background

CRA budget highlights:

Revenue:

Budget estimates suggest increment revenue will increase 10%. With added interest earnings and revenue totals are projected at \$8.44 million. Contributions from Orange County over \$2 million in increment revenue are met with a 30% rebate and a 50% rebate of contributions over \$3 million. The CRA will rebate \$1,300,000 to the County as part of this agreement. This will be the fifth-year increment revenue contributions to the trust fund by the City exceed that of the County.

Expenses:

Through August 2023, actual expenditures of the CRA are expected to be in-line with budgeted estimates by fiscal year-end. As a result, staff has proposed a budget that maintains all debt service payments, supports operations, fulfills all contracts, provides funding for existing programs and includes capital improvement projects. For FY23-24, general personnel and indirect costs are expected to each stay at ten percent or below of total expenditures. Debt Service shows no significant change. The table below demonstrates budget expense categories consistent with the proforma for FY23-24.

Personnel & Indirect Costs: Identified as any cost related to salaries, wages, and benefits.

General Operating: Costs associated with operating supplies, memberships, books, periodicals, equipment, promotional activities, travel and training, and contractual services.

Community Initiatives: Includes CRA resident and business programs, support funding for the Winter Park Community Center and other nonprofits. Staff has added, at minimum, an additional 10% to support funding to combat inflation.

Capital Maintenance: Funding for parking agreements within the CRA district.

Debt Service: Approved bonds through the CRA. Bonds are expected through the existing life of the district.

Capital Projects: Projects included as part of the capital improvement plan (e.g. FY23-24 proforma). This also includes miscellanous enhancement projects such as past examples of weekend Sunrail, the moonlight garden project, downtown sidewalk repair, parking sensors, and pedestrian safety improvements such as rapid rectangular flashing beacons (RRFBs). The intention is to provide opportunities within the budget for the CRA to respond quickly to requests and immediate concerns.

Capital Improvement Plan

The proposed capital improvement plan estimates future increment revenue growth, project costs, and Agency direction into the remaining life of the CRA. At this time, conservative growth (roughly 4.0% average) is presumed through 2027. For reference, the attached CRA pro forma sheet hypothesizes potential future increment growth yet to be determined.

The table highlights over \$4.8 million of new investment by the CRA to the district in project, program, and social & event funding. Included for discussion are the MLK Park Enhancement project, 17-92 Streetscape, Central Park Area Improvements (Public Facility), Small Scale CRA Projects, and program updates.

MLK Park Enhancement

Under redevelopment goals and objectives sections 1.8, 1.9, and 6.5 of the 1999 CRA plan highlights the need to beautify the corridor including "to augment and improve open space", "to showcase Lake Island (MLK) Park", and "to resolve stormwater pollution issues." To that end, the CRA budget includes \$2.0 million to continue the improvements to MLK Park that began in FY22 with replacement of the fields and funding of the MLK Memorial Corner. Remaining enhancements include cultural and historical signage, improved lighting and sidewalks, parking improvements, restroom & playground area enhancements, and funding contingency for stormwater upgrades. Over the past year,

City staff along with consultant Dix-Hite, held meetings with the Parks and Recreation board (PRAB), Community Redevelopment board (CRA), and community input meetings related to the Community Playground at MLK Park. The attached conceptual design was brought forward at a joint PRAB/CRA meeting that ensures preservation of key structures and identity of the current playground. The intent is to keep with the desire of residents that value the legacy of the area, while also accommodating aspirational new elements to the park. These include better visibility, water features (spray play), accessibility, line of sight adjustments, inclusiveness, and modern safety standards.

Staff's intent is to move forward with the project in phases. This provides continual usage of the park while improvement are made. Given the uncertain nature of material and labor costs, staff is continuing to hone in on a final price, but feel this allocation largely gets the entirety of the project funded.

17-92 Streetscape

The \$1,000,000 for improvements to U.S. 17-92, or Orlando Avenue, is the first of a three year allocation consistent with the local match required by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). While this \$5.2 million dollar improvement may adjust given the rise in material in labor costs, it accounts for the pre-existing estimates for intersection improvements at Orlando Avenue and Fairbanks, Morse, and Webster Avenue including mast arms, landscaping, pedestrian curbing, and utility improvements including stormwater. In addition, the CRA's local contribution will provide for sidewalk improvements in excess of six feet where applicable and additional landscaping. Staff is currently working with FDOT and consultants on new valuations for the proposed work.

Central Park Area Improvements: Public Facility

The CRA plan Policy 7.3A, directs that where possible, the Agency shall enhance public spaces and facilities with land purchases, park improvements, and facility upgrades. In addition, Policy 8.6D states open spaces shall be coodinated to provide a cohesive neighborhood. Further, table 6-1 of the 1994 plan illustrates Central Park as an eligible funding area for increment financing. As a framework, staff has engaged with a consultant on a concept for Central Park restrooms. The proposal took into consideration location, efficiency of storage to staff, and public park amenity improvements. Staff is working with the consultant on providing adjustments based on Agency direction at the August 10th work session. To that end, staff is recommending moving forward with a budget allocation that will be revised, along with the concept through the FY24 year that will be brought back as early as the November meeting. If there is concensus to move forward at that point, the board may move to design, or design and build as part of its currently allocated budget. The concept has been vetted and will continue to be coordinated and communicated among staff, the CRA/Parks Advisory board, Park Avenue merchants, and users of the park (Farmer's Market patrons and vendors, stakeholders, and the public at large).

Small Scale CRA Projects Fund:

The purpose of this line item is to be responsive to needs and concerns not considered as part of the city's budget within a given year. Put differently, it provides a financial opportunity to elevate the city's level of service not considered in the city's budget. For example, the Parks Department has requested assistance with a project to improve sightlines in the Central Park area. The refuse staging area, located at the southern end of Central Park is an unattractive but necessary component of the park facility. A screen could be utilized to block the area the view and improve the overall area appearance and experience. Screening the waste staging would be an improvement to the area and would serve to benefit the CRA.

The CRA plan has the ability through the contributive programs mechanism, to assist in accomplishing specific objectives, in the case to improve the overall appeal and appearance of the public area, and to meet and exceed accepted landscape requirements to screen a waste/refuse staging area from public view. The CRA plan addresses small scale projects such as this through objectives and policies specifically Objective 3.4: Landscaping - To emphasize and reinforce the "Park-Like" feeling within the CRA.

Similarly, this line item also accounts for continual improvements on Center Street, such as the previously approved condensate disposal improvement program currently underway. Staff is currently putting together a list of interested businesses so contracted vendors have the opportunity to address collectively.

Program Updates

The budget provides for updates to both the CRA's business façade and housing rehabilitation program. Changes from last year include a new time certain before reapplication by business façade property owners/lessees and an updated cap of \$30,000 for eligible rehabilitation improvements including emergency provisions for natural disasters such as hurricanes.

Support Funding

Funding for supporting partners has increased by 10% at minimum to account for inflation. The budget also accounts for Agency direction to include an allocation for the Winter Park library of \$350,000.

WINTER PARK, FL, an internationally recognized, award winning city with multiple accredited agencies (January 31, 2023) The City of Winter Park and its Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) will host a community meeting on Tuesday, February 7, at 6 p.m., in the Winter Park Community Center located at 721 West New England Avenue. The purpose of this meeting is to review concepts developed from the public and stakeholder input received regarding enhancements to the Community Playground and surrounding area in Martin Luther King, Jr. Park.



During the summer 2022, the city held public meetings to receive feedback on necessary renovation and upgrades of the Community Playground, also known as Castle Park. After decades of wear and tear, the playground is in need of enhancements including improvements to bring the playground into compliance with today's safety standards.

Martin Luther King, Jr. Park has become enlivened and engaged with the opening of the new Winter Park Library & Events Center in 2021, which overlooks Lake Mendsen and the 23-acre park. In recent years, the CRA has worked to establish parameters for public investment into the park, including a memorial corner near the intersection of South Denning Drive and West Morse Boulevard, and an overall park concepts package.

A 35-year-old wooden playground in Winter Park could see some big upgrade and possibly even a complete overhaul in the near future.

"Castle Park," a wooden jungle gym in Martin Luther King Jr. Park has been one of the most beloved public play areas in Winter Park since it was built in 1987 and is one of the last remaining wooden playgrounds in the area. The structure features a series of turret-like towers that helped to give it its nickname and was originally built by volunteers using donated materials and equipment and designed by **Robert Leathers** (Website).

The City of Winter Park has been mulling over an update for the structure since 2022 when we shared a public meeting notice **HERE**, saying the city felt that the years of wear and tear had necessitated bringing it up to code.

A public meeting is currently scheduled for Tuesday, February 7 at 6 p.m. at the Winter Park Community Center where city staff will review concepts and renderings that they've developed using public input since a series of meetings held last summer. **Click HERE** for more information.


A petition has been launched on <u>Change.org</u> in the hopes of convincing the City of Winter Park to repair the current structure and keep it as-is and retain its original character.

Playground Upgrades Presented at Community Meeting

The enhancement of Community Playground at Martin Luther King Jr. Park took another step toward construction as Winter Park's Community Redevelopment Agency and design contractor Dix Hite + Partners, Inc. revealed a new design concept during a Feb. 7 meeting at Winter Park Community Center.


The playground, also known as Castle Park, was built in 1987 using donated materials and equipment. Renovations will remedy years of wear, meet current playground safety standards, and create new play areas.

Renderings presented at the Feb. 7 meeting were the product of input collected at previous meetings, and focused on the castle redesign and a proposed splash pad. Workshops and meetings will continue until a final design is agreed upon.




New playground features (illustrated above) incorporate climbing areas, tunnels, slides, and sensory play areas with textured walls and sounds.


While the original structure is at the center of the project renderings, designers suggested an abbreviated version. "The main castle is what's so special about this place," said Dix Hite Landscape Architect Viviana Castro, adding that it, "would require a lot of maintenance, a lot of upkeep to follow today's standards."



A reinforced, streamlined castle/fort design would include wheelchair-accessible inclines and roller slides on one side (above); climbing features would be positioned on the opposite side (below).



The splash pad is designed for a range of age groups with fountains, waterfalls and quiet spaces. Additional climbing areas exist within the rock formations and water would continuously move throughout the area.



Attendees had the opportunity to review the designs and offer feedback. Suggested additions included:

- Attendants posted throughout the new playground
- More visibility in the tunnels and climbing areas
- Incorporating more of the original castle
- Additional water fountains and bathrooms
- Replace mulch with more soft surfacing

Designers and city staff will take the feedback from the Feb. 7 meeting into consideration and additional meetings will be scheduled to review changes, and discuss other areas of the new playground design.

Aside from the Community Park redesign, the area by the corner of Denning Drive and Morse Boulevard will receive a Martin Luther King Jr. memorial and community space, called Unity Corner, that will host Winter Park's annual Unity

Heritage Festival. Community meetings will be scheduled as part of the design process.






Project Location Map








