B) GENERAL MANAGER & GENERAL COUNSEL

B.1 General Manager's Report Status Report.

Chuck Carden, General Manager, provided an update on member demands and environmental conditions. Mr. Carden stated the agency delivered 183.72 million gallons a day (mgd) since October 1 (2.65% more than last year at that same period). The Surface Water Treatment Plant is running well at 60 mgd and the C. W. Bill Young Reservoir is at 14 billion gallons. The South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield is running at 24.8 mgd. Mr. Carden reviewed several upcoming items scheduled to be brought to the Board for consideration such as the Long-term

Master Water Plan project feasibility studies Feasibility Study, discussions on the ELAPP property transaction, Fiscal Year 2023 budget, water quality, and the Surface Water Treatment Plant operating contract. Next, Mr. Carden updated the Board on current agency recruitment efforts noting the agency recently hired Casey LaLomia, IT Director.

Commissioner Smith asked about the contract for the Desalination Plant. Mr. Carden explained the contract for the desalination facility will be brought to the Board once the decision is made whether to expand the facility.

B.2 Legislative and Grant Funding Program Update Receive Report

Michelle Stom, Chief Communications Officer, introduced Peter Dunbar, Dean Mead, and Matthew Blair, Corcoran Partners, to provide a legislative update. Mr. Dunbar updated the Board on legislation concerning water protection, water quality, sovereign immunity, cybersecurity, redistricting and the state retirement system, among other topics. Mr. Dunbar then turned the presentation over to Matthew Blair. Mr. Blair provided an update on the state budget appropriations and noted the legislature was scheduled to end the session on time.

C) ACTION ITEMS

C.1 Water Conservation Month Proclamation Approve Proclamation.

Amelia Brown, Demand Management Program Manager, provided a presentation on Water Conservation Month. Ms. Brown stated this year marks the twenty-fourth year April is recognized as Water Conservation Month. It is an effort coordinated by the Florida Section of the American Water Works Association and the water management districts across the state. The purpose is to raise awareness of the important role water conservation plays during the month of April, a typically dry month. Tampa Bay Water supports water conservation efforts through the Florida Friendly Landscaping Program, the Community Water Wise Awards program, and the Tampa Bay Water Wise rebate program. Staff requests Board approval of the Water Conservation Month Proclamation.

C.2 Agreement with the Tampa Bay Estuary Program for the Alafia River Watershed Historically Mined Lands Restoration Plan Project Approve Agreement.

Robert McConnell, Source Water Assessment Manager, provided a presentation on the Agreement with the Tampa Bay Estuary Program (TBEP) for the Alafia River Watershed Historically Mined Lands Restoration Plan Project. Mr. McConnell explained this project was developed as part of Tampa Bay Water's Source Water Assessment and Protection Program to help maintain reliable water quality in the region's drinking water supply sources. The project requires a large amount of data collection and technical input from a stakeholder group to determine how past mining activities impact water quality and identify restoration opportunities for water quality and habitat improvements. Tampa Bay Water will take the lead on the project along with a large group of stakeholders who will participate in plan development. Conceptual restoration designs will be prepared along with a comprehensive Alafia River Watershed Restoration Plan identifying priorities and future projects that can be implemented by watershed partners. The total project cost is \$282,776 with \$100,000 of the total cost reimbursed through a Tampa Bay Environmental Restoration Fund grant. The project will be completed in two phases over Fiscal Years 2022 -2023 using approved budgets.

C.3 Professional Services Contracts - As-Needed Ecological Services Contract Nos. 2022-027 through 2022-035
 Approve Professional Services Contract Nos. 2022-027 through 2022-035.

Warren Hogg, Interim Chief Science and Technical Officer, provided a presentation on As-Needed Ecological Services Contract Nos. 2022-027 through 2022-035. Mr. Hogg stated the procurement process began in October 2021 and based on review and scoring of submitted proposals, nine new contracts are recommended for approval. Each contract has a three-year term with two, one-year extensions available. Mr. Hogg explained seven of the contracts will be

with firms that have the highest-rated freshwater wetlands expertise and two contracts with firms having the highest-rated technical expertise in estuarine systems and in GIS/remote sensing expertise.

Chairman Eggers asked if all nine contracts will be needed. Mr. Hogg responded all nine firms should receive work. Vice Chairman Oakley asked if there is an increase in the billing rate of the contracts over last year. Mr. Hogg explained the firms will average their billing rate for the coming three years but the averaged billing rates have increased slightly. Chairman Eggers asked if they were all within the budget. Mr. Hogg responded yes.

C.4 Groundwater (Reclaimed) Credits Methodology and Proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield
 Project Purchase and Sale Agreement Term Sheet
 Discussion and Approval of Term Sheet if desired.

Maribel Medina, Interim Engineering Senior Manager, introduced the presentation on the Groundwater (Reclaimed) Credits Methodology and Proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield Project Purchase and Sale Agreement Term Sheet. Ms. Medina provided a brief overview of the Long-term Master Water Planning process. Currently, staff are evaluating Surface Water Expansion, Desalination Plant Expansion, and the South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP Credits). Ms. Medina reviewed the timeline for the new water supply implementation noting that the reclaimed water Sale and Purchase Agreement is in the critical path and is needed no later than June 20, 2022, in order to determine the life cycle costs and apply for co-funding with the Southwest Florida Water Management District. Ms. Medina explained the South Hillsborough Wellfield has an additional cost component of reclaimed credit costs which the other two water alternatives do not have. Ms. Medina introduced Mr. Neil Callahan, WSP USA, Inc., to provide the details of the proposed term sheet that will serve as a basis for negotiations with Hillsborough County staff. Mr. Callahan reviewed the recommended pricing principles noting the reason for including the capital and an O&M Reclaimed Credit Price component is that under the Interlocal Agreement Tampa Bay Water is prohibited from owning any Reclaimed Water assets. Mr. Callahan reviewed the recommended pricing principles and the cost-based approach applied to the proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield Project. Next, Mr. Callahan reviewed the key terms of the Term Sheet and the Reclaimed Water Credit Price Escalation.

> At the conclusion of the presentation, Board discussion ensued and the Board authorized staff to submit the term sheet without pricing or a specified duration to Hillsborough County as a basis of negotiations

Motion: Commissioner Smith moved to Approve Issuance to Hillsborough County of the Groundwater Credits (Reclaimed Water) Pricing Term Sheet (without pricing or duration) to be used as a basis for negotiation of a sale and purchase agreement with Hillsborough County. Commissioner Cohen seconded the motion.

Vote: The motion CARRIED by a vote of 6 - 1. Chairman Eggers voted nay.

C.5 2022-2024 Tampa Bay Water Communications Plan Approve Plan.

Brandon Moore, Public Communications Manager, provided a presentation on the 2022-2024 Tampa Bay Water Communications Plan. Mr. Moore provided an overview of the Tampa Bay Water Communications Plan explaining the Plan identifies and drives the utility's communications objectives for various stakeholder groups and includes tailored strategies and tactics that align with the updated Strategic Plan and results of the Public Opinion Survey. Mr. Moore explained the Plan's strategies focus on policies for regional solutions, community outreach and education, strengthening and expanding regional partnerships, collaborating with member governments utility communications staff, engages the public, agency recognition, and a go-to source for news media who act as an intermediary between Tampa Bay Water and its stakeholders establishing relationships and providing information on water-related topics to create a positive impact.

D.1 South-Central Hillsborough County Program Update Receive Status Report and Presentation.

Justin Fox, Engineering Manager, provided an update presentation on South-Central Hillsborough County Program. Mr. Fox reviewed the progress of the Memorandum of Understanding with Hillsborough County. Four of the six items have been completed, two are

in progress and should be completed on time. The design team are underway with the Pipeline Route Study and will be brought back to the Board for consideration this summer.

No Board action was required on this item.

D.2 Reports of Certified Public Accountants Regarding Financial Statements for the Year Ended September 30, 2021 Receive Report.

Chuck Carden, General Manager, stated an independent audit of the agency's financial statements for fiscal year 2021 was completed by Mauldin & Jenkins. Mr. Carden introduced Wade Sansbury and Daniel Anderson, auditors with Mauldin & Jenkins, to provide the audit results. Mr. Anderson provided a brief history of Mauldin Jenkins stating the company is nationally recognized in the top 100 public accounting firms and approximately 600 governmental entities served. Mr. Anderson then stated that Mauldin & Jenkins have issued an unmodified opinion, which is the highest form of assurance they can render with regard to the fairness of the financial statements on which they are opining. Mr. Anderson spoke briefly about no auditor proposed adjustments, no uncorrected misstatements and no disagreements with management. He continued by noting that GASB 87 through 98 will become effective within the next five years. Mr. Anderson then turned the presentation over to Wade Sansbury. Mr. Sansbury presented some historical comparative information regarding the agency's total revenues, operating expense, uniform rate, water revenues by member, total debt and capital assets and coverage area population totals. He stated that total revenues decreased slightly in fiscal year 2021 compared to fiscal year 2020 due to lower investment income and the increase in funds going into the rate stabilization account. Next, Mr. Sansbury declared that Tampa Bay Water staff performed all activities required in order to achieve completion of the audit.

Chairman Eggers thanked Mr. Sansbury, Mr. Anderson, and agency staff for their hard work.

Chairman Eggers passed the gavel to Chuck Carden, General Manager. Mr. Carden opened the nominations for the position of Chairman of the Tampa Bay Water Board of Directors. Commissioner Starkey nominated Commissioner Oakley as Chairman. With no other

nominations, Mr. Carden closed nominations and requested a vote on Commissioner Oakley as Chair.

Vote: Commissioner Oakley was elected Chairman by vote of 7-0 of the Board.

Chairman Oakley opened the nominations for Vice Chair of Tampa Bay Water Board of Directors. Commissioner Cohen nominated Commissioner Smith as Vice Chair. With no other nominations, Chairman Oakley closed nominations and requested a vote on Commissioner Smith as Vice Chair.

Vote: Commissioner Smith was elected Vice Chair by a vote of 7-0.

AVAILABLE CAPACITY

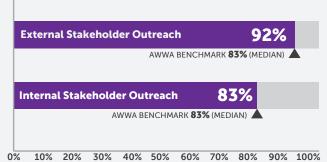
This indicator shows the gap between how much water the utility is permitted to use, the 12-month running average sustainable system capacity and the 12-month running average demand. Average demand should not exceed permitted capacity.



STAKEHOLDER OUTREACH FISCAL YEAR 2021

This indicator provides a measure of the utility's stakeholder outreach activities using the American Water Works Association's Stakeholder Outreach Index. A value is assigned by senior management to various categories of stakeholder outreach based on evidence that existed during the reporting period. Total scores can range from 0 to 12 and are presented as a percentage of the maximum possible score. Utilities should strive to be above the benchmark.

BOND RATING

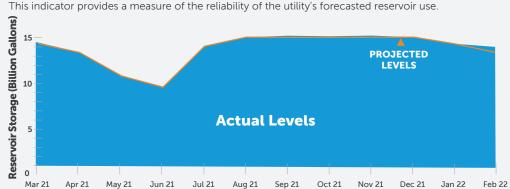
The bond rating assigned by the three major rating services based on evaluations of the issuer's financial strength and ability to pay a bond's principal and interest in a timely fashion.



Tampa Bay Water Rate

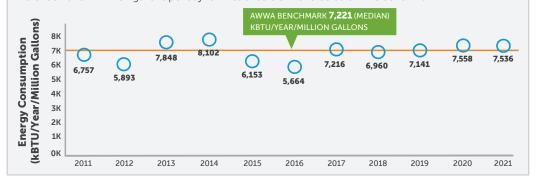


MEETING PROJECTED RESERVOIR LEVELS

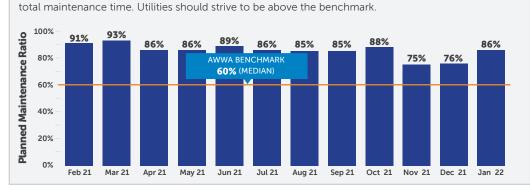

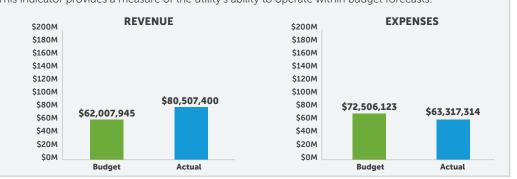

Report

SUMMARY

This item provides the status of Tampa Bay Water's water demand and water supply conditions including hydrologic conditions, surface water and reservoir management, and source rotation. Water Shortage Mitigation Plan status and an outlook for the spring season are also included. The Agency continues to closely monitor production from the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield and work with Hillsborough County to implement measures that limit demand and shift production to manage water delivery to the Lithia Point of Connection.

DISCUSSION

Summary Highlights

Since the beginning of this fiscal year, the Agency has delivered an average of 184.29 million gallons per day (mgd) to meet the member governments' demands. This is 6.4 mgd (3.6%) more water delivered than for the same period last year. The region received an average of 0.8 inches of rainfall in February 2022 (about 2.0 inches below average). River flow was at the 35th and 23rd percentiles for the Hillsborough and Alafia Rivers, respectively, for the month of February 2022. A normal condition is defined when river flow is between the 34th and 67th percentiles of flow for the same calendar month; therefore, a normal flow condition was observed in the Hillsborough River and a below-normal flow condition was observed in the Alafia River during February 2022. Although the flow condition of the Hillsborough River falls into the normal range, it is at the borderline of a below-normal condition. The Regional Reservoir storage volume was 13.74 billion gallons (88% of full storage) at the end of February 2022. A summary of other conditions is highlighted below:

- The 12-month running average Consolidated Permit Wellfield pumping rate was 84.10 mgd at the end of February 2022.
- The 12-month running average pumping rate for the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield was 25.44 mgd at the end of February 2022, above the permitted annual average quantity of 24.1 mgd. On January 24, 2022, the Board of Directors approved a permit application to increase the annual average quantity from this wellfield to 24.95 mgd. After the 30-day arbitration selection period ended, staff submitted the permit application to the Southwest Florida Water Management District on February 28, 2022.
- The City of Tampa's Hillsborough River Reservoir was at an elevation of 22.34 ft. (nearly full) at the end of February 2022.
- Water diversion through Harney augmentation started on February 25th; the monthly average water diversion rate was 2.92 mgd.
- No water delivery to the City of Tampa at the Morris Bridge Point of Connection occurred during February 2022.
- The Tampa Bay Water Desalination Facility began operation on December 13, 2021 and the average production rate in February 2022 was 15.34 mgd.
- Groundwater levels generally **decreased about 0.7 foot** from January 2022 to February 2022.
- Average water levels in the 10 indicator lakes and wetlands located on and near Consolidated Permit Wellfields **decreased 3.2 inches** during February 2022 (based on data collected throughout the month, not necessarily end-of-month).

Climate Outlook

La Niña conditions developed in October of 2021 which typically bring warmer temperatures and reduced rainfall in our region. The effect of a La Niña condition often peaks in the months of December, January, and February. A La Niña Advisory was issued by the National Oceanic and

Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) in its updated forecast issued at the end of February 2022. A La Niña condition is likely to continue into the Northern Hemisphere spring (77% chance during March-May 2022) and then transition to a neutral condition during May-July 2022.

The 90-day climate outlook issued by NOAA on February 17, 2022 predicts the continuation of below-normal precipitation and above-normal temperatures for the period of March-May 2022. This is projected for much of the Southeastern United States including Florida.

Hydrologic Conditions

The region received 0.8 inches of rainfall in February 2022 based on average rainfall from all gauges throughout the service area (Figure 1). Rainfall measurements from a single gauge at individual wellfields (Figures 7-16) are provided showing current environmental conditions at those locations.

Average monthly flows in the Hillsborough and Alafia Rivers were 62 mgd and 79 mgd (35 th and 23rd percentiles) respectively, in February 2022. Note that a normal river flow condition is defined when the flow falls within the range of the 34th and 67th percentiles compared to the historical baseline; therefore, a normal flow condition was observed in the Hillsborough River and a below-normal flow condition was observed in the Alafia River during February 2022. Although the flow condition of the Hillsborough River falls into the normal range, it is at the borderline of a below-normal condition.

Permitted available withdrawals from the Alafia River averaged 11.37 mgd while the average withdrawal of water from the Tampa Bypass Canal was 30.64 mgd in February 2022.

Water Demand and Supply Summary

Tampa Bay Water's budgeted delivery for Water Year 2022 is 192.2 mgd. This includes a projected average annual delivery to the City of Tampa of 6.0 mgd. Total average delivery to the member governments in February 2022 was 186.58 mgd, which is 13.16 mgd more than the total average delivery in February 2021. This increase in delivery to the member governments in February 2022 was driven by both dry weather and regional socio-economic development. Since the beginning of this fiscal year, the Agency has delivered an average of 184.29 mgd to the members. This is 6.4 mgd (3.6%) more water delivered than for the same period last year (Figure 2).

Aggregate groundwater production from the 13 Tampa Bay Water wellfields averaged 110.95 mgd in February 2022. Production from the Consolidated Permit Wellfields averaged 78.75 mgd in February 2022 and the 12-month running average withdrawal rate was 84.10 mgd through February 28, 2022 (Figure 3). Groundwater production from each of the Consolidated Permit Wellfields is presented in Figures 7-16.

Tampa Bay Water continues to closely monitor water production in the South Hillsborough County service area. The twelve-month average water production rate from the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield was 25.44 mgd at the end of February 2022, above the existing permit limit (24.1 mgd) (Figure 4). Agency staff prepared a permit application to the Southwest Florida Water Management District (District) to increase the annual average permitted quantity from this wellfield to

24.95 mgd. The Board approved this permit application on January 24, 2022. After the 30-day arbitration selection period expired, staff submitted the permit application to the Southwest Florida Water Management District on February 28, 2022.

Staff continues working with Hillsborough County to implement supply and demand management measures in this service area. The County instituted a one-day-a-week watering restriction for its South County residential and commercial customers. The watering restriction took effect on January 4, 2021 and ends December 31, 2022. Staff is also working with the County to reduce water demand at the Lithia Point of Connection and shift more production to the Central Point of Connection. In addition, Agency staff are exploring small additional supply quantities that may potentially be available at the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield or in South Hillsborough County near the potential South Hillsborough Wellfield test well site. Additional alternative water supply delivery capacity to the Lithia Point of Connection will occur when the temporary Brandon Booster Station is online in summer 2022.

Treated surface water totaled 61.37 mgd in February 2022. The Desalination Facility has been online since December 13, 2021; the average production rate from the Desalination Facility was 15.34 mgd in February 2022. To supplement water production at the Regional Surface Water Treatment Plant, 16.6 mgd of water was diverted from the Regional Reservoir in February 2022. The Regional Reservoir storage volume was 13.74 billion gallons (88% of full storage) at the end of February 2022.

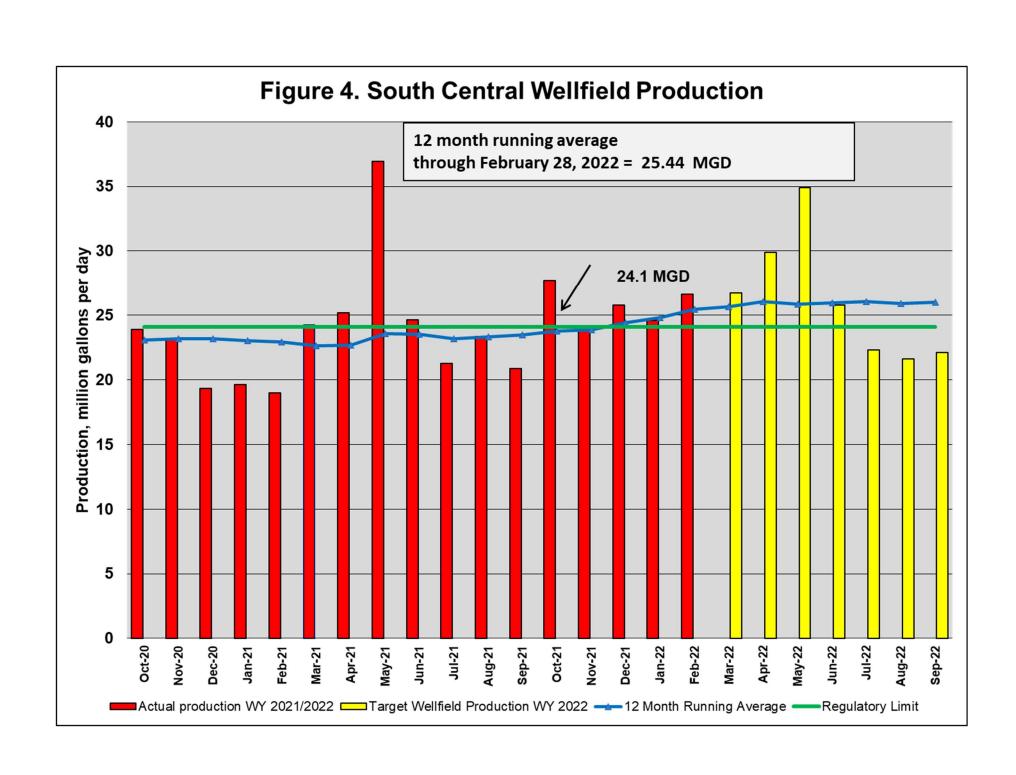
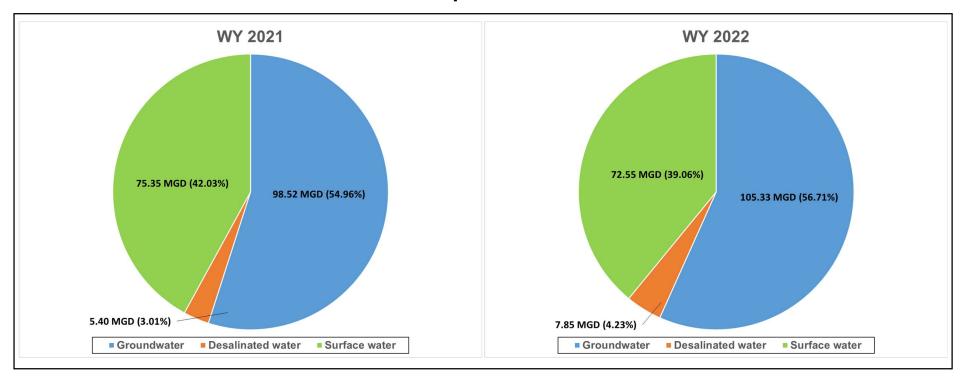
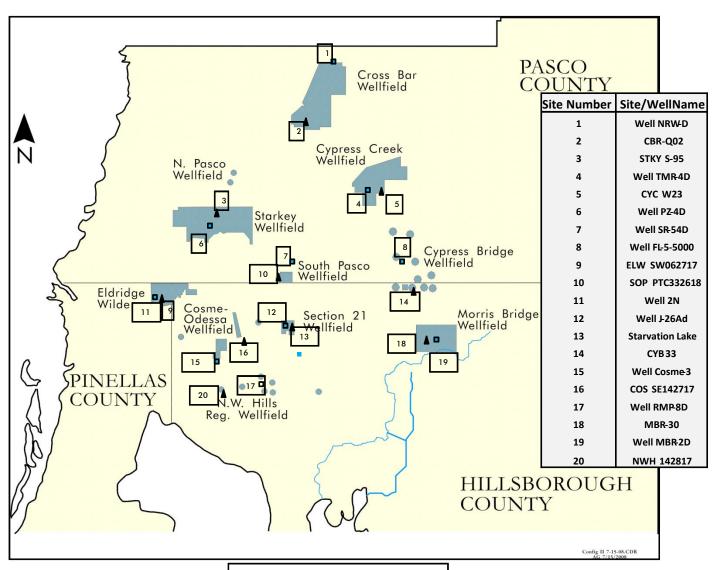
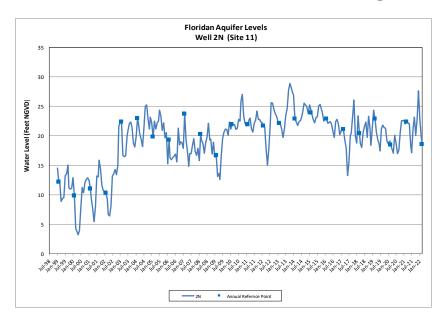


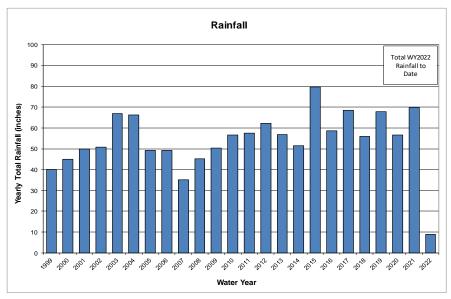
Figure 5: Tampa Bay Water Supply Sources

Comparison of year-to-date production from the three water supply source types between WY 2022 and WY 2021 is shown in Figure 5.

Environmental Conditions

Tampa Bay Water closely monitors the environmental conditions around Agency wellfields and these data are used to guide production and wellfield management decisions. Figure 6 depicts the locations of selected Upper Floridan Aquifer monitor sites and lake or wetland sites. A summary of observed conditions in and around the 10 Consolidated Permit Wellfields is provided in Figures 7 through 16. These figures show pumping rate and rainfall at these wellfields for the past 24 years as well as water-level data from the Upper Floridan Aquifer and a lake or wetland located on or near each wellfield.

A reference line on the lake and wetland hydrographs shows the lake minimum level or the normal pool elevation in the wetland. The normal pool elevation of a wetland is the water-surface elevation that is normally reached at the end of the rainy season during an average rainfall year. This is typically the highest water level reached in a wetland during an average rainfall year; water levels are expected to fluctuate below this elevation during the year.

Water levels in lakes and wetlands respond more directly to changes in rainfall than does the Floridan Aquifer. Even with substantially reduced groundwater production, because of the strong relation to rainfall conditions, water levels in some lakes and wetlands on and near wellfields will exhibit normal water level fluctuations only as rainfall occurs in normal or above-normal amounts. With a sustained reduction in groundwater pumping rate and normal rainfall, water levels in area lakes and wetlands

should continue to approximate normal water level fluctuations.

General water level changes are summarized as follows:

- Groundwater levels generally **decreased about 0.7 foot** during February 2022.
- Groundwater levels in February 2022 were generally **2.0 feet lower** than in February 2021.
- Average water levels in the 10 indicator lakes and wetlands located on and near Consolidated Permit Wellfields **decreased 3.2 inches** during February 2022 (based on data collected throughout the month, not necessarily end-of-month).
- Average water levels in the 10 indicator lakes and wetlands in February 2022 were about **0.6 inch lower** than water levels in February 2021.

Water Shortage Mitigation Plan

The Board approved the updated Water Shortage Mitigation Plan (WSMP) in April 2017. The WSMP uses rainfall, stream flows, and reservoir storage as indicators of the health of the region's water supplies. The cumulative rainfall in the region is at a 1.90-inch surplus at the end of February 2022 (compared to a 4.30-inch surplus at the end of January 2022). Stream flow is at a 9.80 mgd surplus at the end of February 2022 (compared to a 28.80 mgd surplus at the end of January 2022). The storage in the Regional Reservoir was 13.74 billion gallons (nearly 88% of full storage) at the end of February 2022. Tampa Bay Water is currently under a normal WSMP stage.

Staff continues to work with the members in collecting watering restriction and conservation information, discussing and exploring various short-term and long-term demand management alternatives, implementing a consistent public awareness campaign throughout the region, and identifying additional opportunities to optimize existing water resources.

BACKGROUND

Data collection, analysis, and interpretation as well as decision-making are ongoing for a multitude of factors that influence and constrain Agency operations. These include hydrologic and environmental conditions, supply and demand conditions, treatment plant parameters, water quality constituents, along with equipment/machinery and infrastructure variables.

A summary of monthly information is compiled and provided to the Board in each Agenda Packet and is supplemented as necessary. A summary of highlights is presented annually.

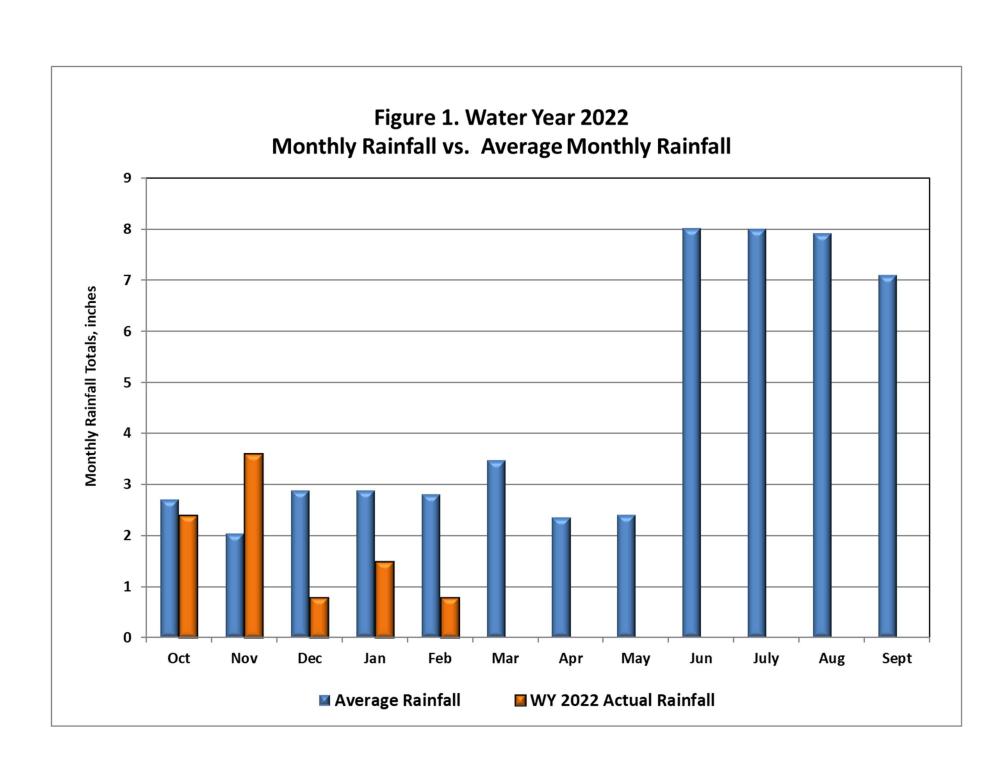
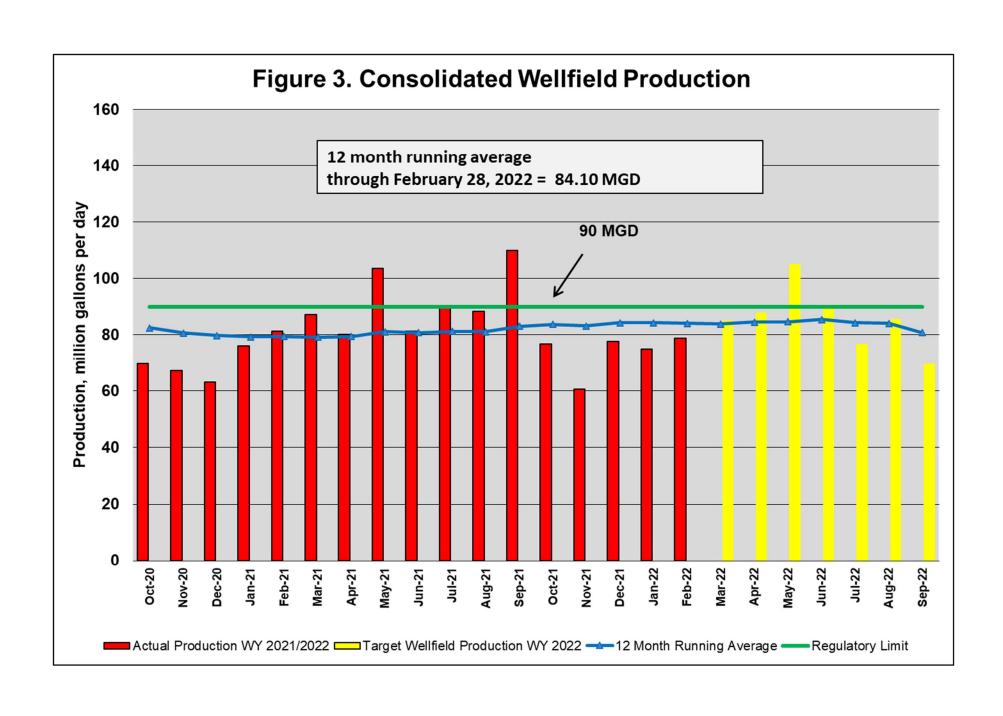


Figure 2. Tampa Bay Water Delivery Through February Water Year 2022 Compared To Water Year 2021 190 185 3.6% increase 180 (6.41 mgd increase) 175 million gallons per day 184.29 mgd 170 WY 2022 177.88 mgd WY 2021 165 160 155 150 145 140 ■ WY 2021 Water Year to Date Delivery ■ WY 2022 Water Year to Date Delivery

Water Year 2022 Compared To Water Year 2021

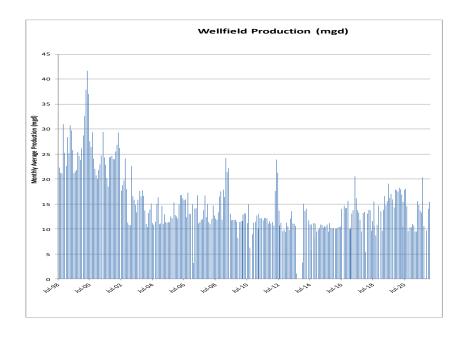


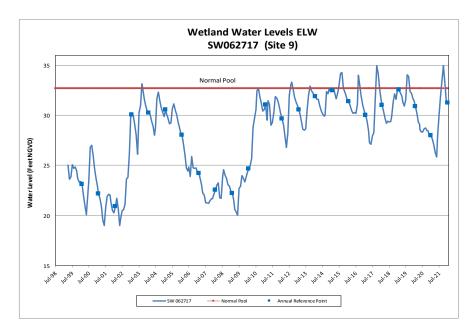


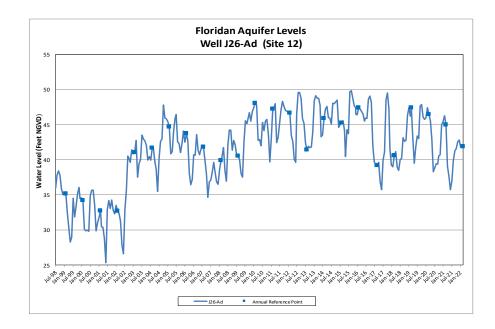

SUBJECT: Water Quality Update - Receive Report

SUMMARY

The Water Quality Update summarizes agency water quality compliance and studies through February 2022 and member government distribution systems performance through January 2022.

DISCUSSION

The agency monitors regional system water quality at member government points of connection and sampling locations identified in the Comprehensive Regional Water Quality Monitoring Plan approved by the FDEP. Data are reported in accordance with the Master Water Supply Contract (Exhibit D) and state and federal water quality compliance requirements. The agency complied with all state/federal drinking water standards for this reporting period.

Exhibit D Water Quality Compliance

Exhibit D requirements were met for all parameters and locations during this reporting period, except turbidity (1.21 NTU) at the point of connection with the Cosme Water Treatment Plant. Turbidity slightly above the 1 NTU running annual average requirement at this location has been discussed with the City of St. Petersburg. This is not a drinking water concern because turbidity is removed by the Cosme Water Treatment Plant's lime-softening process.

Consumer Confidence Report

Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) data for 2021 were compiled and distributed to members in February 2022. The agency's final CCR report, which is an annual drinking water quality report to customers, will be published in March 2022. The deadline for issuing this report to members is April 1, 2022.

Regional Water Quality Study

Operation of the ion exchange and granular activated carbon pilot systems continued to treat a sample stream of groundwater from the Cypress Creek Wellfield, and the reduction of total organic carbon and overall performance remain favorable and consistent with bench-scale studies performed earlier in 2021. The total organic carbon target concentration for this pilot study was 1 mg/L and the pilot test results show a reduction in total organic carbon to 1 mg/L or less. Pilot testing was completed in February 2022 and a report will be issued in March 2022. Updates are provided at Utility Director and Water Quality Working Group/Operations Coordination Committee (WQWG/OCC) meetings.

Regional Free Chlorine Maintenance Evaluation

Discussions continue with member government water quality staffs to examine disinfection byproducts (DBP) formation potential more closely. Bench-top tests will be conducted to further characterize free chlorine use in the regional system with a focus on members' distribution systems, as requested by some members. Pilot tests to gauge biological sloughing potential in agency transmission mains will be further discussed with the Utility Directors.

Northwest Hillsborough Transmission System - Chloramines and Nitrites

Regional system water quality satisfies Exhibit D requirements. Fluctuations in chloramine residuals and nitrites were previously observed by members receiving water from the Northwest Hillsborough regional service area. Tampa Bay Water Operations staff optimized chloramine formation, increased chloramine stability, and reduced nitrites. This favorable performance continued during the current reporting period.

Northwest Hillsborough Wellfield and Regional Blends - Chloramines and Nitrites

Work continues with Hillsborough County operations and water quality staffs to achieve optimum wellfield and regional water blends to achieve increased chloramine stability in the member's

distribution system downstream of their Fawn Ridge Water Treatment Plant. Progress meetings are held monthly.

Proposed PFAS Monitoring

In support of the agency's PFAS litigation, a sampling plan and analytical method for PFAS detection in source waters was proposed by special counsel's technical expert, Weston & Sampson. EPA's Draft Method 1633, which was published in late-2021 and is different from Weston & Sampson's proposed method, is being considered and continues to be discussed with special counsel. The proposed plan and analytical method will be presented to the Utility Directors prior to sampling.

Fifth Round Unregulated Contaminant Rule (UCMR5)

EPA published their final rule in late December that requires finished water monitoring of 29 PFAS compounds and lithium in January 2023 to January 2025. The agency will coordinate sample collection with members, so that "upstream" (Tampa Bay Water) and "downstream" (members) test results are available during the monitoring program.

Red Tide

Staff continues to review monitoring performed by others to remain current on red tide conditions in Tampa Bay. Red tide conditions have not been reported in the vicinity of the desalination plant intake structure. The desalination plant is currently online.

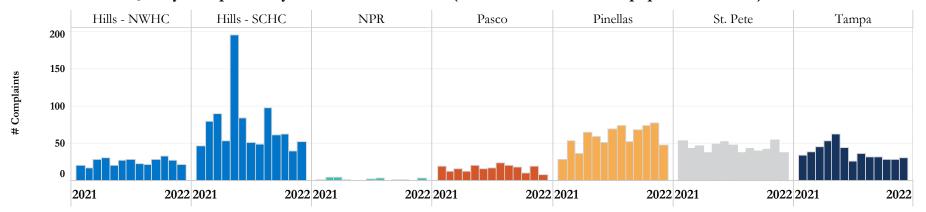
Water Quality Working Group/Operations Coordination Committee

A Water Quality Working Group/Operations Coordination Committee (WQWG/OCC) meeting was held on February 10, 2022. Discussion topics included Tampa Bay Water regional system performance and project status reviews (described above). Member governments presented distribution system performance data that are provided in attached Tables 1-4 and shown on the attached graphs. The graphs show, by member government for January 2021 through January 2022, the total number of received complaints, the total distribution system water flushed (by volume), and the water distribution system water flushed (percent of total water delivered). No compliance issues were reported by the member governments. Minutes are attached for this meeting.

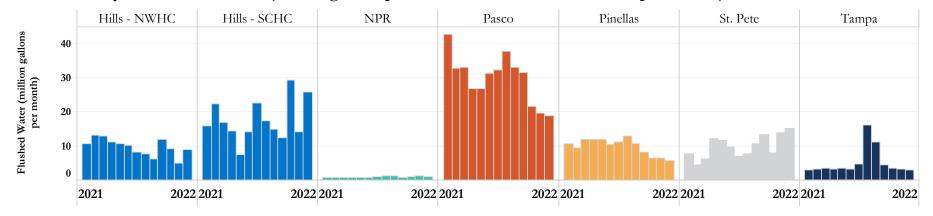

Distribution System Flushed Water (% of total water delivered per month)

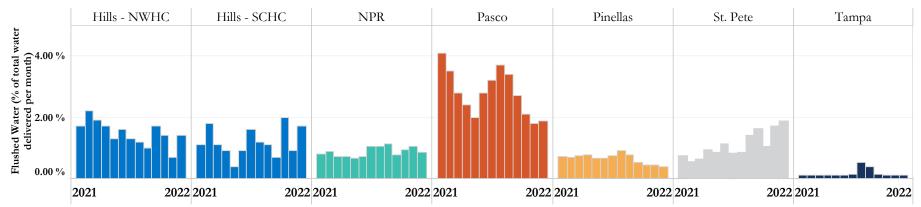

B. WATER TREATMENT

1. EXHIBIT D PERFORMANCE

- a. Exhibit D performance met requirements with the turbidity exception at Cosme Influent.
- b. Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) data tables for 2021 annual water quality were approved by FDEP and shared with members on February 9, 2022.
- c. The CCR final is being worked on and will become available in March 2022, which is ahead of the April 2022 deadline.

2. REGIONAL WATER QUALITY STUDY

- a. Operation of the GAC and IX pilots on Cypress Creek WF water continues with overall favorable performance.
- b. TOC target reductions of 1 mg/L or better have been achieved. These results have been largely consistent with bench-scale treatability findings.
- c. An unexpected pressure buildup in the second of two GAC units operating in series occurred in January.
- d. Iron bacterial growth was determined to have been the cause of an unexpected pressure build up in the second of two GAC units that were operating in series in January 2022.
- e. The growth was eliminated by a reconfiguration of piping from the first GAC unit.
- f. GAC pilot conditions were recently changed to observe different operating conditions and to collect contaminant mass transfer rate data.
- g. The pilots are expected to run through February to obtain three months of operating data.

3. REGIONAL CHLORINE MAINENANCE EVALUATION

- a. The next phase of work will include supplemental disinfection byproducts (DBPs) formation potential testing.

- a. Given that water quality distribution issues are of key importance to WQWG/OCC, this manual, which is being updated by AWWA, will be reviewed as a routine agenda item.
- b. The current manual was sent by Sharefile link to all WQWG/OCC members.
- c. Steve suggested the WQWG/OCC plan to discuss the first two chapters at the next WQWG meeting.

DISCUSSION

As identified to the Board on May 4, 2017, Board acceptance of the annual Capital Improvements Program document is an acceptance of the capital projects roadmap. Subsequent Board approvals of individual capital project activity is sought for planning, design and/or construction contracts and/or task authorizations under existing contracts for project fees and assigned funding source.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water's CIP Plan is a comprehensive ten-year plan of approved and proposed capital projects. The CIP is updated annually and is subject to changes as the needs for specific projects become more defined and as final approval of individual projects is provided by the Board.

SUMMARY

GSI Environmental, Inc. is assisting Tampa Bay Water staff with two projects under Professional Services Contract No. 2020-017. These two assignments are the development of improved rainfall data sets across our region and the calibration, evaluation, and documentation of the Integrated Northern Tampa Bay Model. Completion of these two projects will enhance the Agency's analytical models and support our decision-making process for existing and future water supply sources. Additional work is needed to complete these two assignments and each Purchase Order will now exceed the General Manager's signature authority of \$250,000 per assignment under this contract.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve two amended task orders under As-Needed Systems Decision Support Services Contract No. 2020-017. Increase P.O. 20200268 by \$93,302.00 to a total amount of \$318,446.00 and increase P.O. 20210332 by \$68,262.43 to a total amount of \$307,903.43.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

\$161,564.43 total for the two Purchase Order modifications / Uniform Water Rate. Funds from the approved Fiscal Year 2022 Budget.

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water staff have developed advanced numerical modeling and data analysis tools to support our decision-making processes for existing and future water supply sources. One of the analytical processes that Agency staff have developed is the combination of rainfall data collected from gages and rainfall data collected by radar to produce a significantly improved rainfall data product (Bayesian rainfall) as compared to previous rainfall data products. The improved rainfall data product, when complete, will be used by Tampa Bay Water staff to improve our models and data analysis tools and improve our ability to analyze data and enhance water supply forecasts.

This enhanced rainfall data will be incorporated into the Integrated Northern Tampa Bay (INTB) model which is a calibrated application of the Integrated Hydrologic Model code. Incorporating the enhanced rainfall data into the INTB model will require the model to be recalibrated using this new data set. The INTB model is a critical tool used by the Agency to provide support for the Optimized Regional Operations Plan, Water Use Permitting, Minimum Flows and Levels, and the evaluation of changes to flows and levels due to climate change, sea level rise, and land use change.

The staff of GSI Environmental, Inc. provide highly-specialized, technical consulting services that Tampa Bay Water staff use to support our Integrated Hydrologic Model, the Integrated Northern Tampa Bay Model, the Optimized Regional Operations Plan models, and other water resource assessment forecast models under As-Needed Contract No. 2020-017. The staff of GSI Environmental, Inc. have been supporting Tampa Bay Water staff in the development of the enhanced rainfall data product and the recalibration and documentation of the INTB model described above under two separate task order assignments. Additional assistance from GSI Environmental, Inc. is necessary to complete these two projects.

Staff recommends approval to amend two existing task orders to complete this critical work as both amended task orders will now exceed the General Manager's signature authority of \$250,000 per assignment for work under this contract: 1) increase P.O. 20200268 by \$93,302.00 to a total amount of \$318,446.00 and 2) increase P.O. 20210332 by \$68,262.43 to a total amount of \$307,903.43.

BACKGROUND

The Agency retains as-needed professional services consultants to provide specific services on a task order basis for assisting Tampa Bay Water staff to complete studies and analyses pertinent to water supply decision support systems. The As-Needed Systems Decision Support Professional Services Contract No. 2020-017 with GSI Environmental, Inc. was approved by the Board of Directors on October 21, 2019 for a total contract value not to exceed \$750,000 over a 5-year period. On November 15, 2021, the Board of Directors approved an amendment to the contract to increase the total contract value by \$500,000 to a value not to exceed \$1,250,000 over the original 5-year period. The contract also authorizes the General Manager to approve an individual task order that does not exceed \$250,000.

SUMMARY

Tampa Bay Water is responsible for land management and wetland restoration/mitigation activities along our pipelines, at the Regional Reservoir, at the Tampa Bay Water-owned portion of the Cypress Creek Wellfield, and at other facilities. The current as-needed land management services contracts will expire in April 2022. Approval of the recommended contracts will secure firms for the next three-year period with an option for two, one-year renewals without a gap between the expiring and new contracts.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve Professional Services Contract Nos. 2022-040 through 2022-045 with the six top-ranked consultants to perform land management services up to a maximum amount of \$500,000 per contract (initial three-year term at \$300,000 with two, one-year renewal options at an additional \$100,000 for each additional year). Staff also recommends waiver of the expenditure limit of the General Manager's signature authority for task orders up to the contract limit.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

\$1,800,000 (six contracts over three years) FY 2022 Budget/Uniform Water Rate. Funding for subsequent years through the contract period requires Board approval of future budgets.

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water uses as-needed professional services contracts to extend the technical expertise and expand staff functions of the agency. In order to manage workload variations (both within each year and from year to year), Tampa Bay Water has traditionally used outside consultants with particular experience and expertise for short-term activities rather than acquiring additional staff and specialized equipment. This has proven to be a cost-effective means of accomplishing the required work in a timely manner.

Staff evaluated the potential workload for the next three years and determined that six contracts for asneeded land management services are needed, each with an initial contract limit of \$300,000 (\$500,000
maximum including the two, one-year extensions). The list of six recommended firms provides the
agency with the variety of expertise that will be needed over the next three to five years to meet permit
compliance requirements and land management obligations. The FY 2022 approved budget contains
\$388,499 for land management services and additional services are anticipated each year associated
with capital construction projects.

On November 18, 2021, Tampa Bay Water posted the Request for Proposals on Demandstar.com for As-Needed Land Management Services Contract Nos. 2022-040 through 2022-045. Over 355 firms were notified through advertisement on DemandStar and Tampa Bay Water's website and 23 firms downloaded the Request for Proposal. On January 12, 2022, Tampa Bay Water received timely, responsive proposals from seven companies.

The selection committee, comprised of Tampa Bay Water technical staff, rated all respondents in several categories using the advertised scoring criteria including project management experience, previous relevant project experience, nuisance plant species treatment qualifications, prescribed burn qualifications, planting qualifications, nuisance wildlife trapping & removal, land improvement, tree trimming and removal, volume of work previously awarded and certified minority status. The committee ranked the respondents by compiling written scores using the advertised scoring criteria.

Tampa Bay Water recommends the award of six land management contracts. Staff has ranked the following firms to be the most qualified:

Cardno, Inc.
Earthbalance Corporation
Water & Air Research, Inc.
Quest Ecology Inc.
Wildlands Conservation, Inc.
Rick Richards, Inc.

Staff recommends Board approval of the negotiated contracts for the above-listed firms. Contracts shall

have a term of three years at \$300,000 per contract, with an option for two renewal years, one year at a time at \$100,000 per contract. The approval of these contracts does not encumber any funds at this time. Funds for the task orders to be issued under these contracts will be from the current and future Tampa Bay Water budgets as approved by the Board of Directors.

In addition, staff recommends that the Board waive the expenditure limit of the General Manager's signature authority for task orders up to the contract limit. This will allow time-sensitive projects to begin and work to progress, avoiding the potential delay that may occur given the Board meeting schedule.

The proposed contracts and associated fee schedules are available upon request from the Tampa Bay Water Records Department and have been reviewed and approved as to form by Tampa Bay Water's General Counsel.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water has permit-required land management responsibilities for conservation, restoration and wetland mitigation areas along pipelines, at the Regional Reservoir, at the Tampa Bay Water-owned portion of the Cypress Creek Wellfield, and at other facilities. In addition, some land management projects are required to maintain access or for risk management. Past land management tasks performed by contractors and consultants include:

- Herbicide treatment of nuisance species in wetland mitigation and upland restoration areas
- Prescribed burns conducted in conservation or restoration areas
- Planting of native woody and herbaceous species in mitigation and restoration areas
- Trail improvements (e.g. construction of hardened crossings for off-road vehicles)
- Clearing of drainage ditches and swales
- Tree trimming and removal
- Bush hogging, mowing and brush removal
- Gopher tortoise relocation

SUMMARY

Ferric Sulfate is used in the treatment process at the Regional Surface Water Treatment Plant. The vendor for the supply of this chemical requested a price increase due to increased supply chain costs. Staff has worked with the vendor to negotiate new pricing for the continued chemical supply through September 30, 2022.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve Third Amendment to Contract No. 2020-021 with Kemira Water Solutions, Inc. to increase to the unit prices shown in the table below.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Uniform Rate of \$0.7974 per pound of Ferric Iron.

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water uses Ferric Sulfate in the water treatment process at its Regional Surface Water Treatment Plant. Contract No. 2020-021 was competitively bid and awarded to Kemira Water Solutions, Inc. at the August 19, 2019, board meeting. The First and Second Amendments to the contract, approved by the Board, extended the contract through September 30 2022.

Kemira Water Solutions, Inc. informed Tampa Bay Water's Purchasing Department that the manufacturing costs have increased. Kemira Water Solutions, Inc. requested a price increase of 33% based on the supply chain issues from raw material costs, transportation costs and industry volatility for the last six months. Purchasing was able to negotiate down to a unit price increase of 20% shown below.

Product Current Price Per lb. of iron New Price Per lb. of iron

Ferric Sulfate \$0.6645 \$0.7974

Tampa Bay Water confirmed the industry information and based negotiations on the U.S. Bureau of Labor, PPI and other, observed market conditions. This research of the current market conditions indicates it would be in the best interest of Tampa Bay Water to accept the negotiated unit price increase instead of pursuing a new procurement.

Staff recommends approval of the Third Amendment to Contract No. 2020-021 which is effective upon the date of execution through September 30, 2022.

SUMMARY

Diatomaceous Earth Precoat Filter Media is used in the treatment process at the Seawater Desalination Plant. Due to unforeseen circumstances during the 2021 operating season, the vendor for the supply of this chemical incurred storage fees that the contract terms and conditions do not consider. Staff has worked with the vendor to negotiate additional contract language to address chemical storage in excess of 90-days should a similar situation occur in the future.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve Second Amendment to Contract No. 2021-007 with Chemical Systems of Orlando, Inc. to include a product storage fee clause.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Uniform Rate/\$0.01 per pound for storage of product in exceedance of 90 days.

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water uses Diatomaceous Earth Precoat Filter Media in the water treatment process at its Seawater Desalination Plant. Contract No. 2021-007 was competitively bid and awarded to Chemical Systems of Orlando, Inc. at the August 17, 2020, board meeting. The terms of the original contract

provides the option to renew the contract for an additional three years, one year at a time or any portion thereof. The first option year was exercised and approved by the Board at the August 2021 meeting.

Chemical Systems of Orlando, Inc. informed Tampa Bay Water's Purchasing Department that due to the unplanned shut down of the Seawater Desalination Plant in 2021 the product had to be stored for an extended period of time and Chemical Systems of Orlando, Inc. incurred storage fees that the contract terms and conditions do not consider. The clause will read as follows:

• 3.2.10 Contractor shall store product in accordance with section 3.1.3 above for a minimum period of 90 days. To the extent that prolonged storage exceeds 90 days, by any portion of the 30 days thereafter, and if storage continues to exceed any portion of every increment of 30 days thereafter, the charge to Tampa Bay Water will be \$0.01/lb. or \$20.00/month for each pallet (2000 lbs.). The storage fee shall be billed and/or invoiced to Tampa Bay Water on a monthly basis.

Staff recommends approval of the Second Amendment to Contract No. 2021-007 for the Storage Fees Clause.

The proposed amendment has been approved as to form by Tampa Bay Water's General Counsel.

Tampa Bay Water solicited bids for Fence, Gate, and Gate Operator Installation and Repair work. Seven contracting companies downloaded the bid package. One company submitted a responsive bid. Tampa Bay Water Staff recommend awarding a contract to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve award of Contract No. 2022-049 to the lowest responsive responsible bidder, Smith Industries, Inc., dba Smith Fence Company in the amount not to exceed \$150,000.00 per year.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Uniform Rate. Not to exceed \$150,000.00. FY 2022 and FY 2023 budgeted funds.

DISCUSSION

On December 14, 2021 Tampa Bay Water posted an Invitation for Sealed Bids (ITB) for the Fence & Gate Installation & Repair Services. Over 220 contractors were notified through advertisement on DemandStar and Tampa Bay Water's website. Tampa Bay Water added one known contractor as a supplemental contractor and seven contractors downloaded the bid plans.

On February 2, 2022, sealed bids were received and publicly opened as follows:

Staff contacted plan holders for this bid in an effort to determine the reason why only one bid was received. The general responses received indicated that the work and workload was different than anticipated as well as on-going supply chain issues for material and labor shortages for the region.

The low bid was reviewed by staff and found to be responsive. Staff recommend that Contract No. 2022-049 be awarded to the lowest, responsive, responsible bidder and approved in the amount of \$150,000.00 for the contract term from date of award through March 31, 2023 with three renewal options, one year at a time. Funds for this work will be included in each fiscal year budget.

The proposed contract is available upon request and will be reviewed and approved as to form by Tampa Bay Water's General Counsel.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water utilizes contractors for Fence, Gate, and Gate Operator Installation and Repair to maintain fences around properties in Hillsborough, Pasco, and Pinellas counties. Approve Award of Contract Nos. 2022-046 through 2022-048 to the lowest responsive responsible bidders, Paff Services LLC, Rick Richards, Inc. and Tucker Enterprise Services, Inc. in the amount not to exceed \$150,000.00 per year each.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Uniform Rate. Fiscal Year 2022/2023, Not to Exceed \$450,000.00 budgeted funds.

DISCUSSION

On December 14, 2021 Tampa Bay Water posted an Invitation for Sealed Bids (ITB) for the Fence & Gate Installation & Repair Services. Over 280 contractors were notified through advertisement on DemandStar and Tampa Bay Water's website. Tampa Bay Water added seven known contractors as

supplemental contractors and 23 contractors downloaded the bid plans.

On February 2, 2022, sealed bids were received and publicly opened as follows:

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water utilizes Tree Trimming and Fence Line Maintenance contractors to maintain properties and rights of way in Hillsborough, Pasco, and Pinellas counties. Tampa Bay Water previously piggybacked this work on other municipal government contracts but elected to bid this work starting in 2018 due to some unique aspects of the work, to include: 1) Specific Homeland Security requirements for clear zones on both sides of all security fences, 2) Geographical issues with contractors being asked to work in three counties with related increased costs, 3) Specific language for emergency response time in event of a natural disaster or critical need.

SUMMARY

Tampa Bay Water utilizes outside analytical laboratory services to provide water quality analyses that our laboratory is not equipped to perform as some analyses are not cost effective to complete inhouse. These include analyses that are performed infrequently and/or they require a level of protection from health and safety hazards that is not required for most drinking water quality testing. Tampa Bay Water also uses these services for backup to assure compliance in the event of unanticipated staffing shortages, and/or long delays in the delivery of laboratory supplies, instrumentation parts, and repairs. The current analytical service contracts will expire on March 31, 2022. Approval of the recommended contracts will secure as-needed laboratory services for the next one-year period with an option for three, one-year renewals.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve the award of Contract Nos. 2022-036 and 2022-037 for As-Needed Analytical Laboratory Services to the lowest responsive, responsible bidders, Advanced Environmental Laboratories, Inc. and Pace Analytical Services, LLC, in the combined amount not to exceed \$75,000 annually.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Combined contract amount up to \$75,000 annually/Approved FY2022 Budget - Funding for subsequent years requires Board approval of future budgets.

DISCUSSION

On November 30, 2021, Tampa Bay Water posted an Invitation for Sealed Bids (ITB) for As-Needed Laboratory Services. Over 90 contractors were notified through advertisement on DemandStar and Tampa Bay Water's website. Tampa Bay Water added three known contractors as supplemental contractors. Three contractor firms downloaded the bid plans.

On January 19, 2022, at 2:00 p.m., sealed bids were received and publicly opened and are listed below.

Advanced Environmental Laboratories, Inc. \$28,076.00 Pace Analytical Services, LLC \$48,689.00

The two apparent low bids were reviewed by staff and found to be responsive. Staff recommends that Contract Nos. 2022-036 and 2022-037 be awarded to the two lowest, responsive, responsible bidders for the contract term beginning from the date of award through March 3, 2023 with three (3) renewal options, renewable one year at a time. Funds for this work will be included in each fiscal year budget.

The proposed contracts have been approved as-to-form by Tampa Bay Water's General Counsel. Copies of the Bid Price Forms are attached.

BACKGROUND

The Tampa Bay Water Laboratory is certified under the National Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Program (NELAP) to perform many drinking water and non-potable water analyses. Other permit-required analyses that may require equipment/instrumentation that our laboratory does not have are contracted out to private laboratories with the appropriate analytical equipment. These analyses include but are not limited to herbicides, pesticides, radioisotopes, and mercury. This has proven to be the most cost effective means of accomplishing the required work in a timely manner.

Based on the ongoing number of analyses required, cost effectiveness comparisons have shown that use of outside vendors for these particular water quality parameters is more efficient than purchasing and maintaining equipment, annual certifications, adding and training staff.

In addition, outside laboratories serve as an important backup during times when multiple staff members are unavailable, delivery of critical supplies are delayed, or when instrumentation repairs cannot be made in sufficient time to assure compliance as learned during the recent pandemic and postpandemic periods.

SUMMARY

The original contract was awarded at the December 2018 Board meeting. Per the terms of the contract, the vendor has requested a unit price increase. Staff conducted research including verifying fuel and labor rates through the United States Bureau of Labor Producer Price Index and other observed market conditions and can justify the proposed increase.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve Sixth Amendment to Contract No. 2019-001, with Albert E. Roller, LLC to include an increase to the unit price of 5%.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Uniform Rate. Fiscal Year 2022/2023 budgeted funds.

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water uses Mowing & Grounds Maintenance Services for locations in the three counties of Hillsborough, Pasco, and Pinellas. The contract was competitively bid and awarded to Albert E. Roller, LLC at the December 2018 board meeting.

The terms of the original contract provide the option to renew the contract for an additional three years, one year at a time or any portion thereof. The three option years were exercised and approved by the board at the October 2019, October 2020 and October 2021 meetings through December 31, 2022.

In accordance with the contract's escalation clause, the contractor may request a price increase once per calendar year with appropriate justification and back-up documentation. Albert E. Roller has requested a unit price increase of 5%. Staff conducted research including verifying fuel and labor rates through the United States Bureau of Labor Producer Price Index and other, observed market conditions. Staff had determined that an increase of 5% in unit price is substantiated by regional construction and transportation fluctuations as well as labor rate increases of 8.7% from December 2020 to December 2021.

Staff recommends approval of the Sixth Amendment to include the unit price increase of 5%.

The proposed amendment has been approved as to form by Tampa Bay Water General Counsel's Office.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water's Buildings, Grounds, and Fleet Department is responsible for lawn maintenance services at all Agency operating facilities and wellfields, along with land management services on all agency facilities, including high vegetation areas along pipeline easements. Work includes bush hogging, disking, tree trimming and/or removal, trash/debris removal in pipeline easement areas and line trimming at various agency facilities/sites. Due to agency staffing levels and high capital equipment investment, these services were considered for outsourcing in 1995. It is recommended that these services continue to be outsourced.

DISCUSSION

Operations Status and Outlook

For the month of February 2022, the Agency delivered an average of 186.58 million gallons per day (mgd), which is 13.16 mgd higher than delivered in February 2021. Groundwater produced 110.95 mgd using the Consolidated Wellfields, the South-Central Hillsborough Regional wellfield, and the Brandon Urban Dispersed Wells. The Surface Water Treatment Plant averaged 61.37 mgd and the Seawater Desalination Facility averaged 15.34 mgd. An average of 16.6 mgd was withdrawn from the reservoir and is 88% full (13.8 billion gallons of storage).

For the 2022 water year to date (October 2021-February 2022), the system averaged 184.29 mgd

which is 6.4% higher than the same period last year. The 2022 water year budget is 192.2 mgd. The consolidated water use permit 12-month running average is 84.10 mgd against the permit limit of 90 mgd. The South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield permit 12- month running average is 25.44 mgd and is above the permit limit of 24.1 mgd. The Board approved a permit modification for this wellfield and it was submitted to the Southwest Florida Water Management District on February 28. In addition, staff is preparing a Water Use Permit application to harvest the unused water supply quantity left on the AgMart property in southern Hillsborough County. Staff has also identified other properties near the AgMart property that are transitioning from agriculture to residential land use and will meet with the owners of those properties to see if they have permitted quantities that they will no longer use and if Tampa Bay Water can acquire those water supplies. All of these quantities can be transferred to future water supply wells on the AgMart property to hep meet the growing demands in south Hillsborough County.

Below normal rainfall and above-normal temperatures are predicted to continue from the period March through May.

The City of Tampa anticipates purchasing water from the Morris Bridge interconnect in early May for two weeks as they continue to make improvements at their David L. Tippin Surface Water Treatment Plant. Tampa Bay Water is likely to ramp up production of the Surface Water Treatment Plant and Seawater Desalination facility during this time period.

South Hillsborough County Water Demands

Demands in South Hillsborough County continue to climb as we approach the dry season. Tampa Bay Water staff will be discussing with Hillsborough County some potential measures that could be put in place to curb demands during the driest months of the year.

Upcoming items

The proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP credits) project is a potential water supply project that could be selected to help meet the increasing drinking water needs of the region. This project is estimated to initially yield 6.1 to 10 million gallons per day of potable supply via a new wellfield located in south Hillsborough County when fully built out, though staff and consultants have begun to look at phasing the project. The wellfield would be permitted using groundwater credits acquired through the injection of reclaimed water into the non-potable aquifer along the coast as a part of Hillsborough County's South Hillsborough Aquifer Recharge Program (SHARP). Staff and consultant WSP USA presented a term-sheet and associated attachments to the Board at its February meeting and, per Board direction, conveyed the amended term sheet to Hillsborough County as a basis for establishing a future Sale and Purchase Agreement with Hillsborough County of reclaimed water that results in potable water supply development for the South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP credits).

The Board also directed Tampa Bay Water staff to meet with Hillsborough County staff to negotiate a Sale and Purchase Agreement for Board consideration by its June 2022 meeting. Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County staff met several times since the February Board meeting and the following is an

update on those discussions:

- Hillsborough County staff has stated that is not interested in pursuing a 30-year agreement at this time
- Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough staff have discussed the option of building the wellfield in phases starting with 2-3 production wells (2.4 mgd yield).
- Tampa Bay Water's consultants have begun to evaluate a phased approach to the proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield project as part of the current configuration of projects for Board selection later this year.
- Hillsborough County staff and Tampa Bay Water staff have discussed limiting the initial agreement term to 10-20 years, tied to the first phase of the proposed wellfield.
- Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County finance staff will meet to discuss alternative financing strategies for a phased wellfield.

As part of the next steps in these discussions, Tampa Bay Water is updating costs information for the smaller wellfield and proving updated yield and locations of new well configurations. Discussions with the County are on-going and a status update will be regularly provided to the Board.

Fiscal Year 2023 Proposed Budget – The budget is being prepared and will be distributed in March for member government review before a scheduled workshop with the Board in April.

Other Items of Note

The **Chief Operating Officer** deadline for submitting applications closed on February 21. First round interviews have been scheduled on March 24-25. The **Chief Science Officer** position closed on February 25 and applications are being evaluated for interviews.

Continuous Improvement Work - Tampa Bay Water hired a consultant to assist the agency in benchmarking other utility continuous improvement programs and developing recommendations for a continuous improvement program framework for the agency. The process kicked off last month and a workshop will be held for senior staff in the coming weeks.

The 2022 Florida Legislative Session began on January 11, 2022, and legislative work continues year-round at the federal level. The Board approved the 2022 Legislative Program Goals & Priorities at its November 2021 Board meeting, and the Legislative Team continues to track and monitor bills that are of interest to Tampa Bay Water and its member governments in accordance with the goals and priorities. This item provides an update on current legislative team efforts at both the state and federal levels.

DISCUSSION

Federal and state legislation can significantly affect the cost of producing water and meeting regulatory requirements. Providing input on potential legislation and regulations that could pose additional costs

has become increasingly important as Tampa Bay Water focuses on operating its system efficiently and cost-effectively. The State Legislation Tracking Report (attached) and Bill Tracking from our legislative counsel (attached) ensure that bills filed that could impact Tampa Bay Water have been identified and analyzed. Strategies to engage in the legislative process to ensure that Tampa Bay Water's priorities are met are being developed consistent with the Board-approved 2022 Legislative Program Goals & Priorities.

BACKGROUND

The Tampa Bay Water Board created a unique water system that includes three diverse water sources. Tampa Bay Water's story is a model for other regional water systems. The agency continues to reach out to stakeholders such as the Florida Legislature and the Federal Congressional Delegation to provide knowledge and assistance on water policy. Staff also provides input and assistance to state and regional officials and regulatory agencies by providing expertise on water supply policies, water management history and needs, and technical topics.

The items of interest we are monitoring follow below, and all member bills are now filed and numbered. Senate bills included in this report are numbered through **SB 1974**; Senate committee bills numbered through **SB 7046**; House bills numbered through **HB 1593**; House committee bills numbered through **SB 7071**; and House "repealer" bills numbered through **HB 6119**. The summary and tracking items include activities through the **close of business on March 9, 2022**. The water-related initiatives appear first and followed by other legislative initiatives of interest.

Future reports will update the progress of the identified bills and include new filings as they appear. Changes from the prior report will appear in **bold type**. The full text of each bill, as well as applicable legislative staff reports, are available on the legislative web sites (www.flsenate.gov; www.myfloridahouse.com; and www.leg.state.fl.us.).

TAMPA BAY WATER LEGISLATIVE STATUS REPORT

The bill tracking report is attached, and the water-related legislation appears first in the summary. Other bills of interest in the system are shown by chronological bill number, and the full text of each bill can be found on the legislative web sites. (www.floridahouse.com; and www.leg.state.fl.us.)

Water Related Legislation

<u>Water Resource Management</u>: <u>CS/SB 198</u> by Senator Rodriguez and <u>CS/HB 349</u> by Representative Sirois and are similar bills that authorize the Board of Trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund to grant easements for mitigation banks to ensure the protections and restoration from the impacts primarily to sovereignty submerged lands. The legislation requires DEP to consult with water management districts in the rule adoption process required to provide for the long-term management of mitigation. **This legislation will die in committee when the Legislature adjourns.**

<u>"Fracking" Ban: SB 208</u> by Senator Farmer define and create a regulatory framework for "high pressure well stimulation treatment," and the legislation would prohibit hydraulic or acid fracturing for the exploration or production of oil or natural gas, basically banning "fracking" in any form. SB 208 received 4 committee references and has not been heard and has no House companion bill. This measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

<u>Sanitary Sewer Systems—Protection of Water Quality</u>: <u>HB 303</u> by Representative Truenow and <u>CS/SB 608</u> by Senator Brodeur are companion bills that permit counties and municipalities to access and maintain sewer laterals to preserve and protect water quality. **This legislation will die in committee when the Legislature adjourns.**

<u>Bottled Water Tax</u>: <u>HB 473</u> by Representative Casello and <u>SB 798</u> by Senator Taddeo are companion measures that will impose an excise tax on bottled water operators, and the legislation provides that proceeds will be used for grants and loans to local governments to connect onsite sewage systems to central sewage systems. HB 473 received 4 committee references. SB 798 received 3 committee references. Neither bill has had a hearing, and this measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

<u>Headwater Protections</u>: <u>HB 603</u> by Representative Bell and <u>SB 1400</u> by Senator Burgess are companion bills that will create a permanent funding source for the protection of the headwaters in partnership with regional water supply authorities for the Alafia, Hillsborough, Kissimmee, Ocklawaha, Peace and Withlacoochee Rivers. **This legislation will die in committee when the Legislature adjourns.**

<u>Water Supply Project Funding</u>: <u>HB 621</u> by Representative Fine and <u>SB 1162</u> by Senator Broxson are companion bills that limit the disbursement of funds from the state and from water management districts for water-related projects, including water supply projects, when the potential grantee uses revenues that it collects for providing utility services to fund other governmental functions. HB 621 received 4 committee references. SB 1162 received 4 committee references. Neither bill has had a hearing, and this measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

Water Quality Enhancement Areas: CS/CS/CS/HB 965 by Representative Truenow provides for water quality enhancement areas and enhancement credits to be permitted by the Department of Environmental Protection. The enhancement areas are intended to ensure long-term pollutant reduction and provide permanent water quality enhancement. CS/CS/CS/HB 965 has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-____, Laws of Florida.)

<u>Saltwater Intrusion</u>: <u>HB 1019</u> by Representative Duggan and <u>CS/SB 1238</u> by Senator Polsky are companion measures that will require coastal counties to conduct vulnerability assessments to analyze the effects of saltwater intrusion on their water supplies and their preparedness to respond to threats of saltwater intrusion. HB 1019 received 3 committee referrals. **This legislation will die in committee when the Legislature adjourns.**

<u>Floating Solar Facilities</u>: <u>CS/HB 1411</u> by Representative Avila and Senator Diaz provides for and encourage the location of floating solar facilities on manmade bodies of water including reservoirs. **CS/HB 1411** has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-___, Laws of Florida.)

Groundwater Contamination: SB 1418 by Senator Albritton and HB 1475 by Representative McClure are similar measures that will require DEP to adopt rules for statewide cleanup target levels for perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances from soil and groundwater. This legislation will die in committee when the Legislature adjourns.

Flooding and Sea Level Rise Resilience: CS/HB 7053 by the Environment, Agriculture and Flooding Subcommittee creates a Statewide Office of Resilience to recommend strategies for enhanced infrastructure and prioritized resilience needs. The legislation identifies regional utilities as "significant assets" and regional water supply authorities as entities that may submit projects that mitigate risk of flooding or sea-level rise for priority consideration by the Department of Environmental Protection. CS/HB 7053 has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-____, Laws of Florida.)

Morris Bridge Wellfield: <u>HB 3625</u> by Representative DiCeglie and Form #1629 by Senator Burgess is the appropriation request for \$2.5 million for the improvements and upgrades at the Morris Bridge Wellfield. **The appropriation is pending as part of the Budget conference process to be finalized on Monday.**

Tampa Water Quality Treatment Pilot for PURE: HB 4821 by Representative Driskell and Form #1763 by Senator Cruz is the appropriation request for \$1 million to implement the Suspended Ion Exchange pilot project for PURE at the Howard F. Curren Treatment Plant. Under PURE, the City will redirect highly treated reclaimed water from the City's wastewater treatment plant to provide a sustainable, long-term solution for the minimum flows on the Lower Hillsborough River, increase the resilience of Tampa's drinking water source, and comply with the state rule that restricts discharges into Hillsborough Bay. The appropriation is pending as part of the Budget conference process to be finalized on Monday.

Other Legislation of Interest

<u>Discriminatory Employment Practices</u>: <u>HB 57</u> by Representative Fine and <u>SB 242</u> by Senator Gruters companion bills that require state agencies, counties and municipalities to prevent teaching of race or sex "scapegoating" or race or sex stereotyping and ensure agency diversity and inclusion of employees without regard to color, race, ethnicity, sex or any other characteristic protected by federal or state law. The current language in the bills does not extend to Tampa Bay Water. HB 57 received 3 committee references. SB 242 also received 3 references. Neither bill has had a committee hearing and this measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

Administrative Procedures: CS/CS/HB 337 by Representative McClain and CS/SB 536 by Senator Diaz are companion measures that make a series of changes to the Florida Administrative Code. Among the changes, proposed administrative rules are required to be filed with 12 months after posted notice of rule development or be withdraw; requests by affected persons for public workshops on proposed rules must be made in writing; notices of rule development must include available statements of estimated regulatory costs; the adverse impacts of a rule on small business are specifically defined; good faith estimates of defined market impacts of a proposed rule are required; and agencies are required to engage in periodic review of rules for consistency with enabling statutes. CS/CS/HB 337 has been amended and approved; passed all committees; and is pending on the House Calendar. CS/SB 536 has passed the Senate and is pending in Messages in the House.

<u>Sea Level Rise—Central and Southern Florida Project</u>: <u>CS/HB 513</u> by Representative Bartleman and Senator Rodriguez requires the South Florida Water Management District to annually report on the District's sea level rise and resiliency plan together with recommendations and cost estimates for refurbishment and replacement of vulnerable structures. **CS/HB 513** has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-____, Laws of Florida.)

<u>Business Damages Caused by Local Governments</u>: <u>CS/SB 620</u> by Senator Hutson will authorize a claim for business damages from a county or municipality that enacts or amends an ordinance that causes significant economic harm to a business. **CS/SB 620** has been amended; passed the House; and pending in Returning Messages in the Senate.

<u>Family and Medical Leave</u>: <u>HB 627</u> by Representative Eskamani and <u>SB 688</u> by Senator Cruz are companion bills that require an employer to provide paid family and medical leave to employees for the birth, adoption, or foster care placement of a new child. HB 627 received 3 committee references. SB 688 also received 3 committee references. Neither bill has had a hearing, and this measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

<u>Public Meetings During Declared Emergency</u>: <u>SB 674</u> by Senator Cruz will authorize public bodies to use media technology to conduct meetings during states of declared emergency; and it will authorize members to attend remotely. SB 674 received 3 committee references; it has not been heard in any committee; and has no House companion bill. This measure no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

Heat Illness Prevention: SB 732 by Senator Rodriguez and HB 887 by Representative Chambliss are companion bills that will require an employer to implement an outdoor heat exposure program approved by the Department of Agriculture for employees who regularly work in an outdoor environment, including, but not limited to, agriculture, construction and landscaping. SB 732 received 3 committee referrals and has been approved by the first committee of reference. HB 887 received 3 referrals; but has not had a committee hear. This measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

<u>DFS Department Package</u>: <u>CS/CS/HB 959</u> by Representative LaMarca contain initiatives on behalf of the Department of Financial Services. Among the provision in the legislation, it provides for the enrollment period for state group health insurance; it provides that the CFO may consult with local government entities on the Florida Open Financial Statement System; and it revises provisions in the law relating to workers' compensation. **CS/CS/HB 959 has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor.** (Chapter 2022- , Laws of Florida.)

Sovereign Immunity: CS/CS/SB 974 by Senator Gruters and CS/CS/HB 985 by Representative Beltran are companion measures that raise the level of the waiver of sovereign immunity for governmental entities from \$200,000 to \$1 million based on the population base of the governmental entity. CS/CS/CS/SB 974 has passed all committee references; and it pending on the House Calendar. CS/CS/HB 985 has been amended and approved by all committees and is pending on the House Calendar.

<u>Pre- Polyfluoroalkyl Substances Task Force</u>: <u>CS/HB 1475</u> by Representative McClure creates a Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances Task Force within the Department of Environmental Protection and will require annual reporting by the Task Force to the Governor and Legislature. **CS/HB 1475** has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-____, Laws of Florida.)

<u>Contracting: HB 1385</u> by Representative Woodson and <u>SB 1530</u> by Senator Jones are companion measures that will require agencies to require competitively solicited contracts to use certified minority, woman-owned, or veteran-owned businesses as subcontractors or sub-vendors. HB 1385 is pending reference by the Speaker. SB 1530 received 3

committee referrals. Neither bill has had a hearing, and this measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

Florida Retirement System: HB 1551 by Representative Tomkow and SB 1810 by Senator Perry are similar measures that redefine "termination" of an employee and authorize the Division of Retirement to adopt rules for volunteer services by an employee. HB 1551 is pending referral by the Speaker. SB 1810 received 3 committee references. Neither bill has had a hearing, and this measure is no longer viable during the 2022 Session.

Local Government Cybersecurity Act: CS/HB 7055 by State Administration & Technology Appropriations Subcommittee and Rep. Giallombardo prohibits state agencies and local governments from paying or otherwise complying with a ransomware incident. The bill requires counties and municipalities (local governments) to report cybersecurity and ransomware incidents to the sheriff and State Watch Office (SWO) within the Division of Emergency Management. It also requires the submission of action reports to FLDS following a cybersecurity or ransomware incident; it requires employees to undergo certain cybersecurity training within 30 days of employment and annually thereafter; and it requires the adoption of cybersecurity standards that safeguard the local government's data and information technology. CS/HB 7055 has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-_____, Laws of Florida.)

Cybersecurity Records Exemption: CS/HB 7057 by State Administration & Technology Appropriations Subcommittee and Rep. Giallombardo provides an exemption from the public records requirement for information relating to the cybersecurity and ransomware incidents involving state agencies and local governments. CS/HB 7057 has passed the Legislature and pending action by the Governor. (Chapter 2022-____, Laws of Florida.)

Retirement: HB 5007 by the House Appropriations Committee will provide that an employer of a state-administered retirement plan is required to contribute 1.5% of gross compensation each pay period. HB 5007 is pending as part of the Budget conference process to be finalized on Monday.

Operations/Administration

SB 510/HB 301- Financial Disclosures for Elected Local Officers

Sponsors: Senate- Brodeur; House- Roach

Summary: Requires specified local officers to file full & public disclosure of financial interests.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill is of interest, due to its impact to member governments and board members but does not have a direct impact to Tampa Bay Water.

House Status: The Bill has been added to the Second Reading Calendar.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed by the Senate and is in House Messages.

HB 337/SB 536- Administrative Procedures

Sponsors: House- McClain; Senate- Diaz

Summary: The Bill makes a series of changes to the Florida Administrative Code. Among the changes, proposed administrative rules are required to be filed within months after posted notice of rule development or be withdrew; requests by affected persons for public workshops on proposed rules must be made in writing, notices of rule development must include available statements of estimated regulatory costs; the adverse impacts of a rule on small business are specifically defined; good faith estimates of defined market impacts of a proposed rule are required; and agencies are required to engage in periodic review of rules for consistency with enabling statutes.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This could have direct impact in how Tampa Bay Water interacts with the rule-making process.

House Status: The Bill has been added to the Second Reading Calendar.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Senate and has been sent in Messages to the House.

HB 965/SB 1426- Environmental Management

Sponsors: House-Truenow; Senate-Burgess

Summary: Provides for water quality enhancement areas, enhancement service areas, & enhancement credits; directs DEP & water management districts to authorize sale & use of

enhancement credits to offset adverse water quality impacts & to meet water quality requirements; directs DEP to maintain specified ledgers; authorizes DEP to enter into agreements & contracts with public & private entities for donations, funds, & payments to expedite evaluation of environmental resource & dredge & fill permits; requires DEP to make such agreements & contracts publicly available; provides appropriation & authorizes FTE positions.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill is currently just of interest to Tampa Bay Water. Should it pass, it could change some development policies.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House and has been enrolled.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Senate and been sent to the House in messages.

HB 959/SB 1874- Department of Financial Services

Sponsors: House- LaMarca; Senate- Boyd

Summary: Authorizes retired employees, widows, and widowers of employees and retired employees of the Division of Rehabilitation & Liquidation to purchase coverage in state group health insurance plan; transfers Stop Inmate Fraud Program from DFS to DEO; revises statewide schedules of maximum reimbursement allowances for medically necessary treatment; removes cap on transferring burial rights fees; requires boilers manufactured after specified date to be stamped with specified code symbol; requires specified spaces & rooms be equipped with carbon monoxide detector; provides exception to prohibition against unaffiliated insurance agents' holding appointments from insurers; revises requirements to qualify for public adjuster licenses; revises requirements for renewal of fire safety inspector certificates.

Potential Impact to Tampa Bay Water: Some of the provision concerning the Fire Marshall could have an impact on Tampa Bay Water.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House and has been enrolled.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Senate and been sent to the House in messages.

SB 974/HB 985- Sovereign Immunity

Sponsors: Senate- Gruters; House- Beltran

Summary: Revising the statutory limits on liability for tort claims against the state and its agencies and subdivisions; revising requirements for the state or an agency or a subdivision of the state to agree to settle a claim or judgment; prohibiting an insurance policy from conditioning the payment of benefits on the enactment of a claim bill; requiring the Department of Financial Services to adjust the limitations on tort liability every year after a specified date, etc.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: The Bill raises the level of the waiver of sovereign immunity for governmental entities from \$200,000 per injured person and \$300,000 per incident to a higher amount based on a sliding scale contingent on the size of the local government with the max being \$1 million per injured person and \$3 million per incident. The limits must be adjusted for inflation every ten years in the future. Tampa Bay Water falls within the bottom tear and would remain at the \$200,000 per injured person and \$300,000 per incident amount.

House Status: The Bill was added to the second reading calendar.

Senate Status: The Bill has been read for the first time on the Senate floor.

HB 7055/SB 1670- Local Government Cybersecurity Act

Sponsors: House- Giallombardo, Senate- Hutson

Summary: The Bill prohibits state agencies and local governments from paying or otherwise complying with a ransomware incident. The bill requires counties and municipalities (local governments) to report cybersecurity and ransomware incidents to the sheriff and State Watch Office (SWO) within the Division of Emergency Management. It also requires the submission of action reports to FLDS following a cybersecurity or ransomware incident; it requires employees to undergo certain cybersecurity training within 30 days of employment and annually thereafter; and it requires the adoption of cybersecurity standards that safeguard the local government's data and information technology (IT).

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: The Bill prohibits state agencies and local governments such as Tampa Bay Water's member governments, from paying or otherwise complying with a ransomware incident.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House and been enrolled.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Senate and been sent to the House in messages.

HB 7057/SB 1694- Public Records and Public Meetings/Cybersecurity Incident or Ransomware Incident

Sponsors: House- Giallombardo, Senate- Hutson

Summary: The Bill provides exemption from public records requirements for certain information related to cybersecurity or ransomware incident held by local government, state agency, or sheriff; authorizes disclosure of confidential & exempt information under certain circumstances; provides exemption from public meetings requirements for portions of meeting that would reveal certain information related to cybersecurity or ransomware incident held by local government, state agency, or sheriff; requires recording & transcription of

exempt portions of such meetings; provides exemption from public records requirements for such recordings & transcripts; provides for future legislative review & repeal of exemptions; provides statement of public necessity. This Bill is a linked Bill with HB 7055/SB 1670- Local Government Cybersecurity Act.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: The Bill prohibits state agencies and local governments such as Tampa Bay Water's member governments, from paying or otherwise complying with a ransomware incident.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House and has been enrolled.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Senate and has been sent to the House in messages.

Human Resources

SB 514/HB 317- Workforce Education Requirements

Sponsors: House- DiCeglie; Senate- Burgess

Summary: An act relating to substitution of work experience for postsecondary educational requirements; creating s. 112.219, F.S.; authorizing the head of an employing agency, beginning on a specified date, to elect to substitute certain work experience for postsecondary educational requirements under certain circumstances; prohibiting the substitution of certain work experience for postsecondary educational requirements; providing advertising requirements relating to positions of employment; specifying that certain laws and regulations governing equal opportunity employment apply; providing a definition; providing an effective date.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill will have a direct impact on Tampa Bay Water should it pass, in that it will mandate changes in hiring practices.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House and has been enrolled.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Senate and has been sent to the House in messages.

SB 7038/HB 5007- Retirement

Sponsors: Senate- Government Oversight and Accountability; House- Appropriations

Summary: Revising the employer contribution rates for the retiree health insurance subsidy as of a specified date; revising required employer retirement contribution rates for each membership class of the Florida Retirement System, etc.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: The Bill would change employer contributions.

House Status: The Bill was amended and passed and sent to the Senate.

Senate Status: The Bill has been added to the tax package and is being negotiated in the

budget process.

Possible Funding Sources

SB 356/HB 201- Sales Tax Holiday for ENERGY STAR and WaterSense Products

Sponsors: Senate- Jones; House- Daley

Summary: Providing a sales tax exemption for certain ENERGY STAR and WaterSense products during a specified timeframe; defining terms; authorizing the Department of Revenue to adopt emergency rules, etc.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill could have a direct impact to Tampa Bay Water's Water Wise program as it creates a sales tax holiday for low-flow toilets and other household items.

House Status: The Bill was added to the tax package and is being negotiated in the budget process.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed the Commerce and Tourism Committee, and the Finance and Tax Committee. Its last stop before being floor ready is the Appropriations Committee.

SB 1940/HB 7053- Statewide Sea-Level Rise and Resilience

Sponsors: Senate- Brodeur; House- Duggan

Summary: Establishing the Statewide Office of Resilience within the Executive Office of the Governor; providing for the appointment of a Chief Resilience Officer; requiring the Department of Transportation to develop a resilience action plan for the State Highway System; revising the projects the Department of Environmental Protection may fund within the Resilient Florida Grant Program; extending the dates by which the department must complete a comprehensive statewide flood vulnerability and sea-level rise data set and assessment; requiring the Florida Flood Hub for Applied Research and Innovation to provide tidal and storm surge flooding data to counties and municipalities for vulnerability assessments, etc.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: The Bill recently was recently amended to include regional water supply authorities, making Tampa Bay Water eligible to submit qualifying projects to be funded from the Resilient Florida Grant Program.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House.

Senate Status: The Senate took up the House's version and passed it. It is now enrolled.

Miscellaneous

HB 309/SB 856- Private Provider Inspections of Onsite Sewage Treatment and Disposal System

Sponsors: House-Fetterhoff; Senate-Brodeur

Summary: An act relating to private provider inspections of onsite sewage treatment and disposal systems; amending s. 381.0065, F.S.; authorizing private provider inspections of onsite sewage treatment and disposal systems under certain conditions; prohibiting the Department of Environmental Protection from charging certain inspection and permit fees; specifying requirements for private providers and onsite sewage treatment and disposal system owners and authorized contractors; authorizing the department to audit the performance of such inspections; providing audit conditions and construction; providing an effective date.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill is of interest, due to its impact to member governments and wastewater, but does not have a direct impact to Tampa Bay Water.

House Status: The Bill has been laid on the table.

Senate Status: The Senate has passed the Bill and sent it to the House in messages.

SB 882/ HB 761- Inventories of Critical Wetlands

Sponsors: Senate- Brodeur; House- Truenow

Summary: Requiring each water management district governing board, in cooperation with local governments, to develop a list of critical wetlands for acquisition using funds from the Land Acquisition Trust Fund; requiring the boards to consider certain criteria when including wetlands on the list, etc.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill will not directly impact Tampa Bay Water but may have impact on member governments and the Southwest Florida Water Management District.

House Status: The Bill has passed the House and was sent to the Senate in messages.

Senate Status: The Senate has passed the Bill and it has been enrolled.

SB 1326/HB 513- Comprehensive Review Study of the Central and Southern Florida Project

Sponsors: Senate- A. Rodriguez; House- Bartleman

Summary: The Bill requires the South Florida Water Management District to prepare and submit a consolidated annual report regarding the status of the project to the Office of Economic and Demographic Research, the Department of Environmental Protection, the Governor, and the Legislature by a specified date.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill does not have a direct impact currently, but there is a chance that some of our facilities could be identified in such a report. We are tracking to stay informed.

House Status: This Bill has passed the House and been enrolled.

Senate Status: The Senate took up the House version and passed it.

HB 1411/SB 1338- Floating Solar Facilities

Sponsors: Senate- Diaz; House- Avila

Summary: The Bill provides legislative findings regarding floating solar facilities; requires floating solar facility to be permitted use in certain land-use categories; requires local governments to promote expanded uses of floating solar facilities by taking specified actions; authorizes county to specify buffer & landscaping requirements; provides exceptions on construction of floating solar facilities; requires Office of Energy within DACS to submit specified recommendations regarding floating solar facilities for certain entities.

Impact to Tampa Bay Water: This Bill would allow Tampa Bay water to construct a floating solar gride at one of our properties should we decide to do such a project.

House Status: The Bill has passed and is enrolled.

Senate Status: The Bill has passed and is enrolled.

SUMMARY

Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County staff continue to develop additional pumping and transmission (pipeline) capacity to increase supply to rapidly growing South Hillsborough County through the August 2020 Memorandum of Understanding. A status report is provided at each regular meeting of the Tampa Bay Water Board of Directors until the projects are operational. Tampa Bay Water staff negotiated an additional Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) proposal: GMP Proposal No.5 for the Brandon Urban Dispersed (BUD) Well No.7 Improvement requiring a fourth amendment to Contract No. 2021-012. This is the last GMP Proposal for the remaining scope of work of Project 01609. No additional GMP Proposals are anticipated for this project.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Receive South-Central Hillsborough County Program Update status report and approve Amendment No. 4 to Contract No. 2021-012 to include Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) Proposal No.5 for the Brandon Urban Dispersed (BUD) Well No.7 Improvements for a Lump Sum Amount of \$719,009.85 inclusive of \$97,437.00 for Owner's Allowance/Contingency provided by the Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR), PCL Construction, Inc. under Contract No. 2021-012.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

\$719,009.85/Capital Improvements Fund (CIF)

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water continues to meet with Hillsborough County staff to coordinate activities to increase wholesale system capacity to serve South-Central Hillsborough County. Wholesale facilities being developed include: expansion to the existing Regional High Service Pump Station; a new booster pump station on the existing Brandon Transmission Main to increase its capacity by at least 5 million gallons per day (mgd) and a new pipeline system to deliver up to an additional 65 mgd of water supply.

Regional Facility High Service Pump Station Expansion (Project 07010):

This project is located at the Regional Facility High Service Pump Station and will increase the existing regional water firm pumping capacity by 10-12 mgd average and 20 to 22 mgd maximum day at the Regional Facility Site High Service Pump Station – the main pump station for the region's wholesale water system. This project is receiving up to \$1,200,000 of funding through the Southwest Florida Water Management District's (District) Cooperative Funding Initiative.

• Construction activities completed in early March 2022. Project will be brought to the Board for close-out later this Spring.

Brandon Booster Station (Project 01609):

The project includes acquiring fee property and the design, permitting, and construction of a new in-line booster station in Brandon. The Brandon Booster Station has been designed to have flow-boosting capacity of 20 mgd with a net gain in transmission line flow of approximately 5 to 7 mgd. This project will receive up to \$3,800,000 through the District's Cooperative Funding Initiative.

- Issued Notices to Proceed for Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) Packages 1, 2, 3, 4, and 6.
- Material has begun to arrive on site and TECO has begun their upgrades to the electrical system feeding the Booster Station site.
- Approval of GMP package 5 is presented in detail below for the Board's approval.

Pipeline System (Projects 01610/01616):

This project includes the construction of a new transmission main to the South Hillsborough County Area. When completed, the project will be able to provide an additional 65 mgd of new supply to South Hillsborough County. This project will be co-funded from the District's Cooperative Funding Initiative.

• Initiated route studies; project teams are collecting data on potential routes and weighting selection criteria.

Spring 2022 Program:

Delivery of drinking water to the South-Central Hillsborough service area continues to rapidly increase

and peaked at 71 mgd during the spring 2021 dry season. Tampa Bay Water's Brandon Booster Station will be on line in 2024 and the South Hillsborough Pipeline on line in 2028. To meet increasing demands between now and then, Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County are coordinating activities and have screened several projects that can help increase water supply in an early-action program within the wholesale and retail systems. In addition, the agency and the County are exploring demand management options. Making progress on several initiatives at the same time is necessary. The most promising supply-side initiatives for Tampa Bay Water to provide benefit as early as spring 2022 are:

- Remove the control valve bottleneck on the existing Brandon Transmission Main. This was approved in GMP 1 by the Board of Directors and is scheduled for completion by spring 2022.
- Seek an increased capacity re-rate from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for the Lithia Hydrogen Sulfide Treatment Facility. Field testing for the capacity re-rate occurred in early January. Consultant and staff are currently evaluating the testing data.
- Install a temporary booster pumping station on the Brandon Booster Station site. Guaranteed maximum price proposals for temporary pumping equipment and installation of pre-purchased piping materials have been approved and purchase orders are being issued.
- The Demand Management Task Force continues to meet monthly. The task force is comprised of Hillsborough County staff, Tampa Bay Water staff, Florida Friendly Landscaping program staff, a University of Florida extension agent specialist, and a consultant from Hazen Sawyer. The group is mainly targeting outdoor water use. The Florida Friendly Landscaping (FFL) has conducted outreach by mail to 351 HOAs to promote their landscape and water saving services and the Tampa Bay Water Wise program. The county is finalizing their letter that will go out to about 2,000 customers who are eligible for the smart irrigation controller and/or the shallow well. Code enforcement is including the highest water-using HOAs in their activities, and provides FFL and Tampa Bay Water Wise literature with their warnings and citations. In addition, the task force identified a group of homeowners (about 40) who are connected to reclaimed water but using potable water for outdoor irrigation. The County is planning to contact those customers to ask them to switch back to reclaimed water. Lastly, agency staff will begin to reach out to multifamily property owners and large commercial customers directly in coordination with the County to promote the Tampa Bay Water Wise program.

Short-Term Plan for Additional Water Supply

The Tampa Bay Water Board approved a permit application for the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield at the January meeting to increase the annual average permit limit from 24.1 mgd to 24.95 mgd. The application was submitted to the Southwest Florida Water Management District on February 28, 2022 as arbitration of the permit application was not requested by a Host Member Government. The increase in the annual average quantity will revert back to 24.1 mgd when the new regional transmission main is placed in service. Additional environmental monitoring will occur while the increased annual average permit rate is in effect. Staff anticipate that the modified permit will be issued in May 2022 by the District.

Hillsborough County and Tampa Bay Water staff have discussed the tie-in of two or more production wells to supply water to the County's Water Resources Department at the Ag-Mart property as a new

potential short-term solution for additional water supply for the South County area. Specifically, this includes equipping the recently completed test production well, drilling and equipping one or more additional production wells, and constructing connecting pipelines to deliver the water to the County's Ag-Mart Water Resources property. This concept could be used until the South Hillsborough Pipeline is completed in 2028 or it could remain on-line as part of the proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP credits) which is one of the three water supply concepts being evaluated as part of the Agency's Long-term Master Water Planning efforts. The short-term concept includes the need to:

- Identify location(s) for additional production well(s)
- Identify the location and type of water treatment needed and responsible entity
- Identify a preliminary implementation schedule to confirm when the short-term plan can come on-line
- Obtain fee and easement interests for the well(s) and pipelines on the Ag-Mart Environmental Land Acquisition and Protection Program site and/or the Ag-Mart Water Resources Department site, and support during the County's development review process.
- Obtain a Water Use Permit based on commitments for county injection of reclaimed water into its SHARP wells authorized under operating permits
- Identify the term for operation of the short-term plan
- Estimate the capital and operating costs
- Identify funding source(s) for the work

The short-term solution could potentially provide a yield of 1.6 to 4.5 million gallons per day of additional water supply.

Brandon Booster Station - GMP No. 5

The Board approved the construction of the Brandon Booster Station and approved a Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) contract with PCL Construction, Inc. The CMAR is a delivery method which entails a commitment by the Construction Manager to deliver the project within a Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) which is based on the construction documents and specifications at the time plus any reasonably inferred items or tasks. The booster station has had several GMP proposals brought before the Board for approval. GMP Proposal No.1 for the Lithia Regional Point of Connection Flow Control Valve and GMP Proposal No.2 for Early Equipment Procurement were approved by the Board at the August 2021 Board meeting. GMP Proposal No. 3 for the Temporary Pumping System and GMP Proposal No.4 for Underground Piping installation were approved by the Board at the November 2021 Board meeting. GMP Proposal No.6 for the Brandon Booster Station General Construction was approved by the Board at the January 2022 meeting. This is the last GMP Proposal for the remaining scope of work. No additional GMP Proposals are anticipated.

GMP proposal No.5 for the Brandon Urban Dispersed (BUD) Well No.7, includes all pricing for the complete replacement of the submersible well pump, pump head, VFD, and associated electrical gear necessary for complete operation of a new 250HP well pump. With the exception of the Owner's Allowance/Contingency values, to the extent the cost of this Project Task exceeds the GMP, the Construction Manager will bear such costs in excess of the GMP without reimbursement or additional

compensation from Tampa Bay Water.

GMP proposal No.5 has been reviewed by Tampa Bay Water staff and the Engineer of Record, CHA Consulting, Inc. Staff requests Board approval of the negotiated GMP Proposal No.5 to PCL Construction, Inc. for a Lump Sum Amount of \$719,009.85 inclusive of \$97,437.00 for Owner's Allowance and authorize the Chair and General Manager to execute Amendment No.5 to Contract No. 021-012. Upon approval of GMP Proposal No.5 by the Board, the CMAR Contract will be amended to implement the GMP Proposals, commencing the Construction Phase of the scope included in Proposal GMP No.5.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County staff continue to develop additional pumping and transmission (pipeline) capacity to increase supply to rapidly growing South Hillsborough County. The Board approved the construction of a new in-line booster station as an interim solution to provide 5 to 7 million gallons per day (mgd) while other larger capacity projects are brought online. This project is an entirely new asset to increase delivery capacity to the Regional Delivery Point of Connection at the Lithia Water Treatment Plant from the existing Brandon-South Central Transmission Main. Upgrades at Lithia Regional Point of Connection and Brandon Urban Dispersed (BUD) well site 7 are essential to the success of this goal. The August 2020 Memorandum of Understanding provides for a status report at each regular meeting of the Tampa Bay Water Board of Directors until the projects are operational.

Historic drinking water supply initiatives in South Hillsborough County

In the 1980's, the West Coast Regional Water Supply Authority (the predecessor agency to Tampa Bay Water) constructed temporary supply, treatment and pumping facilities to maintain pressure on behalf of the County and constructed the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield (SCHRWF), the Lithia Treatment Plant, the 42, 36 and 24-inch south county transmission mains and Brandon Transmission mains. The agency retained the wellfield but turned over the treatment, pumping, and transmission facilities to the County.

Again, in the early 2000's, some of the facilities built in the 1980's were nearing capacity, and Tampa Bay Water constructed temporary pumping and treatment facilities under a joint project agreement for the county's use while the county completed construction of its Central Water Treatment and Pumping Facility. Tampa Bay Water also provided a new Point of Connection to the new Central facility to provide access the larger Regional System. The supply initiatives of the early 2000's are now nearing capacity.

As of the end of Water Year 2021, Tampa Bay Water supplied 50 million gallons per day (mgd) to the south county area, nearing but not exceeding the existing wholesale system capacity for two of the three Points of Connection that supply the south county area.

New Point of Connection

A new Point of Connection was contemplated in the 2020 Memorandum of Understanding approved by Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County, and Section 10 of the 1998 Master Water Supply Contract provides for changes to Points of Connection at the cost of the requesting party. Hillsborough County requested a new Point of Connection for its South Hillsborough service area and Tampa Bay Water's Board approved the request in July 2021.

Joint Project Agreement

In October, a final Joint Project Agreement with Hillsborough County for Segment B was fully approved by Tampa Bay Water and Hillsborough County.

Cooperative Funding

Tampa Bay Water applied in October 2020 for co-funding through the Southwest Florida Water Management District (District) Cooperative Funding Initiative for the new regional system transmission main. The Project is a regional project and was ranked high by the District. Initial co-funding for eligible costs (up to the Basis of Design Report included in Task 1) was approved by the District. Upon completion of the Basis of Design Report, the District will conduct a third-party review to consider approval of additional co-funding to complete design and construct the pipeline. The District will fund up to 50% for eligible project costs (currently estimated at \$145 million). The County and Tampa Bay Water have entered into a Joint Project Agreement in October 2021 for funding of the portion of the Pipeline that is not funded by the District.

This GMP submission represents the final work package being presented to Tampa Bay Water for approval for the complete Brandon Booster Station project.

- GMP-2 Early Equipment Procurement (Approved 8/16/2021)
- GMP-3 Brandon Booster Station Temporary Pumping System (Approved 11/15/2021)
- GMP-4 Brandon Booster Station Underground Piping Installation (Approved 11/15/2021)
- GMP-5 BUD 7 Well Improvements (Current Submission)
- GMP-6 Brandon Booster Station General Construction (Approved 1/24/2022)

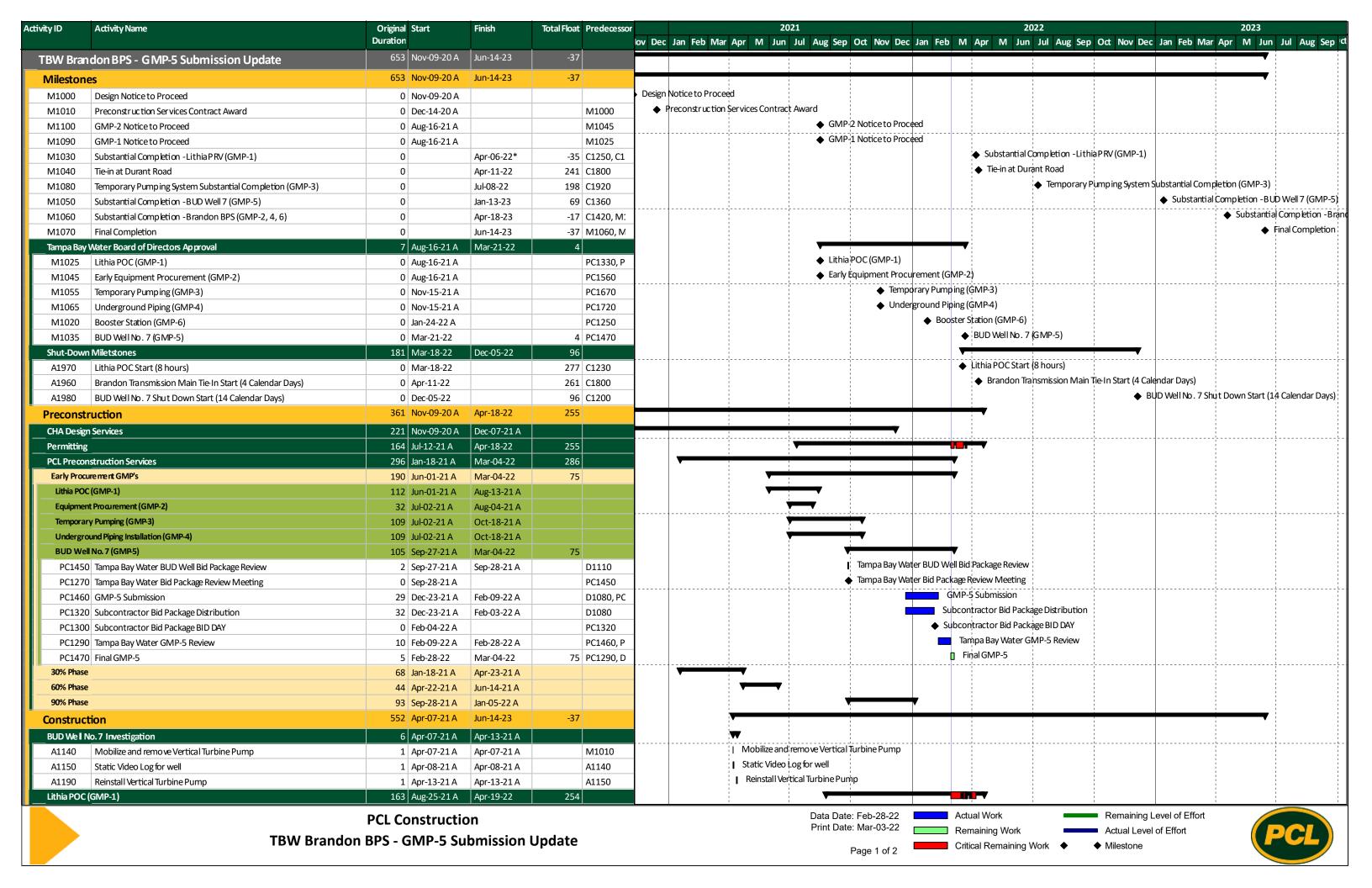

GENERAL NOTES

- 1. This GMP is based on the Southern Hillsborough County Supply Expansion: Booster Pump Station C-BUD 7 Well Improvements Bid Drawings and Specifications provided by CHA dated December 2021.
- 2. The Scope of the BUD Well No. 7 GMP-5 specifically includes the following items.
 - 1. BUD Well No. 7 GMP-5:
 - 1. Removal of existing submersible pump, piping, and well head to be turned over to Tampa Bay Water Operations staff.
 - 2. Supply and installation of new 250 HP submersible pump, piping, and well head necessary for complete operation of pump.
 - 3. Supply and installation of new 250 HP VFD for submersible pump.
 - 4. Supply of new DP Distribution Panel sized to meet new 600 AMP load and new main disconnect.
 - 5. New feeder wire from TECO transformer to DP panel sized for 600 AMP load.
 - 6. Commissioning of the BUD Well No. 7 and turn-over to Tampa Bay Water Operations.
 - 2. Items not covered in this GMP Proposal:
 - 1. Disinfection and flushing of BUD Well No. 7 prior to returning to service.
- 3. This GMP assumes that a two (2) week shutdown of BUD Well No. 7 will be provided. All work will be performed during normal business hours Monday through Friday between 7 am and 5 pm.
- 4. This GMP assumes total aggregate liability for the contract be limited to the value of the GMP.
- 5. This GMP assumes that a mutual waiver of consequential damages be considered.
- 6. This GMP does not include hazardous materials management. Owner is generator of any pre-existing hazardous material. Any hazardous material encountered will be addressed by utilizing the Owner Contingency.
- 7. Refer to the attached billable rates matrix in TAB 5 for all management, labor, and equipment to be charged to the project, allowances, and contingencies.
- 8. CMAR and Owner will work together to review the Allowance/Contingency Items and amounts based on design information and mutually concur that the Allowance/Contingency values constitute reasonable estimates. Nothing herein is intended to constitute a guarantee by CMAR that the Allowance/Contingency Items in question will be performed for the values stated herein.
- 9. All required permitting will be handled via the Owner's Permit Allowance. This allowance is to be utilized for the changes to the drawings/specifications resulting from the Building Department review; this may include added or changed construction work.
- 10. Due to escalation concerns, pricing is contingent upon receiving GMP approval at the March 21, 2022 Tampa Bay Water Board Meeting.

SUBCONTRACTOR RECOMMENDATIONS

PCL solicited pricing from various subcontractors and provided a self-perform number for three (3) of the bid packages of the Brandon Booster Station which can be seen on the following Subcontractor Selection Summary. Any bidders that declined the invitation or did not provide a bid on the required date have been listed as such, and full documentation of project correspondence has been provided to Tampa Bay Water for review.

Each subcontractor was contacted to review their bid and verify scope and any changes to their bid from those submitted on bid day will be shown in the Subcontractor Selection Summary. Documentation for those changes has also been provided to Tampa Bay Water. The values listed in the Subcontractor Selection Summary reflect any additions and/or modifications needed to make an accurate comparison between companies. PCL's recommendation for award is as follows:

1. BP 5.1 Mechanical Package:

A.C. Schultes of Florida, Inc.

PCL reviewed the quotes, quantities, and documents submitted by each Subcontractor for the scope of work and confirmed that A.C. Schultes had the required experience and provided the best value for the project. An additional 1.35% was added to all vendors to account for PCL's required Default Insurance. PCL recommends carrying the final pricing by A.C. Schultes of \$233,105 as the lump sum value for this scope of work.

2. BP 5.2 Electrical Systems Package:

B.L. Smith

PCL reviewed the quotes, quantities, and documents submitted by each Subcontractor for the scope of work and recommends including BL Smith as the Electrical Subcontractor for this work to keep communication consistent and maintain a single point of contact for the entire project. Although BL's bid was approximately \$11,000 higher than the low bid, BL has included replacement of the existing DP panel instead of retrofitting the existing panel with a larger bus bar and new current transformer. This was carried by two of the bidders in response to concerns from Square D over the time frame for the shutdown and potential complications with a retrofit upgrade. During review of the GMP-5 documents, BL Smith also made a recommendation to replace the feeder wire from the TECO transformer to the DP panel due to code concerns over the allowable wire size vs what is currently in place. PCL has carried the additional \$33,500 necessary for this change to prevent any reductions in project allowances during construction. This amount will be carried as its own bid item. BL Smith was selected as the electrician for GMP-1 and GMP-6 and has been involved in pricing and providing constructability reviews from the 30% design phase. An additional 1.35% was added to all vendors to account for PCL's required Default Insurance. PCL recommends carrying the final pricing by BL Smith of \$252,462.85 as the lump sum value for this scope of work.

SUMMARY

Tampa Bay Water uses as-needed utility management consulting services for specialty assignments for which staff does not have internal expertise. Projects and assignments are often stand-alone projects that do not require on-going consultant work once completed. The current utility management contracts expire in April 2022 and a procurement process for requests for proposals for new utility management consultants was completed.

SUGGESTED ACTION

Approve five-year contracts with the four top ranked As-Needed Utility Management Consulting Services firms in the amount of \$750,000 each.

COST/FUNDING SOURCE

Operating and Capital Project Budgets as applicable.

DISCUSSION

Tampa Bay Water uses As-Needed Utility Management Consulting Services to complete specialty assignments for which staff does not have internal expertise and to tap into the vast industry experience these consultants typically have. These assignments are often stand-alone projects that don't require on-

going consultant services once the work is completed. Some examples of past utility management assignments include: staffing study and succession planning; strategic planning and creation of an agency performance management system; assistance in creating a formula for reclaimed water credits or purchase; and, evaluation of facility operating contracts.

On October 29, 2021, Tampa Bay Water advertised Request for Proposals for the 2022-019; 2022-020; 2022-021 & 2022-051, As-Needed Utility Management Consulting Services on DemandStar. Over 700 firms were notified through advertisement on DemandStar and Tampa Bay Water's website. Tampa Bay Water added 4 supplemental consultants and 40 plan holders downloaded the Request for Proposal documents. A Pre-Proposal conference GoToMeeting was held on November 30, 2021, and 7 firms were in attendance. Four firms submitted timely proposals and a fifth firm was rejected and deemed unresponsive. Firms were requested to provide qualifications in three subject areas of expertise including: 1) evaluation of alternative operation and maintenance delivery methods, 2) experience performing staffing analysis for utilities, and 3) experience performing other utility management studies and services for continuous improvement. In accordance with the Sunshine Law, a selection committee, comprised of Tampa Bay Water staff, rated all respondents in several categories, including contract manager and team qualifications, subject area expertise, fees, and certified minority business.

The resulting four highest ranked consultants are listed below:

- 1. WSP USA Inc.
- 2. Hazen and Sawyer, P.C.
- 3. Raftelis Financial Consultants, Inc.
- 4. Arcadis, U.S., Inc.

Staff is recommending the award of contracts to the top four ranked firms for As-Needed Utility Management Consulting Services in the amount of \$750,000 each over the five year contract term, with an additional proviso the Board delegate to the General Manager authorization to issue individual task orders in the amounts not to exceed \$250,000. This authorization will allow staff to proceed on projects in an efficient manner.

The approval of these As-Needed Utility Management Consulting Services contracts does not encumber any funds at this time. Funds for the task orders to be issued under these contracts will be from the current and future Tampa Bay Water budgets as approved by its Board of Directors annually.

The proposed As-Needed Utility Management Consulting Services contracts, copies of which are available upon request, have been reviewed and approved as to form by Tampa Bay Water's General Counsel.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water issued contract numbers 2017-041, 2017-042 and 2017-043 for As-Needed Utility

Management Consulting Services in April 2017. The five-year terms of these contracts will expire in April 2022. The contracts presented for approval in this agenda item will replace the contracts issued in 2017 and will be utilized for conducting business case analyses of contracted operations, Agency strategic planning assistance, staffing analyses, and other utility management tasks.

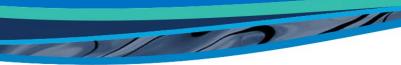

SUMMARY

The 2018 Long-term Master Water Plan was approved by the Board of Directors in December 2018 and included several recommendations including further study of three top-ranked water supply projects to meet the region's future water supply needs. Feasibility studies for the three projects are nearly complete and Black & Veatch, the agency's Integrated Program Manager, will be creating several configurations of projects for Board consideration. The Board will select a project configuration between the October-December 2022 timeframe. This item provides an update on the on-going feasibility studies for those projects and outlines the next steps and schedule for the 2022 new water supply configuration selection process.

DISCUSSION

The 2018 Long-term Master Water Plan (Plan) was approved by the Board of Directors in December 2018. The Plan included several recommendations including further study of three top-ranked water supply projects to meet the region's future water supply needs. Below is a summary of each project and its status.

Surface Water Treatment Plant Expansion: Feasibility Study (Project 09014):

The Surface Water Treatment Plant (SWTP) Expansion Feasibility Study is complete, and Tampa Bay Water has received the final report. The purpose of this project included the assessment of the feasibility of expanding the existing Tampa Bay Water Regional Surface Water Treatment Plant and increasing the use of associated surface water supplies to maximize the available yield of surface water supplies. The project also evaluated an alternative location for a new surface water treatment plant near the C.W Bill Young Regional Reservoir, including identifying anticipated risks and benefits associated with that location. The overall objective of the project was to evaluate the feasibility of increasing Tampa Bay Water's (Agency) annual average yield of existing surface water supplies by 10 to 12.5 million gallons per day (mgd).

Desalination Treatment Plant Expansion: Feasibility Study (Project 09015):

The Desalination Treatment Plant Expansion Feasibility Study is near completion. Tampa Bay Water has received and reviewed the draft feasibility report and consultants are currently addressing feedback provided. The purpose of this project is to further assess the feasibility of expanding the existing Tampa Bay Desalination Water Treatment Plant to maximize the available yield of the Agency's regional water supplies. This project would leverage the existing facility as much as possible for meeting projected regional water demands, as well as inform design decisions for the future expansion. The overall objective of the project is to evaluate the feasibility of increasing Tampa Bay Water's available desalinated seawater supply by 10 to 12.5 mgd.

South Hillsborough Wellfield: Feasibility Study (Project 01611):

The South Hillsborough Wellfield Feasibility Study is near completion and Tampa Bay Water has received and reviewed the draft feasibility report. Consultants are currently addressing feedback provided and are evaluating the implementation of the project through a phased approach. The purpose of this project is to further assess the feasibility of developing a new wellfield and associated collection mains and water treatment facilities using groundwater credits from the injection of reclaimed water by Hillsborough County. The feasibility project includes a test production well and monitor wells, aquifer performance test, wellfield modeling and development of documents required for a water use permit application, collector main layout and water treatment facilities required to meet Exhibit D of the Master Water Supply Contract and negotiations with Hillsborough County for aquifer recharge/groundwater credits. The overall objective of the project is to evaluate the feasibility of increasing the Agency's available groundwater supply by approximately 6.15 mgd.

2022 New Water Supply Configuration Selection Process Overview and Schedule:

The Desalination Treatment Plant Expansion and the South Hillsborough Wellfield Feasibility Studies are scheduled to be completed by spring 2022. The Surface Water Treatment Plant Expansion

Feasibility Study was completed summer of 2021. This will allow all these potential capital improvement projects to be simultaneously considered relative to future debt service obligations and uniform rate effects. Tampa Bay Water's Integrated Program Manager, Black and Veatch, has initiated activities for the configuration selection process. Below are the activities that will be taking place during 2022 leading to Board selection later this year.

- 1. **February to March 2022:** Selection process kickoff for configuration selection including Tampa Bay Water staff, the Member Governments, and the Board of Directors.
- 2. **March to April 2022:** Feasibility studies review of the final feasibility reports for the three short-listed options outlined above.
- 3. **April to May 2022:** System configuration development of project alternatives that combine water supply, treatment, and transmission system options (and sub-options) together to provide 10 to 20 mgd of additional regional water supply capacity to be implemented by year 2028.
- 4. **April to May 2022:** Define and confirm the process and framework that will be used for scoring and ranking the configuration alternatives based on Board-approved selection criteria: Environmental Stewardship; Costs; and Reliability.
- 5. May 16, 2022, Board Meeting: Present system configuration alternatives and proposed framework for scoring and ranking of the alternatives for review and comment before proceeding with the evaluations.
- 6. **May to June 2022:** Conduct public engagement activities for the water supply configuration alternatives being considered.
- 7. **June to August 2022:** Completion of the initial scoring and ranking evaluations for the system configuration alternatives.
- 8. **August 15, 2022, Board Meeting:** Present scoring and ranking evaluations draft results for review and comment.
- 9. **September to October 2022:** Complete final scoring and ranking of alternatives to support the recommendation of a system configuration alternative.
- 10. October December, Board Meeting: Request Board approval of recommended configuration.

BACKGROUND

The 2018 Long-term Master Water Plan was approved in December 2018. The Plan made several recommendations including further study of three top-ranked water supply projects to meet the region's future water supply needs. These projects were approved for further feasibility study to be performed prior to the 2023 Plan cycle. Once completed, the feasibility studies will help in the development of a recommendation for the eventual selection and construction timing of one or more projects. The three projects are: South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP credits), Surface Water Treatment Plant Expansion, and Desalination Treatment Plant Expansion. In October 2019, the Board approved Contract 2020-011 with Black & Veatch for the Tampa Bay Desalination Water Treatment Plant Expansion.

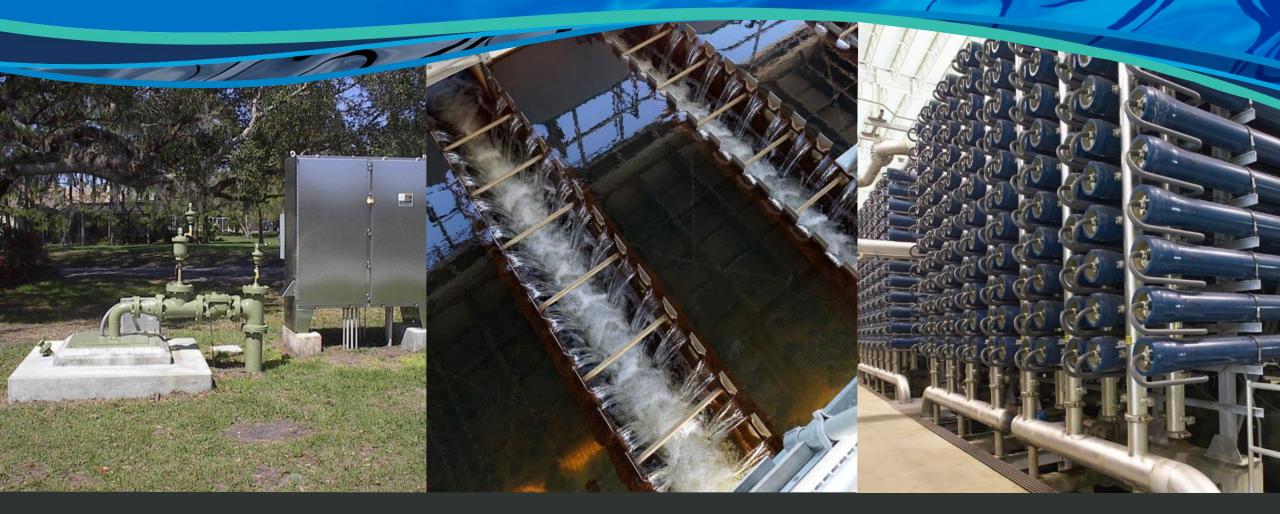

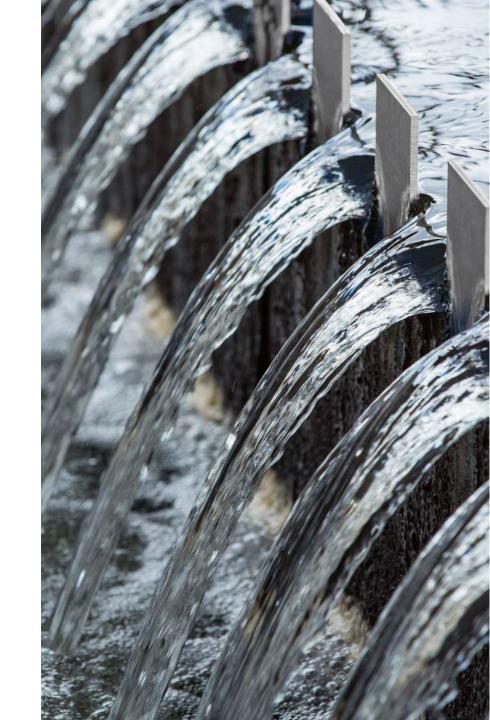

SUMMARY

This presentation will provide a synopsis of the ten-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) estimated expenditures and funding sources, along with information regarding the anticipated amount of the upcoming funding needed to meet the CIP expenditures in fiscal years 2023 and 2024, plus a timeline of next steps.

DISCUSSION

In August 2020 the Board was presented a ten-year capital expenditure projection that included costs for the next water supply project or projects, the water quality improvement projects plus the funding needed for the FY21-FY30 Capital Improvement Program. During the budget workshop and public hearing for the fiscal year 2022 budget, an overview of the updated FY22-FY31 Capital Improvement

Program Plan reflected the anticipated timing and amount of future funds needed to meet these expenditures. This projection indicated the agency would need future funding in place by fiscal year 2023.

This presentation will provide a synopsis of the ten-year Capital Improvement Program estimated expenditures and funding sources, along with information regarding the anticipated amount of the upcoming funding needed to meet the CIP expenditures in fiscal years 2023 and 2024, plus a timeline of next steps.

BACKGROUND

Currently, the Agency has 9 outstanding bond series with maturity dates from 10/1/22 to 10/1/2038. Tampa Bay Water maintains the following funds and accounts to comply with requirements of the Bond Covenants and the Master Water Supply Contract; Operation and Maintenance Reserve, Renewal and Replacement Fund, Capital Improvement Fund, Sinking Fund - Interest and Principal Accounts, Sinking Fund - Debt Service Reserve Account, Utility Reserve Fund, Rate Stabilization Account and the Rebate Fund. The agency also maintains an Energy Fund. Some of the funds and accounts have governance balance requirements and some of the funds and accounts have management preferred minimum balances.

In the FY22-FY31 Capital Improvement Program Plan had an estimated \$1.2 billion in total expenditures. About 43%, \$527 million, of the funding was anticipated to be met with either funds on hand, member government joint project agreements, state grants and district co-funding, reflecting an estimated potential \$701 million in future funding needed. However, included in the estimated \$1.2 billion is about \$537 million being earmarked for three anticipated but not fully defined projects such as \$25 million for a Surface Water Treatment Plant Renewal and Replacement Program to maintain the existing level of service. Plus \$349 million for water quality projects to be identified from the water quality studies and \$163 million for the next water supply project or projects. The remaining future funding need of \$165 million is for the South Hillsborough County Pipeline project plus other capital improvement and renewal and replacement projects.

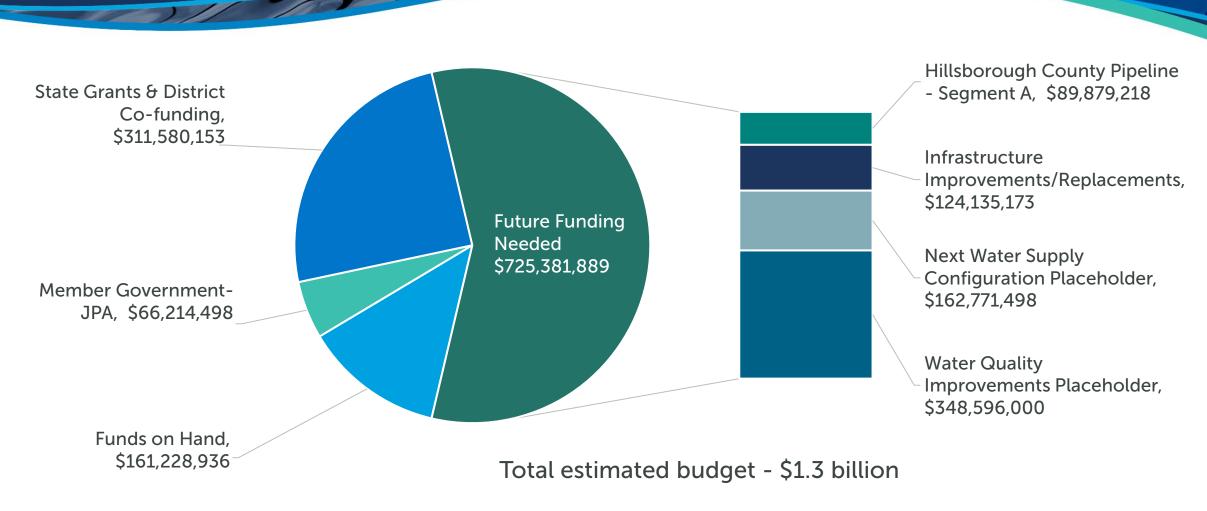

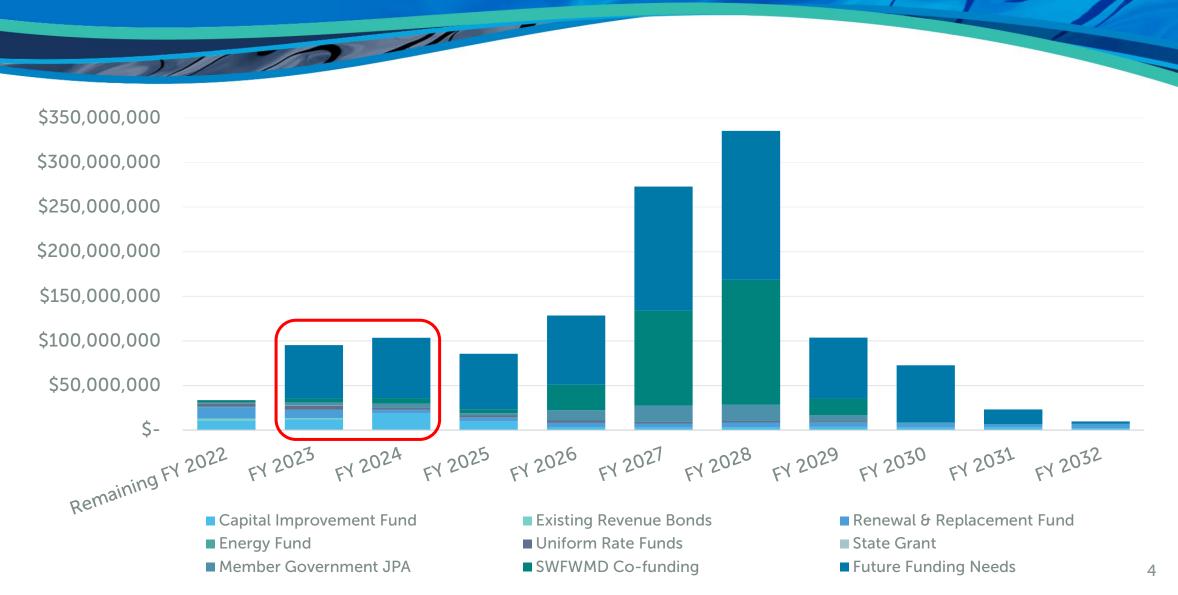

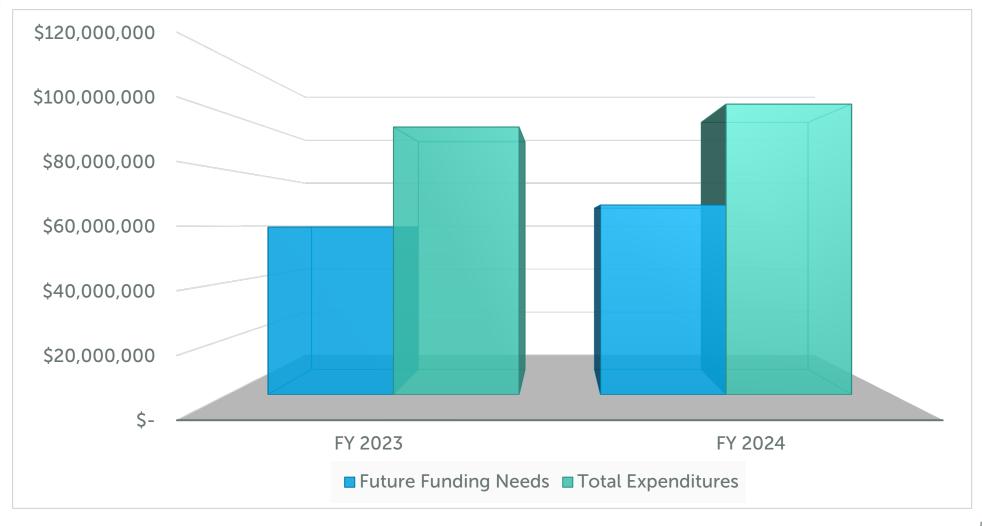




Annual Capital Improvement Program Expenditures



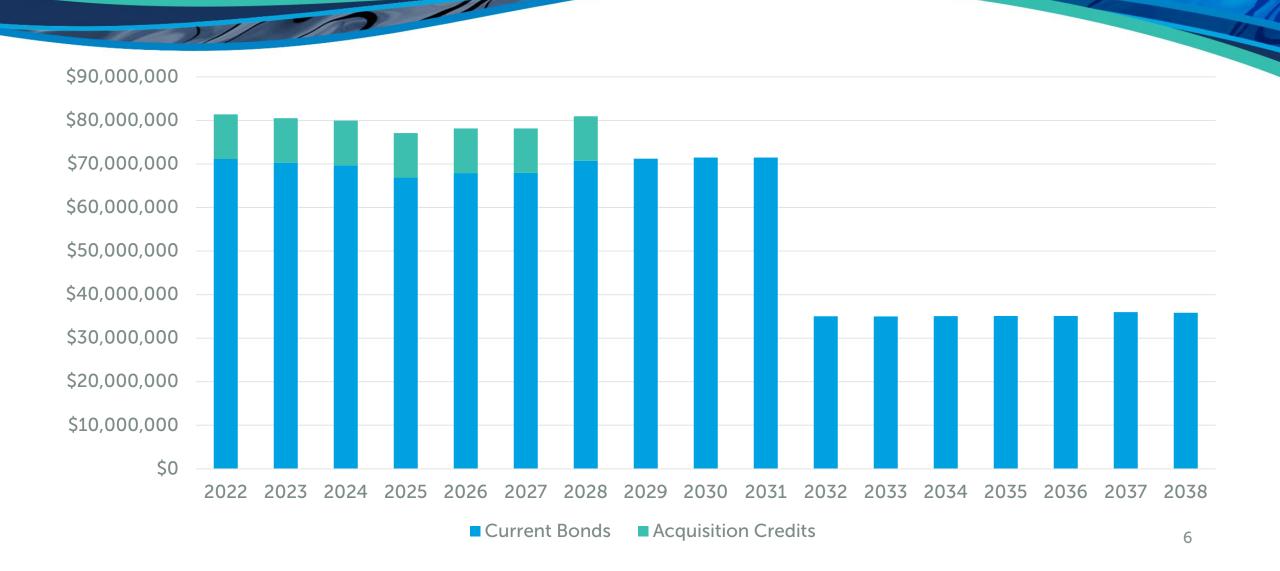
Fiscal Years 2023 & 2024 Funding Needs



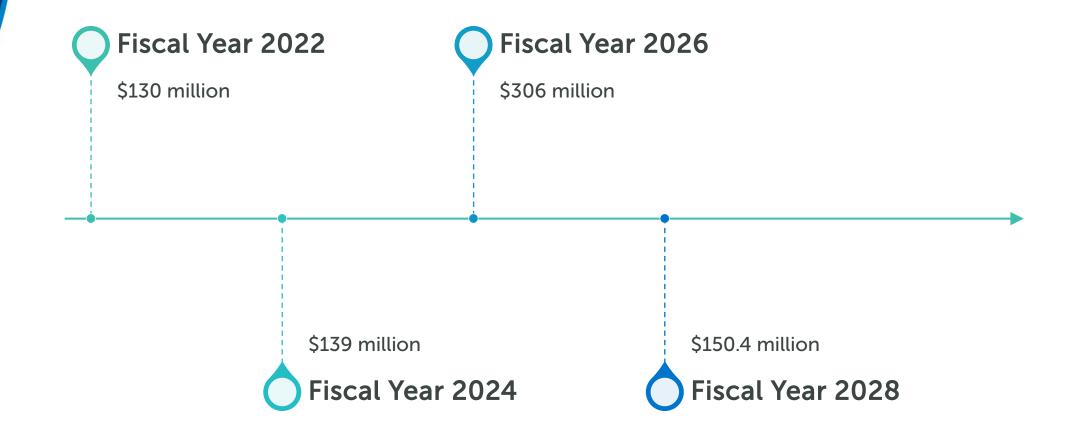

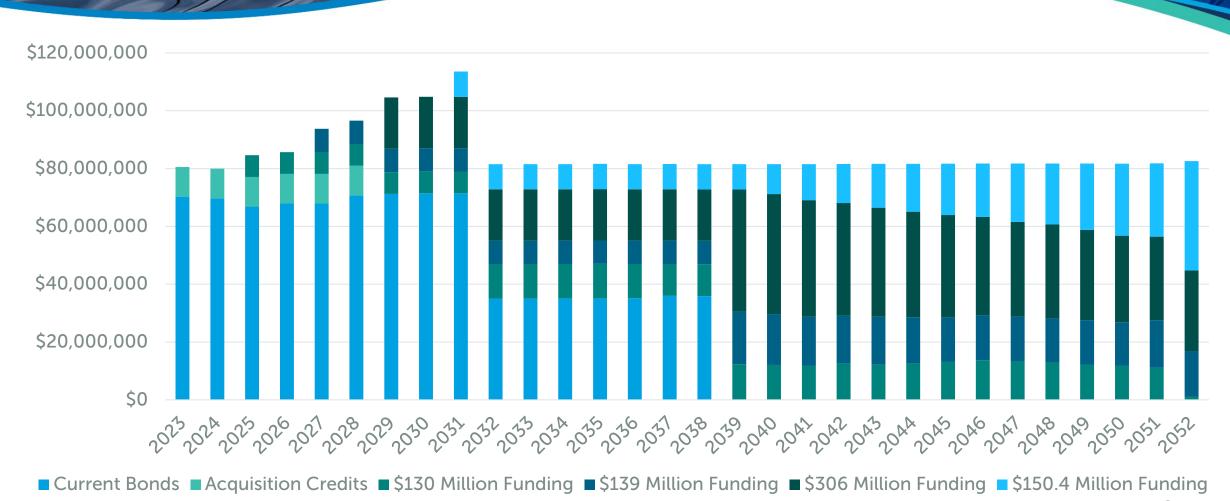

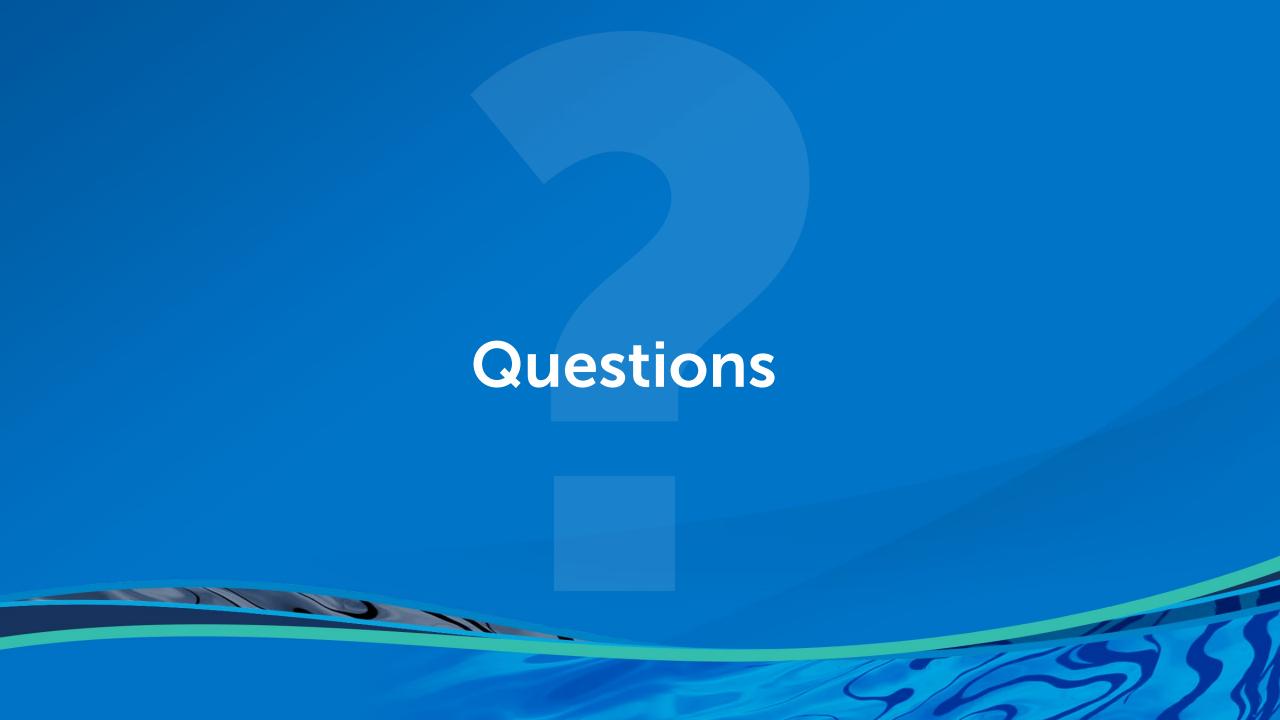

SUMMARY

The Tampa Bay Water Wise program consists of 12 rebate programs and is supported by water conservation grant funding from the Southwest Florida Water Management District. The program goal is to save up to 11 million gallons of water per day (mgd) by 2030. This program is intended to cost-effectively defer the need for new water supplies through improved water use efficiency. This item gives an update of the program and highlights the progress to date. Staff and a representative of EGIA, the program administrator, will present an update of the program and highlight proposed activities for the coming year.

DISCUSSION

Following is a status report on the various components of the Tampa Bay Water Wise program and other demand management activities in the region. Staff and a representative of EGIA, the program administrator, will present an update of the program and highlight proposed activities for the coming

Rebates and Water Savings

In total, the program has issued 1,421 rebates, 866 of which have been paid for high-efficiency toilets in single family homes, 541 toilets in multi-family homes, 5 toilets in business locations, 6 irrigation controllers, 1 shallow well rebate, and 2 customizable rebates. One customizable rebate was for 120 toilets, 174 aerators and 36 showerheads, and the other customizable rebate was for the installation of two flow management devices. All together, these rebates result in an estimated 48,858 gallons per day saved (data from March 30, 2020 through February 28, 2022). The water savings from each member government are apportioned as follows: 39% from Tampa, 20% from Hillsborough County, 19% from Pinellas County, 11% from St. Petersburg, 10% from Pasco County and 1% from New Port Richey. Two large, multi-family toilet retrofit projects have occurred in Tampa, which is why Tampa has the largest water savings to date.

The regional dashboard provides a snapshot of the program's progress across the region. The water savings totals shown on the dashboard are currently under-reporting the actual water conservation data as reported above. The program administrator is working to correct the dashboard programming. The dashboard is also permanently available at this link, and is updated monthly:

Marketing

<u>Residential Toilet Rebate</u> - The majority of Home Depot and Lowes stores now have new signage about the rebate program, as well as stickers on the actual product boxes that customers buy to increase the visibility of the program.

<u>Residential Outdoor Rebates</u>: Hillsborough County is poised to send letters and emails to customers who are eligible for the smart irrigation controller and/or shallow well rebate. Pasco County is looking into an email campaign to promote the smart irrigation controllers. The program is also going to test targeted digital advertisements to eligible customers to promote the smart irrigation controller and shallow well rebates.

<u>Commercial Rebates</u>: The Electric and Gas Industries Association (EGIA) and Agency staff are working with several industry associations to promote the commercial rebates, such as the Florida Restaurant Lodging Association, the Florida Irrigation Society, and the Bay Area Apartment Association. In addition, Agency staff are conducting outreach to contractors, companies and multifamily property owners/management companies to promote awareness about the rebate program.

<u>Member Reporting</u>: Members are now reporting their promotional activities on the monthly conservation reports attached to this update, so that we can better track which promotional avenues are used (e.g. social media, bill stuffers, etc.) and what impact they have on customer participation.

Additional Regional Demand Management Activities

The collective and coordinated efforts of the Member Governments, the Florida Friendly Landscape programs, and the University of Florida have an impact on regional water demand. These activities have been coordinated by the Agency for years and play a key role in educating residents about the best ways to save water. These efforts are complementary to the Tampa Bay Water Wise rebate program.

- Hillsborough Demand Management Task Force The Demand Management Task Force continues to meet monthly. The task force is comprised of Hillsborough County staff, Tampa Bay Water staff, Florida Friendly Landscaping (FFL) program staff, a University of Florida extension agent specialist, and a consultant from Hazen and Sawyer. The group is mainly targeting outdoor water use. The Florida Friendly Landscaping program has conducted outreach by mail to 351 Home Owner Associations (HOAs) to promote their landscape and water-saving services and the Tampa Bay Water Wise program. The County is finalizing their letter that will go out to about 2,000 customers who are eligible for the smart irrigation controller and/or the shallow well. Code enforcement is including the highest water-using HOAs in their activities, and provides Florida Friendly Landscaping and Tampa Bay Water Wise literature with their warnings and citations. In addition, the task force identified a group of homeowners (about 40) who are connected to reclaimed water but using potable water for outdoor irrigation. The County is planning to contact those customers to ask them to switch back to reclaimed water. Lastly, in coordination with the County, Agency staff will begin to reach out to multi-family property owners and large commercial customers directly to promote the Tampa Bay Water Wise program.
- Florida Friendly Landscaping agents continue to educate residents and businesses about program practices. The agents are also helping with the Tampa Bay Water Wise program by performing irrigation evaluations to rebate-eligible customers who wish to participate in the smart controller rebate program.
- Conservation Coordination Consortium Once per month, staff from Member Governments, Florida Friendly Landscaping agents, Tampa Bay Water, District, and other organizations meet to provide information about upcoming activities, current efforts, and important project updates. It is also a time to coordinate and plan the Community Water Wise awards program.
- The University of Florida directly assists with the Tampa Bay Water Wise program through data analyses and targeted marketing efforts, as well as water conservation field research. In addition, University staff are conducting field research to quantify the water conservation and other benefits of soil amendments, and they are testing sprinkler nozzle efficiency and performance in turf plots.

BACKGROUND

Tampa Bay Water Wise is a regional water conservation rebate program which aims to save up to 11 million gallons of water per day (mgd) by 2030 through 11 rebate components. This program is intended to cost-effectively defer the need for new water supplies through improved water-use efficiency which will save the Member Governments and their customers money. The program is managed by Tampa Bay Water and guided by the Member Governments through a Working Group

made up of Member Government and District staff which meet monthly. The program is administered by a third-party contractor, Electric and Gas Industries Association (EGIA).

At its December 2008 meeting, the Tampa Bay Water Board of Directors approved a resolution directing the Agency to prepare a revised Demand Management Plan (DMP). This project provided a comprehensive investigation of the benefits and costs of integrated water demand management as a quantifiable, alternative water supply source and reflects improvements in the state of knowledge that have occurred since 1995. The DMP evaluates the potential of demand management as a beneficial tool for long-term water supply planning and defines how demand management fits within the Agency's long-term water supply planning process, supply reliability, and Member Government demand projections. Consideration of costs and water supply benefits allow a consistent "apples to apples" comparison to other water supply alternatives.

At the February 2013 meeting, the Tampa Bay Water Board approved Resolution No. 2013-006, which incorporated water-use efficiency evaluation efforts into the Agency's long-term water supply planning process. This resolution directed the Agency to:

- Develop and implement data collection, management and analysis protocols and procedures for the continued assessment of passive water-use efficiency within the Agency's service area.
- Integrate passive water-use efficiency into the Agency's Long-term Demand Forecast and Future Need Analysis.
- Include the Water-Use Efficiency Evaluation as an element of the Long-term Master Water Supply Plan and include an updated evaluation of potential active measures for implementing efficient water-use products as part of future options for the next Long-term Master Water Supply Plan update.

The Board subsequently directed Tampa Bay Water staff to evaluate demand management implementation strategies to determine how active demand management could be implemented and help meet the Agency's unequivocal water supply obligation, if selected by the Board.

In August 2018, Agency staff developed a list of potential demand management best practices that could save up to 11 mgd by 2030 at about one-fifth of the cost of developing new water supplies. This approach optimizes the use of existing water resources and could defer the need to develop new supplies to a later date, all within a cost-effective strategy. The plan was approved by the Board in December 2018 as part of the Long-term Master Water Plan update.

On August 20, 2018, the Board approved funding of demand management actions through the annual budget process and applying for matching cooperative funding from the District. The Board also directed staff to work with Member Governments to develop implementation strategies that will help to secure identified savings consistent with the Amended and Restated Interlocal Agreement.

The Tampa Bay Water Wise program was officially launched and open to the public via

tampabaywaterwise.org on March 30, 2020. The Working Group that was established at the outset of this program currently meets on a monthly basis and is comprised of representatives from each Member Government, Tampa Bay Water, and the District.

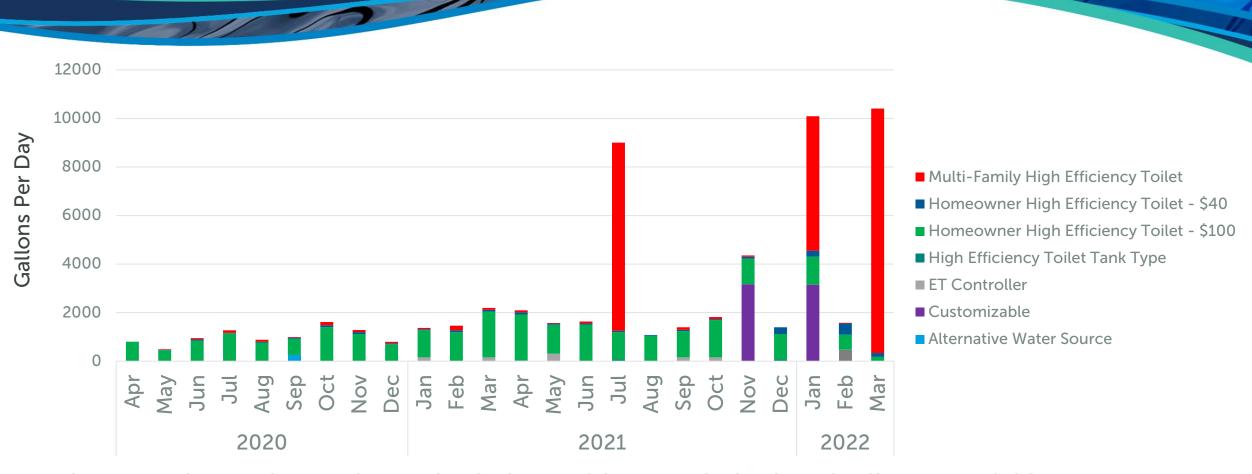

Savings Show Program is Maturing

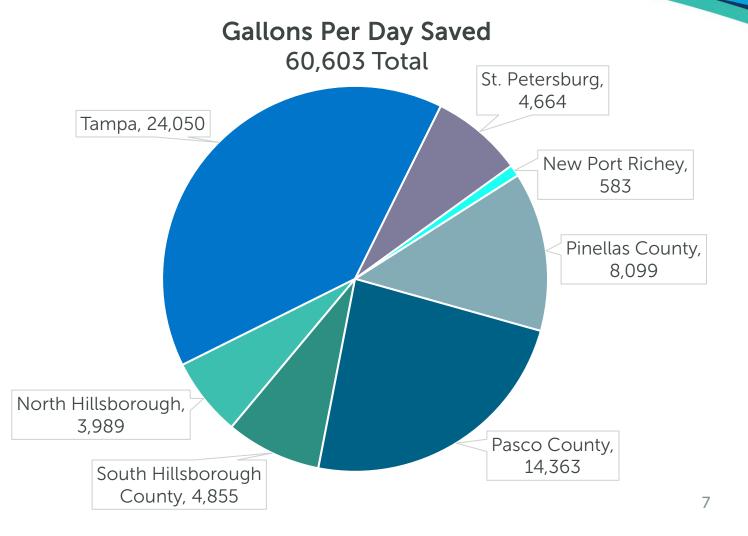

The following is an update on current activities for each Tampa Bay Water Division for the month of February 2022.

Engineering, Construction, Planning and Projects Departments

The Engineering, Construction, Planning and Projects Departments are responsible for the delivery of the Agency's Capital Improvements Program including, design, permitting, and construction of capital projects. Additionally, the departments are responsible for engineering evaluations, surveying, utility conflict management, and real estate management and acquisition. The following are major division activities for February 2022.

- Brandon Booster Station (Project 01609) In conjunction with Public Affairs, a virtual Neighborhood Meeting was held to address upcoming road closures due to upcoming pipeline installation.
- Initiated Capital Improvements Program Risk Management activities including standing up a Risk Management/Register working group.

Construction

Construction administers capital projects construction contracts to be in compliance with the design, permitting, regulatory requirements, property rights, budget, schedule and all related agreements.

- W. Bill Young Regional Reservoir Solar Energy System (Project 52004) Solar panels became operational on February 12, 2022
- Cypress Bridge Wellfield Improvements (Project 50031) Issued Notice to Proceed and held preconstruction meeting.

Engineering

Engineering conducts limited in-house design; provides capital projects project management services in as-needed basis; conducts engineering studies and assessments; manage Agency design standards and specifications; ensure that all capital projects meet Agency's engineering standards and specifications; and provides quality review of capital projects design completed by outsourced services.

- Continued coordination meetings with Hillsborough County regarding South County Supply.
- Finalized Brandon Booster Station GMP No. 5 for Board approval (Project No. 01609)
- Held the Southern Hillsborough County Pipeline project Route Criteria weighting workshop (Project No. 01610/01616.)

Planning and Projects

Planning & Projects manages and implements the update of the Agency's Capital Improvements Program, the Long-term Master Water Plan, and the Energy Management Program and other Agency critical plans and reports and provides capital projects project management services. They also are responsible for the development of all processes and procedures for effective project management following project management best practices.

- Completed FY 2023-Capital Improvements Program cash flow analysis.
- Continued the development and review of Project Management Guidelines and Procedures.
- Completed the development of scripted training videos for the Masterworks Program/Project Management Software.

Real Estate

Real Estate is responsible for the negotiation and acquisition of property rights for capital projects and supports other departments by verifying that property rights under existing agreements allow proposed projects and other activities. Additionally, it manages existing lease and license agreements, property address changes, verifies taxes due or exemption status annually, and disposes of surplus property.

- Prepared property cost estimates for the proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP credits).
- Continued negotiations on the Ag-Mart parcels for the acquisition of four well sites and other easements on the ELAPP portion of the proposed South Hillsborough Wellfield (via SHARP credits).
- Finalized easement agreement granting Tampa Bay Water additional access rights at no cost, along State Road 54 as part of Pasco County's roadway expansion project.
- Finalized Mutual Use Agreement for Cosme Odessa with the City of St. Petersburg for the construction of a berm within our easement area.
- Continued negotiations with Hillsborough County on the potential sale of 39 vacant parcels adjacent to the Regional Surface Water Treatment Plant.

Surveying

Surveying manages the utility conflicts and cathodic protection programs; manages and conducts surveys; manages and maintain record drawings; and maintain and develop computer-aided design (CAD) and geospatial data for the Agency. They also assist with engineering, construction, real estate, and geographic information systems (GIS) activities.

- Finished documenting the geospatial locations of the Cypress Bridge Transmission Main appurtenances from the Cypress Creek Facility to Cypress Bridge Well 1.
- Completed 2022 Phase 1 repairs and replacement of the Desalination Transmission Main cathodic protection system.

Finance and Administration Division

The Finance and Administration Division is responsible for finances, procurement, inventory, risk and vital records. Departments include Finance, Purchasing and Warehouse and Records. The following are major division activities for February 2022.

 infrastructure, systems, job functions, support processes, and projects in process.

Applications

The Applications team supports data and software systems built within various technologies. This includes development, maintenance, and procurement for custom applications, databases and flows, and third-party software including GIS systems.

- Completed updates to the Integrated Hydrological Model front end and error handling.

Systems

The Systems team manages Agency's enterprise technology infrastructure encompassing: PCs, computer peripherals, servers, networks, data centers, cloud environments, and telecommunication systems. The team also oversees cybersecurity systems, polices, risk assessments, and vulnerability scanning, including ongoing system patching and backups.

SCADA

The SCADA (Supervisory and Control and Data Acquisition) system is a mission critical component of Tampa Bay Water managing and monitoring water production facilities both physically and wirelessly

connected. The team is responsible for the ongoing development, maintenance, and security of the SCADA system, including managing dedicated hardware, software, networks, and telecommunications.

- Installed back communications link at High Service Pump Station location to increase resiliency of network communication to that site.
- Applied SCADA Graphics and database updates as per user requirements, enhancing system usability.
- Applied system updates to optimize operator alarms, enhancing system usability.
- Applied multiple cybersecurity enhancements to improve system monitoring and management in the SCADA environment.

Public Affairs Division

The Public Affairs division develops and executes strategic initiatives to advocate for the agency and its members; builds and maintains the agency reputation; provides education, information and outreach on agency projects, programs and policies to stakeholders; and develops and implements critical water supply plans. Division responsibilities include public communications, outreach and education, and grant funding and government affairs. For February 2022, Public Affairs:

- Managed the agency strategic planning and performance measurement process in coordination with WSP USA, Inc.
- Managed the pilot project with the Knowledge-to-Implementation (K2i) Platform.
- With Dialogue Public Relations, continued public outreach for the Brandon Booster Station, Seawater Desalination Expansion and South Hillsborough Wellfield via Aquifer Recharge Credits projects.
- Held a community meeting on Feb. 3, 2022, for residents near the Brandon Booster Station site to discuss construction impacts and road closures related to pipeline work.
- Coordinated the Water Smarter conservation campaign, with Hillsborough County staff, targeted to residents in south Hillsborough County to encourage outdoor water conservation.

Grant Funding and Government Affairs

Grant Funding and Government Affairs is responsible for developing and implementing strategic positions and priorities for the Agency's legislative, grant funding and regulatory policy initiatives.

- Worked with legislative counsel and grant funding and legislative consultants to monitor and report on 2022 Florida Legislative session including: monitoring and evaluating bills filed; monitoring committee meetings; and meeting weekly with legislative team.

discussed potential regulatory changes that may affect Tampa Bay Water.

- Attended Session February 15th through the 17th to conduct legislative delegation staff meetings to identify shared policy interest with the delegation and Tampa Bay Water.

- Attended meetings of the Water Wise working group to identify ways the Grants and Legislative Funding Program can coordinate with the Water Wise program to ensure the program's success.

Project Public Engagement

Public Communications, Outreach and Education develop and execute strategic communications programs that support and promote agency projects, policies and initiatives, and build and maintain relationships with agency stakeholders.

- Complete four tours for 34 guests of the Tampa Bay Seawater Desalination Plant, Tampa Bay Regional Surface Water Treatment Plant and C.W. Bill Young Regional Reservoir.
- Held a neighborhood meeting on road closures related to the pipeline connections on Feb. 3, 2022.
- Completed and presented to the Board of Directors the agency's communications plan based on Public Opinion Survey input and strategic planning results.
- Conducted Tampa Bay Water educational sessions at Pinellas County Schools' STEM teacher workshop on February 21, 2022.
- Planned Tampa Bay Water's exhibit with hand-on activities and educational materials at the Florida Water Festival on March 5, 2022.
- Coordinated Water Smarter outdoor conservation campaign, with Hillsborough County staff, targeted to residents in south Hillsborough County to encourage outdoor water conservation from January through spring dry season 2022. Campaign elements include a website landing page, social media messages and advertisements, billboards, and utility bill inserts.
- Coordinated with the demand management program administrator and working group on the

- regional marketing campaign for the Tampa Bay Water Wise demand management rebate program.
- Prepared campaign materials to promote the 2022 Community Tampa Bay Water Wise Awards
 Program in coordination with member government conservation staff and UF/IFAS Florida

Science and Technical Division

The Science and Technical Division provides water resource technical support for planning, operations, demand management, water quality and regulatory functions of the Agency. This Activity Report summarizes the key activities of the Systems Decision Support, Environmental Regulatory Compliance, Water Use Permitting and Water Quality Services Departments. For February 2022, Science and Technical:

- Coordinated with engineering on water supply and demand management options for South Hillsborough County.
- Submitted a Water Use Permit application to the District to increase the annual average permitted quantity of the South-Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield from 24.1 to 24.95 mgd.

Systems Decision Support

Addresses the Agency's system-wide decision support needs on a multi-scale time horizon: from week-to-week operational support to seasonal resource allocation, annual demand and supply projections, to decadal water supply planning and environmental recovery assessments. Designs, implements, and maintains water resources optimization tools, integrated hydrological models, risk and reliability analysis tools, water demand management and forecasting programs and models all in support of

operational, annual budgeting and long-range planning needs. Leads the Agency's effort in climate variability and climate change assessment and adaptation.

- Continued System-Wide Reliability Evaluation (SWRE) model analysis. Also, worked with GSI Environmental Consultant on the 'Calibrating IHM/INTB Model' and the 'Stochastic Bayesian (radar-based) Rainfall Time-Series Generation' projects.
- Continued documentation/knowledge transfer work created by expected retirement of a key staff member.
- As of the end of February 2022, Tampa Bay Water Wise has completed two large commercial customizable rebates, two more projects are underway, and seven more are in the beginning or exploratory stages. Hillsborough County is poised to launch their direct-mail campaign to residents who are eligible for a smart irrigation controller and/or shallow well. Pasco County is looking into a similar email campaign. The program is about to launch a targeted digital campaign aimed at eligible smart irrigation controller customers. The new signs and stickers for toilet rebates have been posted in nearly all of the Home Depot and Lowes stores across the region. The website is being revised to provide a more streamlined look, with imagery to match the current rebate campaign marketing images.
- Continued working on Sea Level Rise framework and action plan project. Held internal workshop for staff on a roadmap of future activities to understand impact on agency water supply sources and infrastructure. Briefed member government utility directors. Workshop for external stakeholders is planned on March 24, 2022.

Permitting

The Water Use Permitting Department is responsible for the acquisition and renewal of, and compliance with, Agency Water Use Permits including implementation of the Domestic Well Mitigation Program. Work also includes monitoring and management of wetland impacts associated with construction and/or past operation of Agency facilities and infrastructure and management of lands owned by the Agency to maintain appropriate natural habitat.

- South Central Hillsborough Regional Wellfield Staff prepared a permit application to modify the annual average permitted quantity from this wellfield from 24.1 mgd to 24.95 mgd and this application was approved by the Board on January 24, 2022. Staff submitted the permit application to the Southwest Florida Water Management District on February 28, 2022, following the 30-day arbitration selection period by the host member governments in accordance with the Amended and Restated Interlocal Agreement. Staff anticipate the issuance of this permit by May 2022.
- South Hillsborough water supply options Staff continue to evaluate new water supply opportunities to deliver additional water to southern Hillsborough County. Performed preliminary modeling to estimate yield from early phase of the South Hillsborough Wellfield via SHARP credits. Completing a Water Use Permit application for Hillsborough County and Tampa Bay Water for water supply on the AgMart parcel recently purchased by the County; anticipate presenting the permit application to the Board for review and approval in April 2022.

Environmental Regulatory Compliance

Environmental Regulatory Compliance is responsible for guiding the implementation of an Environmental Management System (EMS) in conformance with ISO 14001, environmental compliance tracking and reporting, and coordination of environmental permit applications and renewals.

- Continued coordination with Engineering, Operations, Water Quality and Water Use Permitting Departments in the development of an Environmental Permitting Standard Operating Procedure.
- Continued implementation of the project initiated for remediation of surface water management units (SWMUs) for compliance with environmental resource permits at 18 Tampa Bay Water facilities. SWMU quarterly maintenance activities are being implemented to maintain the sites in their permitted condition and allow for SWMU recertification.

Water Quality Services

Water Quality Services is responsible for laboratory testing, water quality compliance reporting, environmental/hydrologic/hydrobiological monitoring, source water assessment and protection, and water quality treatment support to operations and others.

Laboratory

- Completed routine monthly water quality compliance sampling and reporting.
- Continued analytical support for the Regional Water Quality (TOC) Study pilot units.
- Submitted Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) 2021 water quality tables to members.

Environmental/Hydrologic /Hydrobiological Monitoring

- Completed monthly hydrologic monitoring of groundwater/surface water elevations.
- Continued monitoring station upgrades to improve detection, data transfer, and reliability.
- Continued hydrobiological monitoring for Tampa Bay Water source waters.

Source Water Assessment and Protection

- Continued monitoring/data enhancements for Alafia River and Tampa Bypass Canal.
- Refining source water protection plans for Alafia River, Tampa Bypass Canal, and wellfields.
- Continued the Alafia watershed fluoride sources study and multi-partner restoration plan.

Water Quality Treatment Support

- Continued operation of pilot treatment units for the Regional Water Quality (TOC) Study.
- Began planning for Fifth Round Unregulated Contaminant Rule (UCMR5) with members.
- Led Water Quality Working Group (WQWG) monthly meeting with member governments.

Water Production Division

The Water Production division is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the agency's water production assets that provide drinking water to the members. Departments within the division include: Buildings & Grounds and Fleet Services, Maintenance Planning & Reliability, Operations & Maintenance, and Safety Services. The following are major division activities for the month:

- Provided drinking water to meet member government demands in compliance with Exhibit D and Safe Drinking Water Act water quality standards
- Met biweekly with Hillsborough County staff on water supply projects for the south county region.
- Continued work on Brandon Booster Station to provide additional water capacity to South Hillsborough County.
- Continued the Design Criteria Package for the Desal connection to TECO Tunnel 1.

Buildings & Grounds and Fleet Services

The Buildings & Grounds and Fleet Services team is responsible for maintaining the primary physical plants of each facility, including HVAC systems, roadways, fire safety systems, and roofing and coating systems. The team also takes care of the acquisition and maintenance of fleet vehicles for the entire agency. Highlights from the Building & Grounds and Fleet Services team for the month include:

- Substantially completed painting, lighting, carpet, wood, and tile work at the Clearwater office.
- Continued installation of an IOT based system to monitor Clearwater Office Building Power, HVAC, and Generator systems with real time alerts and control capabilities.
- Removed the power transformer and began getting county permits in preparation for demolition of the building at Starkey 11 wellsite. Coordinated with Starkey Park Ranger for trail detour route.
- Prepared to replace all fluorescent lighting at the Cypress Creek Infrastructure and Emergency Management (IEM) Building with LED fixtures.
- Prepared to replace all first-floor fluorescent lighting at the Surface Water Treatment Plant Building with LED fixtures.
- Finalized both purchase pricing and availability and have ordered all Board-approved FY 2022 fleet vehicles.
- Returned the remainder of the Clearwater building parking lot to service pending further repair efforts.
- Recommended award of contracts for both Tree Removal and Fence/Gate As-Needed contractors. These contracts will be brought to the March Board meeting for approval.
- Replaced the Odessa Booster Pump Station HVAC systems (2) for both the Analyzer and Control rooms.
- Started roofing preventative maintenance services for multiple buildings at the Cypress Creek Facility.

Maintenance Planning & Reliability

The Maintenance Planning & Reliability team is responsible for overseeing the Agency's Asset

Management System, including the MAXIMO software and the Renewal and Replacement Program. Highlights from the Maintenance Planning & Reliability team for the month include:

- Held the failure codes workshop, which is part of the MAXIMO 5-year plan.
- Updated MAXIMO workgroups to align with the new zone structure in Operations.
- Deployed iPad tablets to all Operations staff.
- Wrote five Maintenance Job plans to update to current standards and entered into the MAXIMO system.
- Reviewed 819 asset nameplate pictures and entered data into the MAXIMO database.

Operations & Maintenance

The Operations & Maintenance team is responsible for ensuring that the Agency's production assets are maintained and operated in a sustainable and resilient manner to fulfill the drinking water needs of the member governments. They provide continuous attention to the system, adjusting to changing conditions and in compliance with permit and environmental recovery constraints. Highlights from the Operations & Maintenance team for the month include:

- Continued operating in the dry season configuration. The Surface Water Treatment Plant production was 60 mgd and the Desal Plant production was 16 mgd for the month.
- As of the end of February, no source water was available from the Alafia River or the Tampa Bypass Canal due to minimum flows and levels, which is a normal annual occurrence.
- The level in the regional reservoir at the end of the month was 131.48 feet, corresponding to 13.74 billion gallons of storage.

Safety Services

Safety Services is responsible for agency Safety, Security and Emergency Management. Highlights from Safety Services for the month include:

- Continued to monitor COVID-19 adjusted protocols to match lowered community spread; will continue to monitor as endemic phase continues.
- Received and reviewed Regional Resiliency Assessment Program after-action report. Recommendations being assessed and an improvement plan created in coordination with Information Technology.
- Continued Emergency Response Two Way Radio Enhancement (Florida Fire Code 11.10) surveys for all agency buildings. The Cypress Creek Warehouse DAS mitigation is in progress.
- Began preparations for 2022 Storm Season assessed supplies and plans and drafted an agency training plan to include Incident Command Training, Emergency Plan Training and Emergency Management Leadership Training.
- Trained and communicated with security personnel and staff regarding First Amendment Audits and public records requests.

Board of Directors

• Attended the February regular Board meeting and advance briefings with Board members.

- Reviewed documents for, and advised agency staff regarding, real estate matters.
- Working with staff on property acquisition matters for Pipelines A and B.
- Participated in pipeline weighting criteria workshop with pipeline design team.
- Reviewed draft updated real estate guidelines.
- Evaluating potential remedies for parking garage collapse and working with staff to develop and assess alternative parking arrangements.

Legislative and Administrative

- Attend legislative team weekly meetings.

Issue: Complaint for damages pertaining to PFAS and related compounds including counts for strict liability, failure to warn, design defect, negligence, private nuisance, public nuisance, and fraudulent conveyance.

DISCUSSION

To assist our Members in their planning and budgeting, we present a monthly schedule that shows the projected true-up adjustment due each September based on the water production to date for the current fiscal year. This is done to ensure that each member is aware of the up-coming true-up billing and that the member government will have time to take appropriate planning measures for the September 2022 year end.

Each member is billed for fixed charges through the year based upon their respective pro-rata share of

the prior year's production.

BACKGROUND

As required by the Master Water Supply Contract, each member's actual contributions are adjusted at year-end to the current year's budgeted fixed costs, based upon their pro-rata portion of current year production. This adjustment is called the true-up. This true-up adjustment results in potential amounts due to/from each member with no net revenue impact to the agency. It is calculated at the conclusion of each fiscal year, resulting in a potential invoice or credit to each member in October of each year.

DISCUSSION

The attached Chandler Asset Management Consolidated Statement and Bond Market Review provide a monthly summary of the agency's asset allocations and the drivers of the economy that may affect investment performance.

Chandler Asset Management, the Board's contracted investment advisor, manages a portion of the agency's funds to earn a higher return, without sacrificing or risking principal.

As of January 31, 2022, the funds currently managed by Chandler Asset Management had a Market

Value of \$164,794,153 and are detailed in the attached statement. All the investments are held in a third-party trust account with Regions Bank as custodian.

As of January 31, 2022, the Agency had \$98,804,863 held in deposit accounts or certificates of deposits with multiple banking institutions, with interest rates ranging from .05% to .17%. In addition, these banking institutions participate in the State of Florida Public Funds pool and are designated Public Funds. Under this program, each participating bank is required to post collateral with the State at a percentage of the amount of Public Funds held by that bank. The percentage of collateral required is determined by the State and may vary by institution. Of the funds held by Tampa Bay Water, 66% are restricted as to purpose. An additional \$30.8 million in the Utility Reserve Fund is not restricted as to purpose but must be maintained at levels sufficient to ensure compliance with debt coverage requirements.

BACKGROUND

Resolution 2017-002 approves the Agency's Investment Policy.

US Government Securities - Treasuries (100%) - Collective term used to describe debt instruments backed by the US Government and issued through the US Department of Treasure.

US Government Agency (50%) – A debt instrument issued by one of the Federal Agencies.

Federal Instrumentalities (80%) - A government sponsored/owned entity created by US Congress.

Mortgage-Backed Securities (20%) – An ownership interest in a pool of mortgage loans made by financial institutions to finance the borrower's purchase of a home or other real estate.

Repurchase Agreements (50%) - A short-term investment vehicle where an investor agrees to buy securities from a counterparty and simultaneously agrees to resell the securities back to the counterparty at an agreed upon time for an agreed upon price.

Commercial Paper (25%) – Short term unsecured promissory note issued by a company or financial institution. Issued at a discount and matures for par or face value.

Corporate Note (25%) – A debt instrument issued by a corporation with a maturity of greater than one year and less than ten years.

Bankers' Acceptances (25%) – A draft or bill of exchange drawn upon and accepted by a bank.

Municipal Note/Bond (20%) – A debt instrument issued by a state, local government or public agency.

Supranationals (15%) – A debt instrument issued by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, International Finance Corporation or Inter-American Development Bank.

Money Market Mutual Funds (50%) – Market in which short-term debt instruments are issued/traded.

Intergovernmental Investment Pool (25%) – An investment by local governments in which their money is pooled as a method for managing local funds.

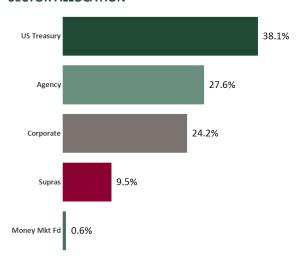

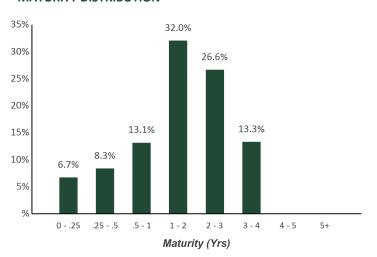

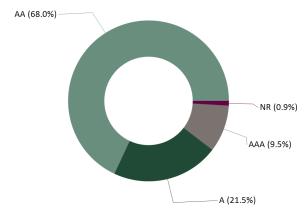
SECTOR ALLOCATION

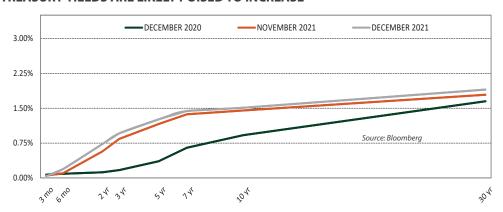
Market Summary

Fed policymakers have recently pivoted toward a more hawkish stance as inflation indices continue to run hot and the labor market appears relatively tight, given their dual mandate of promoting maximum employment and stable prices. Although labor force participation remains lower than it was prior to the pandemic, there are signals the economy may be near full employment within the context of the current health situation. The unemployment rate declined from 6.7% to 3.9% in 2021, a high percentage of workers are voluntarily quitting jobs, the level of job openings relative to those looking for work remains high, and wage growth has been strong. Meanwhile, inflation continues to run well above the Fed's long-run 2.0% target. The Consumer Price Index excluding food and energy was up 5.5% in December. The Core PCE index, the Fed's preferred inflation measure, was up 4.7% year-over-year in the latest report. Given the current inflation and employment dynamics, Fed policymakers have begun discussing plans to remove monetary policy accommodation. The Fed is currently tapering its asset purchases and we expect that process will be complete within the next few months. Should aggregate demand remain strong and economic activity remain robust, we believe the first rate hike may be announced in the first half of this year after the taper is complete. However, we do not believe monetary policy is on a pre-set course. We expect the Fed to adjust policy at a gradual pace and believe policymakers will adjust their views as necessary based on incoming economic and financial market data.

We believe US economic growth is likely to moderate this year but remain above the long-run trend rate of growth. The consensus forecast for GDP growth this year is 3.9% versus estimated growth of 5.6% in 2021. Amid the current surge of virus infection rates, we believe global supply chains remain challenged and we see risk to the first quarter US GDP consensus estimate of 3.9%. Nevertheless, we believe aggregate consumer demand remains strong and consumer spending, the largest component of US GDP, should remain solid this year, supported by healthy consumer balance sheets, an improving health situation, and ongoing improvement in the labor market. We expect supply chain bottlenecks will continue to put upward pressure on inflation over the near-term but we believe inflation may be at or near a peak, We believe pricing pressure is likely to abate in the second half of this year amid an improving global health backdrop and less acute global supply chain stress.

In December, the 2-year Treasury yield increased nearly 17 basis points to 0.73%, the 5-year Treasury yield increased ten basis points to 1.26%, and the 10-year Treasury yield increased about seven basis points to 1.51% in the month. We have witnessed a relatively swift move in Treasury rates this month with the 2-year Treasury yield up roughly 19 basis points, and the 10-year Treasury yield up more than 20 basis points, year-to-date.

TREASURY YIELDS ARE LIKELY POISED TO INCREASE



At the end of December, the 2-year Treasury yield was about 61 basis points higher and the 10-Year Treasury yield was about 60 basis points higher, year-over-year. We believe Treasury yields are likely to increase further this year, across the curve.

Economic Roundup

Consumer Prices

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) was up 7.0% year-over-year in December, versus up 6.8% year-over-year in November. Core CPI (CPI less food and energy) was up 5.5% year-over-year in December, versus up 4.9% in November. The Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) index was up 5.7% year-over-year in November, up from 5.1% in October. Core PCE was up 4.7% year-over-year in November, versus up 4.2% in October. Current inflation readings continue to run well above the Fed's longer-run target of around 2.0%. Upward pressure on inflation from supply chain bottlenecks and pandemic-related disruptions is likely to remain elevated over the near-term.

Retail Sales

On a year-over-year basis, retail sales were up 18.2% in November versus up 16.3% in October. On a month-over-month basis, retail sales were softer than expected in November, up 0.3% versus expectations of 0.8%, but this followed an upwardly revised gain of 1.8% in October. In our view, the data suggests that consumers may have started shopping early this holiday season in anticipation of supply shortages. Higher gas prices seem to have taken some wallet share, with spending at gasoline stations up 1.7% month-over-month. Amid the current resurgence of virus cases, the near-term outlook for retail sales is uncertain, and nonstore retailers (online) may be poised to outperform.

Labor Market

Job growth slowed in December, with US nonfarm payroll growth of just 199,000 in the month versus the consensus forecast of 450,000, but the unemployment rate still declined to 3.9%, the lowest level since February 2020. On a trailing 3-month and 6-month basis, payrolls increased an average of 365,000 and 508,000 per month, respectively, which still compares favorably to the average job gains in the five years leading up to the pandemic of about 196,000 per month. We believe a variety of factors are keeping some workers out of the labor force for now, which continues to hold back job growth despite strong demand from employers. The labor participation rate was unchanged in December at 61.9% and remains lower than the pre-pandemic level of 63.4%. The employment-population ratio increased to 59.5% in December form 59.3% in November, but also remains below the pre-pandemic level of 61.2%. The U-6 underemployment rate, which includes those who are marginally attached to the labor force and employed part time for economic reasons, declined to 7.3% in December from 7.7% in November (versus 7.0% in February 2020). Annualized average hourly earnings rose 0.6% month-over-month and were up 4.7% year-over-year in December versus 5.1% in November.

Housing Starts

Total housing starts jumped 11.8% in November to an annual pace of 1,679,000. Single-family starts increased 11.3% while multi-family starts increased 12.9%, month-over-month. On a year-over-year basis total housing starts were up 8.3% in November.

The attached Statement of Revenues and Expenditures summarizes the Agency's uniform rate basis financial activity for January 2022.

DISCUSSION

Financial Statement - Summary of Major Points: The agency lags in actual expenditures for the Professional Services category due primarily to the normal nature of the billing and review process which takes typically 60 to 90 days. This is adjusted at year end to reflect all actual activity. Electricity and Water Treatment Chemicals appear low because the budgeted amount is spread evenly over the year, but the use of electricity and chemicals are more seasonal.

Revenues – Operating income consists of water sales (fixed and variable components), sales from the Tampa Bypass Canal to the City of Tampa, and the board-approved balance carried forward from the

previous year through the Rate Stabilization Fund. Other Income consists routinely of interest income received from investments.

Expenditures - Throughout the year, actual expenditures normally lag behind budgeted expenditures by at least one to two months. This is due to the fact that vendor bills and the subsequent payment of those bills generally lag behind the actual performance of the services by 30 to 45 days and the budgeted expenses are distributed evenly across the 12 months of the fiscal year.

When the fiscal year end approaches, the books are held open to allow for all the appropriate activity to be accounted for and shown in the appropriate fiscal year. Variable rate expenditures will have seasonal peaks as the agency enters the dry season and begins to use the costlier supply sources.

The "Encumbrance" balance shown on the bottom of the financial statements represents the amount of open purchase orders (committed funds and blanket purchase orders) as of the end of the month, including purchase orders carried forward from the previous year. Although the encumbrance is presented for informational purposes, it gives a projected contractual commitment against current year funds. There are many purchase orders established at the beginning of the year that will be spent through the year and monthly revenue will be collected through the year to offset that expense.

Rate revenue is shown as being earned in level monthly increments and only catches up to the expenditures at year end. Significant encumbrances include Water Treatment Chemicals, Power, Professional Services and Water for Resale. Professional service tasks frequently carry over beyond the end of a fiscal year, in which case the applicable open purchase orders and the associated budget dollars are carried into the next fiscal year to allow for completion of those tasks as mentioned above.
