# Specialized Transportation Grant Program: Addendum to the 2020 Program Management Plan

#### Overview

In order to receive additional Federal Transit
Administration (FTA) Section 5310 program funding
made available through the Coronavirus Relief and
Response Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021
(CRRSAA) and American Rescue Plan Act of 2021
(ARPA), the FTA requires SANDAG to update its Program
Management Plan (PMP) so that the methods used to
allocate CRRSAA and ARPA funding are consistent with
those documented in the PMP.

#### **Background**

Federal guidance for the FTA Section 5310 program (FTA Circular 9070.1G) requires SANDAG, as the designated

recipient of Section 5310 program funding in the region, to maintain a PMP to facilitate grant management and FTA oversight over the program. The SANDAG PMP describes SANDAG's policies and procedures for administering the Specialized Transportation Grant Program (STGP), which includes the FTA Section 5310 and *TransNet* Senior Mini-Grant programs.

#### **Key Considerations**

- The 2020 PMP was adopted by the Transportation Committee at its October 16, 2020, meeting and approved by the FTA on October 22, 2020. It stipulates that SANDAG use a competitive process to allocate STGP funding.
- Federal guidance provided SANDAG flexibility in allocating CRRSAA and ARPA funding through a different process than described in the 2020 PMP.
- At its June 11, 2021, meeting, the Board of Directors approved the Transportation Committee's recommendation to offer CRRSAA and ARPA funding to six Section 5310 grantees in proportion to their total awarded funding through the recent Cycle 11 STGP call for projects.
- Since the Board approved a deviation from procedures outlined in the 2020 PMP, the FTA requires an addendum to document this deviation, which only will be applicable to CRRSAA and ARPA funding.
- This PMP update is required in order for the FTA to obligate the CRRSSA and ARPA funding apportioned to the region.

#### **Next Steps**

Pending adoption, SANDAG will submit the addendum to the 2020 PMP to the FTA for approval in compliance with federal guidance. Pending FTA approval, SANDAG will post the addendum to the STGP webpage. Further, pending approval of its applications to the FTA, SANDAG will execute a grant agreement with the FTA, obligating CRRSAA and ARPA funding to support Section 5310 COVID-19 response projects.

### **Quarterly Status Update of Grant Programs**

#### Overview

The *TransNet* Extension Ordinance and Expenditure Plan provides funding for a variety of regional competitive grant programs available to local jurisdictions, transit agencies, and non-profit organizations that help implement San Diego Forward: The Regional Plan. Grant programs include the Environmental Mitigation Program (EMP), Smart Growth Incentive Program (SGIP), Active Transportation Grant Program (ATGP), and Senior Mini-Grant Program (SMG).

Additionally, SANDAG is the designated recipient of funds provided through the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities program (Section 5310). Board Policy No. 035 applies to all competitive grant programs administered through SANDAG and outlines competitive grant program procedures.

SANDAG awards these grant funds on a competitive basis that considers the grantees' ability to perform their proposed projects on a timely basis. SANDAG intends to

During the reporting period, eight grant projects were completed, and seven projects were on the Watch List.

If the City of El Cajon's schedule amendment for the Active Transportation Plan ATGP project is approved by the Transportation Committee, the project will be completed by June 2022.

hold grantees accountable to the project they have proposed to ensure fairness in the competitive process and encourage grantees to get their projects implemented quickly so that the public can benefit from the project deliverables as soon as possible. Projects are placed on a Watch List if a grantee has not made timely progress towards its milestones or key project deliverables, or if the grantee has not implemented any SANDAG-issued corrective actions. This quarterly status update provides an overview of progress and performance of projects funded through these grant programs.

#### TransNet Environmental Mitigation Land Management Program

Through the EMP Land Management Grants, SANDAG provides land managers with funding to help maintain and enhance the integrity and size of regional habitat preserves as well as protect endangered species. Eligible applicants include land managers from private nonprofit organizations, local jurisdictions, and other government agencies. Example land management projects include habitat restoration, habitat preservation (in general or as it relates to the habitat of an endangered species), and non-native plant species eradication. As of the end of the reporting quarter, SANDAG had awarded more than \$16 million to 117 projects throughout the San Diego region and 104 Land Management Grant projects have been completed and closed out.

#### TransNet Smart Growth Incentive Program

The SGIP provides funding for transportation-related infrastructure improvements and planning efforts that support smart growth and transit-oriented development in Smart Growth Opportunity Areas as shown in the Smart Growth Concept Map. As of the end of the reporting quarter, SANDAG had awarded more than \$57 million to 67 projects throughout the San Diego region with 46 projects completed.

#### **Active Transportation Grant Program**

The ATGP supports local efforts to increase walking, biking, and transit use throughout the region; and encourages local jurisdictions to plan and build facilities that promote multiple travel choices and increase biking and walking. The ATGP also is funded with Transportation Development Act funds. As of the end of the reporting quarter, SANDAG had awarded more than \$28 million to 87 projects throughout the San Diego region with 77 projects completed.

#### Specialized Transportation Grant Program

The Specialized Transportation Grant Program (STGP) funds projects that provide specialized transportation services for seniors and individuals with disabilities whose needs cannot be met by conventional transit or Americans with Disabilities Act paratransit services. The STGP is comprised of the *TransNet* Senior Mini-Grant and FTA Section 5310 programs. Since the program began in 2006, SANDAG has awarded over \$26.8 million in federal grant funds (including funds from former federal grant programs) and \$21.1 million in *TransNet* Senior Mini-Grant to support more than 275 specialized transportation projects.

Staff has consolidated information regarding the various grant programs into this report and its attachments. During the reporting period, eight projects were completed, and seven projects were on the Watch List. A glossary of key terms for the SANDAG grant programs is included in Attachment 1 for reference. Project status changes within the quarter for each grant program are highlighted in Attachment 2. Completed projects or projects that met major milestones during the reporting period are listed in Attachment 3. Detailed project status updates for each grant program are shown in Attachment 4.

#### **Amendment Request**

This quarter, a request has been made by the City of El Cajon for a seven-month amendment to its Active Transportation Plan ATGP project. More information regarding the nature of the request is included in the discussion memo (Attachment 2) and the City's amendment request letter and revised schedule (Attachment 5). At its September 8, 2021 meeting, the *TransNet* Independent Taxpayer Oversight Committee (ITOC) recommended the Transportation Committee approve the seven-month schedule extension for the City of El Cajon's Active Transportation Plan.

#### **Next Steps**

If approved, a seven-month schedule extension amendment will be executed for the City of El Cajon's Active Transportation Plan. The next quarterly status update on these grant programs is scheduled to be presented to the ITOC, Regional Planning Committee, and the Transportation Committee in winter 2022.

#### **Specialized Transportation Grant Program (STGP)**

Due to COVID-19, some grantees have provided a reduced number of trips or their cost per trip has increased. With SANDAG approval, other grantees have provided alternative services such as trips for meal deliveries and counted those trips towards their trip total. As a result, a number of projects have been placed on the Schedule Watch List and have remained there for an extended period of time, whereas other projects have had their cost per trip substantially decreased.

As of the end of the reporting period, one project was completed, eight projects were on the Schedule Watch List and one project was on the Cost-Efficiency Watch List. Staff will continue to closely monitor the Watch Lists and keep the Transportation Committee apprised. Details on the status and performance of each active STGP project, including vehicles purchased on behalf of and operated by grantees, are provided in Attachment 4D. Please note that Facilitating Access to Coordinated Transportation (FACT) did not submit a vehicle report to SANDAG for this reporting period, so the performance data of the eight active STGP-funded vehicles operated by FACT is unknown for this reporting quarter. #### **Amendment Request**

The City of El Cajon is requesting a seven-month schedule extension for its Active Transportation ATGP project. The project will develop an Active Transportation Master Plan for the City of El Cajon. Key deliverables will include a Sidewalk/Pedestrian Master Plan, an update to the 2011 Bicycle Master Plan, incorporation, and prioritization of findings from the City's ongoing Safe Routes to School program, and refinement of conceptual mobility improvements found in the City's Transit District Specific Plan. The primary focus of this project is on community engagement, with various community workshops and "pop-up" events that were scheduled to occur in the spring, summer, and fall of 2020. All these events were postponed for a period of approximately nine months, which impacts the project schedule.

The City of El Cajon's schedule amendment request (Attachment 5) details the circumstances resulting in the request for additional time to complete the project and includes a revised Schedule for the project. The requested amendment is for a schedule extension only; no additional funds are requested. The City of El Cajon anticipates that the project will be completed June of 2022. At its September 8, 2021, meeting, the Independent Taxpayer Oversight Committee recommended that the Transportation Committee approve this amendment request.

Now, it is clearer where to stay off social trails, which may look like real trails. This allows sensitive, native plants to recover so that the social trail disappears.



The City of El Cajon is requesting an amendment to agreement No. 5005463 for the El Cajon Active Transportation Project (ATP). The requested ten (10) month extension will allow the City to complete the project in a timely manner. Note: a three month extension was approved as an administrative amendment. The additional 7-month schedule extension is being requested from the Transportation Committee

# Previous efforts undertaken to maintain the project schedule.

Every effort was made to maintain the project schedule, however, due to the Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic, the schedule has been pushed back by approximately six (6) months.

# A detailed explanation on the reason for delay, and how it was unavoidable.

As the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic resulted in the declaration of a State of Emergency by the federal, state, county, and local governments, respectively, the El Cajon City Hall building was closed to the public in March 2020. It recently opened for business to the public in spring 2021. Task 3 of the ATP project is primarily focused on community engagement, with various community workshops and "pop-up" public outreach events that were scheduled to occur in the spring, summer, and fall of 2020. All of these events were postponed for a period of approximately nine (9) months. In fall 2020, these community engagement activities were resumed and substituted with on-line "Zoom" meetings.

# Demonstrate the ability to succeed in the timeframe proposed.

The City of El Cajon is requesting a ten (10) month extension for the ATP project, with the proposed completion date of June 30, 2022. Although the pandemic situation continues to evolve rapidly, the City of El Cajon remains fully committed to pursuing the completion of the work in a safe, diligent, and reasonable manner. We anticipate the work will be successfully completed by the new completion date and productivity will not be negatively impacted by the current pandemic conditions. The City of El Cajon recognizes there may be unforeseen delays that may occur if conditions worsen during the continuation of the pandemic.

# **Social Equity Early Action Transit Pilots**

#### Overview

On Friday, February 12, 2021, the SANDAG Board of Directors approved a Commitment to Equity statement that is meant to inform all decisions and projects implemented by SANDAG. This statement says:

We hold ourselves accountable to the communities we serve. We acknowledge we have much to learn and much to change; and we firmly uphold equity and inclusion for every person in the San Diego region. This includes historically underserved, systemically marginalized groups impacted by actions and inactions at all levels of our government and society.

We have an obligation to eliminate disparities and ensure that safe, healthy, accessible, and inclusive opportunities are available to everyone. In 2021, SANDAG will develop an equity action plan that will inform how we plan, prioritize, fund, and build projects and programs; frame how we work with our communities; define how we recruit and develop our employees; guide our efforts to conduct unbiased research and interpret data; and set expectations for companies and stakeholders that work with us

We are committed to creating a San Diego region where every person who visits, works, and lives can thrive.

## Action: Recommend

The Transportation Committee is asked to recommend that the Board of Directors approve an amendment to the FY 2022 Program Budget to:

- create new Overall Work Program Project No. 3505000 for the Early Action Transit Pilot project; and
- 2) program \$2.13 million of Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement funds to fund the project.

## **Fiscal Impact:**

An FY 2022 budget amendment to program \$2,130,000 of CMAQ funds to OWP 3505000. The balance of the project, \$5,870,000, will be funded in the FY 2023 and FY 2024 Budgets

#### Schedule/Scope Impact:

The Free Youth Fares would start in the spring of 2022, the education, outreach, and research would begin just before the free youth fares start, and the transit improvements would start in the fall of 2022. The pilot would end in the summer of 2023, with a research report presented shortly thereafter.

A statement is only as good as the actions to which it informs. The time is now to implement mobility solutions for historically underserved communities. Toward this end, staff has worked with a representative group of the SANDAG 2021 Regional Plan Social Equity Working Group along with other stakeholders and staff from the transit operators to implement several early action pilot projects. These include public transit and bike projects, policies, and programs that will benefit the most marginalized members of our region.

These pilot projects will function as building blocks toward achieving the aim of the Board of Directors as described in the Commitment to Equity and will serve as a proof of concept for projects identified in the draft 2021 Regional Plan. The draft 2021 Regional Plan, should it be adopted, includes funding for transit operating funds and fare subsidies.

To provide funding for these pilot projects, the Transportation Committee is asked to recommend that the Board of Directors approve a budget amendment to consider the following projects for inclusion in the 2021 Early Action Transit Pilot: free youth fares for all riders age 18 and under, public education and program research, and transit improvements for underserved areas.

## **Key Considerations**

The SANDAG 2021 Regional Plan Social Equity Working Group (Working Group), chaired by City of San Diego Councilmember Vivian Moreno, is charged with providing input on the 2021 Regional Plan from an equity perspective. The Working Group has weighed in on early actions in the plan that show a true commitment to equity.

In response to recommendations from stakeholders and the Working Group, the Working Group asked SANDAG staff to work with members and friends of the Working Group to discuss possible projects to bring back for consideration. This small working group has met over the course of the past two months and devised the following proposals for the transit pilot:

- A free transit fare for all Youth 18 and under
  - o All youth 18 and under would receive a free fare on their PRONTO account
  - Estimated \$6 million to reimburse Metropolitan Transit System (MTS) and North County Transit
     District (NCTD) (\$2 million in FY 2022, \$4 million in FY 2023)
- Transit improvements on a network of high-demand routes in traditionally underserved areas of the region
  - o Add transit service on weekdays and weekends on routes with infrequent service, or late-night service that ends too early
  - Estimated \$1.75 million to reimburse MTS
- Education and outreach to youth and to residents in traditionally underserved areas of the region
  - Work with our Community Based Organizations (CBOs) to help get PRONTO accounts for youth, and to educate residents on the existing and added services in their areas
  - o Estimated \$200,000 for CBOs
- Conduct a Research Study
  - o Evaluate the benefits of the pilot using both qualitative and quantitative measures
  - o Estimated \$50,000 for a consultant

The Working Group, at its September 23, 2021, meeting, voted unanimously to recommend that the Transportation Committee and Board of Directors approve a budget amendment to consider the following projects for inclusion in the Early Action Transit Pilot: Free Youth Fares for 18 and Under, Education and Research, and Transit Improvements in Underserved Areas.

## **Next Steps**

Pending the Transportation Committee's recommendation, the Board of Directors will be asked to approve a budget amendment at its October 22, 2021, meeting. Staff would work with MTS, NCTD, and stakeholders to finalize the details of the fare costs and transit improvement projects. Pending MTS and NCTD Board approvals, the Free Youth Fares would start in the spring of 2022; the education, outreach, and research would begin before the free fares start; and the transit improvements would start in the fall of 2022. The pilot would end in the late summer of 2023, with a research report presented shortly thereafter.
