The Lockport Street crossing will likely require additional infrastructure due to the high traffic volume. Background Findings

The Village of Plainfield previously purchased fifty-eight (58) acres of unimproved property located on Van Dyke Road in the Village (the "Property"), to facilitate the then-proposed STAR Line railway project. While that project is no longer viable, public transportation needs for residents of the Village remain.

Recently, PACE - the Suburban Bus Division of the Regional Transportation Authority, sought the Village's cooperation to enter into an agreement granting PACE a non-exclusive license to a portion of the Property, for the purpose of constructing and operating a PACE Park-n-Ride facility. PACE has asked the Village to enter into an agreement, substantially in the form attached hereto, (the "Agreement"), to facilitate the construction and operation of the proposed Park-n-Ride facility.

Staff has reviewed the Agreement and finds its terms and conditions to be appropriate, as well as necessary to address the public transportation needs of residents of the Village.

Policy Considerations

Execution of the Agreement does not present or create any policy considerations.

Financial Considerations

The Village's financial considerations are set forth in the attached proposed Agreement.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Village Board authorize the Village President to execute the Intergovernmental Agreement with PACE, to grant a non-exclusive license for Village owned property for the purpose of constructing and operating a Park-n-Ride facility.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT

This Intergovernmental Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into this _____ day of January, 2017, by and between Pace, the Suburban Bus Division of the Regional Transportation Authority, an Illinois Municipal Corporation ("Pace" or "Licensee"), and the Village of Plainfield ("Village" or "Licensor"). Pace and Plainfield are individually referred to herein as a "Party" and collectively referred to herein as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Constitution of the State of Illinois, 1970, Article VII, Section 10, authorizes units of local government to contract or otherwise associate among themselves in any manner not prohibited by law or ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act, (5 ILCS 220/1 *et seq.*), authorize and encourage intergovernmental cooperation; and

WHEREAS, Pace and the Village are units of government within the meaning of the Constitution of the State of Illinois, 1970, Article VII, Section 10, having the power and authority to enter into an intergovernmental agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Village is the fee simple title holder of the property located on Van Dyke Road south of 143rd Street in Plainfield, Illinois ("the Property") and more fully identified in the legal description attached as Exhibit A, and incorporated herein by reference to this Agreement; and the Village has the power and authority to grant rights and privileges with respect thereto; and

WHEREAS, Pace desires to acquire a non-exclusive license to use that portion of the Property identified on the attached Exhibit B, incorporated herein by reference to this Agreement (the "Licensed Premises"), for the purpose of constructing a Pace Park-n-Ride ("PNR") sufficient to accommodate up to 400 parking spaces and an additional 200 adjacent parking spaces as expansion; and

WHEREAS, the Parties also envision the construction of a Pace bus garage on the Property in the future; and

WHEREAS, the Parties, pursuant to the terms set forth in this Agreement, desire to memorialize their respective obligations and responsibilities regarding design, construction, funding and use of the Property and the Licensed Premises.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the aforementioned recitals and the mutual covenants contained herein, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

I. TERM

This Agreement shall become effective on January 31, 2017 at 12:00 a.m. and it shall terminate on January 30, 2057 at 11:59 p.m., unless terminated earlier, by either Party, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

II. LICENSE

- A. The Village hereby grants to Pace and Pace hereby accepts a non-exclusive license to enter and use the Licensed Premises for the sole purposes of operating a PNR, subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein.
- B. The acquisition or transfer of property is not required for the PNR. It is understood by the Parties that there will be no exchange of any ownership interest in the Property by the Village for purposes of this Agreement.
- C. The Village's grant of a non-exclusive license to Pace to enter and use the Licensed Premises for operation of the PNR, does not preclude the Village from entering upon or using the Licensed Premises during the term of this Agreement. The Village's use of the Licensed Premises during the term of the Agreement shall be coordinated between the Parties. The Parties agree that the Village shall not use the Licensed Premises at any time or for any purpose which would interfere with Pace's operation of the PNR.

III. PNR

Pace's PNR shall include approximately 400 parking spaces in Phase I. Pace shall have the option to expand the PNR by an additional 200 parking spaces in its Phase II Build-Out. At a later date, and subject to available funding, the Parties may also agree to extend the use of the Property, by written approval of both Parties, for the purpose of constructing a bus garage for the parking and storage of buses owned and operated by Pace.

IV. ENGINEERING

- A. In consideration of the Village granting to Pace a license to use the Licensed Premises, the Village shall be responsible for the design, engineering and construction of the PNR and shall prepare probable construction estimates and contract documents, and shall also obtain necessary surveys and prepare the final plans and specifications for the PNR.
- B. In order for the Village to design and engineer the PNR, the Village agrees to be responsible for letting bids for construction of the PNR.

- C. The Village will coordinate with Pace to ensure that the PNR design and construction documents meet all applicable State, Federal, and Pace procurement rules and requirements.
- D. Pace shall have the right to attend and participate in all design and engineering meetings.
- E. During the design and preparation of the plans and specifications for the PNR, the Village shall submit the design plans and specifications to Pace for its review and approval at the following stages of plan preparation:
 - i) At 30% completion of design and plan preparation;
 - ii) At 60% completion of design and plan preparation; and
 - iii) At 100% completion (final) of design and plan preparation.
- F. Pace shall have no responsibility for the design, engineering, construction, contractors work, payments to contractors or sub-contractors, completion of the project, or close out of the design and plan preparation.

V. CONSTRUCTION

- A. In consideration of the Village granting to Pace a license to use the Licensed Premises, the Village shall advertise and receive bids, award the contract(s), provide construction engineering inspections and cause the PNR to be constructed in accordance with the approved plans and specifications.
- B. The Village shall also work with Pace to ensure that the PNR construction documents meet all applicable State, Federal, and Pace procurement rules and requirements.
- C. Pace shall have no responsibility for the design, engineering, construction, contractors work, payments to contractors or sub-contractors, completion of the project, or close out of construction of the PNR.
- D. Pace shall not have any direct financial obligations to third parties in connection with the design, engineering, or construction of the PNR.
- E. Construction shall commence only after Pace provides the Village with written direction to proceed, which written direction shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- F. Pace has the right to conduct periodic inspections of the Licensed Premises during construction of the PNR. The Village shall address any concerns brought to it by Pace based upon such inspections; however, the Village shall have no obligation to modify the construction plans for the PNR after written approval of such plans is provided to the Village by Pace pursuant to subparagraph E above.

G. Pace shall participate in the final inspection of the PNR.

VI. FINANCIAL

- A. Notwithstanding anything contained within this Agreement to the contrary, subject to and contingent upon Pace's receipt of funding approval and any other required approvals from the Pace Board of Directors and/or The Regional Transportation Authority, Pace shall reimburse the Village for all actual design, engineering, construction oversight, and construction costs of the PNR, in an amount not to exceed Five Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,800,000.00). A detailed cost estimate for the PNR is attached as Exhibit C and incorporated herein by reference to this Agreement.
- B. For costs associated with the design and engineering of the PNR, which costs shall not to exceed One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00), Pace shall reimburse the Village within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice detailing the work performed and the actual costs of said work incurred for the PNR along with proper invoices based upon the following deliverables:
 - i) At 30% Pre-Design Phase;
 - ii) At 60% Construction Document Phase; and
 - iii) At 100% Construction Document Phase.
- C. Subject to and contingent upon Pace's receipt of funding approval and any other required approvals from the Pace Board of Directors and/or The Regional Transportation Authority, for costs associated with construction of the PNR, which costs shall not exceed Four Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,800,000.00) the Village agrees to bill Pace for the construction of the PNR based on work performed. The Village agrees to have its contractors prepare draw requests on form AIA G702-703 Application and Certification for Payment, with related support documents attached (i.e. waivers of lien, certified payrolls, DBE documentation, etc.). The Village agrees to hold back ten percent (10%) retainage, Four Hundred and Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$480,000.00), until construction is accepted by Pace. The Village may, in its sole discretion, not incur any costs related to construction of the PNR prior to receipt of written confirmation from Pace of the above-mentioned funding approval from the Pace Board of Directors and/or The Regional Transportation Authority.
- D. All Change Orders for the PNR must be submitted to Pace for its approval prior to the work being ordered.
- E. Pace shall reimburse the Village within thirty (30) days after receipt of a completed draw request.
- F. The Village shall allow Pace full auditing privileges covering costs charged to Pace pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. This paragraph shall survive termination of the Agreement.

G. Pace shall have the right to inspect work performed during the construction of the PNR.

VII. INSURANCE

A. The Village shall require the Contractor to provide and maintain the following insurance:

- (1) General Liability Insurance. This coverage shall be in the form of a comprehensive general liability insurance policy.
- (2) Limits of Coverage. Policies for comprehensive general liability insurance under paragraph (1) above shall be in writing in the following limits of liability per occurrence:
 - (a) Bodily injury, including death resulting therefrom, \$1,000,000 for any one person injured or killed or \$2,000,000 for any one accident or occurrence whether more than one person is injured or killed; and
 - (b) Property damage not less than \$1,000,000 as a result of any accident or occurrence subject to an aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000.
- (3) Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance. The Village shall require each contractor or subcontractor to take out and maintain comprehensive automobile liability coverage, non-owned or leased vehicle, with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000 for each accident.
- (4) Qualification of Insurers. Insurance required under this Section of the Agreement shall be carried with an insurer with a rating of A- VII or better by AM Best Corporation.
- (5) Verification of Coverage. The Village shall inspect and approve the insurance coverages identified above.
- (6) Certificate. Each Certificate of Insurance required pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall identify Pace as an additional insured. Duplicate copies of Insurance Certificates called for above, evidencing insurance coverage carried by the contractor shall be filed with the Village before commencement of any work at the Licensed Premises. Each Certificate shall contain a clause stating that the policy shall not be cancelled without thirty (30) days prior written notice having first been sent to the Village.
- B. All insurance required pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until Pace accepts the completed PNR.

- C. Pace shall maintain, for the duration of the PNR's facilities existence, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property which may arise from or are in connection with the operation and maintenance of the PNR, as follows:
 - (1) General Liability Insurance. This coverage shall be in the form of a comprehensive general liability policy which shall include protection against bodily injury to or death of persons or on account of Pace's operation of the PNR at the Licensed Premises, or due to or arising in any manner from any omission or any negligent act of Pace, or its respective employees, agents, vendors or invitees, including damage to adjacent property; bodily injury or death of such employees, agents, contractors, subcontractors or any of their respective employees, agents or invitees, due to the condition of the Licensed Premises, upon, about or in connection with any work upon or use of the Licensed Premises incident to this Agreement.
 - (2) Policies for comprehensive general liability insurance under paragraph (C)(1) above shall be in writing and include the following limits of liability per occurrence:
 - (a) Bodily injury, including death resulting therefrom, \$1,000,000 for any one person injured or killed or \$2,000,000 for any one accident or occurrence whether more than one person is injured or killed; and
 - (b) Property damage not less than \$1,000,000 as a result of any accident or occurrence subject to an aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000.
 - (3) Qualification of Insurers. Insurance required under this Section of the Agreement shall be carried with an insurer with a rating of A-VII or better by AM Best Corporation.
 - (4) Verification of Coverage. The Village shall inspect and approve the insurance coverages identified above.
 - (5) Certificate. Each Certificate of Insurance required pursuant to the terms of this Agreement shall identify the Village as an additional insured. Duplicate copies of Insurance Certificates called for above, evidencing insurance coverage carried by the contractor shall be filed with the Village before commencement of any work at the Licensed Premises. Each Certificate shall contain a clause stating that the policy shall not be cancelled without thirty (30) days prior written notice having first been sent to the Village.

VIII. WARRANTIES

The Construction Contract shall require that all warranties provided by the Contractor for work performed at the Licensed Premises pursuant to the Construction Contract, shall run for the benefit of, and be enforceable by, the Village and Pace.

IX. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. Pace covenants and agrees to indemnify, keep and save the Village harmless at all times from and against any liabilities, losses, damages, causes of action, claims, judgments, costs or expense, (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by the Village, and will defend the Village in all proceedings (unless the Village elects to assume its own defense as hereinafter provided) arising by reason of or growing out of (1) any accident, loss or damage resulting to persons or property from any use of, occupancy of, or operation of the PNR at, the Licensed Premises; (2) any act or thing done, or to be done, or any occurrence upon the Licensed Premises during the term of this Agreement; and (3) any damage sustained to adjoining property or by adjoining property owners or other persons or property in connection with Pace's use of, occupancy of, or operation of the PNR at the Licensed Premises by Pace or its agents, contractors, subcontractors, representatives or employees. Pace further covenants and agrees that should the Village, without fault on its part, be made a party to any litigation involving the Licensed Premises, and the Village elects to assume its own defense, Pace shall and will pay all costs and expenses, including all attorney's fees and expenses, incurred by or imposed on the Village, by or in connection with such litigation. The Village's election to assume its own defense in any litigation shall in no way limit Pace's indemnification, or the obligations contained in this subparagraph A. Further, Pace covenants and agrees to pay all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, which may be incurred by the Village in its successful enforcement of the terms of this Agreement.
- B. The Village covenants and agrees to indemnify, keep and save Pace harmless at all times from and against any liabilities, losses, damages, causes of action, claims, judgments, costs or expense, (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees and expenses) incurred by Pace, and will defend Pace in all proceedings (unless Pace elects to assume its own defense as hereinafter provided) arising by reason of or growing out of (1) any accident, loss or damage resulting to persons or property related to construction of the PNR facility at the Licensed Premises during the term of this Agreement; and (2) any damage sustained to adjoining property or by adjoining property owners or other persons or property in connection with the Village's construction of the PNR at the Licensed Premises by the Village or its agents, contractors, subcontractors, representatives or employees. The Village further covenants and agrees that should Pace, without fault on its part, be made a party to any litigation involving the Licensed Premises and Pace elects to assume its own defense, the Village shall and will pay all costs and expenses, including all attorney's fees and expenses, incurred by or imposed on Pace by or in connection with such litigation. Pace's election to assume its own defense in any litigation shall in no way limit the Village's indemnification, or the obligations contained in this subparagraph B. Further, the Village covenants and agrees to pay all costs and

expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs, which may be incurred by Pace in its successful enforcement of the terms of this Agreement.

X. MAINTENANCE

Pace shall be solely responsible for all maintenance related to the PNR, including landscape maintenance, repair and/or replacement of structures on the PNR, snow removal and salting, and refuse removal.

XI. UTILITIES

Pace shall be solely responsible for all utility services provided to the PNR, including but not limited to full payment of water, electricity, natural gas and telephone services for the PNR.

XII. TERMINATION

Beginning January 31, 2037, either Party may terminate this Agreement upon a minimum of one hundred twenty (120) days advance written notice to the other Party. If the Village revokes the license or terminates this Agreement at any time prior to January 31, 2037, the Village shall pay Pace back straight line depreciation of the improvements to the Licensed Premises, as set forth in Exhibit D, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. If Pace breaches the terms of the license or terminates this Agreement at any time prior to January 31, 2037, Pace shall pay the Village the cost of demolition of the improvements made to the Licensed Premises, prorated for the balance of the term of the license granted hereunder.

XIII. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. The above Recitals are agreed to and are incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement by reference.
- B. This Agreement and the Exhibit(s) referenced and incorporated herein and attached hereto contain the entire understanding of the Parties and shall constitute the entire Agreement between the Parties. No restrictions, agreements, other warranties, inducements, considerations, promises or interpretations, written or oral, which are not expressly addressed herein, shall be implied or impressed upon this Agreement. This Agreement supersedes all prior agreements and understandings between the Parties with respect to its subject matter.
- C. This Agreement may be amended only by a written instrument duly executed by the Parties or their successors or assigns. No modification or amendment to this Agreement shall be effective unless reduced to writing and executed by the authorized officer of each Party.

- D. Neither Party will be obligated to perform any of their respective obligations hereunder if prevented from doing so by reasons outside of their reasonable control, including but not limited to, events of force majeure.
- E. Neither Party may assign, delegate or otherwise transfer all or any part of their rights or obligations under this Agreement, absent prior written approval of the other Party.
- F. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto and their respective successors and approved assigns.
- G. This Agreement and all amendments thereto shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois applicable to contracts made and to be performed therein. Any dispute that arises as a result of this Agreement shall be heard in an Illinois court of competent jurisdiction, Illinois law shall be applied, and venue shall lie in in the Circuit Court of the Twelfth Judicial Circuit, Will County, Illinois.
- H. If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid or unenforceable by an Illinois court of competent jurisdiction, that provision shall be deemed severed from this Agreement and the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect, and may be enforced with the provision severed or as modified by the court.
- I. No waiver of any breach or default hereunder shall be considered valid unless in writing and signed by the Party giving such waiver and no such waiver shall be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach or default of the same or similar nature.
- J. The section and subsection headings contained herein are for convenience of the Parties only and are not intended to define or limit the context of said sections and subsections.
- K. In connection with the execution of this Agreement, each Party warrants and represents that it is legally authorized to execute and perform or cause to be performed this Agreement under the terms and conditions stated herein.
- L. The Parties specifically acknowledge that they are not acting as the agent of the other in any respect hereunder and that each party is an independent contracting entity with respect to the terms, covenants and conditions contained in this Agreement. None of the terms or provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed to create a partnership between or among the parties or cause them to be considered joint ventures or members of any joint enterprise. This Agreement is not intended and shall not be construed to create any third party beneficiary rights in any person with respect to the terms, covenants or conditions of this Agreement.
- M. The Parties agree that this document shall be recorded with the office of the Recorder of Deeds of Will County, Illinois.

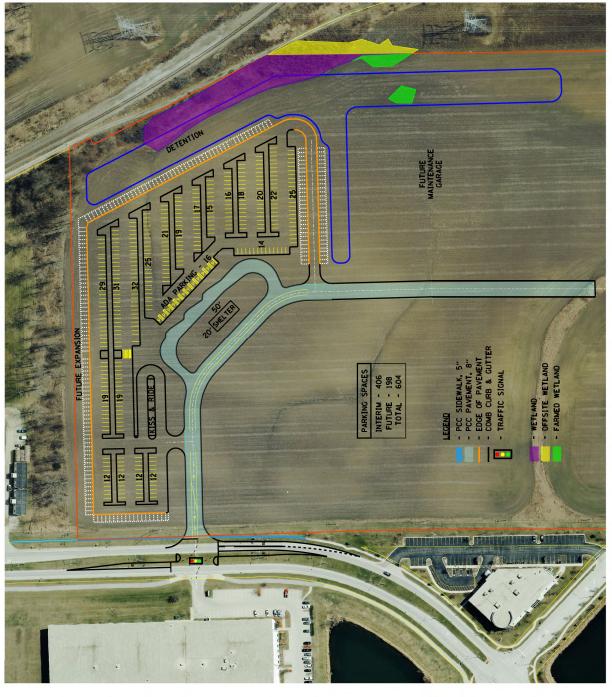

REPORT SUMMARY

VARIANCE - 12549 S. WINGSTEM ST. CASE NO. 1744.113016.VAR

SUMMARY

The applicant is seeking a variance to allow a fence in the corner side yard of their property. The fence will be a five-foot aluminum fence. The applicant is requesting an encroachment into the corner side yard of approximately 30 feet, but no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk, which it will run parallel to.

ISSUES

- * Reasons the applicant has made the variance request include that Wingstem Street generates significant traffic on school days and because the applicant wants to ensure the safety of their two active children and a disabled adult who wouldn't otherwise be able to be safely outside by themselves. Staff also observes that the street along the corner side yard, Corydalis Street, runs at an angle to the corner side yard, reducing the buildable area in the rear yard, creating a hardship for the homeowner. Staff finds that the four required findings of fact necessary to approve a variance request were met and recommends approval of the variance request.
- * The applicant will still need to obtain HOA approval and building permit approval if the variance is granted. The HOA has requested the applicant obtain the variance approval first.
- * The commissioners generally liked the open-style aluminum fence design that is proposed.
- . One of the commissioners acknowledged the curvature of the street creates a smaller rear yard and thus a hardship, but one of the commissioners believed that the lot size was large enough to make up for it.
- * The commissioners felt that the originally-proposed distance up to a foot from the sidewalk was too close to the street and amended the original recommendation to be no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk, which the applicant was agreeable to. This will soften the appearance from the street and the property to the east. The applicant also plans to remove old landscaping in the corner side yard and add newer landscaping along the fence.

RECOMMENDATION

On December 20, 2016, the Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of the variance request, 5-0, with staff's original recommendation modified from one foot from the edge of the sidewalk to no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk. Should the Board of Trustees concur, the following motion is offered for your consideration:

DISCUSSION

The applicant is seeking a variance to allow a fence in the corner side yard of their property. The fence will be a five-foot aluminum fence. The applicant is requesting an encroachment into the corner side yard of approximately 30 feet, but no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk, which it will run parallel to.

The adjacent land uses, zoning and street classifications are as follows:

East: Single-family detached residential (R-1)

West: Wingstem Street and single-family detached residential (R-1) across the street South: Corydalis Street and single-family detached residential (R-1) across the street

North: Single-family detached residential (R-1)

Analysis

The subject property is located at the northeast corner of Wingstem Street and Corydalis Street. The property address is 12549 S. Wingstem St. and the lot number is Lot 191. The applicant is requesting to build a five-foot aluminum fence enclosing the rear yard and a portion of their corner side yard. The applicant is seeking a variance to allow an encroachment into the corner side yard of approximately 30 feet, but no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk, which it will run parallel to.

The proposed fence design will include 1 inch x 1-1/8 inch reinforced rail and 5/8-inch pickets. The applicant has submitted a graphic depicting what the proposed fence will look like. The applicant is proposing that the fence run from the northernmost point of the house north, travel along the north property line, travel along the eastern property line, travel parallel to and approximately one foot north of the sidewalk along Corydalis Street, and then turn north to meet the southern façade of the house on an angle perpendicular to Corydalis Street. The proposed route of the fence is indicated on a plat of survey the applicant has provided.

The Village's Zoning Ordinance prohibits fences from being placed in a corner side yard. The applicant is requesting a variance to allow them to encroach into the corner side yard a distance of approximately 30 feet, but no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk. One of the reasons the applicant has asked for the variance is that Wingstem Street generates significant traffic on school days due to the proximity to Heritage Grove Middle School. Other reasons the applicant has provided include ensuring the safety of their two active young children, ages 10 and 12 years old, as well as the safety of a disabled adult who wouldn't otherwise be able to be safely outside by themselves. Village staff also observes that the street along the corner side yard, Corydalis Street, runs at an angle to the corner side yard, reducing the buildable area in the rear yard, creating a hardship for the homeowner.

In accordance with Section 9-33 of the Village's Zoning Ordinance, the Zoning Board of Appeals shall not recommend approval of, nor shall the Village Board grant a variance from the regulations of the Zoning Ordinance unless it makes the following findings based on the evidence presented. The petitioner is seeking relief from Section 9-86 of the Zoning Ordinance, which prohibits fences from being placed in a corner side yard.

The findings are as follows:

a) The variance is in harmony with the general purpose and intent of this Zoning Ordinance; As set forth in Section 9-4 of the Zoning Ordinance, the Ordinance is adopted for a number of reasons, including the purpose of protecting the public health, safety and general welfare of the Village; maintaining and promoting orderly land use patterns; protecting the quality of life for Village residents; protecting the character of existing residential neighborhoods; and implementing the Village's policies and goals, to include those of the Comprehensive Plan.

Staff submits that a 30-foot encroachment of an aluminum fence into a corner side yard is mostly consistent with the purpose and intent of the Zoning Ordinance. While orderly land use patterns are not promoted by allowing some corner side yards to be encroached upon with fencing while others are not, this encroachment does not do anything to hinder the character of the neighborhood or the quality of life for Village residents. The fence will feature an attractive design that will add to the quality and character of the neighborhood. Additionally, by allowing the encroachment, it protects the safety and furthers the welfare and quality of life for residents in the neighborhood, allowing active children and a disabled adult to more fully and independently enjoy their yard while reducing the likelihood of vehicular-pedestrian conflicts.

- b) The plight of the owner is due to unique circumstances and thus strict enforcement of the Zoning Ordinance would result in practical difficulties or impose exceptional hardships due to the special and unusual conditions that are not generally found on other properties in the same zoning district;
 - The applicant has demonstrated a unique, unusual, or exceptional hardship in this case. The physical characteristics of this property create a hardship in that Corydalis Street runs on an angle to the corner side yard, reducing the buildable area in the rear yard of the property. Furthermore, the applicant has demonstrated an additional unique situation in that a disabled adult who lives there can't currently be safely outside by themselves. Allowing this variance would allow the disabled adult to more independently and more fully enjoy their yard and the outdoors.
- c) The property cannot yield a reasonable use if permitted only under the conditions allowed by the Zoning Ordinance; and Staff believes that the angle at which Corydalis Street runs along the corner side yard creates an unusual circumstance that impacts the applicant and what they are able to do with their property. While the property could still yield a reasonable use if permitted only under the conditions allowed by the Zoning Ordinance, the area is certainly lessened in comparison to other corner lots in the Village due to the angle of the street.
- d) The variance, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the locality and will not be a substantial detriment to adjacent property. Staff believes that granting a variance in this case would not alter the essential character of this neighborhood and would not be a detriment to adjacent property. Staff finds that the proposed fence will be constructed of quality materials and will feature a design that is warm and open while protecting the safety of residents, furthering quality of life, and adding to the value of the property and the character of the neighborhood.

Zoning Board of Appeals Consideration

The Zoning Board of Appeals considered the case at its meeting on December 20, 2016 and held a Public Hearing regarding the matter. There was one public comment from a resident who asked if the project had received approval from the homeowners' association (HOA). The applicant stated that the HOA asked him to obtain Village approval for the variance before seeking HOA approval. One of the commissioners stated that the applicant would still be responsible for obtaining HOA approval and building permit approval if the variance is granted. Staff also received a phone call right before the meeting from a resident who had heard a rumor that the applicant planned to have a chicken coop and other livestock in his yard. Staff informed

the resident that was not the case and explained to the caller what the applicant was proposing and why.

The commissioners generally liked the open-style aluminum fence design that the applicant was proposing. The commissioners also questioned the applicant regarding their plans for landscaping along the fence. The applicant responded that they did plan to install low bushes along the fence, as well as remove old landscaping. One of the commissioners acknowledged the curvature of the street creates a smaller rear yard and thus a hardship, but one of the commissioners felt that the lot size was large enough to make up for it. The commissioners felt that the originally-proposed distance up to a foot from the sidewalk was too close to the street and amended the original recommendation to be no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk along Corydalis Street, which the applicant was agreeable to. The commissioners felt that the increased distance from the sidewalk would allow the applicant more room to install landscaping along the fence as well as soften the appearance from the street and from the neighboring property to the east.

The Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of the variance request by a vote of 5-0, with staff's original recommendation modified from one foot from the edge of the sidewalk to no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk.

CONCLUSION/RECOMMENDATION

On December 20, 2016, the Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of a variance to permit a fence up to 30 feet into the corner side yard, but no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk along Corydalis Street, and recommends the findings of fact of staff be adopted. Should the Board of Trustees concur, the following motion is offered for your consideration:

Mr. Bogda stated this is a request for a variance to allow a 5- foot aluminum fence to be installed in the corner side yard one foot from the edge of the sidewalk along Corydalis Street. Mr. Bogda indicated the adjacent land uses, zonings and street classifications to be single-family detached residential. Mr. Bogda further described the type of fence requested as noted in the staff report dated December 12, 2016; and also stated the reasons for this request as noted in the staff report.

Mr. Bogda reviewed the findings of fact as noted in the staff report dated December 15, 2016. Prior to direction from the Zoning Board of Appeals, staff is suggesting a recommendation of approval.

Chairman Kiefer swore in Loc Ha, owner of the property.

Chairman Kiefer asked for public comments.

Chairman Kiefer swore in Scott Portillos, neighbor on Corydalis. Mr. Portillos asked if this project has received approval from the Homeowners Association (HOA.) Mr. Proulx stated the applicant must show approval from a HOA at the time of the submittal of the request for permit. Mr. Ha stated he spoke with the HOA and was told they would approve the fence if the Village approved it.

Commissioner Seggebruch mentioned to the applicant that if this request is approved by the Village he will still need approval from the HOA, and they will need a building permit.

Commissioner Seggebruch stated the rear yard gets smaller due to the curvature of the street. Commissioner Seggebruch asked how the owner intended to maintain the fence and the property just Zoning Board of Appeals Minutes December 20, 2016 Page 2 of 2

outside of the fence. Mr. Ha stated he would be willing to move the fence back from the sidewalk so he could plant a tree outside of the fence. Commissioner Seggebruch asked if he meant some low bushes. Mr. Ha said yes.

Commissioner Heinen liked the fence material; fells this is a large lot; expressed concern with the location being only 1 foot from the sidewalk; indicated he would prefer the fence be located 10 feet back from the sidewalk.

Chairman Kiefer mentioned we want to avoid having fences all along the street.

Commissioner Womack asked how the owner was going to deal with the existing trees in the corner of the lot. Mr. Ha indicated the existing trees in the back corner are old and will be replaced with new trees. Commissioner Womack suggested a good compromise would be to retain the south corner landscaping and grant an encroachment of the fence due to the hardship of the street.

Commissioner Heinen did not feel Corydalis Street caused a hardship due to the size of the side yard of this lot; felt some separation from the sidewalk to the location of the fence is worthwhile.

Commissioner Seggebruch explained that this corner side yard faces the front yard of the neighbor across the street; mentioned the open design of the proposed fence is favorable to a solid fence.

Mr. Bogda mentioned the Commission could amend the motion to include the type of fence.

Commissioner Minnis supported the material of the fence; felt 1 foot spacing to the sidewalk was too tight; would like some kind of a landscaping buffer that could be incorporated between the sidewalk and the fence. Commissioner Seggebruch like the idea of backing up the fence 10-feet to preserve the easement. Mr. Ha agreed to back up the 10 feet from the sidewalk. The Commissioners felt this was a good compromise.

Commissioner Heinen made a motion to adopt the findings of fact of staff as the findings of fact of the Zoning Board of Appeals and recommend approval of a variance to permit a fence up to 30 feet into the corner side yard but no less than 10 feet from the edge of the sidewalk along Corydalis Street for the property located at 12549 S Wingstem Street.

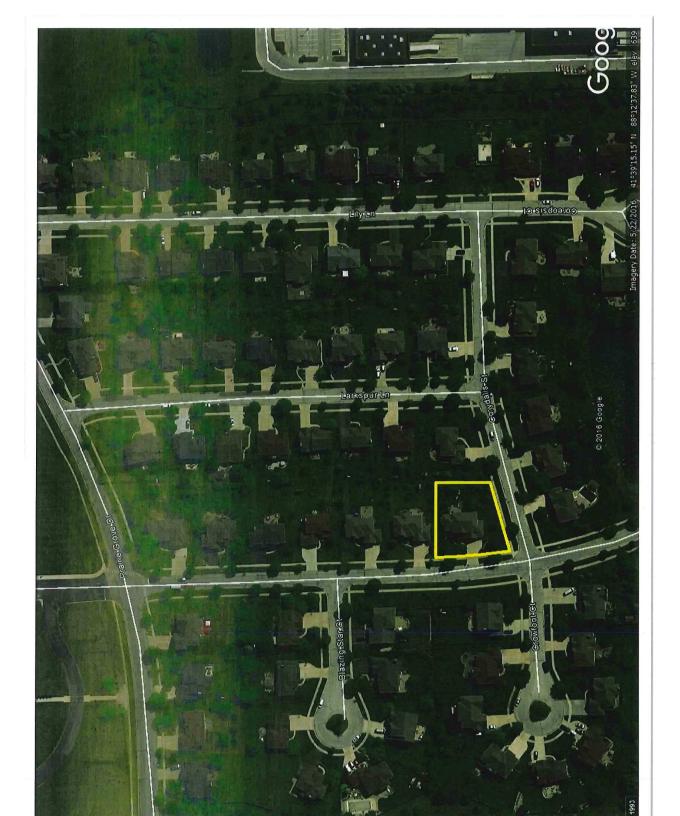

Troy Cooper of Naperville Kayak and Village Staff are proposing a concession agreement to provide nonexclusive privilege of maintaining a kayak service at Electric Park West. Mr. Cooper is also looking to enter into an agreement with the Plainfield Park District for the utilization of the 135th Street canoe/kayak launch to link up with Electric Park West for the proposed service.

Mr. Cooper plans on running Plainfield Kayak – a full service kayak operation that will provide beginner classes by certified instructors, kayak rental services, and guided group trips at the proposed locations. Naperville Kayak has been providing this service just south of Downtown Naperville for the past 4 years with a Naperville Park District partnership. Each year their business has nearly double or tripled in size bringing in over 3,800 people to Downtown Naperville to kayak in 2016, and the Naperville Park District has seen their paddleboat rentals double as well due to this activity.

Mr. Cooper has stated that launch points may need to be flexible dependent on different parts of the river and its flows of each particular day/week. Plainfield Kayak will provide pick-up/drop-off services if required by the kayak renters. More details of the operation are listed below and a copy of a "participant release" form is attached providing user regulations as well.

Operation (more business information please visit www.napervillekayak.com)

- Typical hours of operation are from \sim 7am to dusk in line with park hours.
- May to October operation.
- Village can terminate operation if found concession is not upholding agreement and problem is not remedied in a timely manner.
- The Village of Plainfield and the Riverfront Foundation will be named as an additional insured to the kayak service's insurance policy.
- Kayak service bears all cost of operation including liability of goods on site.
- Life vests required for all kayakers.
- No alcohol will be allowed (if caught customer will be banned from renting).
- Anyone under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who can sign a waiver on their behalf. Children 13 to 18 years may be on the water without a parent or guardian. Children 12 years and under must have a parent or guardian on the water with them at all times.

- Certified instructors to determine water flow safety. If too high/fast, will not rent will only be servicing beginner to intermediate water flows.
- Signage will be displayed on site listing particular rules as so defined in the release form.
- Identification signage/kayaks would be placed near Lockport St. to identify the service from the street (all signage and areas of signage would need staff approval).
- A temporary tent will need to be erected to provide cover for employees and customers.

Village staff offers the following in support of the proposed agreement:

- The Electric Park West vision and master plan illustrates an area of activity and energy—this service will help energize the downtown and bring more people to the park.
- Provides another reason for people to visit Plainfield and the Downtown helping to create a sustainable economic model for the downtown.
- Adds to the already growing outdoor recreation amenities the Village can provide to its residents an attraction the Village can utilize to market itself to future residents.
- Kayak services are typically done in a public-private partnership (Naperville, Geneva, Yorkville) as these services are not highly profitable but rather done by passionate kayak and outdoor enthusiasts.
- The service can be too costly for many park districts/municipalities to take on themselves and provide the level of service a private entity can, i.e. certified instruction.
- Same service provider as Naperville will provide a connectivity between the two downtowns allowing for day trips from Naperville to Plainfield.
- Established and proven kayak service.
- Plainfield Kayak will be a full service kayak business offering tutorials through certified trainers giving an outlet for those who are beginners and initially uncomfortable with kayaking.
- PK will also look to add stand up paddle-rafting (larger than normal, inflatable raft boards that provide more security when standing than average paddle boards).
- Village working with PK to integrate bicycle rentals into the operations.

CONCLUSION & RECOMMENDATIONS

As the proposed use of a kayak service is complimentary to the vision of the Riverfront area and will provide ancillary economic development benefits to the downtown and the Village, and with the Riverfront Foundation Board's recommendation of approval, staff recommends the approval of the motion to direct the Village Attorney to review and prepare the Kayak Concession Agreement with Naperville Kayak, LLC for the utilization of Electric Park West.

I move we direct the Village Attorney to review and assist in preparation of a concession agreement with Naperville Kayak, LLC and the Village of Plainfield for the nonexclusive privilege of maintaining a kayak concession at the Riverfront Park/Electric Park West.

KAYAK CONCESSION

Agreement made as of March 13, 2014 between the municipal corporation of the State of Illinois, hereinafter referred to as "GRANTOR" and Naperville Kayak, LLC, State of Illinois, hereinafter referred to as "CONCESSIONAIRE".

RECITALS

GRANTOR manages the following property commonly referred to as the Paddleboat Quarry. GRANTOR desires to grant a concession for kayak rental and instruction to CONCESSIONAIRE and CONCESSIONAIRE desires to obtain a concession for kayak rental and instruction from GRANTOR.

In consideration of the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. **GRANT AND DESCRIPTION OF PREMISES.** GRANTOR grants to CONCESSIONAIRE and CONCESSIONAIRE accepts from GRANTOR the nonexclusive privilege of maintaining a kayak concession at the Quarry in space to be designated and agreed by the parties. CONCESSIONAIRE acknowledges that the space, hereinafter referred to as the "CONCESSION PREMISES," is adjacent to and shares the dock facilities with the GRANTOR's Paddleboat operation and CONCESSIONAIRE will conduct its business so as to not unreasonably interfere with the Paddleboat operation.
- 2. **CONDITION OF PREMISES**. Taking possession of the Concession Premises by CONCESSIONAIRE shall constitute acknowledgment that the premises are in good condition. CONCESSIONAIRE shall accept the concession premises in their presently existing condition, and GRANTOR shall not be required to make any alteration to those premises.

3. CONCESSION FEE.

- 3.1 CONCESSIONAIRE shall be permitted to use the property during designated hours consistent with the GRANTOR'S Paddleboat operation beginning in May, 2014 through September, 2014 (hereafter referred to as the "Season"); and
- 3.2 Rentals shall be sold at the GRANTOR's "and separately accounted for by GRANTOR. GRANTOR shall deliver all rental fees collected by it to CONCESSIONAIRE less any credit card or bank charges as incurred, and less which is paid as a Concession Fee for the privilege to use the Concession Premises.
- a. Income received for kayak lessons promoted by the GRANTOR whereby the GRANTOR takes registration for said lessons will be paid to CONCESSIONAIRE, less gross sales. GRANTOR shall include an accounting of revenues received for lessons in the monthly payment report under Section 4.

- b. Income received for kayak lessons promoted by the CONCESSIONAIRE whereby the CONCESSIONAIRE takes registration for said lessons and conducts said lessons at the Concession Premises ("Concessionaire Bookings") will be paid to the GRANTOR less of gross sales. CONCESSIONAIRE'S books and records shall be available to GRANTOR for inspection. Any intentional or repeated misstatement of the revenues received for Concessionaire Bookings shall be grounds for immediate termination of this Agreement in addition to all other rights and remedies available to GRANTOR.
- c. CONCESSIONAIRE shall be solely liable to pay each of its employees and to withhold and remit any and all taxes. CONCESSIONAIRE and its employees may accept gratuities for which they are solely responsible for reporting as income.
- d. CONCESSIONAIRE and its employees shall not hold themselves out as or otherwise represent that they are employees of the GRANTOR.
- e. CONCESSIONAIRE is not responsible for payment to the GRANTOR of any sales for programs or lessons that are advertised solely by the CONCESSIONAIRE and do not occur at the CONCESSION PREMISIES or other properties owned by the GRANTOR.

4. PAYMENT.

GRANTOR shall remit collected revenues due to CONCESSIONAIRE hereunder no later than the second Tuesday following the completed calendar month used for measuring receipts. Thus, by way of illustration, receipts for kayak concessions collected for the month of May shall be paid to CONCESSIONAIRE, less credit card and bank charges, and less concession fees for rentals or lessons, no later than close of business Tuesday, June 10th. Likewise, CONCESSIONAIRE shall remit concession fees due to GRANTOR for Concessionaire Bookings no later than the second Tuesday following the completed calendar month used for measuring receipts.

5. ACCOUNTING AND RECORDS.

- 5.1 <u>ACCOUNTING</u>. GRANTOR shall install and maintain such bookkeeping and accounting methods and methods of collection of monies as shall permit GRANTOR to accurately compute the revenue of CONCESSIONAIRE. Such records shall be made available to CONCESSIONAIRE during the normal business hours of GRANTOR.
- 5.2 <u>ANNUAL ACCOUNTING</u>. GRANTOR shall submit to CONCESSIONAIRE, no later than thirty (30) days after the close of the Season, a summary of the weekly receipts and all charges, deductions, and fees.
 - 5.3 <u>CASH REGISTER</u>. The Riverwalk Eatery shall be the exclusive point of sale.
 - 5.4 TAX RECORDS. CONCESSIONAIRE shall be solely liable for preparing and

paying any and all taxes dues from or as a result of its operations.

- 5.5 FOIA. CONCESSIONAIRE agrees to maintain, without charge to the GRANTOR, all records and documents for projects of the GRANTOR in compliance with the Freedom of Information Act, 5 ILCS 140/1 et seq. In addition, CONCESSIONAIRE shall produce records which are responsive to a request received by the GRANTOR under the Freedom of Information Act so that the GRANTOR may provide records to those requesting them within the time frames required. If additional time is necessary to compile records in response to a request, then CONCESSIONAIRE shall so notify the GRANTOR and if possible, the GRANTOR shall request an extension so as to comply with the Act. In the event that the GRANTOR is found to have not complied with the Freedom of Information Act due to CONCESSIONAIRE's failure to produce documents or otherwise appropriately respond to a request under the Act, then CONCESSIONAIRE shall indemnify and hold the GRANTOR harmless, and pay all amounts determined to be due including but not limited to fines, costs, attorneys' fees and penalties.
- 6. **USE OF PREMISES**. The CONCESSION PREMISES shall be used to conduct a kayak boat rental, kayak boat storage, and kayak instruction business. CONCESSIONAIRE shall not use or permit the concession premises to be used for any other purpose without obtaining the prior written consent of GRANTOR.
- 7. **EQUIPMENT.** GRANTOR shall not be responsible to furnish CONCESSIONAIRE with any equipment. CONCESSIONAIRE shall furnish and install ready for use, at CONCESSIONAIRE'S own expense or as the result of a rental agreement that CONCESSIONAIRE negotiates on CONCESSIONAIRE'S own behalf, all the equipment that is necessary to operate the concession—including all life preservers, helmets and other safety equipment. The CONCESSIONAIRE shall not make any improvements to the CONCESSION PREMISES or other real property of the GRANTOR, such as dock extensions or boat storage devices, without the prior written consent of the GRANTOR.

All such equipment shall be in good and safe working order. CONCESSIONAIRE shall NOT permit customers to bring their own kayaks or other equipment into the CONCESSION PREMISES.

The CONCESSIONAIRE shall retain the rights to all equipment and will remove that equipment at the termination of the Agreement. If the equipment is not removed within fifteen (15) days following termination of this Agreement, all equipment remaining shall become the property of the GRANTOR to do with as it pleases.

8. **QUALITY OF SERVICE**. The services provided by CONCESSIONAIRE shall be rendered courteously and efficiently. GRANTOR reserves the right to order improvement of the quality or the services provided by CONCESSIONAIRE.

9. RATES AND CHARGES.

The 2014 kayak rental rate will be \$14.00 for 30 minutes of rental. The GRANTOR and

CONCESSIONAIRE will mutually agree upon rates for kayak instruction for lessons advertised by the GRANTOR. Kayak rental rates will be reviewed annually and may be modified by CONCESSIONAIRE.

CONCESSIONAIRE shall post the rental fee schedule and deposit schedule for all services in such places as GRANTOR may designate.

- 10. **CHANGES IN RATES AND SERVICES.** CONCESSIONAIRE shall not change any rates established in Section Nine of this Agreement or curtail or diminish any services provided for in this Agreement without first requesting and receiving written permission from GRANTOR.
- 11. HOURS OF OPERATION. CONCESSIONAIRE shall operate the concession seven (7) days a week during the term of this Agreement during hours that are consistent with the GRANTOR'S Paddleboat operation unless otherwise permitted by GRANTOR.

12. EMPLOYEES OF CONCESSIONAIRE.

12.1 QUALITY OF EMPLOYEES. CONCESSIONAIRE shall at all times employ only those persons of good moral character and a clean criminal record, and CONCESSIONAIRE shall not retain any employee that GRANTOR considers to be unfit for employment or otherwise objectionable. CONCESSIONAIRE shall not assign any employee or sub-contractor who has not successfully completed a criminal background check. All kayak instructors shall have current American Canoe Association (ACA) certification.

12.2. DRESS AND MANNER OF EMPLOYEES.

CONCESSIONAIRE's employees shall at all times be courteous and, to the greatest extent applicable, shall present a neat and clean appearance and shall wear identifiable work garments and identification to indicate they are employed by or subject to a contract with CONCESSIONAIRE. All work and services shall be performed with due regard for the care of the GRANTOR's property, and that of its users and employees, and all complaints handled with due regard to the GRANTOR's public relations. CONCESSIONAIRE shall utilize only employees or sub-contractors who are competent and skilled to perform the specific job tasks to which they are assigned and who are instructed to utilize and who do utilize only safe methods and techniques in the provision of work and services and who understand the importance of leaving the GRANTOR's property in safe condition. At the request of the GRANTOR, CONCESSIONAIRE will remove from the performance of the work and services any employee or subcontractor of CONCESSIONAIRE who is incompetent, negligent, discourteous, destructive, or repeatedly fails to abide by the GRANTOR's rules and regulations or specifications of this Agreement. CONCESSIONAIRE, its employees or sub-contractors are forbidden to use any facility or equipment owned by the GRANTOR either for CONCESSIONAIRE or CONCESSIONAIRE's employee's benefit during the period of time when they are working.

- 12.3 <u>COMPENSATION OF EMPLOYEES</u>. CONCESSIONAIRE shall be solely responsible for the rate of pay, benefits, and working conditions of CONCESSIONAIRE'S employees.
- 12.4 <u>RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PARTIES.</u> It is understood, acknowledged and agree that the relationship of CONCESSIONAIRE and CONCESSIONAIRE's employees and subcontractors to the GRANTOR is that of Licensee. NO officer, employee or agent of CONCESSIONAIRE, or any sub-contractor or other person performing services for CONCESSIONAIRE is an employee of the GRANTOR nor shall any person be entitled to benefits of employees of the GRANTOR. CONCESSIONAIRE shall be responsible for prompt payment of and shall pay all taxes and charges assessed or payable with respect to the employment or contractual arrangement of such persons.
- 13. **TERM**. The term of this Agreement shall begin upon the date of execution hereof and shall terminate on The term of this Agreement is subject to two one (1) year options to renew and to earlier termination as provided below.
- 14. **OPTION TO RENEW**. This Agreement will automatically renew for the calendar years of provided that no later than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of the initial term of this Agreement CONCESSIONAIRE serves a written notice on GRANTOR of CONCESSIONAIRES desire to extend the term of the Agreement. Any changes to this Agreement will negotiated at that time.
- 15. **HOLDOVER**. If CONCESSIONAIRE holds over after the expiration of the term of this Agreement with the express or implied consent of GRANTOR, the holding over shall be deemed to be a month-to-month tenancy at the concession fee stated in this Agreement and otherwise subject to the terms of this Agreement. This section is subject to the option to renew section stated above.
- 16. **REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE OF PREMISES**. CONCESSIONAIRE shall maintain the concession equipment in good order and repair at CONCESSIONAIRE'S own expense during the entire term of this contract. CONCESSIONAIRE shall perform any required maintenance and repairs at CONCESSIONAIRE'S own expense. If CONCESSIONAIRE neglects or refuses to do so, GRANTOR shall have the right to perform maintenance or repairs for the account of CONCESSIONAIRE, and CONCESSIONAIRE shall reimburse GRANTOR for the cost of such maintenance or repairs within fifteen (15) days of notice, provided that GRANTOR shall first give CONCESSIONAIRE fifteen (15) days written notice of its intention to perform maintenance or repairs to enable CONCESSIONAIRE to perform maintenance or repairs at CONCESSIONAIRE'S own expense.
- 17. APPROVAL FOR ALTERATIONS REQUIRED. The CONCESSIONAIRE may not construct or otherwise alter the concession premises without obtaining the prior written consent of GRANTOR. If alterations or additions are made, they shall be made at the sole expense of CONCESSIONAIRE, who shall agree to hold GRANTOR harmless for all alterations or additions.

- 18. **IMPROVEMENTS AS PROPERTY OF GRANTOR**. All alterations and additions to the concession premises shall remain on the concession premises and become the property of GRANTOR on the termination of this Agreement.
- 19. MAINTENANCE OF EQUIPMENT. CONCESSIONAIRE shall maintain all equipment in good and safe working condition at all times, at CONCESSIONAIRE'S own expense, for the operation of the concession. At the end of each season, the kayaks and other equipment necessary for the business shall be removed from the CONCESSION PREMISES by CONCESSIONAIRE and stored at CONCESSIONAIRE'S sole expense.
- 20. **PREMISES TO BE KEPT CLEAN**. CONCESSIONAIRE shall keep the concession premises in a clean and sanitary condition at all times. CONCESSIONAIRE shall store all trash in containers.
- 21. **RIGHT OF ACCESS.** GRANTOR shall have access to the concession premises, and to each part of the CONCESSION PREMISES, at all times for the purpose of inspecting the same and making repairs on the CONCESSION PREMISES.

CONCESSIONAIRE shall have the right at all times to traverse park property to get to and from the concession premises to keep the concession premises open during the regularly scheduled business hours.

- 22. PARTIAL DESTRUCTION OF CONCESSION PREMISES. If, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the concession premises and/or concession equipment are damaged by fire, act(s) of nature, or other causes beyond the control of CONCESSIONAIRE, to the extent that continued use of the concession premises is unfeasible, CONCESSIONAIRE may, on written notice to GRANTOR delivered within fifteen (15) days after the damage has occurred, terminate this Agreement without any liability of CONCESSIONAIRE to GRANTOR except for the payment of concession fees accrued to the date of termination. If CONCESSIONAIRE does not elect to terminate this Agreement, CONCESSIONAIRE may restore the concession premises and equipment at his sole expense. GRANTOR shall be not responsible for any profits lost by CONCESSIONAIRE due to the partial destruction of the concession premises.
- 23. **SIGNS, ADVERTISING AND NAME**. CONCESSIONAIRE shall erect a sign which posts the Rules and Regulations for the use of the kayaks. The sign design and coloring must receive prior approval from the GRANTOR before it is erected. No other signs shall be placed on the concession premises or in the vicinity without obtaining the prior written approval of GRANTOR. The minimum Rules and Regulations are as follows:

The following are prohibited while renting a kayak:

- Food or Alcohol
- Smoking
- Swimming or diving
- Abusive Language
- Exiting to shore or changing occupants
- Fishing

- Standing or transporting
- Racing

- Boating beyond designated and posted areas
- Removing or untying straps from life preserver

The following rules will be enforced:

- o Kayaks can be rented only to persons thirteen years of age and older.
- Children <u>twelve</u> and under must be accompanied by an adult <u>eighteen</u> years of age or older.
- o All individuals using a kayak must wear a correctly fitted life preserver at all times, including when entering or leaving the kayak.
- o Illinois boating regulations require that there be one life preserver for each person on board watercraft.
- o Not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged belongings.

Renters shall be required to sign a Waiver & Release prior to each rental.

See attached Exhibit "A"

The CONCESSIONAIRE shall complete the Waiver & Release form for each rental. A copy of this document shall be maintained by GRANTOR at the Eatery and shall be completed at the time of rental.

- 24. **LICENSES AND PERMITS.** CONCESSIONAIRE shall obtain and pay for all permits or licenses that may be required for the operation of the concession.
- 25. **COMPLIANCE WITH STATE AND LOCAL LAWS**. CONCESSIONAIRE shall comply with applicable state and local laws governing the operations of the concession premises,, including, but not limited to the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Illinois Human Rights Act, and any other local, state, or federal laws regarding non-discrimination, sexual harassment, and laws and regulations regarding safety and employee training. Violation of state laws or the ordinances of the GRANTOR, DuPage County or the City of Naperville may be considered as a cause for termination of this Agreement.
- 26. TAXES. CONCESSIONAIRE shall pay all taxes levied against the operation of the business.

27. INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS.

The CONCESSIONAIRE's Insurance Requirements are set forth in Exhibit B which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

28. INDEMNIFICATION.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, to waive any and all rights of contribution against the GRANTOR and to indemnify and hold harmless the GRANTOR and its officers, officials, employees, volunteers and agents from and against all claims, damages, losses and expenses, including, but not limited to, legal fees (attorney's and paralegal's fees, expert fees and court costs) arising out of or resulting from the performance of the CONCESSIONAIRE's work, provided that any such claim, damage, loss or expense is attributable to bodily injury, sickness, disease or death, or injury to or destruction of property, other than the work itself, including the loss of use resulting therefrom, or is attributable to misuse or improper use of trademark or copyright protected material or otherwise protected intellectual property, to the extent it is caused in whole or in part by any wrongful or negligent act or omission of the CONCESSIONAIRE, any Subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable. Such obligation shall not be construed to negate, abridge or otherwise reduce any other right to indemnity which the GRANTOR would otherwise have. The CONCESSIONAIRE shall similarly, protect, indemnify and hold and save harmless, the GRANTOR, its officers, officials, employee, volunteers and agents against and from any and all claims, costs, causes, actions and expenses, including, but not limited to, legal fees, incurred by reason of CONCESSIONAIRE's breach of any of its obligations under, or CONCESSIONAIRE's default of any provisions of the Contract. The indemnification obligations under this paragraph shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation, or benefits payable by or for the CONCESSIONAIRE or any subcontractor under Workers' Compensation or Disability Benefit Acts or Employee Benefit Acts.

- 29. **TERMINATION BY GRANTOR.** If, in the judgment of GRANTOR, the manner of operation of concession or the quality of services does not meet the requirement of this Agreement, or if CONCESSIONAIRE is in default of any other term of this Agreement, GRANTOR shall give CONCESSIONAIRE a written notice specifying the particulars of the unsatisfactory performance or default. If CONCESSIONAIRE fails or refuses to remedy the unsatisfactory performance or default within four (4) days after the receipt by CONCESSIONAIRE, excluding date of notice, GRANTOR may terminate this Agreement. The decision of GRANTOR on any such matter shall be final.
- 30. CONCESSION PREMISES ON TERMINATION. On the termination of this Agreement for any reason, GRANTOR shall have full authority to re-enter and take full possession of the concession premises without the necessity of obtaining any legal process. CONCESSIONAIRE stipulates that GRANTOR shall not be liable to prosecute or for damages for resuming possession of concession premises.

CONCESSIONAIRE agrees to return the CONCESSION PREMISES to the GRANTOR at the termination of this Agreement in the same condition as it was at the start of this Agreement, except for reasonable wear and tear.

- 31. **SOLE PURPOSE**. The concession premises may be used only by CONCESSIONAIRE for the sole purpose of kayak rental, storage and instruction.
- 32. **ASSIGNMENT PROHIBITED**. CONCESSIONAIRE shall not assign any right, privilege, or license conferred by this Agreement, nor may CONCESSIONAIRE sublet or encumber any part of the concession premises without first obtaining the written consent of GRANTOR.
- 33. WAIVER OF BREACH. The waiver by GRANTOR of any breach of any term contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term for any subsequent breach of the same or any other term. The subsequent acceptance of any payment from CONCESSIONAIRE by GRANTOR shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any prior occurring breach by CONCESSIONAIRE of any term contained in this Agreement regardless of the knowledge of GRANTOR of the prior existing breach at the time of the acceptance of the payment.
- 34. **REMEDIES**. In the event of breach by the CONCESSIONAIRE of any term of this Agreement, GRANTOR shall retain all remedies provided by law, including, but not limited to specific performance and injunction.
- 35. **NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY.** This Agreement is entered into solely for the benefit of the contracting parties, and nothing in this Agreement is intended, either expressly or impliedly, to provide any right or benefit of any kind whatsoever to any person or entity who in not a party to this Agreement, or to acknowledge, establish or impose any legal duty to any third party.
- 36. **NOTICE**. All notices required to be given by the parties shall be deemed given by deposing the same in the United State mail, postage prepaid and addressed to:

THIS DOCUMENT IS PART OF THE AGREEMENT entered into by and between NAPERVILLE KAYAK, LLC (hereafter the "Concessionaire") and THE NAPERVILLE PARK DISTRICT ("District").

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth therein and other good and valuable consideration received and to be received, the Concessionaire hereby agrees:

- To comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and rules promulgated by any Federal, State, County, Municipal and or other governmental unit or regulatory body now in effect during the performance of the work. By way of example, the following are included within the scope of the laws, regulations and rules referred to in this paragraph, but in no way to operate as a limitation on the laws, regulations and rules with which CONCESSIONAIRE must comply, are all forms of Dram Shop Act laws, Workers Compensation Laws, all terms of the Equal Employment Opportunity Clause of the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Commission, the Illinois Preference Act, the Social Security Act, Statutes relating to contracts let by units of government, all applicable Civil Rights and Anti-Discrimination Laws and Regulations, and traffic and public utility regulations.
- 2. To keep in force, to the satisfaction of the District, at all times during the performance of any work referred to above, Workers Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance, Commercial General Liability Insurance, specifically including kayak/watercraft rental liability and "contractual liability".
 - 1. Workers' Compensation:

DISCUSSION

The applicant is seeking special use approval to operate a beauty/nail salon and body art service in Unit 102 of the commercial retail building at 12443 S. Route 59. Per recent amendments to the Village's Zoning Ordinance approved on November 7, 2016, beauty/nail salons and body art services are now required to be approved through the special use application process.

Existing Conditions/Site Context

The subject property is located in a 2,100 sq. ft. unit in a 10,500 sq. ft. retail building on approximately 1.12 acres, located at the northeast corner of Route 59 and Industrial Drive. The property is Lot I-7 of the Plainfield Business Park. The adjacent land-uses, zoning and functional street classifications are identified below:

North: Vacant Lot (B-3)

East: Retention Pond (B-3)

South: Industrial Drive (Local Street)

McDonald's and vacant lot (B-3) across the street

West: Illinois Route 59 (Major Arterial)

Village of Plainfield Pressure Adjusting Station (R-1) across the street

ANALYSIS

The applicant is requesting special use approval to permit a beauty/nail salon and body art service in the B-3 zoning district. The applicant's business will occupy the 2,100 sq. ft. Unit 102 of the 10,500 sq. ft. multi-tenant retail building at 12443 S. Route 59. The business, European Beauty Lounge, will offer an array of services, specifically including nail services, manicures, pedicures, waxing, and microblading. Microblading is a new body art technique involving 3-D eyebrow hairstrokes and semi-permanent makeup.

The planned hours of operation for the business are 10:00 A.M. -8:00 P.M. on Monday-Saturday and 10:00 A.M. -6:00 P.M. on Sunday. The business plans to start with three full-time employees, but could hire more employees as the business grows. The applicant foresees a maximum of 10 people at their business at any given time, including three employees servicing three customers, plus up to three to four customers in the waiting area. The property includes a 62-space shared parking lot and staff believes this will be adequate to service this business and the four existing businesses.

The applicant has been in the beauty business in Europe for over 10 years, owning and managing a salon for 11 years and a beauty academy for three years, as well as training nail and lash technicians and working as a microblading expert. The applicant plans to provide the same services in Plainfield as they have in Europe for the past several years.

In order for the Plan Commission to recommend approval of a special use, it must make two findings of fact, as follows:

a.) The special use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate area for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish property values within the neighborhood; and

Staff finds that there will be no detrimental impact to adjacent properties. The multitenant retail building currently includes an Italian restaurant, a specialty Indian grocer, a title-lending business, and an insurance office. Staff believes the proposed use will fill a vacant unit in the building and be complementary to the existing uses on-site and in the surrounding area. Staff also believes that the unique services provided by the business will likely draw customers from both inside and outside of the Village, generating additional traffic that could potentially patronize surrounding Plainfield businesses. Moreover, staff finds that the applicant has demonstrated that the number of people in the business at any one time will not be significant enough to generate parking issues and staff finds that adequate parking has already been provided in the shared lot that services the building. In addition, staff finds that the planned hours of operation and the nature of the business will be desirable and not create any disturbances that would affect surrounding businesses. Staff believes that filling the existing vacancy and allowing the proposed use could actually increase the value of the subject property and the value of surrounding properties, independent of any non-related factors.

b.) The establishment of the special use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the adjacent properties for uses permitted in the subject zoning district.

Staff finds that the proposed use is compatible with, and complementary to, the existing uses on the property and with surrounding properties. Staff believes that the incorporation of this use into the existing multi-tenant retail building will fill a vacancy with a needed and desirable use and contribute to a diversity of uses and the overall economic vitality of the area. Filling existing vacancies with desirable and needed retail services combined with continued commercial demand could eventually spur development of the vacant commercial lots to the north and to the south. To that end, staff believes that allowing the proposed use will not impede the development and improvement of adjacent properties, and if the business is successful, it could actually encourage the development and improvement of adjacent properties.

Plan Commission Consideration

The Plan Commission considered the case at its meeting on January 3, 2017 and held a Public Hearing regarding the matter. There were no public comments.

One of the commissioners noted that there are several beauty/nail salons and body art services in the Village and questioned why this case needed special use approval. Staff restated that while these uses were formerly allowed by right in the B-3 zoning district, the Board of Trustees recently passed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance that now require beauty/nail salons and body art services to receive special use approval.

The commissioners were curious about the microblading aspect of the business, which the applicant further elaborated on. The commissioners asked the applicant if a market analysis was done to see if there was a need for this use in the Village. The applicant responded that while microblading has historically been more popular in Europe, it is becoming increasingly popular in the United States and they see a growing market and demand for it in the area.

The commissioners stated that this center was difficult to access due to the only access to the parking lot being from the rear of the building and asked if staff was aware of any plans to develop the vacant lot to the north. Staff responded that they were not aware of any current plans to develop the vacant lot at the moment.

The Plan Commission recommended approval of the special use permit by a vote of 4-0.

Mr. Bogda reviewed the adjacent uses as noted in the staff report dated December 30, 2016. Mr. Bogda further indicated the house on the property was previously converted into a two-unit residence, with separate entrances, kitchens, bathrooms, bedrooms, and living areas for each of the units. The property previously had a special use permit to allow residential use, but this was canceled when the property became vacant. Mr. Bogda stated there is no garage but described the parking provided.

Ms. Tyrell indicated she has budgeted \$50,000 for new siding for the building, new windows, and landscaping; further indicated the exterior of the property has been neglected but the interior is in good condition; proposes that her daughter live in the

upstairs unit and plans to rent out first floor. Ms. Tyrell indicated she has family in Plainfield and has a business in Plainfield.

Chairman Kiefer asked for public comments. There was no response.

Commissioner Minnis asked if the R-1 Overlay permitted multi-family in the past. Mr. Bogda indicated this property had a special use previously. Commissioner Seggebruch thought it had been a daycare was operated on the first floor previously; felt this proposed use is a better use of the property.

Commissioner Heinen asked if Mr. Bogda was familiar with Vision for Division; felt this was a high profile corner; and agreed this was a good interim use. Mr. Bogda thought the Vision for Division was for Route 59 properties.

DISCUSSION

The applicant is seeking special use approval to allow multi-family residential use in the B-3 commercial zoning district for the property at 23904 W. Main St. While the R-1 overlay that includes the subject property allows for single-family residential use, multi-family use is not permitted in the B-3 district and requires special use approval. The applicant is seeking this special use approval in advance of acquiring and improving the property.

Existing Conditions/Site Context

The subject property consists of a two-story frame house on a 5,300 sq. ft. lot located at the northwest corner of W. Main St. (Illinois Route 126) and Michigan St. The adjacent land-uses, zoning and functional street classifications are identified below:

North: Four:13 Salon & Spa (B-3 with R-1 overlay)

East: Michigan Street (Local Street)

Moravec Orthodontics (B-1 with R-1 overlay) across the street

South: Main Street/Illinois Route 126 (Major Arterial)

Single-family residential (R-1) across the street

West: Novak Real Estate (B-3 with R-1 overlay)

ANALYSIS

The applicant is requesting special use approval to allow a multi-family residential use in the B-3 zoning district. The applicant has signed a contract to purchase the property at 23904 W. Main St., contingent on achieving this special use approval. The house on the property was previously converted into a two-unit residence, with separate entrances, kitchens, bathrooms, bedrooms, and living areas for each of the units. The property previously had a special use permit to allow residential use, but this was canceled when the property became vacant.

The applicant plans to continue the two-family residential use on the property. The applicant plans for her daughter to live in one of the units and will rent out the other unit to another tenant.

Acknowledging the severely neglected nature of the property, the applicant plans to rehabilitate the exterior of the property with new roofing, siding, windows, doors, and fascia & soffits as soon as possible upon purchasing the property. While the exterior of the property will receive an improved appearance and updated color, the overall architecture of the property will remain the same. The applicant also plans to improve the property with new landscaping in the spring of 2017. While the applicant has indicated that the interior of the property is in overall good condition, they will be making some interior improvements as well, including new flooring, paint, and appliances.

The property does not have a dedicated garage or driveway, but a series of parking spaces are provided off of Michigan Street adjacent to the property. The property also includes a fenced yard.

In order for the Plan Commission to recommend approval of a special use, it must make two findings of fact, as follows:

- a.) The special use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate area for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish property values within the neighborhood; and
 - Staff finds that there will be no detrimental impact to adjacent properties. With the planned occupation of and improvement to the property, staff believes that this will contribute to an increased overall appearance to the surrounding area, an increase in economic activity, and an increase in property values independent of any other factors. Staff finds that there is adequate parking off of Michigan Street adjacent to the property to serve this property and other nearby properties. Staff also finds the planned twofamily residential use to be a relatively low-intensity use and will likely not create any nuisances that would impede the use and enjoyment of surrounding properties.
- b.) The establishment of the special use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of the adjacent properties for uses permitted in the subject zoning district.
 - While the property is zoned B-3 and several of the surrounding properties are commercial businesses or are residential properties that have been converted to business use, the

subject property consists of a residential structure that was most recently used for residential purposes prior to becoming vacant. Given the prior residential use and the mix of uses in the general area (including commercial and converted-commercial north of Main Street and residential south of Main Street), staff believes the planned residential use is an appropriate interim use until market dynamics cause the subject property to be converted to or redeveloped for commercial uses. In the meantime, staff believes that the planned improvements to the property and the occupation and productive use of the property for residential purposes to be a significant improvement from the neglected and vacated current state of the property. Staff believes that the reinvestment and improvement of the subject property will enhance the surrounding area and could contribute to increased economic activity and improvement of property values, potentially sparking additional reinvestment and redevelopment in the area.

Plan Commission Consideration

The Plan Commission considered the case at its meeting on January 3, 2017 and held a Public Hearing regarding the matter. There were no public comments. Staff did receive one phone call in advance of the meeting from a nearby resident that was concerned about the neglected state of the property.

The applicant testified that they have a budget of \$50,000 to make improvements to the property and reiterated that her daughter plans to occupy the second floor of the building and will rent out the first-floor unit to another tenant. The applicant testified that she has family in Plainfield, operates a business here, and is dedicated to improving the property.

One of the commissioners asked if the R-1 overlay permitted multi-family in the past, which staff indicated they did not believe so. Staff restated that the property previously had a special use permit to allow multi-family in the B-3 district, but that it was canceled when the property became vacant.

One of the commissioners mentioned that the property was previously used as a home daycare center and felt the proposed two-family residential use was a better use of the property.

Another commissioner questioned whether this was the best use of the property given the long-term plans to develop the area as commercial and the goals of the Vision for Division plan. This commissioner also suggested a TIF district be implemented in the area to encourage future redevelopment. Staff noted that while the market is not quite there yet to support large-scale commercial redevelopment, staff believed this was an appropriate interim use. One of the commissioners agreed with staff and believed that improving and reusing the property could potentially draw attention to the area. The applicant indicated they would be open to selling their property for redevelopment purposes in the future.

The Plan Commission recommended approval of the special use permit by a vote of 4-0.

CONCLUSION/RECOMMENDATION

On January 3, 2017, the Plan Commission recommended approval of a special use permit to allow a two-family residential use in the B-3 zoning district at 23904 W. Main St., and recommends the findings of fact of staff be adopted. Should the Board of Trustees concur, the following motion is offered for your consideration:

Mr. Bogda stated the applicant is seeking special use approval to operate a beauty/nail salon and body art service in Unit 102 of the commercial retail building at 12443 S. Route 59. The Zoning Ordinance which was approved on November 7, 2016 now requires beauty/nail salons and body art service to be approved through the special use application process.

Mr. Bogda described the location of the subject property and described the adjacent uses. Mr. Bogda further stated the business will offer an array of services, specifically including nail services, manicures, pedicures, waxing, and microblading. Microblading is a new body art technique involving 3-D eyebrow hair strokes and semi-permanent makeup.

Mr. Bogda reviewed the findings of fact as noted in the staff report dated December 30, 2016.

Staff also believes that the business will be a desirable use that could potentially draw customers from a wider area, will fill a vacancy in an existing building, will contribute to a healthy variety of commercial uses, and could potentially enhance the overall economic vitality of the area. In advance of any comments from the public hearing or input from the Plan Commission, staff recommends approval.

Chairman Kiefer swore in Bojana Tutnjilovic, owner of the business. Ms. Tutnjilovic indicated they have had a business in Europe for the past 11 years.

Chairman Kiefer asked for public comments. There was no response.

upstairs unit and plans to rent out first floor. Ms. Tyrell indicated she has family in Plainfield and has a business in Plainfield.

Commissioner Minnis asked if the R-1 Overlay permitted multi-family in the past. Mr. Bogda indicated this property had a special use previously. Commissioner Seggebruch thought it had been a daycare was operated on the first floor previously; felt this proposed use is a better use of the property.

Commissioner Heinen asked if Mr. Bogda was familiar with Vision for Division; felt this was a high profile corner; and agreed this was a good interim use. Mr. Bogda thought the Vision for Division was for Route 59 properties.

Commissioner Minnis made a motion to adopt the findings of fact of staff as the findings of fact of the Plan Commission and, furthermore, move to recommend approval of the special use for two-family residential at 23904 W. Main St.

Commissioner Seggebruch seconded the motion. Vote by roll call: Heinen, yes; Seggebruch, yes; Minnis, yes; Kiefer, yes. Motion carried 4-0.

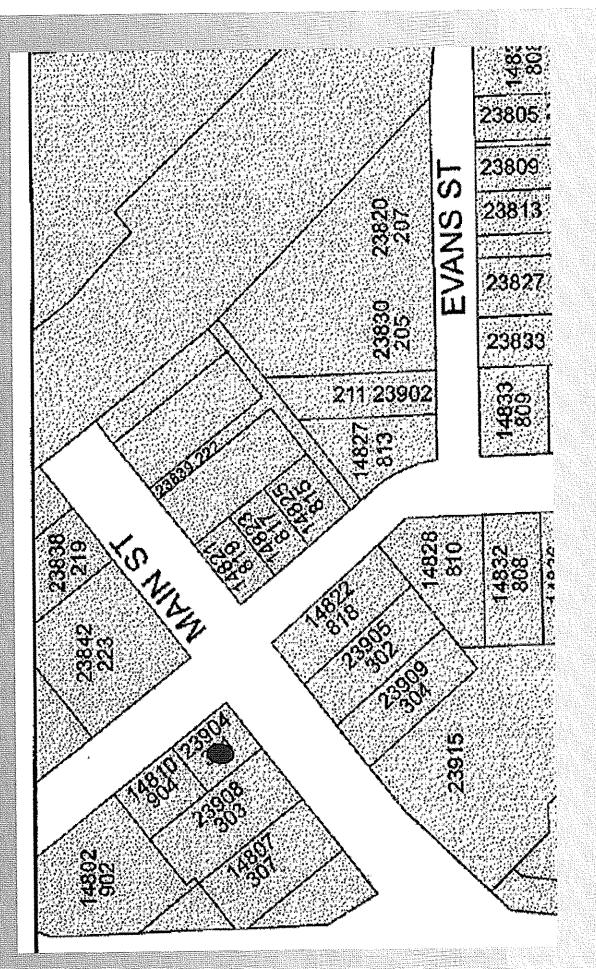

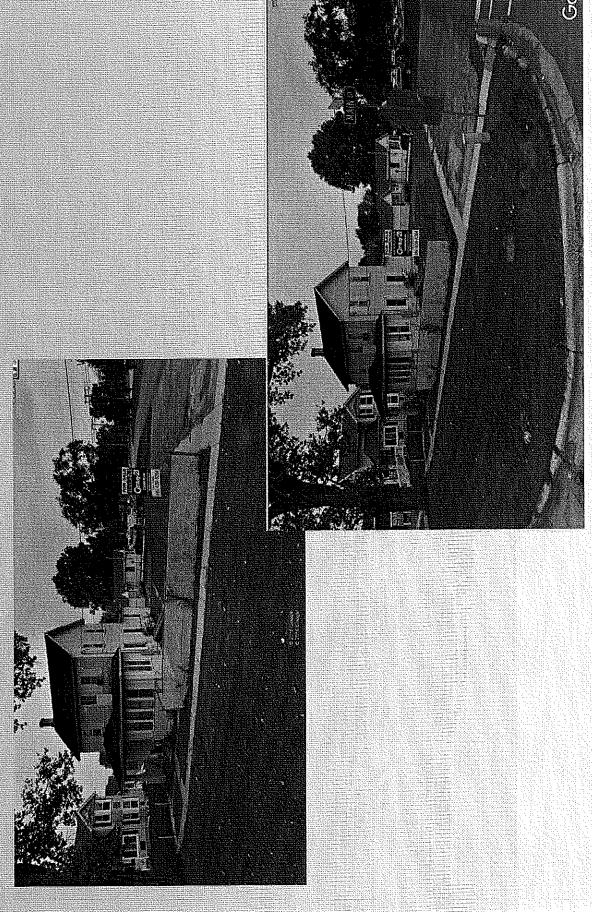

Indian Boundary Bridge Replacement Project – Consultant selection - Engineering Service agreement

Background Findings

Re:

The item under consideration by the Village Board pertains to the engineering Phase 1 and 2 work to design a replacement bridge structure and related improvements.

During 2015, Staff submitted a letter to IDOT requesting that the Indian Boundary Bridge be considered for the MAP 21, Surface Transportation Bridge Program (STP-BR) Grant Funding. This funding source is a cost sharing program whereby this Grant will cover 80% of cost and the Village will be responsible for the other 20% of the cost. We received a letter later that year stating that the Village may proceed with the selection process of a consultant. Staff then followed the State and Federal guidelines to develop a Request for Qualification (RFQ) packet for the project. The RFQ was advertised and the Village received thirteen submittals in all. The submittals were evaluated to narrow the field down to the top three. The three firms, in alphabetical order were; Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Inc., Clark Dietz Engineers and Strand Associates. The top three firms then made a presentation to the Staff committee about the manner in which they would manage and design the project for the Village and the most qualified firm was then selected afterwards.

It is our recommendation that Strand Associates, the most qualified firm, be awarded the engineering agreement. The Phase 1 portion of the agreement would be in an amount not-to-exceed of \$145,000 and the Phase 2 portion would be in an amount not-to-exceed of \$130,000. The Phase 2 scope may change slightly as the Phase 1 process moves through the regulator bodies and may go lower dependent upon direction received. Staff anticipates the Phase 1 and 2 process will take approximately 18 months. It is our initial estimate that the construction costs for the project would be between \$1.1 -1.4 million. The time for construction should take between 12-18 months to complete depending on the time of the bid letting.

Policy Considerations

The item supports the Villages ongoing assessment and improvement of the Villages transportation assets and the direction to utilize outside funding sources whenever possible and to the fullest extent allowed.

According to Section 2-43 (6) of the Village Code of Ordinances, the Village Administrator shall make a recommendation to the President and Board of Trustees on purchases over the \$5,000 statutory limit.

Financial Considerations

The agreement has been reviewed by Staff and meets the Village needs and requirements.

Recommendation

It is our recommendation that the Village Board approves the engineering service agreement and authorizes the Village President to sign said agreement with Strand Associates for the Phase 1 and 2 engineering work for the Indian Boundary Bridge replacement project in an amount not to exceed \$275,000.

b) Final Payment – Upon approval of the work services by the LA but not later than 60 days after the work services are is completed and reports have been made and accepted by the LA and STATE, a sum of money equal to the basic fee as determined in this AGREEMENT less the total of the amounts of partial payments previously paid to the ENGINEER shall be due and payable to the ENGINEER.

4. The recipient shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of any DOT-assisted contract or in the administration of its DBE program or the requirements of 49 CFR part 26. The recipient shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR part 26 to ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts. The recipient's DBE program, as required by 49 CFR part 26 and as approved by DOT, is incorporated by reference in this agreement. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as violation of this agreement. Upon notification to the recipient of its failure to carry out its approved program, the Department may impose sanctions as provided for under part 26 and may, in appropriate cases, refer the matter for enforcement under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or the Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act of 1986 (31U.S.C. 3801 et seq.).

III. IT IS MUTALLY AGREED,

1. That no work services shall be commenced by the ENGINEER prior to issuance by the LA of a written Notice to Proceed.

2. That tracings, plans, specifications, estimates, maps and other documents prepared by the ENGINEER in accordance with this AGREEMENT shall be delivered to and become the property of the LA and that basic survey notes, sketches, charts and other data prepared or obtained in accordance with this AGREEMENT shall be made available, upon request, to the LA or to the STATE, without restriction or limitation as to their use.

- 3. That all reports, plans, estimates and special provisions furnished by the ENGINEER shall be in accordance with the current Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction, Bureau of Local Roads and Streets Administrative Policies, Federal-Aid Procedures for Local Highway Improvements or any other applicable requirements of the STATE, it being understood that all such furnished documents shall be approved by the LA and the STATE before final acceptance. During the performance of the engineering services herein provided for, the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any loss or damage to the documents herein enumerated while they are in the ENGINEER's possession and any such loss or damage shall be restored at the ENGINEER's expense.
- 4. That none of the services to be furnished by the ENGINEER shall be sublet, assigned or transferred to any other party or parties without written consent of the LA. The consent to sublet, assign or otherwise transfer any portion of the services to be furnished by the ENGINEER shall not be construed to relieve the ENGINEER of any responsibility for the fulfillment of this agreement.
- 5. To maintain, for a minimum of 3 years after the completion of the contract, adequate books, records and supporting documents to verify the amounts, recipients and uses of all disbursements of funds passing in conjunction with the contract; the contract and all books, records and supporting documents related to the contract shall be available for review and audit by the Auditor General and the STATE; and to provide full access to all relevant materials. Failure to maintain the books, records and supporting documents required by this section shall establish a presumption in favor of the STATE for the recovery of any funds paid by the STATE under the contract for which adequate books, records and supporting documentation are not available to support their purported disbursement.
- 6. The payment by the LA in accordance with numbered paragraph 3 of Section II will be considered payment in full for all services rendered in accordance with this AGREEMENT whether or not they be actually enumerated in this AGREEMENT.
- 7. That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any and all damages to property or persons arising out of an error, omission and/or negligent act in the prosecution of the ENGINEER's work services and shall indemnify and save harmless the LA, the STATE, and their officers, agents and employees from all suits, claims, actions or damages of any nature whatsoever resulting there from. These indemnities shall not be limited by the listing of any insurance policy.
- 8. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LA upon giving notice in writing to the ENGINEER at the ENGINEER's last known post office address. Upon such termination, the ENGINEER shall cause to be delivered to the LA all drawings, plats, surveys, reports, permits, agreements, soils and foundation analysis, provisions, specifications, partial and completed estimates and data, if any from soil survey and subsurface investigation with the understanding that all such material becomes the property of the LA. The LA will be responsible for reimbursement of all eligible expenses to date of the written notice of termination.
- 9. This certification is required by the Drug Free Workplace Act (30ILCS 580). The Drug Free Workplace Act requires that no grantee or contractor shall receive a grant or be considered for the purpose of being awarded a contract for the procurement of any property or service from the State unless that grantee or contractor will provide a drug free workplace. False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited to, suspension of contract or grant payments, termination of a contract or grant and debarment of the contracting or grant opportunities with the State for at least one (1) year but no more than five (5) years.

For the purpose of this certification, "grantee" or "contractor" means a corporation, partnership or other entity with twenty-five (25) or more employees at the time of issuing the grant, or a department, division or other unit thereof, directly responsible for the specific performance under a contract or grant of \$5,000 or more from the State, as defined in the Act.

The contractor/grantee certifies and agrees that it will provide a drug free workplace by:

- a. Publishing a statement:
 - (1) Notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance, including cannabis, is prohibited in the grantee's or contractor's workplace.

- d. Notifying the contracting or granting agency within ten (10) days after receiving notice under part (B) of paragraph (3) of subsection (a) above from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction.
- e. Imposing a sanction on, or requiring the satisfactory participation in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program by,
- Assisting employees in selecting a course of action in the event drug counseling, treatment and rehabilitation is required and indicating that a trained referral team is in place.
- Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug free workplace through implementation of the Drug Free Workplace Act.

10. The ENGINEER or subconsultant shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the performance of this AGREEMENT. The ENGINEER shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR part 26 in the administration of DOT assisted contracts. Failure by the ENGINEER to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this AGREEMENT, which may result in the termination of this AGREEMENT or such other remedy as the LA deems appropriate.

That the ENGINEER shall be responsible for any and all damages to property or persons arising out of an error, omission and/or negligent act in the prosecution of the ENGINEER's work services and shall indemnify and save harmless the LA, the STATE, and their officers, agents and employees from all suits, claims, actions or damages of any nature whatsoever resulting there from. These indemnities shall not be limited by the listing of any insurance policy.
- 8. This AGREEMENT may be terminated by the LA upon giving notice in writing to the ENGINEER at the ENGINEER's last known post office address. Upon such termination, the ENGINEER shall cause to be delivered to the LA all drawings, plats, surveys, reports, permits, agreements, soils and foundation analysis, provisions, specifications, partial and completed estimates and data, if any from soil survey and subsurface investigation with the understanding that all such material becomes the property of the LA. The LA will be responsible for reimbursement of all eligible expenses to date of the written notice of termination.
- 9. This certification is required by the Drug Free Workplace Act (30ILCS 580). The Drug Free Workplace Act requires that no grantee or contractor shall receive a grant or be considered for the purpose of being awarded a contract for the procurement of any property or service from the State unless that grantee or contractor will provide a drug free workplace. False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited to, suspension of contract or grant payments, termination of a contract or grant and debarment of the contracting or grant opportunities with the State for at least one (1) year but no more than five (5) years.

For the purpose of this certification, "grantee" or "contractor" means a corporation, partnership or other entity with twenty-five (25) or more employees at the time of issuing the grant, or a department, division or other unit thereof, directly responsible for the specific performance under a contract or grant of \$5,000 or more from the State, as defined in the Act.

The contractor/grantee certifies and agrees that it will provide a drug free workplace by:

- a. Publishing a statement:
 - Notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession or use of a controlled substance, including cannabis, is prohibited in the grantee's or contractor's workplace.
 - (2) Specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition.
 - (3) Notifying the employee that, as a condition of employment on such contract or grant, the employee will:
 - (a) abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - (b) notify the employer of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) days after such conviction.
- Establishing a drug free awareness program to inform employees about:
 - (1) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;

- e. Imposing a sanction on, or requiring the satisfactory participation in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program by,
- Assisting employees in selecting a course of action in the event drug counseling, treatment and rehabilitation is required and indicating that a trained referral team is in place.
- g. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug free workplace through implementation of the Drug Free Workplace Act.

10. The ENGINEER or subconsultant shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the performance of this AGREEMENT. The ENGINEER shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR part 26 in the administration of DOT assisted contracts. Failure by the ENGINEER to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this AGREEMENT, which may result in the termination of this AGREEMENT or such other remedy as the LA deems appropriate.
