LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: • Resolution 2019-61 (6/24/2019) – Authorization to apply for an ARLE grant (denied)

- Resolution 2021-66 (6/14/2021) – Authorization to reapply for an ARLE grant (unable to submit the application). The Township received a PennDOT GLG grant for \$206,200 in July 2022.

- This item has not been before the Board of Commissioners previously.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: Lancaster Avenue, especially through Radnor Township, is considered a critical corridor and is often subjected to congestion. A traffic adaptive system allows for the optimum progression of vehicles through the roadway. The Township received a PennDOT Green Light Go grant for a reduced scope project. PennDOT required that its consultant, Michael Baker, complete the design using a portion of the grant.

The project consists of upgrading traffic signals along Lancaster Avenue (SR0030) to traffic adaptive from Chamounix Road/St. Road to Airdale Road at the following seven locations. The intersections received various improvements to upgrade the traffic signals and optimize the signal timings.

- St. Davids/Chamounix Avenue
- Villanova Center
- Sproul Rd /Kenilworth Road/Spring Mill Road/Aldwyn Ln.
- St. Thomas Way
- Ithan Avenue
- Lowry’s Lane

- Airdale Road

An additional six intersections along the Lancaster Avenue corridor were addressed in association with the Penn Medicine facility on King of Prussia Road. Regarding the remainder of the intersections at the western end of Lancaster Avenue within Radnor Township, PennDOT expressed concerns with the viability of an adaptive system. The agency identified the lack of left turn lanes, which impacts traffic progression and constrains the ability to achieve the smooth flow objective of a traffic adaptive system. Also, high pedestrian activity in the central business district area limits the range of optimal timings. Other systems may be more suitable to these intersections.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE: The project is substantially complete but requires final adjustments to meet its intended functionality. At that time, a PennDOT inspection will be conducted and the project closed out.

FISCAL IMPACT: The low, responsible bidder for the traffic adaptive system was Lenni Electric Corporation (\$854,752.33). Two change orders were approved for a total additional cost of \$113,830.55, i.e., 13% of the bid price. This project is funded from the proceeds of the 2019 General Obligation Bond and the Pennsylvania Department of Transportation Green Light Go grant program of \$206,200.

Bill White, Township Manager, spoke on the resolution for community funding which came from Commissioner Mulroney who worked with former Commissioner Abel. Commissioner Mulroney brought it forward, it establishes a committee of Commissioners

and Township Staff that would oversee a process similar to most grant processes, it would be open to qualified 501C3s, this would be followed by a review process which would make it back to the Board of Commissioners for approval.

Commissioner Mulroney spoke on legacy groups that have received money and the allowance for other groups to apply for funding. She also noted the amount of overall funding can be changed each year at the Boards discretion.

FISCAL IMPACT: \$91,044.00 The vehicles can be purchased under the 2026 Pennsylvania COSTARS Program. The funds for this purchase requisition will come from a Township vehicle insurance settlement, and the Capital Vehicle Budget.

LEGISLATION: Resolution 2026-66 - Authorizing the Execution of a Grant Application to the PA Department of Environmental Protection's Section 902 Municipal Recycling Grant Program in the amount of \$250,000 for the Purchase of a Compost Windrow Turner in an Amount of \$277,778, Requiring Matching Funds of \$27,778 from the Capital Improvement Fund.

LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: This item has not previously appeared before the Board of Commissioners.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: The Township is requesting the authorization to apply for a Section 902 Municipal Recycling Grant from the PA Department of Environmental Protection, which would be used to purchase a Compost Windrow Turner. Skunk Hollow Park serves as the Township's primary leaf composting site, where leaves collected in the fall are placed in multiple large windrows for compost processing. Currently, the Public Works Department uses a front-end loader to turn multiple large windrows of leaves. These leaf piles remain in very long windrows at Skunk Hollow for several years to accomplish the composting process.

With a Compost Windrow Turner, the leaves could be turned more frequently, improving aeration, mixing, and moisture distribution. This would accelerate decomposition and produce more consistent, higher-quality leaf mulch, in a shorter timeframe for distribution and use by our residents, and Township. It would also reduce greenhouse gas emissions through proper aeration, decrease the amount of space required at Skunk Hollow Park, and help maintain compliance with the PA DEP composting guidelines and best management practices.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE: Pending authorization from the Board of Commissioners, the grant application will be prepared and submitted prior to the May 22, 2026 deadline.

FISCAL IMPACT: There is no direct fiscal impact or financial obligation to authorizing the execution of a grant application to DEP's 902 Municipal Recycling Grant Program for the purchase of a Compost Windrow Turner. The Township will only accept the terms of the proposed DEP's 902 Municipal Recycling Grant Program, in the event that it is awarded, upon approval by the Board of Commissioners

at a future meeting. Radnor Township is requesting \$250,000 in grant funding from DEP, with a local Township cash match not to exceed \$27,778 from the Capital Improvement Fund.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Radnor Township has the opportunity to execute grant applications through the PA Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) Section 902 Municipal Recycling Grant Program due to the scope and nature of the grant for the purchase of a Compost Windrow Turner. Projects eligible for grant funding are those that divert the following recyclable materials from municipal solid waste: source separated recyclable materials (clear glass, colored glass, aluminum, steel and bimetallic cans, high-grade office paper, newsprint, corrugated paper, plastics and other marketable grades of paper), source separated food waste and leaf/yard waste.

Staff requests that the Radnor Township Board of Commissioners authorize the Township Manager to execute all documents and agreements between the Township of Radnor and the Department of Environmental Protection to facilitate and assist in obtaining DEP's 902 Recycling Grant Program for the purchase of a Compost Windrow Turner in the grant request amount of \$250,000. The proposed resolution is attached.

Township Staff will prepare and administer the necessary grant documentation, and will coordinate the purchase of the turner if approved by the Board of Commissioners and subsequent granting authorities.

WHEREAS, projects eligible for grant funding are those that divert the following recyclable materials from municipal solid waste including leaf/yard waste; and

LEGISLATION: Resolution 2026-64 - Authorizing the Township to enter into an agreement with Stix Lacrosse for 2026 seasonal recreational lacrosse programming in an amount that is estimated at \$20,000 (100% of which is offset by programming proceeds).

LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: This is a one-time resolution that is specific to the seasonal lacrosse recreational programming in 2026. Since the program enrollment is anticipated to be high enough to cause Stix Lacrosse's portion of the proceeds to exceed \$7,500, the Charter requires that the Board formally approve the agreement.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: The Parks & Recreation Department would like to work with Stix Lacrosse to offer various seasonal lacrosse recreational programs in 2026. These programs include developmental lacrosse programming focused on an introduction to skill development, of which complements the program offering of our Radnor Youth Girls/Boys Organizations. It is anticipated that the enrollment for the seasonal recreational programming will be high enough to cause Stix Lacrosse's portion of the proceeds to exceed \$7,500. The purpose for the resolution is to satisfy the Charter requirement that any contract that exceeds \$7,500 must be formally approved by the Board of Commissioners.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE: Upon Approval.

FISCAL IMPACT: The impact of the seasonal recreational programming is that it is anticipated that the Township will generate 20% of the total programming sales (plus 100% of the non-resident fees) and that 80% of the total programming sales will be retained by Stix Lacrosse under this contractual agreement, which is estimated at \$20,000.00 for 2026. Stix Lacrosse will be responsible for collecting all of the proceeds generated from the seasonal programming and the Township will receive their 20% portion from Stix Lacrosse. There will be no direct payment made by the Township under this contractual agreement and therefore no direct impact to the expense portion of the Township 2026 Budget.

ORDINANCE NO. 2026-11

AN ORDINANCE OF RADNOR TOWNSHIP, DELAWARE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, AMENDING THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF RADNOR, CHAPTER 240, SOLID WASTE, ARTICLE III, GENERAL PROVISIONS; RECYCLING, SECTIONS 240-21, DEFINITIONS, AND SECTION 240-25, RECYCLABLES, TO REQUIRE RECYCLING AT COMMUNITY EVENTS.

The Board of Commissioners of the Township of Radnor does hereby ENACT and ORDAIN the following amendment to Section 240, Solid Waste, Article III, General Provisions; Recycling, as follows:

Section 1. Section 240-21, Definitions, is hereby amended to include the following definition in its appropriate alphabetical position:

COMMUNITY EVENT

Any gathering that is open to the public, including, without limitation, any parade, outdoor demonstration, picnic, meeting, dance, live entertainment, concert or other musical event, stage show, fireworks, sporting event, for any and all purposes.

Section 2. Section 240-25, Recyclables, is hereby amended to add a new Subsection G as follows:

G. Community Events.

1. The organizers or sponsors of a community event shall establish a collection system that includes an appropriate number of recycling containers at easily accessible locations to accommodate the amount of recyclable material generated. Community activity organizers and sponsors shall provide signage and/or labels on recycling containers to indicate what recyclable materials are to be source separated by event participants.
2. Organizers or sponsors shall contact the Township for the collection of recyclable materials, at a fee to be determined by the Township.

Section 3. Repealer. All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. Severability. If any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than that portion specifically declared invalid.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective in accordance with the Home Rule Charter of Radnor Township.



AN ORDINANCE OF RADNOR TOWNSHIP, DELAWARE COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, AMENDING THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF RADNOR, CHAPTER 240, SOLID WASTE, ARTICLE III, GENERAL PROVISIONS; RECYCLING, SECTIONS 240-21, DEFINITIONS, AND 240-25, RECYCLABLES, TO REQUIRE RECYCLING AT COMMUNITY EVENTS.

The Board of Commissioners of the Township of Radnor does hereby ENACT and ORDAIN the following amendment to Section 240, Solid Waste, Article III, General Provisions; Recycling, as follows:

Section 1. Section 240-21, Definitions, is hereby amended to include the following definition in its appropriate alphabetical position:

COMMUNITY EVENT

Any gathering that is open to the public, including, without limitation, any parade, outdoor demonstration, meeting, dance, live entertainment, concert, rock group, stage show, burlesque, vaudeville, disc jockey or talent show, for any and all purposes.

Section 2. Section 240-25, Recyclables, is hereby amended to add a new Subsection G as follows:

G. Community Events.

1. The organizers or sponsors of a community event shall establish a collection system that includes an appropriate number of recycling containers at easily accessible locations to accommodate the amount of recyclable material generated. Community activity organizers and sponsors shall provide signage and/or labels on recycling containers to indicate what recyclable materials are to be source separated by event participants.
2. Organizers or sponsors shall contact the Township for the collection of recyclable materials, at a fee to be determined by the Township.

Section 3. Repealer. All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4. Severability. If any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than that portion specifically declared invalid.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective in accordance with the Home Rule Charter of Radnor Township.

ORDINANCE NO. 2026 -12

AN ORDINANCE OF RADNOR TOWNSHIP, DELAWARE COUNTY, COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, CREATING CHAPTER 115, ARTICLE IV – “PET STORES” OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF RADNOR; ADDING DEFINITIONS TO CHAPTER 115, ARTICLE I; PROHIBITING THE SALE OF PETS IN PET STORES; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS; REPEALING ALL INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES OR PARTS THEREOF; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Charter of the Township of Radnor (“*Charter*”) authorizes the Board of Commissioners of Radnor Township (“*Board*”) to exercise any powers and perform any functions not denied by the Constitution of the United States, by the Constitution and applicable laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, or by the Charter;

WHEREAS, a significant number of pets sold at pet stores come from large-scale, commercial breeding facilities where the health and welfare of the animals are not adequately provided for; and

WHEREAS, the documented abuses endemic to these commercial breeding facilities include over-breeding, inbreeding, minimal to non-existent veterinary care, lack of adequate and nutritious food or water, lack of adequate shelter, lack of socialization, lack of adequate space, and lack of adequate exercise; and

WHEREAS, the inhumane conditions at commercial breeding facilities lead to health and behavioral issues in the animals bred in those facilities, which many consumers are unaware of when purchasing animals from retail pet stores because these issues do not present themselves until sometime after the purchase of the animals; and

WHEREAS, across the country, thousands of independent pet stores as well as large chains operate profitably with a business model focused on the sale of pet services and supplies, and not on the sale of pets, and many of these stores collaborate with animal shelters and rescue organizations to offer space and support for showcasing adoptable homeless pets on their premises; and

WHEREAS, this Ordinance will not affect consumers’ ability to obtain a pet of their choice directly from a breed-specific rescue organization or a shelter or from breeders directly; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the proposed Ordinance amending the Code of the Township of Radnor (the “*Code*”) promotes the health, safety, and general welfare of Township residents by enacting reasonable regulations to reduce costs to the Township and

its residents, protect residents who may seek to purchase pets, and help prevent inhumane breeding conditions, promote community awareness of animal welfare, and foster a more humane environment in the Township.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Commissioners of Radnor Township, Delaware County, Pennsylvania, does hereby **ENACT** and **ORDAIN** as follows:

SECTION I. Chapter 115 of the Code (“Animals”), Article I (“Definitions”), Section 115-1 (“Terms defined”) is hereby amended to add the following definitions which shall be inserted in alphabetical order:

§ 115-1 Definitions.

ANIMAL – Any nonliving human organism having sensation and the power of voluntary movement and requiring for its existence oxygen and organic food.

ANIMAL SHELTER –

- (1) a facility operated by or under contract with a state or political subdivision of any state for the impoundment and care of seized, stray, homeless, abandoned, unwanted, or surrendered animals; or
- (2) a facility maintained or operated by a non-profit organization incorporated under the laws of any state and exempt from federal taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, and whose principal purpose is to rescue sick, injured, abused, neglected, unwanted, abandoned, orphaned, lost, or displaced animals and to offer them for adoption to safe, responsible, permanent homes.

ANIMAL RESCUE ORGANIZATION - A nonprofit organization incorporated under the law of any state and exempt from federal taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended, and whose principal purpose is the prevention of cruelty to animals and whose principal activity is to rescue sick, injured, abused, neglected, unwanted, abandoned, orphaned, lost, or displaced animals and to offer them for adoption to safe, responsible, permanent homes. This term shall not include any entity that breeds animals or that: (a) is located on the same premises as, (b) has any personnel in common with, (c) obtains pets in exchange for payment or any other compensation from, or (d) facilitates the sale of pets obtained from, a person that breeds animals.

OFFER FOR SALE – To display or proffer for acceptance, for remuneration.

PET – Any animal maintained in captivity and/or being sold or offered for sale for the purpose of being maintained in captivity, including but not limited to dogs, cats, rabbits, birds, fish, mammals, reptiles and amphibians. The term also includes the germ plasm, embryos, and fertile ova of such animals.

RETAIL PET STORE – A commercial establishment that sells or offers for sale on its premises any animals or any pet-related supplies, including but not limited to food, toys, and accessories, directly to the public for use by pets. The term shall not include an animal shelter, an animal rescue organization, or an individual selling only animals that the individual has bred

and raised.

SELL – To exchange for consideration, barter, trade, lease or otherwise transfer.

SECTION II. Chapter 115 of the Code (“Animals”) is amended to add Article IV (“Pet Stores”), which shall contain the following sections and shall read as follows:

Article IV - Pet Stores

§ 115-19 Prohibition of the Sale of Pets.

- A. It shall be unlawful for a retail pet store to sell, offer for sale, deliver, barter, auction, or transfer a pet for remuneration.
- B. Nothing in this Section shall be construed to prohibit a retail pet store from providing space to either an animal shelter or to an animal rescue organization, whether such shelter or organization is located within or outside the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, for the purposes of displaying pets available for adoption.
- C. This Section shall not apply to the display, sale, offer for sale, delivery, bartering, auction, giving away, or transfer of pets from the premises on which they were bred and raised.

§ 115-20 Prohibition of Adoption from Noncompliant Store, Shelter, Organization

In the event that the Director of the Department of Engineering and Community Development of Radnor Township (“Director”) or the Director’s designee determines that a retail pet store, animal shelter, or animal rescue organization operating in Radnor Township is substantially out of compliance with any applicable statutes, laws, regulations, or ordinances relating to animal welfare, the Director or Director’s designee may order that the retail pet store, animal shelter, or animal rescue organization be prohibited from offering animals for adoption until such noncompliance is remediated to the satisfaction of the Director or Director’s designee. A violation of any order issued under this subsection shall constitute a violation of this Section.

§ 115-21 Enforcement.

The provisions of this Article may be enforced by the Radnor Township Police Department and/or the Radnor Township Engineering and Community Development Department.

§ 115-22 Violation, penalties, and remedies.

- (1) Any retail pet store, any owner of a retail pet store, and any other person or organization that violates any provision of this Article commits a summary offense and, upon conviction, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000, plus costs, including reasonable attorneys’ fees incurred by the Township as a result of its prosecution of the violation. Each separate act of unlawful sale or offer for sale of any pet, or violation of an order issued under Section 115-19.C, shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

(2) The Board of Commissioners or the Director of Engineering and Community Development, with the approval of the Board of Commissioners, may institute in the name of the Township any appropriate civil action or proceedings to restrain, correct, or abate continuing violations of this Article, or to prevent any violation, illegal act, illegal conduct, or illegal use in violation of this Article. The Township shall be entitled to reasonable attorneys' fees incurred by the Township as a result of its pursuit of any civil actions or proceedings brought under this Article. The rights and remedies provided in this subsection are cumulative and in addition to all other remedies provided for by law.

SECTION III. Severability. If any section, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance shall be declared illegal, invalid, or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such declaration shall not prevent, preclude, or otherwise foreclose enforcement of any of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

SECTION IV. Repealer. All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION V. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect in accordance with the Radnor Township Home Rule Charter.







LEGISLATION: Resolution 2026-70 - Authorization for the expenditure to purchase 97 banners for the America250 Celebration, in an amount not to exceed \$25,000.

LEGISLATIVE HISTORY: On April 13, 2026, the Board adopted Resolution 2026-57, authorizing the license agreement for an America250 for a mural as well as the expenditure of funds not to exceed \$43,000 for the mural (\$12,000) and a fireworks show (\$31,000). We now know the fireworks will only cost \$16,800, leaving some funds available for the banners, should the Board elect to move forward.

PURPOSE AND EXPLANATION: This resolution is being presented to improve the current banner program with an aesthetically pleasing red, white, and blue patriotic theme in honor of the America250 celebration. To help build township-wide awareness and togetherness, while beautifying the Lancaster Corridor (from Aberdeen to Banbury), along with North and South Wayne from the War Memorial to West Ave, and the Garrett Hill Business District from Summit Terrace to Clem Macrone, this resolution authorizes the purchase of 97 America250 banners. The distribution includes 79 banners along Lancaster, North and South Wayne, plus 18 banners in Garrett Hill.

IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE: This resolution is needed at the May 11th meeting to allow enough lead time for the printer to manufacture the double-sided cloth banners in time for their installation tentatively scheduled for early June. The plan is to have the banners hung throughout the summer and late into 2026, ahead of a larger conversation about a rotating banner program (to be discussed at a later date).

FISCAL IMPACT: Main Line Print Shop has quoted a per unit price of \$215. At 97 banners, the total cost of the banners is expected to be around \$21,000. Then, it is anticipated some additional costs will be incurred for setup and installation (brackets/ hardware). All said, the request is for a not to exceed \$25,000.
