CALL TO ORDER

The City Council convened in Work Session on July 28, 2025 at 6:31 p.m. in the Government Office Building Council Chambers, Room 301, located at 125 N. Division Street.

PRESENTATION

President Doughty called Chief Frampton forward for the presentation.

• 1st Half of 2025 Statistical Update of the SFD

Chief Frampton presented a midyear 2025 update, reporting an 8.9% increase in total calls compared to the same period in 2024. He explained that "fire unit responses" count each individual vehicle dispatched, reflecting equipment use and wear. The rise in calls was attributed to city and county population growth. To address higher demand, discussions were underway to add a fifth EMS unit during peak hours. The department was also exploring ways to reduce non-emergency calls from skilled nursing facilities through community paramedicine and educational programs.

Financially, Salisbury secured improved funding from Wicomico County, with \$3.5 million paid in FY25—including a \$1.5 million catch-up—and \$3.7 million projected for FY26, bringing the city in line with other county fire departments. EMS billing revenue was projected at \$2.62 million for the year, while the Fire Marshal's Office generated \$275,000 and saved over \$4 million in property value. The department was fully staffed, implemented firefighter health screenings, and continued community outreach programs, including school-based opioid education. Council members praised the department for its transparency and dedication amid rising service demands.

ORDINANCE

• Ordinance for MOOR ORF Opioid Grant Amendment

Chief Frampton shared that a state grant that was originally awarded in January for \$542,000 had been

increased to \$623,300 due to new legislation allowing the funds to cover indirect administrative costs. With no questions from Council, they gave consensus to move forward to Legislative Session.

• Ordinance - Accept Equitable Sharing Funds

Captain Felts requested authorization to use \$150,000 in equitable sharing funds to expand and improve storage systems. They proposed \$75,000 for completing a property storage system to meet legal and chain-of-custody requirements and another \$75,000 for half the cost of a new records storage system, with the remainder already included in the current year's budget. No questions were asked by Council, and consensus was given to move forward to Legislative Session.

COUNCIL DISCUSSION

• Housing Presentation by Councilwoman Sharon Dashiell followed by Council discussion

Ms. Dashiell discussed current housing challenges affecting renters, buyers, seniors, veterans, and low-income residents. She explained that the housing stock was approximately 70% rentals and 30% owner-occupied with a shortage of starter homes and delays for buyers due to high interest rates. Potential solutions included apartments, single-family homes, duplexes, townhouses, ADUs, assisted living, and senior housing. Discussion on House Bill 1466, effective 2026, was noted and would allow ADUs on single-family owner-occupied properties, expanding flexible housing options. The 4-to-2 ordinance was noted as important for maintaining balance in single-family districts. Timing, financing, and availability of housing remain challenges, with 969 new building permits currently open. Rising development costs affect affordability, and incentives and clear ADU guidelines were suggested to support multigenerational households. The Council proposed centralizing housing resources and providing monthly updates on progress to streamline access and inform the public.

PUBLIC COMMENT (Agenda Items Only)

The following public comments were heard:

- Speaker #1 spoke in support of expanding the 4-to-2 ordinance, noting it preserved neighborhood integrity
- Speaker #2 echoed speaker #1 and raised concerns about new developments' contributions to affordable housing.
- Speaker #3 highlighted the city's urgent housing crisis, stressing its impact on families, workers, and the local economy, and urged the city to prioritize safe, affordable housing.
- Speaker #4 noted that replacing college rentals with families had improved neighborhood peace and stability.
- Speaker #5 highlighted the city's affordable housing challenges, noting rents had risen far faster than incomes and many families faced mortgage and down payment gaps.
- Speaker #6 noted rising housing costs and stressed the need for reliable public transportation to support residents without cars.

ADMINISTRATION COMMENTS

Mayor Taylor thanked everyone for participating in the housing discussion, acknowledged the complexity of affordability and transportation issues, noted limited city resources, and emphasized the need to balance community needs while seeking long-term solutions.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Ms. Gregory pointed out the need to consider nontraditional families who might be excluded by the 4-to-2 rule. She also gave a shout-out to Debbie and Randy Day for donating \$1 million to the new Wicomico County Public Library's children's area.

Ms. Jackson highlighted the Games On youth program and how successful it had been. She thanked city staff, schools, and volunteers for their help with the program and reminded everyone about National Night Out.

Ms. Dashiell attended the Junior Fire Academy graduation and met K-9 dogs trained in explosives, drugs, and arson detection. She thanked Mr. Voitiuc and the Department of Infrastructure and Development for involving them in the ADU website project.

President Doughty thanked everyone for the fruitful conversation about housing. He noted that the Blood Bank had reopened in Salisbury and encouraged everyone to donate.

CALL TO ORDER

The City Council convened in Work Session on August 11, 2025 at 6:26 p.m. in the Government Office Building Council Chambers, Room 301, located at 125 N. Division Street.

PRESENTATION

• Salisbury Adopt-A-Road Program - presented by Dave Chiddenton

Mr. Chiddenton, from Wicomico Presbyterian Church, thanked the city council for approving their participation in the Adopt-a-Road program, proposing to maintain Fitzwater Street from Mill to Pemberton Drive with four to six cleanups a year. He shared past program materials, clarified safety procedures, and discussed signage, documentation, and coordination. The city confirmed they were finalizing legal forms, setting up an online sign-up process, and planning publicity to encourage more groups to adopt roads.

• Water and Sewer Presentation

Ms. Green and Ms. Cameron presented "Water & Sewer 101," noting the water and sewer system was funded entirely by customer fees and not tax dollars. They noted that fees supported operations, capital projects, and debt service. A significant increase in FY29 when annual bond payments could rise from \$150,000 to \$3.6 million following retirement of a 2008 loan. Ms. Green added that the fund had a \$3 million negative unrestricted balance and \$93 million in projected capital needs for FY26–30, driven by inflation, higher chemical costs, and new PFAS filtration requirements. Council requested a list of overdue and upcoming projects with original and current cost estimates and a simpler explanation of the debt increase. Ms. Green and Ms. Cameron reviewed billing procedures, assistance programs, and clarified that water and sewer charges only fund the utility system.

ORDINANCE

• Budget Amendment for Lawsuit Funds

Ms. Green presented an ordinance to amend the FY26 budget, reallocating \$2 million in anticipated PFAS lawsuit proceeds from the Water Sewer Fund to the Water Sewer Capital Project Fund, and shifting \$1.5 million in project funding to be covered by these proceeds. The \$469,900 difference will come from Water Sewer Fund surplus and be assigned to the PFAS filter project to cover upfront costs before state loan funds are received. Council reached consensus to move the ordinance forward.

• Budget Amendment for Union Negotiations

Ms. Green stated that on June 16, 2025, Council approved Resolution 3414 and three union side letters from wage reopener negotiations, resulting in wage increases not in the adopted FY26 budget. She added that the FY26 budget originally provided one-step salary increases in July 2025 and January 2026; negotiations added another step in July 2025 and increased Fire step increments from 2% to 2.25%, creating \$1,336,784 in unbudgeted costs. Ms. Green explained that an ordinance was presented to amend the FY26 budget to cover these costs. Ms. Caton suggested adjusting the negotiation calendar (currently Oct–Jan) to align with budget information, and to consider guidelines or caps for wage increases tied to available revenue. She also noted options such as percentage-of-revenue formulas, guaranteed increases contingent on projected growth, arbitration subject to Council approval, or removing certain provisions from the labor code as a last resort. She mentioned that timeline changes may be acted on quickly, with broader wage policy changes requiring more analysis. She highlighted that the current union contracts run through FY26, providing time to review processes but suggested moving quickly with the timeline changes. Council reached consensus to move forward with the budget amendment.

PUBLIC COMMENT (Agenda Items Only)

The following public comments were heard:

- Speaker #1 expressed concerns about poor management and oversight in city projects and union contracts. He also noted ongoing issues with city water quality and suggested that any rate increases should target commercial users rather than residents.
- Speaker #2 criticized the 2026 budget amendment's \$1.3 million cost for union salary and fringe increases, questioned funding sources and fee hikes, and condemned ongoing mismanagement of the water and sewer funds.

ADMINISTRATION COMMENTS

Mr. Swiger praised the police department for a successful National Night Out, reminded everyone about Third Friday's disco-themed event featuring the new downtown TAPS program for to-go alcohol, and announced the long-awaited Carroll Street repaying and restriping project starting next Monday.

Mayor Taylor recognized Mr. Swiger, Mr. Lowe and Mr. Feliciano for their new assignments and noted that the city anticipates swearing in a new City Administrator soon.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Ms. Gregory thanked Mr. Swiger and the field operations team for completing the long-awaited

sidewalk providing park access and was glad to hear the report of how National Night Out went since she was unable to attend.

Ms. Blake was looking forward to Carroll Street getting redesigned and striped. She noted that the Blood Bank on Mt. Hermon Road was back open and asked everyone to consider donating blood and plasma.

Ms. Dashiell praised National Night Out and the city's quick response regarding the unsafe bridge. She highlighted the impressive hands-on training in the Junior Fire Academy for kids. She shared exciting developments at the local airport with an aerospace startup testing hybrid-electric drones and suggested revisiting previous housing questions to develop actionable solutions.

President Doughty echoed the same thoughts for National Night Out and praised the community and volunteers. He highlighted the Junior Fire Academy and 911 Center operations, and encouraged continued public engagement, noting the next meeting was in two weeks.

CALL TO ORDER

The City Council convened in Work Session on August 25, 2025 at 6:24 p.m. in the Government Office Building Council Chambers, Room 301, located at 125 N. Division Street.

PRESENTATIONS

• Maryland Heritage Areas Authority Grant Presentation

Ms. O'Hare shared that the Maryland Folk Festival received a \$50,000 grant from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority, with support from Beach to Bay Heritage Area, to fund the Folk Life stage. This year's theme - Maryland, America in Miniature - showcases the state's cultural heritage through music, dance, crafts, and storytelling, including Janice Curtis Green as Harriet Tubman. The grant covers artist fees, travel, lodging, staff, and equipment, promoting Salisbury as a cultural hub and boosting tourism and economic development. The festival runs September 19–21 across four stages, with downtown businesses participating.

• Presentation of Brand New Downtown SBY Website

Mr. Ray presented Salisbury's new website, downtownsby.com. The website was designed to be the central hub for residents and visitors to explore downtown events, businesses, and cultural initiatives. He explained that it replaced the outdated platform and offered an easy-to-navigate, fully functional experience. Key features included a month-by-month event calendar, a categorized business directory, and an interactive GIS portal highlighting public art and walking tours. The site allowed users to plan visits, boosted downtown engagement and tourism, and drove foot traffic to local businesses. Mr. Ray noted the website was led by the communications department and strengthened the city's connection with the community and visitors.

RESOLUTIONS

• Franchise Fee Negotiations

Finance Director Sandy Green presented a resolution to appoint Cohen Law Group and CBG Communications for cable franchise renewal consulting. The current contract had expired and their expertise was needed for complex negotiations. Cohen Law Group was deemed the most qualified. Council gave consensus to move this forward to Legislative Session.

• Annexation Introduction for Gordy Road/Beaglin Park Drive

Mr. White reviewed a request to annex 0.87 acres of parcel 312 along Gordy Road to complete the Aydelotte Farms PRD, bringing several lots fully into city limits with zoning as Plan Residential Zone 7. Parcel 310 and its access easement were excluded per the owner's wishes. After addressing questions about utilities and the property, the council gave consensus to move the annexation forward.

• Annexation Introduction for Johnson Road, Parcel 269

Ms. Jean introduced a request to annex parcel 269 on Johnson Road, a 14.88-acre property currently zoned R20 in Wicomico County. The applicant requested R5A residential zoning for a development of 148 townhomes with public water and sewer. Discussions included potential policies for including affordable housing in future annexations and the benefits of connecting to city water and sewer versus having wells. It was noted that the existing home on the parcel would not be annexed. The council gave consensus to move the annexation forward.

ORDINANCES

• Drug Court Grant

Chief Meienschein informed the Council that \$5,000 in recurring funding from the Office of Problem-Solving Courts supported Wicomico Drug Court clients, helped officers perform home visits and curfew checks to assist in aid compliance, recovery, and to reduce crime. Having no further questions, consensus was given by the council to move this forward to Legislative Session.

• Budget Amendment for North Prong

Mr. Swiger presented an ordinance to approve a budget amendment reallocating funds to 337 Lake Street as part of the North Prong Park project. Funds would be transferred from the Unity Square streetscaping project, which was almost complete. Councilmembers expressed strong support, noting the property was an eyesore and the project had been long awaited. Consensus was given to move the amendment forward.

PUBLIC COMMENT (Agenda Items Only)

The following public comments were heard:

- Speaker #1 urged the council to adopt an affordable housing code, noting Salisbury lacked one. Council responded that updates would come from the housing team in September.
- Speaker #2 highlighted costs from failing septic systems and the need for better public education on city services and gradual tax payments.

• Speaker #3 was in favor of the North Prong property purchase and wanted a community-driven planning process, while addressing issues like lack of shade early in the design.

ADMINISTRATION COMMENTS

Mayor Taylor expressed appreciation for public comments on Carroll Street. He noted the upcoming projects: infrastructure improvements on Fitzwater Street, installation of the final floodgate on Lake Streets east side, and repairs to damaged concrete buffers, with more projects planned.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Ms. Jackson praised the summer program for engaging kids from multiple communities with activities and arts, and thanked city staff and volunteers for their support. She emphasized the importance of such programs for keeping children safe. Additionally, she encouraged community support for Relay for Life, sharing personal experience as a two-time cancer survivor.

Ms. Dashiell recognized Poplar Hill's 50th anniversary, the Estonian choir performance, the Tidal Health Clinic ribbon-cutting, local cleanup efforts, and Salisbury University's 100-year celebration.

Ms. Blake congratulated Ms. Jackson on the successful program and was excited for the Westside Community Center. She shared a personal connection to Salisbury University, highlighting her grandmother's history there. Ms. Blake encouraged plasma, blood and organ donation, and reminded everyone to drive safely as school resumed. She also applauded the Council and Mayor for allocating \$1 million for infrastructure improvements in Foggy Bottom, Spring Chase, and Schumaker Manor, noting the positive impact for those communities.

President Doughty attended the Governor's sub-cabinet summer roundtable on socioeconomic procurement. The new Maryland Department of Social and Economic Mobility would streamline resources from three offices to support historically underserved communities.

• Summer Youth Program Recap

Ms. Manning highlighted a successful summer youth program. The program included: the first Youth Business Fair (12 entrepreneurs), the Newton Community Center drop-in program (650 visits), gardening and cooking activities, arts and crafts, and a field trip to the zoo. The new "Game On" program at Lake Street Playground drew 10–25 kids daily, with free lunches provided. The Summer Youth Employment Program hired 11 high school students in various city departments. She noted that the summer would conclude with the upcoming Parkfest event, which offered free games, food, and activities for the community.

RESOLUTION

• <u>Charter Amendment - Updating SC5-1 to increase the maximum fines for misdemeanors and municipal infractions</u>

Mr. Boda presented a charter amendment for the purpose of updating fines and municipal infractions. The idea was to create an annual fine schedule to avoid frequent code updates. An alternative to creating the annual schedule was to reference state law for simplicity and clarity. Vice President Blake asked Ms. English for this option to be presented at the next Work Session. Consensus was reached to move the amendment forward.

ORDINANCE

• Ordinance to add the International Property Maintenance Code to Title 15 of the Salisbury City Code

Mr. Boda presented an ordinance to amend Title 15 of the Salisbury City Code for the purpose of referencing the 2021 International Property Maintenance Code. He explained that this aligned with the code used in trainings and certifications taken by the housing inspectors and code enforcement officers. Consensus was reached to move the ordinance forward.

COUNCIL DISCUSSION

• Boards and Commissions – Vice President Blake tabled this conversation. No vote was taken.

PUBLIC COMMENT (Agenda Items Only)

The following public comments were heard:

- Speaker # 1 encouraged more proactive code enforcement, criticizing the current complaintdriven system and cited a case where rental inspectors would not act without a court order.

Salisbury Department of Water Works posted an invitation to bid for the Sandblasting and painting of the Elevated Water Storage Tank at Salisbury University on 7/25/25. Six responsive and acceptable bids were received and opened on 8/29/25.

The Department of Water Works conducted further investigation into past job performances of the low bidder and found numerous safety concerns and have deemed them non responsible due to prior performance at other municipal entities. We recommend award of bid to the second lowest bidder, Minoan Industrial LLC, for \$564,700.00. This ordinance presents proposed amendments to Chapter 2.25 of the Salisbury City Code ("Labor Code") for the Council's review. The updates aim to modernize the City's labor provisions, clarify the collective bargaining process, and better align the ordinance with current operational needs. The proposal focuses on adjusting the bargaining timeline.

ORDINANCE NO. 2966

 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SALISBURY AMENDING CHAPTER 2.25 OF THE SALISBURY CITY CODE ENTITLED "LABOR CODE" TO BETTER DEFINE "EMPLOYEE" AND TO CHANGE THE TIMELINE FOR BARGAINING.

WHEREAS, by Ordinance No. 2817, the City of Salisbury amended the City Code to add Chapter 2.25, entitled "Labor Code," in furtherance of Article XXIII of the City Charter, which grants certain employees the right to organize and bargain collectively through representative employee organizations; and

WHEREAS, since the passage of the City's Labor Code in 2023, the City has recognized an exclusive representative for each of the representation units (fire, police, and general government); and

WHEREAS, the City negotiated with each of the exclusive representatives and entered into and ratified Collective Bargaining Agreements with each covering the time period from July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2026; and

WHEREAS, the City has learned from the negotiation process that the definition of "employee" and the timeline for bargaining should be amended; and

WHEREAS, Mayor and Council may amend Chapter 2.25 of the Salisbury City Code pursuant to the authority granted in § SC 2-15 of the Salisbury City Charter; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council have determined that the amendments to Chapter 2.25 of the Salisbury City Code shall be adopted as set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE **CITY OF SALISBURY, MARYLAND**, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 2.25 of the Salisbury City Code, entitled "Labor Code," is amended by adding the bolded and underlined language and removing the strikethrough text as follows:

2.25.010 Title and Legislative Findings.

- (a) Title of Chapter. This Chapter shall be referred to as the City's "Labor Code."
- (b) Legislative findings. It is the public policy of the City and the purpose of this Labor Code to promote a fair, harmonious, peaceful and cooperative relationship between the management of the City and those employees of the City who are covered by this Labor Code, and to ensure the public health, welfare and safety of the City will be maintained at all times.

2.25.020 Definitions.

For the purposes of this Labor Code, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them:

- (a) *Budget submission date*. "Budget submission date" means the date not later than 60 days before the end of the fiscal year on which the Mayor submits to the City Council the proposed City budget for the following fiscal year.
- (b) City administration. "City administration" means the Mayor, the City Administrator, Deputy City Administrator and all department and deputy department heads or their designees.
- (c) Confidential employee. "Confidential employee" means an employee who:
 - 1. Has access to confidential information, including budgetary and fiscal data, subject to use by the City administration in collective bargaining; or
 - 2. Works in a close and continuing confidential relationship assisting or aiding the City administration.

(d) Employee.

- 1. "Employee" means a person employed by the City full-time or <u>regular</u> part-time, who is not a confidential employee or management employee as defined by this Labor Code.
- 2. "Employee" does not include any seasonal employees.
- (e) Employee organization.
 - 1. "Employee organization" means an association, labor organization, federation, council, or brotherhood, a purpose of which is to represent employees of a public employer in matters authorized by Article XXIII of the City's Charter and this Labor Code.
 - 2. "Employee organization" does not include an association, labor organization, federation, council, or brotherhood, that discriminates with regard to the terms or conditions of membership because of race, color, creed, sex, age, national origin, political affiliation, religion, marital status, sexual orientation, gender identity, genetic information, disability, or any other protected class.
- (f) Employer. "Employer" means the City of Salisbury, Maryland body corporate.
- (g) Exclusive representative. "Exclusive representative" means an employee organization that is certified as the exclusive negotiating agent for employees within a representation unit.
- (h) *Impasse*. "Impasse" means the failure of the employer and the exclusive representative to reach a collective bargaining agreement despite good faith efforts to do so.
- (i) Grievance. "Grievance" is a complaint as defined by the City's Employee Handbook.
- (j) Management employee. "Management employee" means an employee who has a significant role in the preparation and administration of budgets for a City Department and may reasonably be required to assist directly in the preparation for and conduct of collective bargaining negotiations on behalf of the City administration or have a significant role in the administration of collective bargaining agreements. This includes having the authority to exercise independent judgement in

the interest of the employer to hire, transfer, suspend, lay off, recall, promote, discharge, or discipline other employees, or having the responsibility to adjust their grievance, or effectively to recommend such action, if it is not of a routine or clerical nature but requires the use of independent judgement.

For purposes of this Labor Code, an employee holding the rank of Captain or below within the Fire Department and rank of Lieutenant or below within the Police Department is not a "management employee."

- (k) Collective bargaining agreement. "Collective bargaining agreement" means a written collective bargaining agreement signed by the Mayor and the exclusive representative, covering all items agreed to by both parties and ratified by City Council.
- (1) Representation unit. "Representation unit" means a grouping of positions in the City recognized as appropriate for representation by an employee organization into a unit described under this Labor Code for the purpose of representation in negotiations.
- (m) *Third-party agency*. "Third-party agency" means an independent agency like the American Arbitration Association, Federal Mediation Conciliation Service, or JAMS, all of which offer panels of qualified labor arbitrators.

2.25.030 Director of Human Resources.

- (a) *General*. The Director of Human Resources shall carry out certain duties and functions of this Labor Code and, to ensure impartiality, shall refer certain duties and functions to a third-party agency, including supervising the conduct of representation elections and granting or revoking certification of employee organizations as the exclusive representative.
- (b) *Authority*. The Director of Human Resources shall be charged with the administration of the Labor Code and is authorized and empowered to make any rules and regulations as may be necessary or proper to put into operation and effect the provisions of this Labor Code.

2.25.040 Management and Confidential Employees.

- (a) *Exclusion from collective bargaining*. All management and confidential employees are excluded from participation in a representation unit, and thus prohibited from engagement in collective bargaining.
- (b) Authority to meet with the City administration. Nothing in this Labor Code may be construed to preclude management and confidential employees from meeting and conferring with the City administration.

2.25.050 Representation Units.

(a) Exception. This section does not apply to confidential or management employees.

(b) In general. Employees who are not confidential or management employees shall constitute the following separate representation units: 1. Fire; 2. Police; or 3. General Government. 2.25.060 Employee rights. (a) Employees shall have the right of self-organization; to form, join, or assist employee organizations; and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing as provided by Article XXIII of the Charter and this Labor Code. Employees shall also have the right to refrain from any or all such activities. (b) Employees shall be free from retaliation for the exercise of any rights set forth herein, or for participating in any proceeding established pursuant to this Labor Code. (c) Nothing in this Labor Code shall prohibit an employee from presenting, discussing or resolving any concern or dispute directly with the employer and without the intervention of the exclusive representative, provided any adjustment or resolution shall not be inconsistent with the terms of any applicable collective bargaining agreement. 2.25.070 Employer rights. (a) The employer shall have the following rights: 1. To determine the budget of the City, including all financial obligations and expenditures, and to exercise its taxing authority; 2. To determine the ways and means to allocate funds to its various departments and projects; 3. To exercise control and discretion over its organization and operations; 4. To determine how and when to deploy its personnel; 5. To establish, suspend, relocate or discontinue operations, facilities, stations, or services and to reduce personnel;

6. To determine the way personnel will be used to ensure public safety;

- 7. To adopt reasonable rules, regulations and general orders pertaining to the City's purpose, operation, techniques, efficiency and management which are not inconsistent with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement;
- 8. To determine staffing, including, but not limited to, the use of full and part-time employees and the number of such employees;
- 9. To suspend, demote, discharge or take disciplinary action against employees for just cause, and, in the case of sworn police officers, to do so subject to the provisions of the Maryland Police Accountability Act; and
- 10. To discharge employees it reasonably believes to be involved in a strike, and, in the case of sworn police officers, to do so subject to the provisions of the Maryland Police Accountability Act.
- (b) The employer shall not enter into or become bound by any collective bargaining agreement pursuant to this Labor Code that contains terms that infringe upon or limit the rights set forth in this Labor Code or otherwise provided by law.

2.25.080 Collective bargaining.

- (a) Bargaining in good faith. Upon certification of an employee organization as the exclusive representative, the employer and the exclusive representative shall have the duty, through their designated representatives, to negotiate collectively and in good faith with respect to the subjects of bargaining enumerated in this Labor Code and to reduce to writing the matters agreed upon as a result of such negotiations.
- (b) Negotiations deferred.
 - 1. If an employee organization is certified after March 1 of any fiscal year, negotiations shall be deferred until the appropriate time in the budget preparation process in the following fiscal year.
- (c) Employer/employee organization representative.
 - 1. The employer shall appoint the employer's representative or representatives for the purpose of conducting any bargaining with the exclusive representative of a representation unit.
 - 2. The exclusive representative of a representation unit shall appoint a representative or representatives for the purpose of conducting any bargaining with the employer.
- (d) *Subjects of bargaining*. The employer and exclusive representative may bargain collectively and reach agreement on the following subjects of bargaining:

239 1. Wages;

- 241 2. Hours; and
 - 3. Other terms and conditions of employment, but excluding health insurance benefits.
 - (e) *Scope of bargaining*. The employer and the exclusive representative shall not be required to bargain any subject that is not specifically enumerated in this section or that infringes upon any of the employer rights enumerated in this Labor Code.
 - (f) *Duration of collective bargaining agreement*. The employer shall not enter into, or be bound by, any collective bargaining agreement that is in effective for less than two years or longer than three years.

2.25.090 Representation.

- (a) *Certification of representative*. No collective bargaining agreement shall be valid or enforceable unless it is between the employer and an employee organization that is certified as the exclusive bargaining representative for employees in the bargaining unit.
- (b) *Majority of employees*. Certification of an employee organization shall only occur if the employee organization has been selected or designated by a majority of employees in the bargaining unit.
- (c) Procedure.
 - 1. Certification election. An employee organization seeking exclusive representative status for employees in the representation unit shall file a petition with the Director of Human Resources accompanied by evidence that at least thirty (30) percent of the employees in the representation unit have designated the employee organization as their exclusive representative. Within thirty (30) days of filing a petition for certification, the Director of Human Resources shall retain a third party agency to conduct a secret ballot election. If the results of the secret ballot election establish that a majority of those employees voting in the election designate the petitioning employee organization as their exclusive representative, then the thirty-party agency shall certify the employee organization as the exclusive representative and the Director of Human Resources shall authorize the employer to bargain collectively as provided for in this Chapter.
 - 2. Voluntary recognition. In the event a petition filed by an employee organization is accompanied by valid evidence that more than fifty (50) percent of the employees in the representation unit have designated the employee organization as their exclusive representative for purposes of collective bargaining, as determined by the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service or a like third-party agency pursuant to its rules, the Director of Human Resources shall voluntarily recognize the employee organization without first conducting a certification election. Upon voluntary

recognition pursuant to this section, the Director of Human Resources shall certify the employee organization as the exclusive representative and shall authorize the employer to bargain collectively as provided for in this Chapter.

- 3. Decertification election. Any employee seeking to terminate the certification of an employee organization as the exclusive representative of employees in the representation unit may file a petition with the Director of Human Resources accompanied by evidence that at least thirty (30) percent of the employees in the representation unit have expressed their desire to remove the employee organization as their exclusive representative. Within thirty (30) days of the filing of a petition for decertification, the Director of Human Resources shall retain a third party to conduct a secret ballot election. If the results of the secret ballot election establish that a majority of those employees in the representation unit no longer wish to have the employee organization as their exclusive representative, then the third-party agency shall decertify the employee organization as the exclusive representative of the employees in the petitioned-for unit. The decertification of an employee organization does not void or moot any agreement currently then in effect.
- 4. No election under this section may be conducted more frequently than once every twenty-four (24) months.

2.25.100 Unfair labor practices.

- (a) *Employer unfair labor practices*. It shall be an unfair labor practice for the employer to engage in the following conduct:
 - 1. Interfere with, restrain or coerce employees in the exercise of their rights guaranteed under this Labor Code;
 - 2. Encourage or discourage membership in any employee organization;
 - 3. Fail or refuse to negotiate in good faith with an exclusive representative;
 - 4. Retaliate against an employee because of that employee's exercise of rights guaranteed under this Labor Code; or
 - 5. Control or dominate an employee organization or contribute financial or other support to it.
- (b) *Employee organization unfair labor practices*. It shall be an unfair labor practice for an employee organization by and through its officers, agents and representatives to engage in the following conduct:
 - 1. Interfere with, restrain or coerce employees in the exercise of their rights guaranteed under this Labor Code;

- 2. Induce the employer or its representatives to commit any unfair labor practice;
 - 3. Directly or indirectly, cause, instigate, encourage, condone, initiate, sponsor, support, direct or engage in any strike;
 - 4. Fail or refuse to negotiate in good faith with the employer; or
 - 5. Retaliate against an employee because of that employee's exercise of rights guaranteed under this Labor Code.

2.25.110 Checkoff.

- (a) *Dues checkoff*. When an employee organization has been certified as the exclusive representative of the employees in the bargaining unit, it shall be the only employee organization eligible to obtain an agreement from the employer to deduct dues or service fees of the employee organization from the pay of those employees in the unit who provide a written, signed and dated authorization, and to remit said dues to the employee organization without cost. All authorizations shall be in effect for one (1) year and shall be automatically renewable from year to year unless written notice of termination by the employee is received by the Director of Human Resources. An employee may terminate an authorization at any time by giving thirty-days written notice to the Director of Human Resources.
- (b) *Indemnification*. The employer shall not have the authority to enter into a collective bargaining agreement that authorizes the deduction of dues from pay unless the agreement contains a provision whereby the employee organization agrees to indemnify the employer for any and all claims arising out of the deduction of dues and/or fees pursuant to this section.
- (c) *No compulsory union membership*. No agreement between the employer and an employee organization shall compel any employee to become and remain a member of the employee organization and/or pay dues.

2.25.120 Permissible union activities.

Solicitation of members and dues may be conducted during work hours provided it is not disruptive to work. Employer-requested or approved consultations and meetings between the employer and representatives of the exclusive representative shall, whenever practicable, be conducted on official time. Negotiations between the employer and representatives of the exclusive representative for the purpose of negotiating a collective bargaining agreement shall be conducted during work hours.

2.25.130 Work actions prohibited.

(a) Definitions. In this section, the following words have the meanings indicated.

- 1. "Lockout" means the temporary withholding of work, by means of shutting down an operation or function in order to bring pressure on employees or on their representatives to accept a change in compensation or rights, privileges, obligations, or other terms and conditions of employment.
- 2. "Strike" means the refusal or failure by an employee or group of employees to perform their duties of employment as assigned if a purpose of the refusal or failure is to induce, force, or require the City to act or refrain from acting with regard to any matter.
- 3. "Work stoppage" means: (i) The willful absence of a group of employees from their positions; (ii) The engaging in a slow-down by employees; or (iii) The refusal of employees to perform job duties.
- (b) In general. Strikes, work stoppages, and lockouts are prohibited.
- (c) *Prohibited employee actions*. Employees and employee organizations may not engage in, sponsor, initiate, support, direct, or condone a strike or work stoppage.
- (d) *Penalty for violation Employee organization*. If an employee organization violates this section, the City Administrator shall submit the matter to arbitration for the arbitrator to determine the penalty, which can include revoking the employee organization's designation as exclusive representative or disqualifying the employee organization from participating in representation elections for a period of up to two years.
- (e) *Penalty for violation Employee*. An employee who violates this section is subject to immediate disciplinary action, which may include termination of employment.
- (f) Lockouts prohibited. The City may not direct a lockout against employees.

2.25.140 Timeline of collective bargaining and impasse.

- (a) *Timeline*. Regardless of the date upon which certification is issued to the employee organization, negotiations shall be held between October 1 January 15 and January March 15. Any collective bargaining agreement reached as a result of any such negotiations shall be presented to the City Council for ratification no later than April May 15 and, if ratified by Council, shall become effective July 1.
- (b) *Impasse procedure*. If no understanding has been reached between the employer and exclusive representative by <u>January March</u> 15, it shall be deemed that an impasse has been reached, at which time the matters in dispute may be submitted to arbitration and the parties shall follow the arbitration procedures set forth in this Chapter.

2.25.150 Arbitration.

(a) *Matters subject to arbitration*. The employer, exclusive representative, or employee may submit to arbitration any alleged unfair labor practice, dispute regarding the application or interpretation of a collective bargaining agreement, or an impasse.

(b) *Matters not subject to arbitration*. No grievance as defined by the City Employee Handbook shall be submitted to arbitration. Rather, all grievances shall follow the procedures set forth in the City's Employee Handbook, although an employee within a representation unit may elect to have representation from his/her exclusive representative at all steps in the grievance process.

(c) *Mediation*. Before any dispute subject to arbitration proceeds to arbitration, the parties may mutually agree to first submit the dispute to mediation.

(d) *Arbitrator selection*. The arbitrator shall be chosen by mutual agreement of the parties. If the parties are unable to agree, the parties, shall ask the American Arbitration Association, Federal Mediation Conciliation Service, or JAMS to provide a list of five arbitrators from Maryland, who are familiar with public labor issues. Within seven days after receipt of the list, the parties shall alternately strike names and keep track of the order of the strikes. The party striking first shall be agreed to or determined by a coin toss. The last arbitrator remaining shall be arbitrator for that fiscal year.

(e) Powers and duties of arbitrator. The arbitrator may:

1. Convene and adjourn a hearing;

2. Administer oaths;

3. Call and examine witnesses;

4. Issue subpoenas to compel the presence of witnesses and the production of documents;

5. Hear the evidence; and

6. Issue a final and binding decision.

(f) *Hearings*. Arbitration hearings shall be conducted in Salisbury, Maryland unless otherwise agreed in writing by the parties. The arbitrator shall designate a time and place for the hearing and notify the parties not less than 20 days before the hearing.

(g) *Rights at hearing*. At the arbitration hearing, each party has the right to be heard, to present evidence material to the controversy, and to examine and cross-examine witnesses. Arbitrators are not bound by the technical rules of evidence.

- (h) *Time Limits*. Unless otherwise agreed by the parties, each party has up to eight hours to present its/his/her case to the arbitrator so that the arbitration shall conclude within two days.
- (i) Written decision. The arbitrator shall make findings of fact and shall issue a written decision within 30 days after declaring the record closed, unless the parties otherwise agree in writing.
- (j) Consideration of pertinent factors by arbitrator. In making findings, the arbitrator shall take into consideration all pertinent factors, including, but not limited to:
 - 1. Wages and all other benefits of employment of other similarly situated local government employees;
 - 2. The value of all benefits available to or received by City employees as compared with private sector employees on the Delmarva Peninsula;
 - 3. Cost-of-living information;

- 4. The availability of funds; and
- 5. Any agreement reached between the employer and any other City representation unit.
- (k) *Costs shared*. Each party shall bear its own expenses in connection with the arbitration proceedings. The parties shall share equally the fees and expenses of the arbitrator.

2.25.160 Review of collective bargaining agreement.

The City Council shall vote on the ratification of any collective bargaining agreement. Prior to voting on the ratification of any collective bargaining agreement, the Director of Finance shall submit to the City Council a fiscal impact note addressing, at a minimum, the annual cost of the contract to the City, the increase or decrease in costs compared to the current or preceding contract, and how the costs of the agreement are to be funded.

BE IT FURTHER ENACTED AND ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SALISBURY, MARYLAND, as follows:

<u>Section 2</u>. It is the intention of the Mayor and Council of the City of Salisbury that each provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein.

Section 3. It is further the intention of the Mayor and Council of the City of Salisbury that if any section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid, unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable under applicable Maryland or federal law, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, subsection, clause or provision so

514 515	adjudged and all other provisions of this Ordinance shall remain and shall be deemed valid and enforceable.

Subject: The North Prong Park Project - 1st Reading

North Prong Park is the planned redevelopment of abandoned industrial sites into a green space for recreation, exercise, and flood mitigation. The park will be located between Lake Street and the west side of the Wicomico River's North Prong. The future park entails multiple properties owned by the City that will require varying amounts of environmental remediation and improvements.

On June 1, 2025, the Maryland House Bill 1519E for Prior Authorizations of State Debt - Alterations was passed, earmarking \$500,000 to the City of Salisbury for the North Prong Park Project from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Local Parks and Playgrounds Infrastructure (LPPI) Grant Program. The City submitted the Development Application and supporting documents to DNR detailing how the funds will be utilized on August 26, 2025. On October 22, 2025 the application was approved by Maryland's Board of Public Works and the approval letter sent to the City.

The \$500,000 funding is allocated towards environmental assessment and remediation, demolition, and site improvements at the property and will help develop it into a great asset for the City.
