Law Director's Report

Mr. Reilly stated that he would have one item for Executive session. Mr. Feldman asked if Mike Jones, appointed City Engineer attend the Board of Control meetings. Mr. Wren stated that Mr. Jones' new position was effective July 1st.


Consideration of Business Items

- Discussion: Ord. 24-115 Amending Chapter 505 C.O.S.

Mr. McIntire provided a brief summary of the background for this legislation. He specifically received a complaint of the noise from roosters. Prior to the meeting, Mrs. Coffey sent an email (attached) to City Council from Lindsey Tournoux, Summit County Farm Bureau. She reported the information from Summit County Farm Bureau. Roosters are prohibited unless 2-5 acres. She supported legislation but would like a compromise for residents in her ward who have roosters. The compromise would state the number of acres permitted. Mr. Feldman was informed of free roaming roosters. Mr. McIntire noted that this issue has come up several


times. Mr. Fiocca asked Mr. Cowan for a recap regarding enforcement. Mr. Cowan stated that this would be a noise complaint which would be a general offence enforced by the Police Department. Mr. Film confirmed that it was complaint driven enforcement. Mr. McIntire stated that there are multiple communities that prohibit roosters. Mrs. Coffey understood but suggested if the roosters were kept in coop away from a dwelling. Mr. Reilly shared that Law Department had successfully prosecuted a rooster noise. Mrs. Coffey requested that the noise enforcement aligned with acreage which should be away from other residential neighbors. Mr. Herman agreed with Mrs. Coffey. He continued that there were not many farms in the City of Stow but supported allowing roosters with provisions. Mr. Riehl referred to Law Director regarding the prosecution for unlawful noise regarding roosters. Mr. Feldman commented that he supported the legislation and looked forward to a compromise. This Ordinance would be a 2nd reading on the Council agenda. Mr. Reilly cited the code, 55.098, that was used to prosecute a noise complaint which was in violation of the restricted hours. Mr. McIntire stated that there is currently a restriction for the noise complaint during restrictive hours. Mr. Reilly stated that "disturbing of the peace of the neighborhood" could be violated at any hours of the day and still be prosecuted. Mr. McIntire stated that Ordinance was complaint driven only.

23 WHEREAS, a settlement proposal is being presented to certain local governments by
24 Kroger to resolve claims against it whereby the City of Stow would be allocated certain settlement
25 funds which it must use in a certain manner, to be determined at a later date by a governing board

28 WHEREAS, the Law Director and the Mayor recommend that Council vote to accept the
29 terms of the Settlement and authorize future execution of a Settlement Agreement;

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 115.02(a) C.O.S., ENTITLED
“VACATION TIME”.

WHEREAS, The City desires to develop a vacation buy-back program for its employees;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STOW,
COUNTY OF SUMMIT AND STATE OF OHIO:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 115 C.O.S, specifically Section 115.02(a), entitled “Vacation
Leave” shall be amended to include the following:

(13) Vacation Buyback Policy

**(a) Active employees of the City of Stow are eligible for the vacation buyback
program. Employees must be active at the time of conversion.**

**(b) Employees shall not be eligible to cash out more than the maximum hours earned
based on length of service at the time of the request.**

**(c) Conversion of vacation leave will result in a permanent deduction of the converted
hours from the participating employee’s vacation leave balance.**

**(d) Converted hours shall not count as hours worked in the week for the purposes of
calculating overtime, or accruing additional leave. The City shall complete any standard
deductions as required by law.**

**(e) Employees are permitted to participate in the vacation buyback program a
maximum of four times in a calendar year.**

**(f) Employees must complete a “Vacation Buyback Request” form, as developed and
circulated by the Human Resources Director. All such forms shall be completed by the
employee and approved by the Appointing Authority.**

**(g) The time of conversion for the purposes of this policy shall mean any time
throughout the year, provided the balance remains no less than the equivalent hours earned, as
shown in Table 3, found below:**

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE SUMMIT COUNTY
9-1-1 PLAN, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code Section 128.06 establishes that every county shall maintain a county 9-1-1 Program Review Committee and that committee shall maintain and approve a plan for implementing and operating the county 9-1-1 system (the “Plan”); and

WHEREAS, the Plan identifies each of the Public Safety Answering Point (“PSAP”) in the County, indicates how they operate, the expense of the operation and establishes processes for spending the spending of funds received from the State of Ohio for 9-1-1; and

WHEREAS, Ohio Revised Code Section 128.08 requires that the final plan be adopted by the County and approved and adopted by 66 percent of municipalities in Summit County; and

WHEREAS, the Plan was updated in coordination with each PSAP located in Summit County; and

WHEREAS, this Council finds and determines that it is necessary and in the best interest of the City to approve and adopt the aforementioned 9-1-1 Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STOW,
COUNTY OF SUMMIT AND STATE OF OHIO:

SECTION 1. The 2024 Summit County 9-1-1 Plan (the “Plan”) is hereby adopted and approved by this Council.

SECTION 2. This Council finds and determines that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were taken in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and of any committees or subcommittees that resulted in those formal actions were in meetings open to the public in compliance with the law.

SECTION 3. That this Ordinance was adopted pursuant to Section 4.11 Charter, and is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health and safety for the reason that the City should adopt the plan to coordinate with the County in the implementation of said Plan, and, pursuant to Section 4.13 Charter, shall take effect upon its adoption by Council and approval by the Mayor, otherwise at the earliest period allowed by law.

WHEREAS, the City has determined that the construction of the Safety Building First
Responders Memorial (the "Memorial") is necessary and in the best interest of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City has been diligent in pursuing, and has received assistance from the
State of Ohio through the One Time Strategic Community Investment Fund, in the amount of
\$95,000.00 to defray some of the costs of the construction of the Memorial; and

WHEREAS, the City has also received private donations, in the amount of \$79,301.00, to
assist with the construction of the Memorial; and

WHEREAS, the City has previously allocated \$70,000.00 to assist with the construction
of the Memorial; and

WHEREAS, the City now desires to allocate the funding for, and solicit proposals for the
construction of the Memorial; and

WHEREAS, the City further intends to solicit requests for proposals for construction
management of the Memorial, to ensure the efficient and quality construction of this needed
Memorial; and

WHEREAS, further, it is necessary for the City to comply with the competitive bid
precepts of Ohio law and the enactments of this Council governing the awarding of contracts for
the construction of the Memorial, under the direction of the management of the vendor selected in
the previous clause of this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Council to clearly indicate its assent, so long as the
same is accomplished in accordance with law; and

WHEREAS, this Ordinance must go into immediate effect to ensure maximum water flow

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to residents; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STOW, COUNTY OF SUMMIT AND STATE OF OHIO:

SECTION 1. That the Director of Public Service be, and he hereby is, authorized to prepare plans and specifications, or to have the same prepared, and thereafter, to advertise and solicit bids, according to statutory law, for the Safety Building First Responders Memorial. The Law Director shall review the completed bid package for legal form and correctness prior to advertisement.

SECTION 2. That the Mayor be, and he hereby is, authorized to make and enter into contracts with the lowest responsive and responsible bidders for said construction services as specified in Section 1 hereof, according to law, so long as the proper authorization for such contracts have first been secured, in accordance with Section 173.05, C.O.S., and adequate appropriations exist.

SECTION 3. That this Council does hereby adopt, ratify, and confirm the plans and specifications, profiles and estimates of cost hereby delegated to be prepared by the proper officers of the City of Stow, under the authority of the Director of Public Service.

SECTION 4. That this Council finds and determines that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were taken in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and of any committees or subcommittees that resulted in those formal actions were in meetings open to the public in compliance with the law.

SECTION 5. Council Members,

In 2018, The City of Stow Police and Fire Departments united to form the First Responders Memorial Foundation to create a lasting monument that would honor first responders who have served the public and those who have bravely given their lives performing the duties of their profession. The proposed memorial would be located in front of the Stow Safety Center. In our pursuit of a meaningful memorial, the foundation consulted OHM Advisers, an architectural firm specializing in landscape design and the construction of such projects. The memorial that they designed and proposed is a beautiful and lasting tribute to those retired Police Officers, Firemen, and Dispatchers who have served a career faithfully performing their duties. Special honors will be given to those who have lost their lives as a result of line-of-duty deaths.

The new First Responder Memorial will be a beautiful memorial that will complement our Safety Center in a parklike atmosphere amongst a backdrop of towering Oak Trees. The memorial will be a circular shaped space, bordered by a curved brick sitting wall, topped with a limestone cap and Corten steel seatback with meaningful text stamped into it. The focal point in the center will be a circular sculpture of Corten steel arches with engraved text depicting the core values of first responders. Beneath the arch will be a granite cube foundation with bronze sculpture and plaques on it that reinforce the values of a first responder. The 9-11 memorial located in front of City Hall will be relocated and integrated into the First Responders Memorial, where we feel it will be given a more fitting and impactful setting. We intend to create a compelling and lasting tribute to honor the first responders who have dedicated their careers and even given their lives in service to the public.

We believe this memorial will create a pleasant and special environment that our community, retired first responders, families, and the survivors of those lost, can come to appreciate and contemplate. We also hope the future generations that appreciate it, can be inspired to pursue the work and dedication of our first responders.

OHM Associates updated the cost estimation to complete the First Responders Memorial at \$228,151.20. The First Responders Memorial Fund has raised \$72,287.99 through contributions from the Fire and Police Unions and public and private donations. We recently applied and have been awarded \$95,863.21 through a One Time Strategic Community Investment Fund with the assistance and guidance of Senator Kristina Roegner and Councilman Matt Riehl. 
