or improvements to the Original Projects exceeds the amount needed for such Original Project. The City hereby designates an amount not to exceed \$1,400,0002,150,000 from the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds to be used to finance the

acquisition, construction and/or improvements to the projects of the City set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance. The designation of such additional public projects authorized to be financed from the proceeds of the sale of the Bonds shall in no way limit the City from designated such further additional public projects as permitted by the Authorizing Ordinance and shall in no way modify, amend or rescind any other provisions of the Authorizing Ordinance.

Section 3: Pursuant to the authority of this Ordinance, all officers, employees and agents of the City may take such actions and execute and deliver such documents as are necessary or appropriate from time to time to provide for the designation of additional public projects authorized to be financed by the proceeds of the Bonds.

Section 4: This Ordinance shall take effect from the date of its approval by the Mayor, on or following the date of its final passage.

(Effective April 1, 2025)

- A. All on-street paid blocks and parking lots located on blocks abutting the Boardwalk or the beach:
 - 1. During the month of April, May 1 through the Thursday before Memorial Day Weekend, and the month of October, parking shall be free from Monday through Thursday, and the rate shall be \$3.50 per hour from Friday through Sunday. Beginning the Friday of Memorial Day weekend, and during the months of June through September, the rate shall be \$4.50 per hour.
 - 2. A ticket issued for an expired meter can be voided by paying the owed amount within 1 hour of the previous paid session expiring.
 - 3. Handicapped parking in designated ADA spaces no charge if stay is less than 1 hour, otherwise full rate.
- B. All on-street paid blocks and parking lots that do not abut the Boardwalk or the beach excluding the Inlet Parking Lot, 99th Street, 100th Street, the 100th Street Lot and the 64th Street Boat Ramp Lot:
 - 1. During the month of April, May 1 through the Thursday before Memorial Day Weekend, and the month of October, parking shall be free from Monday through Thursday, and the rate shall be \$2.50 per hour from Friday through Sunday. Beginning the Friday of Memorial Day weekend, and during the months of June through September, the rate shall be \$3.50 per hour.
 - 2. A ticket issued for an expired meter can be voided by paying the owed amount within 1 hour of the previous paid session expiring.
 - 3. Handicapped parking in designated ADA spaces no charge if stay is less than 1 hour, otherwise full rate.
- C. 99th Street Bayside, 100th Street Bayside, the 100th Street Lot and the 64th Street Boat Ramp Lot:
 - 1. April 1 through October 31, the rate shall be \$3.50 per hour.
 - 2. A ticket issued for an expired meter can be voided by paying the owed amount within 1 hour of the previous paid session expiring.
 - 3. Handicapped parking in designated ADA spaces no charge if stay is less than 1 hour, otherwise full rate.

D. Inlet Parking Lot:

- 1. During the month of April, May 1 through the Thursday before Memorial Day Weekend, and the month of October, parking shall be free from Monday through Thursday, and the rate shall be \$3.50 per hour from Friday through Sunday.
- 2. Beginning the Friday of Memorial Day weekend and during the months of June through September, the rate shall be \$4.50 per hour.

E. Special Event Parking Rates:

1. The rate for all paid parking spaces will be \$1.50 per hour above the rates established in sections A, B, and D of this Appendix during any event listed in the "2025 Special Event Dates – Appendix" of the Resolution.
