CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

- 1. The Keaton Avenue Drainage Improvement Project is progressing despite rain and cold weather. The sanitary sewer work next to the Wynnwood Drive is complete so channel work can commence upstream towards Keaton Avenue and Fry Avenue. Reynolds and Kay is working on the junction where the two channels from Shepherd Lane and Fry Avenue intersect so that multiple crews can work on the channels in order to minimize erosion and speed up productivity. Also on drainage, the pre-construction meeting for the West Mud Creek restoration next to the Glenwood Church of Christ was held last week, and we plan to begin work on that during the first week of April to have better working conditions. Wet ground from rains from this time of year should dry out faster, which is pretty important since we're working on the creek itself.
- 2. One of the things you may have seen on Saturday morning was a lot of our UT Tyler students about the community. I know just walking through Pollard Park, I saw some there working on cleaning up the park and planting trees. And so, with that, we also had quite a few that came downtown. Main Street assisted in organizing and hosting projects for the East Texas Big Event, which sent students out to serve Tyler in different areas. In downtown Tyler, students cleaned the Fair Plaza parking garage, Downtown Square, surrounding streets, and the railroad. Other projects included serving at the East Texas Brewing Company, the Foundry Coffee House, the Smith County Historical Society, the Tyler Public Library, Discovery Science Place, and Callan Photography. So, we're proud to have our college students out and about as far as giving back to our great community.
- 3. And finally, tomorrow at 1:30 p.m. at the Rose Center complex, we will have the official designation of Tyler as a Veteran-friendly community. This is something that has been worked on by our own Councilman Nichols and also along with the Chamber of Veterans Affairs community. And we're very proud to be able to get this designation to be able to once again show that Tyler is a great place for veterans to come and live and to have their businesses.

On December 13, 2023, the Tyler City Council passed a Resolution authorizing the Tyler Police Department to continue participation with the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force (ETATTF). It is requested that the City Council adopt another resolution authorizing the Police Department to participate with other agencies in the submission of grant requests from the Texas Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority for the thirty-first (31st) year of funding. As part of the ETATTF's existence from 1993 through 2024, the City of Tyler has experienced reductions in auto thefts through enforcement efforts and public education programs. In recent years, the ETATTF has also focused on the reduction of vehicle burglaries and catalytic converter thefts. The Police Department has one full-time investigator assigned to the ETATTF.

Participants in the ETATTF include representatives from the Smith County Sheriff's Office, Rusk County Sheriff's Office, Henderson County Sheriff's Office, Tyler Police Department, and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

This year there was a slight delay with Smith County sending the City signed Interlocal Agreements because the ETATTF has new grants associated with SB 224 (catalytic converter thefts and education). The City of Tyler's total cash-match share from all the grants is \$29,092.00. These funds will come from the Police Department regular budget, account #101-0313-421-04-08. The City of Tyler's in-kind match share of this grant for wireless computer services is \$420.00. The ETATTF reimburses the City for one investigator and provides a vehicle and office space. Revenue will be placed in the ETATTF revenue account, and the match will be expensed from the 2024-2025 ETATTF account. The renewal period is from September 1st, 2024 through August 31st, 2025.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the attached Resolution authorizing the Tyler

Police Department to participate with other law enforcement agencies in the submission and use of grant requests from the Texas Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority for the thirty-first (31st) year of funding in the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force, authorizing certain City matching cash and in-kind shares, and authorizing the City Manager to enter into working agreements regarding the same.

RESOLUTION NO. R-2025-

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TYLER, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE TYLER POLICE DEPARTMENT TO PARTICIPATE WITH OTHER LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES IN THE SUBMISSION AND USE OF GRANT REQUESTS FROM THE TEXAS MOTOR VEHICLE CRIME PREVENTION AUTHORITY FOR THE THIRTY-FIRST YEAR OF FUNDING FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT'S PARTICIPATION IN THE EAST TEXAS AUTO THEFT TASK FORCE; AUTHORIZING THE CITY'S MATCHING SHARE; AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY **MANAGER INTO** TO **ENTER** COOPERATIVE **AGREEMENTS** REGARDING SAME; **AND** ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City Council to promote the public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, under provision of Texas Revised Civil Statutes Article 4413 (37) and Texas Administrative Code Title 43; Part 3; Chapter 57, entities are eligible to receive grants from the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority to provide financial support to law enforcement agencies for economic automobile theft enforcement teams and to combat automobile burglary in the jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the City Council's action resulted in the reduction of auto thefts in the City of Tyler from 1993 to 2024; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler's cash matching funds will be in the amount of \$29,092.00, and in-kind matching funds in the amount of \$420.00; and

WHEREAS, the Police Department's participation has proven to be successful in the reduction of auto thefts and burglaries, benefiting the citizens of Tyler and Smith County; and

WHEREAS, the East Texas Auto Theft Task force has agreed that in the event of loss or misuse of the grant funds, the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force assures that the grant funds will be returned in full to the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TYLER, TEXAS;

- **PART 1:** That the Resolution authorizes the Tyler Police Department to participate with other law enforcement agencies in the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force in the submission of grant requests for the thirty-first year of funding from the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority.
- **PART 2:** That Smith County Judge Neal Franklin is designated Authorized Official to apply for, accept, decline, modify, or cancel the grant application for the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority grant programs and other necessary documents to accept said grants; and that Lieutenant Kenneth Richbourg is designated as the Project Director, and Smith County Auditor Karin Smith is dedicated as the Financial Officer for the grants.

- **PART 3:** the City of Tyler's cash matching funds are hereby authorized in the amount of \$29,092.00, and in-kind matching funds in the amount of \$420.00; and
- **PART 4:** That the City Manager is hereby authorized to enter into cooperative working agreements with the Texas Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority.
 - **PART 5:** That this Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

Interlocal Agreement 2025 State of Texas

This Agreement is entered into by and between the <u>County of Smith</u>, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, hereinafter referred to as "County" and the <u>City of Tyler</u>, a municipal corporation situated in Smith County, Texas, hereinafter called "City" pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 791.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> have the objective to participate in a combined task force funded by the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority (MVCPA) of the State of Texas, in the amount of <u>\$665,702.00</u> for the <u>East Texas Auto Theft Task Force</u>, and,

WHEREAS, the <u>City</u> has agreed to contribute the total of <u>\$28,179.00</u> in matching funds if said grant application is approved; and,

WHEREAS, the source of funds would not normally be used for this purpose; and,

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> believe it to be in their best interests to continue a <u>multijurisdictional MVCPA</u> <u>Task Force</u>; and

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> agree to each accept the responsibility and to adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws or regulations

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE

1.01 The purpose of this Agreement is to allow the <u>County</u> (Grantee) to file an application for a grant with the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority (Agency), which application is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof for all purposes.

ARTICLE II. TERM

2.01 The term of this Agreement is to commence on September 1, 2024 and to end August 31, 2025.

ARTICLE III. CONSIDERATION

3.01 As consideration for this Agreement, the <u>City</u> (sub-grantee) agrees to contribute a total of \$28,179.00 in matching funds for the enhancement of the funded grant program in the amounts and methods as follows:

ARTICLE V. EQUIPMENT

5.01 Upon termination of this Agreement, equipment including vehicles, hardware, and other non-expendable items will revert to the applicant. The Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority of the State of Texas will be notified and inventory records will be updated.

ARTICLE VI. AMENDMENTS

6.01 This Agreement may be amended by the mutual agreement of the parties hereto in writing to be attached to and incorporated into this agreement.

ARTICLE VII. LEGAL CONSTRUCTION

7.01 In the event any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any respect such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision thereof and this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

ARTICLE VIII. UNIFORM ASSURANCES

8.01 In accordance with §783.005 of the Texas Government Code Grantee and sub-grantee shall comply with the following uniform assurances:

Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment- Grantee certifies that no federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress on its behalf to obtain, extend, or modify this contract or grant. If non-federal funds are used by Grantee to conduct such lobbying activities, the prescribed disclosure form shall promptly be filed. In accordance with 31 U.S.C. § 1352(b)(5), Grantee acknowledges and agrees that it is responsible for ensuring that each sub-grantee certifies its compliance with the expenditure prohibition and the declaration requirement.

In addition, Grantee represents and warrants that it will comply with all requirements imposed by the awarding agency concerning special requirements of law, program requirements, and other administrative requirements. In instances where multiple requirements apply to Grantee, the more restrictive requirement applies.

Excluded Parties- Grantee certifies that it is not listed in the prohibited vendors list authorized by Executive Order No. 13224, "Blocking Property and Prohibiting Transactions with Persons Who Commit, Threaten to Commit, or Support Terrorism", published by the United States Department of the Treasury, Office of Foreign Assets Control.

Executive Head of a State Agency Affirmation- Under Section 669.003 of the Texas Government Code, relating to contracting with an executive head of a state agency, Grantee represents that no person who served as an executive of Agency, in the past four (4) years, was involved with or has any interest in the contract or grant. Indemnification- to the extent permitted by law Grantee shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the state of Texas and agency, and/or their officers, agents, employees, representatives, contractors, assignees, and/or designees from any and all liability, actions, claims, demands, or suits, and all related costs, attorney fees, and expenses arising out of, or resulting from any acts or omissions of Grantee or its agents, employees, subcontractors, order fulfillers, or suppliers of subcontractors in the execution or performance of the contract and any purchase orders issued under the contract. The defense shall be coordinated by Grantee with the office of the Texas Attorney General when Texas state agencies are named defendants in any lawsuit and Grantee may not agree to any settlement without first obtaining the concurrence from the office of the Texas Attorney General. Grantee and agency agree to furnish timely written notice to each other of any such claim.

Law Enforcement Agency Grant Restriction- Grantee on behalf of <u>East Texas Auto Theft Task Force</u> is a law enforcement agency regulated by Chapter 1701 of the Texas Occupations Code, Grantee represents and warrants that it will not use appropriated money unless the law enforcement agency is in compliance with all rules adopted by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE), or TCOLE certifies that it is in the process of achieving compliance with such rules.

Legal Authority- Grantee represents that it possesses legal authority to apply for the grant. A resolution, motion or similar action has been duly adopted or passed as an official act of the Grantee's governing body, authorizing the filing of the Response, including all understandings and assurances contained therein, and directing and authorizing the person identified as the official representative, or the designee of Grantee to act in connection with the Response and to provide such additional information as may be required.

Lobbying Expenditure Restriction- Grantee represents and warrants that Agency's payments to Grantee and Grantee's receipt of appropriated or other funds under the contract or grant are not prohibited by Sections 403.1067 or 556.0055 of the Texas Government Code which restrict lobbying expenditures

No Conflicts of Interest State- Grantee represents and warrants that performance under the contract or grant will not constitute an actual or potential conflict of interest or reasonably create an appearance of impropriety. Further, Grantee represents and warrants that in the administration of the grant, it will comply with all conflict of interest prohibitions and disclosure requirements required by applicable law, rules, and policies, including Chapter 176 of the Texas Local Government Code. If circumstances change during the course of the contract or grant, Grantee shall promptly notify Agency.

No Waiver of Sovereign Immunity- The Parties expressly agree that no provision of the grant or contract is in any way intended to constitute a waiver by the Agency or the State of Texas of any immunities from suit or from liability that the Agency or the State of Texas may have by operation of law.

Open Meetings- Grantee represents and warrants its compliance with Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code which requires all regular, special or called meeting of a governmental body to be open to the public, except as otherwise provided by law.

Texas Public Information Act- Information, documentation, and other material in connection with this Solicitation or any resulting contract or grant may be subject to public disclosure pursuant to Chapter 552 of the Texas Government Code (the "Public Information Act"). In accordance with Section 2252.907 of the Texas Government Code, Grantee is required to make any information created or exchanged with the State pursuant to the contract or grant, and not otherwise excepted from disclosure under the Texas Public Information Act, available in a format that is accessible by the public at no additional charge to the State.

Reporting Compliance- Grantee represents and warrants that it will submit timely, complete, and accurate reports in accordance with the grant and maintain appropriate backup documentation to support the reports.

Records Retention State Grant- Grantee shall maintain and retain all records relating to the performance of the grant including supporting fiscal documents adequate to ensure that claims for grant funds are in accordance with applicable State of Texas requirements. These records will be maintained and retained by Grantee for a period of four (4) years after the grant expiration date or until all audit, claim, and litigation matters are resolved, whichever is later. Agency reserves the right to direct a Grantee to retain documents for a longer period of time or transfer certain records to Agency custody when it is determined the records possess longer term retention value. Internal control- Effective control and accountability will be maintained for all grant cash, real and personal property, and other assets. Grantee will safeguard all such property and assure that it is used for authorized grant purposes.

Page Budget control- Actual expenditures will be kept within budgeted amounts for each grant.

Allowable cost-Applicable cost principles, agency program regulations, and the terms of grant agreements shall be followed in determining the reasonableness, allowability, and allocability of costs.

Source documentation- Accounting records must be supported by such source documentation as checks, paid bills, payroll records, receipts, timesheets, travel vouchers, and other records, etc. These source documents must be retained and made available for MVCPA staff when requested.

Cash management- Grantee will establish reasonable procedures to ensure the receipt of reports on cash balances and cash disbursements in sufficient time to enable them to prepare complete and accurate cash transactions reports to the awarding agency.

Reimbursement Grant- All expenditures reported will be based on actual amounts paid and documented. Reporting budgeted amounts or estimated costs as expenditures are not permitted and if used may result in payment suspension and possible termination of the grant.

(3) Issuing a management decision for audit findings pertaining to the sub-award provided to the sub-grantee from the local government as required.

12.01 This Agreement supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or in writing, between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no other agreement, statement, or promise relating to the subject matter of this Agreement which is not contained herein shall be valid or binding upon all parties.

Budget Narrative

A. Personnel

The Project Administrative Assistant shall be responsible for the clerical functions of the Task Force and act as Administrative Assistant to the Project Manager. 100% of the Assistant's scheduled workweek will be dedicated to the Task Force. The duties of the Project Assistant include, but are not limited to: Telephone and office reception, coordinating mail-outs and mail distribution, work processing, record keeping, maintaining Task Force files, preparation of statistical reports on each investigator, compiling data from weekly reports, and maintain office and Public Awareness supplies for the Task Force, Project Assistant maintains the Task Force Expense Log, Salvage/Business Inspection Log, Property Inventory Log, and Task Force Case Assignment Log. The Project Assistant also schedules 68-A inspections and assists in the submission of quarterly Progress Reports and End of Year Reports to the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority or its Designee, following the approval of the report by the Task Force Manager. The Project Assistant will also be responsible for working with the Project Manager in the preparation of the Task Force Grant Proposal. The Project Investigator shall perform criminal investigations related to Auto Theft, Auto Burglary, Insurance Fraud and other relevant crimes; conduct salvage, business, auction, trades day and 68-A inspections. Investigator will apprehend and arrest suspects, develop intelligence information, attend intelligence meetings, conduct surveillance operations and covert operations. Project Investigator shall also conduct public service programs to inform the general public of methods to reduce the incidence of auto related crimes. Investigator shall conduct Liaison Activity with local officers and officials. Investigator shall provide instruction to local peace officers and officials as assigned. Project Investigator must hold a Texas Peace Officers license certified by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. Approximately 80% of the Investigator's time will be spent conducting investigations and related police activity, 15% performing inspections and 5% performing public awareness activities. The Investigator is a full time assignment to the Task Force. (Percentage of Time is based on at least a 40 hour work week.)

B. Fringe

Fringe from FICA, Retirement, Insurance, Workers Comp (Investigator), and Unemployment calculated from rates obtained through Smith County Auditor's Office in April 2024.

C. Overtime

\$1,000.00 for overtime has been requested for each Investigator assigned to the Task Force. This additional funding will assist the participating agencies cover the costs of call outs and unexpected investigations that occur and added fraud investigations.

D. Professional and Contract Services

The Project Director (Grantee) of the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force is charged with the responsibility of overseeing the activities of the Task Force within the guidelines of the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority, The Project Director of the Task Force is a Lieutenant with the Department of Public Safety (DPS). DPS has always paid the full salary, fringe, travel, vehicle, fuel and necessary equipment for the Project Director at no cost the MVCPA. These funds are now considered In-Kind match instead of previously being considered as Cash Match. The Project Director position is a full time assignment to the Task Force, provided as In-Kind Match. (Percentage of time is based on at least 40 hour work week.) He is responsible for the day to day administration and operation of the Task Force. The duties of the Project Manager include preparing written summaries of the activities of the Project Investigators and responding to requests for assistance from law enforcement agencies. The Project Manager is responsible for reviewing and approving reports produced by the Task Force. He is responsible, with the aid of the Project Administrative Assistant, for the preparation of the Project Grant application and its administration. The Project Manager is the first line supervisor of the personnel assigned to the Task Force. The Project Manager will be available to assist the Task Force Investigators in the performance of the assigned duties. The Project Manager shall be a licensed Texas Peace Officer certified by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. Approximately 80% of the Project Manager's time will be spent in Administration and Supervisory Activity. Approximately 10% will be spent in Public Awareness Activities and 10% in Investigation and Inspection Activity. The Project Investigators shall perform criminal investigations relating to Auto Theft, Auto Burglary, Insurance Fraud and other relevant crimes; conduct salvage, business, auction and 68-A inspections. Investigators will apprehend and arrest suspects, develop intelligence information, attend intelligence meetings, conduct surveillance operations and undercover operations, when applicable. Project Investigators shall also conduct public service programs to inform the general public of methods to reduce the incidence of auto theft and burglary. Investigators shall conduct Liaison Activity with local officers and officials. Investigators shall provide instruction to local peace officers and officials as assigned. Project Investigators must hold a Texas Peace Officers license certified by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. Approximately 80% of the Investigators time will be spent conducting investigations and related police activity, 15% performing inspections and 5% performing public awareness activities. The Investigator position is a full time assignment to the Task Force. (Percentage of time is based on at least a 40 hour work week.) Overtime in the amount of \$3,000.00 has been added to the application to help cover agency costs of call outs and additional motor vehicle crimes (fraud) investigations.

E. Travel

Four rooms for the TAVTI Convention \$140.00 (x) 4 investigators = \$560.00 (x) 4 days = \$2,240.00; per diem estimate at \$40.00 maximum per day per investigator (x) 4 investigators = \$160.00 (x) 4 days = \$640.00. Grant Introduction (Executive Summary) and General Information

1.1 Briefly describe the organization and program operation. Provide a high level summary to the application and how it will affect the local community. (500 words or less)

The Smith County - East Texas Auto Theft Task Force was established in the early 1990's and was one of the original Task Forces to receive a grant. The multi-jurisdictional Task Force is currently comprised of five participating law enforcement agencies that include Smith County, Rusk County, Henderson County, the City of Tyler, and The Texas Department of Public Safety. The Smith County District Attorney's Office participates by providing a cash match for an administrative assistant. The Task Force has as its Project Manager a Lieutenant provided by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Criminal Investigations Division, who has specialized training from the Department in motor vehicle theft crimes. There are four full time criminal investigators assigned to the multi-jurisdictional Task Force from the five participating agencies, dedicating 100% of their time as Task Force Investigators. These Investigators are licensed Texas Peace Officers with extensive specialized training in vehicle crimes investigation. Combined, these investigators, including the program manager, have over 100 years of experience as law enforcement officers and over 50 years of extensive specialized training as vehicle crimes investigators. The Investigators assigned to the ETATTF are some of

the only Investigators with specialized training in motor vehicle theft and vehicle identification, with the exception of few. The Task Force serves a three county project area with a population of approximately 384,446 (2023 Cubit). Within the three county project areas, there are 376,109 registered motor vehicles (2021 DMV). The Task Force, since its inception, has included the 14 counties within the East Texas Council of Governments (ETCOG) service area to answer calls for assistance. The population within the 14 counties that make up the ETCOG is 905,134 (2023 Cubit) and there are 860,717 registered vehicles (2021 DMV).

It is the intent of the ETATTF through this application to continue to serve the members of our community and state by carrying out the following programs made possible by MVCPA. While TF Investigators devote the majority of their efforts to the detection, investigation, recovery of stolen vehicles, and the arrest of vehicle crimes suspects, Investigators perform many other functions. TF Investigators are involved in prevention of vehicle related crimes by participating in community events, National Nights Out, college events, distributing literature, and conducting 68-A Inspections. TF Investigators routinely make efforts to reduce the sale of stolen vehicles and parts by alerting the public to schemes, conducting business inspections of businesses in the vehicle industry. TF Investigators work directly with TX DMV regional office in Longview and local tax offices. TF Investigators engage in educating the public by speaking at public events and meetings for organizations. The effect of the programs carried out by TF Investigators has an impact that ranges from emotional to economic. The citizens of our community know that there are Investigators with specialized training that investigate and apprehend vehicle crimes offenders. Law enforcement agencies know there are TF investigators who can be called on anytime to assist with vehicle related crimes and vehicle identification. Having a dedicated unit to address vehicle crimes has been invaluable to law enforcement and the community. Existing for 30 years, and continually receiving the support of local Sheriffs, Police Chiefs, District Attorneys. State Representatives and Senators from East Texas that have sponsored legislation in the past to deliver funding to MVCPA and the ETATTF demonstrates the impact and necessity of our Task Force.

1.2 Describe the taskforce governing, organization and command structures. Include a description of the nature of support and agreements that will be in place if the grant is awarded. Provide any details unique to the taskforce organization or geographical target area. The ETATTF is governed by a Board of Directors that was formed to allow agencies participating in the Task Force to monitor the effectiveness and efficiency of their personnel assigned to the Task Force, as well as that of the Task Force as a unit. The Board is composed of the Smith County District Attorney, the Smith County Sheriff, the City of Tyler Police Chief, the Rusk County Sheriff and the Henderson County Sheriff and the Smith County Judge as the authorized official. The Texas Department of Public Safety is represented through the Commander of the Task Force. Board meetings are scheduled on an as-needed basis by the Task Force Commander. The Commander maintains communication with the Board and keeps them apprised of Task Force activities. The Board has been instrumental in garnering support from State Representatives and Senators to sponsor legislation in support of the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force and MVCPA. It is the goal of both the Board and the Task Force to insure that the funds allocated to the Task Force by the MVCPA are used wisely and effectively to address the problem of vehicle crimes in the Project Area. The Commander of the Task Force assigns investigations from requesting agencies and organizations as they are made. Task Force Meetings are generally held weekly to discuss cases, intelligence, and significant activities. Each Investigator is assigned specific counties outside the project area to respond to calls for assistance and to conduct inspections and presentations. Many of the calls for assistance are made directly from agency investigators to Task Force Investigators as relationships have been established over many years. Outside the project area, most counties are rural with few investigators and none with specialized training in investigating auto crimes or identifying vehicles.

A cooperative work agreement has been signed by all participating agencies and all will sign an inter-local agreement. Many, if not all, of the 14 county ETCOG Sheriff's Departments will provide letters of support, along with some municipalities and Fire Marshalls Offices. An Agreement with the Smith County District attorneys office will be in effect so that seized funds may be retained by the ETATTF. There is no intent to serve a specific target population.

Grant Problem Statement

2.1 Provide an assessment of the burglary from a motor vehicle (including theft of parts) problem in the coverage area of this application. Include loss data consistent with the reported incident numbers above.

The ETATTF coverage area as it relates to BMV's and the theft of parts includes the 14 counties in the ETCOG and all the municipalities within. The combined population for the 14 counties was 905,134 in 2023 per Cubit. According to the State's supplemental data in NIBIRS, these agencies reported 1463 burglary of vehicles, and 576 incidents of stolen parts in 2022. In 2023 there were considerably less BMV's with 1260, with only 284 theft of parts reported. The cost associated with all BOV's in the 14 county area was well over\$1,000,000 and theft of parts was over\$1,000,000 in 2023.

The burglary from vehicles and theft of parts is often difficult too track and sporadic. The Task Force has identified the majority of vehicle burglaries occur at residences, apartment complexes, and venues with large parking lots. The majority occur in the warmer months of the year and of vehicles with items in plain sight. Many of the vehicle burglaries that occur in these areas are due to vehicles being left unlocked. There are cases documenting groups on surveillance recordings of thieves walking through neighborhoods followed by a chase car, checking every vehicle to see if it is locked. If it is not locked, they will commit the burglary. Sometimes this leads to the theft of the vehicles when a spare keys are found. Sometimes home burglaries will be committed later if house keys or garage door openers are found in vehicles. In our community, large industries such as hospital parking lots, businesses complexes, apartment complexes, and sporting locations draw large numbers of vehicles and people. These have historically been locations where a thief or thieves can remain anonymous and blend in with the law abiding public to commit burglaries. They are able to target vehicles, wait until no one is around and then burglarize the vehicle.

Citizens who fall victim to vehicle burglaries are lucky if it is only the loss of property. Many times door locks are defeated, windows are broken, and damage is done to the vehicle. In some instances firearms are stolen from vehicles and are used for other crimes or sold on the black market, placing citizens at risk of more violent crimes. The cost to the citizens of our community is not only calculated in dollars but also in feeling safe in their community. Victims of vehicle burglaries often not only lose their property, but increasingly their identities. The thefts of wallets and purses from vehicles put victims at risk of identity theft and having bank and credit information compromised. The cost of having a purse or wallet stolen can cost a victim countless hours away from work or family trying to repair the damage, not to mention real monetary losses associated with the theft.

2.2 Provide an assessment of the motor vehicle theft problem in the coverage area of this application. Include loss data consistent with the reported incident numbers above.

In most instances these vehicles thefts occur at citizens' residences, businesses, and in shopping centers and convenient stores. In many of these cases, vehicles have been left unlocked with keys where citizens feel safe and secure at their residence and in their community. Vehicle thefts from residences have led to additional crimes including residential burglaries. Conversely, residential and commercial burglaries have led to stolen vehicles when keys are found in the residences or buildings. The majority of thefts from shopping centers and convenient stores occur when citizens leave the vehicle running, unlocked, and unattended. Most of these thefts are committed by thieves of opportunity who simply need transportation from point A to point B, or to steal the contents of the vehicle. Another component to vehicle theft in the area is that of insurance fraud. In many instances, vehicles are reported stolen, only to be found stripped or burned. Some of these cases have been determined to be insurance fraud and arson cases. TF Investigators Collaborate with other LE agencies and Fire Marshalls offices on these investigations. Thefts of vehicles from car dealerships has also occurred with more frequency over the past few years, with the use of stolen or created key fobs. There has also been an increase in the theft of vehicle from dealerships via online purchase with stolen identities.

A common vehicle theft in our area is that of utility and enclosed trailers. Trailer thefts are as prevalent in our cities as they are in our rural areas. Many times trailers are stolen with mowing equipment and trade tools used by the victim to earn a living. They are stolen from business, construction sites and residences. Once stolen, they are easily altered and sold in other markets to unsuspecting purchasers.

Additionally, all-terrain vehicles, utility vehicles, farm tractors and implements, and construction equipment are stolen with a high frequency. Many of these vehicles are recovered with the identification numbers removed. It is necessary to have Investigators with specialized training and resources to identify these altered vehicles and equipment. These thefts have a huge economic impact and affect people's livelihoods in our communities, especially those who are uninsured.

- 2.3 Provide an assessment of the fraud-related motor vehicle crime problem in the coverage area of this application. Include loss data consistent with the reported incident numbers above.
 - For the ETATTF and the entire state, fraud related vehicle crimes to include: Title fraud, registration fraud, E-Tag, and other related fraud crimes involving vehicles. These crimes have increased through the years as technology advances. For the ETATTF participating and coverage areas there were a total of 46 fraud cases in 2022 and 89 in 2023 reported by Texas Department of Motor Vehicles (TXDMV), and TF captured statistics. These statistics are difficult to obtain and are poorly reported by agencies.
 - These cases, primarily Title fraud and registration fraud cases referred to the ETATTF by the Smith County tax office in which we share a building with and the TX DMV regional office in Longview which calls on the ETATTF to investigate fraud related vehicle crimes, primarily stolen vehicles sold with fictitious and washed titles. In the past most of these title frauds were done with the criminal washing a Titles. Now, most if not all of the Title fraud cases are done with computer generated Titles that appear on face value to be State issued legitimate Titles but in reality are fictitious. Currently most if not all of these stolen vehicles are Vin Switches/Clones. The loss associated with vehicle related fraud is difficult to analyze with limited data. However, if you consider that the majority of these stolen vehicles are late models vehicles 1-3 years old and average a value of \$30,000-\$40,000, the loss is significant. The majority of these cases come from vehicles sold with fictitious documents originating in other larger jurisdictions were collaboration with other MVCPA task forces is necessary. The innocent purchasers are generally responding to on-line adds and social media where the vehicles are listed well below market value and targeted to the Hispanic community. A second area that continues to increase is the purchase of vehicle from dealerships done entirely on-line with stolen identities. In these cases, the dealerships suffer a loss, the lender will likely suffer a loss, and the victim of ID theft suffers a loss that is not easily calculated but is substantial.
- 2.4 Provide an assessment of motor vehicle crime not covered above like insurance fraud, preventing stolen vehicles from entering Mexico, bridge/port stolen vehicle export crime, disruption of cartels and organized criminal enterprises related to motor vehicle crime, etc...
 - The Investigators for the ETATTF devote the majority of their time detecting and investigating vehicle thefts, building criminal cases and arresting suspects. This has lead to criminal cases that touch on other penal offenses that include fraud. These cases include Insurance fraud. Often vehicles are reported stolen never to be seen again, parted out or burned, so the owner doesn't have to continue to pay for the vehicle and receives an insurance settlement. TF Investigators will investigate these cases and collaborate with insurance companies whenever possible to solve these crimes. Many of these cases include the offense of filing a false report that task force investigators file in addition to fraud.

Another common problem in the geographical area covered by the ETATTF is the theft of trailers, atv's, farm equipment and implements. Many of these items are not registered of titled. Many have no identifying number or markings which makes them extremely difficult to recover much less report accurately as stolen.

Another problem that has occurred with frequency as of late is the issuing of buyers and Dealers E-tags from dealers and individuals not having sold the vehicles, we have investigated several of these cases in collaboration with TX DMV and have made arrests for these offenses.

To combat the problem of burglary of a motor vehicle in our project area, the ETATTF takes a proactive and reactive approach. Task Force Investigators believe that educating the citizens of our community is the most effective means of combatting vehicle burglaries and thefts through public awareness - the more people who are aware of the risks and know simple common sense solutions, the more they can minimize their exposure to burglary and thefts. Though TF investigators primary function is vehicle theft driven, TF investigators will investigate actionable cases of BOV and stolen parts, make arrests, and present cases for prosecution. The Task Force will continue to place parking lot signs in areas that are visible to pedestrian and vehicular traffic, such as apartment complexes, business parking lots, parks, boat ramps, shopping centers and locations with high incidents of vehicle burglaries. Task Force Investigators will seek opportunities and collaborate with other law enforcement agencies with intelligence sharing to prevent vehicle burglaries, parts thefts, solve investigations and arrest suspects.

The Task Force Investigators have established a large network with other investigators throughout the East Texas area. Information is shared through intelligence meetings, calls, and emails with many jurisdictions concerning not only vehicle burglaries and suspects, but most property crimes. Suspect information is shared and de-conflicted as many of the suspects are involved in many different crimes. Investigators routinely share information with other agencies through a restricted email system. This sharing of information has helped develop and identify suspects and solve crimes.

The Task Force will continue to collaborate with local and state law enforcement agencies to combat vehicle burglaries and use technology. This will be done by using analytical data from agencies as it is available and human intelligence to target areas with high frequencies of theft using bait vehicle operations. Task Force Investigators and participating agencies will deploy a vehicle containing items commonly stolen as bait with trackers when available. Investigators will conduct active surveillance of the vehicle. Arrests for burglary of a vehicle will be made as offenses occur.

To address the theft of vehicle parts, Task Force Investigators will conduct VIN Etching operations in collaboration with insurance companies and other entities when possible. Most Vin Etching operations are done in conjunction with "Watch Your Car" month. Business inspections of salvage yards, metal recyclers and auto repair shops will be performed to combat vehicle parts thefts.

3.2 Functions of the proposed program related to motor vehicle theft.

East Texas Auto Theft Task Force Investigators spend the majority of their time and efforts in the detection, investigation, identification, recovery of stolen vehicles, preparing cases, and arresting vehicle theft suspects. To combat the problem of vehicle theft the ETATTF takes both proactive and reactive approaches that include technology to reduce the incidences of economic vehicle theft in the East Texas area. One of the best approaches to combat vehicle thefts in our region is through intelligence sharing. Task Force Investigators have developed professional relationships with Investigators and officers from many local, state and federal agencies. These lines of communication are invaluable in solving not only vehicle crimes but also other related crimes, as offenders are opportunistic. Through these relationships intelligence in shared on trends and offenders who cross jurisdictions in their pursuit of crime. Intelligence is also shared and received from other MVCPA task forces, our local TAG unit, and the VCC.

To combat vehicle theft in general in our project area and the 14 county coverage area, Task Force members will educate as many citizens as possible through social media, community events, presentations, the news media, and crime prevention meetings on auto theft, burglary prevention and training investigators and patrol officers on stolen vehicle recognition and ID. To target vehicle theft in specific areas such as residential areas and apartment complexes, sporting complexes and businesses, Task Force Investigators will employ the above listed strategies and post signs and banners. These signs and banners remind citizens to always lock their vehicles and never leave anything in sight. The ETATTF also responds to LPR hits and conducts surveillance and covert operations with local LE when the stolen vehicle is located. If unable to respond the proper agency will be notified of the stolen vehicle. Flock cameras which the ETATTF access to over 36, and ring camera have been successful in identifying stolen vehicles and identifying suspects.

Task Force Investigators will monitor trends throughout East Texas and the state to prepare for and combat theft by professional thieves and organized criminals. Investigators will warn members of the auto industry when it is warranted to prevent crimes. When crimes occur, Investigators will develop investigative leads and suspects through investigations, intelligence gathering and information sharing. To identify and arrest offenders, investigators will utilize informants and analytical data when possible. Investigators will request and utilize bait vehicles from other agencies when available and necessary to address specific vehicle theft problems. The use of Task force and DPS pole cameras and trackers will be used when necessary to further investigations and record evidence of thefts or suspect locations.

The problem of insurance fraud and vehicle theft are often interrelated. Often times they also include the related crimes of arson and false reporting. Cars found burned or stripped in our multijurisdictional area are sometimes proven to be insurance frauds. Other times they are stolen for parts. When Investigators become aware of trends of particular models of vehicles being stolen, parted out or burned, information will be shared with local and state agencies to share information and develop leads and suspects. Many times we work collaboratively with Fire Marshalls offices. Vin etching programs will be conducted as a deterrent to vehicle theft.

One of the most common and problematic thefts in our geographical area are trailer thefts. All-terrain vehicles, utility vehicles, tractors and implements are also stolen at a high frequency. To address this problem, Investigators will deploy seized and purchased bait trailers with a trackers. This will be done in targeted areas where these thefts are occurring with regularity. The TF also has access to a DPS tracker equipped ATV that will be utilized as bait in conjunction with the trailers. They have been used with success in identifying suspects, making arrests and presenting cases for prosecution. The TF also partners with TPWD game wardens to deploy atv/trailer and watercraft/trailer.

Task Force Investigators will address the vehicle theft problem in the 14 county East Texas Council of Governments with public awareness strategies, analytical data as applicable, use of informants, intelligence, use of technology, training law enforcement and knowing the prolific offenders. Task Force Investigators will advocate for the use of anti-theft deterrents on vehicles and trailers.

3.3 Functions of the proposed program related to fraud-related motor vehicle crime (such as title and registration fraud)

ETATTF investigators will continue to respond to our local tax offices and the DMV regional Office in Longview to investigate title and registration frauds that they send directly to ETATTF investigators. These cases usually involve an innocent purchaser, buying a stolen vehicle that is presented with what appears to be a good clean title and a copy of the seller's ID which is fictitious. These cases usually originate in jurisdictions

such as Dallas and Houston and our investigators work collaboratively with other task forces to try and ID the suspects and make arrests.

Another common and increasing trend is the online purchase of vehicles and atv's from dealerships where no physical contact is ever made. The suspect using a stolen Identity, purchases a vehicle with the victims stolen credit and takes delivery using a patsy. Usually several weeks pass before the crime is realized. This crimes can in the end cost the victim, lender and dealership wasted time to correct the problem and thousands of dollars in loss. We have educated our dealers and have been able to thwart the thefts and alert the victims of the ID thefts. When possible as in the past will at the allowance of the dealer, make delivery of the vehicle, have the suspect sign the documents and make arrest.

Task Force Investigator have and will continue to work with the newly formed TX DMV Investigators related to fraud cases. TF investigators will collaborate with these investigators on cases where violations have been committed in our jurisdiction. The cases we have collaborated on in the past have involved fraud (falsifying government documents) when rebuilders submitted false affidavits, and larger theft rings throughout the state. TF investigators will continue to collaborate and file these cases as requested. We have also successfully investigated E-tag sales from individuals with TX DMV from Longview. UC buys have been made resulting in arrests, fines and the loss of E-Tag production.

3.4 Functions of the proposed program related to preventing motor vehicle crime (motor vehicle theft, burglary from a motor vehicle and fraud-related motor vehicle crime)

The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force believes citizens educated in vehicle crimes can be the best allies in preventing burglaries of vehicles, vehicle thefts and crime in general. Citizens who employ simple, common sense strategies to harden their property, themselves, and their assets against theft are exponentially less likely to become victims. They become assets in and of themselves by being aware of their surroundings and reporting suspicious activities to law enforcement.

By conducting crime prevention educational presentations to different venues the Task Force Investigators begin this educational process. Task Force Investigators seek to deliver these presentations to civic organizations, church groups, clubs, neighborhood watch groups or any individual who asks. Information is presented on trends to combat specific problems in the area. Ideas on strategies of preventing vehicle crimes and crime in general are discussed. MVCPA literature and promotional items are distributed to participants and are placed at many public building throughout the East Texas area. Task Force Investigators attend "National Night Out" events, community events, festivals, tradeshows, and college campuses. TF investigators set up booths and display vehicles, banners and signs. It's a great opportunity to meet with individuals at these events to share ways of protecting one's property from theft and fraud related activities. Alarms, cameras, locking devices, hitch locks, are advocated as well as placing vehicles and property out of view from roadways and view. At many of these events we will often receive requests from other law enforcement agencies to participate with us.

Another way the Task Force addresses vehicle related crimes and theft is to utilize different forms of media when applicable. Task Force Investigators give interviews to the news media by commenting on particular crimes or addressing the issue of a particular crimes to be prevented. Social media is utilized to inform citizens of events and trends in thefts and ways to keep from falling victim to online schemes involving title frauds and purchasing stolen vehicles. Social media is also used to recover stolen property, identify offenders, and make arrests.

The Task force utilizes an MVCPA "Watch Your Car" signs placed in areas with high volumes of traffic and public properties to remind the community of their responsibility to conceal and protect their property. Placards are placed in business parking lots, government properties, apartment and sport complexes to achieve the same goals of reminding citizens to protect their property. Signs are also given to other LE agencies to display where appropriate.

Task Force Investigators (TCOLE certified instructors) deliver multiple TCOLE and Non-TCOLE training courses to law enforcement officers and investigators. These courses are related to vehicle crimes and prevention. Many of our rural counties in the 14 county ETCOG have investigators who have limited training on vehicle crimes. Once educated, the investigators act as a force multiplier to prevent and detect vehicle crimes. TF Investigators also teach courses to cadets at two local police academies on stolen vehicle recognition and detection. These cadets once certified police officers have a broad knowledge of stolen vehicle recognition.

3.5 Functions of the proposed program for other motor vehicle crimes investigations and activities consistent with the statutory requirements (preventing stolen vehicles from entering Mexico, stopping illegal export of stolen vehicle from bridge/ outbound port operations, disruption of cartel or organized criminal enterprises using stolen motor vehicles or fraud related motor vehicle crime, insurance fraud, etc...)

Much of the ETATTF coverage area is rural and agricultural. With that there are high incidents of trailer, tractor, implements and atv/utv thefts. To Combat these theft we have collaborated with local LE and deployed bait trailers, tractors when available, and ATV's with trackers installed to be able to track the unit if stolen. When can also deploy a pole camera to assist in identifying vehicles used and possibly ID suspect. We also recommend parking equipment out of sight and using hitch locks as preventative measures, when we attend public events or speak to organizations.

TF members are actively looking for ties to vehicle crimes that would be considered organized crime. Some of these problems involve insurance frauds and arsons where vehicle a falsely reported as stolen and dumped and or burned. TF investigators work closely with insurance investigators and Fire Marshall's office to solve these crimes and make arrest. Using technology in some of these cases has proved successful by using geo locates and cell tower information to tie the crime to the owner and make arrests. It is also being used to try and identify suspects in wheel and tire thefts We will continue to receive training and use assets from DPS, analysts, and local IT to further leverage technology to solve crimes.

For abandoned vehicles and parts that are stolen, many are parted out or go to a crusher. Inspections of auto related businesses and salvage businesses are performed as a deterrent. We will follow all leads and seek out information from informants to combat organized criminal activity.

The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force is the only Task Force in the State with a DPS, Criminal Investigations Division, Lieutenant, as the Commander. The Commander is provided at no expense to MVCPA or the TF, in "Lieu of Cash" making it possible for our participating agencies to better afford having highly trained specialized Investigators on the Task Force. DPS provides a vehicle, fuel and all other equipment, which

allows more of the grant award to be expended on vehicle crime. Because of my role as a DPS Investigator and Commander of the Task Force, I am able to bridge a gap and bring assets such as statewide networks of investigators, databases, training, technology, personnel to address vehicle crimes. DPS has committed other resources, equipment, and Special Agents to collaborate on BOV and theft operations, leveraging resources to solve crimes, arrest offenders and submit cases for prosecution. There is no duplication of activities as we do not cover the same area as many single agency task forces.

Task Force Investigators having established relationships with local, state, and federal law enforcement and are often contacted, consulted, and brought into investigation when they involve stolen vehicles or the potential for stolen vehicles through fraud. Task Force Investigators are often called to assist these agencies when search warrants are executed. As a result, on numerous occasions, many stolen vehicles and property has been recovered and suspects identified. Task Force Investigators have attended before the pandemic quarterly multi-state and multi-agency ROCIC intelligence meetings to collaborate on cross jurisdictional vehicle theft and burglary trends and suspects. The Task Force seeks to coordinate its activities with other MVCPA Task Forces, as well as Agents employed by the Department of Public Safety and Agents employed by the National Insurance Crime Bureau. The ETATTF will continue to seek and share intelligence regarding auto thefts and burglaries with other local agencies and MVCPA funded programs to stop auto related crimes. Bait vehicles and BOV bait items will be used in collaborative operations with Tyler P.D, TPWD theft Unit, and DPS targeting BOV and vehicle theft offenders

Task Force Investigators will continue to coordinate with tax assessors-collectors offices and the regional DMV office in Longview regarding suspected Title frauds, stolen vehicles, and suspects. TF Investigators have collaborated with the DMV Investigators, and have filed cases in our jurisdiction. Several calls for assistance from tax offices have developed into Title fraud investigations that have resulted in fraud cases filed and stolen vehicles recovered. Because most of our region is comprised of rural communities and municipalities, these law enforcement agencies have little if any specialized training and are generally understaffed. Task Force Investigators will continue to coordinate and collaborate on investigation within our region by analyzing data when available to target vehicle crimes in these jurisdictions. TF Investigators will continue to offer training on stolen vehicle recognition to law enforcement in collaboration with our colleges and police academies.

The ETATTF utilizes several local intel exchanges covering this region and areas outside our coverage area that share information of theft suspects and BOLO's. TF Investigators will also participate in the VCC to promote and share information with other TF programs to combat vehicle crimes.

A Weekly Report of Investigative Activity is in use to capture the activities of each Task Force Investigator. The report reflects the number of theft and burglary cases assigned, arrests made, cases filed, cases cleared, vehicles inspected, altered vehicles identified, number of 68-A completed, agency assists, and the number of stolen vehicles and parts recovered and their value, and fraud related cases received or investigated. A narrative of each day's activity is also include in the report.

A separate google sheet spreadsheet is completed by each investigator as it relates to the Goals and Strategies selected and those performed but not part of elected goals. The spreadsheet mirrors the progress report Goals and Strategies section and it tabulates the activity automatically. The Commander reviews this data for accuracy and completeness. The Administrative Assistant then enters the data into the Task Force Data Base. The data is then compiled into monthly reports. Each quarter the data is compared to the Project Goals, set forth in the Task Force Grant, to insure it is meeting or exceeding its goals. Should the Task Force not meet a goal in a given quarter, corrective action is taken. At the end of the Grant Cycle, the End of Year Report is compiled and again compared to the Proposed Project Objectives to determine if all objectives set were achieved. The End of Year Report is then forwarded to the MVCPA, as well as reviewed by the Board of Directors and the Task Force Commander's DPS Chain of Command. The participating agencies and Task Force Commander review the work of Investigators, statistics, and data collected for the UCR to determine the effectiveness of the programs, and where goals need to be shifted.

The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force has benefited the East Texas community for 30 years as evidenced by the Sheriff's, Police Chiefs, District Attorneys' offices, and DPS willingness to continue to contribute personnel and funding. All of these agencies have had several elections and administrative changes over the quarter century and remain committed to the Task Force and Community. These officials have been instrumental in garnering the support of State Senators and Representatives to fight for and sponsor funding legislation for the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force and MVCPA. The benefits of maintaining an Auto Crimes Task Force in East Texas is evident to them and the community.

TF investigators have been asked to teach a similar TCOLE class by a local Sheriff where their CID and patrol deputies will received some specialized training to combat vehicle thefts. WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> have the objective to participate in a combined task force funded by the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority (MVCPA) of the State of Texas, in the amount of \$32,000 for the <u>East Texas Auto Theft Task Force</u>, and,

WHEREAS, the <u>City</u> has agreed to contribute the total of \$1,333 in matching funds if said grant application is approved; and,

WHEREAS, the source of funds would not normally be used for this purpose; and,

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> believe it to be in their best interests to continue a <u>multijurisdictional MVCPA</u> <u>Task Force</u>; and

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> agree to each accept the responsibility and to adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws or regulations

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE

1.01 The purpose of this Agreement is to allow the <u>County</u> (Grantee) to file an application for a grant with the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority (Agency), which application is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof for all purposes.

ARTICLE II. TERM

2.01 The term of this Agreement is to commence on September 1, 2024 and to end August 31, 2025.

Grant Introduction (Executive Summary) and General Information

- 1.1 Briefly describe the organization and program operation. Provide a high level summary to the application and how it will affect the local community. (500 words or less)
 - The Smith County East Texas Auto Theft Task Force was established in the early 1990's and was one of the original Task Forces to receive a grant. The multi-jurisdictional Task Force is currently comprised of five participating law enforcement agencies that include Smith County, Rusk County, Henderson County, the City of Tyler, and The Texas Department of Public Safety. The Smith County District Attorney's Office participates by providing a cash match for an administrative assistant. The Task Force has as its Project Manager a Lieutenant provided by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Criminal Investigations Division, who has specialized training from the Department in motor vehicle theft crimes. There are four full time criminal investigators assigned to the multi-jurisdictional Task Force from the four participating agencies, dedicating 100% of their time as Task Force Investigators. These Investigators are licensed Texas Peace Officers with extensive specialized training in vehicle crimes investigation. Combined, these investigators, including the program manager, have over 100 years of experience as law enforcement officers and over 50 years of extensive specialized training as vehicle crimes investigators. The Investigators assigned to the ETATTF are some of the only Investigators with specialized training in motor vehicle theft and vehicle identification, with the exception of few. The Task Force serves a three county project area with a population of approximately 365,688 (2022 Tex. demographics). Within the three county project areas, there are 376,109 registered motor vehicles (2021 DMV). The Task Force, since its inception, has included the 14 counties within the East Texas Council of Governments (ETCOG) service area to answer calls for assistance. The population within the 14 counties that make up the ETCOG is 867,823 (2022 Tex. Demographics) and there are 860717 registered vehicles (2021 DMV). The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force has been able to retain highly trained auto crimes investigators who have been assigned to the Task Force for years. This allows Task Force Investigators to develop and maintain professional relationships with law enforcement, industry, citizens, and business owners. It is the intent of the ETATTF through this application to continue to serve the members of our community and state by carrying out the following programs made possible by MVCPA. While TF Investigators devote the majority of their efforts to the detection, investigation, recovery of stolen vehicles, and the arrest of vehicle crimes suspects, Investigators perform many other functions. TF Investigators are involved in prevention of vehicle related crimes by participating in community events, National Nights Out, college events, distributing literature, conducting 68-A Inspections, assist investigating catalytic converter theft, and conduct business/MR inspections . TF Investigators engage in educating the public by speaking at public events and meetings for organizations. The effect of the programs carried out by TF Investigators has an impact that ranges from emotional to economic. The citizens of our community know that there are Investigators with specialized training that investigate and apprehend vehicle crimes offenders. Law enforcement agencies know there are TF investigators who can be called on anytime to assist with vehicle related crimes and vehicle identification. Having a dedicated unit to address vehicle crimes has been invaluable to law enforcement and the community. Existing for 30 years, and continually receiving the support of local Sheriffs, Police Chiefs, District Attorneys.
- 1.2 Describe the taskforce governing, organization and command structures. Include a description of the nature of support and agreements that will be in place if the grant is awarded.  - The ETATTF is governed by a Board of Directors that was formed to allow agencies participating in the Task Force to monitor the effectiveness and efficiency of their personnel assigned to the Task Force, as well as that of the Task Force as a unit. The Board is composed of the Smith County District Attorney, the Smith County Sheriff, the City of Tyler Police Chief, the Rusk County Sheriff and the Henderson County Sheriff and the Smith County Judge as the authorized official. The Texas Department of Public Safety is represented through the Commander of the Task Force. Board meetings are scheduled on an as-needed basis by the Task Force Commander. The Commander maintains communication with the Board and keeps them apprised of Task Force activities. The Board has been instrumental in garnering support from State Representatives and Senators to sponsor legislation in support of the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force and MVCPA. It is the goal of both the Board and the Task Force to insure that the funds allocated to the Task Force by the MVCPA are used wisely and effectively to address the problem of vehicle crimes in the Project Area. The Commander of the Task Force assigns investigations from requesting agencies and organizations as they are made. Task Force Meetings are generally held weekly to discuss cases, intelligence, and significant activities. Each Investigator is assigned specific counties outside the project area to respond to calls for assistance and to conduct inspections and presentations. Many of the calls for assistance are made directly from agency investigators to Task Force Investigators as relationships have been established over many years. Outside the project area, most counties are rural with few investigators and none with specialized training in investigating auto crimes or identifying vehicles. A

cooperative work agreement has been signed by all participating agencies and all will sign an inter-local agreement. There is no intent to serve a specific target population.

Grant Problem Statement

2,1 Provide an assessment of the Catalytic Converter Theft problem in the coverage area of this application. Include loss data consistent with the reported incident numbers above.

The ETATTF coverage area as it relates to catalytic converter and the theft of parts includes the 14 counties in the ETCOG and all the municipalities within. The combined population for the 14 counties was 867,823 in 2022 per Cubit. According to the State's supplemental data in NIBIRS, these agencies reported 439 incidents of stolen parts in 2021. In 2022 there were more theft of parts at 576 and 175 incidents of catalytic converter thefts. The cost associated with Theft of parts in the 14 county area was \$1,343,682 in 2022. The theft of catalytic converters/parts is often difficult too track and sporadic in nature. The city of Tyler is the only agency that tracks actual CC thefts cases by coding, with 112 incidents in 2022 and 47 in 2023. The Smith County SO per their analyst reported 48 CC thefts in 2022, and 52 CC theft in 2023. This is believed to be a low non-accurate representation of the CC Theft problem in the area. Many of which have multiple thefts per case reported and many thefts go unreported. The other participating agencies have not tracked CC theft specifically, but will attempt to instituted a coding system in the future. The Task Force has identified the majority of catalytic convert thefts occur at apartment complexes, and venues with large parking lots. In our community, large industries such as hospital parking lots, businesses complexes, apartment complexes, and sporting locations draw large numbers of vehicles and people. These have historically been locations where a thief or thieves can remain anonymous and blend in with the law abiding public to commit catalytic converter thefts and vehicle burglaries. They are able to target vehicles, wait until no one is around and then commit the crime(s). The cost of having vehicle parts stolen can cause a victim to spend countless hours away from work or family trying to repair the damage, not to mention real monetary losses associated with the theft.

3.1 Functions of the proposed program related to Catalytic Converter Theft from a motor vehicle.

To combat the problem of catalytic theft and vehicle parts in our project area, the ETATTF will take a proactive and reactive approach. Task Force Investigators believe that educating the citizens of our community is the most effective means of combatting vehicle burglaries and thefts through public awareness - the more people who are aware of the risks and know simple solutions, the more they can minimize their exposure to catalytic converter thefts, BOV and vehicle thefts. Though TF investigators primary function is vehicle theft driven, TF investigators will investigate actionable cases of catalytic converter thefts, stolen parts, make arrests, and present cases for prosecution. Task Force Investigators will seek opportunities and collaborate with other law enforcement agencies with intelligence sharing to prevent catalytic thefts, vehicle burglaries, parts thefts, solve investigations and arrest suspects. The Task Force Investigators have established a large network with other investigators throughout the East Texas area. Information will be shared through intelligence meetings, calls, and emails with many jurisdictions concerning catalytic converter thefts and suspects and other vehicle crimes. The Task Force will continue to collaborate with local and state law enforcement agencies including DPS Regulatory to combat catalytic converter thefts and conduct regulatory inspections of metal recyclers. Task Force Investigators and participating agencies will deploy a LPR's near recycler facilities and areas determined to have high incidents of CC thefts. Task Force Investigators in collaboration with partners can conduct Etching programs. Business inspections of salvage yards, metal recyclers, and auto repair shops will be performed to combat catalytic converter and vehicle parts thefts.

3.4 Functions of the proposed program related to preventing Catalytic Converter Theft

The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force believes citizens educated in vehicle crimes can be the best allies in preventing catalytic converter thefts, burglaries of vehicles, vehicle thefts, and crime in general. Citizens who employ simple, common sense strategies to harden their property, themselves, and their assets against theft are exponentially less likely to become victims. They become assets in and of themselves by being aware of their surroundings and their exposure. By conducting crime prevention educational presentations to different venues the Task Force Investigators begin this educational process. Task Force Investigators seek to deliver these presentations to civic organizations, church groups, clubs, neighborhood watch groups or any individual who asks. Information is presented on trends to combat specific problems in the area. Ideas on strategies of preventing vehicle crimes and crime in general are discussed. MVCPA literature and promotional items are distributed to participants and are placed at many public building throughout the East Texas area. Task Force Investigators attend "National Night Out" events, community events, festivals, tradeshows, and college campuses. TF investigators set up booths and display vehicles, banners and signs. It's a great opportunity to meet with individuals at these events to share ways of protecting one's property from theft and fraud related activities. The Task Force will utilize different forms of media when applicable in preventing catalytic converter thefts and vehicle crimes. Task Force Investigators give interviews to the news media by commenting on particular crimes or addressing the issue of a particular crimes to be prevented.

3.6 Collaboration Effort -- Describe the taskforce method to collaborate, and not duplicate existing activities. Describe the cross boundaries regional approach to grant activity implementation. Describe how the applicant staff and jurisdiction will coordinate with other taskforces and law enforcement agencies to implement this program.

The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force is the only Task Force in the State with a DPS, Criminal Investigations Division, Lieutenant, as the Commander. Because of my role as a DPS Investigator and Commander of the Task Force, I am able to bridge a gap and bring assets such as statewide networks of investigators, databases, training, technology, personnel to address vehicle crimes. The TF will assist and work with other agencies including DPS regulatory services to combat catalytic converter thefts. There is no duplication of activities as we do not cover the same

area as many single agency task forces. Task Force Investigators having established relationships with local, state, and federal law enforcement and are often contacted, consulted, and brought into investigation involving vehicle crimes. Task Force Investigators attended quarterly multi-state and multi-agency ROCIC intelligence meetings to collaborate on cross jurisdictional vehicle theft and burglary trends and suspects. The Task Force seeks to coordinate its activities with other MVCPA Task Forces, as well as Agents employed by the Department of Public Safety and Agents employed by the National Insurance Crime Bureau. The ETATTF will continue to seek and share intelligence regarding catalytic converter thefts and motor vehicle crimes with other local agencies and MVCPA funded programs to stop auto related crimes. Because most of our region is comprised of rural communities and municipalities, these law enforcement agencies have little if any specialized training and are generally understaffed. Task Force Investigators will continue to coordinate and collaborate on investigation within our region by analyzing data when available to target catalytic converter thefts and vehicle crimes in these jurisdictions. The ETATTF utilizes several local intel exchanges covering this region and areas outside our coverage area that share information of theft suspects and BOLO's.

A Weekly Report of Investigative Activity is in use to capture the activities of each Task Force Investigator. The report reflects the number of theft and burglary cases assigned, arrests made, cases filed, cases cleared, vehicles inspected, altered vehicles identified, number of 68-A completed,

agency assists, and the number of stolen vehicles and parts recovered and their value, and fraud related cases received or investigated. A narrative of each day's activity is also include in the report. A separate google sheet spreadsheet is completed by each investigator as it relates to the Goals and Strategies selected and those performed but not part of elected goals. The spreadsheet mirrors the progress report Goals and Strategies section and it tabulates the activity automatically. The Commander reviews this data for accuracy and completeness. The Administrative Assistant then enters the data into the Task Force Data Base. The data is then compiled into monthly reports. Each quarter the data is compared to the Project Goals, set forth in the Task Force Grant, to insure it is meeting or exceeding its goals. Should the Task Force not meet a goal in a given quarter, corrective action is taken. At the end of the Grant Cycle, the End of Year Report is compiled and again compared to the Proposed Project Objectives to determine if all objectives set were achieved. The End of Year Report is then forwarded to the MVCPA, as well as reviewed by the Board of Directors and the Task Force Commander's DPS Chain of Command. The participating agencies and Task Force Commander review the work of Investigators, statistics, and data collected for the UCR to determine the effectiveness of the programs, and where goals need to be shifted.

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Interlocal Agreement SB 224 2024 State of Texas

This Agreement is entered into by and between the <u>County of Smith</u>, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, hereinafter referred to as "County" and the <u>City of Tyler</u>, a municipal corporation situated in Smith County, Texas, hereinafter called "City" pursuant to the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Texas Government Code, Chapter 791.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> have the objective to participate in a combined task force funded by the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority (MVCPA) of the State of Texas, in the amount of \$185,804.00 for the <u>East</u> Texas Auto <u>Theft Task Force</u>, and,

WHEREAS, the <u>City</u> has agreed to contribute the total of <u>\$0.00</u> in matching funds if said grant application is approved; and,

WHEREAS, the source of funds would not normally be used for this purpose; and,

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> believe it to be in their best interests to continue a <u>multijurisdictional MVCPA</u> <u>Task Force</u>; and

WHEREAS, the <u>County</u> and <u>City</u> agree to each accept the responsibility and to adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws or regulations

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE I. PURPOSE

1.01 The purpose of this Agreement is to allow the <u>County</u> (Grantee) to file an application for a grant with the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority (Agency), which application is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof for all purposes.

ARTICLE II. TERM

2.01 The term of this Agreement is to commence on September 1, 2024 and to end August 31, 2025.

ARTICLE III. CONSIDERATION

ARTICLE VIII. UNIFORM ASSURANCES

 - The Smith County East Texas Auto Theft Task Force was established in the early 1990's and was one of the original Task Forces to receive a grant. The multi-jurisdictional Task Force is currently comprised of five participating law enforcement agencies that include Smith County, Rusk County, Henderson County, the City of Tyler, and The Texas Department of Public Safety. The Smith County District Attorney's Office participates by providing a cash match for an administrative assistant. The Task Force has as its Project Manager a Lieutenant provided by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Criminal Investigations Division, who has specialized training from the Department in motor vehicle theft crimes. There are four full time criminal investigators assigned to the multi-jurisdictional Task Force from the four participating agencies, dedicating 100% of their time as Task Force Investigators. These Investigators are licensed Texas Peace Officers with extensive specialized training in vehicle crimes investigation. Combined, these investigators, including the program manager, have over 100 years of experience as law enforcement officers and over 50 years of extensive specialized training as vehicle crimes investigators. The Investigators assigned to the ETATTF are some of the only Investigators with specialized training in motor vehicle theft and vehicle identification, with the exception of few. The Task Force serves a three county project area with a population of approximately 365,688 (2022 Tex. demographics). Within the three county project areas, there are 376,109 registered motor vehicles (2021 DMV). The Task Force, since its inception, has included the 14 counties within the East Texas Council of Governments (ETCOG) service area to answer calls for assistance. The population within the 14 counties that make up the ETCOG is 867,823 (2022 Tex. Demographics) and there are 860717 registered vehicles (2021 DMV). The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force has been able to retain highly trained auto crimes investigators who have been assigned to the Task Force for years. This allows Task Force Investigators to develop and maintain professional relationships with law enforcement, industry, citizens, and business owners. It is the intent of the ETATTF through this application to continue to serve the members of our community and state by carrying out the following programs made possible by MVCPA. While TF Investigators devote the majority of their efforts to the detection, investigation, recovery of stolen vehicles, and the arrest of vehicle crimes suspects, Investigators perform many other functions. TF Investigators are involved in prevention of vehicle related crimes by participating in community events, National Nights Out, college events, distributing literature, conducting 68-A Inspections, assist investigating catalytic converter theft, and conduct business/MR inspections. TF Investigators engage in educating the public by speaking at public events and meetings for organizations. The effect of the programs carried out by TF Investigators has an impact that ranges from emotional to economic. The citizens of our community know that there are Investigators with specialized training that investigate and apprehend vehicle crimes offenders. Law enforcement agencies know there are TF investigators who can be called on anytime to assist with vehicle related crimes and vehicle identification. Having a dedicated unit to address vehicle crimes has been invaluable to law enforcement and the community. Existing for 30 years, and continually receiving the support of local Sheriffs, Police Chiefs, District Attorneys.

The ETATTF is governed by a Board of Directors that was formed to allow agencies participating in the Task Force to monitor the effectiveness and efficiency of their personnel assigned to the Task Force, as well as that of the Task Force as a unit. The Board is composed of the Smith County District Attorney, the Smith County Sheriff, the City of Tyler Police Chief, the Rusk County Sheriff and the Henderson County Sheriff and the Smith County Judge as the authorized official. The Texas Department of Public Safety is represented through the Commander of the Task Force, Board meetings are scheduled on an as-needed basis by the Task Force Commander. The Commander maintains communication with the Board and keeps them apprised of Task Force activities. The Board has been instrumental in garnering support from State Representatives and Senators to sponsor legislation in support of the East Texas Auto Theft Task Force and MVCPA. It is the goal of both the Board and the Task Force to insure that the funds allocated to the Task Force by the MVCPA are used wisely and effectively to address the problem of vehicle crimes in the Project Area. The Commander of the Task Force assigns investigations from requesting agencies and organizations as they are made. Task Force Meetings are generally held weekly to discuss cases, intelligence, and significant activities. Each Investigator is assigned specific counties outside the project area to respond to calls for assistance and to conduct inspections and presentations. Many of the calls for assistance are made directly from agency investigators to Task Force Investigators as relationships have been established over many years. Outside the project area, most counties are rural with few investigators and none with specialized training in investigating auto crimes or identifying vehicles. A cooperative work agreement has been signed by all participating agencies and all will sign an inter-local agreement. There is no intent to serve a specific target population.

Grant Problem Statement

2.1 Provide an assessment of the Catalytic Converter Theft problem in the coverage area of this application. Include loss data consistent with the reported incident numbers above.

The ETATTF coverage area as it relates to catalytic converter and the theft of parts includes the 14 counties in the ETCOG and all the municipalities within. The combined population for the 14 counties was 867,823 in 2022 per Cubit. According to the State's supplemental data in NIBIRS, these agencies reported 439 incidents of stolen parts in 2021. In 2022 there were more theft of parts at 576 and 175 incidents of catalytic converter thefts. The cost associated with Theft of parts in the 14 county area was \$1,343,682 in 2022. The theft of catalytic converters/parts is often difficult too track and sporadic in nature. The city of Tyler is the only agency that tracks actual CC thefts cases by coding, with 112 incidents in 2022 and 47 in 2023. The Smith County SO per their analyst reported 48 CC thefts in 2022, and 52 CC theft in 2023. This is believed to be a low non-accurate representation of the CC Theft problem in the area. Many of which have multiple thefts per case reported and many thefts go unreported. The other participating agencies have not tracked CC theft specifically, but will attempt to instituted a coding system in the future. The Task Force has identified the majority of catalytic convert thefts occur at apartment complexes, and venues with large parking lots. In our community, large industries such as hospital parking lots, businesses complexes, apartment complexes, and sporting locations draw large numbers of vehicles and people. These have historically been locations where a thief or thieves can remain anonymous and blend in with the law abiding public to commit catalytic converter thefts and vehicle burglaries. They are able to target vehicles, wait until no one is around and then commit the crime(s). The cost of having vehicle parts stolen can cause a victim to spend countless hours away from work or family trying to repair the damage, not to mention real monetary losses associated with the theft.

3.1 Functions of the proposed program related to Catalytic Converter Theft from a motor vehicle.

To combat the problem of catalytic theft and vehicle parts in our project area, the ETATTF will take a proactive and reactive approach. Task Force Investigators believe that educating the citizens of our community is the most effective means of combatting vehicle burglaries and thefts through public awareness - the more people who are aware of the risks and know simple solutions, the more they can minimize their exposure to catalytic converter thefts, BOV and vehicle thefts. Though TF investigators primary function is vehicle theft driven, TF investigators will investigate actionable cases of catalytic converter thefts, stolen parts, make arrests, and present cases for prosecution. Task Force Investigators will seek opportunities and collaborate with other law enforcement agencies with intelligence sharing to prevent catalytic thefts, vehicle burglaries, parts thefts, solve investigations and arrest suspects. The Task Force Investigators have established a large network with other investigators throughout the East Texas area. Information will be shared through intelligence meetings, calls, and emails with many jurisdictions concerning catalytic converter thefts and suspects and other vehicle crimes. The Task Force will continue to collaborate with local and state law enforcement agencies including DPS Regulatory to combat catalytic converter thefts and conduct regulatory inspections of metal recyclers. Task Force Investigators and participating agencies will deploy a LPR's near recycler facilities and areas determined to have high incidents of CC thefts. Task Force Investigators in collaboration with partners can conduct Etching programs. Business inspections of salvage yards, metal recyclers, and auto repair shops will be performed to combat catalytic converter and vehicle parts thefts.

3.4 Functions of the proposed program related to preventing Catalytic Converter Theft

The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force believes citizens educated in vehicle crimes can be the best allies in preventing catalytic converter thefts, burglaries of vehicles, vehicle thefts, and crime in general. Citizens who employ simple, common sense strategies to harden their property, themselves, and their assets against theft are exponentially less likely to become victims. They become assets in and of themselves by being aware of their surroundings and their exposure. By conducting crime prevention educational presentations to different venues the Task Force Investigators begin this educational process. Task Force Investigators seek to deliver these presentations to civic organizations, church groups, clubs, neighborhood watch groups or any individual who asks. Information is presented on trends to combat specific problems in the area. Ideas on strategies of preventing vehicle crimes and crime in general are discussed. MVCPA literature and promotional items are distributed to participants and are placed at many public building throughout the East Texas area. Task Force Investigators attend "National Night Out" events,

community events, festivals, tradeshows, and college campuses. TF investigators set up booths and display vehicles, banners and signs. It's a great opportunity to meet with individuals at these events to share ways of protecting one's property from theft and fraud related activities. The Task Force will utilize different forms of media when applicable in preventing catalytic converter thefts and vehicle crimes. Task Force Investigators give interviews to the news media by commenting on particular crimes or addressing the issue of a particular crimes to be prevented.

3.6 Collaboration Effort -- Describe the taskforce method to collaborate, and not duplicate existing activities. Describe the cross boundaries regional approach to grant activity implementation. The East Texas Auto Theft Task Force is the only Task Force in the State with a DPS, Criminal Investigations Division, Lieutenant, as the Commander. Because of my role as a DPS Investigator and Commander of the Task Force, I am able to bridge a gap and bring assets such as statewide networks of investigators, databases, training, technology, personnel to address vehicle crimes. The TF will assist and work with other agencies including DPS regulatory services to combat catalytic converter thefts. There is no duplication of activities as we do not cover the same area as many single agency task forces. Task Force Investigators having established relationships with local, state, and federal law enforcement and are often contacted, consulted, and brought into investigation involving vehicle crimes. Task Force Investigators attended quarterly multi-state and multi-agency ROCIC intelligence meetings to collaborate on cross jurisdictional vehicle theft and burglary trends and suspects. The Task Force seeks to coordinate its activities with other MVCPA Task Forces, as well as Agents employed by the Department of Public Safety and Agents employed by the National Insurance Crime Bureau. The ETATTF will continue to seek and share intelligence regarding catalytic converter thefts and motor vehicle crimes with other local agencies and MVCPA funded programs to stop auto related crimes. Because most of our region is comprised of rural communities and municipalities, these law enforcement agencies have little if any specialized training and are generally understaffed. Task Force Investigators will continue to coordinate and collaborate on investigation within our region by analyzing data when available to target catalytic converter thefts and vehicle crimes in these jurisdictions. The ETATTF utilizes several local intel exchanges covering this region and areas outside our coverage area that share information of theft suspects and BOLO's.

A Weekly Report of Investigative Activity is in use to capture the activities of each Task Force Investigator. The report reflects the number of theft and burglary cases assigned, arrests made, cases filed, cases cleared, vehicles inspected, altered vehicles identified, number of 68-A completed, agency assists, and the number of stolen vehicles and parts recovered and their value, and fraud related cases received or investigated. A narrative of each day's activity is also include in the report. A separate google sheet spreadsheet is completed by each investigator as it relates to the Goals and Strategies selected and those performed but not part of elected goals. The spreadsheet mirrors the progress report Goals and Strategies section and it tabulates the activity automatically. The Commander reviews this data for accuracy and completeness. The Administrative Assistant then enters the data into the Task Force Data Base. The data is then compiled into monthly reports. Each quarter the data is compared to the Project Goals, set forth in the Task Force Grant, to insure it is meeting or exceeding its goals. Should the Task Force not meet a goal in a given quarter, corrective action is taken. At the end of the Grant Cycle, the End of Year Report is compiled and again compared to the Proposed Project Objectives to determine if all objectives set were achieved. The End of Year Report is then forwarded to the MVCPA, as well as reviewed by the Board of Directors and the Task Force Commander's DPS Chain of Command. The participating agencies and Task Force Commander review the work of Investigators, statistics, and data collected for the UCR to determine the effectiveness of the programs, and where goals need to be shifted.

AMENDMENT OF CIVIL SERVICE CLASSIFICATION PLAN TO ESTABLISH THE NUMBER OF AUTHORIZED POLICE AND FIRE CIVIL SERVICE POSITIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024-2025

The attached Ordinance has been prepared for the City Council to consider formal approval of amendments to the Civil Service Classification Plan and the number of authorized Civil Service positions within the Police Department and Tyler Fire Department in accordance with Chapter 143 of the Texas Local Government Code. Changes in the Police Department will be absorbed as part of their fiscal year 2024-2025 budget.

The Civil Service Classifications were last updated on November 13, 2024. This ordinance amendment reflects changes made to positions in both the Tyler Police Department and the Tyler Fire Department. The Police Department change includes the addition of one Sergeant position and a decrease of one Police Officer position. The new Sergeant position will manage and coordinate a new Crisis Intervention Unit, the focus of which will be to address homelessness, violent crime, and other community-based issues occurring within the Downtown, Business, Arts and Culture district. The Fire Department change decreases the firefighter positions by one, which was a temporary authorized position from the last classification update in November 2024.

Texas Local Government Code Section 143.021 (a) provides that the Civil Service Commission shall provide the classification of all fire fighters and police officers, and that the municipality's governing body shall establish the classifications by ordinance. The governing body by ordinance shall prescribe the number of positions in each classification.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached Ordinance amending Tyler City Code Chapter 3, Civil Service Classification Plan and number of Authorized Civil Service positions for Fiscal Year 2024-2025.

City Code Chapter 19

The City of Tyler is the owner and operator of certain waters and lands in and around Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East. State law, at Texas Local Government Code Section 341.903, provides that a homerule municipality may police areas owned by and located outside of the municipality such as lakes and land contiguous to and used in connection with a Lake. The City of Tyler has adopted specific ordinances governing Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East in Tyler City Code Chapter 19, including environmental regulations designed to protect the lake as an important water source. In addition, City Code Chapter 19 contains specific regulations related to construction and leasing of lake lots, plumbing, navigation, sanitation, sewer discharge, water activities and other provisions to promote the public health and safety.

Certain City Code provisions in Chapter 19, specifically Article VI. regarding Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East, were last modified in 2023 and focused on provisions related to alcohol consumption around the Lakes. Significant revisions were previously made in 2011 when the Lake Tyler Master Plan was completed. Additionally, concerns regarding plumbing in boathouses were highlighted in the previous Master Plan.

According to Title 30 of the Texas Administrative Code, Part 1, Chapter 290, Subchapter D, 290.41e(1) (C), septic tanks and soil absorption fields, tile or concrete sanitary sewers, sewer manholes, or other approved toilet facilities must not be located within 75 feet horizontally from the Lake's water surface at the uncontrolled spillway elevation or within 75 feet of the 50-year flood elevation, whichever distance

is less. Therefore, plumbing in boathouses is not permitted at Lake Tyler or Lake Tyler East, as these areas are classified and used as public drinking water sources. The proposed revisions to Chapters 19-1 and 19-130 through 19-221 are being made with these specific health and safety considerations in mind.

Generally speaking, sanitary facilities have not been permitted within the 100' setback from the 378' elevation. This measure has been designed to protect the Lake as a public water supply source. Per written State authorization, the City of Tyler previously granted certain variances to this provision, if certain stringent requirements were met. However, the City of Tyler has not granted any such variances since August 19, 2022. From the effective date of this new Ordinance, no sanitary facilities will be permitted within the 100' setback from the 378' msl elevation. Previous variances that were lawfully granted prior to August 19, 2022 may continue, if the use continues to comply with applicable Code requirements.

Other revisions in the attached Ordinance include the following:

Updated Definitions for Chapter 19.

A comprehensive update of the entire ordinance for clarity.

An update to City Code Section 19-205, which establishes specific finished floor elevations for structures on leasehold property, defines accessory structures, and sets guidelines and requirements for boathouse and pier construction.

An update to City Code Section 19-206 to ensure that annual inspections of On-site Sewage Facilities (OSSF) and existing sanitation facilities located over the water are conducted, along with consequences for failing to complete these necessary inspections. Additionally, no new sanitary facilities will be permitted within the 100-foot setback of the 378-foot mean sea level (msl).

Other amendments clarifying the specific regulatory authority of the City over the lake waters and Cityowned land

An update to Division 6 regarding the Schedule of Fees, in order to reflect the actual costs of administering the Lake regulations. City staff conducted a cost analysis taking into account

Other minor clean-up changes.

Over the past several years, the Water Utilities Department staff has conducted an extensive review of the Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East ordinances, working closely with Planning Concepts. The City of Tyler would like to sincerely thank Mark Priestner for his valuable assistance in reviewing the regulations and suggesting improvements and amendments.

AMENDING PROVISIONS RELATED TO BOATING WATERCRAFT, AMENDING PROVISIONS RELATED TO THE CONSTRUCTION AND LEASING OF LAKE LOTS AND STRUCTURES THEREON, AMENDING **PROVISIONS** RELATED TO BOATHOUSES, **PIERS AND** ACCESSORY STRUCTURES, IMPROVING ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS REGARDING SANITATION AND PLUMBING IN CONFORMANCE WITH STATE REGULATIONS, AMENDING PROVISIONS TO CLARIFY THE CITY'S AUTHORITY OVER LAKE WATERS AND CITY-OWNED LANDS ADJACENT THERETO, REVISING FEES TO REFLECT ACTUAL COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH ADMINISTRATION AND MAKING OTHER CLEAN-UP CHANGE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City Council to protect the public health, safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, municipalities may, under their police powers, enact reasonable regulations to promote the health, safety and general welfare of citizens; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler is a home-rule municipality acting under its Charter adopted by the electorate pursuant to Article 11, Section 5 of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 9 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code Section 51.072(a) states that a home-rule municipality has full power of local self-government; and

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code Section 51.072(b) provides that the grant of powers to a municipality under the Texas Local Government Code does not prevent, by implication or otherwise, the municipality from exercising the authority incident to local self-government; and

WHEREAS, Section 1 of the Tyler City Charter states that the City of Tyler may make any and all rules and regulations by ordinances and resolutions; and

WHEREAS, Section 1 of the Tyler City Charter provides that the City of Tyler may define, prohibit, abate, suppress and prevent all things detrimental to the health, morals, comfort, safety, convenience and welfare of the inhabitants of the City, and all nuisances and causes thereof; and

WHEREAS, Section 1 of the Tyler City Charter states that the City of Tyler may make and enforce local police, sanitary, and other regulations, and may pass such ordinances as may be expedient for maintaining and promoting the peace, good government and welfare of the City, and for the performance of the functions thereof; and

WHEREAS, Section 1 of the Tyler City Charter provides that the City shall have all powers that now are, or hereafter may be granted to municipalities by the constitution or laws of

Texas, and that all such powers, whether expressed or implied, shall be exercised and enforced, in the manner prescribed by the Charter, or when not prescribed in the Charter, in such manner as shall be provided by ordinances or resolutions of the City Council; and

WHEREAS, Section 1 of the Tyler City Charter provides that the City may license and regulate persons, corporations, and associations engaged in any business, occupation, profession or trade; and

WHEREAS, Section 2 of the Tyler City Charter states that the enumeration of particular powers by the Charter shall not be held or deemed to be exclusive, but in addition to the powers enumerated in the Charter, the City shall have, and may exercise all other powers which, under the constitution and laws of Texas, it would be competent for the Charter specifically to enumerate; and

WHEREAS, Section 6 of the Tyler City Charter states that pursuant to the provisions of and subject only to the limitations imposed by the State law and the Charter, all powers of the City shall be vested in an elective Council, which shall, among other duties, enact legislation; and

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code Section 51.001(1) provides that the governing body of a municipality may adopt, publish, amend, or repeal an ordinance, rule or police regulation that is for the good government, peace, or order of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code Section 51.001(2) provides that the governing body of a municipality may adopt, publish, amend, or repeal an ordinance, rule or police regulation that is necessary or proper for carrying out a power granted by law to the municipality or to an office or department of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler is the owners and operator of certain waters and lands located at Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East; and

WHEREAS, on November 16, 2011, the Tyler City Council adopted Ordinance No. 0-2011-101, accepting a petition from the City of Tyler pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 42.022(b), including certain City-owned areas and lands in and around Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East and not within the existing extraterritorial jurisdiction of another city to be included within the City of Tyler extraterritorial jurisdiction (See City Code Sec. 10-143.b.2(c); and

WHEREAS, on February 8, 2012, the Tyler City Council adopted Resolution No. R-2012-5, approving an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Whitehouse, establishing the boundaries and extraterritorial jurisdictions of the two cities (see City Code Sec. 10-143.b.2(f.); and

WHEREAS, on May 23, 2012, the Tyler City Council adopted Ordinance No. 0-2012-44, accepting a petition from the City of Tyler pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 42.022(b), to include the remaining City-owned areas and lands in and around Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East, and not within the existing extraterritorial jurisdiction of another city, and that were not governed by Tyler Ordinance No. 0-2011-101, to be included within the City of Tyler extraterritorial jurisdiction (see City Code Sec. 10-143.b.2(h); and.

WHEREAS, Texas Local Government Code Section 341.903 provides that a home rule municipality may police areas owned by and located outside of the municipality, such as parks and grounds, lakes and land contiguous to and used in connection with a lake, and speedways and boulevards; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyer has established regulations related to Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East in City Code Chapter 19, Article VI.; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code Section 30.00005(b) states a municipal court of record has jurisdiction arising under ordinances authorized by Sections 215.072, 217.042, 341.903, and 551.002, Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code Section 29.003(a)(1)(A) provides that a municipal court, including a municipal court of record, shall have exclusive original jurisdiction within the municipality's territorial limits or property owned by the municipality located in the municipality's extraterritorial jurisdiction in all criminal cases that arise under the ordinances of the municipality, and are punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,000 in all cases arising under municipal ordinances that govern fire safety, zoning, or public health and sanitation, other than dumping of refuse; \$4,000 in cases arising under municipal ordinances that govern dumping of refuse; and \$500 in all other cases arising under a municipal ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code Section 29.003(d)(2) states that the governing body of a municipality by ordinance may provide that the municipal court has concurrent jurisdiction with a district court or a county court at law under Subchapter B, Chapter 54, Local Government Code, within the municipality's territorial limits and property owned by the municipality located in the municipality's extraterritorial jurisdiction for the purpose of enforcing health and safety and nuisance abatement ordinances; and

WHEREAS, Texas Code of Criminal Procedure Article 4.14(a) provides that a municipal court, including a court of record, shall have exclusive original jurisdiction within the territorial limits of the municipality in all criminal cases that arise under the ordinances of the municipality and are punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,000 in all cases arising under municipal ordinances that govern fire safety, zoning, or public health and sanitation, other than dumping of refuse; \$4,000 in cases arising under municipal ordinances that govern dumping of refuse; and \$500 in all other cases arising under a municipal ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code Section 30.0003(a) states that the governing body of a municipality may by ordinance create a municipal court of record if the governing body determines that the creation of the court is necessary to provide a more efficient disposition of the cases arising in the municipality; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler has established a municipal court of record pursuant to Texas Government Code Section 30.00005, Subchapter NN; Tyler City Charter Section 25 and City Code Section 1-80; and

WHEREAS, Tyler City Code Section 1-4 provides for criminal penalty for violations of the Tyler City Code, including provisions in City Code Chapter 19; and

WHEREAS, it is important to update certain provisions in City Code Chapter 19 related to Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TYLER, TEXAS:

PART 1: That Tyler City Code Chapter 19, "Buildings and Structures", Article I., "In General", is hereby amended by adding or amending the following Definitions in the appropriate alphabetical order in Section 19-1 to read as follows, with no other changes to the Definitions:

Sec. 19-1. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following words and terms shall have meanings as follows:

Barge means a flat bottomed boat that rests on top of tubes called pontoons. The pontoons are hollow tubes. Barges are also called pontoon boats. (Ord. No. 2025-__, 4/9/2025) (Ord. No. 0-2025-__; 4/9/2025)

Director means the Director of Utilities or designee. (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

...

Lot means a City-owned lot at the Lake that has been or that may be acquired for lease pursuant to City Code Section 19-200. Lot and Lots does not include Lake waters or their tributaries. (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Manager means the <u>City Manager for the City of Tyler</u>. Water Production and Water Quality Manager for the Division (Ord. No. 0-2025- ; 4/9/2025)

(Ord. No. O-96-54, 6-26-96) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 2009-7, 2/11/09) (Ord. No. O-2019-63, 08/14/2019) (Ord. No. 2020-72; 08/12/2020) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

PART 2: That Tyler City Code Chapter 19, "Utilities", Article VI., "Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East", Division 1., "Generally", is hereby amended by amending the following City Code Sections to read as follows, with no other changes to Division 1:

DIVISION 1. GENERALLY

Sec. 19-130. Purpose; Area of Authority.

The purposes of this Article are to protect and control the quality of the Lake as a water supply source, to ensure safe navigation on the Lake, to guard against deterioration of existing dams and other structures, and to protect the public health safety and welfare. The City adopts this Article to exercise its governmental functions, including, but not limited to, those as to street

maintenance and construction, water works, dams and reservoirs, regulation of traffic, recreational areas and facilities, including swimming areas, beaches and marinas, inspection, engineering and water services, and dumping and litter This Ordinance Article applies to all waters impounded by dams constituting Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East and their tributaries and the adjacent lands owned or controlled by the City, herein referred to as "the Lake". Certain areas adjacent to the Lake have been set aside for development by the City as public parks recreation areas and picnic areas. Other areas have been subdivided into lots to be leased or purchased for the construction of lake homes, other buildings, and boat stalls. All such private use lots are thereby designated as residential or club lots. Only those lots designated as residential or club can be developed for private use. A map entitled "Map of Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East" is hereby incorporated by reference and is available for review in the Water Utilities Department and City Clerk's office. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-131. Authority of peace officers and City on reservoir property.

Any peace officer <u>licensed in the State of Texas</u> shall have authority to arrest any person on the Lake for any violation of this Article, and/or to exclude any person found violating this Article from the Lake. The City shall have full charge and control of the waters of the reservoirs and grounds of the Lake property owned or leased by the City. The <u>Manager Lake Supervisor</u>, in cooperation with the Tyler Police Department, shall keep the peace and patrol the lake in order to enforce this Article and all other laws, ordinances, rules and regulations of the City relating to the waters of the Lake and to make arrests for any violation of this Article or other <u>applicable</u> City ordinance. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

...

Sec. 19-133. Concessions.

- a. Certain designated areas may be set aside by the City Council for commercial purposes such as the rental of boats and motors and sale of bait and supplies. Any person to whom a concession or concession area is let must comply with all rules and regulations governing lake property, and shall sell permits on behalf of the City if requested. It is unlawful for any person to engage in any commercial activity on any lot or other location except in the designated commercial areas or unless otherwise specifically authorized in writing by the City.
- b. Concession rights and the terms and conditions of a concession agreement will be negotiated by the Manager-Director of Utilities, subject to City Council approval with anyone who applies for consideration.
- c. The Manager Director of Utilities may authorize commercial or organized recreational activities or events upon proper request. Activities or events for which authorization is required include: food trucks, races, fishing tournaments, fireworks exhibitions, furnishing of services in aid of water sports, such as water skiing, parasailing, windsurfing, and diving. Requirements for authorization include: (1) assurances of financial responsibility, including appropriate insurance; and (2) signing an indemnification agreement with the City by which the Concessionaire assuminges responsibility for all damages or claims arising out of the activity. The authorization shall specify where and under what conditions the activity may be conducted to prevent the activity from adversely impacting use of the Lake as a public water supply, from constituting a threat to public health, safety or welfare, or adversely impacting use of the

<u>Lake</u> by the general public. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (<u>Ord. No. 0-2025-_;</u> 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-134. Roads.

- a. All main roads around the <u>IL</u>ake may be constructed and maintained by the City or other appropriate entit<u>yies</u> and all <u>private</u> roads <u>and drives</u> to <u>individual</u> lots <u>or groupings of lots</u> shall be constructed and maintained by the lessee. The maximum speed limit on all lake roads constructed by the City shall be forty (40) miles per hour or slower as marked and it is unlawful for any person to drive an automobile, motorcycle or other motor vehicle thereon in excess of the applicable speed limit.
- b. The maximum rate of speed shall be twenty-five (25) miles per hour on the following roads:
 - 1. On Concession Road, from a point 980 feet north of the intersection of Dickson Road and F.M. 346 to a point 2,950 feet in an easterly direction which is the intersection of Concession Road and an oiled road on dam;
 - 2. On an oiled road on dam from a point 390 feet in a southeasterly direction along F.M. 346 from the intersection of Dickson Road and F.M. 346 to a point 2,300 feet to the east on said oiled road;
 - 3. On Concession Road, from a point 3390 feet southeast of the intersection of Dickson Road and F.M. 346 and on F.M. 346 to a point 2,000 feet north of the intersection of Concession Road and an oiled road on dam.
- c. Livestock shall not be permitted to be ridden, or otherwise located on the pavement of any roadway or parking surface constructed by and maintained by the City.
- d. Motorized surface vehicles are prohibited from operating off-road on the shoreline and in the water on public property. Vehicular traffic (including motorcycles and related devices) in and through all City-owned public property of the Lake shall be confined to travel upon established and dedicated highways, streets, roads, and roadways except for the purpose of access to designated authorized sites for camping, picnicking, swimming, and related recreational activities. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-135. Connecting channel between Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East.

It is unlawful for any person to fish or swim in the connecting channel or to stop or moor a boat, barge, or other watercraft in the channel. No person may operate any boat, barge, or other watercraft on or through the connecting channel at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the circumstances then existing. No tubing, skiing, wakeboarding or other similar activities are permitted in the channel. Due to the length and narrow width of the connecting channel, it is designated as a no wake zone and craft should shall be operated slowly enough to leave no visible wake. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-136. Outlet works and spillways.

It is unlawful to operate any boat, barge, or other watercraft within a one hundred (100) foot radius of the outlet works valve on the Mud Creek Dam and/or the Whitehouse Dam or to fish from the bank within a one hundred (100) foot radius thereof. No watercraft, no swimming or skiing is allowed within one hundred (100) feet of the mouth of the spillway at the Mud Creek Dam and/or the Whitehouse Dam. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-138. Lake Tyler Raw water intake.

It is unlawful for any person except authorized repair or maintenance personnel to approach within a two hundred (200) foot radius of the water intake for any reason. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-___, 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-139. Camping.

- a. Camping on City-owned property is permitted in designated recreation park-areas only.
- b. Camp equipment shall not be abandoned or left unattended for a period of more than twenty-four (24) hours.
- c. No person will be allowed to camp on City-owned property for any one (1) period of two (2) weeks or longer. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

. . .

Sec. 19-140. <u>Jumping or Diving from structures</u>.

It is unlawful for any person to jump or dive from or off of any public bridge or any other public structure or part of any public bridge or an appurtenance thereto. This prohibition as to jumping and diving also includes using rope, cable, or other apparatus attached to a bridge or other structure or object, including a tree, so as to permit an individual to swing out over the waters of the Lake. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

...

Sec. 19-144. Livestock and fowl prohibited

It is unlawful for any person to keep or harbor any livestock or fowl on City property at the Lake. No livestock is allowed in or upon public <u>recreation areas</u> parks, boatramps, beaches, designated picnic areas, the dams, or spillways. This section shall not apply to a service animal as defined in federal law, or to an assistance animal defined in State law, that is specially trained or equipped to assist persons with disabilities while in the actual performance of services or assistance to persons with disabilities. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2012-80; 9/26/12) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-145. Cutting trees or brush, disturbing sodding.

- a. Trees/Brush. It is unlawful for any person to cut any trees or brush on any City-owned property at the Lake without the approval of the Manager Director of Utilities. Trees, brush and vines having a trunk diameter smaller than (3) inches growing on lands leased by the City, may be removed by the lessee so long as such activity does not adversely affect drainage or cause erosion.
- b. Sodding. Sodding may not be disturbed unnecessarily. Soil may not be removed nor the natural contour disturbed in any way on City owned property without permission of the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>.
- c. Dredging. All dredging will be accomplished in accordance with U.S. Corps of Engineer rules and guidelines, with approval of the Corps as applicable, and with approval of the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>. No filling is allowed below elevation 376' (msl). (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97(Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99)) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-146. Dumping of garbage, brush, and trash.

It is unlawful for any person to dump trash, brush, or garbage of any kind except in places designated by the City. Trash receptacles located in <u>recreation areas parks</u>, on beaches, and at boatramps are for facility users only, and no household garbage may be deposited in these containers. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-147. Ingress and egress across City land.

Ingress and egress across City-owned land from privately owned land to a Lake road or public road is prohibited except by formal written contractual agreement approved by the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>. A non-transferable fee will be assessed to the applicant for an Access Agreement, payable to the City through the Office of the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>, Water Production and Water Quality. (See Division 6) (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. 0-2002-15, 4/17/02) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-148. Water skiing restrictions and prohibitions.

- a. Designated area. It is unlawful for any person to drive or operate a motorboat or other watercraft towing a person(s) on water skis, aquaplane, or similar device in any area of the Lake prohibited from skiing.
- b. Prohibited near swimming areas, structures, or persons fishing. It is unlawful for any person on water skis, aquaplane, or similar device, to ski within one hundred and fifty (150) feet of any area on the Lake set aside for swimming, or within one hundred and fifty (150) feet of any public launching ramp, dock, boathouse, fishing pier, or other structure or any restricted area or person engaged in fishing.
- c. Personal flotation device (PFD) required. It is unlawful for any person to water ski, or ride an aquaplane or similar device, upon the waters of the Lake without wearing an approved PFD.

d. Ski jumps prohibited. It is unlawful to place or maintain a ski jump on any portion of the waters of the Lake without written permission from the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-149. Flotation devices.

It is unlawful for any person to place barrels, pontoons, or other such containers upon or in the waters of the Lake except for the use described in section 19-172. The City may employ such devices for markers or other similar <u>official</u> uses. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

PART 3: That Tyler City Code Chapter 19, "Utilities", Article VI., "Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East", Division 2., "Boats and Boating", is hereby amended by amending the following City Code Sections to read as follows, with no other changes to Division 2:

DIVISION 2. BOATS AND BOATING

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Sec. 19-161. Anchoring of barges or boats at pier, buoys, etc.

Except for emergencies it is unlawful for any person to cause or permit any boat, barge or other watercraft to anchor or tie up at any public or private pier unless the operator has secured the permission of the owner of such pier. It is unlawful for any person to cause or permit any boat, barge or other watercraft to anchor or tie up at any posted sign, buoy, or other marker on the waters of the Lake or its tributaries except in case of emergency. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

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Sec. 19-164. Removal of unsafe craft from Lake.

The City, through the <u>Director of Utilities</u> <u>Manager</u>, may require the removal of any boat or other craft from the Lake if it is deemed a navigational hazard or is in an unsafe operating condition. In the event of noncompliance by the owner <u>or operator</u> to such order, the craft <u>will may</u> be removed from the Lake by the <u>Director of Utilities</u> <u>Manager</u> and the owner <u>or operator</u> will be assessed all costs. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

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Sec. 19-167. Toilets.

It is unlawful for any person to place or maintain a toilet on any boat or barge except unattached portable chemical toilets. Such toilets must be approved and certified by a Lake Supervisor before being taken aboard the craft. All boats, barges, and other watercraft operated on the Lake having enclosures large enough to accommodate a toilet are subject to inspections by the Lake Supervisor. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

. . .

Sec. 19-169. Abandoned boats, barges, and watercraft.

- a. Any boat, barge, or watercraft which is found upon the waters of the Lake or upon any public property immediately adjacent thereto and which is inoperable and more than five (5) years old and left unattended for more than forty-eight (48) hours, or is unseaworthy and cannot be used as a safe means of transportation on the water or that has remained on the Lake illegally for more than forty-eight (48) hours, or which is subject to a docking fee under these rules by ordinance and which does not have affixed thereto a currently valid docking license issued pursuant to this Article is deemed to be an abandoned watercraft. For purposes of this sSection, "watercraft" shall include any motorboat, outboard motor, or vessel subject to registration under Texas law.
- b. The <u>Director of Utilities</u> <u>Manager</u> may authorize taking into custody any abandoned watercraft found upon the waters of, or on any public property immediately adjacent to the Lake. Any watercraft deemed a navigational hazard may be removed from the Lake.
- c. When any abandoned watercraft is taken into custody under the authority of these rules provisions, the Director of Utilities Manager shall promptly notify by certified mail, return receipt requested, the last known registered owner and all lien-holders of record that the watercraft has been taken into custody. The notice shall describe the watercraft by size, color, and general description and shall set forth the location of the facility where the watercraft is being held, and shall further inform the owner and any lienholder of the right to reclaim the watercraft within twenty (20) days after the date of the notice upon payment of all towing, preservation and storage charges resulting from placing the watercraft in custody and upon paying the required registration and fees as may be required by ordinance these rules. The notice shall further state that the failure of the owner or lienholders to exercise the right to reclaim the watercraft within the time provided shall be deemed a waiver of all right, title and interest in the watercraft and their consent to the sale of the abandoned watercraft at a public auction, or to the removal and destruction of the abandoned watercraft if deemed a navigational hazard.
- d. If the identity of the last registered owner cannot be determined, or the registration contains no address for the owner, or if it is impossible to determine with reasonable certainty the identity and addresses of all lienholders, notice by one (1) publication in a newspaper of general circulation within the City or Smith County shall be sufficient to meet all requirements of notice pursuant to these rules this Article. Such notice by publication may contain multiple listings of abandoned watercraft. Any such notice shall be within the same time requirements and shall have the same contents required for a notice by certified mail.
- e. If an abandoned watercraft has not been reclaimed by the owner or lienholders as provided for herein, the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u> shall sell the abandoned watercraft at a public auction or remove and destroy the abandoned watercraft if deemed a navigational hazard. Sale of the abandoned watercraft must be preceded by a notice published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City or Smith County at least three (3) weeks before the sale takes place. The notice shall include the place and date of sale, a full description of the watercraft to be sold, and the name of the owner, if known. The purchaser of the watercraft shall take title to the watercraft free and clear of all liens and claims of ownership, shall receive a sales receipt from the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u> and shall be entitled to register the purchased watercraft

as provided for herein. From the proceeds of the sale of an abandoned watercraft, the <u>Director of Utilities</u> Manager shall reimburse itself for the expenses of the auction, towing, preserving, watercraft storage, notice and publication costs which resulted from placing the abandoned watercraft in custody. Any remainder from the proceeds of a sale shall be held for the owner of the watercraft or entitled lienholder for ninety (90) days, and then shall be deposited in a special fund which shall remain available for payment of auction, towing, preserving, storage, notice and publication costs which result from placing other abandoned watercraft in custody whenever the proceeds from a sale of such other abandoned watercraft are insufficient to meet these expenses and costs.

f. If there are no purchasers of the watercraft at a public auction held pursuant to these rules regulations, the <u>Director of Utilities</u> Manager shall may purchase same for its accrued cost of conducting the auction, towing, preserving and storage, and all notice and publication costs incurred, and any disposal of same, including the destruction thereof, as may be proper under the circumstances. <u>As an alternative, the City Council may authorize donation of the watercraft for a public purpose.</u> (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

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PART 4: That Tyler City Code Chapter 19, "Utilities", Article VI., "Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East", Division 5., "Leasing and use of Lots", is hereby amended by amending the following City Code Sections to read as follows, with no other changes to Division 5:

DIVISION 5. LEASING AND USE OF LOTS

Sec. 19-200. Acquisition of leases.

- a. Basis. Acquisition of lots at the Lake shall be on a rental basis as follows: An appraisal shall be made of the value of each lot offered to the public for use. Depending on the location and desirability of the lots, a bonus shall be placed upon each lot according to its appraisal value. Said bonus shall be paid by the lessee on each lot leased in addition to the yearly rental on the lot.
- b. Normally, individuals or a family seeking to lease a lot at the Lake will be restricted to no more than one lot, but upon proper request, the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u> may lease additional lots to an individual or family when it is determined to be in the public interest. (Ord. No. 0-98-12, 2/11/98) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)
- c. Lots for groups or clubs shall be designated and separated from residential lots.
- d. No company, group, club, or corporation may lease more than three (3) lots, and said lots must be adjacent; but upon proper request, the <u>Director of Utilities</u> <u>Manager</u> may lease additional lots to a company, group, club, or corporation when it is determined to be in the public interest.
- e. No group or club house may be maintained on any lot set apart for residences in the foregoing rules and regulations. Lots will be provided in certain areas for group or club houses at the same rental rates as provided for residential lots, said rates to be fixed by City Council. All

rules and regulations herein set forth with reference relating to individual residence lots shall apply insofar as applicable to lots set apart for group or club houses.

- f. Lots shall be described by maps drawn to scale and under the direction of the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u> and recorded in the Smith County plat records and Water Utilities Department.
- g. Leased lots at the Lake shall cover the full length of the lot up to the waterfront, the City reserving all rights to police, preserve, and protect all of the City's interests. <u>Leased lots do not include the waters of the Lake or its tributaries</u>. <u>Leased lots are subject to all applicable provisions in this Article</u>. See Definition of Lot in Section 19-1.
- h. Applications for the leasing of lots are honored on a first-come-first-served basis. Applicant must file the request with the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>, stating which lot is desired. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99)) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-201. Leases - applicable fees.

- a. Rental for all lots with leases originating prior to November 18, 2011 (and as described further in <u>sSection 19-221a.</u>). An annual rental fee will be assessed on each lot leased on Lake Tyler. See Division 6. The annual rental shall be adjusted at each annual anniversary date in an amount equal to the increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the South (the geographic area including Smith County, Texas), as published by the United States Department of Labor (or its successor document), from the year in which the last rental increase was effective to the year in which the latest rental increase is occurring times the then annual rental rate, but in no event shall the amount of increases in rental exceed ten (10) percent at any one time. In the event of a decrease in the C.P.I., no decrease in rental shall be made; however, additional increases in rental shall not be made until the C.P.I. rises above the point from which the last increase in rental was determined, using 1993 as the base year. In July of every year, City staff will calculate any rental increases required under this paragraph and such increases shall be applicable to all leases coming due between the next October 1 and September 30 of the next year. Any such rental increase will be automatic, with City Staff to give lessee notice of such increase in the next bill sent to the lessee.
- b. Rental for all lots with leases originating after November 18, 2011 (and as described further in <u>sSection 19-221a.</u>). An annual rental fee will be assessed on each lot leased on Lake Tyler equivalent to the city taxes which would be paid if the property and improvements were privately owned and located within the City of Tyler, Texas. Lease payments shall be established using the tax rate adopted by the Tyler City Council and applied to initial land lease value established by the City plus any improvement values established by Smith County Appraisal District.
- c. Other charges. Certain Fees will be charged for handling lease-related documents and transactions as set out in Division 6. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. O-2011-100, 11/16/11) (Ord. No. 0-2025- ; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-202. Renewal of leases.

Each lease shall automatically be renewed for the term specified in the original lease or in the addendum by the payment in advance of each annual rental provided:

- a. If Lessee has an Addendum to the original lease from the City, and is not in default under the terms of said agreements or is in the process of curing and does cure any default in accordance with the terms of Lessee's contractual obligations under the original lease and Addendum:
- b. If lessee does not have an Addendum to the original lease and has cured any default about which the City has given 45 days written notice to Lessee sent via certified mail, return receipt requested, addressed to Lessee's last known address. Lessee may receive an additional period of time to cure and remedy said default with the City's prior written approval, said approval not to be unreasonably withheld. If Lessee fails to remedy such default under this provision, the lease shall terminate and Lessee shall be given 60 days to remove any improvements. If Lessee fails to act within the specified time, the lease will become null and void and the improvements thereon will revert to the City;
- c. If Lessee has at all times conformed with the applicable rules and regulations governing the lake and property. Upon failure to pay the rental of any lot within forty-five (45) days from due date, the lessee shall be notified and given a maximum of sixty (60) days in which to remove any improvements. If lessee fails to act within the specified time the lease shall—will become null and void and the improvements thereon will revert to the City. (Ord. No. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-203. Transfer of leases; persons to which lease applies.

All transfers of leases are subject to approval by Tthe City, through the Director of Utilities Manager, must approve all transfers of leases. Lessee may transfer the lease to heirs, assigns, or transferees, subject to Director of Utilities Manager approval, such approval not to be unreasonably withheld. Any improvements on such lease may be sold to the new tenant at whatever price the lessee can get, as the City will not enter into this transaction. A copy of all leases and lease transfers shall be filed with the Smith County Clerk – Official Public Records City Clerk before becoming effective. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-204. Use of leasehold and/or improvements as collateral for loan.

The lessee of any lot has the right to encumber the leasehold and/or any building or structure erected or to be erected thereon. Upon lessee's application, the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u> shall have authority to consent to encumbrance of the leasehold, and it being understood that if any such lien is foreclosed the City will consent to the assignment of such lease to the purchaser at the foreclosure sale, provided the purchaser shall take such lease subject to all rules and ordinances governing and controlling the use thereof, and subject to all of the terms and conditions of the lease as modified, and the holder of an encumbrance of any such property shall have the privilege of paying the annual renewal rental on any such <u>leasehold and/or improvements lot(s)</u> upon which an encumbrance may exist or upon which a foreclosure may be granted. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-205. Leasehold construction and location.

- a. Building permits required for construction. All construction on Lake Tyler leased lots or <u>any structures</u> located over the lake waters, after November 18, 2011, shall require a building permit issued by the City of Tyler Building Inspection Department. Applicable codes and fees, in addition to fees listed in Division 6, shall be detailed in Chapter 6, "Buildings and Structures" of the City of Tyler Code of Ordinances. Inspections as required by Chapter 6 of the City of Tyler Code of Ordinances shall be scheduled through, and performed by, the City of Tyler Building Inspection Department.
- b. Residences, clubhouses. No house may be constructed without adequate sanitary facilities (a bathroom) connected to an approved wastewater disposal system. No house may be erected containing less than one thousand (1,000) square feet of enclosed floor space. It is unlawful for any person to erect any type building within 100 feet measured horizontally of elevation 378' msl at the waterfront except for boat houses and piers. Swimming pools may be constructed within the 100' setback, but the filter system, bathhouse, and other associated structures must be constructed outside the 100' setback line (100' from the 378' elevation). All buildings, other than boat houses, constructed after the effective date of this Ordinance, April 9, 2025., must have a minimum Finished Floor Elevation (FFE) of 380'. No buildings or structures other than fences and retaining walls may be erected within 7½ feet measured horizontally from any side property line of a leased lot on Lake Tyler nor may it be nearer the front (street) property line of a leased lot than 25 feet. No more than one residence may be constructed on a residential lot. No use/structure shall encroach into an existing easement or right-of-way, an identified future easement or right-of-way, over an adjacent property or easement line or an identified or set aside access path.
- c. Piers, boathouses. No more than one boathouse may be constructed on in association with a residential lot. All piers and boathouses shall be inspected annually in conjunction with annual onsite sewage facility inspections, or as deemed necessary by the Director of Utilities Manager. All i Inspections will be coordinated with lessee, however, the City reserves the right to inspect at any time. The City Council Director of Utilities shall have the authority to declare a pier, boathouse, or other structure located below the 378' elevation unsafe, unsightly or a nuisance, and to order the same repaired or removed within a specified time period. If the structure is deemed a navigational hazard, it may be removed by the City, and costs incurred shall be collected from the lessee. All boathouses and piers must display the associated lot number in a way visible from the Lake.
- d. Accessory Structures. Any structure detached from the main residence shall require a building permit from the City. No accessory structures shall be permitted within the 100' setback from the 378' elevation. All accessory structures must meet Tyler City Code of Ordinances Chapter 10, Article 3, Division D, "Accessory Buildings and Structures," the same as required for properties inside the City of Tyler limits and be setback a minimum of 5' from any property line.
- <u>ed</u>. Approval for Construction required. <u>An</u> Approval for <u>the construction</u> Construction must be granted by the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>, prior to initiating construction on any <u>Lake Tyler leased lots or any structure located over the lake waters property or lot on the Lake. In order to receive approval, a plat drawing must be submitted to the office of the <u>Director of Director Order Director Order Director Order Director Order Director Order Director Direct</u></u>

<u>Utilities Manager</u>, on available forms identifying the lot, subdivision, owner and building, and containing the lot dimensions, the 100' setback line from the 378' elevation line, the exact location of existing and proposed structures in relation to all property lines including the 100' setback line, and describing the location and size of the septic system to be installed. As applicable, plans for boathouses, piers, retaining walls, swimming pools, boat ramps, and other structures <u>must also be approved are also subject to approval</u> through the method described above. Approval for construction <u>may will</u> be granted upon confirmation of a current lease on Lake Tyler lots, of current lot ownership registration with the <u>office of the Director of Utilities City Clerk</u> on Lake Tyler East lots, and following a physical on-site inspection by a Lake Supervisor. A fee for each Approval for Construction form submitted shall be collected when the form is presented to the Office of the <u>Director of Utilities Manager</u>, (See Division 6).

- f. Boathouse and Pier Construction. Plans submitted for proposed boathouses, docks and fishing piers shall include the location of the leased lot property corners and lot lines. Lessees are responsible for accurately locating such platted property boundaries before plans are submitted. Construction may begin only if and when a Building Permit is issued. The lessee is required to post such Building Permit(s) in a visible location at the work site before construction may begin.
 - 1. No structure shall be constructed or allowed to be constructed if its length extends more than one-hundred (100) feet from normal lake shoreline (the water's edge at normal pool elevation).

Exceptions:

- 1) <u>In the event that the depth of water at 100 feet from shoreline at normal pool elevation is less than 5 feet.</u>
- 2) In the event either or both (left and right) adjacent lots are legal nonconforming structures, the proposed construction may be permitted by using an averaged approach, if it will not cause an adverse effect on adjacent lots or watercraft use.
- 1. In the event the depth of the water at 100 feet from the shoreline at normal pool elevation is less than 5 feet, the Director of Utilities may permit a structure to extend outward from the shoreline past the 100-foot limit until a water depth of 5 feet is encountered, provided that:
 - (a)The proposed structure conforms to and complies with current Ordinances, Rules and Regulations Governing Lake Tyler and Lake Tyler East in all respects; and
 - (b)The Director of Utilities determines that the proposed structure will not have an unreasonable or adverse impact upon navigation on the Lake or the use and enjoyment of the adjoining Lots and any approved improvements thereupon; and (c)In no event shall the structure extend more than 150 feet from the shoreline, regardless of whether a water depth of 5 feet is reached, nor may the structure come within ten (10') feet of the centerline of the channel.
 - 3. Height and stories. The maximum height of any structure built over water is forty-five (45') feet measured from the normal pool elevation to the top of the roof. No structure shall exceed a single story with a roof deck.
 - a) The decking for all boathouses and piers shall be a minimum of eighteen (18") inches above the normal pool elevation.

- b) Any enclosed area, other than typical storage closets, intended for living space must have a FFE above the 378' elevation.
- 4. Maximum size. No structure built over the Lakes shall exceed 2,000 sq. feet in size. Maximum width shall be sixty (60') feet, however, the total width of any pier or boathouse shall not exceed seventy-five (75%) of the lot frontage along the shoreline. Width shall be measured at the widest point and include both enclosed and unenclosed areas.
- 5. Building Materials. All building materials used in the construction of any pier or boathouse shall utilize materials typically used for such purposes and designed specifically for exposure to the elements. All building materials and methods must comply with the most current Building Code being utilized by the City of Tyler.

 6. Lighting. No lighting shall be installed in a manner that causes a distraction or danger to boaters. Lighting shall be installed to minimize its effect on adjacent properties.
- e. Recreational vehicles (RV), campers. Locating or establishing recreational vehicles or campers on a lot as a permanent residence is prohibited. When utilized routinely for camping on a lot, the unit must be equipped with self-contained sanitary facilities, or connected to an approved wastewater disposal system. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. O-2011-100, 11/16/11) (Ord. No. 2025- , 4/9/2025) (Ord. No. 0-2025- ; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-206. Water and sanitation.

- a. Plans and specifications. All plans and specifications for all residences or other plumbed buildings must contain provisions for proper sanitation and are subject to the approval of the City and State.
- b. On-site sewage disposal system. It is unlawful to employ as the method of sewage disposal on the Lake, any method other than an approved and permitted on-site sewage disposal system. All grey water shall be discharged to the approved and permitted on-site sewage disposal system. No grey water discharges to the surface or to an independent subsurface system are allowed. Sewage disposal systems shall be designed and installed in accordance with state law governing private sewage systems. Prior to construction, detailed plans for each system shall be submitted to all applicable approving authorities, copies of which are to be attached to the Approval for Construction submitted to the Director of Utilities Manager. Formal written approval from all applicable approval authorities is required prior to initiating any construction on the system, including that of Tyler Water Utilities. All sewage effluent from either aerobic or anaerobic systems shall be disposed of in an approved spray irrigation field, or an approved subsurface drain field, with no effluent discharged to the surface within the 100' setback from 378' msl elevation or into the waters of the lLake. No part of the disposal system, including plumbing fixtures, collection and transport components may be located within 100 feet from the 378' msl elevation. An inspection of the on-site sewage system must be conducted annually by a licensed inspector for A fee set by the City Council will be assessed annually by the Manager for the inspection of each approved sewage disposal system on the Lake effective November 18, 2011., and payable The inspection report shall be submitted to the City at the time the annual lease fee is due on Lake Tyler lots and the annual registration fee is due for lots on Lake Tyler East, and upon the anniversary of system installation for lots on Lake Tyler East. Any system may be inspected in response to a complaint, but at a minimum, all systems will be inspected

annually in conjunction with the inspection of piers and boathouses. All inspections shall be are to be coordinated with by the lessee and shall include all collection/pumping facilities whether over the water or not.

1.Failure to submit the annual septic inspection for properties on Lake Tyler will result in the City withholding renewal of the lease. The City will not process lease renewal payments without the annual inspection report. Lake Tyler lease holders will have sixty (60) days to remedy any issues identified in the report. Failure to remedy will result in the City withholding renewal of such lease and reserves the right to begin the process of lease termination.

2.Failure to submit the annual septic inspection and use fee for properties on Lake Tyler East may result in a \$500 fine. The City reserves the right to file a lien(s) on any property of Lake Tyler East for non -payment. Lake Tyler East property owners will have sixty (60) days to remedy any issues identified in the report. Failure to remedy will result in additional fines/liens to the extent limited under State Law.

- c. Sanitary facilities located inside the 100' setback from 378' msl elevation. No new sanitary facilities will be permitted within the 100' setback from the 378' msl elevation after the effective date of this Ordinance, April 11, 2025. The Manager may grant a variance to allow continued use of plumbing fixtures and collection and transport components that were lawfully obtained via variance granted by the City prior to August 19, 2022, may continue as legal non-conforming uses to be located inside the 100' setback from 378' msl elevation, if such use continues to comply with under the following conditions:
 - 1. The system must be designed by a registered professional engineer with experience in design of such systems.
- 2.Only one commode, one bathroom lavatory, one shower and/or tub, one kitchen sink (double compartment), one water heater, and one ice-maker/ice dispensing unit is allowed per boathouse.
- 3.Only a single wastewater collection tank is allowed per boathouse, and only when pumping is required to reach the disposal system located outside the 100' setback from 378' msl elevation.
 - 4. Where a wastewater collection tank is required, <u>the</u> same shall be equipped with a sewage pump capable of pumping the volume required to meet specified engineering criteria for the system activated by means of a float switch.
 - 5. Where a wastewater collection tank is required, the same shall be constructed of a corrosion resistant, non-buoyant material, and shall be located within a containment structure capable of holding 1 ½ times the volume of the tank.
- 6. Where a wastewater collection tank is required, <u>the</u> same shall be equipped with an audible and visual alarm system indicating tank leaks or overflow.
- 7. All pipe and fittings used to convey wastewater from the boathouse to the on-site sewage facility (OSSF) shall have a minimum working pressure rating of 150 pounds per square

inch. Final plans and specifications shall describe and require pressure testing for all lines installed with the minimum test pressure being 1.5 times the maximum design pressure. All pipe and fittings used to convey water to the boathouse and wastewater from the boathouse to the OSSF shall be located above the 376' elevation and must be capable of being visually inspected.

- 8. The system will be subject to periodic, routine inspections by the City Staff.
- 9. The system will be subject to a permit fee and an annual inspection fee as described in Division 6 of this Article.
- 10. Any system changes from the original permit must be designed by a registered professional engineer with experience in design of such systems, and will require a new permit approved by the Manager, and subject to an additional permit fee (see Division 6).
- d. Floating boathouses, piers or any other on-water facility which has sanitary facility connections shall be prohibited.
 - e. Pit toilets. It is unlawful to employ as the means of waste disposal any pit-type toilet on a Lake lot or on City property at the Lake.
 - f. Garbage. It is unlawful to maintain any dump ground or garbage incinerator on in the <u>Lake Tyler</u> watershed. All garbage shall be collected and removed from the lake shore at least once weekly by lessee. The burning of household garbage is prohibited on the Lake.
 - g. Non-potable untreated (raw) water may be obtained from the Lake by the following means:
- 1. by lease holders and lot owners for irrigation purposes only, with a maximum 5 hp pump and a 2" supply line; or
- 2. by contractors upon obtaining a temporary water diversion permit from the State of Texas. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. O-2011-100, 11/16/11)

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h. Insecticide Misting Systems. Insecticide misting systems are permitted for the use of controlling insects in and around piers, docks and boathouses. Misting systems shall be designed in accordance with the City of Tyler Water Utilities Misting System Guidelines. All insecticides used shall be approved are subject to approval for use over surface water supplies by the Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and meet the criteria for EPA FIFRA 25(b) exemption. (Ord. No. 0-2025-_; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-207. Resubdivisions, replats, new subdivisions.

All resubdivisions, replats and new subdivision plats of properties on the Lake and certain marginal lands on Lake Tyler East must be approved are subject to approval by City Council, and will be subject to a fee as described in Division 6 of this Article. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

Sec. 19-208. Resubdivision of City owned Lots.

Certain lots on the Lake contain substantial acreage having been originally created as recreational areas for corporations, clubs, groups, or companies. The following criteria are established for requests for resubdivision of club lots containing two (2) or more acres.

- a. The minimum acreage for a new lot created by resubdivision shall be no less than 1.0 acre above 378' elevation (msl), and shall have a minimum of 100' waterfront access.
- b. Construction of improvements on lots created by resubdivision shall be restricted to single family residences and appurtenances built in accordance with this Article.
- c. Sewage disposal systems shall be designed and installed in accordance with state law governing private sewer systems, and shall comply with Sec. 19-206 of this Division.
- d. All costs of resubdivision (i.e. surveying fees, filing fees, engineering and drafting fees, etc.) shall be paid by the Lessee.
- e. A one-time fee per additional lot created by resubdivision, excluding the original lot subdivided when occupied by existing lessee shall be applicable and payable to the <u>Manager Director of Utilities</u> prior to official replatting. When the existing lessee transfers their interest to another, the lot fee must be paid.
- f. The lease for an additional lot(s) created by resubdivision, excluding the original lot subdivided when occupied by existing lessee, shall be a thirty (30) year term lease automatically extended at the end of the regular term, subject to compliance with lease conditions. When the existing lessee transfers their interest to another, the new lessee must take the new lease.
- g. An annual lease fee will be assessed on lots created by subdivision under this sSection. (See Division 6) The annual rental for lots created and leased prior to November 18, 2011 shall be adjusted at each annual anniversary date in an amount equal to the increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the South (the geographic area including Smith County, Texas), as published by the United States Department of Labor (or its successor document), from the year in which the last rental increase was effective to the year in which the latest rental increase is occurring times the then annual rental rate, but in no event shall the amount of increases in rental exceed ten (10) percent at any one time. In the event of a decrease in the C.P.I., no decrease in rental shall be made; however, additional increases in rental shall not be made until the C.P.I. rises above the point from which the last increase in rental was determined, using 1997 as the base year. In July of every year, City Staff will calculate any rental increases required under this paragraph and such increases shall be applicable to all leases coming due between the next October 1 and September 30 of the next year. Any such rental increase will be automatic, with Manager Director of Utilities to give lessee notice of such increase in the next bill. For lots created and leased after November 18, 2011, the annual lease payment shall be equivalent to the city taxes which would be paid if the property and improvements were privately owned and located within the City of Tyler, Texas. Lease payments shall be established using the tax rate adopted by the Tyler City Council and applied to the initial land lease value established by the City plus any improvement values established by Smith County Appraisal District.

In the situation where a previously created large club lot is divided into 2 or more smaller lots, one of the new smaller lots would be deemed as the original lot while all the other new smaller lots would be treated as new lots subject to the new fees and process.

- h. Access to each new lot created by resubdivision shall be provided by the subdivider. Such access shall be to the nearest public road, but shall remain private. The access road shall be thirty (30) twenty-eight (28) feet wide.
- i. Access roadways shall be built to no less than Smith County road construction standards and shall be constructed at the sole expense of the subdivider and/or lessee. A perpetual maintenance agreement shall be signed by all lessees of lots within a resubdivided plat. The

agreement will establish a perpetual maintenance fund to care for the roadway. Failure to establish and maintain a perpetual maintenance agreement and fund shall be considered a violation of the lease, and thus, grounds for default. All access roadways shall be shown on the resubdivision plat. Lease documents resulting from the subdivision shall contain a provision requiring lessee to acknowledge responsibility for the maintenance of all private access roadway systems. (Ord. 0-97-52, 10/22/97(Ord. No. 0-99-80, 10/20/99) (Ord. No. 0-2013-44, 6/12/13) (Ord. No. 0-2025-; 4/9/2025)

In April 2019, the City Council authorized an engineering contract with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc. to provide a year-long study of the City's traffic signal system. One of the recommendations of the study as presented to the City Council in August 2020 was to annually re-time traffic signals. The plan called for re-timing approximately 15 intersections per year for the first six years of the implementation plan and 30 intersections per year for the next four years of the implementation plan.

As part of the Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) Master Plan - Year 1 projects, 18 intersections were re-timed along S Broadway Avenue south of Grande Boulevard, Southeast Loop 323, and Troup Highway. The after-study indicated that the re-timing of these 18 intersections resulted in delay savings of approximately 231,000 vehicle hours per year (~ 26 years of vehicle delay annually), which translated to more than \$7 million annually in driver delay savings.

Year 2 traffic signal retiming efforts touched 18 signalized intersections along Front Street, S Broadway Avenue between Front Street and Old Troup Highway, and along 4th and 5th Streets. The estimated delay savings of approximately 86,000 vehicle hours per year (~ 10 years of vehicle delay annually) which results in \$2.8 million annually in driver delay savings.

Year 3 traffic signal retiming efforts impacted 18 signalized intersections along the West Loop 323 and Old Jacksonville Highway corridors providing an estimated delay savings of approximately 323,000 vehicle hours per year (~37 years of vehicle delay annually) which results in \$11.3 million annually in driver delay savings.

Year 4 traffic signal retiming efforts focused on 15 signalized intersections along the Gentry Parkway, Glenwood Boulevard, and Palace Avenue corridors. These efforts resulted in an estimated delay savings of approximately 201,716 vehicle hours per year (~23 years of vehicle delay annually) which results in \$7.5 million annually in driver delay savings. These results emphasize the benefits of re-timing traffic signals on a regular basis.

This work order will provide for the re-timing of 12 signalized intersections (*) not previously evaluated and the fine-tuning of 14 signalized intersections previously retimed during the Master Plan Study and Year 1. Tasks will include project management, data collection, development of timing plans, implementation, and a final report.

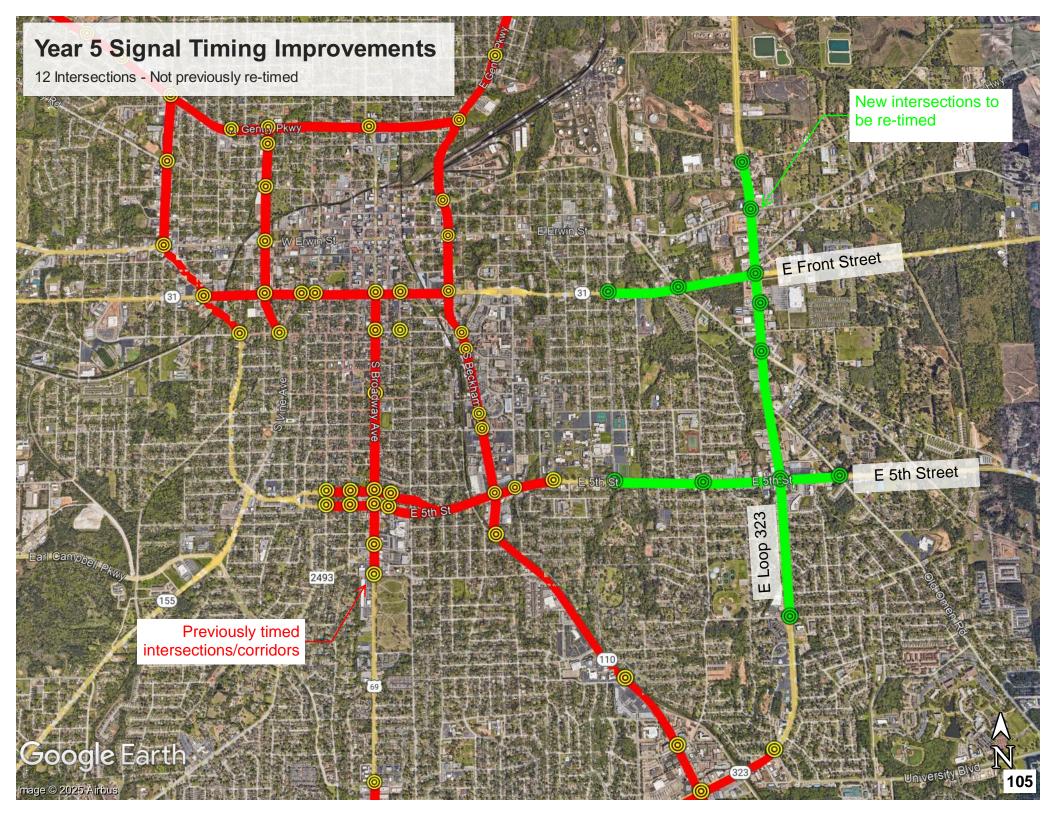

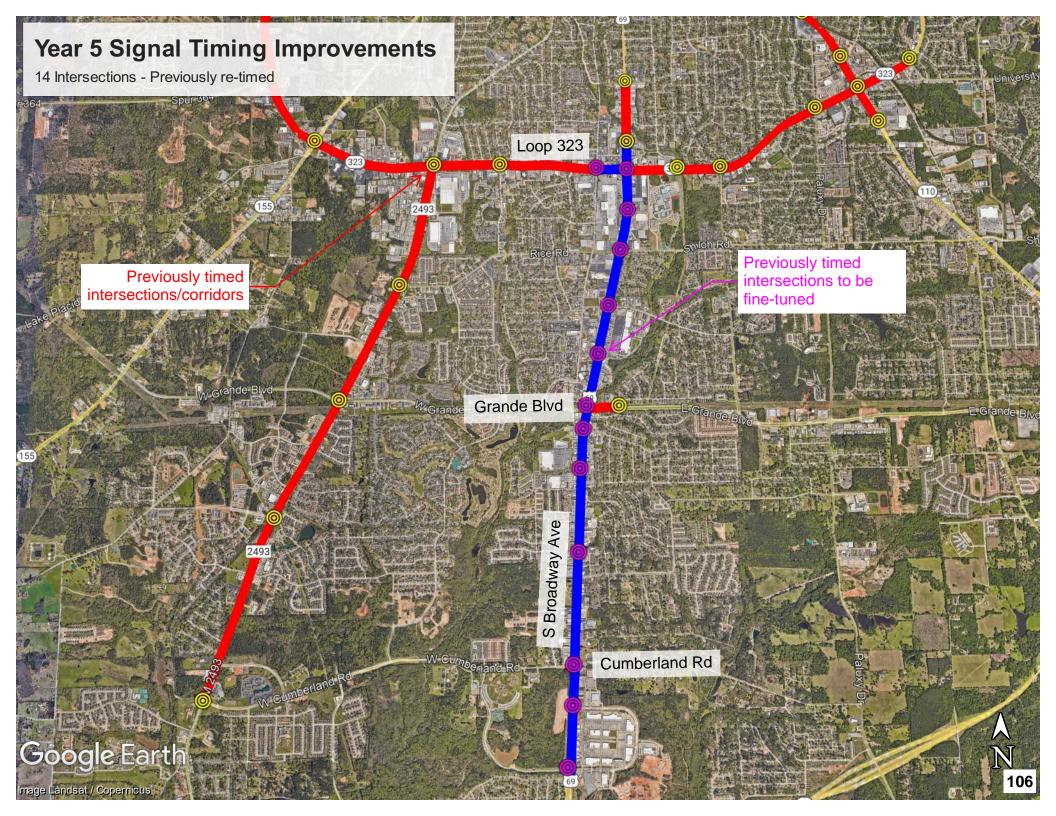

Project Understanding

The City of Tyler wishes to expand the coordinated traffic signal system started under the Signal Timing Pilot of the ITS Master Plan and continued under the Year 1 - 4 Timing Projects. As part of this project, Kimley-Horn will develop, implement, and fine-tune coordinated traffic signal timing at the following intersections to reduce stops, delay, and emissions:

Scope of Services

Kimley-Horn will provide the services specifically set forth below.

Task 0 Project Management

Task 0.1 Project Administration

Project administration spans the duration of the project and is crucial to the success of the project. This task involves the monitoring and coordination of services to be provided to the City of Tyler, Texas (the "City") to achieve timely and efficient completion of the project. This task consists of project control and management, reporting requirements, project status meetings, and schedule development and maintenance.

Task 0.2 Project Control and Management

The Engineer will be responsible for the day-to-day activities of managing the Project, which is assumed to have a duration of 12 months. Specific activities consist of ongoing reassessments of contract and schedule adherence.

Task 0.3 Status Reports and Invoicing

Monthly status reports will be prepared and submitted to the City. The status reports will contain a concise report of Project progress and contract fulfillment. The report will address technical progress, contract progress, and management-related topics.

Task 0.4 Project Status Meetings

In addition to the reporting requirements outlined above, project status meetings with the City will help the Engineer maintain schedule and contract adherence. It is assumed that project status meetings will be held monthly, either in the City's office or via Microsoft Teams. It is assumed that all other project meetings will be held in the City's office or via Microsoft Teams.

Task 0.5 Schedule Development and Maintenance

The Engineer will develop a project schedule for review and approval by the City.

Task 1 Data Collection

Task 1.1 Kick-Off Meeting

At the outset of the project, the Engineer will prepare for and attend one (1) kickoff meeting with the City to begin the exchange of data to be provided to the Engineer. It is expected that this meeting will be held remotely via Microsoft Teams.

Task 1.2 Data Collection

Task 1.2.1 Turning Movement Data and Arterial Link Volume Data

The Engineer will authorize the subconsultant to collect turning movement count (TMC) data at up to 26 intersections and seven-day bi-directional machine count data for up to 3 arterial locations.

Two-hour peak period counts (AM, MD, PM, and Saturday peaks) will be collected by the subconsultant for the following 26 intersections:

- 1. Loop 323 & Commerce Street
- 2. Loop 323 & E Erwin Street
- 3. Loop 323 & E Front Street (SH 31)
- 4. E Front Street & Old Henderson Highway

- 13. S Broadway Avenue & Rose Plaza
- 14. Loop 323 & Old Bullard

Seven-day bi-directional machine count data will be collected by the subconsultant at the following 3 intersections:

- 1. Broadway Avenue between Heritage Drive and South Town Drive
- 2. Broadway Avenue between Loop 323 and Rice Road-Shiloh Road
- 3. Loop 323 between Old Henderson Highway and 5th Street

Task 1.2.2 Crowd-Sourced Probe Data Collection

The Engineer will obtain crowd-sourced probe-based data through a tool such as INRIX for the study corridors. This data will replace traditional "before" and "after" travel time runs to quantify the benefits of the signal retiming effort. The data will be collected one month before and one month after implementation, excluding major special events, holidays, and changes in school schedule. Measures of effectiveness (MOEs) expected to be evaluated consist of:

- Speed
- Travel time
- Delay
- Travel Time Index
- User Delay Cost

Other MOEs may be available and/or deemed appropriate by the Engineer for analysis

Task 2 Traffic Signal Timing

The Task will consist of developing a base model for the signalized intersections and roadway segments connecting these intersections; performing a baseline analysis of selected peak periods; recommendation of minor intersection and signal improvements; and development, implementation, and fine-tuning of newly optimized signal timing plans. Task 2 intersections consist of the following:

- 1. Loop 323 & Commerce Street
- 2. Loop 323 & E Erwin Street
- 3. Loop 323 & E Front Street (SH 31)
- 4. E Front Street & Old Henderson Highway
- 5. E Front Street & Palmer Ave
- 6. Loop 323 & Walmart Driveway
- 7. Loop 323 & Old Henderson Hwy (Spur 124)
- 8. Loop 323 & E 5th Street (SH 64)

Task 2.1 Assemble Existing Data

The Engineer will obtain from City the current local controller and coordination timing for all Task 2 intersections. It is anticipated that this information will be provided in the form of printouts from the signal system database in PDF format. This information must consist of the following:

- Local controller timing parameters
 - o Minimum and maximum green times;
 - Vehicular clearances (e.g. yellow and all-red);
 - o Pedestrian timing (e.g. walk and flashing-don't-walk);
 - o Phase sequences;
 - Local special functions; and
 - o Phase orientation.
- Coordination timing
 - O Cycle lengths, offsets, splits, and phase sequences;
 - o Time-of-day, day-of-week (TOD/DOW) schedules;
 - o Special events timing; and
 - o System-commanded special functions.

Task 2.2 Qualitative Assessment

Using personnel experienced in traffic signal operations, the Engineer will perform an in-field qualitative traffic operations assessment. This will specifically consist of observing existing cycle lengths, splits, offsets, phase sequences, and left turn operations modes (e.g., permissive-only, protected-permissive, or protected-only) on the priority corridor(s). The Engineer will also identify by movement any intersection approaches where excessive queuing is observed, where capacity appears to be substantially constrained, and/or where excessive delay appears to be the result of inefficient signal operations. For priority corridor intersections, the Engineer will also make note of locations where possible changes in lane assignment could improve intersection efficiency.

Priority corridor intersections will be observed by the Engineer during the weekday AM, midday, PM peaks, and/or on Saturday.

Task 2.3 Verification of Arterial and Intersection Geometry and Pedestrian Accommodation The Engineer will perform a field inventory to collect or verify the following information:

- Priority corridor intersections
 - o Number of lanes and lane use;
 - Modes of left turn operation;
 - o Existence of push buttons;
 - o Length of left-turn bays; and
 - o Crosswalk and stop bar locations.
- Arterial segments between project intersections
 - o Number of lanes; and
 - o Posted speed limits.
- Pedestrian accommodation (for each pedestrian movement)
 - o Pedestrian LED countdown signal modules; and
 - Accessible pedestrian signals.

Task 2.4 Traffic Counts

The Engineer will use turning movement count and seven-day bi-directional machine count data obtained as part of Task 1.2 in the analysis and development of coordinated traffic signal timing.

Task 2.5 Development of Existing Conditions Synchro Models

Using the information gathered in previous tasks, the Engineer will prepare base conditions Synchro models for each priority corridor for up to five (5) standard timing plan periods (e.g. weekday AM peak, weekday midday peak, weekday PM peak, weekend midday peak, and weekday late night) as identified by the Engineer. These models will be used to analyze existing conditions and identify operational improvements.

Task 2.6 Clearance Interval Calculations

As part of this Task, the Engineer will work with City staff to determine appropriate and consistent clearance interval calculations to be used for this and subsequent City timing efforts and will recalculate the clearance intervals at task intersections accordingly.

Task 2.7 Development of New Coordinated Traffic Signal Timing

The Engineer will develop new coordinated traffic signal timing plans for the task intersections and the timing plan periods identified by the Engineer. Synchro will be used to generate a "first cut" version of each of the new timing plan.

"On-screen" review and adjustment will then be performed by senior engineers with extensive experience in traffic signal operations.

Task 2.7.1 Number of New Timing Plans

As determined by the Engineer, up to five (5) base timing plans will be developed, expected to include the following:

- Weekday AM Peak;
- Weekday Midday Peak;
- Weekday PM Peak;
- Weekend Midday Peak; and
- Weekday Late Night.

Task 2.7.2 Updated Synchro Models

The Engineer will develop updated Synchro models for each plan, inclusive of any planned changes to be made on the street during this project. New TMCs will be incorporated into each model. Newly calculated clearance times will also be incorporated into the models.

The Engineer will then use the following process to calibrate each model for existing peak conditions. Modeled link speeds will be adjusted to achieve a reasonable correlation with actual corridor travel times as determined during the qualitative assessments and the crowd-sourced probe-based data. Specific factors that will be reviewed consist of queue lengths and the locations of significant stops and delays. Iterative adjustments will be made until reasonable calibration is achieved.

Task 2.7.3 Intersection Operations Assessment

During the qualitative assessment and field verification process, the Engineer will identify possible opportunities to improve intersection operations through hardware modifications and lane assignment changes (e.g., by changing a shared left-through lane to a left-only lane). Using the Synchro models and new TMC data, the Engineer will quantitatively assess the benefits of such possible changes.

Task 2.7.4 Cycle Length Requirements and Control Area Boundaries

Using the Synchro models, the current coordinated cycle lengths will be analyzed for critical intersections on each arterial, to verify that these cycles are still practical moving forward.

The Engineer will determine the most appropriate control groups.

Task 2.8 Develop Preliminary Time-of-Day Schedule

Using the seven-day machine count data, crowd-sourced probe-based data, and/or existing time-of-day schedules, the Engineer will develop a recommended time-of-day/day-of-week (TOD/DOW) schedule(s) for operation of the new signal timing plans.

Task 2.9 Timing Plan Data Entry

The actual entry of new timing plans into the controller databases will be done by the City staff responsible for operating and maintaining the signals. During this process, the Engineer will provide on-call support to resolve issues that may arise.

Task 2.10 Timing Plan Implementation and Fine-Tuning

The Engineer will plan to be on-site with City staff as new timing is downloaded from the computer into the field controllers. The Engineer will then perform in-field fine-tuning to enhance actual on-street operation of new timing plans. It is assumed that City staff will be on-hand to download desired timing adjustments into the controller databases, at least during normal business hours, and that Engineer staff will have access to the field controller cabinets to verify operations and to make changes in cases when City staff is not otherwise available.

Fine-tuning for the new timing plans will be performed as soon as practical after implementation.

Task 2.11 Crowd-Sourced Probe Data Analysis

The Engineer will use the crowd-sourced probe-based data obtained as part of *Task 1.2 Data Collection* to evaluate the "before" and "after" conditions. This data will replace traditional floating-car travel time run data.

Task 2.12 ATSPM Data Analysis

The Engineer will use the City's Automated Traffic Signal Performance Measures (ATSPM) system to evaluate "before" and "after" conditions at up to three (3) critical intersections, to be mutually agreed upon with the City. This data will supplement the crowd-sourced probe-based data.

Task 2.13 Final Documentation

The Engineer will develop a signal timing final report that will consist of the following:

- Narrative discussion of the Task with supporting figures such as maps of the control groups by time period; and
- Tabular comparisons of the *before* and *after* travel time runs, based on INRIX data.

The Engineer will submit a draft version of the final report for review by the City. It is anticipated that the draft report will be submitted electronically in a PDF format. Following receipt of comments, the Engineer will prepare and submit a sealed final report. The Engineer will provide the City with a PDF version of the sealed final report.

Task 3 Traffic Signal Timing Updates

The Task will consist of updating an existing base model for the signalized intersections and roadway segments connecting these intersections; performing a baseline analysis of selected peak periods; and development, implementation, and fine-tuning of newly optimized signal timing plans. Task intersections consist of the following, all of which were previously retimed by the Engineer under previous projects:

- 1. S Broadway Avenue & Rose Plaza
- 2. Loop 323 & Old Bullard*
- 3. S Broadway Avenue & Loop 323*
- 4. S Broadway Avenue & Independence Place*
- 5. S Broadway Avenue & Shiloh Road/Rice Road*
- 6. S Broadway Avenue & Rieck Road*
- 7. S Broadway Avenue & Chimney Rock Drive/Donnybrook Avenue*
- 8. S Broadway Avenue & Grande Boulevard*
- 9. S Broadway Avenue & Robert E Lee Drive
- 10. S Broadway Avenue & South Town Drive
- 11. S Broadway Avenue & Heritage Drive
- 12. S Broadway Avenue & Cumberland Road
- 13. S Broadway Avenue & Centennial Parkway
- 14. S Broadway Avenue & Market Square Boulevard

It is assumed that existing Synchro models are substantially accurate and up to date with current operations at the task intersections.

Clearance intervals will be recalculated for intersections marked with an asterisk ("*") as detailed in *Task 2.6*.

Task 3.1 Qualitative Assessment

Using personnel experienced in traffic signal operations, the Engineer will perform an in-field qualitative traffic operations assessment. This will specifically consist of observing existing cycle lengths, splits, offsets, phase sequences, and left turn operations modes (e.g., permissive-only, protected-permissive, or protected-only) on the priority corridor(s). The Engineer will also identify by movement any intersection approaches where excessive queuing is observed, where capacity appears to be substantially constrained, and/or where excessive delay appears to be the result of inefficient signal operations. For priority corridor intersections, the Engineer will also make note of locations where possible changes in lane assignment could improve intersection efficiency.

Priority corridor intersections will be observed by the Engineer during the weekday AM, midday, PM peaks, and/or on Saturday.

Task 3.2 Traffic Counts

The Engineer will use turning movement count and seven-day bi-directional machine count data obtained as part of *Task 1.2* in the analysis and development of coordinated traffic signal timing.

Task 3.3 Update of Existing Conditions Synchro Models

Using the information gathered in previous tasks, the Engineer will update base conditions Synchro models created under previous projects for each priority corridor for up to five standard timing plan periods (e.g. weekday AM peak, weekday midday peak, weekday PM peak, weekend midday peak, and

weekday late night peak) as identified by the Engineer. These models will be used to analyze existing conditions and identify operational improvements.

Task 3.4 Development of New Coordinated Traffic Signal Timing

The Engineer will develop new coordinated traffic signal timing plans for the priority corridors and the timing plan periods identified by the Engineer. Synchro will be used to generate a "first cut" version of each of the new timing plan.

"On-screen" review and adjustment will then be performed by senior engineers with extensive experience in traffic signal operations.

Task 3.4.1 Number of New Timing Plans

As determined by the Engineer, up to five (5) base timing plans will be developed, with the planned addition of two (2) variant plans (based on Midday) for use on weekends and late night:

- Weekday AM Peak;
- Weekday Midday Peak;
- Weekday PM Peak;
- Weekend Midday Peak; and
- Weekday Late Night.

Task 3.4.2 Updated Synchro Models

The Engineer will develop updated Synchro models for each plan, inclusive of any planned changes to be made on the street during this project. New TMCs will be incorporated into each model.

The Engineer will then use the following process to calibrate each model for existing peak conditions. Modeled link speeds will be adjusted to achieve a reasonable correlation with actual corridor travel times as determined during the qualitative assessments and the crowd-sourced probe-based data. Specific factors that will be reviewed consist of queue lengths and the locations of significant stops and delays. Iterative adjustments will be made until reasonable calibration is achieved.

Task 3.4.3 Intersection Operations Assessment

During the qualitative assessment and field verification process, the Engineer will identify possible opportunities to improve intersection operations through hardware modifications and lane assignment changes (e.g., by changing a shared left-through lane to a left-only lane). Using the Synchro models and new TMC data, the Engineer will quantitatively assess the benefits of such possible changes.

Task 3.4.4 Cycle Length Requirements and Control Area Boundaries

Using the Synchro models, the current coordinated cycle lengths will be analyzed for critical intersections on each arterial, to verify that these cycles are still practical moving forward.

The Engineer will determine the most appropriate control groups.

Task 3.5 Develop Preliminary Time-of-Day Schedule

Using the seven-day machine count data, crowd-sourced probe-based data, and/or existing time-of-day schedules, the Engineer will develop a recommended time-of-day/day-of-week (TOD/DOW) schedule(s) for operation of the new signal timing plans.

Task 3.6 Timing Plan Data Entry

The actual entry of new timing plans into the controller databases will be done by the City staff responsible for operating and maintaining the signals. During this process, the Engineer will provide on-call support to resolve issues that may arise.

Task 3.7 Timing Plan Implementation and Fine-Tuning

The Engineer will plan to be on-site with City staff as new timing is downloaded into the field controllers. The Engineer will then perform in-field fine-tuning to enhance actual on-street operation of new timing plans. It is assumed that City staff will be on-hand to download desired timing adjustments into the controller databases, at least during normal business hours, and that Engineer staff will have access to the field controller cabinets to verify operations and to make changes in cases when City staff is not otherwise available.

Fine-tuning for the new timing plans will be performed as soon as practical after implementation.

Task 3.8 Crowd-Sourced Probe Data Analysis

The Engineer will use the crowd-sourced probe-based data obtained as part of *Task 1.2 Data Collection* to evaluate the "before" and "after" conditions. This data will replace traditional floating-car travel time run data.

The Engineer will also evaluate the "before" condition (circa the start of the project) to "after" data from previous retiming efforts (circa 2021) at task intersections.

Task 3.9 ATSPM Data Analysis

The Engineer will use the City's Automated Traffic Signal Performance Measures (ATSPM) system to evaluate "before" and "after" conditions at up to three (3) critical intersections, to be mutually agreed upon with the City. This data will supplement the crowd-sourced probe-based data.

Task 2.10 Final Documentation

The Engineer will develop a signal timing final report that will consist of the following:

- Narrative discussion of the Task with supporting figures such as maps of the control groups by time period; and
- Tabular comparisons of the *before* and *after* travel time runs, based on INRIX data.

The Engineer will submit a draft version of the final report for review by the City. It is anticipated that the draft report will be submitted electronically in a PDF format. Following receipt of comments, the Engineer will prepare and submit a sealed final report. The Engineer will provide the City with a PDF version of the sealed final report.

Task 4 Design Contingency

As requested by the City, the Engineer can provide design contingency services. Suggested design contingency services may include the following:

Traffic Signal Timing on Additional Corridors

Task 2 and Task 3 identify the recommended approach that would be used on additional corridors not previously covered.

Traffic Engineering

The Engineer can provide traffic engineering functions such as meetings, traffic studies, plan review related to proposed developments, signal warrant analyses, traffic signal design, intersection geometric design modifications, preparing or reviewing grant applications or submittals, or troubleshooting signal timing issues.

Additional Services

The above scope of services was identified based upon previous City of Tyler Signal Timing projects, the Engineer's experience, and requests from City staff. The Engineer can provide additional services for additional fee upon request.

Item Reference:

The South Glenwood Ground Storage Tank (GST) is located on South Glenwood Boulevard between Vine and Houston where the road parts to straddle the tank. Originally constructed in the 1940's, this tank served as storage and a distribution point into the system from Well #2. In a separate project, several wells, including Well #2, are to be decommissioned by the end of the year. This GST has served its purpose in the Tyler distribution system and has been out of service for over 30 years.

On February 14, 2024, City Council approved the engineering portion of the project. Sealed bids were received and read aloud on March 11, 2025 at City Council Chambers with a total of two bids as noted below:

Item Reference:

The Tyler Fire Department seeks to acquire property from the Tyler Economic Development Council (TEDC) to build a new state-of-the-art fire training facility. The new training facility will feature modern technology and equipment and will significantly improve community safety by enabling the Department to respond more swiftly and effectively during emergencies, ultimately leading to faster emergency response times.

The proposed facility will be located at 3150 Robertson Rd., in the Tyler Industrial Park, and will be adjacent to the TISD Career and Technology Center (located to the south), Atwood's distribution center (located to the east), and the City of Tyler Fire Station No. 5 (located to the west). The agreed sale amount for the property is \$1,275,000. This project represents a vital step toward fostering a safer, more resilient community, equipped to meet the challenges of the future.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the purchase of a 14.6-acre tract of property for \$1,275,000 to construct a fire training facility and ratify and authorize the City Manager's execution of any and all documents necessary to accomplish the same.

- 2. AS IS SALE. Purchaser stipulates and agrees that the Property is purchased and sold AS IS AND WITH ALL FAULTS, and without any verbal or written representations or warranties of any kind, express or implied (except for special warranty of title), by Seller or any agent of Seller, and Purchaser stipulates and agrees that:
 - (i) All implied warranties (including, without limitation, the implied warranties of merchantability and fitness for a particular purpose) are disclaimed to the full extent allowed by applicable law;
 - (ii) Seller has no obligation to make any disclosures regarding the Property;

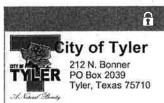

apply for and accept Smith County 9-1-1 District participation funding for facility and equipment upgrades for the Tyler Police Department, in

the amount of \$15,583.30.

Item Reference:

As part of the Tyler Police Department Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP), telecommunicators provide services for law enforcement and fire personnel. They also answer initial calls for Emergency Medical Services and forward citizens to the appropriate response agency. In an on-going effort to maintain state-of-the-art equipment and remain responsive to the needs of Tyler citizens, there is an occasional need to evaluate and update facilities and equipment.

In November 2024, a compressor failed in the Dispatch air conditioning system, which was determined to be almost 20 years old. The physical environment for employees inside Dispatch is a critical component for successful delivery of 9-1-1 services. A new air conditioning system was installed by a city vendor as an emergency replacement for \$11,983.30.

While evaluating PSAP facility security, the Police Department determined an upgrade was warranted to the front perimeter fencing at PD Headquarters to prevent unauthorized access to an exterior Dispatch break area and exterior door. In December 2024, ninety-seven (97) feet of commercial grade galvanized chain link fencing with vertical slats was installed on top of a concrete ledge. The cost for this facility upgrade was \$3,600.

Each year, Smith County 9-1-1 District allows for Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) funding reimbursements. The total cost for this PSAP funding request is \$15,583.30. Per Smith County 9-1-1 District PSAP funding guidelines, any funding requests more than \$5,000 must be authorized by the governing body of the requesting agency, in addition to submission of the form(s) attached.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the attached PSAP Participation Project funding requests and authorize the City Manager to accept Smith County 9-1-1 District funding in the amount of \$15,583.30 for various facility and equipment upgrades for the Tyler Police Department.

Item Reference:

Based on the pavement ratings, a list of streets in need of a seal coat was advertised for bids. The project consists of 21 lane miles of roads. A list of streets to be seal-coated is attached, along with a map of these streets. Two (2) bids were received and opened on Tuesday, March 11, 2025:

COMPANY: BASE BID - ALT 1 - ALT 2 - ALT 3 - TOTAL

Lone Star Equipment Co.: \$799,408.15 - \$37,607.30 - \$62,420.50 - \$97,138.55 - \$996,574.50 Reynolds and Kay: \$882,440.50 - \$42,660.00 - \$70,085.00 - 106,974.00 - \$1,102,159.50

The Engineer's estimate, which was based on prices from the 2024 Seal Coat Improvements project, was between the bids received. The Engineering Department has reviewed the bids and recommends acceptance of the Base Bid plus Alternates 2 and 3, for a total contract amount of \$958,967.20. Construction is expected to begin in May 2025 and be complete in September 2025.

General Fund 103 will account for \$917,100.15 of the Seal Coat and replacement striping. The Traffic department will fund \$34,416.35 for the maintenance striping. Parks will fund \$7,450.70 for the Fair Park Drive parking striping.

FUNDING: General Fund 103 (Street Commitment Fund), Traffic Dept., Parks Dept.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council authorize the City Manager to execute a contract with Lone Star Equipment Co., for the construction of the 2025 Seal Coat Project in the amount of \$958,967.20.

This Interlocal Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the City of Tyler, Texas ("Tyler") and Lindale Independent School District ("Lindale ISD") pursuant to the authority granted under and in compliance with the provisions of the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code.

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City of Tyler and the Lindale Independent School District to promote the public health, safety, and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler Vehicle Services Department ("VES") currently has one Dodge Durango vehicle which has been replaced; and

WHEREAS, at the request of VES, the Tyler City Council has declared such Dodge Durango vehicle to be surplus property; and

WHEREAS, Lindale ISD requested to purchase the surplus Dodge Durango vehicle from the City to update their current fleet; and

WHEREAS, after the completion of the sale, Lindale ISD agrees to and would be responsible for removal and all future use, maintenance, and repair of the equipment; and

WHEREAS, the Parties agree that execution of this Agreement and the sale of the Dodge Durango vehicle to Lindale ISD will be highly beneficial to both entities in their efforts to provide services to the public and the public will benefit from this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Tyler City Code, Chapter 4, Article I, Section 4-9(d) provides that the City of Tyler is authorized to initiate or to respond to requests for transfers of surplus or salvage property to other governmental agencies.

NOW THEREFORE, the Parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Tyler agrees to sell, and Lindale ISD agrees to buy one (1) Dodge Durango vehicle owned by Tyler as more thoroughly identified below (the "Vehicle"):

Unit No. 13857 – 2013 Dodge Durango

- 2. Lindale ISD agrees to pay Tyler the total purchase price of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred dollars and no cents (\$11,500.00) on or before April 11, 2025.
- 3. Tyler warrants that it has full legal title to the Vehicle.
- 4. The Vehicle is sold in an "as is" condition. Tyler hereby disclaims any warranty of

merchantability, working order, or condition of the Vehicle except that the Vehicle shall be sold in its present condition.

- 5. Lindale ISD shall be responsible for pick-up and removal of the Vehicle from Tyler VES and all future possession, use, maintenance, registration, and repair of the Vehicle following the effective date of this Agreement. The Vehicle shall be picked up on or before April 11, 2025.
- 6. By signing this Agreement and upon receipt of payment from Lindale ISD to Tyler, Lindale ISD assumes ownership and possession of the vehicle and shall be responsible for all future use, maintenance, repair, and preservation thereof as well as registration, titling and any associated costs. Furthermore, the Parties hereby agree that effective upon the date of sale, Tyler shall be released from all liability and Lindale ISD assumes full, total, and sole liability and responsibility for the Vehicle and for any resulting injuries, losses, damages, or claims of any sort resulting from, involving, or in any way related to the Vehicle. The parties hereto agree that the payment to Tyler by Lindale ISD of the amount in Section 2. above, the assumption of the duties by Lindale ISD pursuant to this section, and the benefits to Lindale ISD and its citizens that are associated with the transferred Vehicle, all constitutes good, valuable, and adequate consideration for the parties to enter this Agreement.
- 7. Upon the effective date of this Agreement and receipt of payment, Tyler relinquishes all rights of ownership, possession, and maintenance of the Vehicle to Lindale ISD. Immediately thereafter the Parties shall effectuate the transfer of title to the Vehicle and Tyler shall properly submit Vehicle Transfer Notification to the Texas Department of Motor Vehicle.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the City of Tyler, Texas and Lindale Independent School District have caused this Agreement to be executed and effective as of the <u>9th</u> day of <u>April</u>, 2025.

On January 12, 2022, Council approved an Inter-Local Agreement with ETCOG for services provided by them for the City of Tyler Transit in the event they were not able to fulfil the required services for the City of Tyler Transit users.

The first week of January 2025, ETCOG was approved by TxDOT and FTA to purchase NDMJ operations. Staff chose to amend the current agreement to simplify and streamline operations. This required an addendum to change pricing and wording to the Agreement. With this agreement, Overflow service request price increase from \$24.00 to \$27.00 per trip, hourly rate for special requested services increased from \$75.00 per hour to \$100.00 per hour, and added a No-Show fee of \$13.50 per trip that was not in the original agreement. This charge is for when a trip isn't properly canceled by the customer.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council consider authorizing the City Manager to approve Addendum #1 to existing Inter-Local Agreement with East Texas Council of Governments (ETCOG) to simplify and streamline operations on overflow/as needed public transit provider.

AMENDMENT #1 TO THE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

The City of Tyler, Texas ("City") and the East Texas Council of Governments ("ETCOG" and, collectively, the "Parties") have entered into that certain agreement titled, "INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN EAST TEXAS COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS AND CITY OF TYLER, TEXAS FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SERVICES" dated January 12, 2022 ("Agreement"). The Parties enter into the amendment ("Amendment #1) as of April 12, 2025.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Agreement provides that contract terms cannot be altered, changed, or amended except by a written instrument signed by both parties;

WHEREAS, Section 2 of the Agreement, titled "COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS", requires ETCOG to comply with all policies and procedures of the Federal Transit Administration ("FTA") and the Texas Department of Transportation ("TxDOT");

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement further as set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises of the Parties, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, upon execution of this Amendment #1 (the "Amendment"), the Parties agree to modify the Agreement as follows:

1. Amendment. The following language is added to Section 3 of the Agreement as a new paragraph titled: "Scope of Service for Overflow/As-Needed Public Transit Provider." Purpose: This Agreement outlines the terms under which ETCOG will provide overflow or as-needed transit services to support the City of Tyler Transit ("Tyler Transit") when regular capacity is exceeded, ensuring that all passengers can travel efficiently and safely.

Services Provided: ETCOG agrees to provide supplemental public transit services under the following conditions:

- a. <u>Overflow Service:</u> ETCOG will provide additional vehicles and/or staff when Tyler Transit experiences ridership levels exceeding its regular capacity on scheduled routes.
- b. <u>As-Needed Service:</u> ETCOG will provide on-demand transit services based on specific requests by Tyler Transit to accommodate unexpected surges in demand and/or any other situations deemed necessary by Tyler Transit to ensure passenger safety and comfort.
- 2. Amendment. The Parties agree to amend SECTION 6: COMPENSATION of the Agreement. This Amendment modifies the pricing table in the Agreement as follows: Per Trip Rate: Increased from \$24.00 per trip to \$27.00 per trip. Hourly Rate: Increased from \$75.00 per hour to \$90.00 per hour. No-Show Trip Rate: \$13.50 per no-show trip. This is an additional rate that did not exist in the original Agreement.

The adjustments to the pricing structure reflect the Parties' intention to support the services described in the Agreement and provide fair remuneration for the additional requirements, including but not limited to:

- a. **Service Delivery**: Performing the trips assigned daily by Tyler Transit, as specified in the Agreement.
- b. **Compliance with Original Agreement**: Adhering to the terms and conditions outlined in the Agreement executed on January 12, 2022.
- c. **Regulatory Compliance**: Ensuring full compliance with all applicable City policies and procedures, as well as those of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).
- d. **Operational Standards**: The City of Tyler requires that ETCOG meets or exceeds standards related to safety, security, accident prevention, fuel costs, maintenance costs, and insurance.
- **3. Other provisions.** All other terms and conditions, except those provisions specifically changed by Amendment #1, shall remain in full force and effect.

This Interlocal Agreement is made and entered into this __12th___ day of January 2022, by and between the East Texas Council of Governments ("ETCOG") dba GoBus, a political subdivision of the State of Texas, and the City of Tyler dba Tyler Transit, a home-rule municipality located within Smith County, Texas, ("City"), under the authority granted by and pursuant to Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City of Tyler to promote the public health, safety, and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler desires the public to be the beneficiary of a demand-response transit system operated by the East Texas Council of Governments dba GoBus; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler desires to engage the GoBus rural demand response public transportation service funded by the Texas Department of Transportation and administered by the East Texas Council of Governments to perform demand response transportation trips to assist citizens within the identified area; and

WHEREAS, authorizing the administration of public transportation programs on behalf of the City of Tyler by the East Texas Council of Governments would increase the efficiency and effectiveness of such public transportation programs in the City of Tyler, avoid needless repetition and duplication of costs on behalf of both the City of Tyler and the East Texas Council of Governments, and preserve the quality of public transportation programs within the City of Tyler at a lower cost; and

WHEREAS, Texas Government Code Section 791.011(d) provides that an interlocal contract must (1) be authorized by the governing body of each party to the contract unless a party to the contract is a municipally owned electric utility, in which event the governing body may establish procedures for entering into interlocal contracts that do not exceed \$100,000 without requiring the

approval of the governing body; (2) state the purpose, terms, rights, and duties of the contracting parties; and (3) specify that each party paying for the performance of governmental functions or services must make those payments from current revenues available to the paying party; and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler is a home-rule city and political subdivision member of the East Texas Council of Governments pursuant to Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, entitled "Interlocal Cooperation Contract;" and

WHEREAS, the East Texas Council of Governments is a governmental entity and body politic created pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 391 of the Local Government Code and as such constitutes a corporate and political entity organized under state law and a political subdivision pursuant to the definition set out in Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code, entitled "Interlocal Cooperation Contract;" and

WHEREAS, the City of Tyler and the East Texas Council of Governments are therefore authorized pursuant to Chapter 791 of the Texas Government Code to enter into an interlocal contract, the purpose of which is to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of both local government entities; and

WHEREAS, Section 791.011 of the Texas Government Code specifically authorizes said interlocal contract between the City of Tyler and the East Texas Council of Governments, more specifically authorizing an interlocal contract for the purpose of providing a governmental function or service that each party to the contract is authorized to perform individually; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Tyler and the governing body of the East Texas Council of Governments desire to enter into an interlocal contract to authorize the East Texas Council of Governments dba GoBus to administer public transportation services and public transportation grant programs within the City of Tyler;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Tyler, Texas dba Tyler Transit, hereinafter referred to as "City," and East Texas Council of Governments dba GoBus, hereinafter referred to as "ETCOG," in consideration of the mutual benefits to be derived by each, do hereby stipulate and agree each with the other as follows:

1. ETCOG Acceptance of Program Responsibility. ETCOG hereby accepts and shall assume responsibility for the administration of the GoBus rural demand response public transportation service ("GoBus") as described herein. As part of the exercise of responsibility for said GoBus

hereunder, ETCOG covenants and agrees that it has all personnel, processes, procedures, and all other infrastructure currently in place necessary to operate the GoBus program in full conformance with all applicable laws, regulations, guidelines, orders and other directives.

- 2. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. Under the provision of 49 U.S.C., ETCOG shall perform all necessary actions provided under this agreement in connection with transportation services. ETCOG shall perform all obligations and services pursuant to this Agreement in compliance with all applicable laws, statutes, regulations, and ordinances. This involves maintaining compliance with all Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) regulations in order to provide transportation service, including ensuring that all drivers are participating in ETCOG's Drug and Alcohol Program.
- 3. Scope of Service. ETCOG's GoBus shall be capable of comfortably accommodating ambulatory and non-ambulatory passengers commensurate with public transportation procedures. Transportation shall be via paratransit, demand response, or charter/event-based services scheduled at least 24 hours in advance for City's clients in the identified service area. Service provided to clients will be scheduled and completed during the service hours of 6:00 AM-9:00 PM on weekdays and 9:00AM-6:15PM on Saturdays. Upon advance request of 24 hours' notice, GoBus may operate during City's special events outside of the aforementioned service hours. The bus shall be maintained by ETCOG in a clean, neat, and orderly fashion and in good working order and condition.

ETCOG shall be responsible for determining vehicle replacement needs and for applying for and securing such vehicles under available funding programs. City shall have no responsibility for the maintenance of the GoBus. Trips to client destinations shall be scheduled by the City through the City's Public Transportation System, also known as "Tyler Transit." For the purpose of efficient and effective public transportation utilization, Tyler Transit is responsible for dispatching services. Trips shall be scheduled 24 hours in advance and up to two weeks in advance according to GoBus policies and procedures. Scheduled departure and arrival times are an estimate based on traffic, weather and the number of passengers occupying the bus.

ETCOG assumes all responsibility for satisfying all requirements imposed by any applicable agency with appropriate jurisdiction over any and all portions of the GoBus program, and the City shall have no responsibility for said GoBus. ETCOG shall be solely responsible for certifying and assuring that the GoBus complies with any and all requirements related to, but not

limited to: Equal Employment Opportunity, nondiscrimination, procurement, non-conflict of interest and other GoBus program requirements as shall be imposed by appropriate federal or state agencies. ETCOG shall maintain all records and documents in its possession relating to or used in the performance of GoBus in complete form and in conformity with all applicable federal and state rules and regulations with regards to the sufficiency and completeness of such records, and shall make such records available to the City or any authorized representative of any state or federal agency with appropriate jurisdiction over GoBus, upon reasonable demand for access to said records.

- **4.** <u>Personnel</u>. ETCOG has, or will secure, all personnel required in performing services under this agreement to support Tyler Transit operations. All vehicle operators associated with this project will be direct employees of ETCOG's transportation department.
- 5. <u>Period of Performance</u>. Services shall commence on/or around <u>January 12</u>, 2022 and shall continue through <u>January 12</u>, 2023. This agreement shall be automatically renewed on a year-to-year basis for up to a total of four (4) years, unless terminated by either party as otherwise specified herein.
- 6. <u>Compensation</u>. City agrees to compensate ETCOG's GoBus via monthly reimbursement through chosen pricing format based on the transportation type or event requirements (see the GoBus Pricing Table immediately below). The GoBus Pricing Table lists three Reimbursement prices. Reimbursement may also be paid via in-kind services. The cost of in-kind services will be based on open market pricing of the same or similar goods or services. All in-kind services must be agreed upon by both parties and will be deducted from the total price of the monthly invoice.

Payments to GoBus will not fluctuate according to, or in response to, distance, or required accommodation, client (or attendant). GoBus will invoice and provide supporting documentation to Tyler Transit on a monthly basis, including trip reports, denials, and no shows.

- 7. <u>Termination</u>. Either party retains the right to terminate this Agreement at any time giving written notice to other party of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof at least thirty (30) days before the effective date of such termination.
- 8. Changes. ETCOG and/or City may, from time to time, require changes in the scope of the services to be performed hereunder. Such changes are subject to mutual agreement by both parties and will only take effect by written amendment to the Agreement.
- 9. Interest of Members of GoBus and Others. No officer, member, employee, or delegate of ETCOG and no member of its governing body, and no other public official of the governing body of the locality or localities in which the project is situated or being carried out who exercises any functions or responsibilities in the review of approval of the undertaking or carrying out of this project shall participate in any personal or pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, in this agreement or the proceeds thereof.
- 10. Insurance. GoBus shall ensure that all ETCOG personnel operating and assets belonging to GoBus shall be fully licensed and competent to operate the bus. In addition, ETCOG shall acquire and maintain during the term of this agreement all appropriate insurance coverage, including but not limited to, commercial liability insurance, workers compensation insurance; auto insurance; and any other insurance a prudent owner and operator of a bus used for public transportation would maintain and all in accordance with federal and state compliance standards..
- 11. Special Considerations. GoBus holidays are New Year's Eve, New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Martin Luther King Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and the day after, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. GoBus will follow its Bad Weather Policy in the event dangerous weather conditions are forecasted. During these times GoBus services, including buses operated under this agreement may be halted for the safety of GoBus employees and patrons. GoBus commits to coordinating with Tyler Transit during the event of these occurrences. Any disruption of normal service due to bad weather or other, will be immediately communicated with Tyler Transit upon event.
- 12. <u>Point of Contact</u>. There shall be a designated point of contact for each organization, GoBus and Tyler Transit. The points of contact will be outlined below to maintain an organized flow of communication and coordinate meetings as needed.

- 13. No Waiver of Immunity or Defenses. The parties, as independent political subdivisions of the State, cannot indemnify each other for any claims, damages, judgments, costs, or expenses arising out of the sole or partial negligent or intentional act or omission by the other. The parties agree that each party shall be liable only for damages, including attorneys' fees and costs, related to or arising out of the intentional or negligent act or omission of such party's own respective officials, agents, representatives, and employees in performance of this Agreement. This Agreement does not extend the liability of the parties. Neither the City nor ETCOG waives any immunity or defenses available to it against claims made by third parties.
- 14. Applicable Law and Venue. The validity, interpretation, and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Texas. Venue for all actions arising under this Agreement shall lie exclusively in the courts of Smith County, Texas, for actions arising under state law, and in the Eastern District of Texas for all cases arising under federal law.
- 15. <u>Assignment.</u> This Agreement may not be assigned by any party hereto without the prior written unanimous consent of the other parties. No assignment, delegation of duties or subcontract under this Agreement shall be effective without the prior written unanimous consent of all parties hereto.
- 16. <u>Legal Construction</u>. In the event that any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability shall not affect the other provisions, and the Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provisions had never been contained in this Agreement.
- 17. Agency: Independent Contractor. The parties agree and acknowledge that each entity is not an agent of the other entity, and that each entity is responsible for its own acts, forbearance, negligence, and deeds, and those of its agents and employees in conjunction with this Interlocal Agreement. The Agreement does not and shall not be construed to entitle any party or any party's respective employees, if applicable, to any benefit, privilege, or other amenities of employment applicable to the other party.

18. Force Majeure. Neither party will be liable for failure or delay to perform obligations under this Agreement, which have become practicably impossible because of circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the applicable party. Such circumstances include without limitation natural disasters or acts of God; premises destroyed or damaged by fire, wind, flood, cause of nature; acts of terrorism; labor disputes or stoppages; war; government acts or orders; epidemics, pandemics or outbreak of communicable disease; quarantines; national or regional emergencies; or any other cause, whether similar in kind to the foregoing or otherwise, beyond the party's reasonable control.

19. Entire Agreement. This Agreement represents the entire Agreement among the Parties with respect to the subject matter covered by this Agreement.
